Now and then a printing job had a save in parchment paper which required a special kind of printers' ink which smelled very bad some days. I always dreaded it when "Mac" would take you to the largest press in spite of the fact he always opened an outside door to lessen the odors on the room itself.

One of the jobs I had to do, besides putting and  
graders' devil on the staff, was to... I cleaned one  
and then... One day not long after I started to get to  
the grating plant. I decided to climb the floor that  
apparently hadn't been cleaned for some con-  
siderable time.

"J.J." came along and said, "how are you making out Vince?" I assured him that I thought I was beginning to see the floor. "J.J." laughed very heartily. He thought the remark pretty good and whole.

Sometimes the gasoline engine, a piece of machinery would refuse to work, and the "fix-it" man had patiently worked for a certain length of time to get it going again, without results. Max would then stand back and come over dramatically then he would immediately start working. "See," he would say, "all it needed was a bit of fixing."

On other occasions when some people would say, "let's be a little off" and vice versa, often that is all it took. They often since have a respect of the value of that remark and the actual need of "off" in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and in the right way.

(Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I told "Mac" of four teenage boys who in the spring season of 1961 got together just before dark one evening and decided to initiate the newly built outdoor Quon Hut swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around, and the four

Clothes were taken out near the pool, nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits, as in the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" informed to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story went something like, "Four Boy Swims Officially Open Pines Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the four? Many years later (they are known as: the late Dr. Earl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world and Korean), was awarded the Victoria Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent druggist, for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale hardware merchant, and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day, I was asked to contribute about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read at least two times what I had written about the man who was found marooned on a beach in some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Duffy County. When I read this man's tongue had been cut out and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

Jerome appeared to have been a man of considerable social standing and, possibly, of considerable wealth. However, the way things could or would ever get any better seemed not to be some family in the Forest, but something that sounded like the Forest itself, either, you'd not, or, would not, or, would not, who he was or why he was left there, or, was, and, is, one of Dug's Cunts, and, different ideas have been, years concealing this man. However, "Mr." was, I felt, no surprise, but different about this man. The man had been very well educated, and people, and he was a sort of, people who wanted where he thought.

From the files of the Chamber of January 22, 1960, the following account has been copied concerning Dwight D. Davis:

The Town Plot is situated at the east of the township just within the entrance to Annapolis Basin, and extends miles from Annapolis Town, and six miles across land from the head of M. Mary's Bay. This land not only has water's edge, partly on level ground, and partly on the declivity of a modern hill, dry and pleasant, and having on an eastern aspect a view of the Annapolis Basin and its cultivated shores for twenty miles in extent, it terminates with the Fort and River's mouth at that name. It was secured by Leyden, from New York in 1624, the time of which went nearly to Britain, or, moving to other countries, left the shore

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Well, I felt that I had learned considerable from my short experience at "The Wallis Job Print." ## Town Approves More Electrical Wiring Care

At Tuesday evening's session of Digby Town Council a letter was read from James Ayer, superintendent of the Digby County Power Board, which stressed the need for more control over wiring in Digby. The letter said that too many unqualified men, who are not familiar with the town's electrical code, are doing wiring, and only qualified men should be allowed to make the installations. Council approved the request that all permits granted for building in the town of Digby should be subject to the approval of the superintendent of the electric light system.

It was reported that all owners of the King Street sewer have signed a document which would turn the sewer over to the town if the town would bear all maintenance costs. Council decided to either build a complete new sewerage system from Mr. Raymond Graham's to the Racquette, or enter the existing sewer at the corner, on the advice of an expert. Investigation is to be carried out on both possibilities.

Deputy Mayor Helen Aathony was appointed a committee of one for the local district to help arrange, with the Board of Trade and/or other interested groups, plans for Canada's Centenary celebration in 1967.

The Digby Pines was granted permission to erect a 8'x12' sign on the shore side of the street near the Racquette bridge. Permission was also granted for a Hospital Tag Day on Wednesday, August 21.

Council authorized repairs to the Fire Hall not to exceed \$150.00.

The Police Report for June revealed fifteen complaints laid, of which eight required field investigation. Four cases required court action, and all were disposed of before the court. Three were under the liquor control act. One motor vehicle accident was investigated.

The Relief Report showed only \$34.00 spent during June, as compared with \$282.00 last month and as high as \$300.00 or more in previous months. Two families (16 persons) were on relief during June.

According to a report given by Councillor Hersey, the future of the Municipal Home, at Marshalltown, will be decided on Saturday.

Permission was granted the Oddfellows to erect a hall on the former Lynch property on King Street, and to the Digby Branch Royal Canadian Legion to sponsor the Bill Lynch shows at the Cannon Bank from July 8-14.

## Ballet And Nursery Closing

The Community Centre at HMCS Cornwallis was the scene of an impressive closing exercise of the Cornwallis Ballet Class and Nursery School, Saturday night, when well over a hundred parents and their guests attended the performance.

The little ones of the Nursery School gave every evidence of their ability and training and were obviously as pleased with themselves as were their parents.

The Ballet group was outstanding, with difficult numbers being danced with sureness and grace. Two lovely young ballerinas, Miss Brenda Berry, Smith's Cove, and Miss Gladys Sloan, Bear River, gave an outstanding performance in their solo dances. Miss Valerie Beeler and Miss Holly Berry danced a pas de deux and also took part with the rest of the pupils in group dancing.

The classes are taught by Miss Harriet Graves and are a credit to her ability in these arts.

## Boulevard For Parking?

William Troop and Allen Pyne, representing a number of business establishments on Water Street south, came before Digby Town Council on Tuesday with a request that the boulevard be removed.

It was pointed out that already a serious traffic situation occurs daily in that area and with the opening of a large department store on that street later this summer, the removal of the boulevard for parking reasons has become a necessity.

Police Chief W. F. Dunn said that if the boulevard were removed angle parking could be allowed all along the west side of the street. This would double the amount of cars parked in this area, he said. He stated there would be no change in parking on the water side of the street and that it would not be necessary to remove the second portion of the boulevard, located in front of the post office.

Council decided to table the matter until a petition could be circulated among merchants and residents of that particular area, asking their opinions on the matter.

## Memorial Service At North Range

Not in as great numbers as last year, but with well over fifty from far and near, the Annual Memorial Service in the old Methodist Church at North Range was held, with Rev. R. R. Winchester conducting the service and Mr. Fred I. Withers bringing the message.

Prior to the service the great old glass oil lamp was placed in position outside the church, and inside, by means of a hand operated (for there is no electricity in the church) phonograph, several favorite hymns of other days were played.

Rev. Mr. Winchester led the singing of the hymns and the offering was received in one of the old box type offering plates, one equipped with a long handle, seldom seen except in the very oldest of churches nowadays.

Mr. Withers spoke on a text from Genesis, chapter 14, and entitled his message "Memorial From Mamre", telling of that ancient town on the borders of Palestine where Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph all had associations. He told of choosing Abraham as representing generosity; Isaac, obedience; Jacob as typifying willingness to be changed and Joseph as integrity.

Mr. Withers drew a similitude to the situation of Mamre as a last resting place of loved dead and the church and adjacent burial ground at North Range. He pointed out that the early people called Methodists had helped carve out the land and that here nearby were laid their bodies to rest.

Mr. Withers gave tribute to the unflagging work of Mrs. William Wamboldt, who though herself unable to leave her home these last few years had yet in a labor of love directed the work that has kept the church and surrounding grounds as attractive as they are.

The offering received was in the vicinity of \$18.00 and with other donations that may come in will be carefully used to keep up the cemetery as far as possible. It is suggested that any desiring to make further contributions might do so by remitting in care of Mrs. William Wamboldt at North Range.

For several years the Baptist and United Church ministers, with the people of the churches, have cooperated to make this service possible.

Supported by the rays of old sol, a large and enthusiastic crowd led off by the bands and majorettes from Yarmouth and Oromocto and the Digby majorettes, the parade on July 1st in Digby was pronounced one of the best in many years.

Prizes were awarded to the Digby Fire Department, 1st; Siesta Motel, 2nd, and Burma Propane, 3rd. Special mention was given to Mrs. Alma Melanson, whose car was decorated with upwards of 30 hand-made dogs, product of her own imagination and skill.

Following the parade the spectators went to the Digby Forum where children and grown-ups alike saw Randy Dandy and Silly Willy in person. Another attraction was the display of old model cars brought here by the Antique Car Club, Yarmouth, N. S.

The evening amusement featured the famed hypnotist Edwin L. Baron, from Chicago, and the usual midway activities.

The day's program was conducted by the Digby Lions Club and proved a successful event.

## Arctic Atmosphere In July

Despite the heat of the day, July 1st in Digby took on an Arctic atmosphere for the Lions Club Dominion Day celebrations when Douglas Woodman, Saint John, N. B., formerly of Conway, Digby Co., entered a float in the parade and a booth at the Forum displaying articles from the far north.

Many of the articles on display were from Resolute Bay in the North West Territories.

A jacket and parka and the outside covering from the garment were on display and had been made for Mr. Woodman by the chief of the village, his wife and daughter. Measurements for the jacket had been made by string with a knot to indicate the lengths and proportions of each part of the garment.

The Eskimo stove consisting of a hollowed piece of soap stone was shown. The fire in the stove was obtained by burning whale oil in the hollow.

On display were also hides of the caribou and polar bears and seal skins from the male, the female and baby seals. Beautiful furs from the blue fox, Arctic white fox, the red fox and those of a cross between all three were shown. Among the novelties and other articles were caribou horns, the wings of a patamargarin (similar to a partridge), a crocheted hat made by the Eskimos, cribbage boards made from ivory walrus tusks, slippers of seal skin, a sweet grass basket woven for carrying water, rings and the pins of ivory, narwhal tusks and many small articles made from soap stone, whale bone and tusks.

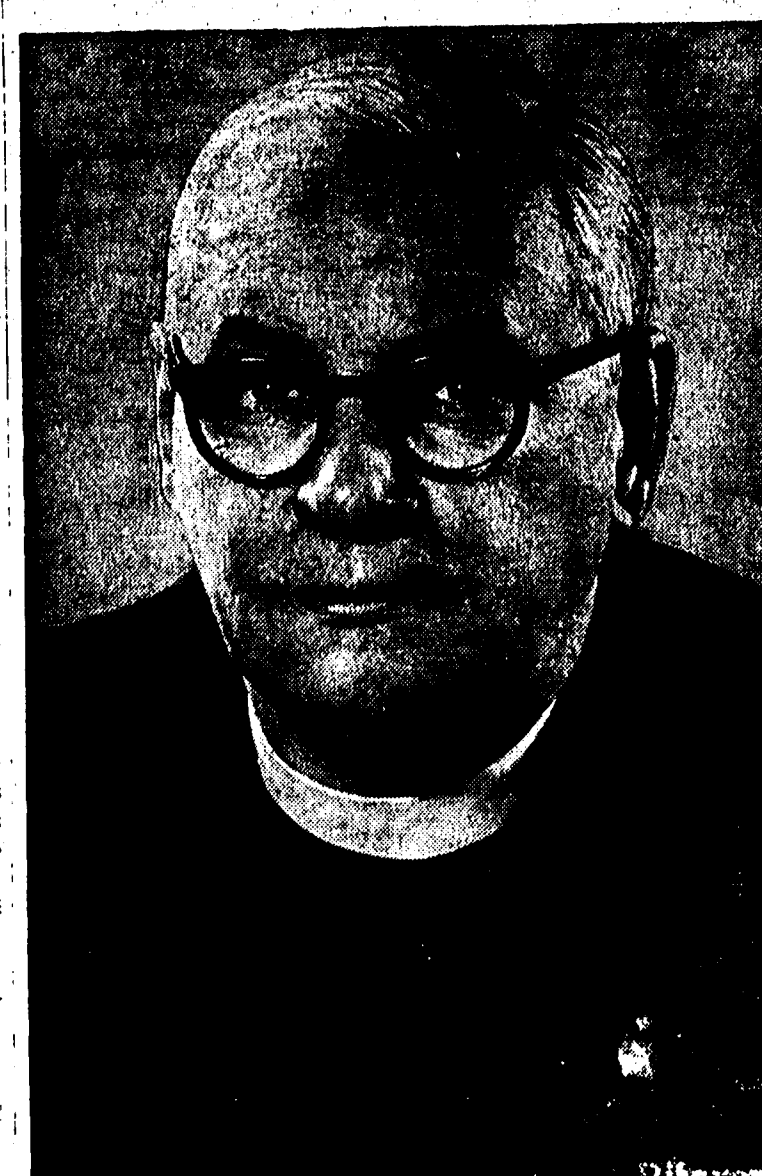
Mr. Woodman had many pictures on hand showing the life of the Eskimo people, their homes, means of travel, and the glorious skies of the never ending days. He told of the clever, mechanical minded and musically talented Eskimo people and showed letters he received from Eskimo children. Certificates for having crossed the Arctic Circle and a relief map were among the displayed items. The map was a lunar plastic relief map prepared by the Army Map Service Corps of Engineers of United States Army, Washington, D. C., and was given to Mr. Woodman by Remo T. Gajda, chief geologist with the Department of Mines and Technical Surveys, Ottawa, Canada.

Among the pictures were those of the ships on which Mr. Woodman travelled north and of icebergs 310 feet high above water which they encountered. This represented only one-tenth of the size of the icebergs as nine-tenths was below water. Temperatures, almost unbelievably, reached 98 degrees at times in some Arctic places despite icebergs floating in the Arctic waters.

These missionaries travel from village to village telling of the love of God, giving spiritual guidance, teaching the way to cleanliness, teaching them to read, caring for the sick, and many other ways to show they are cared for. These missionaries also help them to build churches some of the simple material used, but it is their own and gives them something to work for. The meeting was closed with a hymn and prayer.

## Cornell Research Continues In Digby Area

Students with many backgrounds have arrived in Digby County to carry out a summer project of the Cornell Programme, directed by Dr. Alexander H. Leighton, of Trumansburg, N. Y., and Smith's Cove, this marks a dozen years of study about health and ways of life.

As part of Cornell University and Cornell Medical College, the Programme does basic research into the relationships of health and environment, and has studied in Europe, New York City, Africa, Alaska and Mexico, in addition to Digby County. So far it has found that although life is very different in these places, many aspects of it have similar effects on health. But much remains to be learned. In the continuing studies, such as this in Digby, it hopes to find out about changes in both health and environment and how such changes fit together.

The researchers here this summer are advanced students from Laval University in Quebec, Cornell University in Ithaca, and Cornell Medical College in New York. One of them, Mr. Olasupo (Supo) Ladipo, is a Nigerian, from the Western Region where the Programme's African study was carried out. He spent several years in government service before he came to Cornell, where he plans to complete studies in economics and statistics, and then return to his homeland. Mr. Ladipo comes from one of the many large cities in the Western Region, and this is his first experience in living in smaller communities.

From Laval are two students in the social sciences, Mr. Roger de la Garde and Mr. Marcel Samson, both of whom were members of the research team in 1962. Mr. Thomas Revak is a first-year medical student in New York City, as were two of the interviewers last year. The remaining researchers are from Cornell University's Department of Anthropology. They include Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Caulkins, Mr. Robert Maxwell and Mr. Philip Silverman. Mr. Silverman's wife, Ingrid and infant daughter are also here for the summer.

Since Dr. and Mrs. Leighton, who directed last summer's project are in Europe, Mrs. Alice Longaker is in charge of the study here this year. Mr. Thomas Stone, who spent last summer in the County is co-director, and his wife, Mrs. Sarah Stone, is one of the researchers. Mrs. Longaker is living in Digby and the Stones are in Plympton. The students are living in various communities throughout the County.

As in the past, the project consists of trying to learn about patterns of living and of health, including mental health. This is done through questionnaires and interviews of various kinds. The success of the research has depended on the assistance of residents of the County who have given freely of their time not only in answering questions and in making the interviewers feel at home, but also through innumerable kindnesses in finding quarters, helping out in difficult times, and providing occasions for enjoyment as well as work. For many of the visitors, this summer is also the first time they are living near the ocean and so many opportunities for outdoor recreation as Nova Scotia provides.

In the past, the summer's research will contribute to the growing body of knowledge about the social sciences. Since the time the Cornell Programme began, this is a field which has come to receive increasing recognition throughout the world. During the past year, for example, Dr. Leighton has been invited to participate in conferences and discussions in Geneva, Switzerland, where he was a U. S. delegate to a United Nations Conference, in Sweden and Scotland, both of which have studies similar to the Programme's, and in a number of centers in France and Poland.

Other places where various members of the Programme are doing research this summer are Africa, New York and Sweden, although the project here is by far the largest one.

## Firemen Present Wheel Chair

Mrs. Edna Rice, of Landsdowne Road, a short distance from the village of Bear River, is a happy woman today because after thirty years of being more and more hopelessly crippled with muscular dystrophy, she is able to get around her home and look after some of her housework.

Mrs. Rice's ability to do these things has been made possible through the gift of a wheel chair made to her by the Nova Scotia Division of the Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada.

The presentation of the collapsible wheel chair was made to Mrs. Rice in her home by Allister C. Milner, chief of the Bear River Fire Department which has been collecting in the Bear River area for the muscular dystrophy association for the past several years.

Mrs. Rice is not the only member of her family who has been stricken with the terrible crippling, muscular dystrophy. A sister, Miss Lizzie Thibault, of Weymouth Mills, has been crippled for the past 38 years and has not walked for 16 years. A brother, Ernest Thibault, also of Weymouth Mills has been a victim of muscular dystrophy for the past 35 years and has been unable to walk for the past thirteen. Another sister, Mrs. Arnold Hand-spiker, of Mount Pleasant, near Digby, has been crippled for 23 years and has not been able to walk or use her arms for some 11 years.

Deeply grateful for the gift of the wheel chair, Mrs. Rice says it will mean she will be able to do much more of her own housework. She will also be able to get out and visit friends and relatives she has not seen in years as the chair is collapsible and can be packed in a car.

A great supporter of the Canadian Muscular Dystrophy Association herself, Mrs. Rice says that it is unfortunate that more people are not aware of the extent of this crippling disease throughout Canada. More than 25,000 people are affected in this country alone, she says, and the number in the USA is a quarter of a million.

## - Proclamation -

BY THE HONOURABLE E. D. HALIBURTON  
Minister of Lands and Forests

To all whom these Presents shall come or  
whom the same may in any wise concern:

Whereas the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia deems it necessary for the protection of the forests to make this Proclamation:

Now Know Ye that the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia under and by virtue of Section 117 of The Lands and Forests Act doth hereby set aside on, from, and after the twenty-eighth day of June A.D., 1963 until the thirtieth day of September, A.D., 1963 unless this Proclamation is sooner revoked, every area of forest land as an area of forest and upon which no person shall enter for the purpose of travelling, camping, fishing, or picnicking, or any other purposes, without first notifying the local Forest Ranger, or other person duly authorized to receive such notification, of the route, destination, purpose and duration of the trip, with dates, and having obtained authorization in writing from the local Forest Ranger or other person duly authorized to issue same: Provided, however, that forest land may be entered upon by the actual owner or occupier thereof or his, or their employees as such, and by Forest Rangers, Volunteer Rangers, fire fighters and land surveyors: Any person found in any area of forest land without a permit whilst this Proclamation is in force is, upon conviction, subject to a penalty of not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars.

Of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Dear Mrs. Wallis,

I have just attended what I believe to have been a special meeting of the Digby County Municipal Council called to select an assistant tax collector or out of applications submitted to the warden. I do not believe that I have ever been to a meeting where there was as much mumbling and whispering and inaction by the executive as I have witnessed tonight. If our municipal affairs must be decided by whispering and mumbling and so few councillors, then we have arrived at a very sad state of affairs. Now perhaps what they whispered about was confidential, I do not know, however I had the feeling that the councillors seemed to want to hide certain things of interest to all the taxpayers. When the councillors did decide on some applications it seemed to me in the audience that it was decided by very few councillors who they wanted and then the rest agreed. I had expected to see each councillor choose certain applications and then discuss them over to sort out the most desirable. However they did speak up to turn down flatly some applications that offered their services at the cost of \$2100.00 and \$2600.00 for no other reason than that they were too low. ## Mayor Heads Industrial Committee

The Mayor of the Town of Digby will head the Digby area Industrial Committee, it was decided at the organizational committee, which met at the Town Hall on Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor V. L. Bent presided. It was further decided that the vice-chairman be the president of the Digby Board of Trade (presently Ralph MacIntyre); the secretary one of the members of the Digby Municipal Council (Mrs. M. P. Gott); treasurer, a member of the town's finance committee which at present is Councillor Charles Hersey.

After much discussion it was decided the committee should represent the area covered by the Municipality of Digby with concentration on the ecological centres Weymouth, Bear River and Digby. The size of the master committee is to remain the same as planned with two representatives from the Lions, Kiwanis, Board of Trade and the town and municipality, but two sub-committees were formed which are expected to include business men from other centres of the municipality.

The two sub-committees are the Promotional Committee and the Industrial Zoning and Provision of Services Committee. The Promotional Committee is headed by A. L. Robinson with power to add. 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## About This and That

### Beauty Marred

We appreciate ideas for editorials. We mean ideas for editorials which are constructive and pertinent to our area. We, therefore, appreciated two recent remarks. We appreciated the complimentary remarks from a visitor on our editorials during the past two weeks on the beauties of the Neck and Islands and the suggestion that the assets of the Neck and Islands, including the present ferry system, be more widely advertised. We also appreciated his suggestion that we write a further editorial on the unsightly mess of garbage, refuse and general litter near the wharf at East Ferry where passengers wait for the ferry or visitors just browse around enjoying the otherwise marvellous scenery. Part of the litter, no doubt, comes from those people who do wait around for the ferry or stand to gaze at the view but the rest is just deliberate household tossing of garbage over the embankment and creating an unsightly appearance, we have been told. This garbage dumping does not necessarily come from the villagers of East Ferry. All too often people make a point of taking garbage away from their own areas and secretly tossing it by night in full daylight view of other villagers. How the litter happened to get near the ferry wharf is difficult to establish but this reminder might help by preventing a worse condition from growing throughout the remainder of the summer. It might even give some public minded citizen nearby a bright idea of occasionally tidying up the litter left by careless travellers. We'll likely always have the careless litterbug but even the worst litterbug will think twice before he tosses paper wrappers or garbage on a freshly cleaned surface. His guilt is too obvious.

