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NOTED AUTHOR AND NEWSPAPERMAN DIES

Andrew D. Merkel, 68, former Atlantic bureau chief of The Canadian Press, died in Halifax Friday after a lengthy illness.

He retired May 1, 1946 after 30 years as a newspaper man in the Maritime provinces.

With The Canadian Press since its formation in 1917 he made CP Halifax an internationally known news source in the days of pioneer trans-Atlantic flights.

As a cub reporter on the old Sydney Record, he covered the story of Marconi's transmission of the first commercial wireless message. Two years afterwards he recorded the first airplane flight in the British Empire when he watched J. A. D. McCurdy take off from the ice of Nova Scotia's Bras d'Or lakes.

In later years he organized coverage of the Moose River mine disaster of 1936 and the International Fishermen's races off Halifax.

He was head of the bureau in Halifax during six years of war when in most stories Halifax was known only as "an east coast Canadian port."

He contributed greatly to the advancement of The Canadian Press, especially in the discovery and development of young newspaper men.

The son of an Anglican minister, Rev. A. D. Merkel, he was born in upper New York state 68 years ago and came to Nova Scotia when his father took charge of a parish in Digby.

Upon his retirement he returned to the scene of his boyhood where he bought 300 acres of land at Lower Granville, N. S., near Champlain's first habitation.

In addition to his newspaper work, Mr. Merkel wrote two volumes of poetry, "The Order of Good Cheer" about the first French settlers in Nova Scotia and "Tallahassee," a story of Halifax during the days of the American Civil War.

Halifax newspaper men paid tribute to Mr. Merkel shortly after his retirement at a dinner tendered by the Halifax newspapers of that day, the Herald and Mail and the Chronicle and Star.

The late H. P. Duchemin of the Sydney-Post-Record, former president of The Canadian Press, paid tribute to Mr. Merkel for "his courage and impartiality."

"The work he did was a big

factor in the success of CP," said Mr. Duchemin. "There was no employee with as long a record in one field."

J. E. (Gee) Ahern, then mayor of Halifax, himself a newspaper man, presented Mr. Merkel with a fountain pen on behalf of the city of Halifax.

Others who spoke included the late Sir Joseph Chisholm, chief justice of Nova Scotia, and Chas. Bruce, general superintendent of the Canadian Press, who was trained under Mr. Merkel.

Telegrams of good wishes to Mr. Merkel were read from F. L. Kerr of the Hamilton Spectator, then president of The Canadian Press, and T. F. Drummond of the Saint John Telegraph-Journal, a director.

C. F. Fraser, then managing editor of the Halifax Chronicle and Star, made a presentation on behalf of Halifax newspapers.

R. J. Rankin, managing editor of the Herald and Mail, and now president of the Canadian Press, presided.

Mrs. Merkel died two years ago. Survivors include a son, J. Arthur Merkel of the C. P. R. public relations bureau in Montreal; Mrs. Gordon Thompson of Halifax and Mrs. Charles B. Lynch, wife of a Reuters news agency executive in New York.

The funeral was held Monday at Port Royal—whose historic name was re-established through the efforts of Mr. Merkel who did not like the new name of Lower Granville. Service was held at 2 p.m. at the Anglican church with burial in the church cemetery.

Paying tribute to Mr. Merkel, Mr. Rankin, as president of Canadian Press, said:

"The passing of Andrew D. Merkel removes from the Canadian scene a pioneer newspaper contribution to the development of the nation's news-gathering service. Through his long period of service Mr. Merkel gave to Canadians vivid stories of many thrilling chapters in Canadian history. Under his capable guidance, there developed many young newspaper men who are holding top positions in the newspaper world today. In literature as well as in news writing he made a name for himself and in both fields he did a real and lasting service to the people of this country."

INDUSTRY CLOSED IN DISPUTE WITH LABOUR

Nearly two hundred persons—eight hour day by leaving work on Monday afternoon at "five o'clock" rather than the usual quitting time of five-thirty. However, when the noon hour whistle of the mill which is used to call the men back to work was resounded and the mill closed down.

Bell of the Labour Relations Board who is in Sydney would not be able to give a ruling on the matter until his return to his Halifax office. It is expected he will be in Halifax on Friday.

In the meantime it is understood efforts are underway to secure Unemployment Insurance benefits for the nearly two hundred employees who have been rendered jobless by the closing of the mill.

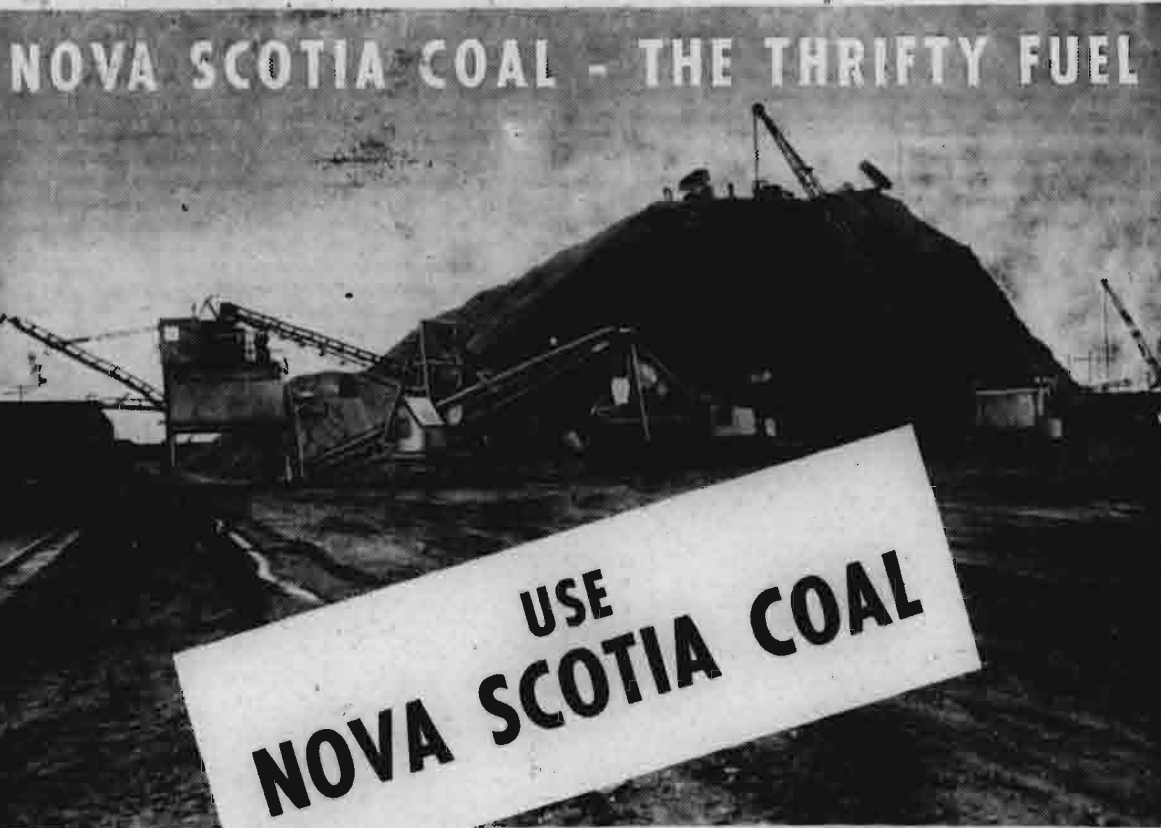

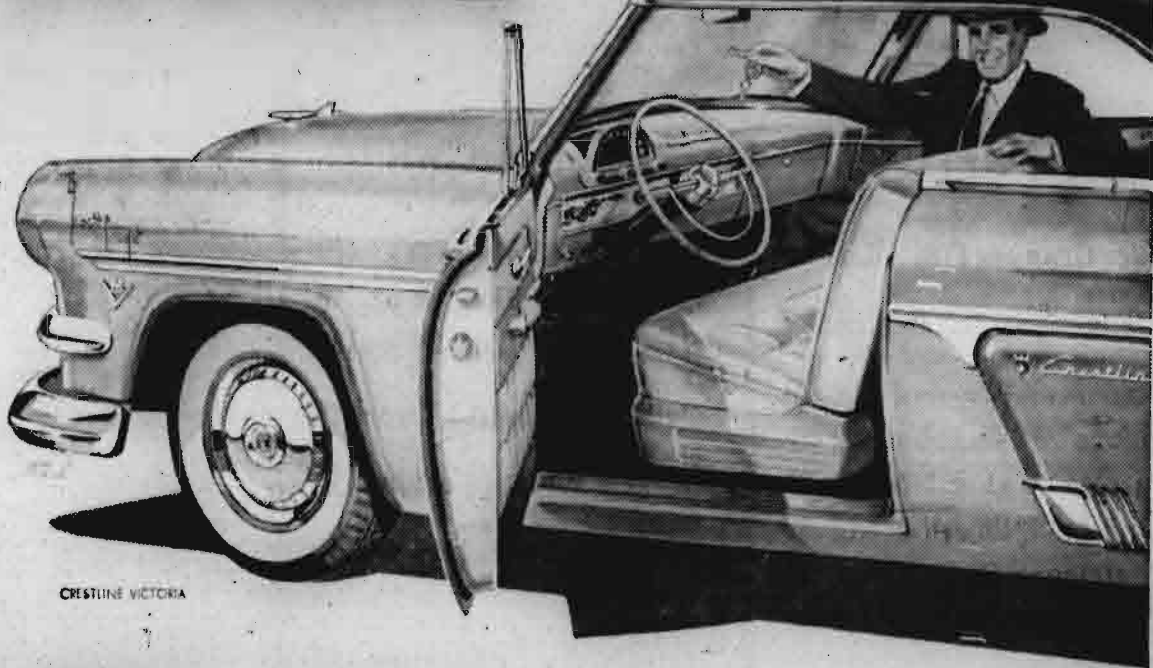

Butterscotch-Pecan Cookies

Grease cookie sheets. Preheat oven to 350° (moderate). Mix and sift twice 2 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour or 2 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour, 2 tps. Magic Baking Powder and 1/2 tsp. salt. Cream 1/2 c. butter or margarine and gradually blend in 1 1/2 c. lightly-packed brown sugar; add 2 well-beaten eggs part at a time, beating well after each addition; mix in 1/4 tsp. vanilla and 1/4 c. chopped pecans. Drop dough by spoonfuls, well apart, on prepared cookie sheets; flatten with the floured tines of a fork. Bake in pre-heated oven 10 to 12 minutes. Remove from pan immediately. Yield—6 dozen cookies.

Tom Farnham's Column

To the Editor of The Digby Courier:
I recently received a very interesting letter from Mrs. Annie Smith Bradbury, of Waban, Mass. U. S. A., formerly of Weymouth Bridge, N. S.

She writes for old acquaintance sake, having known "me and my gang" fifty-six years ago at Weymouth, N. S., during my twelve years sojourn there.

Well do I remember the picnics held at Sandy Cove, and the moonlight excursions on St. Mary's Bay, accompanied by The Weymouth Brass Band of twenty-five pieces, directed by Tom Farnham.

Enclosed in Mrs. Bradbury's letter, to me was an excerpt from her mother's letter to her sister, Mrs. Ellen Smith, dated August 29, 1898.

The letters below will tell the story:

Waban, Mass.,
June 14, 1954.

Dear Mr. Farnham:
I am Annie Smith Bradbury. When I was a young girl I lived with my grandmother, Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, in Weymouth, Nova Scotia.

I remember you and Mrs. Farnham well. We were neighbours and we all went to the Methodist Church there.

I am enclosing a copy of a letter I wrote my dear sister, Ellen, August 29, 1898, when I was living in Weymouth, telling her of a picnic I went to at Sandy Cove. My sister and her husband, Mr. Frank Nichols, Roxville, Digby Co., Nova Scotia, saved the letter and not long ago he sent the letter to my daughter, Mrs. Anne Bradbury Hart. He suggested that I write you a letter telling all about the picnic and perhaps you might publish the letter in the Digby Courier.

You were leader of the band, Mr. Farnham, and we had grand music.

I thank you very much Mr. Farnham.

I will close with happy memories of fine neighbours and good friends.

This is an excerpt from my mother's letter to her sister, Ellen Smith, written fifty-six years ago:

Weymouth Bridge,
August 29th, 1898.

"I must not forget to tell you what a beautiful time I had Saturday. There was an excursion from here to Sandy Cove, to a picnic, and I went. Hattie and Edna went too. There were lots of young people from here. We went from here in large boats all fastened together, and the steamboat towed us out of the harbour about two miles and a half, and there we got aboard a vessel and went to Sandy Cove. There was a large crowd went from here and down river. The Weymouth Band went too. I was a little sick going over.

When we got there, the Band marched ahead and played, and we all followed on behind to the picnic grounds. Then we got our teas and the Band played awhile.

About dark we started for home. The old tug-boat blew the whistle for us and we all went down and got aboard the vessel. There was a large crowd down to the wharf, and the Band played twice and we started for home. The trip home was beautiful, for it was just as calm as it could be, and it was so moonlight and clear, and we had music and singing on the water. I had just one lovely time. I wish you could have been with me. It was quite late when we got home."

The trophy, which was originated by the Digby club, was won last year in the grand competition at the end of the season by Lunenburg. Digby retrieved it last week from Lunenburg and Sunday defended it against the Bridgewater club.

Fight Card Attracts Crowd

Cobey McCluskey, Maritime Middleweight Champion took a unanimous decision in a ten round bout against Cecil Gray of Montreal here last Thursday night. The fight was unspectacular with McCluskey in the lead all the way. Referee was Freddie Cookson.

The McCluskey-Gray bout was the main event of a boxing card which formed part of the July 1st celebration sponsored by the Digby Board of Trade.

In the semi-final bout, a six rounder, Buddy Daye of Moncton, weighing 136 pounds kayowed Babe Roberts, 134 pound Halifax boxer in the closing moments of the first round. Roberts proved no match for the hard hitting Daye and went down for the count during a flurry of blows to the head by Daye.

A special attraction added to the card just prior to the semi-final was a three round exhibition featuring Keith Paris, 136 pound contender for the light-weight championship of Canada, and Rocco Jones, 127 pound claimant to the featherweight crown of the Maritimes. This bout proved to be very popular with both boys showing fast footwork and cagy handling of the gloves.

In the second bout of the evening Vincent Cook, 140 pounds of Halifax, scored a first round knockout against 135 pound Rocky Keating of Parrsboro. Keating showed well in the opening seconds of the round but Cook's superior ability began to tell early and the Parrsboro lad was floored for the count with a hard body blow from Cook twelve seconds before the round ended.

The first match saw 156 pound Kid Izzard of Halifax and 158 pound Alfie Grant of Truro, fight to a four round draw. Both fighters were very evenly matched and the scrap was an excellent one throughout. Referee for the preliminaries was Carl Saulnier. Judges were Gregg Gilliat and Dave Daley. Timekeeper was Frank Robinson.

Recalls First Trip To Digby

Samuel Wax, Brookline, Mass., who has been on a fishing trip near Yarmouth, made a call at the Digby Courier on Tuesday. Mr. Wax took great pleasure in relating the story of his first visit to Digby in 1895. Accompanied by his brother, Martin, they crossed on the "New Brunswick" from Boston to Digby where they obtained room and board at \$5.00 per week. Mr. Wax recalled a trip to Tiverton in a 35 foot sail boat manned by Mr. Main and of rounding up a party of 10 who at \$1 each were able to procure a boat for a day fishing. Their catch, he said, was 400 pounds.

Mr. Wax was unable to recall the name of the people with whom he and his brother spent a couple of weeks in Marshalltown back in 1895 except that there was a son named Oscar and a daughter by the name of Clara. Room and board at this home, he said, was \$2.50 per week with horse and buggy available for use and all the vegetables from the garden they wanted to eat.

Town Council Meets

Routine business occupied Monday night's session of the Town Council. Opening of the meeting was delayed over an hour due to a lack of a quorum.

Permission was granted Miss Anna Marshall to erect a home on her land on King Street according to plans and specifications submitted.

Mayer Guy E. Morehouse and Councillor Joseph D. Hattie were named as delegates to the convention of the Nova Scotia Union of Municipalities which meets this year in New Glasgow.

