

1. COMMERCIAL VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS 1959 expire January 31st, 1960, instead of February 29th, 1960.

4. OPERATORS LICENCES expire March 31st, 1960. New OPERATORS LICENCES will be issued on and offser December 21st.1959, and will expire at the end of the Drivers Birth month in 1961. Date of birth and explry date will be shown on all 1960 licences.

5. WEIGHT PLATES will not be issued for commercial vehicles in 1960.







In other words, Mayor Cardoza stated, the total net de benture debt as of December 15, 1959, to be paid from taxation is \$195,209.71. To this however should be added \$42,500 outstanding on the Forum bonds which will no doubt be paid through taxation making the total \$237,709.71.

This amount, the Mayor said, is 6.52% of the net assess ment of the town for 1959, which is \$3,646,070.

Speaking of contingent liabilities, the Mayor said these amount in gross total to \$302,188.40. Included are \$46,500 for the which \$4,000 has been paid in 1959, leaving \$42,500 which is already included in the net debenture debt figure. Also included in contingencies is the provincial school loan of \$5,688.40. An amount of \$250,000 for the Digby County Power Board is also included but there are already investments sufficient to liquidate this and there has been some question as to whether it should in fact continue to be shown as a contingent liability.

The Hospital Situation

The news which was announced last week in this paper that the Digby town council saw fit to call a halt in negotiations with the municipal authorities regarding plans for hospital extension in this area, we believe, was viewed with alarm by most of our readers. Indeed, if the seriousness of the situation is thoroughly considered there is cause for alarm.

We in this area have now a 28 bed hospital to serve a 15,000 population. If we understand correctly this will shortly be cut to 22 beds in order to comply with existing provincial hospital regulations. Have we ever considered that with a catastrophy befalling a school bus, one of our summer camps for young people or any other group that most of those beds could

According to reports from the last council meeting it would seem that the town has already exceeded or reached the maximum of its borrowing power. If this is true, and the councilfors feel that it is unwise to further negotiations which involve by Peggy Seegar and Ewan the spending of the people's money, is there no alternative? We MacColl. feel, if the people see the seriousness of the situation that they will demand that every angle be explored before turning down a proposition for the welfare of Digby citizens. Let each ratepayer consider himself or herself a parent with a young son or daughter suffering an acute attack of appendicitis and it is found that time means life. Will we say that we haven't the price right now we'll wait to operate when we get the money? We are sure this would not be the case. The hospital situation is just that. There will be those who will desperately need the hospital, it might be you, it might be another, it might be your son or daughter, sister, brother, father or mother, or it might be those of others. When time means life will we wait until a more convenient opportunity to care for the sick? The truth of the matter is that we will not wait. If we cannot accommodate our ill in Digby we will waste precious time by getting there but we will get to the nearest hospital possible in the shortest possible time. And let us not forget that we'll be helping to pay wherever we go.

As this is written there is in view a citizen's hospital meeting this week and others scheduled for later, we believe. We can only hope that the people will avail themselves of the opportunity to discuss this important matter with all seriousness.

The Holy Thorn Of Glastonbury

In honor of the Hawthorn, which legendarily shielded Christ while he rested in the woods before the crucilizion, Joseph of Arimathaea chose a thorn staff when he started on his long journey to Britain shortly after the death of Christ. Arriving at last at his new home in Glastonbury, Joseph stuck his walking stick into the ground; the staff began to grow and soon acquired the habit of producing flowers each Christmas Eve.



The first literary mention of the thorn is contained in Hearne's His-tory and Antiquities of Glastonbury. tory and Antiquities of Glastonbury, published in 1722. In this work, Mr. Eyston states: "Whether it sprang from St. Joseph of Arimathaea's dry staff, I cannot find, but beyond all dispute it sprang up miracu-lusty."

When Britain adopted the Gregorian calendar in 1753, 2,000 persons assembled at Glastonbury on December 25—new style—to see if the Holy Thorn would bloom in agreement with the new calendar; when it did not, many refused to participate in the usual observances of Christmas. The evil of changing calendars was proven when the thorn blossomed on January 5—Christmas Eve—old style—and many ministers in the vicinity of Glastonbury appeased their congregations by announcing that Christmas would be observed according to the old calendar.

was brought to America in 1900 and
planted near St. Alban's school in
Washington, D. C., by the late
Right Rev. Henry Gates Satterlee. The cutting grew into a tree, blos-soming for the first time in De-cember, 1918; since then, it has blossomed each year at Christmas-time and attracts thousands of

The well-known bearded figure was ousted by Quetzalcoatt, the Indian god, half bird, half snake, who was worshipped by the Aziecs before the Spanish invasion.