Of course, in mentioning the litter at East Ferry does not in any way imply that this is the only spot where litter and garbage has collected. This particular instance brought to our minds serves to remind others that defacing beautiful scenery with wrappings and garbage is an offense to the eye of the tourist whom we wish to attract to our area. Besides litter is not only offensive to the eye of the tourist but it is unsanitary and often creates a fire hazard for ourselves. How about cleaning up? The summer is upon us. We want this year's tourists now and their return with their friends in years to come.

### That Digby Sign

The above editorial reminds us that coming from Yarmouth towards Digby we noticed that the Digby sign outside of town near the Marshalltown area is broken in two. Part of a scallop shell painting is there but nothing more remains of the sign. Who is going to see to it? The summer is here. Tourists are travelling. How will they know when they get near to Digby travelling from the Bluenose at Yarmouth in this direction?

### Guard Our Forests

The outbreak of fire back of Gilbert Cove, a couple of weeks ago should make us all more aware of our responsibility in protecting our forests from fires. Particularly is this true of campers and those who are enjoying the summer woodland.

Any fire loss is hard to bear and a needless waste but all forest fires or woodland fires cannot be controlled so readily as the one at Gilbert Cove. We do not wish to minimize the loss and waste at that particular fire but we do want to impress on our readers that carelessness can lead to a much more dangerous and destructive conflagration than was fought last week and also the previous one. The fact that the blaze had to be quelled the second time in a week proves how stubborn and dangerous even a small fire can become.

Again, our forests are a tourist attraction. But their scenic beauty, recreational and sporting provisions for native and tourist alike are not their only assets. Every bit of waste in woodland and forest is a waste of that very thing we are all striving for — industry. Forests and the products they create are a good source of our economy. Let's save them. It is a public responsibility. As in the home, so in the woodland and forest, it is each individual who can guard against wasting this valuable resource by fire.

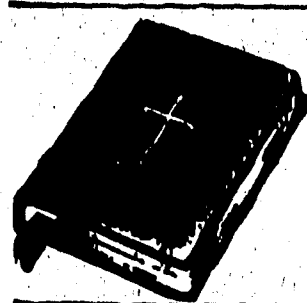

the municipal government; (4) no committee can operate without funds; and (5) the community as a whole must be behind the venture with its support and every citizen be prepared to sell "Digby".

Continuing, he said, that the committee should not be thought of as the only people interested in industrial development but it is, he said, the committee's job to get every business and citizen interested.

The committee was given a survey form put out by the N.S. Department of Trade and Industry for guidance. Mr. V. G. Cardoza noted that a survey had been made by the Department of Trade and Industry and that Cornell University had inspired a complete industrial survey of the county, possibly the first time in Canada's history that an economic survey was made on a county-wide basis. He felt that Digby had done practically all it could do to encourage industry. He also mentioned that in Sweden the government made loans to pocket unemployment areas.

Mr. Cardoza and Mr. Robinson stated that they had called the federal Minister of Labor urging that Digby be designated as an area which would qualify under the new regulations for depreciations and tax concessions. They were advised, they stated, by the minister to write a letter to that effect. They reported that they had done so on June 29 but to date had not had a reply.

Dear Editor:

Once again we are confronted with the question of the removal of the boulevard in order to solve our parking problems. From the report of the Council meeting given in the Digby Courier the merchants on Water Street are to be consulted for their opinions of this question.

The removal of the boulevard would be a crime for several reasons:

(1) The removal of the boulevard would only accommodate a few more cars, and would not solve the traffic problem of Digby.

(2) Our taxes are high enough now, and the cost of cutting down trees, digging out the boulevard and then paving

it would be extremely high.  
(3) Should the boulevard be removed the attractive approach to the business section of the town, which is a source of comment from our visitors, would be completely spoiled.

(4) The remaining trees would never be replaced and people would have no place to rest and enjoy the beauty of the scenery.

A solution to the problem is to have parallel parking all along the west side of Water Street and to meter the waterfront side of both boulevards for parallel parking. No paving would be necessary although it would be an improvement to have the narrow strip paved. It is used now for free parking without paying. Some of the better of the old meters could be used for this section.

As the Main Street of Digby is part of the provincial highway, it would seem that no change could be made without consultation with the Department of Highways.

## About This and That

### The Tourist To Digby

A letter in this issue of The Digby Courier regarding tourists to Digby has attracted our attention because of its general nature. It seems to convey the idea which we have so often tried to put across. The idea is that to attract people to a place you must first show them the way — you must suggest there is such a place as Digby or Bear River or Freeport or Weymouth, or whatever place it happens to be. Make the tourist want to come and tell him how to get here and what he will find when he arrives. Definitely, we must do our share to keep the tourist or repeat his visit after he gets here but certainly we must first attract the tourist to the locality. There are many ways in which this can be done but we think our letter-writer of this week has indeed hit on the most important method. Especially, it is true for those towns and villages which are off the beaten track. The letter to which we refer is written especially about Digby town. We live here and we certainly are especially interested in getting tourists into town. But The Digby Courier not only serves the town, it serves the whole County of Digby and so we can think of other places, too, which could do a little more in promotion. Eg. where is there a sign which attracts people to the Neck and Islands? The only one we can think of is a plain stark black and white directional sign. The tourist has to pretty well guess if there is anything to see or what the villages are like.

The federal government, we understand, is stepping up its tourist promotion program with preparations for the 1967 centennial observance. Centennial committees, too, are being formed around this area now. Why not plan something more than a parade down town with banners and ticker-tape? Why not something more lasting? We might not be able to aspire to a new town hall, a new library (or, can we?) but we might be able to aspire to new signs advertising many of our tourist assets. This is not suggesting we should leave this important promotion for 1967 but a suggestion for those villages which cannot go big on the centennial program and which need time to achieve a goal.

The federal government is stepping up its tourist promotion program. No province has a better promotional program than Nova Scotia. The number of tourists coming to the province has doubled since 1952 and the Digby area has, no doubt, benefitted from this increase. But, the question is "Have we had the maximum benefit from the province's increase or has the increase gone more in other directions?" Are we making the most of this industry? and we emphasize — industry. The federal government is promoting tourism. The province of Nova Scotia is doing a magnificent job. Certain areas like the South Shore and the Annapolis Valley are doing promotional work. Is this area being singled out enough or are cars driving past the entrance to Digby town — or some other of our beautiful villages? Read the letter in this issue of the Courier and then express your own opinion and add more ideas. Somebody must have some.

After writing the above editorial we must mention that Bear River has been complimented on their attractive new tourist folder. Recently attractive signs had been made advertising Bear River. A new spark has been put into the exhibition, we hear, and the Cherry Carnival for Saturday, the 20th of July, is progressing to a bigger and better hit than ever before. The very thin variety of plastic was designed for one purpose alone — to protect garments and other commodities until they reach the home, after which it should be tied in tight knots and discarded. With its clinging property, caused by static electricity, it leads easily to suffocation.

It was never meant to cover a baby's crib mattress or pillow, or to be re-used as a diaper bag in baby's carriage. There are heavy-gauge plastic sheets and laundry bags manufactured especially for these purposes, very inexpensive to buy, and not worth pinching pennies over.

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

The editorial in last week's Courier entitled "That Digby Sign" prompts me to write you in this regard. Being engaged in the business of travel promotion and a native of Digby I have been asked on previous visits what in my opinion, could be done to draw the maximum number of motorists into the town as they travel between Yarmouth and Halifax. The answer was and still is — more effective signs. Some of the present signs near the crossroads of Highways 1 and 1(a) are not only inadequate, they are in dilapidated condition the impression created of Digby must be an unfavourable one. Directional signs, while necessary, are useless from an advertising standpoint.

To be constructive and specific, there should be installed in two suitable locations near each junction from Highway 1, attractive, well designed painted signs of standard billboard dimensions (or even larger) which in themselves would impress the visitor with the importance of Digby. On such signs, there would be sufficient space for very necessary "advertising slogans" which would give some reasons for visiting the town instead of by-passing it. Because of Digby's fortunate location (its greatest tourist asset) slogans such as the following are suggested. On the beautiful Annapolis Basin — The scallop centre of Canada — Founded by United Empire Loyalists in 1783. The town's crest would give an added distinction.

I am well aware that many small municipalities face the problem of promoting their tourist attractions with a limited budget. In the case of Digby, which is situated off of one of Nova Scotia's principal tourist arteries, the efforts of all concerned should be concentrated first and foremost in having erected, not only for the Municipality, but by those providing tourist facilities and services, the most attractive painted signs along Highway 1. Collectively, the impression on all travellers could not but have the desired result, namely to induce the maximum number to see Digby before proceeding further.

From a cost standpoint, I believe this recommendation to be a practical one when viewed over a long range period. The competition for the "tourist dollar" is now greater than ever. Benefits will accrue only to those municipalities that make every effort to keep their name and their attractions prominently before visitors.

Dear Editor, Here in Bay View we are disappointed that a decision has been made not to pave the road from Digby to Point Prim. While the machinery to do so will be in the vicinity it would have been a golden opportunity, since the road has been prepared for paving.

I understand the reason for not paving was that the traffic load did not warrant it. This is not surprising, for no one if they could avoid it would travel on it at most times. In the past winter it was ploughed less than half a dozen times, and just now it has been graded for only the second time this year. My family and I, others too, spent many hours on many days, breaking the ice in the ditches during the winter to prevent flooding over the road.

We may be relatively few down here, but we do have to get to and from work and require a variety of services. We are, I know, free to live where we wish, but we are also free to receive equal public amenities for what we pay in our society.

I hope the authorities will change their minds and pave; if not, may we hope for improved road maintenance? 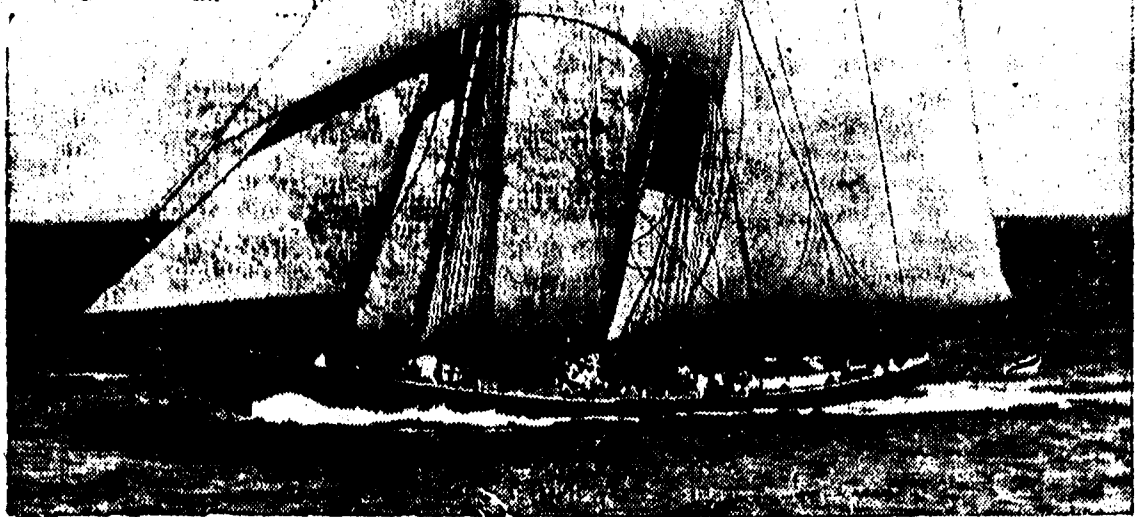
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## Bluenose Launching July 24

All roads lead to Lunenburg on July 24th, the day "Bluenose II", replica of Canada's famous schooner, slides into the water from the same shipyard where the first Bluenose was launched in 1921.

So say town authorities, expecting the thousands of people who will crowd into Lunenburg that day, both ashore and afloat, will likely surpass in numbers those who came to see the "Bounty" take the water in the summer of 1960. That was a day that Lunenburgers, and a lot of other people, will not soon forget. And since, as one of them has put it, "The Bluenose is even more our own than the 'Bounty'", they're probably right in expecting the crowds to be pretty sizeable.

Plans are in high gear for special arrangements to suitably mark the occasion, as well as for extra police and water patrols to handle the bumper traffic. Several yacht clubs are planning to be on hand en masse.

Back in 1921, when Lunenburg built and launched the "Bluenose", they little realized how fully their hopes would be met that she would not only reclaim the International Fishermen's Trophy, but bring honor and glory to her home port and country. For the "Bluenose" not only became a living legend during her own lifetime as the fastest of all sailing ships, but established an enviable reputation as a worker. Her record catch of fish still stands and most of the times when she hurried back to port to meet one or another new challenger, she merely took a break in her regular work as a seasoned salt-banker to do it.

She will fill many roles. First of all, she has been constructed as a memorial to the most famous of all Canadian sailing ships and to the days of sail. As such, "Bluenose II" will stand as a striking symbol of Canada's Maritime heritage. But she will have to maintain herself as far as possible, and in the process she is expected to make an outstanding contribution toward spreading Nova Scotia's fame for the hospitality of its people and the quality of its products. It's in the latter area, involved in the relatively new field of tourism as it's known today, that she's expected to become an asset of almost incalculable value.

She will recall the romantic days of sail in vivid fashion by taking groups of people to sea in brief but thrilling, once-in-a-lifetime experiences for many of them. Others will simply want to go aboard to see what it must have been like to stand on the deck of the Queen of the Seas. Part of each year she will be in Lunenburg, where she will be available to conventions and larger groups for sailing parties. Part of each year, too, she will be in Lunenburg, to receive the countless visitors who annually have been asking to see something connected with the port's great schooner.

Just as the "Bounty" remained a powerful attraction as she lay at the Smith & Rhuland wharf in Lunenburg being rigged in 1960, so will "Bluenose II" in this summer of 1963. Like the "Bounty", a good deal of interior finish work will remain to be done after the schooner slides into the water on July 24th. By the time all this is completed and the last line of rigging added, the "Bluenose" replica will just about make it in time for the opening of the Nova Scotia

Fisheries Exhibition in her home port. Lunenburg has been given assurance that "Bluenose II" will be in that port for the Nova Scotia Fisheries Exhibition each year. What's more, the ship will be entirely at the disposal of the Fair's management, with all income from her operations during that week going into the Fisheries Show's coffers.

"Bluenose II" will be registered and regularly refitted in the South Shore port also, according to Victor Oland, President of Oland's in a speech to a meeting of the Lunenburg Board of Trade before the ship's keel was laid.

In a score of ways, too numerous to mention, "Bluenose II" should, more than prove her worth and there could hardly be a more fitting way of immortalizing the first "Bluenose" and her exploits which not only won glory for her native province, but for herself, a permanent place in the hearts of thousands of Canadians.

Probably the most widely-known skipper afloat in the world today, Captain Ellsworth T. Coggins, late of "HMS Bounty", has been signed to command "Bluenose II".

Captain Coggins, a native of Ashmore, Digby County, Nova Scotia, began his sea career as a boy of 16. Only three years later, at 19, he was suddenly thrust into command of a ship when her captain died and had to be buried at sea. Coggins completed the voyage of the vessel, a three-masted schooner, to Martinique, and subsequently returned her to Nova Scotia for the owners. This brief taste of command decided him upon his career. After a 'goodly stint' under sail, he 'moved to steam' and eventually worked his way up to his Master's Ticket.

When war broke in '39, Coggins joined up as an Able Seaman in the Naval Reserve, serving mainly on convoy duty, until released from the service with the rank of Lieutenant in 1946. Rejoining again in 1949 for a further ten-year stint, his commands included the Algerine, "HMCS Sault Ste. Marie", and fittingly enough, the Bangor Sweeper, "HMCS Digby". He also sailed the Navy's training sloop, "Orlole" from Halifax, by way of the Panama, to Victoria, B.C. He retired from the Navy in 1959.

A notable appointment came in 1961. He was chosen by Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, Hollywood, to skipper the "Bounty", replica of Captain William Bligh's storied 18th Century full-rigger. He trained a new-found crew in the intricacies of square-sail as he took "Bounty", via the Panama Canal, to Tahiti, for filming of the new movie epic of "Mutiny On The Bounty". After returning the vessel to Los Angeles, he next plotted her on a worldwide six-month publicity tour for the motion picture company. During this exhibition cruise, the ship captain and crew were received and feled in every port visited, including London, England, and greeted by a list of notables, headed by Lord Louis Mountbatten.

Victor Oland has expressed his Company's "delight in securing such an able Master for 'Bluenose II'." Captain Coggins' great experience in sail, as well as his command of the "Bounty", both as a working vessel and an exhibition ship, will be of great value", he said. "In addition, we think it most fitting that 'Bluenose II' will be under the command of an illustrious Master Mariner and thus follow in the tradition of the

original 'Bluenose', which gained her laurels under the hand of the greatest skipper of them all, Captain Angus Walters!"

Captain Coggins added to those sentiments when asked to elate the most memorable thrill of his career. "I think it's still to come", he said. He explained he expected it to happen on the day he could welcome 'Cap'n Angus' aboard the new "Bluenose" — "when he'll be the real skipper, believe me" — and watch for the gleam in the eye of the old sea dog as, standing beside the helm, he sniffs the breeze, casts a weather eye aloft and barks the almost-forgotten order, "Up jib and foresail ... steady as she goes!"

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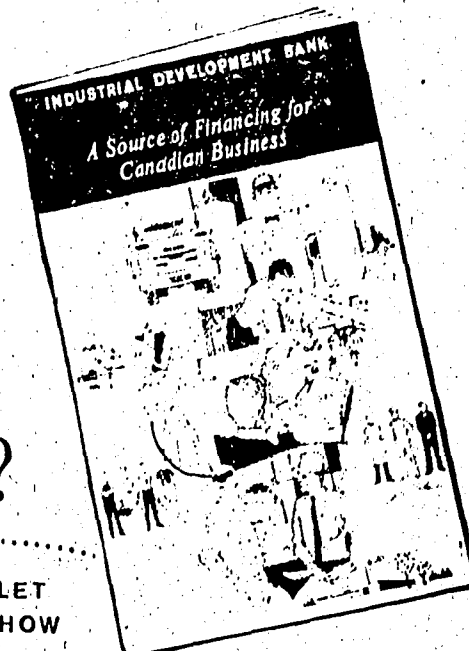

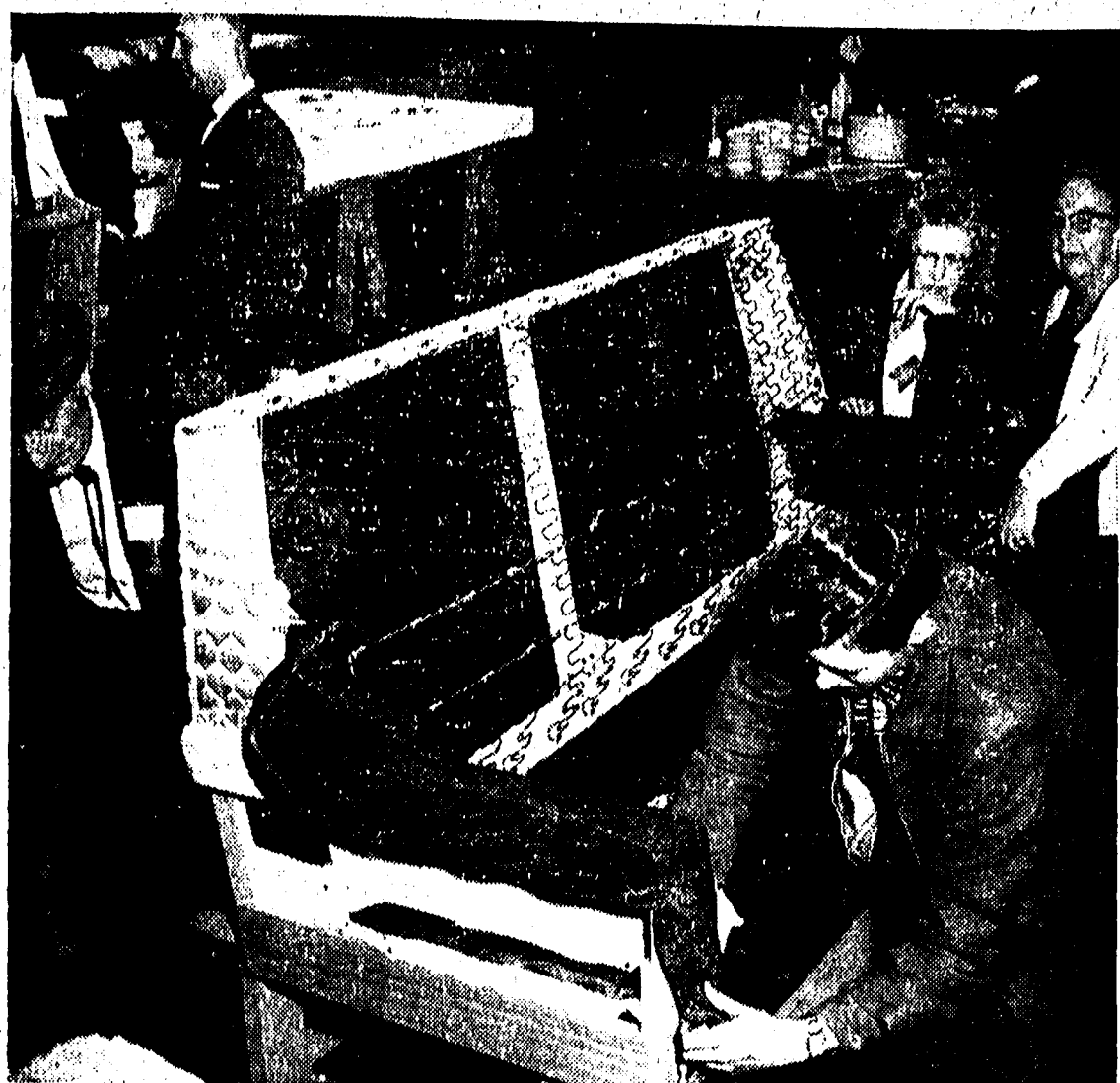

## Address Conservative Meet

Premier Robert Stanfield and Honourable Stephen Pyke Minister of Highways for Nova Scotia, addressed a regular meeting of the executive Digby Co. Progressive Conservative Association in the Lion's Club Hall, Digby on Tuesday evening. The meeting was presided over by Baden Powell, president.