Permission was granted the Ladies' Hospital Aid to hold a Penny Parade on July 24th and to the Digby General Hospital for a tag day in connection with their fair on August 18. The Salvation Army was also granted permission to hold a tag day in September.

Town Clerk S. C. Denton reported over four thousand dollars in taxes, both current and arrears, collected in June. He stated this was nearly double the amount collected during the same month last year.

It was decided to continue the drive to collect outstanding taxes. Letters and statements have now been sent to delinquent taxpayers and these will be followed up, if disregarded, by the posting of lists and later, if necessary, by tax sales of property.

The Council passed an amendment to Section 10 of Chapter 20 of the Town By Laws prohibiting the burning of rubbish or other combustibles on the waterfront of the town between the Spur Pier and the Salvation Army building.

It was reported to the meeting several new fire hydrants were in stock and would be installed in the locations recommended by a meeting of the Fire Department, Fire Committee and Wardens.

Fortieth Year Of Pastor's Arrival

Rev. J. W. Derby, pastor of Westport Disciple Church of Christ, celebrated his fortieth year of coming to this pastorate on Sunday, July 3rd. At least two members were present at the morning service who attended the first one of forty years ago.

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Date-Orange Pudding

Combine in a greased casserole (6-cup size) $\frac{1}{4}$ c. corn syrup, 1 tbs. grated lemon rind and $\frac{1}{2}$ c. orange juice. Preheat oven to 375° (moderately hot). Mix and sift once, then sift into a bowl, $1\frac{1}{2}$ c. once-sifted pastry flour (or $1\frac{1}{2}$ c. once-sifted all-purpose flour), $2\frac{1}{2}$ tps. Magic Baking Powder, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt and $\frac{1}{4}$ c. fine granulated sugar. Mix in $\frac{1}{4}$ c. corn flakes, slightly crushed, and $\frac{1}{4}$ c. cut-up pitted dates. Combine 1 well-beaten egg, $\frac{1}{2}$ c. milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. vanilla and 3 tbs. shortening, melted. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly. Turn into prepared dish. Bake in preheated oven, about 40 minutes. Serve warm, with pouring cream. Yield—6 servings.

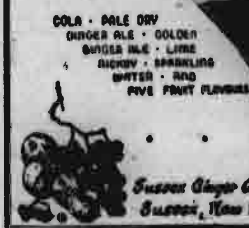


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Announces Bursaries

Major General E. C. Flaw, CBE, DSO, CD, General Officer Commanding Eastern Command and chairman of the local committee of the Strathcona Fund has announced that the committee has granted eight bursaries valued at fifty dollars each for the purpose of encouraging physical education in the public schools of Nova Scotia.

Those receiving the awards were: Doreen Barton of Lockport Rural High School who next year will be on the staff of the Lockport High School; Barbara Creelman of Shannon Park School; William Gatchell, New Germany Rural High School; Stuart Burdine of Tatamagouche Rural High School; Ethyl Longley, Kings County Academy, Kentville; Fraser Matheson, East Pictou Rural High School; Percy Millett, Lockport Rural High School and Norma Pratt of Oxford Rural High School.

This is the second year that the course has operated and once again will be held at the Nova Scotia Summer School at Dalhousie University. The course is open to men and women who hold a General First Class or High School License and who wish to become qualified as teachers of Physical Education. On the successful completion of the three summer sessions the Minister of Education may issue a physical education License of the same class as the license held by the teacher.

The money received by the eight teachers will be used mainly to underwrite course registration fees and to assist in the cost of books, materials and incidentals.

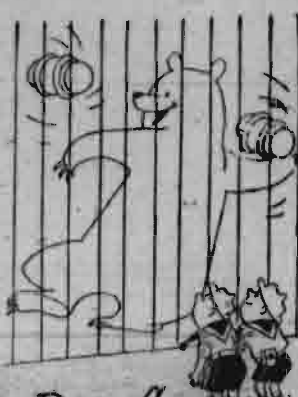

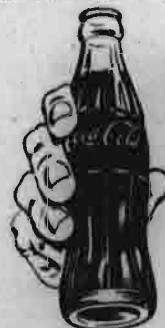

Visited By Field Secretary

B. M. MacArthur, Field Secretary of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, has completed all calls in Digby County. This means that everyone of the more than sixty registered blind persons of the county has been called upon. Some of the services available to blind persons through the Institute are: home teaching, library service, theatre passes, reduced rates for travel by bus, train, etc.

Home teaching is an important part of the work done by the Institute and one of the first steps in its rehabilitation program. This means that a home teacher is sent to the home of newly blinded men and women, and they are shown that, despite their handicap, they can still do many of the things to which they were accustomed before blindness.

Instruction is also given in braille reading, writing and handicrafts. Sightless persons who have received this training may avail themselves of the Institute library and handicraft materials. A rehabilitated blind person is able to enjoy life and take an active, useful part in and community activities.

Bass Fishing Providing Sport

A type of sport fishing quite new to this area is attracting hundreds in the Bear River district lately. This is bass fishing and almost every evening when the tide is right one can see literally hundreds of people gathered on the Victoria Bridge and along the shores of the Bear River in the vicinity of the bridge, waiting for bass.

Not only is there a good deal of the bass fishing on and adjacent to the Victoria Bridge but also off the bridge in the village of Bear River where every evening when the tide suits local followers of Isaac Walton gather to try for the elusive bass.

Rather uncertain as a rule, bass fishing in the areas above mentioned has been extremely good lately and heavy catches, both in weight and numbers, have been made.

The fishing is attracting many sportsmen, both local and tourist, and all report a real exciting time when their luck is good. Last week the Courier learned over thirty bass, ranging in size from nine to twenty pounds, were caught with some fishermen getting as many as five in an evening.

Wood Ticks Extend Attack

Eight-legged wood ticks with ugly little heads are expanding the range of their misery campaign against humans in western Nova Scotia's forest country.

Their bite isn't painful, itchy or especially harmful, but their brand of psychological warfare gives woodsmen the willies.

Ticks crawl up grass, shrubs, or low stumps and grab people and animals that rub against them. A lucky pounce gives them free room, board and transportation.

They're no great inconvenience to forest animals but most humans regard bugs that burrow under the skin with a kind of horror.

Actually the tick's capabilities in the matter of flesh-gorging and other things of which he's accused are exaggerated. His bad reputation is mostly unearned.

He does get under the skin to suck blood, but his small head doesn't leave much of a hole. He doesn't crawl in bodily, contrary to general opinion. That idea took root because flesh often swells around ticks and buries them.

The refined male drops to the ground when he's barely bulging, but the female gorges on blood — not flesh — until she blooms into a purplish sphere. Then she drops off to moult or lay eggs. She wouldn't think of laying them in your system.

Provincial forest entomologist L. S. Hawbolt says ticks are potential disease carriers. "They're part of nature as much as black flies and mosquitoes now."

New France, in Yarmouth county, the most western part of the province, is the heart of the wood tick country. In fact, they were supposed to have started here, brought in by the imported hounds of an Alsatian family that tried to start a colony here.

"I don't know why," Mr. Hawbolt says, "but ticks are spreading very rapidly." He thinks recent warm winters might have something to do with it.

"They have a habit of flourishing in one area for several years, then suddenly dying off for no apparent reason."

He explains the biological difference between the wood tick and the moose tick, which it resembles: "The moose tick sticks to one host, preferably an ailing moose. The wood tick has three hosts and gets around more."

The wood tick hatches on the ground in late summer, winters there, and finds its first host the next May. It eats its fill, falls off and moults. Then it looks for another host until it has lived on three animals. After completing the cycle, the female lays her eggs and both sexes die.

Ticks belong to the spider family. The reddish brown male seldom grows a quarter-inch long. The female is slivery blue when empty of blood, and may grow bigger than half an inch. Ridges along their backs are generally mistaken for stripes.

It pays to be choosy about resting spots in the bush. Commercial repellents are a help too. But if you're wise, you'll do as the woodsmen do: Go on a tick hunt every night on returning to camp. With luck you won't find more than two or three, and chances are they won't be in very deep.

Canadian Troops Guard \$2 Million Japanese Payroll

One of the strangest assignments ever carried out by Canadian soldiers stationed in the Far East involved the shipment of 700 million yen, it went off without a hitch.

Forty-five Canadians, members of the 25th Canadian Reinforcement Group, Kure, Japan, rode "shotgun" on the huge cash shipment when it was moved by truck from Hiroshima to Kure. The money, representing about 2 million dollars Canadian, was destined for Japanese workers in the Kure-Hiro area. It was to be returned to workers who previously had paid it into a pension fund.

Fearing that organized Japanese bandits might be tempted by such a prize, headquarters of the Commonwealth Forces in the Far East asked Lt.-Col. L. H. Young of Winnipeg, officer commanding the Canadian Reinforcement Group, to provide protection for the truck carrying the money.

All main intersections along the 15 mile route from the bank in Hiroshima to Kure were manned by Canadian troops armed with sten guns and rifles. As the heavily-laden truck with armed guard passed, the street corner guards fell in behind to give maximum protection to the rich convoy.

Officers commanding Canadian troops guarding the shipment were Capt. E. D. Carron, Painscourt, Ont.; Capt. Harry Harkes, 25 Maple Street, Dauphin, Man.; Capt. Peter Hall-Humpherson, Digby, N. S.; and Lt. W. J. Kitson of Dunnville, Ont.

Boy Dies After Being Struck By Car

Struck by a car shortly after noon on Saturday, five year old Eric Charles Comeau, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Comeau, of Comeauville, died about three o'clock in the Yarmouth Hospital. Police stated the driver of the car, Joseph Max Glaser, of Long Island, N. Y., suffered minor injuries when he lost control of his car while attempting to avoid the youngster. His car smashed into a building on the side of the road. Glaser was also admitted to the Yarmouth Hospital but was later released.

An inquest into the fatality opened at the Yarmouth County Court House on Monday afternoon with Dr. S. W. Williamson presiding.

POUR ALCOHOL DOWN RADIATOR AND YOU WILL LIVE LONGER

PASADENA, Calif.—If you "had been drinking," you're headed for trouble when you drive a car, warns the "Independent."

Those three letters, HBD, can increase the seriousness of any traffic charge against you, make it practically certain you'll be convicted—and increase the penalty. HBD written on the police blotter, stands for "had been drinking." And if they're written alongside a traffic charge against you, they mean trouble. It isn't necessary to be drunk while driving. "Had been drinking" is enough—even if you've had only those proverbial "couple of beers."

If you must have alcohol while driving, put it into the car's cooling system, where it's needed for winter protection. The new car dealer who handles your make of car can recommend the correct anti-freeze, because he knows your car best.

Only about 1500 people died of poisons accidentally last year in the United States. Unless, that is, you count alcohol in a driver as a poison—which it is, judging by results. Last year about 22% of all drivers or pedestrians involved in fatal accidents were those who "had been drinking."

For when a driver or passenger is taken to the hospital after an accident, the hospital all too often adds three more letters to the HBD on the police blotter. Those three letters are DOA—"dead on arrival."

A "Down East"

Travel Adventure In American Magazine

You don't have to cross the ocean to find Scotland, Ireland and France, writes Vance Packard in a recent issue of The American Magazine. Just go Down East through the enchanting Canadian Maritime Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Describing it in his article "Down East Adventure," Packard took his family of five on such a trip—a 1,000 mile drive from Boston to the tip of Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia.

An "out-of-this-world feeling hit us," he writes "when we drove out onto Cape Tormentine, New Brunswick, which is about three days of leisurely driving northeastward from Boston." Then, for the next 17 days, the Packard family drove through a vacation wonderland through the provinces where bits of Scotland, France and Ireland were enjoyed without ever leaving smooth highways.

For a period of ten years, he was associated with the Excelsior Life Insurance Company of Saint John. During this strictly sales phase of his career, this young man became one of his company's leading representatives and was top sales producer of the Maritimes, and a consistent member of the company's senior clubs from the outset, he qualified for membership in his company's million dollar club as well. He resisted management opportunities to remain in the selling field. After four years of study through the University of Toronto Extension Department, he was awarded the University's coveted C.L.U. degree in 1948.

In 1952, expanding radio activity forced a reluctant decision to leave the insurance business to devote his time completely to advertising, promotion and public relations. At this time he was appointed executive director of the Saint John Community Chest.

Hugh Truman's radio career goes back to broadcasting's earliest days. At the age of eleven, he became "junior announcer" of a children's program that has developed over the years and become the "UNCLE BILL SHOW", one of Eastern Canada's most popular broadcasts—now heard over a network of stations throughout the Atlantic Provinces. Sponsored by W. H. Schwartz and Sons Ltd., Halifax and Montreal, for the past eighteen years, the series of personality shows has won a tremendous following. Mr. Trueman cannot recall missing more than a half-dozen weekly shows in twenty-four years! It has been on the air longer than any other commercial program in Canada, and—excepting Amos 'n Andy—few American shows can match its long record of audience-building.

Over the years Mr. Trueman has written and produced many local and network features:

The Most Profitable?

Back in 1933, while employed at CHSJ (Saint John) as one of two staff announcers, he noted that the first commercial advertisement of the day was heard at 9:00 a.m. In those days, no advertiser could be convinced that anyone listened to the radio before nine o'clock. Leasing this period from the station on a percentage basis, he developed a two-hour breakfast feature, selling, writing and announcing his own commercials and building it over a three-year period into one of the station's most profitable operations.

The Most Far-Fetched?

During his years of free-lancing, he had no difficulty in finding sponsors for his various radio features—but at times his stock of ideas would run low. He recalls that at one time he wrote (and sold) a fifteen minute dramatic sketch in which he played all three roles, a boy of ten, a man of eighty-five, and Hugh Trueman—simultaneously! Did it go over? "Yes," he recalls, "The sponsor ran it two years but I wasn't enthusiastic about a third. It was a great time-taker and, besides, I'd find myself slipping into one of the other voices on regular broadcasts!" Later, however, the idea was developed to become a popular CBC feature, "Capt. Jones", and was heard over the Atlantic network weekly for two years, with Mr. Trueman playing the role of the ancient fisherman. To retain the illusion of an octogenarian, Hugh's name was not mentioned with the production—and many listeners still do not realize that behind the old fellow's wheeze was the familiar voice of Uncle Bill!

The Most Valuable?

Talk Of Polio Clinic

Two preliminary meetings took place in Yarmouth last Saturday, both sponsored by Dr. E. L. Eagles, Director of Child and Maternal Health and Communicable Diseases, for the province of Nova Scotia. With Dr. Eagles was Dr. C. E. Kinley, Director of the Victoria General Hospital Polio Clinic, Halifax.

The first session was with the local doctors on the staff of the Yarmouth Hospital, and was then followed by a meeting with Mayor W. F. Allen, chairman of the Hospital Commission, and Commissioners Hubert Lynch and K. O. Hodge.

The purpose of these meetings was to discuss the possible establishment of a Western Nova Scotia Polio Clinic in either Yarmouth, Shelburne or possibly Digby, so as to ease the burden of the Halifax Clinic.

It was suggested that the night nurse's cottage on the Hospital grounds, would be ideal, and could easily be converted into a 10-bed clinic, which would be obtained by the Department of Health, and supplied with all necessary therapy equipment. The cost to the town of Yarmouth would be very little.

A trained Registered Nurse would be made available for Yarmouth while a Yarmouth nurse is in Halifax taking a course in Polio treatment. It was also suggested that one or more local doctors should take a course in Polio treatment should Yarmouth take on this project.

The matter will be further discussed at an early meeting of the Hospital Commission.