Besides being present at the meeting, the Honourable Mr. Pyke spent two full days touring all the roads in Digby County. On the tour Mr. Pyke was accompanied by Mr. Powell and engineers of the Department of Highways. In general, he said, he found the roads in good condition and stated that work is being done on the roads as money is available. He mentioned the paving to be done from Marshalltown across to the Neck Road and in the Culloden area and said that through-out the province paving has to be done and new pavings also must be given priority as to the amount of service rendered by the road. Improvements to roads are being made first to places where people are living and working. He noted with interest the activity in the area and especially on the Neck where the fishing industry, so important to Nova Scotia is being carried on. The paving of the Marshalltown - Neck road provides a quicker transportation to fish markets. The policy of the department, Mr. Pyke said is to bring areas farthest removed from pavement, like Culloden and Doucetville to the pavement either by paving or reconstructing roads.

The Premier in a short talk complimented the association on the work it is accomplishing. In referring to the report from the Candidate Survey Committee he said in a "jovial mood", "I don't know when there will be an election the newspapers seem to say there will be one in the Fall, but it is always wise to have an organization ready to go" and to have chosen a candidate early.

The meeting was thrown open to a question period, many which centered around the work of the highway department and were answered by Mr. Pyke. Dust laying, he said, was being done as money is available. In some cases more money is spent on ditching and grading and less on dust laying or vice versa, he mentioned. No more satisfactory way to deal with the low bushes on side of the roads has been found than by using sprayed chemicals. These are unsightly for some time but soon natural growth takes place and the bushes are green again. Utmost care is taken, but occasionally the chemical gets on shrubs, or people's property.

## Municipalities Attend Meet

Mayor V. L. Bent and Digby Town Clerk Jack Whalley, and Municipal Clerk, Roscoe Handspiker attended the regional meeting of the Nova Scotia Municipalities held in Yarmouth last Wednesday.

Chief among the resolutions passed was that which called for the rescheduling of the M.V. Bluenose over the summer months so that she lay at Yarmouth overnight, instead of Bar Harbour.

Moved by Lockport Mayor L. M. Huskisson and seconded by Warden Sylvester Amiraault of Argyle Municipality, the resolution was passed.

Other resolutions passed called for another ferry between western Nova Scotia and New England; and that the Minimum Wage Act of Nova Scotia be proclaimed by the government and a scale of wages implemented which will be "fair and just in view of this day and age in which we are living".

Mayor Fred Emin of Yarmouth, presided over a special meeting which had been called for discussing the possibility of forming a regional planning committee. Mayor Emin called for the three counties to work together as "towns and municipalities had been wasting money trying to do things individually".

On a motion by Warden Amiraault, seconded by Councillor Cecil Barrett of Shelburne, it was agreed that each council appoint two members to make up the membership of a regional planning committee. This body will meet at a later date to continue deliberations.

## Wounded by Rifle

Larry Goodwin, believed to have been wounded while chasing a prowling animal at the home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. James Foster, Hill Grove, on Saturday, is in the Digby General Hospital with serious injuries.

Larry is the seventeen year old son of Paul Goodwin, Digby, and the late Mrs. Goodwin. The wounds resulted accidentally from a 22 calibre rifle.

In the matter of dual axle registration as of April 1st, of the year, Mr. Pyke said this provides information on services available to meet the demand of the people. He referred to the Motor Carrier Act of the Public Utilities Board. Weight restrictions he said, were imposed because the pavement can only stand a certain weight. The flexibility of the pavement is measured and restriction imposed accordingly. When pavement is taxed beyond its flexibility it breaks and mending broken pavement is costly. The department was complimented by the audience on its snow removal program. Mr. Pyke, in closing assured the audience that maintenance money is divided on a fair basis for each area and for various uses, but there was not enough money to do all his department would wish to do.

Dr. D. E. Lewis reported for the town organization when he expressed great pleasure in the construction of the new Digby General Hospital increasing present 28 bed capacity to 90 beds. He also expressed gratitude to the Premier and to Mr. George Nowlan for their part with the C.P.R. in bringing to the Saint John - Digby run the Princess of Acadia with her capacity for 129 cars as against 35 for the Princess Helene. Dr. Lewis, however placed before the Premier the problems created by the new boat in having a wharf which is entirely inadequate to meet present needs. Both a new wharf and work on the old wharf are required to relieve the congestion for tourists and fishermen alike and to provide for their safety. Conditions are expected to be even more serious, he said, with the approach of winter. There is inadequate protection for the scallop fleet, he continued.

Further, Dr. Lewis commented, there is needed in the area better protection for the (Please turn to page 10)

## New Park For Province

A new national park to be established at Kejimikujik Lake in western Nova Scotia becomes the first to be established since the creation of Terra Nova National Park in Newfoundland in 1957.

According to the joint announcement by Premier R. L. Stanfield and Honourable Arthur Laing, Minister of Northern Affairs and National Resources, the two governments are discussing the terms under which the area will be transferred to the federal government.

The proposed national park, 38 miles south of Annapolis Royal and 150 miles west of Halifax, is considered to be an outstanding example of Nova Scotia's beauty of forest and sea. More than 20 lakes, some with excellent beach potential, and a number of connecting rivers are the heart of the park proposal. In addition to the lake area, a representative section of Nova Scotia's Atlantic shoreline will be preserved as part of the new national park. The park will include some 95,000 acres.

Kejimikujik Lake will be the second national park in Nova Scotia and the 19th in Canada. Cape Breton Highlands National Park on Cape Breton Island was established in 1936.

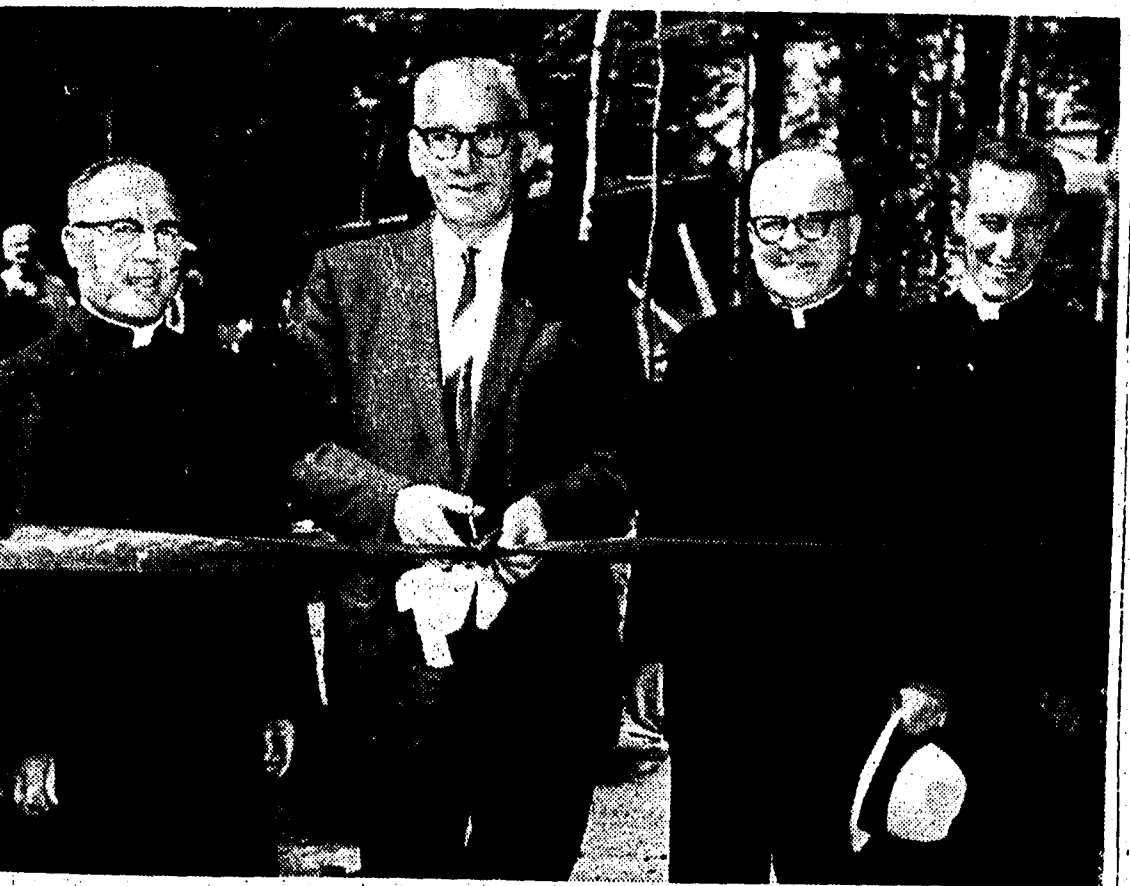

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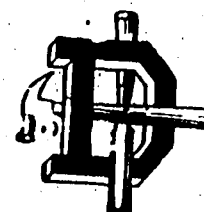

## Where Does That Road Go?

(By F.I.W.)

We promised in the writing of one of our little trips of discovery some time ago to speak of roads bearing off to the left rather than to the right of highway number 17 that leads from Digby to East Ferry and thence via the ferry and islands right down to the very tip of our southwestern part of Nova Scotia — Brier Island and Westport.

Well, the trip down number 17 is a most enjoyable one in itself but having made the trip to where the steep road leads down to the ferry landing at Petite Passage and having perhaps paused for an hour or so just to watch from the higher land the skillful manner in which the ferry operator makes use of both motor and

of the tidal currents, we suggest that one turns back again and now proceeding toward Digby, make your way at a reasonably leisurely pace till one passes the Little River United Baptist Church, and then turn off to the right to the shore at Little River itself. The houses are well kept and tell of a prosperous fishing folk and the view from the wharf is an interesting one. You may return back through the village by the road you came or bearing off a bit to the right also reach the main highway by a road not so good and as we regret to say of all our dirt or gravel roads at this time of year find it a bit dusty.

We neglected to mention on the way down to the ferry a few miles beyond Little River there is a road to the Fundy Shore to Whale Cove. The approach is a bit steep but you need not be discouraged — the road is good and the nine or ten houses overlooking Whale Cove and Whale Cove itself have a charm all their own.

But we had come back to the main highway from Little River and actually to not too interesting scenery till one comes to Mint Cove. You may smell a smell here, not as bad as in the vicinity of other fish plants we know of sometimes, but here at the short road to Mint Cove — some call it Mink Cove — is a very modern oil operated fish by-product plant, where two men operators, with efficient machinery, transform the waste fish products into very useful fish meal.

But let's leave this odoriferous vicinity and on to Sandy Cove. A view from any of the hilltops at Sandy Cove is rewarding and we are glad to see that alert minded folk have seen to it that pleasant advertising signs greet the tourist. They don't mention too well that hotel and pleasant eating facilities are available. But facilities are available and one may arrange for a nice meal in lovely surroundings. Should

you take any one of the many roads branching off at the foot of the Sandy Cove hills you will find pleasurable views. One such leads off to the right going towards the general direction of the wharf and a branch from it, this time to the left, was, we understand, at one time the original shore road that were it followed completely through would bring one back to the main road at or near Titus Service Station at Centreville. You can still travel it for part of the way but the rest is grown up and impassable. So it is with another road about 1½ miles from the Centreville intersection. Sometimes a gate closes it off from the public, but the gate was open recently and tempted we drove down it a bit, over the protests of our other occupant of the car. It is not a good, well kept road. We suggest you do not try it.

At Rossway a more auspicious attempt is made down what we believe was originally called the Tenpenny Grant Road. 'Tis a not unpleasant road with open fields on either side reminding us, somehow, of some of the roads in New Brunswick leading down to the Saint John River in that province. So this road leads past a farmhouse or two still occupied and a few houses vacant and near the shore gives a new different view of the Saint Mary's Bay and the shoreline over towards Brighton, Plympton and Gilbert Cove.

Rather reluctantly we turn again back to the main road, as we know there is but one more road that leads to the shore before the cut off to Marshalltown. This is a quiet road with no houses upon it. It at one time led right out across the marshland to what were two islands at high tide, thence across this higher ground and ultimately crossed the dyked marsh and the old bridge at head of Saint Mary's Bay. 'Tis a not unpleasant road to travel, well shaded and though one can no longer drive right across to the other main highway, it is rewarding in that wild life in the form of foxes and porcupine have been more than once seen there and out towards the marsh itself a great variety of birdlife make their homes. We like it sometimes as a place to have a secluded picnic lunch, especially at such times as we are provided with a spot of tea in thermos bottles. We mention this because there seems no quite suitable spot on this road to build a wee fire.

Well for this time these are the roads (some of them) of Digby Neck, and that's where those roads go.

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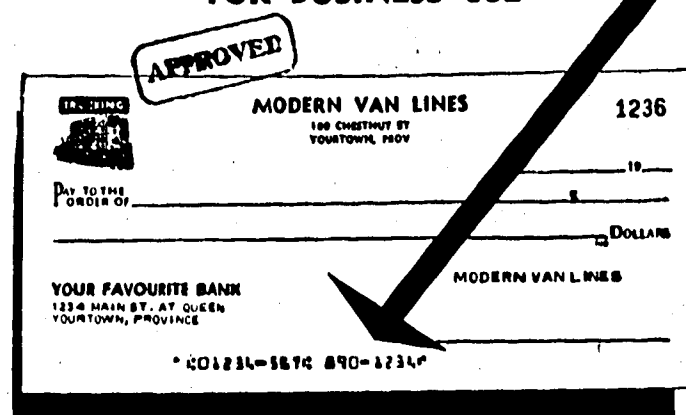

fishing industry employees by a coast guard service. Four bad accidents had been reported in the last few months, he said.

In commenting on Dr. Low's remarks, Premier Stanfield said he felt that the Princess of Acadia was a result of Mr. Nowlan's continuous effort toward improved Bay of Fundy service. 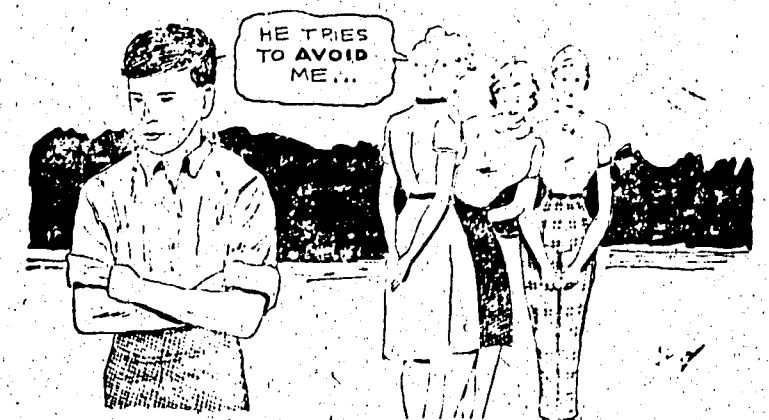

Don't police make mistakes? Or who made that one?

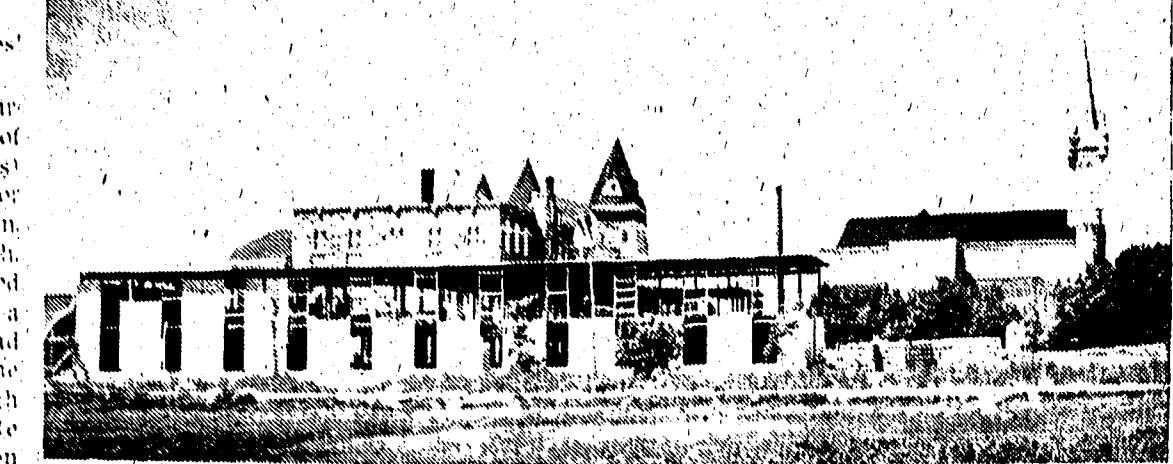
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## New Residence For Students

Desiring to entertain the grown ups we suggested taking some of the scenic drives around the Digby area. Our suggestion was appreciated but courteously declined with the reply "We don't think the children can take much more scenery". After all there were three children and how true those words were. They could take only so much scenery. How understanding the parents were too. We think the suggestion of a ride on the ferries at East Ferry and Freeport might have been the answer to combine scenic pleasure for the adults and something interesting for the children but that trip just didn't seem to fit in with our work schedule at the time so we settled for swimming at the Pines Hotel pool and bowling at one of our attractive lanes. The children had a marvellous time and Digby turned out to be a wonderful vacation spot for children and parents alike.

All this reminds us that the children really make our plans for us. It reminds us that people do not stay home today just because they have several children to take on vacation. They pack them into a station wagon and away they go. However, the children determine where the vacation is spent usually by the answer to "What is there to do?"

Any place which is trying to attract the tourist dollar, any one who is trying to think up something original in a community to make a dollar might well consider catering to the tourist child. Parents are travelling today with the children. They are going where the children can be entertained.

## How To Help Teen-Agers

In his teens a person is in a state of change and transition. He thrives on understanding, but not on overindulgence nor too much sympathy from adults. A challenge he will accept but will run away from constant scolding and condemnation.

Sometimes these young people act young and dependent, other times lofty and hard to reach. This shuttling back and forth between childhood and maturity may be expected at this point in life. It is the in-between age.

The teen-ager is a bundle of possibilities and needs to be spiritually channelled in his thinking. He needs to be kept from spiritual emptiness. There is a great inner void which can be filled with faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Investment in youth will pay dividends faster and larger than in any other area of opportunity, yet too many parents in general let their own offspring grow without controls and without proper instruction in things which matter most.

Youth may be exuberant and overly active, but they also need controls. An undisciplined person may harm others as well as himself. They need to be harnessed and kept within limits. An engine without a governor may destroy itself, so may youth without restraint and proper inhibitions.

Young people, although demanding, will not respect older people who let them always have their own way. Respect for adults comes from seeing in them a symbol of solidarity and strength.

We cannot legislate love and trust for these youngsters, it must be earned by wise understanding on our part.

Interest and pride in the Little League's game or other child's activity might work wonders in their own pride of things fine and beautiful.

## Dangers

Right at the moment of writing we would judge that forest fire hazards are high. Maybe by time this week's edition of the Courier is on the street, the sweltering weather will have been cooled off by a downpour. At any rate, it pays to be careful at all times about forest fires and especially if today's (Monday) weather continues.

Hot or cooler weather, there are other dangers which must be guarded against. We state them here only as reminders after some of the recent happenings in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The one so likely to happen these summer days unless special caution is taken is that of drowning while engaging in the sport of swimming. Water safety knowledge is common sense. Learn it and teach it to others.

Another is bicycling. Some forty or more years ago it meant nothing to go bicycling, sometimes two and more abreast. Today a good deal of care and common sense is needed to be safe on a bicycle where cars are numerous on the road. So often there is little display of caution with the bicyclist. Parents have a duty to talk and preach carefulness. It is up to the car driver, too, to be on the lookout for children at play and enjoying the sport of riding a bike.

## OPENING NOTICE Digby Public Schools

The Digby Urban Schools will reopen on Wednesday, September 4th, 1963, when all pupils of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full school day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 p.m. Student lunches will be served at the Regional High School cafeteria on September 5th.

Pupils registering with the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to September 1st. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1st, will not be registered at any time during the school year, 1963-64. The Superintendent's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Wednesday, August 14th, to Friday, August 16th between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Students from the Islands and Weymouth seeking admission to the Grade XII Commercial class must have application approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Digby, N. S. Immediate application will expedite approval.

For admission to the Academic section of Grade XII a provincial pass of Grade XI or a local pass from the Digby Regional High School will be required. Students seeking admission to Grade XII commerce must have one full year's attendance at the Grade XI level and have application approved by the school administration before registration in the department may be completed.

All prescribed texts for Grades IX to XII are available at a rental fee of five dollars, payable on the opening date of school. Students wishing to take advantage of the Rental plan should come prepared to make this payment.

All pupils must comply with the regulations of the Department of Public Health regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

et. My hat was close fitting and made of white organdie and I wore white shoes and handbags and gloves. We went to London by train and took a taxi from the station. As we got into the cab, Maurice said, "Buckingham Palace, please" and I felt like Cinderella. The London cabs have a huge back seat, and they are quite high. It was almost like riding in a carriage. A crowd had gathered outside the Palace Gates, and along the wall and as we drove up to the Palace and straight through the main gates. I was tempted to raise my hand and wave to the crowd! I shall always remember that moment! A special label which accompanied the invitation had to be displayed on the windshield of the cab to enable entry to the Gates.

We alighted in the outer courtyard and as we passed through the archway into the inner courtyard the guards in their huge bushy hats presented arms. We then entered the palace and passed through three enormous rooms, the last of which opened out on to the formal gardens. The rooms were beautifully decorated with thick red carpets, many portraits hung from the walls, two sets of china were on display and huge floral arrangements were everywhere. But most beautiful were the ceilings which would take me too long to describe, but the colour scheme is cream and gold.

The gardens are much bigger than I had imagined for the Palace is right in the heart of London. They must be as large or larger than St. James Park. The rose gardens, tennis courts, lake, complete with waterfall and flanked by many trees, which completely separate one from the other.

Three members of the Royal family were present, the Queen, Prince Phillip and the Queen Mother. From the Palace to the pavilions where food was being served, the guests formed three aisles down which one of the Royal hosts proceeded and at intervals of about twenty feet, each was presented to previously chosen distinguished visitors from all over the world. The Duke was in morning dress, of course, and carried an umbrella, as did 98 per cent of the guests, including women. The Queen wore a nylon floral printed dress, a close fitting hat of dark red velvet which brought out the deep red in her dress, white purse, gloves and shoes. The Queen mother was dressed in yellow, dress, coat and beautiful close fitting hat with white accessories. Her lady-in-waiting was dressed in green. There was lots of delicious food. Not a sandwich in sight, but instead there were small rolls filled with various spreads. I've never seen such an array of cakes. Drinks served were hot tea, coffee and iced coffee. Among the guests we met were two Canadians from Calgary.

Mrs. Dray's description was as vivid of the happenings that we felt others should share in the visit. Wynne is well known throughout Nova Scotia where she was a designer and was with Micchi Sewing Machines as demonstrator, throughout Eastern Canada. Later she was in Vancouver where she was with Hudson's Bay Company demonstrating fabrics, which no doubt explains her descriptive details in her letter. Mr. and Mrs. Dray have been living in England for about two years and visited many parts of the Continent, as well.