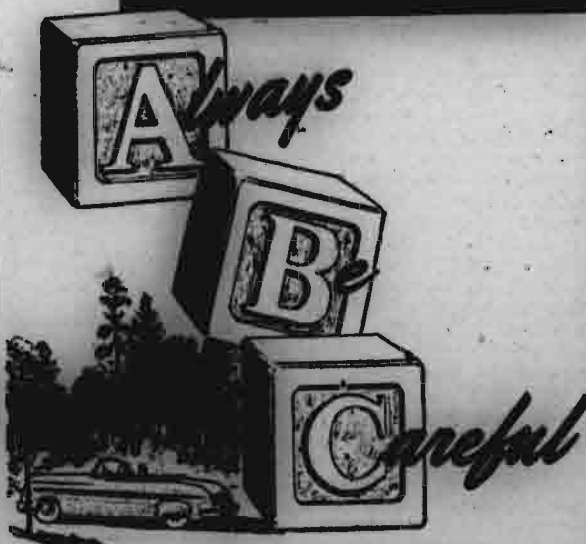

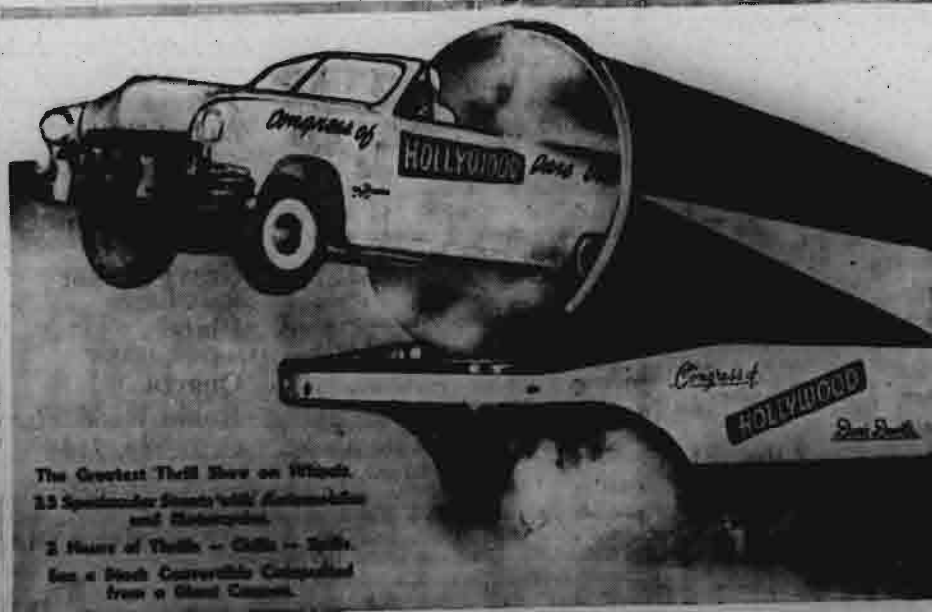

DIGBY FISH DRAGGER SINKS, CREW SAVED

The sixty five foot fish dragger "General Biggar", owned by Victor Halliday of Digby, sank in the Digby Gut Tuesday at 1.30 a.m. while being towed into port by the Bay View life saving boat.

The crew of the vessel escaped but they lost most of their personal belongings. All the ship's gear, including radio-telephone equipment, was lost when she sank. Skipper of the General Biggar is Captain Clarence Greck. Crew members are Victor Halliday and George Haynes.

The mishap which resulted in the loss of the General Biggar occurred as the vessel was making for Digby in heavy fog Monday afternoon. She went ashore on the Bay of Fundy coast some four miles above the Digby Gut and listed over.

The skipper and crew took to their lifeboat but stayed near the vessel, hoping she would right herself as the tide rose. She began to fill, however, and

a call was put in for the Bay View life boat.

The life boat put a line aboard the General Biggar, which by this time only had her top deck afloat, at 6.30 and began to tow her toward Digby. They had reached the bell house in the Digby Gut when a sea went over the vessel, filling her completely and she went down.

The General Biggar, which was built in 1936 for Captain Victor Halliday Sr. served until the beginning of the war as a sealot dragger. During the war she was requisitioned by the Department of National Defence and served as a harbour craft in the harbour at Saint John, N.B. She returned to Digby in 1946 and has been fish dragging since that time.

It is understood the General Biggar was covered by the Fishermen's Insurance plan.

To Mark 110th Anniversary

John Inglis, the third Bishop of Nova Scotia, and the son of Nova Scotia's first Bishop, who consecrated the parish church of Trinity in 1790.

The builder of St. Paul's, Dean Bullock, is perhaps best known as the author of the beloved hymn "We love the place, O God, wherein thine honour dwells." It is interesting to note that his descendants have always been active in the church life of Nova Scotia. His son also took holy orders, and for many years served as an army chaplain. The dean's grandson, Ven. G. W. Bullock, is the present Archdeacon of the Annapolis Valley, while his great grandson, the Rev. C. Strople, son of Mrs. Strople, of Digby, is now rector of Ches-ter.

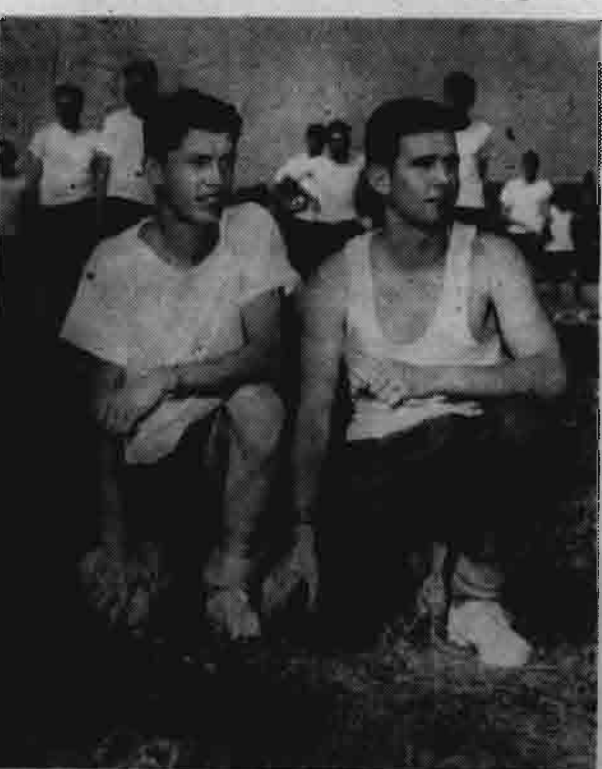

FREEPORT NATIVE DIES IN JOHANNESBURG

Relatives and friends here learned with regret of the death at his home in Johannesburg, South Africa, of Lee Thurber, after an illness of a few months.

Mr. Thurber, who was 85 years of age, was a native of Freeport, Nova Scotia, and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Byron Thurber, of that place.

At the age of sixteen Mr. Thurber left Freeport for the United States where he secured a job as a cabin boy aboard a vessel bound for India. During the voyage he became ill and was put ashore at Durban, South Africa, for treatment, the vessel to pick him up again on the return trip from India.

Fate intervened however, and before its return to Durban the vessel burned and the crew had to be transferred to another ship for the long voyage home. Mr. Thurber, was stranded in Durban seemingly friendless and alone.

TOWN COUNCIL DEFERS ACTION ON DUMP PLAN

The proposal of the Digby Town Council to shift the town dump from its present location to a new spot in the Marshall town area was shelved, at least temporarily, at Monday night's meeting of the Town Council following a storm of protest from the residents of the area concerned.

Three petitions against the location of the dump in the Marshall town area were read at the meeting. One of these stated the location of the dump at the proposed site would be detrimental to public health, property values and the scenic beauty of the area. A fourth petition, from the Maple Leaf Agriculture Society, was delivered at the Town Hall after the Council had decided to give the project the "hold".

Actually, decision of Council in the matter of the dump was to have the streets and public properties committee further consider the whole problem and report at the next Council meeting. Plans were also discussed to have

the committee investigate land fill methods of garbage disposal used in other towns, particularly Kentville.

Discussion was had at the meeting concerning the problems of handling surface water in the main business section of the town. It was reported that in the storm on Sunday rain water had backed up from the main sewer into cellar drains on the main street of the town.

The public works superintendent stated drains from the railway right of way and station were going into the main sewer line and that these were causing the difficulties. He stated each basin on the main street did not enter the sewer. It was decided to inform the railway authorities of the problem and ask their assistance in remedying it.

The financial statement which was presented by the clerk showed all departments living within budgeted figures up to the half year. Revenues were also up with an increase in tax arrears collections shown.

A Real Opportunity

The local response to the heavy run of sea bass in the Bear River leads naturally to the thought that here is something which should be developed and exploited for the benefit of the tourist industry.

Each day for the past month literally hundreds of ardent local fishermen have gathered along the shores of the beautiful Bear River to try their luck for the fighting bass. Many of them have been successful beyond their highest expectations, capturing fish up to twenty pounds in weight.

It goes without saying that the visitors to this section of Nova Scotia, most of them looking for something to add sport and pleasure to their trip, would be enthralled with the experience of taking part in this excellent sport of bass fishing.

What remains to be done then to see to it that these visitors and the bass are brought at least into range of one another? First of all a well planned publicity campaign should be embarked upon to make the fact of the fishing opportunities on the Bear River well known over a wide area. Secondly, those in the vicinity of the fishing district should make an effort to see to it that facilities are provided so that visitors who want to may take advantage of the opportunities to fish for the bass.

This latter move can be a profitable as well as a tourist promotional gesture. Already supplies of lines, lures and other equipment used for fishing are becoming scarce in this district. Boats, too, could be provided on rental so that those who like to troll rather than surf east may also be accommodated.

It is our thought that here is something in which the Digby and Bear River Boards of Trade might well cooperate. Positive action to take advantage of the situation created by the presence of these game fish in the Bear River will be beneficial to all concerned. Such action will work to provide thrilling entertainment for our visitors who sometimes complain of the lack of this and will also help to keep tourist dollars in this area.

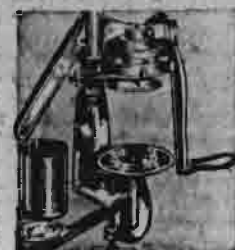

Walnut Buttermilk Loaf

Mix and sift twice, then sift into a bowl, 2½ c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 2¼ c. once-sifted all-purpose flour), 2 tps. Magic Baking Powder, ½ tsp. baking soda, 1½ tps. salt, ½ tsp. ground mace. Mix in ¾ c. lightly-packed brown sugar, ½ c. rolled oats and 1 c. broken walnuts. Combine 1 well-beaten egg, 1 c. buttermilk, 2 tps. grated orange rind, 1 tsp. vanilla and 5 tbs. shortening, melted. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly. Turn into a loaf pan (4½ x 8½) which has been greased and lined with greased paper. Bake in a rather slow oven, 325°, about 1 hour. Serve cold, thinly sliced and lightly buttered.

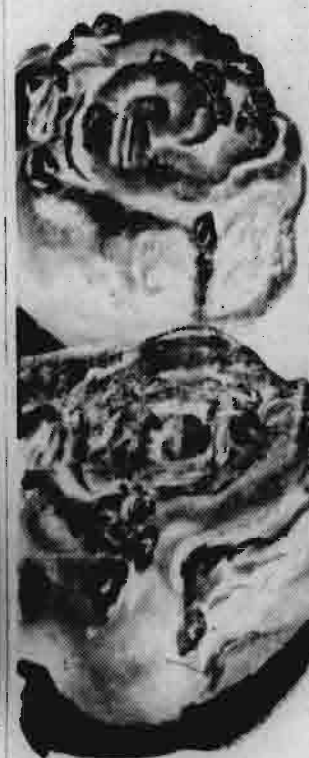

Cut roll into 8 slices, place in greased pan, grease top, cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderate oven, 375°, 25-30 min. Let stand in pan for 3 min., before turning out.

During the past several years Mr. Chisholm has made his home with his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ralph Chisholm, Granville Ferry.

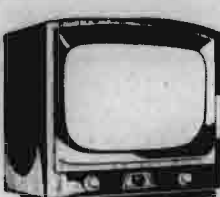

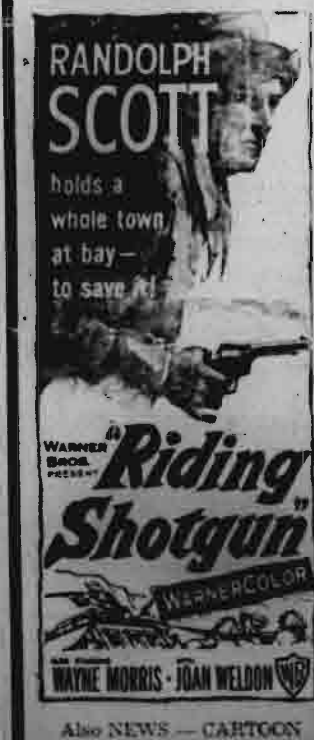

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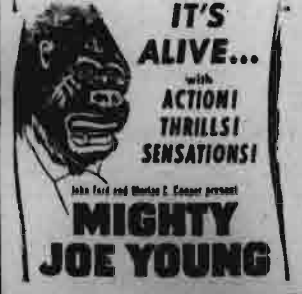

ARMY WORMS INVADE DIGBY COUNTY AREAS

The invasion of army worms which has played so much havoc in other sections of Nova Scotia is also plaguing farmers in this area.

At press time reports were received from the Bear River area that the army worms had struck particularly heavily in that district.

Bruce Read and his brother, Fred Read, of Bear River have had two fields of grain practically stripped bare by the worms. One of these was a field of seventeen acres with the other about ten acres in size.

Other farms in the Bear River area where heavy damage has been done by the worms include those of Burtis Freeman, Max Isles and Harvey Chisholm.

Efforts are being made to put a halt to the destructive work of the army worms but these are not proving too effective, it is reported. Mr. Read stated the worms are not only destroying the green grain but are also eating up the newly seeded grass which will carry the results of their destructive efforts through to next year.

So heavy is the infestation that it is reported one can actually hear the worms at work in the grain. In one field they blocked up a small stream when they attempted to ford it and the smell of the decomposing bodies of the worms is positively nauseous.

Bruce Read of Bear River estimates actual loss from the work of the army worms on his farm alone is in the vicinity of a thousand dollars. It is hard to con-

ceive the tremendous number of worms that are at work. Mr. Read says but there appears to be millions as they cover acres of ground as they work their way through stands of grain.

It is reported that grackles, these noisy blackbirds that appear in such large numbers around this district, are cleaning up large quantities of the army worms but cannot keep up with them at all. Hens, too, seem to enjoy eating the invaders although it is not known if such a diet is beneficial to them.

Not only are the army worms playing havoc with the crops in the Bear River area but foxes and raccoons are also taking their toll of hens and chickens in the district.

It is reported the foxes are invading barnyards even in the thickly settled districts and making off with hens and chickens. Farmers in the area are frightened to let their hens run at large because of the depredations of the foxes.

Raccoons, too, are taking their toll of hens, chickens and ducks. These marauders are increasing rapidly, it is claimed, and this summer have also taken a heavy toll of the cherry crop in the area. It is reported they can be seen with a light at night in cherry trees stripping the fruit clean.

An effort, it is learned, will be made to seek to have a bounty placed on the raccoons. It is also understood the sporting angle of "coon hunts" may be investigated.

Smith's Cove Fire Department Active

A meeting of the Smith's Cove and Joggins Bridge Volunteer Fire Department was held Monday evening. At the meeting plans for fencing and leveling off the fire dams which have been constructed were finalized. Tentative plans for the observance of Fire Prevention Week in October were also discussed. It was decided fire prevention films would be shown in the schools and an inspection of properties in the district for the removal of fire hazards would be carried out.

The Smith's Cove and Joggins Bridge Volunteer Fire Department was organized last October and since that time has accomplished a good deal. Seventeen fire dams have been constructed and plans are underway for three more. Cost of constructing these dams has been met by public subscription. Already some five hundred dollars has been collected and it is expected another two hundred will also be forthcoming.

President of the Fire Department is Robert L. Taylor, who was a member of the Kentville Fire Department for some seventeen years. Other officers are C. E. Jones, Vice-President; Captain P. W. Davidson, Treasurer; W. Stanley Paxton, Secretary, and Beth Bailey, Assistant Secretary.

Chief Warden is Harold A. Sully and other Wardens are Neil Adams, Garnet Adams, Robert Winchester, Lloyd Adams, Chester Brinton. Twelve volunteer firemen have also been enlisted and it is understood these men and the wardens will receive special training at H.M.C.S. Cornwallis through the kind permission of Captain J. C. Plomer. Mr. Davis, head of the Cornwallis Fire Department, will be in charge of the instruction.

The Fire Department has prepared maps of the district and plans are well advanced to have all the houses numbered. Information cards will also be distributed to all householders and the fire departments at Digby, Cornwallis and Bear River will also be provided with numbered plans of the district.