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## House Open To Public

In the heart of the French Acadian district of Nova Scotia, a small house stands as mute testimony of the forced exile of the early French inhabitants and their eventual triumphant return.

Located at Meteghan, La Vieille Maison is open to the public as a museum containing relics of life in the village more than 300 years ago.

Like a journey into the past a visit to the old homestead of the Robicheau family recalls a past that saw prosperity, hardship, expulsion and a victorious return to a life that brought honor to the French forebears of present-day inhabitants.

The home was the possession of Louis Robicheau, who immigrated to Acadia at Port Royal in 1636 and whose descendants suffered the same fate as fictional characters in Longfellow's Evangeline but returned to guide their people to a better understanding of British rule.

The original building was destroyed. The present house, of similar dimensions, was built during the same era and moved ten miles to the ancestral site. Handsomely restored and furnished with family heirlooms and antiques from the region, it is unmatched for its perfect symmetry, unpretentious and pleasing proportions. The aged exterior is relieved by the white woodwork, blue door, and the Robicheau coat of arms emblazoned over the main entrance.

Constructed in simple carpentry with open beams, wide boarded ceilings and large fieldstone hearth, the interior is bright and cheerful, with the Acadian colors, white, blue and yellow. It has been in constant use since pioneer days.

The furnishings are typical of the well-appointed Acadian homestead, scrupulously

clean and comfortable, with country-made furniture, hand-turned beds, and sea chests, rawhide chairs and spinning wheels. Wooden and earthenware cooking utensils, churns and butter moulds occupy their accustomed places.

A fine collection of Ironstone china and Acadian crafts of rug-making, needlework and quilting of the most intricate and delicate workmanship is displayed.

August 14 of each year is set aside as Arts and Crafts day when the old crafts of the Acadian women are revived, including weaving on the old loom, carding and spinning.

La Vieille Maison, located 40 miles from Digby on route 1, is open between the hours of 1:30 p.m. and 5 p.m. except Sundays. Host is Adolphe Robicheau, classical dancer and artist and a direct descendant of the original family.

## Town Taxes \$70,594.25 In Arrears

There are \$70,594.25 due the Town of Digby in tax arrears. This amount, which includes taxes for 1963, was arrived at during a special meeting of the town's three-man finance committee, and Mayor Vernon L. Bent, on Tuesday evening.

The committee, consisting of councillors Charles Hersey, Russell Atkinson and Bruce Baxter, is determined to collect these back taxes. The arrears will be collected by warrant according to the state of evidence showing as to the person's trying to pay. The committee expects to reap funds from the sale of several estates whose taxes are in arrears.

It was the committee's decision that all outstanding taxes, up to and including those of 1962, two years and more in arrears, will be collected by warrant. The warrants will be issued and necessary proceedings taken to sell properties within the next month. An advertisement to this effect appears elsewhere in this issue of the Courier.

In an interview with the Courier Councillor Charles Hersey said, "We will make a determined effort to collect all tax arrears. Every taxpayer should realize his obligation and pay without being reminded from time to time. He must realize that for the town to progress and develop, it must have working capital."

Councillor Bruce Baxter said, "The committee has decided something must be done. The town must have money to carry on. Delinquent taxpayers may feel we are being a little harsh, but these steps have become necessary, and the plans will be carried out."

Councillor Russell Atkinson, the third member of the finance committee, told the Courier, "This effort is a necessary step in properly carrying out the town's business. It has become evident that tax arrears must be collected. It is also increasingly unfair to citizens who faithfully pay their taxes as they become due, to have to share the responsibilities of delinquent taxpayers."

The decision to issue warrants was arrived at following thorough discussion of the matter by the council at their regular meeting on Monday evening.

## Burns At Deep Brook

A 1959 Chevrolet, owned by Vaughan Adams, of Digby, burned at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Moore, Jr., on Friday afternoon while Mrs. Adams was visiting with Mrs. Moore.

She had left the car parked in the driveway and the women were alarmed by the blowing of the horn. Upon looking out they saw the car in flames and smoke. The Cornwallis Fire Department was at once called but could not come due to regulations, unless called to assist another fire department. Bear River Fire Department was then called, but by the time it gathered volunteer firemen it was too late to save the car. Had a wind been blowing in the right direction, the home and garage of Mr. Moore could have also been destroyed by fire.

We understand no fire insurance was carried on the car.

## Garden Tea

A successful and delightful garden tea was held last week on the property of Mrs. J. J. Wallis, Smith's Cove, with the proceeds for the United Church Women's organization.

Miss Edith Wightman was on the table decorating committee, assisted by Mrs. Frank Wightman, A. Ettinger and Mrs. Russell Savary acted as cashiers. Others assisting were the Misses Savary, Jacqueline Lohnes, Geraldine Porter, Patricia Milner and Mrs. Ethyl Banks.

## New Meters Installed

The new meters for the town of Digby have arrived, Police Chief Webster Dunn advised the town council on Monday night. Because of congestion of traffic it was first thought by the Chief that installation of the meters should be delayed until after the closing of the Pines Hotel. It was decided, however, to go ahead immediately with the installation and complete the work as quickly as possible. Already some of the new meters, including double meters, are installed on Prince William St.

Mr. Dunn remarked in his report that the utilization of the Cannon Bank had relieved traffic congestion which would otherwise be caused by the Princess of Acadia traffic. The town police work in conjunction with the C.P.R. police on the traffic control for the Cannon Bank, it is understood.

The general report of the police was given by Councillor Earl Morrell, chairman of the police committee. Twenty complaints had been laid during July, 12 requiring field investigation. Six cases required court action. Two cases were under the motor vehicle act, one charged with selling liquor and one for impaired driving. It was brought to the attention of the police committee that taxi drivers are not allowed to drive taxi for two years after having been convicted of an offense under the taxi regulations of the town.

Councillor Russell Atkinson reported that only \$17.00 had been given out in relief for the month of July.

Permission was granted to the V.O.N. to hold tag days August 30 and 31 and to the Digby East Fish & Game Association to hold tag days August 9 and 10. Permission was granted the firemen to have Labor Day, September 2nd, as their special fund raising day.

Delegates appointed to attend the 58th Annual Conference of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities in Amherst from August 25 to 28 are Councillor Bruce Baxter and Town Clerk Jack Whalley.

It was stressed that a report should be presented to the council on the meeting.

The council was advised that the Municipal Home at Marshalltown was closed, that the tenders of property services were no longer needed and that a watchman was to be employed.

A request was received by the council from Robert Bearne to have the fire siren removed from so near his house.

Permission was granted the Digby Branch Canadian Legion to remove an old 1914-18 machine gun from its storage at the Court House to their property on the Shore Road. Mr. Frank Robinson, who had been called to the meeting to discuss work on sewers, suggested that the council should see that home builders were not going to build their homes out into the street before permission was granted to build. In cases, he said, walls are built as much as 10 to 15 ft. into the street property and it makes it difficult when work on the streets requires digging and bulldozing.

Mayor Vernon L. Bent requested the councillors to give consideration to granting money for expenses of members of the Digby Area Industrial Development Committee if necessary. These expenses could include stationery, postage, phone calls, or trips to Ottawa or other places in the interest of the committee. The committee comprises two from town council, two from the municipal council, two from the Digby Board of Trade, Kiwanis Club, Lions Club, V. G. Cardoza, M.L.A.

## Breaks Golf Record In Digby

Donald Fleet this week broke the Digby Pines Golf Course record it is believed, by a shattering score of 66 in 18 holes, five under par.

The 31 year old ardent golfer shot a 67 two years ago and again a week ago in a match with Garnet Neville on hole number 8 — 145 yds. — he shot a hole in one. In June of this year he won the M. A. Open at the Pines.

When achieving the record Fleet was playing with Hymie Webber, president of the Digby Golf Club, Joe Turnbull and Boyd Hutchinson. He shot four birdies, an eagle, a bogey and 12 pars. The par out score of the course is 434/431/535 first nine, Fleet's score was 434/433/535 — 34. Par in score 444/434/545. Fleet's score was 334/335/245 — 32.

As far as is known this is the record at the Pines course for amateurs, pros or visiting golfers.

## Weymouth Businessman Passes

The community of Weymouth was saddened on Wednesday July 31st by the passing of George Owen Hankinson, prominent business man of Weymouth. Mr. Hankinson had been ill for several weeks in Digby General Hospital, where he died.

Born in Weymouth 83 years ago, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hankinson, and lived here all his life. He began his business life as an employee at Campbell's Store and later ran a flour and feed business in the location of the old Theatre, this was owned by Mr. Scott, whom he later bought out. The business expanded into a general merchandising and lumber business and to handle the distribution of lumber to all parts of the world. ## Sewage And Drainage Discussion

Having a master plan and a long range view of a sewer system for the town of Digby was discussed at the regular meeting of the town council on Monday night. The council was unanimous in its opinion that such a plan should be obtained and that all sewage pipes laid from there on should follow that plan or work toward the system laid down by the plan. It was decided to get prices of such a plan from engineers.

It was learned that the town had taken over the privately owned King St. sewer and that a public sewer would be constructed to link up with the present sewer at the price of \$2.00 per foot frontage. Street Superintendent Frank Robinson was asked to come to the meeting to discuss laying of the sewer and it was decided to have the town employees do the work. Approximate cost given by engineers had been \$3,500. A letter was read from Norman Wright expressing appreciation of the town council in deciding on the project of the King St. sewer. Health conditions arising from some other sewers was discussed and a decision made to have an investigation made.

Ray Thibault appeared before the council regarding excessive drainage of water running across his land. Last year, Mr. Thibault said, his garden had been destroyed to the extent of \$200. Each year, he said, the problem becomes worse, having been aggravated by building of residences, apartment, schools, the paving and now the hospital construction was further adding to the drainage problem on his property. It was decided to install larger and more drainage pipe across St. Mary's St., which, it was thought, would overcome the difficulty.

## Boulevard And Benches

A letter was read from the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society at the Digby town council meeting on Monday night in which appreciation was extended for the \$75 grant received from the town. The letter also stated direct opposition to any thought of removing the boulevard from the Salvation Army Hall to the bandstand in order to make more parking space. They felt that the boulevard could be retained and made to be attractive. They did say, however, that they would not object to losing ten or twenty feet at the end of the boulevard near the Salvation Army Citadel if this is necessary to relieve traffic congestion.

The condition of the benches at the boulevard was also brought up at the council meeting on Monday night and all agreed that the benches at the boulevard and monument had to be replaced. Frank Robinson, street superintendent, who was present at the meeting, said he had been mending those same benches for 22 years. It was felt that the season was too far advanced at present to have benches ready for this year, so plans were made to include the cost in the 1964 budget and have them done during the winter.

## Want A Phone Directory?

The Digby Lions Club sold July 1st souvenir booklets containing the Digby telephone numbers. However, they ordered more than necessary and have an overstock of them so they are now giving them away, we understand.

The reason for giving them was explained by E. B. Tufts. The advertising was sold on the basis of 2,500 circulation and the Lions Club would like to live up to their word for the sake of the advertisers. There are no prizes offered in the books for free distribution as had been in those sold previously, but the Lions Club says "Come and get them anyway." Why don't you? They are really handy to have around.

## Reports On Meeting Mayors And Wardens

Mayor Vernon L. Bent gave a report at the regular meeting of Digby town council on Monday evening on a recent meeting of the mayors and wardens from Shelburne, Yarmouth and Digby counties, held in Yarmouth on July 17.

The Western Counties Regional Meeting of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities was held in the morning when a lively discussion on a uniform cumulative sick leave plan for school employees took place, the mayor said. Four resolutions were passed to place before the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Conference. The first dealt with having the M.V. Blue-nose overnight stop in Yarmouth instead of Bar Harbor, the mayor reported. The second dealt with the implementation of a second ship to operate between Western Nova Scotia and a port in New England. The third asked for the government of Nova Scotia to proclaim the male minimum wage act now on the statute books of Nova Scotia and implement a scale of wages fair and just in view of this day and age. The fourth supported a U. of N. S. M. brief on taxation.

Among other items for discussion, according to Mayor Bent's report, were speeding on the highways and bootlegging joints, but no action was taken on these.

Later in the day a meeting was called for the purpose of forming a mayor-warden executive of Shelburne, Yarmouth and Digby to co-ordinate efforts to improve the needs of Western Nova Scotia. Among other matters discussed was that of the need of a planning engineer for Western Nova Scotia, the report read.

Such a person and expense for same is expected to run into about ten cents per capita, making Digby town share \$220.00, Digby municipality \$950.00, Clare \$830.00, etc. The suggestion is being studied.

Other items for discussion were on the Confederation Centenary and on a Regional Library. Regarding the centenary, Mayor Bent reported contents of a letter from Bruce Ferguson, secretary of the Confederation Centenary Celebration Committee. The letter pointed out that projects should be regional, of a lasting nature and that January 1, 1964, has been set as a tentative dead-line for receipt of proposals and recommendations to the government of Nova Scotia on the projects. Grants from federal and provincial governments will not exceed 3% of the cost of any project and the remainder of the cost must be met by local initiative and resources.

After the report of Mr. Bent it was decided that the mayor or the deputy mayor and the town clerk or any two be members of the Regional Planning Board and to attend meetings to be held in Yarmouth.

## Attends Class Reunion

On Saturday and Sunday of last week, Rev. W. P. Clayton was in attendance at the reunion of the Class of '52, held at Acadia University.

A special feature of the celebrations was the Sunday morning worship service, the first such service to be held in the newly constructed Manning Memorial Chapel. Mr. Clayton presided, with Captain James Mills giving the prayers. Dr. George E. Levy was preacher for the occasion.

## Society To Crown Queen In Digby

The Elocution Society, of the greater Saint John area will hold the crowning of their queen in Digby, sometime later this month, according to a society spokesman.

Edwin Thompson, of Yarmouth, told the Courier that the ceremony and an open air musical program will take place on the grounds of Hugh Dickie, prior to the society's staging a play in Bear River.

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## About This and That Where Do The Tourists Go?

The weather is ideal. It is so different from last year with the continual rain throughout the summer. Yet, despite the weather, several, in fact practically all the motel owners in this area tell us that the tourist business is not as good as last year. Tourism in Nova Scotia has improved. (Nova Scotia's Department of Trade and Industry tourist information services can be given credit for that.) More cars are coming on the Princess of Acadia than the Helene could have thought of bringing. The number of passengers ferried between Bar Harbor and Yarmouth, via the Bluenose we believe have increased substantially. Where then are the tourists going?

Your answer is as good as ours, probably, but one man made it his business last week to take a trip to Yarmouth and see where the Bar Harbor-Yarmouth ferry cars were going. Out of 96 cars he found 72 headed the South Shore direction. 26 headed the Valley. On one day previously he said 170 cars crossed on the Bluenose. But, he added, we didn't see too many of them.

We think there is much truth in what we were told for we read in the Bridgewater Bulletin the following extracts regarding the tourist booth run by the town there and the Board of Trade:

"The number of tourists who have called is far ahead of the number for the same date last year. This is due partly to the wide publicity given to the launching of the Bluenose II, and to the continued fine weather the province is enjoying.

"Tourists from the Province of Quebec are leading the list this year, with Pennsylvania coming second, and they have come from such distant points as Australia and East Africa. There have been more cars from California and Florida, to date, than in other seasons. Some of the inquiries are for places to fish for salmon, about chartered boats for deep sea fishing, and for suitable camp sites, as more people are camping this year.

"One couple, who visited here last week from Long Island, N. Y., were carrying with them a page from their local newspaper, which had pointed out the many beauty spots along different routes and they were delighted with what they had found along the South Shore, and were keeping a record for their two sons who plan to come next year."

We might not have a Bluenose II to launch but we can in Digby find many of the other interests referred to. Anybody have the answer to the tourist riddle for this area? If there are those who feel the tourist season is better here in 1963 than in 1962, let's hear about it.

## Impressive Household Grocery List

According to the Canadian Pacific magazine, "Spanner", the company expected at the C.P. resort hotels this summer would number 300,000 people. Their grocery list was expected to amount to 17,000 dozen eggs, 360 lamb carcasses, 3,600 ribs of beef, 25,000 pounds of turkey, 20,000 pounds of roasting chicken, 1,500 sacks of potatoes, 3,500 pounds of sausages, 2,500 pounds of bacon, 1,600 gallons of ice cream.

Milk consumption was expected to top 100 gallons daily and 3,000 dinner rolls and 300 loaves of bread were expected to be buttered and eaten every 24 hours.

Linen and laundry statistics might impress the average housewife as well. Linen stocks include more than 25,000 sheets, 20,000 pillow slips, 18,000 bath towels and 25,000 table napkins.

Did you know that it would take a clothesline more than 35 miles long to hang out 25,000 sheets, says the "Spanner".

It's a good thing our resort hotels don't use the "clothesline method" for drying laundry because they will handle in excess of 2,000,000 pieces of laundry this season. That could involve a clothesline stretching from Nova Scotia to British Columbia.

During the actual tourist season about 1,600 are employed at the hotels. Most of these are university students. Besides there are many permanent employees on regular staff and hotel department offices.

The Digby Pines Motor Hotel is one of the hotels making up the impressive list above. It has accommodation for 300 guests. That is no mean boost to Digby's economy and Digby citizens would be reluctant to see the hotel removed from its present function in Digby.

## Paving Petition

Two petitions are being circulated we hear asking that the provincial government finish paving the Lighthouse Road to Point Prim. We are all for such a paving program and also to make the Shore Road (that beautiful scenic drive) as safe and comfortable riding as possible. We, however, must bear in mind that paving programs must be paid for and we help to pay for them. We agree with the Hon. Mr. Pyke as quoted in last week's Courier that the roads which render the most service get priority. No one can argue that this is not the best policy to follow.

Let us then see how the Lighthouse Road fits in. We haven't counted the number of families living at Bay View who use that road. That can be done by anyone who wants to think about it a minute. We do know that the families who do live there have people coming to Digby to work. We know they must come to town or up the road a few miles, at least, to shop. In fact other than the homes and one church (no school) there is nothing more and the people must come to Digby for every service with the exception of mail.

Then, there are the tourists who use the road. We believe seven cars were viewing the sunset from the Lighthouse on Thursday evening while the editor was there. We were told that the average per day of "sightseeing" cars would be about 13. Maybe a thousand or more for the season. Besides fishing boat owners come down to the Light to watch for their boats. The road really should be paved said the lighthouse-keeper when we asked what he thought about it.

## The Fundy Tides

When will the tide be highest for the day? That was the question put to the editor one day last week when an American tourist breezed in the office door. We must confess that the tides had been farthest from our minds. The Courier had been getting out each week, high tide or low. We even hadn't put the tide schedule in the paper. We didn't even have a tide book so by consulting every member of the staff we figured as closely as we could just when the tide would be fully high.

Embarrassed we were and well we should have been. "The tides — why the tides here — why the tides are the greatest attraction you have. People come here especially to see the tides" said our tourist friend. We immediately told the tourist that he would be able to get a tide book at May's Book Store and then we, too, dashed off quick as a bunny and purchased two for ourselves. We'll not be caught again not knowing when the tide is high. Not when the tides are that important!

We've had several other requests about time of tides since the one written about above. We live with the tides, we forget their importance. Don't think we even make half enough of them in our tourist folders and advertising. So here we are back again with the tide table in the Courier. Thanks to our reporter, Leigh Everett, who always makes up the schedule for us.

## Others See Us As We Are

Sometimes we cannot get a good view of ourselves until someone far removed from us puts us wise to ourselves. We therefore appreciate the letter in the Courier this week from two tourists from Ontario who are telling us some ways we can improve our tourism in Digby. There is little in their letter with which we cannot agree.

Who for instance would risk sitting on the benches at the boulevard to watch the tides come in and recede again? Enough said on that score. We hear the boulevard benches will be on the Town Council meeting agenda for Monday night. But the tourists do not know the town is thinking about the benches.

## Letter to the Editor



United Church Manse, Weymouth, N. S., August 1, 1963.

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

Two pictures I think of interest to those who watched or attempted to watch the eclipse recently and to bird lovers wherever they may be we send along to you. In both instances the snaps were taken with an ordinary Imperial Debonaire Camera of the box type and with but fixed focus and lens setting.

The first picture was taken on Saturday evening, July 20, from the manse verandah at about 6:45 p.m. when after viewing the eclipse of the sun through two or three exposed film negatives the thought occurred to us to attempt to get a picture. We actually took two, one after the other, and one appears showing a brilliant spot of light with trees outlining the picture, the second was fortunate enough to capture the eclipse just at about the moment of near totality and as you see shows the moon's shadow almost exactly superimposed on the sun and with a brilliant diamond-like brilliance escaping from the lower right hand corner to give what has been referred to as the diamond ring setting.



The other picture is, too, rather unique. It was taken within a day or so of the other at almost the same hour of the day. To escape the heat we had travelled to the shores of Saint Mary's Bay at what must have been the very peak of high tide. The spot was the beach at Grosses Coques, Digby County. Seeing on the beach what looked almost from the distance like an automobile tire we drew closer to discover a large sea bird seemingly quite unafraid and watching us calmly enough as we drew near to circle around it, thinking it must perhaps have been injured as the leg seemed stretched out in an awkward position. We had our camera and again took two pictures from a point near enough almost to have touched it with our hands, though we had no desire to do so, for the beak was sharp and long. It was but five or six feet from the water's edge and we can only conjecture that it must have been thrown up on the beach on the crest of the very last wave of the rising tide. We circled it once or twice and then the bird, as we moved a bit further off, slithered and that is the only word to describe it, into the water, dove almost immediately, and rising again some distance away, repeated the process until it was completely out of sight.

Returning to our home we confirmed our conjecture that the bird was a female or young loon of the so-called Pacific species. Reading further we were further confirmed in our conjecture by the statement that the loon, though one of the most proficient and capable of swimmers is all but helpless upon land. One of our local friends, a woodsman, tells us that the legs of this bird are set so far back on its body as to make it all but impossible to walk and certainly incapable of taking off from land into the air.

We trust this information may be of interest to readers for many, like ourselves, have no doubt both seen and heard this strange bird but few indeed can have come as close to a living specimen as it was our privilege to do so.