Cargo Ship Loads Here

The Motor Ship Marstenen, of Bergen, Norway, arrived in port here from Baltimore this week to take on a full cargo of pulpwood for Calais, France.

The Marstenen, with a net tonnage of 1,471, is under command of Captain Verre Hanson. She has a crew of thirty-two.

Last week the S. S. Ingwi, of Bergen, net tonnage 1,066, cleared Digby with a cargo of some 1,500 cords of peeled pulpwood for La Spezia, Italy. She was under command of Captain K. Thowsen and had a crew of twenty-two.

The pulpwood being shipped out of Digby aboard these two ships is from the lumber firms of Max M. Nathall Ltd. and H. T. Warne Ltd.

FIND OLD RECORDS OF TEMPERANCE SOCIETY

One of the important societies in Digby during the last century was Union Division, No. 6 of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, organized on January 31, 1848, by Deputy Most Worthy Patriarch, Rev. W. W. Ashley, with twenty members. It had a successful career until about 1914 — the exact date is unknown — when it ceased operation.

On October 17, 1934, it was reconstituted with 17 members and it held its last meeting on May 23, 1938. When the writer of this article came to Digby in 1918 the late G. I. Letteney, a former member, took him into the basement of his store and showed him all the equipment of the old Division — charter, books, regalia, etc. In 1938 the Letteney's were out of business and the store had been purchased by the late O. Wright. When it was decided to reconstitute Union Division the writer and Mr. Wright made a thorough examination of the store basement and spare rooms in the building, but all they could find of the material was the organ and it was concluded that the executors of the Letteney estate had destroyed the remainder.

Last week Norman Wright, looking for a box of a special size he needed, moved a quantity of waste lumber in an unused room in the basement and came across a box which had been hidden for many years, containing the original record book and a quantity of material belonging to the old Division and he immediately made his discovery known to the writer. This first book contains the record of the organization meeting, with the

names of the applicants for charter and the list of the first officers and continues through to December 31, 1852. This was when the Order was really a "Sons of Temperance" Order as no ladies were admitted to membership then. It shows that in the four years of its history to that date 167 had been admitted to membership. Its financial records were, of course, in pounds, shillings and pence, and it paid sick and funeral benefits. It also occasionally loaned money to its members, £2 to one, £4 to another, and at one time £200.

At another meeting, about two years later, a motion was passed that no more money be loaned until that outstanding had been repaid. Although several Recording Scribes had written the minutes, the writing was in the beautiful style of that period — writing which, apparently, is not taught in the schools today.

It is hoped that a further search in this room will uncover the charter, regalia and officers' jewels. The charter would be unique as it was very special.

Organized when the National Division of North America was in its infancy, and before the Grand Division of Nova Scotia was organized, Union Division, No. 6, was practically given the powers of a Grand Division, as it was authorized to organize and charter subordinate divisions and to oversee their activities, and we are told it was the only subordinate division ever to be given such powers.

The records, etc., so far found, are now in the custody of Home Division, No. 109, of Smith's Cove.

Commenting that tests are being conducted regularly to determine whether the clams are safe for human consumption, the official said that people should heed signs and notices which are posted when an area becomes polluted.

Federal health officials in Ottawa blame a tiny organism in the sea—a species of plankton eaten by clams—for the recent death of two members of a Montreal family who dined on clams picked from a beach near Rimouski, Quebec.

The Halifax official said that the clams, being bivalves, siphon their food from seawater. In doing this they take in the plankton, which they do not throw off. The clam's spores then become highly toxic. When eaten in sufficient quantity, it will poison the eater.

It was pointed out that the chances of finding poisonous clams are highest in summer on the east coast. The poisonous secretion is described as "one of the very strongest poisons."

Oysters, on the other hand, apparently have nothing to do with the dangerous plankton, but as the oysters spawn during warm weather, they are not at their delicious best, it was pointed out. They are thin until about August and September when the market jumps in full blast. The old story about not eating oysters during months without an "R" from May to August—has nothing to do with poisonousness.

About This and That

The problem of controlling traffic, particularly on the main street of Digby, is becoming an increasingly difficult problem. At the noon and supper time rush hours, especially, the problem reaches the point where it is exasperating to many motorists.

Far too often, however, have we noted criticisms of the police department and the traffic authority in this matter of traffic control. While it may be true that there are times when extra supervision and hardened enforcement of the traffic rules might be extremely beneficial, it seems to us the solution of the problem is not so much in the hands of the police department as it is in the hands of the individual motorist.

While people can, by force of legal persuasion, be made to obey traffic rules and regulations, such constant and rigid enforcement should not be a necessity in order to have a proper and orderly progression of traffic through our town.

After all, motorists are adults — they know, or are supposed to know, the rules of the road. They know, too, that disobedience or ignoring of those rules will create havoc on the road and inconvenience and difficulties, both for themselves and others who use the roads.

This being the case, it seems that the solution of the problem, or much of it, rests in the hands of the individual motorist. If he or she, as the case may be, will scrupulously observe the common sense rules laid down for traffic, particularly in such a section as the main street of Digby, then much of the problem will disappear.

Cooperation in this matter, as in many others, will produce amazing results. Thoughtfulness for the rights of others as well as our own will help to reduce the hazards and annoyances of traffic snarls for everyone. Let us give it a try — we are sure it will produce better results than leaning on the horn or cussing out the traffic cop.

Our Scenic Beauties

For too often, it seems to us, we hear the complaint that visitors to Nova Scotia are not spending enough time in this area — that they just "pass through" and that we are therefore not getting a good share of the tourist dollar that is being spent in this province.

Examining this complaint, it seems there is much to it. Where, however, does the fault lie? Could it be perhaps that we are not making sufficient effort to publicize the tourist attractions which exist in this county of ours? Could it be that, because the tourist is unaware of the wonderful scenic beauties that exist in Digby County, he is passing through on the way to other places which, although no more beautiful or attractive, have received more publicity and are therefore more sought after by the tourists?

To bolster the argument that this is the case is the fact that many visitors to Digby County, after a tour of the district comment on the wonderful scenic views they have enjoyed. They also say, almost invariably, that they had no idea there were so many beauty spots in this area.

It would seem to us that there is a real job to be done in the matter of publicizing our attractions. Surely here is something in which the Boards of Trade in the County could cooperate that would bring real benefits to this area. Why not give it a try?

From the Western Light on Briar Island where the scenery rivals that of the much publicized Peggy's Cove to the hills of Bear River which for scenic grandeur have been compared to the Alps and from the snug fishing villages of the Islands to wooded valleys of our inland settlements, there is much of beauty to delight the eye of the visitor. Why not let them know about these things, why not do our best to see that they are aware of the beauties of which we are, or should be, so proud? It will profit us not only in a material sense, but in many other ways to do so.

The Digby Regional High School, Primary and Intermediate Schools will re-open on Friday, September 10, 1954 when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Any student whose parents reside beyond the limits of the Digby Regional High School Area will be required to pay a tuition fee of \$25.00 to the Secretary of the Digby Municipal School Board prior to registration. Students affected by this regulation should make immediate application for admission to the Regional High School to Mr. F. C. Purdy, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S. The standard for admission to the academic or commercial courses of Grade XII will be a pass certificate from the Atlantic Provinces Common Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health regulation regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

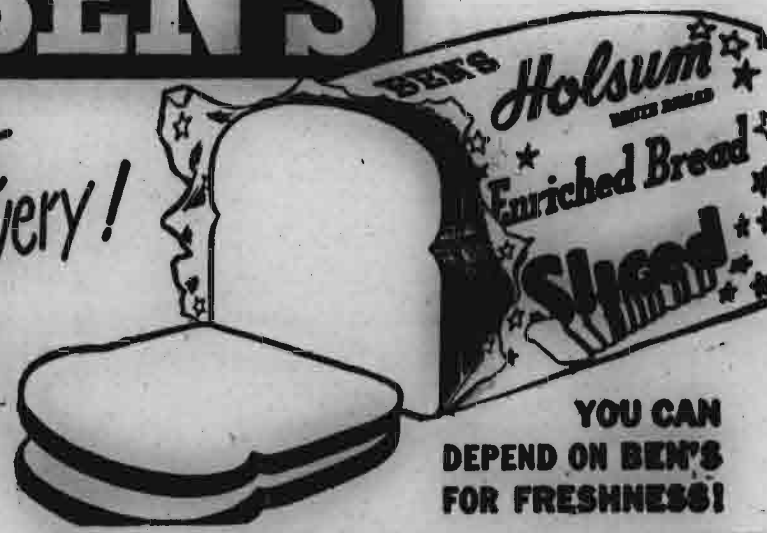

Mix and sift twice, then sift into a bowl, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. once-sifted all-purpose flour), 3 tps. Magic Baking Powder, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. grated nutmeg and $\frac{1}{4}$ c. fine granulated sugar. Cut in finely 5 tbs. chilled shortening. Combine 1 well-beaten egg, $\frac{1}{2}$ c. milk and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. vanilla. Make a well in dry ingredients and add liquids; mix lightly. Two-thirds fill prepared dishes with batter. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375°, about 20 minutes. Turn out and serve hot with sauce or cream. Yield — 6 servings.

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Opening Notice Digby Public Schools

The Digby Regional High School, Primary and Intermediate Schools will re-open on Friday, September 10, 1954 when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students attending the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are expected to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1954-55, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1954. The Supervisor's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive early registrations from August 30th to September 3rd between the hours of 10:00 to 12:00 A. M. and from 2:00 to 4:30 P. M. Students from Regional High School Area or the Town or Digby who wrote the June entrance examinations are also required to comply with early registration regulations.

Any student whose parents reside beyond the limits of the Digby Regional High School Area will be required to pay a tuition fee of \$25.00 to the Secretary of the Digby Municipal School Board prior to registration. Students affected by this regulation should make immediate application for admission to the Regional High School to Mr. F. C. Purdy, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S. The standard for admission to the academic or commercial courses of Grade XII will be a pass certificate from the Atlantic Provinces Common Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health regulation regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

The experience of fishermen who have tried for the why, fighting fish is that they bite best on certain tides and when tide conditions are ideal there seem to be no limit to the catches that can be made.

The fame of the fighting fish in the Bear River has evidently spread far and wide and parties are now in evidence on the banks of the river from far distant points. Tourists, also, are beginning to get word of the sporting opportunities available to them on the Bear River and are coming to the area seeking the fighting fish.

Suppliers of fishing gear report a heavy run on heavy test lines, plugs, casting rods and other equipment needed to tackle the bass. Bamboo rods are also much in demand by those who are going after the strippers from the river banks.

It is understood photographers from the Nova Scotia Bureau of Information have been in the area taking stills, movies and other pictures of the bass fishing to include in publicity releases concerning sport fishing in this province.

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DIGBY HOSPITAL FAIR GROSSES OVER \$4,000

The Digby Hospital Fair, which was held in the Digby Forum last Wednesday afternoon and evening, was again this year a splendid success. As usual, the Hospital Fair enjoyed the fine weather which has marked the event ever since it started, some twenty years ago.

Under the general chairmanship of Donald Amero, the Fair Committee began their work of preparing for the fair months ago and the excellent arrangement of booths, the profusion of goods on display and the orderliness which marked the fair testified to the good work that had been done in preparing for the event.

Playing a large part in the preparations for the fair and in the day itself was the Ladies' Hospital Aid, under the presidency of Mrs. F. R. Eisener. This organization, with its auxiliaries, is responsible every year for the sponsoring of many of the fancy work and novelty booths which are so much a feature of the fair.

During the afternoon's program at this year's fair a splendid band concert by the band of HMCS Cornwallis was featured. The band, which gave nearly a two hour concert, took part in the fair through the kind permission of Capt. J. C. Plomer, Commanding Officer of the huge naval establishment.

The booths at this year's fair were particularly attractive and excellently well stocked. He has preached in almost every Baptist Church in the city of Louisville, as well as in Baptist Churches of other parts of the U. S. Last year he was guest preacher in the Baptist Church in Jerusalem, in which the pastor is a former student under Rabbi Rouch in the Louisville Seminary.

On Sunday evening Dr. Rouch's subject was "Religion on a United Front." With thoughtful consideration for both the Jewish and Christian religions, Rabbi Rouch called his congregation to participate with Jews and Christians throughout the world to give to the world a "peace" which only religion can give. He reminded his listeners that twice in this century the religious bodies of the world have lost the greatest opportunity in two thousand years to give "peace" to the world. After both World War I and World War II, said Dr. Rouch, it was the politicians who called the nations together in united council. There was not a religion, he said, which dared to do what it had given politicians the inspiration to do—call different people of different nations together to discuss the plans and purposes of peace.

During the service Rev. E. C. Churchill rendered as a solo, "Hope of the World," which is the hymn written by Dr. Georgia Harkness for use at the Assembly of the World Council of Churches being held in Evanston, Illinois.

DISCOVER INTERESTING OLD DIGBY DAILIES

J. J. Wallis, Editor of the Digby Courier, this week received copies of two interesting old Digby papers from Mrs. A. M. Bruce of Brighton, Mass.

The two papers, which are remarkably well preserved, are copies of the Evening Telegram and the Morning Telegram, daily papers published in Digby by John T. McBride in the years 1892 and 1893.

The issue of the Evening Telegram for September 23, 1892, and is the maiden issue of the paper. It is stated on the masthead the paper is "published every evening (Sundays excepted) at five o'clock." The price of the paper is one cent per copy.

Each of the papers is four pages in size, tabloid style. Feature story on the front page of the copy of the Evening Telegram tells of the sentencing of one man to hang and another to twenty-five years in prison at Dorchester, N. B. The headline in heavy black type says merely "Buck and Jim." It is not possible to tell from the story where the crime for which they were sentenced took place.

In its opening editorial the Evening Telegram states a large share of space in the paper will be given to the doings of fishermen and mariners since "the majority of our people secure their living either from, or upon, the sea."

In a second page story the Evening Telegram tells of a cricket game in which Digby defeated Annapolis by an inning and eleven runs. Among the Digby players listed are the surnames of Farnham, Beaman, Hughes, Crowe, Tobin, Messenger, Dillon, Martell, Hall, Baxter, Gates and Burns.

It is stated the boys felt very jubilant over their victory and that night, while coming into town, were "making the air ring with their joyous shouts." It is stated that "Policeman Van Tassel evidently did not appreciate such merriment and grabbed the horses by the head, brought the team to a standstill and ordered the boys to be quiet." The boys felt very indignant over the action of the policeman, and claim when a crowd of American fishermen went through the town two nights previously on the "Tally-ho," shouting and yelling, little, if any attention was paid to them.

The third page of the Evening

Telegram contains a full page advertisement from J. L. Peters calling attention to his stock of ready made clothing. The fourth page is also a full page ad. from F. Titus, dealer in confectionery, wholesale and retail.

The feature story on the front page of the Morning Telegram of July 25, 1893, tells of a movement up foot in Gloucester, Mass. to raise funds for the erection of a monument to Captain Harvey Knowlton who captured the Digby schooner "Edward A. Horton" when she was under the American flag in 1871. The story states the Edward A. Horton is "now the property of Joseph E. Snow of Digby. Last winter she was rebuilt and is now considered one of the best vessels of the Digby fishing fleet."

From the story it is understood the Horton, which was owned by the American firm of McKenzie, Knowlton & Co., was first captured by Canadian authorities on a charge of violating treaty regulations and towed into Guysboro, N. S.

While the vessel was at Guysboro Captain Knowlton, a member of the firm, went there posing as a prospector and after enlisting a crew at Canso, seized the vessel and sailed off with her. No attempt was made by Canadian authorities to recapture the vessel and she was later sold to Captain Snow in Digby.

In an advertisement on the second page of the Morning Telegram the Bay of Fundy S.S. Co. offers excursion tickets to and from Saint John from Digby at \$1.50. It is also stated in the ad. that the "Company have also arranged with the management of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway for a cheap excursion to Halifax. Tickets are priced at \$4.50.

Advertisements are also carried in the paper from H. B. Allen & Co., Commission Merchants; G. I. Letteny & Bro.; R. P. Saunders; J. F. Saunders; C. F. Dunham; Chaloner's Drug Store; H. G. Turnbull; Erb's Photo Studio; John A. Clinton; Oliver M. Goldsmith and Turnbull & Welsh. Dr. Annis advertises "Painless Dentistry" and Alfred Morrell, Master of the schooner "Orinoco" advertises he had picked up a bale of cotton one mile north west of Mt. Desert Rock which the owner could claim by paying expenses.

Find Speedboat, No Trace Of Crew

Hope that Walter Muise, Yarmouth seaman working out of Saint John, and 13-year-old Percy Joyce will ever be found alive practically vanished Monday when a United States yacht found the 17-foot speedboat in which they set out from Saint John on Aug. 14.

Search and rescue officials in Halifax reported the United States yacht, en route from Grand Manan to Digby, found the speedboat about 3:30 p.m. floating upside down about 18 miles off Digby Gut in the Bay of Fundy.

They reported that the craft had suffered no apparent damage and that the outboard motor was still attached to the boat. A search of the surrounding area showed no trace of either Muise or his young companion.

The yacht, the Nana, commanded by Philip W. Smith, of South Hamilton, Mass., towed the speedboat to Digby where it will be held for an examination designed to shed some light on the fate of the two missing persons. They were last seen heading out into the Bay of Fundy Aug. 14 and their destination was believed to have been Yarmouth.

Injured By Broken Wheel

Ralph Theriault received painful injuries when he was struck in the face by pieces of a broken emery wheel in his carpentry shop.

The wheel, a large one, broke while Mr. Theriault was using it and the broken pieces struck him directly in the face, above and below the eye.

It is understood several stitches were required to close the facial wound and that X-rays will be taken to determine if any bones may be broken.

Scald $\frac{1}{2}$ c. milk, $\frac{1}{4}$ c. granulated sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. salt and $\frac{1}{4}$ c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meanwhile, measure into a large bowl $\frac{1}{2}$ c. lukewarm water, 1 tsp. granulated sugar, stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 min., THEN stir well.

Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 45-50 minutes. Brush top with honey and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.

Opening Notice Digby Public Schools

The Digby Regional High School, Primary and Intermediate Schools will re-open on Friday, September 10, 1954 when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students attending the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are expected to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1954-55, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1954. The Supervisor's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive early registrations from August 30th to September 3rd between the hours of 10:00 to 12:00 A. M. and from 2:00 to 4:30 P. M. Students from Regional High School Area or the Town or Digby who wrote the June entrance examinations are also required to comply with early registration regulations.

Any student whose parents reside beyond the limits of the Digby Regional High School Area will be required to pay a tuition fee of \$25.00 to the Secretary of the Digby Municipal School Board prior to registration. Students affected by this regulation should make immediate application for admission to the Regional High School to Mr. F. C. Purdy, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S. The standard for admission to the academic or commercial courses of Grade XII will be a pass certificate from the Atlantic Provinces Common Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health regulation regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

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Militia Regiments

Receive Basic

Training At Utopia

At Utopia Army Camp in Southern New Brunswick approximately 200 young soldiers from Militia Regiments of Canada's four Atlantic provinces are being trained as Junior NCO's or being given basic training on a special 7 week course.

These young men, most of whom attend High School, are spending their summer holidays learning to be a soldier.

The courses are under command of Major W. M. Harvey, of Campbellton, N. B., and he is assisted by instructors of the Regular Force and by personnel called out from the Militia for this period of training.

The Junior NCO's course has an enrolment of 60 soldiers and is a stepped up version of the basic training course plus "Tutorial Instruction" periods where the students actually teach each other.

The Basic Training Course, with an enrolment of 135 recruits covers military subjects such as weapons, customs of the service, first aid, field engineering, map using, field craft and many other allied subjects.

There is a Padre's Hour each week and a Church Parade every Sunday.

Recreation includes supervised swimming, parades, competitive sports and transport by St. Stephen or Saint John each evening, that is providing the soldier has a pass. The trips to the city in the evening are supervised and controlled by the instructional staff.

The men are divided into four platoons and interplatoon competition is fierce, the platoons fly a distinctive flag from the same flagpole and the week's "best" platoon flies its flag on top.

When the course finishes on the 28th of August and these young men return home, they, their families, Canada and their Militia Regiment will benefit from the discipline and training they received from this course.

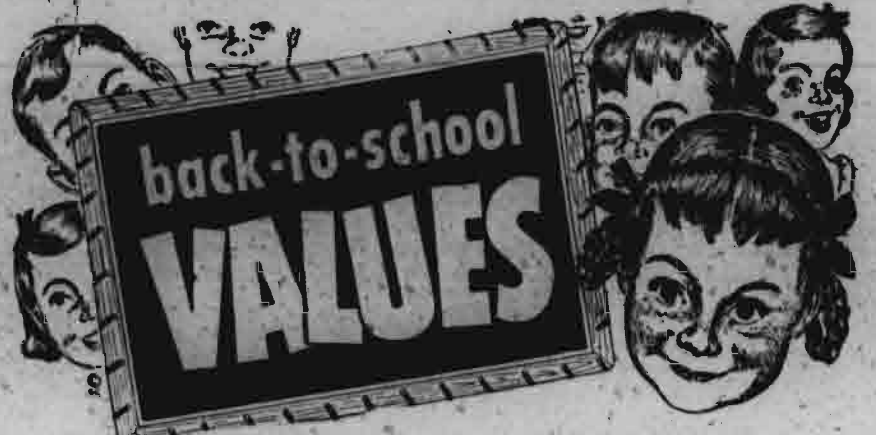

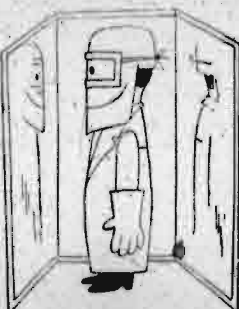

Combine 1/2 cup granulated sugar and 1 tsp. cinnamon; sprinkle on board. Place one portion of dough on sugar mixture and roll into a 12-inch square; fold dough from back to front, then from left to right; repeat this rolling and folding twice, using a little flour on the board, if necessary; seal edges. Place in greased 8-inch square pan; press out to edges. Grease top. Cover and let rise until doubled. Bake at 350° for 35 minutes.

2. APRICOT FIGURE EIGHT

Combine 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 tsp. flour, 1/4 tsp. nutmeg and 1/4 cup finely-chopped nuts. Roll out one portion of dough into a rectangle about 22 by 8 inches. Spread with 2 tbs. soft butter or margarine; sprinkle with nut mixture. Fold dough lengthwise into 3 layers. Twist dough from end to end; turn into figure 8 on greased pan. Grease top. Cover and let rise until doubled. Bake at 350° for about 30 mins. Fill crevices of hot figure 8 with thick apricot jam; spread other surfaces with white sugar; sprinkle with nuts.

3. FRUIT COIL

Knead into one portion of dough, 2 tps. grated orange rind, 1/4 cup raisins, 1 cup chopped nuts and 1/4 cup well-drained currant seed and green marshmallow cherries. Roll out dough, using the hands into a rope about 30 inches long. Beginning in the center of a greased deep 8-inch round pan, swirl rope loosely around and around to edge of pan. Brush with 2 tps. melted butter or margarine; sprinkle with mixture of 1/4 cup granulated sugar and 1 tsp. cinnamon. Cover and let rise until doubled. Bake at 350° for 35 to 40 mins.

4. SUGARED JELLY BUNS

Cut one portion of dough into 12 equal sized pieces. Shape each piece into a smooth round ball; roll in melted butter or margarine, then in granulated sugar. Place, well-spaced, on greased pan; bake slightly. Cover and let rise until doubled. Form an indentation in the top of each bun by twisting the hands at a right angle to the top; fill with jelly. Cover and let rise 15 mins. longer. Bake at 350° for 15 to 18 mins.

Digby Public Schools

The Digby Regional High School, Primary and Intermediate Schools will re-open on Friday, September 10, 1954 when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students attending the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are expected to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1954-55, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1954. The Supervisor's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive early registrations from August 30th to September 3rd between the hours of 10:00 to 12:00 A. M. and from 2:00 to 4:30 P. M. Students from Regional High School Area or the Town or Digby who wrote the June entrance examinations are also required to comply with early registration regulations.

Any student whose parents reside beyond the limits of the Digby Regional High School Area will be required to pay a tuition fee of \$25.00 to the Secretary of the Digby Municipal School Board prior to registration. Students affected by this regulation should make immediate application for admission to the Regional High School to Mr. F. C. Purdy, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S. The standard for admission to the academic or commercial courses of Grade XII will be a pass certificate from the Atlantic Provinces Common Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board.

The newspaper people were favored by planned tours of the Toronto Star and Telegram newspaper plants and the nearly \$6,000,000 plant of MacLean-Hunter Publishing Co., where they witnessed the printing of Financial Post and future issues of Chatelaine, MacLean's, Canadian Home and Gardens and other magazines. At this establishment, the largest printing plant in the British Empire, were seen presses which could print 400,000 pages an hour in seven colors, presses which rolled continually for 14 hours producing 102 miles of printed material without a break.

Another interesting tour was that of the Ford Motor Company Plant at Oakville, Ont. The Ford Motor Company of Canada Ltd. recently celebrated its Golden Jubilee and also recently passed the 3,000,000th number in car production.

At the Canadian National Exhibition the new million and a half dollar Food Products Building was open for tour by the newspaper convention. Besides the valuable building, booths which cost another million and food products to the value of \$50,000 in some booths were viewed. The building is attractive in appearance both inside and outside where the main and side entrances feature water pools with decorative fountains and where water flows in continuous streams from the roof down over glass walls under three color interchanging lights.

One of the many speakers throughout the sessions of the C.W.N.A. convention was J. S. Duncan, president of Massey-Harris Ltd. He warned "it is during these lush days that the storm signals should be hung out." Mr. Duncan said he was concerned that people's thoughts turned too easily to social security, leisure, short working hours and long week ends when they should be on more work and greater productivity.

"In a country which lives by its exports to the extent we do, we must remain competitive," he said. He was also worried, he added, about Canada's \$700,000,000 adverse balance of trade with the U. S.

NOTED WEYMOUTH BUSINESS MAN PASSES

The death of Harry E. Wagner occurred at his home on September 1st following a lengthy illness.

Born at Danvers, Digby Co., N. S., in 1880, he was a son of the late George Wagner and Gertrude Ellen Sabean, of that village. In his earlier years he engaged in farming and lumbering and then served as manager of the Clyde and Sissiboo Pulp Co. Ltd., of Weymouth from 1919 to 1928. In 1928 he again entered business for himself, establishing a lumber, pulpwood and general store business. He also represented the Mersey Paper Co. Ltd., Liverpool, N. S., in the purchase of pulpwood in Digby Co. for over 20 years.

As a young man Mr. Wagner represented Weymouth District, No. 22, as Councillor for the Municipality of Digby for a number of years. In the provincial election of 1928 he contested the constituency of Digby County together with the late Senator John L. P. Robichau, as Conservative standard-bearer against Liberal opponents, the Hon. A. S. MacMillan and Senator J. Willie Comeau, losing by a very close margin.

His interest in community affairs will leave a vacancy realized by all who knew him as he was never known to turn down a worthy cause and was always prepared to lend a helping hand. For many years he served as member of the Digby County Power Board, which position he still had at the time of his death.

A staunch supporter of the Church of Christ (Disciples) he served as elder and Sunday

School teacher in the church at Southville for many years. In 1930, as chairman of the building committee, he was primarily responsible for the erection of the fine Church of Christ in Weymouth, acting as elder in this church until his demise.

Always interested in the work of fraternal orders, he was a member of Tuscan Lodge, A.F. & A.M., Weymouth, and of the Independent Order of Old Fellows.

Twice married, his first wife was the former Mae W. Cossaboom, of Tiverton, N. S., who predeceased him in 1947.

Surviving are his wife, the former Lottie Knock, Rose Bay, N. S.; one son, George, Weymouth; one daughter, Evelyn, (Mrs. J. A. Hart) of Weymouth; two step-sons, Rev. Ralph Knock, B.A., Saint John and LeRoy Knock, Bridgewater, N. S.; one brother, Elijah and one sister, Mrs. Charles Amers, both of Weymouth; four grandchildren and two great grandchildren. One sister and two brothers predeceased him. The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon in the Church of Christ with Rev. John A. Carr, pastor, officiating.

Geneva Park, at which the Assembly was held, is the Conference and training center for the YMCAs of Canada. It is located on Lake Couchiching, near Orillia, Ontario.

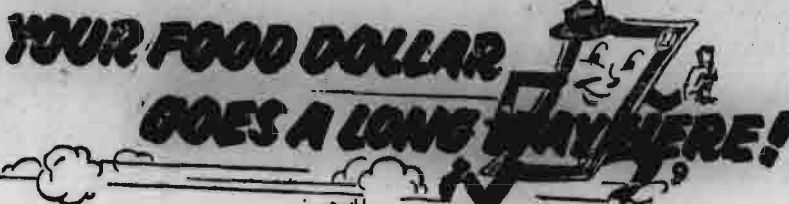

The Digby Regional High School, Primary and Intermediate Schools will re-open on Friday, September 10, 1954 when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students attending the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are expected to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1954-55, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1954. The Supervisor's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive early registrations from August 30th to September 3rd between the hours of 10:00 to 12:00 A. M. and from 2:00 to 4:30 P. M. Students from Regional High School Area or the Town or Digby who wrote the June entrance examinations are also required to comply with early registration regulations.

Any student whose parents reside beyond the limits of the Digby Regional High School Area will be required to pay a tuition fee of \$25.00 to the Secretary of the Digby Municipal School Board prior to registration. Students affected by this regulation should make immediate application for admission to the Regional High School to Mr. F. C. Purdy, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S. The standard for admission to the academic or commercial courses of Grade XII will be a pass certificate from the Atlantic Provinces Common Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health regulation regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

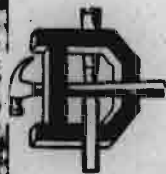

Leslie Roberts Speaks At Convention

Leslie Roberts, noted Canadian author, was guest speaker here Friday afternoon at the Maritime Professional Meeting sponsored by the Maritime and Newfoundland Branches of the Engineering Institute of Canada and the Association of Professional Engineers of Newfoundland, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and held at the Digby Pines.

Mr. Roberts, in his speech, credited Canadians as being people free from inhibitions in possession of a delightful dry humor, a people who are not concerned with "capping" about their accomplishments but neither do they bear their light under a bushel. He said that Canada is a great and growing country and we are at the open door of a new age of the atom which will revolutionize the lives of our children as "gas" revolutionized the lives of the past generation. It is the job of the engineers, he said, to build this country and his own job to tell what Canadians have accomplished so that our neighboring countries will understand and realize the job we are doing here.

Mr. Roberts was born in Wales and came to Canada at the age of 11 years. After attending McGill University he served in the Canadian Army for five years during the first World War. He later returned to journalism and in 1940 became war correspondent. At the beginning of World War II he was special assistant to Minister of Defence, Norman Rogers, until Mr. Rogers' death. Mr. Roberts has contributed to many magazines and has written a number of books including "Canada: The Golden Hinge" as the latest.

Mr. Roberts was introduced by W. R. Brennan, Secretary-Treasurer, Prince Edward Island Branch E. I. C., Commissioner Public Utilities Commission of P. E. I., Charlottetown.

Chairman of the afternoon program was W. R. Godfrey, Saint John, N. B.

L. E. Mitchell, P. Eng., Special Projects Engineer, Canadian National Railways, Montreal, spoke at the morning session on St. Lawrence Waterways. He spoke of the tremendous undertaking involved in the building of the waterway which to complete would entail excavating about 100,000,000 cubic yards, require 15,000 men for a period of five years. One of the chief problems, he said, would be to relocate people living in the area which on the Canadian side constituted 10,000 acres and affected 6,500 people. The total available horsepower which could be developed he figured at 9,000,000.

"Atomic Power" was the subject of an address given by Dr. John Convey during the morning session. Dr. Convey is Director Mines Branch, Dept. of Mines and Technical Surveys, Ottawa. He pointed out many technical problems which face the development of atomic energy for power and attempted to reduce the optimism so often expressed to an audience in regard to atomic energy by endeavouring to portray a more realistic picture of how we stand. He particularly emphasized the problem of radiation damage. He made no attempt to guess at what time atomic energy would be available but laid before the engineers the fact that these colossal problems had to be solved.