## Church Leader Visits Weymouth Area

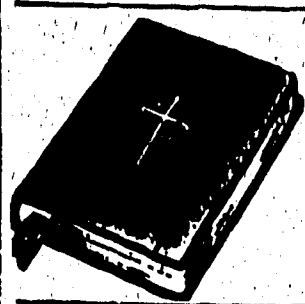

## Burns Mortgage

A capacity congregation assembled at the Church of Christ (Disciples), Weymouth, N. S., on Sunday evening, August 4th, to witness a mortgage burning ceremony. Mr. Albert Jones presided and Mr. Gifford Lewis directed the hymn-sing.

Officiating in the mortgage-burning were Wilfred Cosman, church treasurer; Frank Lewis and Elijah Wagner, original trustees; Harry J. Lewis, chairman of church board, and Rev. Maxwell J. Webb, of Greencastle, Indiana, who in 1950 was the first resident pastor.

Mr. Cosman gave a brief financial resume, and Rev. Mr. Webb led the congregation in the burning ceremony and in lighting the flame to the mortgage, accompanied by the four officers above. As the congregation solemnly viewed the fading embers of thirteen years of toil and responsibility, Mr. Harry Lewis offered the dedicatory prayer.

A congratulatory letter was read from First Christian Church, Greencastle, where Rev. Mr. Webb now serves.

Rev. Mr. Webb, choosing as his subject, "Let the Church be Relevant", delivered a challenging message, calling upon Christians to fulfill their responsibility in making the Church what Christ intended it to be — casting out all sin, jealousy, hatred, envy, strife, materialism, etc., taking Paul as an example, when he said, "For me to live in Christ but to die is gain." He stated, "that accomplishments in the past are good" — "yet the vital task of His followers — the Church — is to view the present situation, face the truth and meet the issues of life today in a Christian-like manner, not relaxing but ever seeking to promote greater goals for Jesus Christ. When individuals become fully committed to God — forgetting self and giving all to Christ will the Church be relevant today."

This congregation originated during the late 1940's when concerned men and women undertook to study plans to erect a new house of worship in Weymouth. Rev. Max Webb, as pastor on the field, serving Southville and South Range, was general chairman and rendered unlimited service studying its architectural designing and assisting in supervision.

In September, 1949, plans became a realization, when a rough draft of the proposed building was forwarded to the Board of Church Extension of the Disciples of Christ. That same Fall, a Finance Committee was named and on December 11, 1949, the first appeal was made for funds. All-Canada Committee allocated \$5,000 of the Crusade for a Christian World Fund to this building program, aside from the growing fund campaign by local members and friends who were making generous donations and gifts.

April, 1950, marked the sod turning ceremony by the late Mr. Harry E. Wagner, who also donated the property for the new church site. Early in May, a Building Program Committee was named and the building commenced.

The present structure valued at \$50,000, was dedicated on September 3rd, 1950.

In 1954, a mortgage of \$10,000 was taken against the building, the final payment, being made in April of this year.

The congregation comprised 45 charter members residing in Weymouth whose membership was at the Southville Church of Christ (Disciples). Present membership is 125.

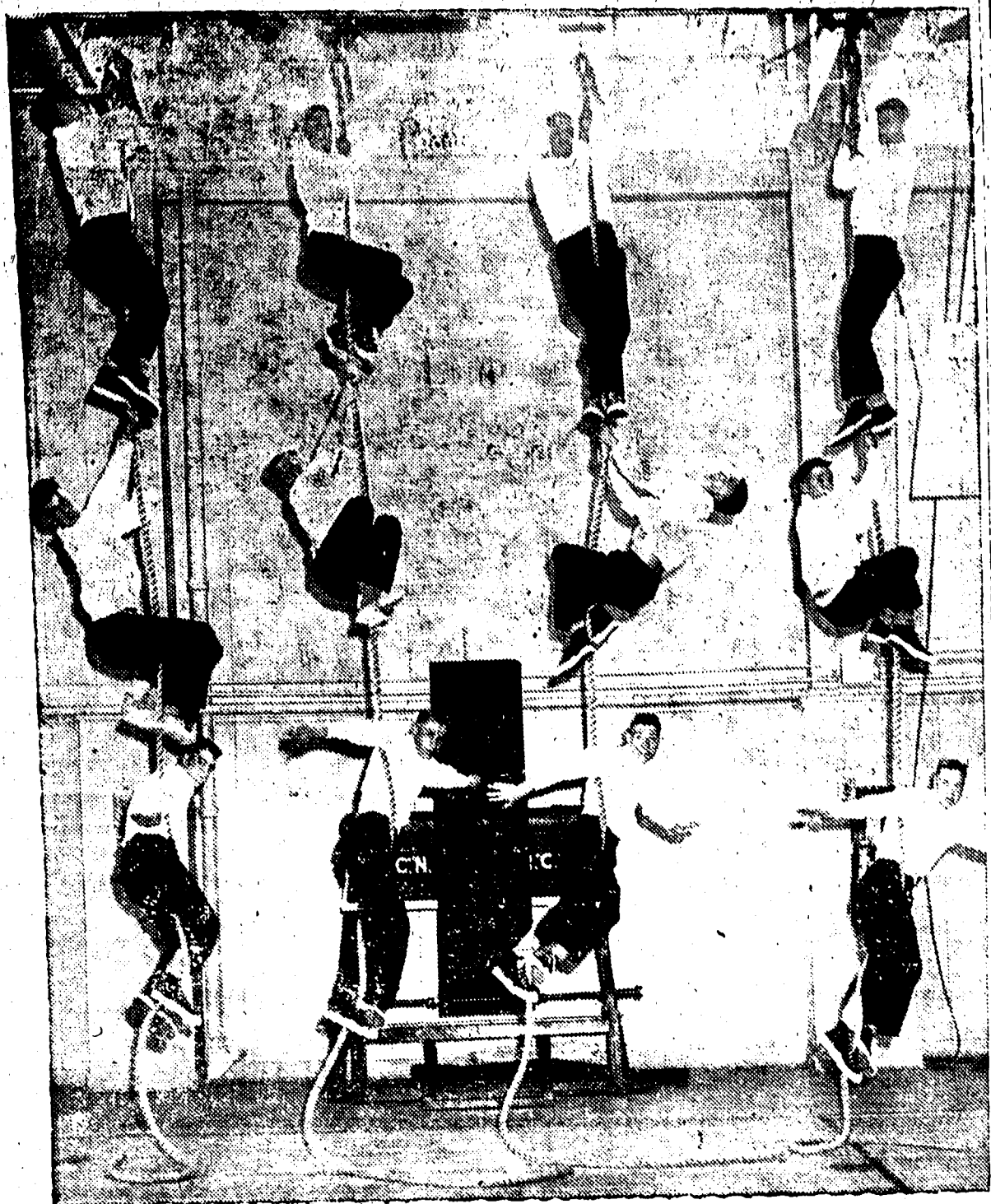

There were a few disappointing features, however, which we feel could be remedied without a great expense to the town, and which would add considerably to its attractiveness.

1. We notice from the newspaper that a new wharf is being considered. This is a good thing. With the wharf, improvement of the whole waterfront should also take place. Many people enjoy sitting on the waterfront to view the scenery, watch the gulls, the tide, and any activities that may be going on. There is scarcely any place on Digby's front where one can engage in such a pleasant pastime in comfort. We would like to suggest that perhaps the strip of land opposite the Telephone Company's office on the Main Street could be developed for this purpose. With attractive benches, and a few baskets or tubs of brightly coloured flowers, a real transformation could be made.

2. The flower baskets on the street a little further along look pretty. Couldn't there be more, here and there, along the front?

3. Another disappointing feature is the absence of bathing facilities and a nice beach area. On a couple of occasions we went to the beach at the end of Montague Road and were surprised to find it in such an untidy condition. ## Plan Labor Day Program

Digby Firemen's Labor Day program was discussed at the regular meeting of the Fire Department held last Wednesday and a good program of entertainment is being prepared for this year. The day will start off with a wheelbarrow race and free rides on the fire truck for the kiddies at 1 p.m. This will be followed by various games and prizes, featuring a door prize. Also included will be bingo, panda booth, cat game, fish pond, country store, crown and anchor, also complete canteen facilities. An added feature will be a fudge booth. The wheelbarrow race is open to anyone from 14 years of age upwards. Application forms are available in another section of this newspaper and should be forwarded to the Fire Department. It is also expected that a demonstration of the new pump will be made during the day if it arrives on time. The day's program will be concluded by fire works. All proceeds of this day are to be applied to the new pump being purchased by the fire department.

At the regular meeting, Chief George Humphrey reported that a total of five calls had been received for the month of July with four of these being in town. One was an electric fire, two chimney fires and a grass fire and one call was received for a rubbish fire at the rear of Fundy Motors in Conway.

Treasurer, Victor Comeau of the department gave a financial report of the department. He felt that a good turn out at the Labor Day Fair would bring the fund up to the required amount necessary to finance the remainder of the new pump.

It is believed that there are still a few advance tickets from the cancelled circus which have not been refunded. Some have made donations of these which have assisted the department. However it was announced that anyone who has tickets that have not been refunded can have them redeemed by the treasurer or secretary.

Earl Anderson, chairman of the Labor Day Fair stated that the usual canvass of individuals would be made this year for groceries to stock the country store.

## Car Catches Fire

A car owned by Ralph McIntyre received engine damage and exterior paint damage when it caught on fire about noon on Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. McIntyre and family were returning home from church when they noticed flames coming from the engine while turning the corner from Queen onto Warwick St. Previously they had smelled a more than usually pronounced odor of gas but did not anticipate a fire. The Digby Fire Department was called.

Mr. and Mrs. McIntyre have been having a series of troubles. Earlier this summer their son, Pat, took ill and was hospitalized and during the past week Mrs. McIntyre accidentally scalded her hand, which required dressings; Judy, age 14, slipped while playing in the yard, bumped a companion and broke her nose; Joan got into difficulties when the brakes gave away on her father's car she was driving and on Sunday the same car caught fire.

## Snow & Neville Cop Trophies

Last Sunday afternoon a red two-ball foursome golf tournament was held in competition for the Dr. P. C. Outhouse Trophy. Fourteen participated in this play, with Clayton Snow and Joyce Neville capturing the trophy with a net score of 70.

The Ladies' Club Championship play will be held this Sunday afternoon. At the same time the men of the club will play off for the Ben Prince Trophy in a 36-hole tournament.

Following these two events a banquet will be held for members of both divisions of the Club.

## Farms Open To Visitors

Departmental personnel and farmers were given the privilege on Wednesday night of visiting the farms of H. M. Warne, Arthur MacKay and Arthur Gates at Hillgrove, following a demonstration and talks at the new Canadian Department of Agriculture, Research Branch Digby Sub Station on the Warne property at Hillgrove.

The first property visited was that of H. M. Warne who has 10 acres of strawberries planted and has 11 acres for cultivation in 1964. This year Mr. Warne had a satisfactory yield from 5 1/2 acres ready for picking. His markets were in the local area, Halifax, Saint John and Boston, making a continuous market for some period of time. A number of different varieties of strawberries are produced on Mr. Warne's farm to endeavour to find the most suitable variety for hardiness, yield and marketing facilities.

Also on the property of Mr. Warne is a 7 acre field of potatoes which the farmers visited but most interest was shown in Mr. Warne's 5 acres of highbush blueberries. In 1960 Mr. Warne planted 1 1/2 acres to start his blueberry venture and in 1962 he planted 3 1/2 acres more. Some of the blueberries were picked this year, but proper production for the 1960 planting will begin only next year and that of the 1962 planting in 1966.

Mr. Warne, in a short explanation about his crops, said that there seemed to be less winter kill of blueberries here than anywhere. Two strains of blueberries were being used and a study made on culture, handling and marketing.

Already Mr. Warne employs about twelve persons.

At the Arthur MacKay farm were viewed three acres of potatoes of the early and late varieties; one acre of corn and other vegetables and two acres of strawberries, one acre planted last year and one the present year.

Arthur Gates has 12 milking Guernsey cows, 6 acres planted in grain and 8 acres in potatoes, which were noted with interest by the visitors. Of particular interest was the potato storage built by Mr. Gates last year at a cost of about \$1300. This of course, Mr. Gates said, was possible because he did much of the work himself. The potato cellar is 28x32 and can store about 4,000 or 5,000 bags of potatoes. The potatoes are put into the building from the top and lowered to the floor through an opening. Temperature of the cellar, Mr. Gates said, remains at about 36 degrees and only occasionally an electric heater is used to help out. In conversation with Mrs. Gates, the editor enquired if the farm made a great deal of extra work for herself but she found that it didn't. She said that occasionally she does help with some of the farm work but most of the work is done in a neighborhood spirit. The neighbouring men do planting together and do much of the farm work together up to harvesting time.

## National Park Location Appreciated

The Digby Board of Trade decided on Tuesday evening at its regular meeting to express by letter its appreciation of the decision to establish a national park in the Western end of Nova Scotia as announced by the provincial government recently. The park is to be located about 38 miles south of Annapolis Royal at Kejimikujik Lake. More than 20 lakes, some with excellent beach potential and a number of connecting rivers are in the heart of the park proposal. The park, which will include 95,000 acres, will also have some of the Nova Scotia Atlantic shoreline.

Letters of appreciation were to go to the Premier of the Province of Nova Scotia, Robert Stanfield; Minister of Northern Affairs and National Resources, Hon. Arthur Laing; Hon. Allan J. MacEachern and George Nowlan.

It all started at the Spit & Whittle Club. The Spit & Whittle Club demands very little cost for membership dues. Actually the only prerequisite for membership, we hear, is to be able to spin a good yarn. From far and near men gather in the workshop on Mr. Ellis' property, and amid the shavings and chips the yarns spin as Mr. Ellis

busies himself with saw and hammer, chisel or adz.

The latest built boat, above, was started last fall amidst the chips and yarns. But the Glamel is only one of many boats Mr. Ellis has built in the past 30 years. There have been row boats, punts, dinghys, outboard motor types, sail boats, fishing boats, some entirely new, some rebuilt, and even the hull of an old scallop boat was rebuilt by Mr. Ellis and sold. It is still well remembered by the fishermen as the "Sentry." Another of his craft was named Mary & Keith, after his wife and son. So far none have been named after his charming daughter Verleia. The Mary & Keith is still going strong.

All this is done by Mr. Ellis as a side-line after hours for Mr. Ellis is sales manager for the B. A. Oil Company, Digby branch. Using native oak and spruce Mr. Ellis has produced about 30 craft in his after-hour schedule.

Mr. Ellis is the son of Mrs. Ellis and the late James Ellis, Bay View, and while his father was not a boat builder, he was handy around the boat-building trade. ## More Information For Tourists

Tourists should have more information available about Digby was the general consensus of opinion of members of the Digby Board of Trade in regular session at the Town Hall on Tuesday evening. It was felt that tourists in Digby did not have enough information on when they were required to get their cars in motion to board the Princess of Acadia for the ferry crossing to Saint John. Without the specific time tourists often stayed in their cars for hours and merchants missed out on these tourists spending time uptown and shopping, it was stated. It was decided to ask the C.P.R. to post the time at the Cannon Bank where the boat cars park so that tourists can utilize the time to advantage for themselves and the merchants.

Not enough information is available for tourists on where to find beaches in the vicinity was another matter discussed by the board. There are nice beaches at Sandy Cove, Barton, Plympton, Smith's Cove, Grosses Coques and other nearby places, it was noted, but little information is available so that tourists in the area can readily find them, it was stated.

There are many good fishing places around, the board members mentioned, such as off Digby wharf, fishing for bass at Joggin and Victoria Bridge; surf fishing at Point Prim; fishing at Freeport, Westport, Tiverton and East Ferry, but there is a lack of information about this for the tourist, it was stated. It was also felt that it would be to the advantage of Digby merchants or promoters of tourism in Digby to offer prizes for sport fishing. Information on where to fish and other pertinent information for tourism should be available from every motel, Board of Trade, tourist bureau and merchant, it was decided.

The result of Tuesday night's discussion led to the decision that some type of information through a folder, newsletter or pamphlet should be going out to the tourist each week. Included in the folder, it was suggested, should be information on events to take place such as church suppers, bazaars, carnivals, etc., and suggestions about what there is to do in Digby. Charles Halliburton was named to look into the proposition, prepare copy and investigate costs. It was suggested that merchants might take turns in sponsoring such a project each week.

## Second Ferry Being Studied

His department is making the feasibility of a second Nova Scotia - New England ferry, the Minister of the Transport has advised Yarmouth town council.

The survey is a detailed one and will take some time to complete, the minister added. In the meantime, Yarmouth town council, which is rallying support for a move to have the ferry Bluenose stay overnight at Yarmouth instead of Bar Harbour in summer, is considering the advisability of sending a delegation to meet the Nova Scotia government on the matter.

However, it was indicated no delegation will be sent prior to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities debating a regional resolution from Yarmouth, Shelburne and Digby counties on the stop-over question.

## Firemen Called Four Times

Digby volunteer firemen were called for service four times during the first three days of this week.

They were called on Sunday to extinguish a car fire in the south end of town. The car was owned by Ralph MacIntyre. On Monday a chimney fire at the home of Delbert Tidd, Mount Street, needed attention; and on Tuesday the department was called twice to extinguish a grass and brush fire near the Baptist cemetery, on St. George Street.

## Membership Drive To Start

A determined effort to collect membership fees in the Digby East Fish & Game Association will be immediately instituted. It was decided at the special general meeting called to discuss the future of the organization.

It was pointed out membership in the organization is limited after July 1st to those who belonged last year and no new members may be enrolled. Purpose of this ruling is to discourage those who join late in the year, paying only the membership fee to participate in the weekly dances which are continued at Defaga Lodge after some of the other dance establishments in the area close for the season.

Need to enrol working members in the organization and re-interest former members who have failed to rejoin this year was stressed. It was stated much yet needs to be done to improve and develop the lodge premises and outstanding debts must be met.

Former president Jack Nichols stated the association's financial position was fairly sound. He stated the bank balance amounted to some \$100 and about \$270 is still to be received on account of sports day advertising. It was pointed out that a note for \$800 is still outstanding.

Plans were finalized at the meeting for the benefit dance to be held at Defaga Lodge August 17th in aid of one of the participants in the sports day program who broke his leg during the day's activities.

## Exhibition Booths Available

The committee on concessions for the Digby County Exhibition, to be held in Bear River on August 28, 29 and 30, reported that booth space was available at the exhibition buildings at \$1.50 per foot. Members of the committee felt that firms around Digby, Bear River, Weymouth and the Neck and Islands were missing the results of a different and effective way of advertising by not utilizing booth space at the exhibition grounds where thousands of people pass by. It was felt that booth space was not sought by firms in this area as is done by firms in areas where other exhibitions in the province are located. The committee hoped that before the dates of the exhibition arrive that more space will be bought by firms, not only to advertise their own products but also to give financial support and stimulus to the exhibition. Repairs to buildings, it was stated by the chairman of concessions, will be needed before too long and it was felt that selling booth space would be a good idea. Please turn to Page 4.

The fish, evidently unconscious after a blow from the heavy lead weight, was soon taken aboard the boat. The day's fishing was not a complete loss, and the men gained a tale to add to the many others being circled in these parts.

The following day, when fishing was equally as poor, the two men repeated their performance with success.

## River Named In Honor Of Late Mr. DuVernet

A river in the Northwest Territories has been named the DuVernet River in honor of the late Fred P. DuVernet, of Ottawa, son of Mrs. E. DuVernet, Fredericton and Digby, and the late Dr. E. DuVernet. Mr. DuVernet was killed in an automobile accident last October enroute from Ottawa to Fredericton to visit his mother.

The announcement of the decision of the Canadian Permanent Committee on Geographical Names of the Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources was made recently. The river is on Borden Island (85 NE and 79 NW) in the NWT.

The late Mr. DuVernet was on the Polar Continental Shelf Project and the following tribute to his memory was made in the announcement that the river was named for him.

"Mr. DuVernet is one of that anonymous group of government scientists, engineers and others who, with little or no public recognition, have done so much to open the north and to extend our knowledge of it. They have gone about their work quietly and, in most cases, at considerable sacrifice. Through a sense of dedication, they have endured physical hardship, long separations from their families, and the daily risks to health and life that are the inevitable accompaniment to their work. I think it is most fitting that the late Mr. DuVernet and through him, his many colleagues should be commemorated in this way."

Mrs. F. P. DuVernet, widow of the man whose name is commemorated, lives with her children, Dianne and Wendy, in Ottawa. A son, John, also is in Ottawa. A brother of the late Mr. DuVernet, Jeffrey, also resides in Ottawa and another brother, Dr. Edward DuVernet, is in Vancouver.

## Will Speak On Industrial Development

The Digby Board of Trade will meet on September 10 when a dinner will be held, at which time M. V. Knight, Deputy Minister of Trade and Industry for Nova Scotia, will be guest speaker. His subject will be "The Local Community and Industrial Development." Plans were made to invite Trade Boards from Bear River, Weymouth and the Fundy Board and a committee set up to contact the Digby Canadian Legion Auxiliary for catering. The meeting of the board on Tuesday night which made the dinner plans was presided over by president Ralph MacIntyre.

It was announced that the annual meeting of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce was to be held in Quebec from October 6 to 8.

Discussion came up on the possibility of taking advantage of some of the \$100,000,000 fund available to the Atlantic Development Board. The President advised that this was being investigated through the Digby Development Committee.

A questionnaire suitable projects for the Canada Centennial Year was read. It was decided to forward the completed questionnaire to the enquiring Chamber of Commerce committee and also to ask for a list of projects suggested by other Trade Boards.

A letter was read from the Canadian Central Registry of Subscription Representatives Inc. stating that over 90% of all magazine salespeople in Canada are registered with the CCR and are pledged by their employees to obey CCR standards of fair practice. All employees of the registered magazines carry CCR sixty day license for identification purposes. The representative's signature appears on his license and anyone in doubt is asked to request a duplicate signature and if found to be irregular, confiscate the license and send it to CCR with a note outlining findings.

## Spray Your Lawn Now

If you wish a dandelion-free lawn, next spring — and who doesn't — then, an even application of 24-D sprayed over the lawn in such a manner as to ensure good coverage, will do the trick.

That is the recommendation advanced and suggested by G. D. Palfrey, Weed Control Specialist at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, who advises that such a treatment, applied right away, should result in only an odd dandelion being present next spring. If control is delayed until spring, of course, several applications may then be necessary to bring the weed under control.

When treating your lawn, Mr. Palfrey suggests that the amine form of 24-D and not the ester type, be used. The amine does not give off fumes and, consequently, one's only worry about causing damage should be because of spray drift. Therefore, the lawn should be sprayed when there is no wind. Should it be necessary to spray during windy conditions, be sure to adjust the spray nozzle so that a coarse spray is used. This will cut the drift to a minimum.

If chick-weed is a problem in your lawn, Mr. Palfrey suggests that composit, or killex, should be used. These materials do an excellent job in controlling chick-weed, even when applied as late as October. They will also control weeds such as dandelions and plantain.

## Traffic Safety

### Railroad Crossings

Don't let hasty judgment doublecross you at double crossings. Walking or driving, if you rush across the railroad tracks as soon as a train has gone through, there might just be another train on the other track. Wait. Wait until you can clearly see in both directions. Follow the Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council's advice to look, listen, and cross carefully.

### Rear-end Collisions

Rear-end collisions are common occurrences in heavy traffic when motorists are inattentive or drive too close together. To avoid them, the Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council makes these suggestions: 1. Don't crowd the guy ahead. Know your stopping distances for all speeds and conditions. 2. Don't be crowded by the guy behind. Try to encourage tailgaters to pass you. 3. Don't let high speed lull you into a half-alert state so that you are unable to make emergency adjustments in your driving. 4. Don't underestimate the power of the other driver to get you into accident trouble. Always anticipate the careless, dangerous moves of drivers around you. And, five — don't neglect to signal your intended moves well ahead of time. Tailgating can start off the kind of chain reaction nobody wants — unless you prevent it.

### Holiday Driving

Making plans for a trip over the holidays? If so, you can count on the inevitability of crowded highways and impatient drivers — the best possible set-up for accidents. The Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council advises you to make your driving schedule flexible enough that delays won't upset you or your passengers. Better yet, get an early start. That way you'll beat the heavy traffic and really enjoy the ride. And — regardless of the length of the trip, don't forget those seat belts. They'll help take you wherever you're going comfortably and safely.

## We Don't Blame Them

The following is an extract from one of the Yarmouth papers, which reported a meeting of the Yarmouth Town and County Tourist Association Executive — "Sign at Digby — With many tourists entering through Digby with the new larger accommodations for cars on the Digby-St. John boat, a sign to bring the tourists to Yarmouth was said to be most essential. Councillor Trask stated he had made an approach for a location and would try and find out why he had received no reply. It was decided that a sign was a must for 1964."

Of course, Yarmouth should put a sign up if they want Princess of Acadia passengers to visit Yarmouth. And we bet ten times to a doughnut the sign isn't going to read "This way round to the South Shore." It will mention Yarmouth just the same as a sign at Yarmouth should say "this way to Digby" and tell what to find here.

Which reminds us. We happened in a tourist home one night, and saw three tourists reading The Digby Courier. They admired the picture and write-up on the Drays being entertained at the Buckingham Palace Garden Party and then went on to read "Where Does That Road Go?" They did not know the editor was in the next room and went on remarking what a grand idea this was to have the roads pointed out and immediately made plans to take that particular road. Made us feel something along this line could be developed for the benefit of tourists.

Which again reminds us of a beautiful brochure put out by the Canadian Department of Trade and Commerce called Circle Tours from the Trans-Canada Highway. It describes tours all the way from B. C. to Nfld. Tour 21 is in Nova Scotia — Fundy and South Shore — tour 22 is Cabot Trail and West Cape Breton. Digby is mentioned in tour 21 with no mean write-up. It says "pass by HMCS Cornwallis, largest navy training station in the Commonwealth. Overlooking the Annapolis Basin and Digby Gut, Digby, is a focal point for visitors to the many deep sea fishing and summer sports resorts in this region. Of special interest are the scallop boats that work out of this thriving sea port. An interesting visit can be made to the tiny fishing communities along the Digby Neck."

Further the tour guide says, "Continuing south on highway 1 through Weymouth, settled by Loyalists in 1783, the tour takes you to the historic and romantic French Shore district with its colourful communities established by the Acadians of Clare. Of particular interest enroute are St. Mary's Church, at Church Point, said to be the largest wooden church in Canada and the great stone church at St. Bernards."

Both these descriptions are well written and the type of copy used would surely draw visitors: e.g., largest navy training station in the COMMONWEALTH, the largest wooden church in CANADA. (We also liked the "many deep sea fishing". We hope there are boats available.) Some similar small booklet about Digby County on the style of copy "Where Does That Road Go" should be good.

## Is There Or Isn't There?

Is there or isn't there an industry coming to town? Someone is supposed to have said "There is but it is too early to let it out." Others say "there must be because the IGA and the Metropolitan wouldn't come here unless they knew business was going to be good." Others are not so optimistic in their guesses. All we can say is that the Digby Area Industrial Development Committee shouldn't stop trying on the strength of rumors that some industry is about to land here.

But rumors or no rumors, there are some things which are facts and which are worthy of a considerable encouraging note. Right now we have a new hospital under construction; a new Oddfellow's Hall is just about finished; an IGA store will open, we believe, in September; the Metropolitan store is well on the way; Stedman's are about to build another store in town. We might even add that a new water main and a new sewer are being installed in town. All these tend to remind us that the wheels of progress are moving and we might add that we have not yet got over being proud of our new paving program completed last fall and the new CPR boat Princess of Acadia, which ferries to Digby from Saint John each day.

These are all within the town. Add to these the progress made in the fishing industry and the sport that has been taken in agriculture and horticulture in Digby County as seen in this week's issue of The Digby Courier and we can be somewhat encouraged.

Just think what a change would take place if we could have a new wharf in Digby and if a new industry or two in the area would be more than just rumors but sureties.

## Lack Of Encouragement

We were disappointed to hear that a recent attempt to revive the 4-H Club in Digby had failed. This, we feel, is not so much a fault of the younger people as a fault of parents. Either parents are unconcerned or they do not know the benefits derived by the young people from participating in 4-H Clubs. We hope that when Elaine Saulnier, of Lower Saulnierville, one of those representing Nova Scotia at the 4-H Club convention in Winnipeg in November, returns from the Winnipeg meeting that she might be able to write a story to enthuse our girls and boys here in 4-H work. Or, maybe, the Dickie boys and girls from Digby who are staunch supporters of 4-H might tell us someday why they believe in 4-H and get other boys and girls enthused.

Nationally this year is the 50th anniversary of 4-H Clubs in Canada. The organization is a worthwhile one in which leadership is given in so many phases of life.

As related by the Council's Manager, James D. Moore, Ottawa, "the primary aim and basic reason for the rapid growth of the 4-H movement is to provide practical training for young people so that they may lead useful, satisfying lives and be better prepared to take their places as citizens of tomorrow." This aim is clearly defined in the symbolic four "H's" as they are embodied into the 4-H pledge and repeated wherever and when ever members met in dutiful assembly. It reads:

I pledge:  
My Head to clearer thinking,  
My Heart to greater loyalty,  
My Hands to larger service,  
My Health to better living,  
for my club, my community and my country.

Provincially, 4-H Club work is a responsibility of the Departments of Agriculture (Department of Education in Newfoundland) and the University Extension Department in Saskatchewan. The members elect their own officers and help to organize each year's program of activities. They learn to express themselves in public and work together on club and community projects.

## What Are Your Centennial Suggestions?

Proposals for centenary projects are supposed to be submitted by January 1, 1964. Everytime someone comes up with the usual saying "Only so many more shopping days until Christmas", just add seven more and say "Only so many more suggestion days until New Year". After all, a worthwhile project takes time to think out, time to figure costs. For, you know, the federal government will bear up to one-third of the cost of the project and the provincial government will throw in an equal sum to the federal. The question is how much can the town go? Or the municipality? or the area? or region? or combination of municipalities? Somebody should be doing some thinking and we'd like to hear what you are thinking. It might be a shame not to take advantage of two-thirds of the project as a gift. But the question is "What project within our means?" and "what area should it cover?"

You might be interested in knowing some suggestions from other areas. The May-June number of The Listening Post, a digest of municipal news, says this —

"Of the types of projects centennial under consideration or approved, those in the field of recreation and park development (33 municipalities) appear to be favorites. An interest in health and sports is reflected in numerous suggestions for swimming pools, skating rinks and community centres. Museums, "cultural buildings" or libraries total 15 among the communities reporting. Waterfront development is mentioned by two municipalities. City halls or municipal buildings are mentioned by 9 communities; tree planting by 8."

What are your suggestions for either Digby, the area, the municipality, a combination of municipalities? It should be of a lasting nature. Dr. Julius Comeau, Meteghan, is on the provincial centennial committee from this area and no doubt has information for anyone seeking it.

How do you feel when you come back from a vacation? Are you the type who comes home full of new resolutions and fresh starts — and, what's more acts on those resolutions? Or are you the type who returns too exhausted to work for another week, while you rest up from the annual two?

We have just returned from a vacation, and, I have found that I, for one, am both types. We had a wonderful holiday. (By the way how was yours?) Our drive home along the sea-coast was supplemented by some delightful, relaxing chamber music on the car radio. Have you ever noticed how music on a car radio can be moulded as you listen into plausible background music for the scenery as you drive? The combination of the music and the view made me determine for the ten thousand, nine hundred and eighty-fourth time to "do better".

However, now we are home. Everything is encased in that grey film which seems to envelope my house when I go away. The kids fall, fight, eat dribbly ice cream, and spill tomato juice on freshly waxed floors just as often as they always did, and the good fairies installed neither a dish washer or a clothes dryer while we were away. I find myself slipping back into that pre-resolution slough.

If you feel this way too, this cup of coffee will be good for both of us.

Fortunately, while this mood has prevailed, cooking has been easy. Ripe fruits and berries make such good desserts, just as they are — and when it is too hot to bake, even husbands do not mind a few desserts from the bakery. However, I now have my second batch of icebox cookies in the refrigerator for this week. The beauty of this recipe is that it takes no eggs, so can be whipped up even when you are out of them (as I have been this week).

### Molasses Refrigerator Cookies

1 cup shortening	1 tsp. ginger
3/4 cup molasses	1 tsp. salt
1/2 cup brown sugar	3 cups flour
2 tsp. soda	

Blend shortening, sugar and molasses. Add dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Shape into rolls, wrap in wax paper. Store in refrigerator, slice off as required, place on greased cookie sheet, and bake 8 minutes in a 355 degree oven.

While we are on the subject of "eggless cookery" here is a recipe for a perfectly delicious orange pudding which I have found lately.

### Orange Pudding

1 cup flour	1 orange
1/2 tsp. salt	1/2 cup shortening
3 tps. baking powder	1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk	1 1/2 cups hot water

Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening with two knives. Add milk and juice and pulp of the orange. Mix thoroughly. Put in baking dish, leaving room around the edges. Cut the rind of the orange into small slivers with scissors. Add sugar and hot water. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Pour over mixture in pan. Dot with butter. Bake 1/2 hour in 350 degrees oven.

I have found another way to beat the summer heat and the summer doldrums. That is the simple expedient of washing diapers, or the day's accumulation of dirty jeans, shorts and tee shirts at night. I have a "semi-automatic" washing machine. I simply throw the clothes into it and set it for the required time, but even if you do not it is easier to do one load of wash in the cool of the evening and hang it out at night, or early in the morning before you start your other work than to swelter doing several washes a week, isn't it? What is more, these are things which do not really need ironing, and what does need ironing can be done in the morning, which is usually cooler than the afternoon.

Anyway, have another of my ice box cookies. I'll put the coffee pot on again. You will come back again, won't you?

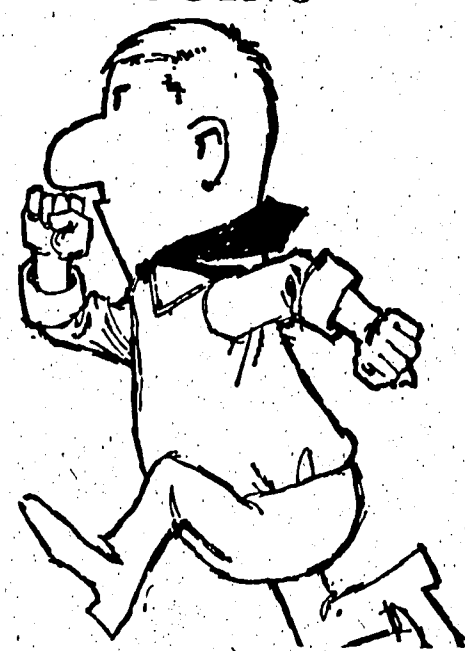

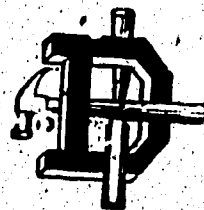

## Fifty Attend Farmers Meet

William LeForte, Agricul-  
tural representative for Digby  
County presided over a "twi-  
light meeting" when about  
fifty gathered at Hillgrove on  
Wednesday evening to view  
a newly established Canadian  
Department of Agriculture  
Research Sub Station on the  
property of H. M. Warne. The  
20 acres of proposition is de-  
signed to test the area's poten-  
tial for fruit growing and to im-  
prove agriculture in the area  
generally. Dr. R. J. Wright,  
director of the Kentville Agri-  
culture Research Station in  
addressing the farmers said  
that the project is being de-  
veloped for their benefit and its  
success would depend on the  
use they make of it. It is your  
project he stated, we want  
you to watch the growth.

Dr. Wright explained that  
the sub station is on rented  
property and if enough inter-  
est is not shown in the pro-  
ject, they will "pull up stakes  
and go". He said that Digby  
was in near proximity to Saint  
John and the Eastern States  
and with enough yield and  
high quality the proposition of  
fruit growing and agricult-  
ure should pay. The subst-  
ation he said is something new,  
they are willing to take risks  
in their test and see what  
happens, but it was the opin-  
ion of the department that the  
area selected was well suited  
for special crops. The crops  
will have to be protected and  
given the best culture and  
management, he said, to get  
most out of the experiment.

Dr. David Crowe, horticult-  
urist at the Kentville Research  
Station explained the project  
in regard to the fruit trees.  
At the sub station, dual ex-  
periment he said, is being con-  
ducted - one is using a flat  
field and the other having a  
South Eastern exposure to de-  
termine the effect of climate  
on the growth of fruits over  
five, ten or fifteen year pe-  
riod.

Included in the experiment  
at the sub station are ten va-  
rieties of peaches; nine of  
pears, all grafted on the Bar-  
lett; five varieties of plums;  
eight of cherries and four of  
apricots. Three trees of a  
hardy kind of peach, the or-  
leone, were also planted as an  
experiment for quick growth.  
The peach trees at present are  
planted in a strawberry patch  
which will probably be plowed  
up next year as cost of cul-  
tivation between trees is expen-  
sive. Dr. Crowe said that they  
are trying to keep cost down  
and operate in a practical man-  
ner that the people of the  
area could duplicate the pro-  
cess economically.

Robert Murray, horticult-  
urist at the Kentville Research  
Station gave a short talk on  
growing grapes and then the  
farmers visited the one acre  
grape experiment at the sub-  
station. Eleven varieties of  
grapes are being used on a  
southern exposure with nine  
plants of each variety. The ar-  
rangement at the substation  
includes wooden posts about  
100 feet apart and steel posts  
8 feet apart strung with wires  
for the vines to trail upon.  
With grapes, he said, a high  
quality and a good yield are  
necessary for a profitable  
venture. They require much  
mulch and fertilizing varies  
with location.

There are four areas in the  
province devoted to grape  
growing experiments. One of  
these is at Bear River. Some  
of the crops include varieties  
not grown here before and the  
experiment is to determine  
what grapes can best be grown  
here and for what purpose -  
table or wine - they can best  
be used. Consideration is given  
not only to variety, but al-

## Digby Vessel In "Mary Celeste" Tragedy

During its long history as  
a seaport town, Digby has  
had a close connection with  
many stirring sagas of the  
sea. One of the most inter-  
esting is that of the mystery  
of the "Mary Celeste", one  
of the most astounding myster-  
ies in the history of shipping.  
In December 1879 the Digby  
brigantine, "Dei Grata", Cap-  
tain Morehouse, arrived at Gib-  
ralter with the American brig,  
"Mary Celeste", picked up as  
a derelict at latitude 38.30 N.  
longitude 17.15 W., but with-  
out apparent cause for her  
abandonment.

At a special survey, ordered  
by the Admiralty Court, the  
ship's hull showed no damage.  
There was no evidence of her  
having struck a rock or of be-  
ing in a collision. The stern,  
sternpost and rudder were in  
good condition. As with the  
exterior, so it was with the  
interior of the derelict.

More books, newspaper and  
magazine stories have been  
written about the mystery of  
"Mary Celeste" than any other  
ship, including Titanic, Blue-  
nose, Bounty, etc. Fourteen  
books and in nine different  
languages have been written  
about the mystery and to the  
present day it remains a mys-  
tery.

## Crops Need Rain

The heavy rains early Wed-  
nesday morning were prob-  
ably a blessing to Digby area  
farmers and residents in gen-  
eral. Although there has been  
no serious water shortage in  
town, it is understood crops

extreme heat and lack of rain  
experienced throughout the  
summer. This is in direct con-

of available hours during July  
and August.

quality and delicate taste.

understood. In several places

up so that water could be  
pumped from some distance  
for home use.

The Valley forest fire haz-

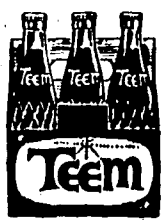

## OPENING NOTICE Digby Public Schools

The Digby Urban Schools will reopen on Wednesday, September 4th, 1963, when all pupils of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full school day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 p.m. Student lunches will be served at the Regional High School cafeteria on September 5th.

Pupils registering with the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to September 1st. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1st, will not be registered at any time during the school year, 1963-64. The Superintendent's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Wednesday, August 14th to Friday, August 16th between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Students from the Islands and Weymouth seeking admission to the Grade XII Commercial class must have application approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Digby, N. S. Immediate application will expedite approval.

For admission to the Academic section of Grade XII a provincial pass of Grade XI or a local pass from the Digby Regional High School will be required. Students seeking admission to Grade XII commerce must have one full year's attendance at the Grade XI level and have application approved by the school administration before registration in the department may be completed.

All prescribed texts for Grades IX to XII are available at a rental fee of five dollars, payable on the opening date of school. Students wishing to take advantage of the Rental plan should come prepared to make this payment.

All pupils must comply with the regulations of the Department of Public Health regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.



into the house and took my fishing line, ran to the wharf and sat down looking unasily behind me all the time. After catching a few little ones, I felt a big tug on my line. It was so strong I knew I couldn't pull it in alone, so I yelled to a couple of boys to help me. We tugged and tugged until with one giant effort we pulled it in. I was so excited that I forgot dad's warning and ran into the house wet, fishy and hollering, "Come see the whopper of a fish I caught." My father was so angry he said, "Throw it back in. I don't want to see any fish."

After my grandfather and a neighbor saw the size of it,

they finally persuaded dad to let me keep the fish, which was a pollock weighing 13½ lbs. We took pictures of it, and when the news got around that a fish that size had been caught off a small wharf, dad forgave me, but made me promise that I wouldn't do it again. In closing, I'd like to say that the difference between this story and the ones you hear on the street, is that this one is TRUE.

## Landmark Goes Clock Remains

The old Digby Post Office building, constructed in the year 1900, will start its downward trend on Monday morning. The building, at the centre of the business street in Digby, which was bought by B. Carson & Son, Yarmouth, after the present federal building was built on Montague Row, is now owned by the Kenney Construction Co. According to H. Boyd, of the company, the building will be completely demolished and a new building for the location is anticipated during the fall. The present building, with a tower some 70 feet high, is not suitable for use even on the lower floor because of its elevation of seven feet above ground level.

It is expected the dismantling of the building in its location on Digby's main thoroughfare, and with the building towering to 70 feet, will not be an easy job. One item, though, will be carefully guarded. That is the old brass clock in the tower which has told the time to Digby's citizens for more than 60 years. This has been offered as a gift to the town by the Kenney Construction Company and the town has accepted.

Definite plans as to the location of the clock in future have not been worked out. The mayor, V. L. Bent, is on vacation and a meeting has not been properly called to dispose of details. One thing the councillors are certain about is that the people of the town would want them to retain the "town clock" and have graciously accepted the construction company's offer with thanks. They are expecting that the citizens will come up with some suggestions where the clock should be located. The Digby Courier would gladly accept suggestions through its columns.

## New Features At Exhibition

Although the Digby County Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition committee feels disappointed in not obtaining a fisheries booth for the week's show several new features and booths, it is understood, are added to make the D.C.A. and I. E. in 1963 superior to previous years.

More entertainment for the children who accompany their parents or who want to spend a day at the exhibition has been planned. A new feature is the tractor rodeo. Nearly all the booth space has by this time been taken up with several new companies occupying space. The usual horse and ox pulls will be held and exhibits promise to be of high quality. For those who are interested in musical talent, a quartette from Weymouth will be featured, the annual amateur program will be held and a sing song will provide audience participation.

Meals will be served all three days of the exhibition with the special turkey dinner on Thursday.

No entries are accepted after 9:00 p.m. on Tuesday and Judging begins on Wednesday morning at 9:30 o'clock and the official opening will be on Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

You might just as well pick blueberries on the farm of H. M. Warne, in Hill Grove, as to pick roses in your own back yard. A look at the picture would suggest rose bushes just as quickly as highbush blueberries. One look at the crates of berries in the picture would never lead one to think these are blueberries. They are much larger than an ordinary blueberry. The new highbush blueberry has taken any drudgery there might have been out of blueberry picking, as seen by the happy looking faces above of Mrs. Jack Miller (left), Mrs. Vernon Heigh (standing), Miss Rosena Heigh and Mrs. Jean Miller. Mr. Warne is finding room for just a few more of the luscious berries to make a well rounded box.

The blueberries grown on Mr. Warne's field are the Blue Crop and Blue Ray variety. On measuring we find that the majority are 1/2 inch in diameter and about two inches in circumference. Exclamations we've heard were "Are these blueberries? I've never seen them so large!" And we agree they are a novelty around these parts. The editor, too, can testify to the flavor — she's tried them.

Mr. Warne has five acres of these highbush blueberries and while he has picked quite a number this year, actually the first bushes planted should only come into proper production in 1964. The other bushes should give a proper yield by 1966. Markets are available locally, in Halifax, Saint John and Boston, but Mr. Warne says to make marketing more worthwhile a greater number of people should be into the highbush blueberry farming.

The first growing venture was begun by Mr. Warne about five years ago when he planted a half acre of strawberries. The strawberry field now contains about ten acres. About 12 to 14 are employed by Mr. Warne on the farm, which also includes potato crops, etc., and about 100 worked at berry picking this summer. Mr. Warne had given a twenty-five dollar prize for picking the largest number of boxes of berries. It went to Graham Miller, and a second prize of ten dollars was won by Amy Barton. Thirty acres of strawberries would need to be planted, Mr. Warne said, in order to maintain a ten acre strawberry production. Right now the workers are busy in the strawberry field placing runners in preparation for fall fertilization.