The last social function to take place was on Friday night when the convention held its closing banquet and dance. The banquet meeting was chaired by R. N. Fournier, General Chairman of Committee for the Maritime Professional Meeting and guest speaker was the Honourable Oliver L. Vardy, minister without portfolio in the Newfoundland cabinet and Director of Tourist Promotion for Newfoundland. He took as his subject "Economic Development of Newfoundland." Mr. Vardy traced the development of his native province since it joined Canada, had developed which had not been there 5 years ago. He said the Newfoundland people were aware of their great potentials of mineral ore, water power and forest products but the vast industrial development was only made possible by encouraging Europeans with their skilled productive methods to invest in industry there. Engineering skill, too, he said, had to be imported from the U. S. A. and other countries. With Newfoundland having the most prolific fishing grounds in the world, Mr. Vardy said, they have embarked on a program of fishing development with an expected expenditure of \$100,000,000 to improve methods of catching and processing fish. Their aim, he said, was to make the Newfoundland fisherman an independent individual.

All the development which is in progress, Mr. Vardy said, is only a means to an end, that of retaining the young people within the bounds of Newfoundland and to improve the standards of living of the people. He stated that Newfoundland has profited by joining with the rest of Canada and also pointed out that their country contributed to Can-

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Town Council To Issue Debentures

The Town of Digby will shortly issue debentures to the amount of \$100,000. It was learned here following the regular meeting of the Town Council last Wednesday night.

These debentures, which will be in the form of serial bonds, will cover expenditures made by the town on schools, paving, fire equipment and electric light extensions. Largest amount is \$33,000 for schools. This amount covers \$40,000 for the new elementary school and \$13,000 on the Regional High School.

Also included is \$13,000 for fire equipment, covering \$6,000 for the new fire station and \$7,000 on the pump. Amount of debentures for paving is \$30,000 and for the electric light utility \$13,000. All these expenditures were approved by meetings of the ratepayers and have been, for the most part, completed.

Financial statement, presented at the meeting last night, showed tax collections, both current and arrears, to be running ahead of last year's. Collections of current taxes to date amounted to 64.6% and to date 32% of arrears have been collected. This compares with 64% on current and 24% on arrears for the same period last year.

Total amount of current tax levy collected to date is \$67,780.40. Warrant for the year is \$104,508. In arrears a total of \$13,907.37 has been collected to date.

According to the financial statement, expenditures in all departments are well within budgeted figures. At the end of August out of a total estimated expenditure of \$114,612, the town has spent in all departments \$63,654.39.

The Council at their meeting last Wednesday night accepted with regret the resignation of Deputy Town Clerk and Treasurer, Mrs. Margaret Appleby. Mrs. Appleby will leave in October to take up a position in Toronto.

Permission was given the newly organized Admiral Digby Garden Club to hold their monthly meetings in the Town Hall.

Plans were also made at the meeting for the recapping of the main street of the town. It was stated actual cost of paving work carried out to date had been sufficiently below estimated figures to make the recapping of the main street financially possible.

Permission was given at the meeting to Turnbull Bros. Ltd. for the erection of a store and warehouse on the site of their former building which was burned some time ago. Plans and specifications for the new building were submitted to the Council.

Digby Pines Has Successful Season

L. C. Parkinson, manager of the Digby Pines Hotel, told the Courier on Sunday as the hotel closed, that he felt the 1954 season had been as good generally as last year but was entirely too short. He stated the hotel had been open for only eighty-one days.

Mr. Parkinson said he was particularly pleased with the number of conventions held this summer at the Pines. Included among the conventions was the professional meeting of the Engineers, who concluded their sessions on Saturday. Well over three hundred attended this affair.

On Sunday some 39 Sports Writers who had been attending the International Tuna Tournament at Wedgeport were luncheon guests at the Pines.

Sydney A. MacNess, Montreal, was remanded for sentence by Magistrate H. B. Dickey in court here Wednesday morning after having been found guilty of stealing a camera of a value in excess of twenty-five dollars from the Kentville Publishing Co. Ltd.

Evidence given at the hearing showed the accused man had borrowed the camera for a day in order to take pictures at the Ken-Wo golf course. He failed to return the camera and later used it as security for a loan of ten dollars from the Wallis Print Ltd. in Digby.

HURRICANE DOES HEAVY DAMAGE

Hurricane "Edna", which swept through much of Nova Scotia Saturday evening, did heavy damage in many sections of the province.

Almost totally destroyed was the apple crop in the Annapolis Valley which this year was one of the largest and best in some time. Not only was the crop almost wiped out but heavy damage was also done to many orchards.

Also suffering severe damage were coastal sections, both in the southwestern end of the province and in the Halifax area. Only fatality reported in the province was the death of William Jefferson, of Lake Centre, in Lunenburg County, who was killed when his barn collapsed about him.

In the Yarmouth area damage was extremely heavy with fish plants, wharves and breakwaters taking the brunt of the storm. Property damage is estimated in the hundreds of thousands in that area.

The hurricane, although producing winds of a force never before known in this area, actually did little real damage in the Digby district. In some sections of the town large trees fell like nine-pins before the wind, tying up traffic and tearing down power lines.

At the Pines Hotel Golf Course which has been noted for its beautiful trees, more than two hundred trees were felled by the hurricane. Much damage was also done to the grounds by the uprooted tree roots. On the grounds at the hotel heavy damage was also done to the trees with a large number being blown down and uprooted.

Forest Hill cemetery suffered what seemed to be the heaviest casualty in trees when some forty large ornamental trees fell prey to the winds. By some quirk of fate, however, only four headstones were damaged by the falling trees, many of which were over forty feet in height.

At Joggins Bridge the garage and service station operated by Stanley White was flattened by the hurricane with only a small section left standing. During the height of the storm fire levelled the small home of Arthur Comeau at Marshalltown. Firemen from Digby aided in fighting the flames but in the face of the high winds efforts to save the structure proved fruitless.

Only injury reported locally as a result of the storm was that

of Alfred Marshall, linesman for the Digby County Power Board, who narrowly escaped death when he came in contact with a live high power line while working atop a pole near the Scotia Restaurant. He suffered a heavy shock to his foot and leg which left him sick and lame for some time.

During the height of the storm mountainous waves swept across the Digby Basin, piling high over the long wharf and spur pier. A German freighter, the St. Katharina, tied up at the spur pier, suffered no damage from the storm although at times waves swept right over her superstructure. Scallop draggers tied up inside the spur pier, although they were severely buffeted by the wind and waves, suffered no real damage.

The C.P.S. Princess Helene sailed on schedule Saturday and ran into no difficulties on her trip to Saint John. Taking shelter in the lee of the Granville Shore during the storm was the well known Gypsum King and another freighter, both of which left port early Sunday morning after the storm subsided.

At Marshalltown a large barn, owned by Rene Richard, collapsed during the storm. Another large building on a wharf at the south end of Digby also collapsed when hit by the winds. Members of the yacht club worked through the storm to protect sail and power boats both on the shore and at the club pier. For a while it was feared a new boat, owned by Gordon Ellis, would be battered to pieces by the wind and waves, but efforts to save it were successful. A power boat, owned by Sypher Morrell, filled but suffered no permanent damage. A sailing boat owned by Percy Weir was also damaged.

The pile driver at the long wharf was smashed by the winds as were a number of windows in residences when hit by the winds or by flying branches and debris carried by the gale.

All during the storm linesmen of both the telephone company and the Digby County Power Board were hard at work clearing lines and trying to keep the service working in as good a shape as possible. By noon on Sunday power service had been restored in sections of the town. Telephone service was maintained in most sections of the town without interruption. Lines of both telephone and power ser-

vice to outside sections were torn down, however, by the winds and by falling trees. It is expected some days will pass before these services can be fully restored to some sections.

Members of the Digby Fire Department did a man service throughout the storm patrolling the streets and standing watch at the fire station. Because of power failure the alarm system was out of order and patrols were maintained to watch for any outbreak of fire. Only one fire was reported in town. This was a chimney fire at the Cornwallis Cafe about nine o'clock. It was extinguished without incident.

Public Works Department workers, under F. W. Robinson, were on duty throughout the storm clearing streets and cutting away branches.

The Police Department also kept close watch on the darkened streets all through the storm.

At Little River the hurricane destroyed the fish house owned by Lee Trask. Roofs were also torn off barns owned by Mrs. Cynthia Denton, Roy Trask and Elmer Addington.

Weirs at Mink Cove, Long Beach and other districts in that area suffered heavily in the storm. Almost totally destroyed were those of Bertram Gidney, Conrad Gidney and Frank Gidney. The weir of Harold Crowell suffered slight damage while Conrad Gidney's float and weir boat were tossed high on the beach by the terrific waves.

The damage and loss occasioned by the storm struck a heavy blow at the weir fishermen of St. Mary's Bay who have experienced an extremely poor season this year. Discouraged at their loss, several feel there is doubt if they will enter this type of fishing next year.

Extensive Damage At Deep Brook

Saturday's storm played real havoc with orchards in the Deep Brook area. On the farm of A. D. Pickett hundreds of baskets of peaches, plums, pears and apples were shaken from the trees. Many fruit trees were also uprooted and limbs broken from many others.

A peach orchard of one hundred young trees, owned by Russell Henshaw, at Waldec, was completely destroyed. Branches were broken, trees uprooted and unripened fruit scattered about the ground.

Struck By Lightning

Bowled over by a bolt of lightning which knocked out the hydro service at the garage where he worked, Ross Boyce, mechanic for Elliott Motors, Dundas Street, West, Belleville, Ont., is in Belleville hospital suffering from shock.

Mr. Boyce was injured late Tuesday afternoon last week during a sharp electrical storm, which passed over the city. Using an extension light, while work on a car, Boyce was knocked unconscious, when the bolt of lightning struck the hydro service and travelled along the extension light cord.

The injured man was taken to hospital by Bush's ambulance where he was treated for shock. Later he complained of a severe headache and a tingling in his legs. He will be kept in hospital 48 hours for observation.

"I don't remember much about it," Boyce observed at the hospital. "I remember the bolt of lightning and the shock through my leg as I leaned against the car. Then I guess I must have blacked out."

Mrs. Boyce is the former Pauline Baxter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Digby Baxter, of Digby.

The electrical storm was sudden and brief but during the few minutes slightly over a tenth of an inch of rain fell on the city. Many late afternoon shoppers were caught in sudden downpour and had to duck for cover until it passed.

Condition Unchanged

According to word from Halifax, the condition of Willie Comeau of Digby, who is a patient in the Victoria General Hospital, remains unchanged. He is listed on the "serious" list at the hospital.

Comeau suffered a fractured neck last week when the car he was reportedly driving went off the road near Rossburg. The accident occurred at an early hour in the morning and details of how it happened are meagre.

Hurricane Hits Island Village Of Westport

The hurricane "Edna" which swept the Atlantic seaboard, hit the village of Westport, causing many thousands of dollars worth of loss and damage. The full force struck soon after six o'clock Saturday night and from then on boats were filled with water, one belonging to Richard Welch was destroyed and also one of Frank Buckman's. A boat was completely smashed owned by Walter and Arnold. Thus, a number of others were damaged but repairs can be made.

The main loss was that of five fish-houses which would total over five thousand dollars, including the contents of fishing gear and other numerous articles. The houses were those of Mr. Leonard Garrison, Mr. Wicker, son, Mr. Randolph Gower, Mr. Franklyn Buckman and Mr. William Welch. The wharf of Mr. Bernard MacDermid, with over 100 lobster traps, was also carried away in the terrible tide, which covered the road and brought logs and wreckage to the other side. Hundreds of dollars worth of breastwork was torn away.

During the storm Mr. Charles Glaven was pinned between a boat and truck, causing serious damage to his leg. Mr. Arthur Dakin was blown from a wharf but was able to grip a boat long enough to keep from drowning.

The television aerial of Mr. Richard Welch was blown down carrying his chimney with it. Other television aerials were flattened to the roofs. A shop, belonging to E. C. Bowers Co. Ltd., was damaged and a large number of cases of cylinder oil were lost. Damage was also done to the Whistle House at Western Light. Windows were blown out in a number of homes and part of the steeple blown from the Disciple Church of Christ.

Vegetable and flower gardens were shattered and a large number of trees and rose bushes were uprooted. The beautiful fall gardens of Westport are terminated for this year and shrubs and trees destroyed which will require years to again grow to such a state and beauty. The road was finally passable on Monday and lights and telephone service later restored.

Large Crowds Attend Maple Leaf Fair

The annual Maple Leaf Community Fair, held last Wednesday afternoon and evening at the Maple Leaf Agriculture Society Building at Conway, attracted large crowds.

Although exhibits of fruits and vegetables seemed to show a marked drop in quantity over past years, quality was good and the prize winners were excellent examples of their particular varieties.

In the school and home arts exhibits there was a great variety and quality was high. Particularly good were displays of school work including art, scrap books, poster displays and other items.

During the afternoon the perennial crowd pleaser, the horse pulling contest, was held. Excitement was high as the teams vied for first place.

In the evening an old time dance was well attended. During the day meals were served and games and other attractions kept the crowd occupied.

Pastor To Enter Evangelistic Field

Rev. Everett S. Ransom, for two and a half years pastor of the Bear River Advent Christian Church, has resigned that position to enter the field of full time evangelism in the Advent Christian denomination. Final sermon will be preached this Sunday, September 19th.

Well known among evangelists in the Maritimes, Rev. Ransom has pastored also in Litchfield, Anna, Co., and directed Bear River Youth For Christ for two years.

Rev. Ransom, a native of New Bedford, Mass., previously had pastored in Boone, North Carolina, before coming to Nova Scotia. He is a graduate of New England School of Theology in Brookline, Mass. For three years he also was pianist and baritone in the Christiana Quartet of his alma mater. He is well qualified for his new work, since he previously conducted many successful campaigns in the states of Virginia and North Carolina.

Rev. and Mrs. Ransom will be known as the "Revival-Airs" and their services will consist of music and gospel preaching. The new pastor for Bear River has not been announced as yet.

Hon. Henry D. Hicks New Liberal Leader

In an upset victory over Premier Harold Connolly, the Hon. Henry D. Hicks, Minister of Education and M.L.A. for Annapolis County, took over the leadership of the Nova Scotia Liberal Party at the nominating convention held last Friday in Halifax.

Mr. Hicks' election as Liberal leader came on the fifth ballot taken at the convention after five other contenders for the leadership had been eliminated. Premier Connolly, with 236 votes, took a strong lead in the first ballot but failed to gain the needed overall margin in subsequent voting.

Others in the leadership race were the Hon. A. W. MacKenzie, Hon. Ronald M. Peabody, Hon. Malcolm Patterson and Hector Hill of Truro, only cabinet outsider in the try for the leadership. Following the convention Mr. Hicks stated he and Premier Connolly had agreed that Mr. Hicks would not take over the office of Premier of Nova Scotia until the end of the month. At present Mr. Hicks, who is Nova Scotia's Minister of Education, is attending an education meeting in Saskatoon. Premier Connolly, who also holds the Health portfolio, leaves next week to attend a health meeting in Ottawa.

Cornwallis Chief To Attend Meet

Captain James Plomer, OBE, DSC, CD, commanding officer of HMCS Cornwallis since 1952, is one of four officers of Canada's armed forces chosen to attend the 1955 course at the Imperial defence college in England. The course begins January 4.

The others selected are Brigadier A. W. Wrinch, CBE, CD, vice-quartermaster general at army headquarters; Group Captain R. J. Lane, DSO, DFC, assistant for logistics planning at air force headquarters; and Group Captain H. A. McLearn of the judge advocate general's office at defence headquarters.

Captain Plomer, a native of England, has been with the Canadian Navy since 1932. During the early part of World War 2 he was on loan to the Royal Navy as group commander of the fifth anti-submarine and mine-sweeping group and later commanding officer of HMS Sunflower in which capacity he led in the destruction of two U-boats.

Mrs. Robertson for three months will study basic nursing arts, body structure and function, home making and related subjects at the Practice House, 222 Newbury Street, after which she will continue her study and practice in bedside nursing at an affiliated hospital. During the final three months she will nurse in private homes in Greater Boston under the supervision of the faculty.

Practical Nursing has come into prominence from coast to coast and the response to the nationwide appeal for more nursing personnel is reflected in an unusually large enrollment, as more and more women between the ages of 18 and 30 realize the opportunity for service and security which practical nursing offers. — Household Nursing Association.

Visit Of T.R.H. The Duchess Of Kent And Princess Alexandra

The huge R.C.A.F. Transport, carrying the beautiful Duchess of Kent and her equally beautiful daughter, Princess Alexandra, landed at H.M.C.S. Shearwater at 5:10 Thursday afternoon. Their Royal Highnesses were met by the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, The Hon. Alistair Fraser and Mrs. Fraser, the Premier of Nova Scotia, The Hon. Harold Connolly and Mrs. Connolly, His Worship the Mayor of Dartmouth, Mr. C. H. Morris and Mrs. Morris, the Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, The

Right Honourable J. L. Lacey and Mrs. Lacey, Flag Officer Atlantic Coast, Rear Admiral R. E. S. Bidwell, General Officer Commanding Eastern Command, and Mrs. Bidwell, Major General E. C. Plow and Mrs. Plow, Air Officer Commanding Maritime Air Command, Air Commodore Martin Costello, Officer Commanding R.C.M.P. Assistant Commissioner Joseph Howe, and Mrs. Howe.

Her Royal Highness inspected a Guard of Honour comprised of members of the WRENS. The Royal Party proceeded from Shearwater to Bedford along the main highway to Halifax and Government House, where a crowd gathered to witness the arrival, and where they enjoyed a quiet dinner as guests of the Lieutenant Governor.

Friday morning saw thousands gathered outside Province House, and on the arrival of the Royal

Party, H.R.H. the Duchess inspected a Guard of Honour, composed of members of the Black Watch Regiment, which was assembled outside the Assembly Chamber. The Red Chamber was filled with dignitaries from all over Nova Scotia, who were to be presented. As T.R.H. were escorted to their places, it was difficult to realize that one was actually witnessing the scene that was taking place. The beauty and graciousness of visitors and the dignity and serenity of the surroundings, would long remain a cherished memory by those present. On the walls of the Red Chamber hang portraits of the first Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, Sir Fenwick Williams, and of Judge T. G. Hall-Burton, famous Nova Scotia author of "Sam Slick." Everywhere throughout the building, which dates back to 1811, their Royal Highnesses saw many reminders of the colourful history of Nova Scotia.

The Address of Welcome, read by Premier Connolly, from a beautifully prepared scroll, was as follows:

The Government and people of Nova Scotia respectfully beg to tender a heartfelt welcome to Your Royal Highness and your charming daughter, Her Royal Highness Princess Alexandra of Kent.

Your visit here is all the more warming because of the prominent part the illustrious name of Kent has played in the affairs of this province.

Near the end of the eighteenth century, Prince Edward Augustus, The Duke of Kent, came to

this capital city as Commander-in-Chief of the British forces then stationed here. His inspiration and leadership won for him the deep affection of our people and indeed, we find that the chroniclers of that time have described his tenure of office as "The Golden Age of Halifax."

We mention these links with the past, because, in this Province, we hold true to the virtues of our fathers and adhere to the time-honoured custom of loyalty and fealty to the Throne.

Nova Scotia is a province whose people represent many races and different creeds; and here, on ground that first in all Canada saw the beginnings of civilization, were fought many battles for supremacy between the French and the English.

Today you find these two great races mingling in harmonious relationship, oftentimes vying good-naturedly in their expressions of devotion to the Crown.

Here, too, are the sons and daughters of Scotland, Ireland, Hanover, and other countries, all preserving some of the characteristics of their ancestors yet maintaining a fervent loyalty to our provincial, federal and commonwealth institutions.

We are happily aware of the deep interest Your Royal Highness has in the affairs of the Navy, especially in the role played by the women.

Nova Scotia has an inseparable connection with the sea, and Halifax has known ships and men of the Royal Navy for more than two centuries.

This ancient port which Kipling christened "The Warden of

the Honour or the North" forms an integral life-line with the Old World in the last conflict.

We sincerely hope that Your Royal Highnesses will have a pleasant visit here and carry away many happy memories of this proud old Province and its people.

We can assure you that your stay with us is an honour which we shall long cherish.

Bouquets were presented by two little girls, Heather Moore of St. Joseph's Orphanage, and Judy Toppie of the Halifax Protestant Orphanage.

The Royal Party on leaving Province House, proceeded to the Grand Parade and City Hall where His Worship the Mayor of Halifax, Richard A. Donahoe, asked Their Royal Highnesses to accept an address from the citizens of Halifax.

To Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Kent:

The Corporation and the Citizens of the City of Halifax are happy to have this opportunity of extending to Your Royal Highness a sincere welcome to this historic city. We are pleased to include in that welcome your daughter, The Princess Alexandra of Kent, and we wish you to know that we are happy that she was able to accompany you here.

You may visit many cities and many places in the British Commonwealth of Nations, but we believe that nowhere will you find more loyalty, devotion and respect for our Beloved Sovereign and the members of the Royal Family.

This City is 205 years old, and in the course of its long and honourable history has been honoured by many visits from members of the Royal House of England.

Prince William Henry, afterwards His Majesty King William IV, and His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, father of Queen Victoria, both made their homes here for a number of years.

King Edward VII, as Prince of Wales, visited here as did Prince Arthur, who later as Duke of Connaught, became Governor General of Canada.

The Marquis of Lorne was inaugurated as Governor General of Canada in this City, and was accompanied by Her Royal Highness Princess Louise.

Prince Albert, later Duke of Edinburgh, visited here, and George V, as Duke of York, lived here during each of the years 1893 and 1894, and in 1901, he visited this City, accompanied by the Duchess of York, the Dowager Queen Mary.

Edward VIII, as Prince of Wales, was here on two occasions, and in 1939, His late Majesty, George VI, and the beloved Queen Mother Elizabeth paid a memorable visit to this City.

In 1951, Her Majesty the Queen, as Princess Elizabeth, and the Duke of Edinburgh visited here, and their visit was the occasion for demonstrations of loyalty and affection long to be remembered by our citizens.

Among the notable visits from members of the Royal Family was the visit of your own late husband, the Duke of Kent. In 1911 he visited the City in the line of duty and in the course of service, and his charm and friendliness remain as a pleasant memory with all who had the privilege of meeting him.

Now we are honoured by your visit, and we seize this opportunity to request respectfully that Your Highness will carry to Her Majesty our renewed pledges of loyalty and affection and our deep appreciation of the devoted manner in which she has accepted her responsibilities as head of the British Commonwealth of Nations.

May you take away pleasant memories of your visit to Halifax, and may you have the opportunity of visiting us again before too much time elapses.

The Royal Party were asked to sign the City Guest Book before departing for the Lord Nelson Hotel, where a Civic Luncheon was given.

In replying to the toast, proposed by His Worship Mayor Donahoe, H.R.H. said: It is a very great pleasure for me to at the home of Mr. and Mrs. thank you for the welcome which

you have given, on behalf of the City of Halifax, to me and my daughter.

We are indeed delighted to find ourselves in this city of so many historic associations, and are more than grateful to you all for the hospitality for which you are famous, and which you are so generously offering to us today.

I know that in no part of the British Commonwealth of Nations is there any city more closely associated with the Royal name of Kent than your wonderful City of Halifax, and here in a very real sense we both feel very much at home.

In the few hours we have spent here we have been touched by the kindness of the people of your city, and I ask you, Mr. Mayor, to accept on their behalf our very real gratitude.

Crowds had gathered outside the Public Gardens during the afternoon, waiting for the arrival of T.R.H. at 5:10 to attend the Garden Party.

The beauty of the gardens and the brilliant sunshine all made a picturesque setting for the Royal Party.

At the State Dinner, held at the Nova Scotian Hotel, and given by the Government of Nova Scotia, the appearance of T.R.H. was breathtaking. H.R.H. the Duchess was wearing her magnificent coronation gown of ivory brocade, heavily embroidered with jewels. With it she wore the dark blue ribbon of a Grand Commander of the Victorian Order of the Cross of St. John.

On her bodice and shoulder, at right, she wore the three family "Orders" of Queen Elizabeth, King George V and King George VI. The brilliance of the diamond tiara, diamond necklace and diamond earrings made a spectacular picture of radiance, which only those present were given the opportunity of seeing the beautiful Duchess in Royal Splendour. Princess Alexandra looked lovely in a white chiffon dress. She also wore the family "orders."

Saturday morning the Duchess and her party, accompanied by Lieutenant Governor Alistair Fraser and Mrs. Fraser, and Mrs. Angus I. Macdonald, journeyed to Mount Uniacke, where they had lunch at the Uniacke House.

Saturday afternoon there were separate itineraries for the Royal Visitors. H.R.H. the Duchess visited Citadel Hill and Camp Hill Hospital. At 4 p.m. she officially opened the new Royal Canadian Navy Warehouse mess at H.M.C.S. Stadacona.

Meanwhile Princess Alexandra had arrived at the Garrison Grounds at 3 o'clock. Thousands of people had gathered on the slopes of Citadel Hill to watch the arrival of the Princess and to see the Bengal Lancers perform. The Princess applauded enthusiastically as the Lancers put on a splendid show for the Royal Visitor. Later in the afternoon she enjoyed tennis at the Waegwolt Club.

After dinner at Government House the Royal couple proceeded to the railway station at 10:30, and brought to a conclusion a busy three day visit to Halifax.

The thanks of the members of the weekly press of Nova Scotia are due Lt. R. A. V. Jenkins, R.C.N., Flight Lieut. Connolly, Lieut. Norris and Lieut. Sam, Inglis and many others, for their courtesies extended their representative. From arrival until departure everything was run like clock-work and the Press Room was a beehive of activity throughout the three-day visit. The very fine brochure was in deed most helpful and contained a wealth of information for those wishing particulars. These men worked hard and their task was not an easy one. Our appreciation and thanks to them.

One day a gentleman called at
the office and wanted to know
if I would take his son Leslie,
and teach him, the newspaper
and printing business. His father
convinced me he was just the
boy I needed — and he was.

After serving his apprentice-
ship at the Weymouth Free
Press, he resigned and went to
Raymond, Washington, U. S. A.
I thought he might enter the
White House some time, but life
did not linger long enough. Les-
lie passed on a few years ago.
He was fond of writing person-
al letters to his friends and the
press.

Below, I am inserting a letter
he wrote to me a short time be-
fore he departed.

His letters were always pleas-
ing and humorous, along with a
few suggestions of how to win
the war.

Dear Tom:—

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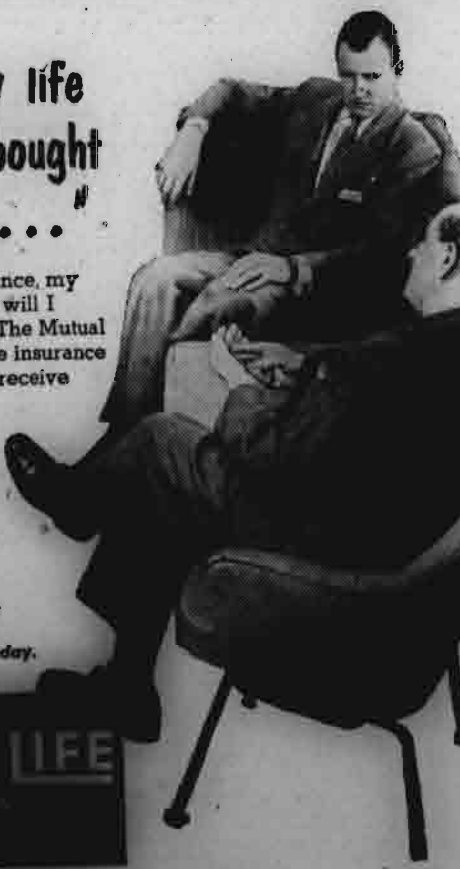

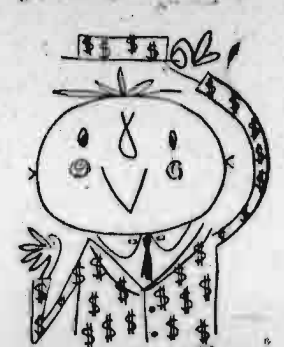

Celebrate 112th Anniversary

September 20th will be the 112th anniversary of the founding of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, the oldest temperance order on the continent, which was instituted by sixteen men in New York City in 1842.

It spread rapidly to all parts of the United States and Canada, and afterwards to most parts of the English speaking world, although its ritual has been translated and used in six other languages.

The benefit system, on which it was founded in America, was dropped some years ago, here, so that all the funds might be used in temperance educational work, but in the other four National Divisions of the world it has been retained, making it a strong financial organization.

Members from the Maritime Provinces were the means of establishing the Order of Great Britain, and when they had reached the required number, the charter for their National Division was issued from the parent body in America, and presented by Sir Leonard Tilly, then head of the Order.

A fire of unknown origin late Monday night completely destroyed the summer home of W. F. Webber, of Digby, with all its belongings. Mr. Webber's summer home is located on the point near Joggin Bridge, some four miles from Digby.

The blaze had gained considerable headway when first noticed about midnight by the residents of Joggin Bridge. The Digby fire department was called but could not save the structure, which was a mass of flames within minutes after it was first noticed.

According to information no one of Mr. Webber's family had been at their summer place for some time and it is not known how the fire could have started. Nothing was saved of the structure or any of its contents.

Injured in the accident was Mack Tibert who received cuts in his head requiring twelve stitches, his girl friend who received a cut hand requiring stitches, and his father, Emdon Tibert, who was thrown from the back seat into the front and was badly bruised. Mr. Emdon Tibert, who was also a passenger in the car, escaped injury by throwing herself to the floor as the car struck.

This meeting is the most recent of a series which was initiated at the suggestion of some of the ministers. It was decided at this meeting to set up a more permanent organization to be known as The Clinic-Clergy Association. A major purpose of the group will be to discuss and study problems of mutual concern in the fields of Religion and Mental Health.

The Rev. H. Y. MacLean and Professor W. H. D. Vernon were elected as Co-Chairmen of the group and Miss Janice Ross, Social Worker at the Clinic, as Secretary.

The next meeting will take place at the home of Rev. Dr. Forester of Weymouth on the 19th of October.

Bass Run Still Continues

Although considerably abated, the bass run in the Bear River still continues and sporting anglers are still catching the fish in sufficient quantity to make trying for the fighting fish interesting.

Last week it was reliably reported to the Courier, however, that some not so sporting fishermen were using nets in the river to trap the wary strippers. Sporting anglers take a dim view of this and feel if it is continued it will do severe damage to the sporting opportunities that are being developed on the Bear River through the bass fishing.

Two Fishermen Saved After Boat Cut In Two

Two fishermen, Edward Young and Lloyd Guler, of Tiverton, had a narrow escape Monday when their 40-foot fishing boat was sliced in two by a freighter in the Bay of Fundy.

According to the pair they were proceeding to the fishing grounds shortly before noon in a very heavy fog when they noticed the freighter, later identified as the Dutch ship, Kroonborg Dezelij, bearing down on them.

The blow sliced off the stern of their boat but they found that they were able to stay afloat until they reached the stopped Dutch ship.

As soon as they boarded the freighter the boat-rank with full fishing gear and equipment.

The fishing craft was owned by Holland Althouse of Tiverton, and was leased to Young and Guler.

The fishermen were later taken from the freighter by Bernard Robins and taken to their homes at Tiverton. The freighter continued on its way to Hantsport to take on cargo.

Observing V.O.N. Work

Miss Cecile Amoro, Pubnico, graduate of Hotel Dieu, Moncton, and now taking post graduate work at Dalhousie University, has been working in Digby for several weeks with Miss Mary Blair, V.O.N., in observation of Victorian Order work as part of her public health training. Miss Amoro was introduced to the local V.O.N. Board at their regular meeting on Tuesday.

Miss Blair reported at the meeting that 303 home visits were made here in July and August, of which 62 percent were nursing care. Seventy-eight percent of the visits were made to persons of 70 years and over, she said. One hundred and two visits were classified as health instruction. Twenty-two attended the 8 well baby conferences.

It was decided on Tuesday to make a uniform allowance of \$50.00 per year towards the Digby Branch V.O.N. nurse's uniform. Digby was the only branch in Nova Scotia which had not been making a uniform allowance.