Besides the farming and fruit growing which Mr. Warne does on his property at Hill Grove, the Canada Department of Agriculture has rented property for the establishment of a Research Branch Substation there. Experiments in fruit growing are carried on to test the success of growth for hardiness, yield, climatic condition and marketing. Planted for experiment are eleven varieties of peach trees; nine varieties of pears; eight of cherries; five of plums and four of apricots.

The farm at Hill Grove has been in the Warne family for a number of years. Tombstones on the property date back to 1850. One reveals the death of Jesse K. Warne, who died at the age of 88 years in 1888 and his wife Sarah who died in 1889. Hubert is a direct (Please turn to page 10)

Compared with some other papers, The Digby Courier is comparatively young. Just recently The Yarmouth Herald came into its 130th year. It is almost half again as old as the Courier so we do not have too much to boast about. However, when we write Volume LXXXVIII, No. 52, this week we realize that this paper has completed 88 years of continuous service to the community and the county of Digby. Ere long we'll be turning the pages on volume XC, no mean record of years for one newspaper in one community.

While the present editor and managers cannot boast too many years service included in the past eighty-eight, these past years have been difficult years for any newspaper and we can think of a number which have fallen prey to high cost of materials and operation. For a newspaper is like any other business, it has to be on a paying basis or it just does not exist.

To most editors and publishers this part of running a newspaper is just a necessary evil but one which must be done and often, though reluctantly, a get tough policy on collecting accounts in order to survive must be taken. We have stooped before to "drastic" measures to collect accounts and we likely will be forced into harsh measures again for even with the risk of making a few enemies a business must collect in its own accounts in order to pay others. This is a necessary evil.

But a newspaper has the happy fortune of being more than a straight business. It has the joyful purpose of being also an institution and while we too often get engrossed in the latter to the detriment of the business angle, the happier purpose of service makes the operation of a newspaper most rewarding.

While we at The Digby Courier leave world affairs mostly to larger newspapers, we feel we have a full time service locally in reflecting and influencing on a more localized area. But no matter how you look at it, an editor is still but one person and a newspaper is bound to radiate opinions of that one person. We therefore feel that in all fairness the voice of the people of the community should also be heard through a newspaper. This can best be done by letters to the editor and we extend a welcome to those who wish to make use of this service. By working together, the people and the editor, a newspaper can perform a most useful and uplifting purpose in a community. It can be an instrument of vast influence in designing the lives and destinies of our people. The Digby Courier has been your servant for 88 years. You can make even greater use of it in the years ahead. It is yours to use in the building of a better community. Take advantage of its services now.

A history on Canadian Weekly Newspapers; an annual selection of Canada's leading or best-all-around weekly newspaper, regardless of class or circulation; bursaries to students to improve the standard of writing; sales and business administration; provision of annual scholarships for any boys or girls planning to attend higher learning channels leading to betterment of the weekly newspapers industry as a whole.

These ideas might also lead to suggestions for communities.

Hil Come in. And don't trip over the dog's dish.

I just put the cat out. She and the dog are still at the stage where they have to be separated. I hope they will eventually get acquainted and become friends. The dog is quite willing to be friendly now, but the cat is a bit more choosy of her company.

We are a pet-keeping family. We have had, at various times, dogs, cats, turtles, frogs, goldfish, budgies, and hamsters. I think pets are good for children, although I am not so sure that the reverse is true. A pet is a small cosmos in itself. It lives, breathes, eats, sleeps, plays, loves, has babies, and even dies, perhaps in a protracted space of time, and a child's observations of these phenomena must add to the child's own sense of the wonder of life.

Psychologists, who have studied just about everything, say that the major age for interest in pets is from seven to fourteen years, with a peak around twelve years. Both boys and girls prefer dogs to cats, and their interest in playing with cats wanes sooner than their interest in playing with dogs, but this is especially true of boys. There must be an age under which children are really too young for pets, however. Our two year old is bursting with a genuine fondness for our dog and for our cat, but his methods of showing it do not exactly convey the message of love and good will to the animals. That is not to say that he has learned nothing from living around them. His exclamations of "Nice dog", "Poor dog", "I feed kitty", always make me glad that I have enough love in my heart to go around among several children and several animals.

Children may learn tenderness and sympathy from the keeping of a pet. It is doubtful whether they learn the much-admired "responsibility for care" unless they absorb this as they watch their parents feeding, walking, and above all wiping up with the regularity of Big Ben. They do, however, learn in a gentle, practical way the cycles of joy and sorrow which are a part of life, and they will have many beautiful memories.

Pets have practical advantages too. They make marvelous letters of introduction. Have you ever walked down the street with a dog on a leash? Who gets spoken to? I cannot think of a better way for a shy child to gain friends, or for any child to introduce himself to a new neighborhood. Children who are isolated from their contemporaries by geography or other means especially find companionship in pets. This is a healthier companionship than that of the imaginary friends such children often create for themselves, and anti-social tendencies are less likely to develop.

I have just thought of a suggestion we can make to the children next time they get bored. Let's suggest a pet show. We can have it in the back yard, and it can be open to cats, dogs, birds (in cages), hamsters, white mice, worms, fish, turtles, or what have you. We could even invite a few adults. The children could each give a brief description of their pets, how they are fed, cared for, etc. We could give prizes to the best swimmer, the best singer, the yellowest, the one with the longest tail, and other such things, and we could have chocolate milk and cookies. This sounds to me like a good summer birthday party idea.

What, no more coffee? Well, bye. Come back again, won't you.

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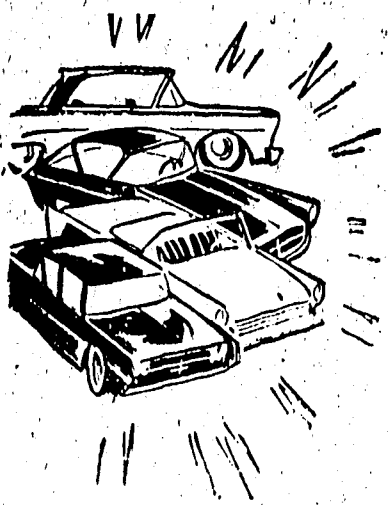

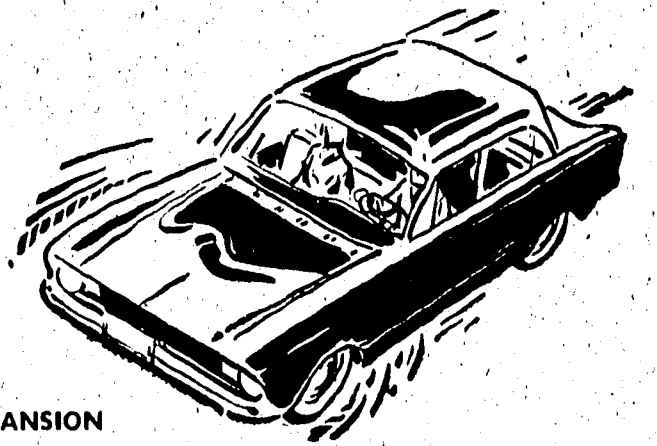

### Sports In Clare

Sports in the Municipality of Clare in Digby County is part of the physical fitness program and in the last two years great strides have been made. The town of Weymouth is linked with Clare when sports is engaged in as the Kiwanis Club of that town has a great portion of members from the Municipality of Clare.

The Kiwanis club has been sponsoring baseball teams among the boys of fifteen years and younger which taken in quite a few youths from Clare. The senior baseball league which is in its third year and is named the Western Valley Baseball League has two teams from Clare Meteghan Lions and Saulnierville Angels with the Weymouth Pontiacs forming the third team of a four team league.

Baseball had been dormant for a number of years but an effort has been made in recent years to awaken the interest in this great sport. The Western Valley baseball league originally was made up of four teams with a Yarmouth entry dropping out this year.

An effort has been made in Clare to encourage the playing of baseball as well as softball. The Richelleu Club of Church Point has engaged a co-ordinator of sports for the Municipality of Clare for the summer months. The aims of the Club is to encourage the various parishes of which there are seven, organize teams in the various sports.

A seven team baseball league has been formed with teams from Salmon River, St. Alphonse, Meteghan, Saulnierville, Church Point, St. Bernards and Concession participating. These teams are made up of youths of fifteen years and over. Teams in the 12 year olds and younger and 15 years olds have been organized and these latter teams will continue to play exhibition games for the balance of this year. Meteghan, Church Point, Concession and Saulnierville have teams in this age group.

Soft ball is also receiving some attention in Clare. The Youth Clubs of Clare, who represent each parish, have entered teams in a league of which plays its games at the Clare District High School athletic grounds every Monday evening. Six teams participate in the softball league from the following parishes. Salmon River, St. Alphonse, Meteghan, Saulnierville, Church Point and Concession. Each parish is comprised of three and four villages within a radius of three miles of central village. Volley ball is being encouraged and a girls' volleyball league is presently being organized to include six teams and the games will be played at the High School grounds at Meteghan River.

A track and field contest is being organized to take place on August 15th at the Meteghan River High School grounds with members from each youth club of the various parishes participating. The first such field day was held last year during the Acadia Festival and it proved quite successful.

The hiring of a sports co-ordinator in Clare by the Richelleu Club is on a trial basis and if it proves successful, the club may continue to pay the expenses of such a co-

He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree at Johnsons Bible College, Kimberlin Heights, Tennessee. It was also at Tennessee that Miss Ester Graves became his bride, in 1922.

During the years 1929 - 1948 he held pastorates at Michigan and Alabama. During World War II, Mr. Outhouse served as Supervisor for Canadian Legion War Services. He was stationed mostly at Debert and Halifax areas.

Mr. and Mrs. Outhouse have two children. A son Edward, who is an instructor at Eastern Airlines, resides at Tiverton.

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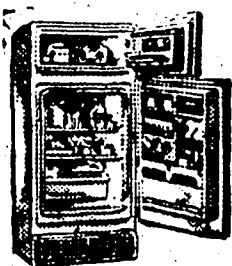

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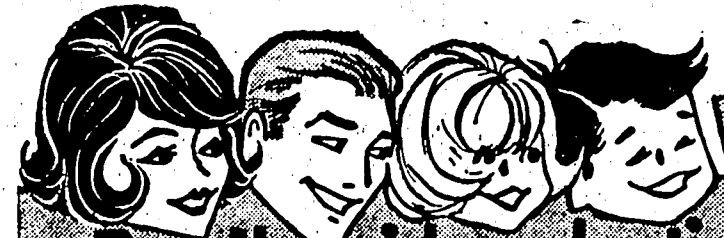
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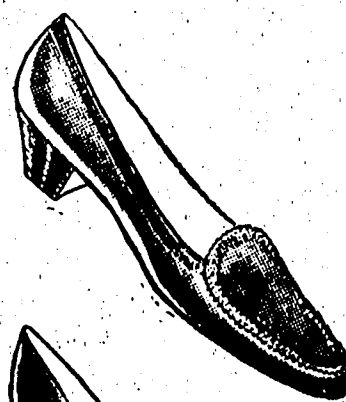

## How To Give MOUTH-TO-MOUTH Resuscitation

Use this method not only on drowning victims, but on persons suffering electric shock, gas poisoning and suf-

focation. To avoid direct contact place a handkerchief over victim's mouth. This won't impede air flow.



1. Examine victim's mouth for foreign matter. If there is any, (mucus, food, sand, tobacco, loose dentures, etc.) turn his head to one side and remove it with your fingers or a cloth wrapped around your fingers.

2. Lift the victim's neck, place a folded coat, blanket, etc., under his shoulders. Tilt his head back as far as possible.

3. Grasp the jaw with thumb in one side of the mouth and pull it forward. Maintain this position to keep air passage open.

4. Pinch victim's nostrils shut, take a deep breath and place your mouth over his mouth and your thumb creating a tight seal; or close the victim's mouth, take a deep breath, and place your mouth over his nose. Blow into victim's mouth or nose until you see his chest rise. For an infant breathe through both nose and mouth, with thumb in mouth.

5. Remove your mouth and listen for out-flow of air. For an adult, inflate lungs at rate of about 12 times per minute. For a child, inflate lungs up to 20 times per minute, using relatively shallow breaths.

If first few attempts to inflate the lungs are unsuccessful, turn victim on his side and administer several sharp blows between the shoulders in an attempt to dislodge the obstruction. NOW REPEAT ENTIRE PROCEDURE.

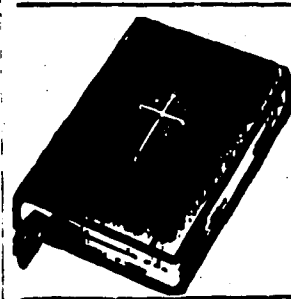

## Former Cmdr. Of Cornwallis Assails Navy

The Royal Canadian Navy is a fleet of badly chosen, badly manned and badly equipped ships and its ineffectiveness is "a major public scandal," a distinguished naval officer says in the current Maclean's.

In an article titled "The Gold-braid Mind is Destroying Our Navy" Commodore James Plomer says the heart of the problem is "a self-perpetuating, self-selecting group of admirals" who have come to believe in themselves as a social institution or marching society.

Commodore Plomer retired from the RCN last spring. At the time, he was the most decorated officer in the service. He has a low opinion of the seamanship of most Canadian admirals.

"Officers who have failed quickly under operational stress have become admirals," he says. "So have officers who dress up in sailor suits but rarely go to sea. The last admiral I worked for had been to sea for less than two years — since before the war."

Commodore Plomer describes his 4,000-word expose of the deficiencies of the navy as "the final discharge of my duties as a naval officer to the people of Canada."

Commodore James Plomer is known in Digby, having served at HMCS Cornwallis training base. He entered the RCNVR at Winnipeg in 1932 and in July of 1952 he took command of HMCS Cornwallis and in September of that year was awarded the Order of the British Empire (Military Division) for his services in the destroyer Cayuga in the Korean war theatre. He was senior officer, Canadian destroyers while in Korea.

He is also a Double Distinguished Service Cross winner and holds the United States Legion of Merit award for the Second World War.

In 1959 he became the Senior Canadian Officer Afloat (Atlantic) which entailed advising the Flag Officer Atlantic Coast and being responsible to him for the sea training of operational ships in the Command.

In 1961 he took up the appointment of deputy naval controller at Naval Headquarters, Ottawa.

During the Second World War he served on loan to the Royal Navy and was group commander of the Fifth Anti-Submarine and Minesweeping Group and commanded the Corvette HMS Sunflower.

## Report May Clinic

Opening of a clinic at Windsor, bringing the total to 15 in the province, resulted in a record number of new patients examined in mobile diagnostic clinics conducted by the Nova Scotia Society for Care of Crippled Children during May. Lieut. Col. J. M. Kinnaird, executive director, said today. Total seen in the spring series held in key centres throughout Nova Scotia rose to 674 needy, crippled and handicapped youngsters, of whom 260 were making their clinical debuts. Comparable numbers for the previous spring were 668 and 245 and for last November, 513 and 117.

After the young patients have been seen by the travelling team of orthopaedic surgeon, paediatrician and field worker-public health nurse from the Society, they are referred back to the family physician. Where additional expenses are entailed and need is demonstrated, the tab usually is picked up by service clubs who are the Nova Scotia Society's Easter Seal franchise holders. In Digby where the Kiwanis Club is the franchise holder, some 56 children were examined in the clinic held at Lions Club Hall. Of these 26 were seen for the first time. A total of 43 cases were orthopaedic and 16 paediatric.

### STUDY TIME—DO'S AND DON'TS



The Perfect Picture of Study Two Things Wrong Here

IN YOUR first days back to school, before you learn anything else, learn how to study. These words of wisdom are not only approved by educators, but they will be recognized immediately by all students as having the ring of good, common sense. There are right and wrong ways to study, as Jeannie Beacham, Hollywood starlet demonstrates in these pictures.

The picture at the desk shows the proper way to study. The room should be well ventilated and there should be as few distractions as possible. The phonograph Jeannie has beside her is played only when she takes a break between study subjects. If the phonograph would be otherwise distracting, it should be removed.

The student's position should not be too comfortable, but it should not be strained. But the lighting is very important according to the Marine Company research service and should not shine directly into the eye or be seen from the corner of the eye. Neither should there be a glare on the page you are reading.

Jeannie is violating two common-sense rules for studying. The light is very poor—in fact the book is in a shadow—and she is too comfortably ensconced in an easy chair. 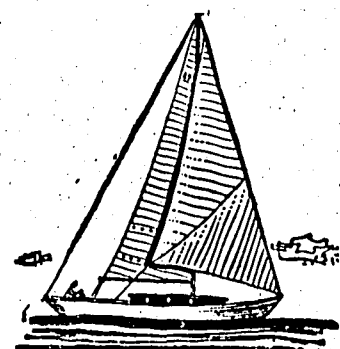

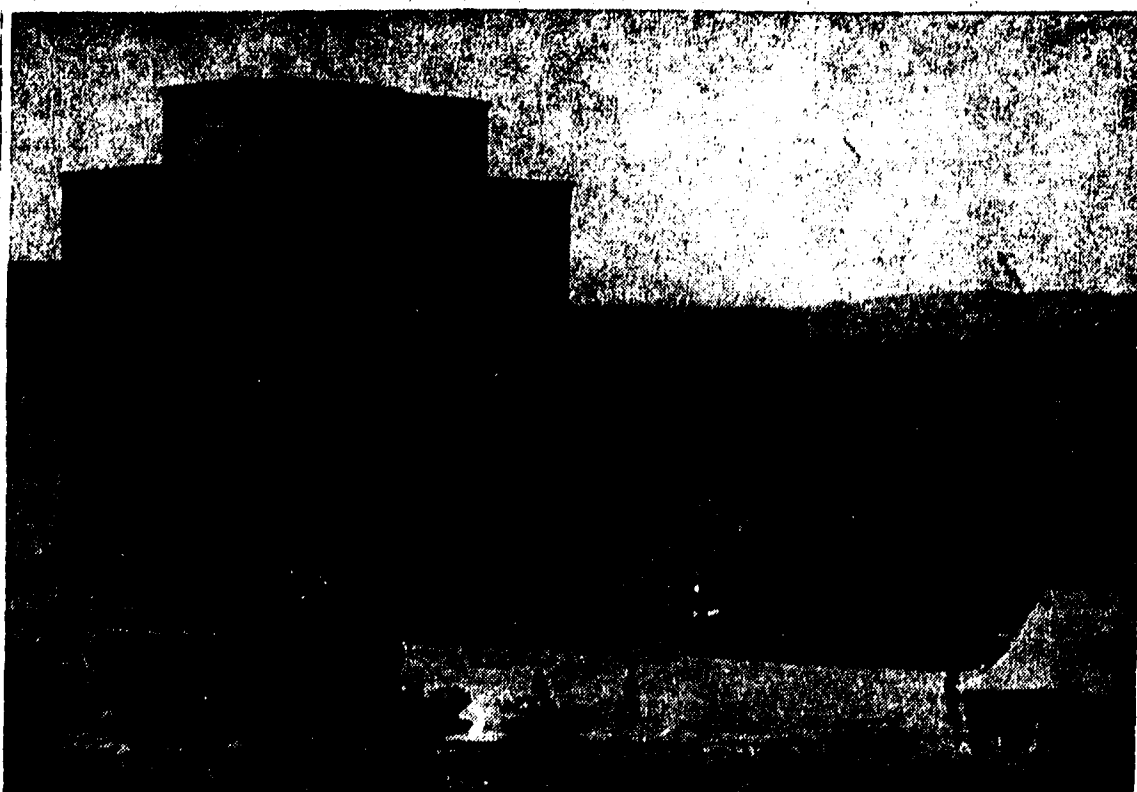

We went to the beach on Sunday. It was a beach where we had never been before. It was warm and sandy. We had a little swim, a little picnic, took some photographs, and started a painting. It was very pleasant, but we were haunted by the feeling that there will not be many more picnics on the beach this year. The goldenrod is blooming. There is butter-n-eggs along the ditches, and the uncut hay has turned yellow. Summer is almost over.

I wonder why people feel sad to see summer go. It seems to me that in some half conscious way, we equate summer with youth. We are rejuvenated with the opening of the new leaves, and we spend all summer basking in the joyful, young warmth of the sun. With the falling of the leaves, a part of us falls too, and we hibernate, and lie dormant until we can come to life with another spring.

This is not quite true, of course. One joy of fall is that so many things begin again. School starts, colleges open, the choir starts practising, we are all home from our vacations, and that busy dizzy round of comparing notes, and having parties, and teas, and dinner guests starts again. We have lazy evenings to read, and think and the frost to clear our brains, and give us ideas.

Since June, I have actually only invited one person to my house for coffee — or for anything else. Of course the impromptu visitors always come and go, but one day I actually picked up the telephone and invited someone to come. After I hung up the telephone that day I remembered I did not have anything in the house to feed my guest, nor even the makings for a good sandwich. I had smoked oysters, but no fancy crackers, then suddenly, I hit on this idea which I thought was so good that I would pass it on to you. Here it is:

## Oyster Fancies

Cut rounds of bread with a cookie cutter. Butter, and broil until golden. Slice up one can of smoked oysters, place one or two thin slices on each toast round, sprinkle with parsley flakes, and dot with the merest drop of tomato catsup to give color. Arrange on a plate and serve.

I have been thinking about money lately — don't we all. I have been thinking of some of the good things which don't need money. I am not talking about health, happiness or the stars at night — I mean real things which enrich our lives, but do not cost much.

First on the list comes paper back books. Have you ever realized how many really good books come in paper back versions? Nearly all the classics, ancient and modern. You can get good paper bound dictionaries, well illustrated books on art for \$1.00 or less, and even atlases. You can read all the major modern playwrights in paper-backs, as well as the plays of the ancient Greek and some Roman authors. Books on medicine, philosophy, psychology, and religion by the great thinkers of the past and present are all available through paper backs. Most of us never read the best sellers while they are still on the list. As soon as they come off, they are out in paper backs. Admittedly, many of the better paper backs are not in the 35c range, but a great deal of good reading can be bought for \$1.00, which would be four times that much in hard-bound editions.

There are still bargains in food too. Two of the best are fish and liver. Please do not turn up your nose. Here is a recipe for liver, which is cheap, simple, and delicious.