F. Wellard Given N. S. Appointment

The appointment of provincial co-ordinators of rehabilitation in British Columbia and Nova Scotia was announced recently. C. E. Bradbury was appointed by the province of British Columbia and Frank Wellard by the province of Nova Scotia. Hon. Milton F. Gregg, Minister of Labour, whose Department is responsible for the co-ordination of the rehabilitation program on the national level, said that these new provincial appointments brought to seven the number of provincial co-ordinators of rehabilitation. Up to now eight of the provinces had signed agreements with the Federal Government which provided for such appointments. Under these agreements, federal funds are available to share with the provinces the costs involved in the appointments.

Opens Fish Market

Signs of progress and faith in the future again made its appearance in Digby on Tuesday when Stanley Vidito opened a small retail fish business known as the Fundy Fish Market.

Mr. Vidito's neat and attractive market is located at the stand of Eli's Snack Bar, where provision has been made for handling all kinds of fresh, smoked, and salted fish, and shellfish.

HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS WIN IN SPORTS EVENTS

One of the most successful sports weekends in the history of the Digby Regional High School was climaxed last Saturday. A Provincial Championship was won by the local golf team and the girls swim team placed second to Q.E.H. in the Provincial Swim Meet at Acadia. Through the cooperation of the management of the Pines Hotel and the Headmasters' Association, 25 boys from schools over the province took off at 9 o'clock at the Digby Pines course. The first meet of its kind, it proved very successful, with Digby taking top honors in team competition. Digby's team of Dick Keen, Fraser Handspiker, Eugene Out-house and Roger Johnson had a total score of 702 for 36 holes, 100 strokes better than their nearest rivals, Lunenburg High School. Individual honors were split between Dick Keen of Digby, and Peter Hope of K.C.S. Hope and Keen were tied at the end of 36 holes with a score of 161 for the low gross prize. In the sudden death playoff which followed, both players parred the first and second hole, in the third Hope sank his put for a par while Keen missed his. Thus Hope won the low gross 36 holes while Keen was runner up. The low gross for the first 18 was won by Keen; low gross second 18 won by Hope; and the lowest

score 185, nine holes by Hope. Particular thanks are to be extended to Mr. Parkinson and the Pines Hotel for their generosity in giving the boys the facilities of the course free of charge. Also thanks are extended to the various men in the town whose donations made possible the beautiful trophies presented to the winners.

On the same day, Digby Regional High School sent its most successful swim team, since its inception, to the Provincial Swimming Meet. When points were tallied the girls team placed second in a field of fifteen teams. This was due to the fine swimming of: Allison MacPherson, who placed first in the 20 and 40 yard breast stroke; Dorothy Sullivan, who placed second in the 40 yard free style; Frieda Verburgh, who came fourth in the 40 yard breast stroke; and the relay team which placed fourth.

The boys team, two men short, put up a fine show. Norman Sullivan reached the semi-final of the 40 yard breast. The relay team, obtaining a second and a third in their two heats, were not good enough to place in the finals because their time was not fast enough.

If winter training time can be obtained at HMCS Cornwallis, it is hoped that the teams will do even better next year.

Lillian Gray, 13 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Gray of Brighton, was painfully though not seriously injured Monday night when the car in which she was a passenger was involved in a collision with a car driven by Charles Herbert Chute of Bear River.

The car driven by Chute and the car in which Miss Gray was a passenger, driven by Ernest Joseph Tebo of Brighton, struck head-on. Miss Gray was thrown against the windshield of the car and suffered severe facial bruises. Medical aid was summoned and the young girl taken to the Digby General Hospital where it was found her injuries were not serious.

Both cars were badly damaged in the head-on collision.

Freeport Hard Hit By Hurricane

Although Westport seemed to be heaviest hit of the communities on the islands of Digby Neck, Freeport also suffered heavy damage.

At Freeport the storm badly damaged or destroyed six fishing boats and two fish houses. The Pentecostal Church was blown from its foundations across the road and completely demolished by the heavy gale.

The road around the cove at Freeport was covered in some places to a depth of several feet with heavy rocks and gravel that was swept up from the shore. Before residents of that section would get to the village it was necessary to have a bulldozer clear the road.

It is understood an appeal for aid for the fishermen of Digby County who lost so heavily in the hurricane has been forwarded to the authorities. Damages in many cases are said to exceed two thousand dollars.

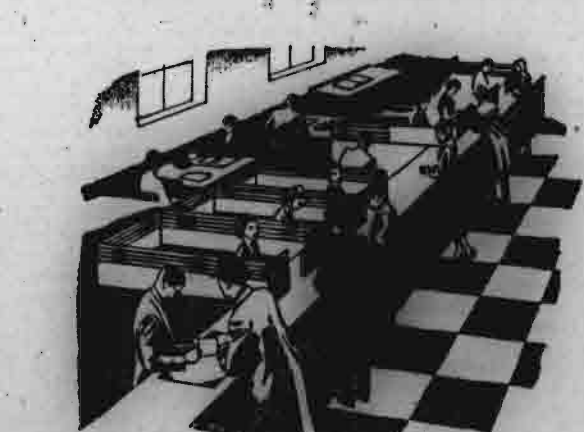

Dear Editor:

My husband and I had a very delightful trip through northern New York and we stopped off at Malone and there I saw a little bit of rest and address apples. It made me think of Digby in the good old days, and preparing for winter which was a big job.

He was French and spoke very sparingly. "Have you any wood to cut?" He would cut or chop away and my mother would give him a meal. Once she got up courage to say, "Napoleon, what is your last name?" He answered her sharply, "Napoleon, that's all."

I'd like to hear more about him if any of your readers know his history.

Beside her husband, Mrs. Haines is survived by Jeanette, 11, Gary, 7, Linden, 5, and Gail, aged one year. Her parents are living in O'Leary, P. E. I.

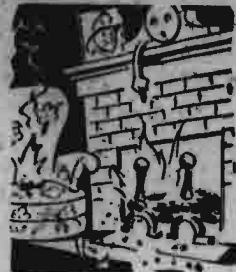

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Maritime Provinces

Board Of Trade

Re Ferry Services

Ferry Services are vital to the maintenance of the economy of the Maritime Provinces of Canada. Each of these Provinces is dependent on efficient ferry services for the transport of trucks, passenger vehicles, passengers and railway equipment between each of the Provinces. Some of these Ferry Services are operated by the Canadian Railways.

In the past, strikes action on the part of employees of the Canadian Railways has resulted in curtailment of vital ferry services thus jeopardizing the economy of all Atlantic Provinces.

The Maritime Provinces Board of Trade feels strongly that no one segment of the transportation field should be left to the whims of its employees, as it is essential to the operational activities of any other mode of transportation.

The Board is deeply concerned over such possible future occurrences because of the disastrous consequences which might ensue and has transmitted its opinion in this matter to the Prime Minister of Canada, the Minister of Transport, and the Presidents of our Canadian Railways. The Board has recommended that a guarantee be given to the Atlantic Provinces that in the event of future strikes by employees of the Canadian Railways, ferry service operated by the Railways between these Provinces will be maintained. It is further recommended that if such guarantee is not possible, the operation of these ferry services be placed in the hands of the Department of Transport to ensure uninterrupted service.

The Maritime Provinces Board of Trade urges the four Atlantic Provincial Governments to support the Board in these recommendations which are considered to be of great importance to these Atlantic Provinces.

Temperance Notes

STOCKHOLM — Sweden's legislation against drunken driving, dating from 1934, is expected to be stiffened by the middle of 1954 according to recent proposals by a parliamentary committee. Thus any driver having an alcohol concentration in his blood of .05 per cent or more will be punished if detected.

Whether involved in an accident or not, drivers are now punished by fines or jail terms up to six months if the alcohol ratio in the blood is between .08 and .13 per cent, and by jail up to one year if it is above that level. The proposed new law would raise the maximum jail terms to two years, and to six years if the driver contributes to another person's death.

Present penalties for the milder form of drunken driving, that is with an alcohol concentration of between .05 and .15 per cent, will not be increased. It is suggested, however, that a ratio of over .1 per cent should lead to a jail sentence more often than now.

The committee further suggests that the police be equipped with special patrol cars with so-called "drunko-meters," in order to check up on the suspect drivers along the highways. Blood tests will still remain the only legal evidence, however.

It also advocates the suspension of a driver's licence for as long a period as eight years or, in very exceptional cases, for life. The new law will apply to all vehicle operators, in other words, to bicyclists and motorcyclists, airplane pilots, locomotive engineers, and steamship captains, and to those who navigate a motorboat.

Bonfire Of Wages

When Forests Burn

The Canadian worker's pay-check is the first value to disappear when a forest is set aflame by public recklessness. J. L. Van Camp, General Manager of the Canadian Forestry Association, said recently.

"A ton of newsprint paper made by a Canadian mill requires about a cord of pulpwood and brings a price of \$126 landed at New York". Mr. Van Camp pointed out. "Of that \$126, about forty dollars represents wages paid to Canadian workers in the pulp and paper mills. Of the remaining amount, a very high percentage is turned over to the Canadian wage-earner for the annual transportation bill of the paper industry runs to 200 millions, with a fuel bill of 47 millions, chemical and other supplies of 97 millions, and the major portion of these items ends up in pay-envelopes."

"The annual plague of forest fires, almost wholly the work of human carelessness, continues to cut deep into the sources of employment and the progress of the nation's business. When the raw material growing in our woodlands can be turned into \$40 of paper-mill wages for each cord of wood extracted, the criminality of forest burning is too tragic for public authority to tolerate any longer."

The Buried Treasure

Of Oak Island

July, 1954 Issue
Coronet Magazine

On "tiny, windswept Oak Island, 34 miles from Halifax, N. S., lies one of the world's most famous buried treasures. It lies buried about 160 feet deep and 400 feet from the ocean shore and its location is plainly marked. It can be claimed by the first person to dig it up."

A warning, though. For more than 150 years, this treasure, believed to be a hoard of precious metals and coins, has eluded the engineering genius of all searchers. More than a million and a half dollars have been spent in unsuccessful attempts to recover it.

The Buried Treasure Of Oak Island, an article in the current issue of Coronet Magazine, says that the treasure was once believed to be the hoard of the successors of Captain Kidd. A later theory, says Coronet, is that the cache was part of loot captured by Spanish marauders in the 15th and 16th centuries and diverted from shipments earmarked for Spain.

Searchers have brought up gold links from their excavations. A tablet was found bearing the inscription: "Forty feet below, two million pounds are buried." But no one has been able to dig that extra forty feet.

Somehow, the mysterious treasure has been placed in some sort of subterranean chamber which has thus far defied every effort to uncover it. At a certain depth, water rushes into each tunnel that is dug, threatening the explorers and crumbling the tunnel walls. Efforts to pump out the water have gone for nil. Attempts to block off the source of the water have been unsuccessful.

A total of 20 expeditions to Oak Island have fallen short of their ambitious goal. "It is almost inconceivable, but true," says Coronet, "that probably unschooled and untrained men were able—more than 200 years ago—to conceive and construct a sub-surface hiding place that has successfully defied the best brains and talents in the modern engineering world."

Little attention is paid, however, to the collisions caused by slow drivers, remarks The Financial Post. News stories of speeding convictions are common but there are few cases where drivers have been apprehended for poking along at 25 miles-an-hour on a highway where the majority wish to — and could safely — drive at 50 and more.

Slow-speed driving may be perfectly all right on a back-country road, but on a super-highway, it tends to shorten tempers possibly already frayed by summer heat or a difficult day at the desk. It is when riled by such circumstances that otherwise sane and sensible drivers often take chances that too often send them to a hospital or a mortuary.

Other areas of the country which haven't such regulations might well consider copying Nova Scotia legislation which stipulates a minimum speed on certain highways.

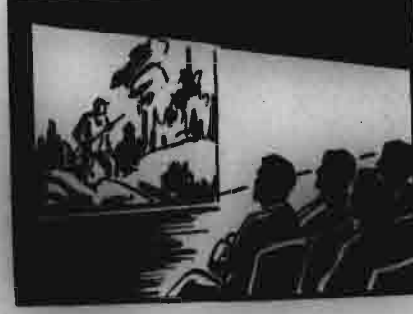

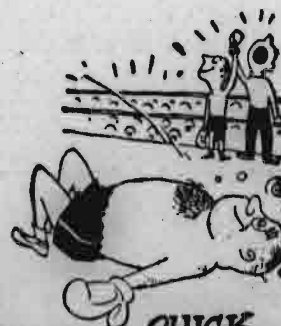

Hot Biscuit Supper Sandwich

Saison to taste 1 c. minced cooked meat with grated onion, salt, pepper and condiment sauce; moisten slightly with gravy or sauce. Sift twice, then sift into a bowl, 2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/4 c. once sifted all-purpose flour), 4 tps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. dry mustard. Cut in finely 5 tbs. chilled shortening. Make a well in dry ingredients and add 1/2 c. chili sauce and 1/2 c. milk; mix lightly, adding milk if necessary, to make a soft dough. Knead for 10 seconds on floured board and divide dough into 2 parts. Pat one part into a greased round 8 1/2" cake pan and spread almost to edges with meat mixture; moisten edges of dough with water. Pat second part of dough into an 8 1/2" round and place over meat mixture; press lightly around edges to seal; score top layer deeply into 6 pie-shaped wedges. Bake in hot oven, 425°, about 20 mins. Serve hot with brown tomato sauce. Yield - 6 servings.

Acadians To Celebrate

National unity will be the over-riding theme of the colorful Acadian celebrations which will take place next summer in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Louisiana, culminating in a mammoth gathering at Grand Pre on August 15, 1935.

It will be the greatest reunion of the Acadians of North America since the enforced dispersion of 200 years ago, and large delegations will be on hand from Louisiana, Quebec, New England, Prince Edward Island, and other centers of Acadian or French Canadian population and culture. Cape Breton, Clare and the Pictoucos all will cooperate.

Rev. Father Clement Cormier, of St. Joseph's University, and M. A. Savie, secretary of the general committee in charge of Maritime arrangements, were in Halifax recently en route home to Moncton from a short preliminary survey of existing facilities in western Nova Scotia.

Maritime preparations are already well under way and agreement has been reached on dates of the main events, which will begin August 11 at Moncton, near which the intrepid exiles who marched back overland through the trackless wilderness of New Hampshire, Maine and New Brunswick in 1766, were first met and welcomed by patriots who had escaped expulsion and had formed new settlements on the banks of the Petitcodiac. A few of the trekkers decided to go no further and remained there near old friends.

On August 12 the celebrants will move to Memramcook, 15 miles east of Moncton, where the marchers of 1766 found larger hamlets of friends and relatives and where many of them decided to settle.

Then on August 15, all roads will lead to Grand Pre, Nova Scotia, which, because of the romantic interest centered upon it by Longfellow's Evangeline, now is generally regarded as the heartland of the Acadian race. To this event English, Scottish, Irish and other principal elements in the modern population of Acadia will be invited to send teams of performers to demonstrate their national songs and dances in conjunction with similar French cultural entertainments.

On the following day, August 16, there will be a grand finale at Champlain's Habitation, Port Royal, in the territory around Annapolis Royal, the real cradle of the Acadian race from which

Grand Pre and other eastern villages were settled in later years. Louisiana already has appropriated a preliminary \$100,000 for its local celebrations and delegations, and it is expected that Quebec, New England and other French speaking areas will be heavily represented. A Maritime Acadian delegation also will journey to Louisiana to participate in the elaborate celebrations there.

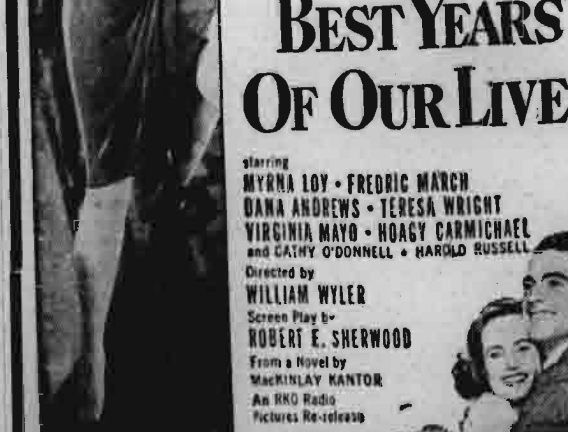