## Poor Man's Goose

| 1 1/4 lbs. beef or pork liver | 5 medium onions, slices   |
| 2 tablespoons bacon fat       | 5 medium potatoes, slices |

Cut liver into serving size pieces. Brown lightly in hot fat, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place browned liver and fat in the bottom of a large casserole. Add onions, then potatoes. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, top with bacon, cover, and bake for 1 hour in a 350 degree oven. Remove cover and bake for 15 more minutes to brown bacon. This will make about 5 servings.

Here is a cheap, and absolutely gourmet soup. It takes a long time, but is easy. Do not be disappointed at its watery quality, if you are used to thick potato soup. The taste is marvelous.

Put all these in a pot, bring to a boil, then simmer at the lowest heat which will continue the cooking for one hour. This is very important. The flavor depends on length of cooking. Mash with fork. Season to taste.

Just before serving, stir in 2 tablespoons softened butter, some parsley flakes.

I can think of several other good material things which cost very little, but if I am going to have onion and potato soup I had better start it, and if you're going to have it, you'd better run. Bye. See you soon.

by each were given. Names of accounts in excess of \$50 payable by the municipality were read with figures, date of cheque mailed to Mental Health Association was given as requested. The answers to questions submitted revealed that no school properties were sold by the municipality in 1962 and listed the number still to be sold as of January 1, 1963.

A brief is to be presented to the Digby Municipal School Board with a request that the answers be made available to each member of the Digby County Ratepayers Association. The time element seemed important and it was to be requested that an answer come from the Municipal School Board by September 30 if possible and convenient. Questions sought from the school board as read in the brief on Thursday night included:

1. (a) The names and annual salaries of all employees in all positions, including school teachers, school bus drivers, school garage employees, janitors, etc., who earned in excess of \$500.00 (Five Hundred) in 1962, who were paid or partially paid out of Municipal or School Taxes. (b) The names and amounts owing, if any, of all persons who are in arrears of taxes to the Municipality, also all persons included in (a).

2. The total amount paid for

or partially paid for from School Taxes for school buses and other motor vehicles in the past 5 years; the parties from whom they were purchased and the amounts paid for same to each party.

3. The amount of money spent for tires, oil and gas, furnace oil for schools in the past 5 years. The parties from whom they were purchased and the amounts paid for same to each party.

4. The procedure the Board uses in disposing of used tires and lawn mowers; if these are sold, in what manner — i.e., by public tender, etc.

Another question which the ratepayers said had been in the original brief was added on Thursday night to the one read and was to be submitted to the School Board. This question sought information on all insurance on school buses and on other school property purchased over the past five years, the amounts and from whom the insurance was purchased. Eugene Morrissey, of Weymouth, complained that he was unable to get the information about insurance from the School Board and had written to the Department of Education to find out whether the records of school boards were open for inspection of a ratepayer of a municipality. He also requested information whether a ratepayer or parent of a child riding to and from school on a school bus had the right to see the insurance

polices covering the buses and if a ratepayer has a right to inspect the records of the school board and which act or acts governs this. He quoted the reply from the deputy minister of education, H. P. Moffatt which said:

"There is no specific provision in the education act governing this point and I do not know of any general provision in the statutes which enables a ratepayer to have access at any time to reports of the municipality or any of its committees or boards."

The letter from the deputy minister advised that as a ratepayer Mr. Morrissey was entitled to attend the annual meeting of the Municipal Council where the financial report of the municipality is given and also a report of the Municipal School Board is presented and there he could ask questions relating to the financing of the municipality and school board. The same Mr. Moffatt stated in his letter applies to the inspection of the insurance policy covering school buses. He also stated that the Motor Carrier Act prescribes the type of insurance policy that must be taken by each municipal school board on the school bus or bus operated by them to provide adequate protection.

Mr. Morrissey appeared dissatisfied with his reply from the department of education and quoted from the municipal act, page 41, chapter 7, article

105, which reads:

"The books, assessment rolls, records and accounts of the municipality shall be open at all reasonable hours and without payment of any fee to the inspection of any ratepayer of the municipality and of the officers and arbitration committees of any city or incorporated town which is required to pay any amount under Section 151. RSC 185 S. 100."

Heated discussion and arguments dominated the meeting regarding municipal matters, Digby Municipal Council meetings and the fact that members of the executive of the Digby Ratepayers Association should not have a conflict of interests.

The president who refused to act on the suggestion he resign said that the Digby Ratepayers Association was not set up with the purpose of antagonizing the municipal council, the ratepayers or anyone else but to try to get answers to questions of interest and try to help the municipality to progress. He felt the type of meeting which was held tonight (Thursday night) was detrimental to industry locating in the area for industry is not inclined to locate amongst turmoil.

The meeting amidst considerable argumentative discussion adjourned, to be called for the first Thursday in October, which meeting is to be advertised in the local newspaper for two weeks previous.

afterwards between Boston and Halifax, Mr. Craig shared the field for a time with F. O. J. Smith, and the rivalries of the two men constitute an interesting chapter in the history of news gathering.

When, in 1849, the telegraph line from Boston was completed to Calais, Me., Mr. Craig established a pony news express, covering the hundred and fifty miles between Halifax and Digby, N. S., and engaged an express steamer thence fifty miles across the Bay of Fundy to St. John, N. B. This enabled him to distance competition and put in his power to demand extravagant prices for his budgets of news. It also earned for him the position of European news agent of the New York Express.

Mr. Craig remained at Halifax in charge of the press and commercial trans-Atlantic telegraph business until 1851, when he removed to New York, and thoroughly organized the Associated Press service, which may be said to have been the parent of all the news agencies which have had an existence to the present day.

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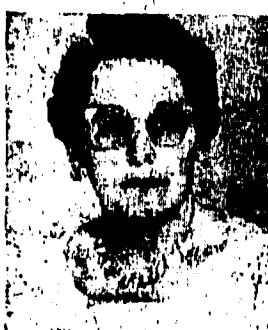

School opened in Digby on Tuesday. New faces have appeared among the students and the teachers. In many cases it seemed strange and different not to see the familiar faces of some teachers. Particularly there were missed from the Digby schools four teachers who chose to retire from the profession last year. Each had taught long enough in the Digby schools

to have become part of the institution in town, each had become a part delightfully looked for as the school bell rang on the opening day of school for several or many years back. On Tuesday the familiar faces of Mrs. Eva Wendell, Miss Lillian McRae, Melford Thurber and Baden Powell were not seen, for they had each and all earned for themselves joyful retirement.

not so much because of the material possessions they had acquired but through their long and faithful services to the youth of our land. Together they had given more than one hundred and fifty years to moulding characters and guiding footsteps in various schools, for next to parents, few have such influence on the character of a child or few make such an impression as does the school teacher. Each in his or her own way casts an influence; each from his or her own experiences imparts and reveals, adding to the knowledge and experiences of the charge. The four teachers who retired from Digby School last Spring each have made their impression on the students from their own varied lives.

### Mrs. Wendell

Mrs. Eva Wendell (nee Whitman) was born in North Williamston in Annapolis County around the turn of the century. She attended the country school there until she reached Grade X. The next two grades were taken at Lawrencetown school. At the time Grade XII was not taught there. Right from high school she was granted a permissive license so at the ripe old age of 16 years she found herself in command instead of being commanded. The next year she wrote a set of papers to obtain Minimum Professional Qualifications and as a result obtained a 'D' License. Three years afterwards she entered Acadia University as a Freshman but was only able to get credit for the First Term's work on account of illness.

After 7 years of teaching she decided to try some other field of work so she went to live in U.S.A. There she married and her son was born. Longing to take up her old profession she returned to Nova Scotia. While teaching she studied Grade XII and then graduated from Provincial Normal College. Then came a series of Summer Schools at Acadia University — seven in all. At this point she had only to complete the Second Term's work of the courses taken years before this so she decided to take 4 months leave of absence from Centre School in Yarmouth to complete her degree. This is when she made the headlines for her son Bill had entered Acadia University that year. The Halifax Herald and the Toronto Daily Star both featured articles under the heading, "Mother and Son attend University together." It was even copied by one of the Boston papers.

Mrs. Wendell was granted a B.A. Degree from Acadia University in 1942. Up to this time she had taught 9 years in various miscellaneous schools in Nova Scotia, 9 years as principal of schools of two departments, two of which were Barton-Brighton and Weymouth North, and 6 years in Central School in Yarmouth. Next she went to teach in the High School at Middleton. While there she became particularly interested in Guidance so after 5 years she registered her position there and registered for a Master of Arts Degree in Guidance at Columbia University. On graduation from there she took a position on the staff of Digby Regional High School. On her retirement in June 1963 she had been connected with the Digby Schools for 15 years.

During these years of teaching and studying, of shaping the lives of young people from many homes, Mrs. Wendell was also guiding her own son through the formative years, through adolescence into manhood. With much comfort and satisfaction she can look to her son, Bill, now living with his wife and three children (ages 8 to 13 years) in Canton Mass. 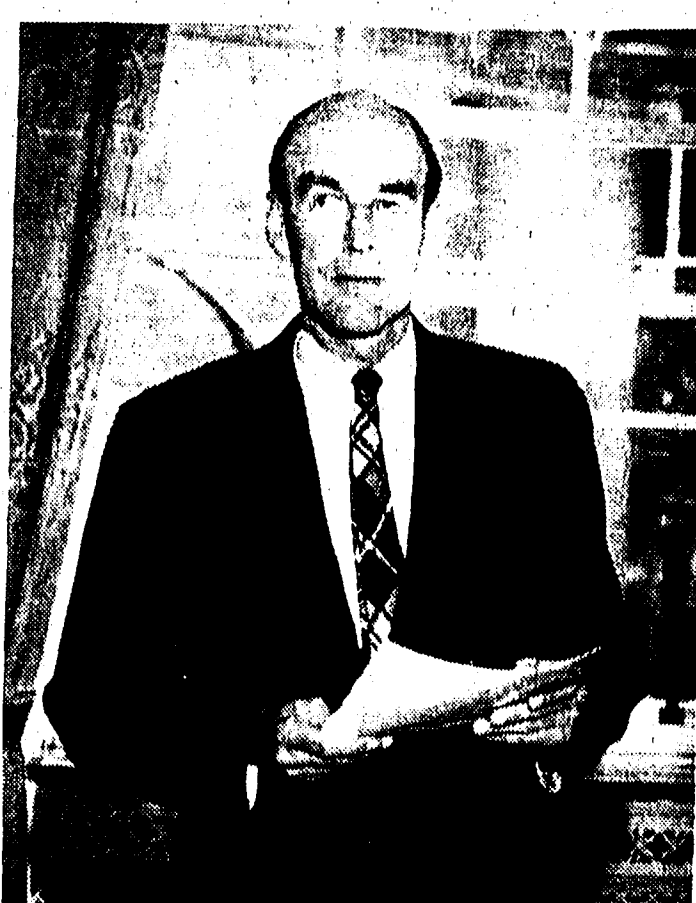
## New Corporal Arrives

## Service Of Witness At Trinity

On Tuesday, September 10, a Deanery Service of Witness will be held in Trinity Church, Digby. Attending this service will be the clergy of Annapolis Deanery, together with their choirs and congregations. The special speaker will be the Right Reverend Ronald Bryan Bishop of Barrachpore in India.

Bishop Bryan, who is an Irishman, is regarded as one of the great orators of the church today. Recently he was one of the delegates attending the Anglican Congress held in Toronto. During his visit to Nova Scotia, Bishop Bryan will be addressing two other gatherings, one in Wolfville and the other in Halifax.

It is anticipated that a very large congregation from the Parishes in Annapolis Deanery will be attending the service, which will begin at 8 p.m. In view of the many important matters discussed at the Congress, among them integration and church reunion, it is felt that people who are not Anglicans will wish to hear Bishop Bryan; and the Courier has been told that a very warm welcome awaits anybody who wishes to attend this service.

Mr. Stanfield will be leading his party for the fifth time and was seeking a third consecutive victory. He formed his first administration in November, 1956, after winning 24 of the 43 seats in the House. In 1960 he won 27 seats.

Issuance of the writ for a general election automatically cancelled the writ issued for a by-election in Annapolis East — that vote to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of PC member Hanson Dowell has been scheduled for October 8.

In his announcement the Premier said:

"The Government of Nova Scotia has concluded that this autumn will be a good time for the voters of this province to decide what government they wish for the next few years."

"So far as we can now see, Nova Scotians will be able to concentrate attention on their own affairs this autumn without distractions such as a federal election."

"In view of the instability of the present House of Commons this might not be true for 1964."

"A general election this autumn will also avoid the necessity of the people of Annapolis East going through a by-election this October and then a general election six months or so later."

Regarding the matter of taxation, Mr. Stanfield stated that "the government had decided after studying its potential revenues during last winter and spring, that we could and would go through the current fiscal year and the next fiscal year without changes in provincial taxation."

The decision at that time had been based on the outlook for revenues of the years in question — to the end of March, 1965 — "and we see no reason to change."

The election called for October 8 will be the first time voters will use their franchise under the new Elections Act of 1962.

There is provision for proxy voting by fishermen, mariners, persons in certain hospitals and full-time students. There is provision for a person to vote if he is 21 years old by election day — under the old act one had to be 21 on the day enumerated. A person may vote if he is living in the polling division on the date of the issuance of the election writ — in this case August 29.

Polls will remain open to 7 p.m. instead of closing at 6 p.m. and the presiding officer will be required to take the names of all persons waiting in line outside at closing time so that they may be admitted to vote.

Lists of voters will not be posted on lamp posts or trees. Instead they will be mailed to voters.

Neither will the traditional election proclamation be posted in public. Instead it will be "posted" in the daily and weekly press. Election documents will be mailed to party headquarters, giving recognition to parties for the first time.

## Writes From North

E. Douglas Woodman of Saint John wrote from the ship C.C.G. Nanook, Resolute Bay, North West Territories, to thank The Digby Courier for a recent story published about him and to order some extra copies. A hurried postscript to the letter reports they had to be transferred to the ice-breaker C.C.G.S. John A. MacDonald as the Nanook started to leak and had to be escorted back to Halifax. The Nanook is a plain cargo ship.

Mr. Woodman, formerly of Conway, told of the field of ice 40 miles wide and 150 miles long in which they were caught. Six ships were in the number, the Nanook, John A. MacDonald, C. D. Howe, J. Edmond Simard, Federal Pioneer, Helga Dan, ice breakers, freighters and tankers.

Mr. Woodman reports this to be the most exciting trip of the six he has made to the North, with planes circling about daily to see how they are making out. They were at the time located 100 miles from their base in Resolute Bay on Cornwallis Island and were in Lancaster Sound the exact waterway named in The Northwest Passage.

On board the Nanook was another Digby County man, Captain Charles Melanson, chief mate and navigator.

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## Water Act Proclaimed

Hon. W. S. Kennedy Jones, Minister Under the Water Act, said recently that amendments of Dr. Bates would en-

able the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick governments to work closely together in matters affecting water resources.

Other members of the three-man authority are Armand F. Wigglesworth, Liverpool, and Alexander J. MacDonald, Sydney River.

Mr. Wigglesworth, who is to be a member and general manager of the Water Authority, has served for seventeen years as the superintendent of the water and electric utilities for the town of Liverpool.

From 1940 to 1945, he was a member of the RCAF and is currently the director of the civil defence organization for both the town of Liverpool and the County of Queens. He is the public information officer of the Emergency Measures Organization of Nova Scotia.

Mr. Wigglesworth is commander of the 14th Field Regiment, of the Reserve Army, president of the Queen's County Red Cross, and chairman of the Liverpool Regional High School Board.

Mr. MacDonald was born and educated in East Bay, Cape Breton, and spent four years in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. He is a member of the Sydney Board of Trade, Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Royal Cape Breton Yacht Club and a Past Grand Knight of the Sydney Council, Knights of Columbus.

Mr. Jones announced the personnel of the Advisory Board, and among them is Merrill Prime, formerly of Freeport, representing the Department of Lands and Forests.

A municipality or person contemplating the establishment of water or sewer works, as well as altering or extending existing works, must submit plans, specifications and an engineer's report of the works to be undertaken, to the Authority. No works are to be undertaken until they have received the approval of the Minister under the Water Act and the Minister of Public Health.

According to the Act, no municipality or person may discharge or deposit material of any kind into a water course where pollution may result, and the quality of water be impaired.

The appointment of Dr. John Bates, of Fredericton, as chairman of the Nova Scotia Water Authority was also announced by Mr. Jones.

Dr. Bates is chairman of the New Brunswick Water Authority and will continue to act in this capacity.

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## Minister Of Agriculture



The Honorable Harry Hays, who became federal minister of agriculture on April 22, 1963, is an internationally known breeder, exporter and auctioneer of purebred livestock.

Mr. Hays has served as mayor of Calgary since 1959.

His interest in cattle export business began in 1932 when he became Alberta fieldman with the Holstein-Friesian Association of Alberta. A year later he became the first Canadian to ship purebred dairy cattle to Britain, and in following years, to several other countries.

In 1945, as president of Hays Farms Limited in Ontario, he became the first cattle exporter to ship by air. The cattle were flown from Toronto to Cuba.

Hays Farms Limited also was the first in North America to export cattle to Spain and Italy.

Prior to assuming office as mayor, Mr. Hays in an average year travelled some 35,000 miles, selling \$2 million worth of livestock.

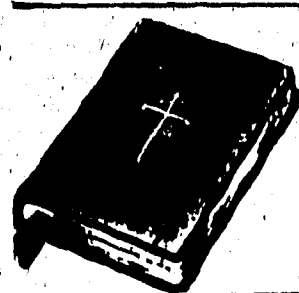

Navy. His Bachelor in Civil Engineering from the Nova Scotia Technical College was received the same year that his mother was granted an M.A. from Columbia. That Mrs. Wendell's son also shared in the recognition of his mother's services given so unstintingly to himself, other children and young people, was noted when he flew home to attend a banquet tendered the four retiring teachers by the school boards.

Life will not be a boring retirement for Mrs. Wendell. Wherever she sees a need for a guiding hand or an encouraging word, Mrs. Wendell automatically will be studying the situation and coming up with a solution to a problem or steering the course toward some goal. Besides, Mrs. Wendell will now devote more time to her special hobbies of music and gardening. We expect, too, that she will continue being active in church and other organizations as she had been along with her teaching duties. She is P.M. of St. Mary's Chapter No. 35, O.E.S., Past President of the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society, member of the choir of the Digby United Baptist Church and a Sunday School teacher.

### Miss McRae

Miss Lillian McRae completed forty-two years of teaching, twenty-seven of which had been in Grade III in Digby, when she retired in June. Miss McRae was born in Springhill, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Colin McRae. She attended school in Springhill where her father was minister for twenty years.

It is strange how some incidental thing will change the course of a person's career or life. With Miss McRae it was the fact that she was requested during her high school years to substitute at teaching one day. Miss McRae then discovered that she liked to teach and that she especially loved children. Otherwise Miss McRae might have followed her earlier plans of being a nurse.

Having satisfied herself that she had found her vocation, Miss McRae headed for Truro to attend the Provincial Normal College following high school. She later returned to Springhill where she taught for nine years. Following this she spent one year in the United States visiting relatives and working as a governess in a private family. The pay was good but it lacked the atmosphere and satisfaction of public school teaching, so Miss McRae returned to Nova Scotia to the town of Middleton. There she spent six years in Grades V and VI. The next twenty-seven years in Digby make up forty-three teaching years.

My plans from here are indefinite as yet, Miss McRae answered to our query. At present Miss McRae does not participate in outside activities to a great extent, having found teaching in the past few years taxing on strength, energy and time. Earlier she had devoted many years to Sunday School teaching, Young People's work and Mission Band, to which she devoted ten years in the United Church of Canada. A member of that church, she also did choir work in the various places she lived and taught.

### Mr. Powell

The life of Baden Powell, who retired from teaching last Spring, is so varied with accomplishments and interests that one must wonder how he managed to squeeze into it thirty-seven years of school teaching. However, ask any of his students, any of his colleagues, and you'll hear that his teaching had never suffered because of other interests or accomplishments.

But let us start at the time when Baden Powell first saw the light of day. It was at Westport, N. S., on Brier Island and the most westerly point of Nova Scotia, where this son was born to the late Captain and Mrs. Byard Powell. Maybe this son of a sea captain and his wife could not help turning to school teaching sometime in his life. His grandfather, Willoughby Powell, was the first school teacher to teach on Long Island. He came there from Nictaux, N. S., if we have understood correctly, and built his own school on the island. Mr. Powell's (Baden) early schooling was obtained in the villages of Little River, Freeport and Tiverton for at various stages of his life he lived in these villages.

Mr. Powell's teaching took him to the provinces of Manitoba and Alberta besides Nova Scotia. In Nova Scotia Mr. Powell taught academic subjects in Ashmore and Weymouth North. He then turned

to Industrial Arts for his next teaching period and this was first done in the Digby-Annapolis Circuit, from 1938 to 1962 he taught Industrial Arts in Digby.

Teaching alone did not satisfy the talents of Mr. Powell. While in the West he did freelance writing, mostly in short stories and articles. During these years he wrote for the Manitoba Free Press, Farm and Ranch Review, Canadian Countryman, Canadian Magazine, Family Herald and Weekly Star and the Western Home Monthly.

It was at Weymouth where Mr. Powell started his play writing. Here he produced two 3 act plays, one of which was put on in Digby before Mr. Powell served with the Canadian Armed Forces overseas. While serving on the teaching staff in Digby, Mr. Powell produced a one act play practically every year. These were dramatized by the students of the school, presented before large audiences in the school auditorium and at times won trophies in the Western Nova Scotia Student's Congress Drama.

Probably the most significant of Mr. Powell's writings while he was teaching was his mathematics course which was given provincial Grade XI credit in place of the Grade XI academic course. Subjects included in Mr. Powell's courses accepted for school work are motor mechanics, electronics, woodworking and drafting. Besides his teaching career, Mr. Powell served for five years with the Royal Canadian Army overseas and was mentioned in despatches in the Italian Campaign with the 1st Canadian Survey Regiment, R.C.A.

And what are your future plans? We asked Mr. Powell. How do you plan to spend these leisure hours of retirement? We queried. Maybe retirement was the wrong word to use. It might be more to the point to say what will you do for a change? Retirement is at his home in Plympton where Mr. Powell finds no hobby more pleasant than working on the farm in a small way, often selling some of his prize vegetables from a roadside stand. But, Mr. Powell will again supervise the Adult Education at DRHS and Vocational Education courses, too, just as he did in his full time teaching days. Actually Mr. Powell has only retired from a "full-time" teaching career for he goes back to his same location in the Industrial Arts room to supervise one day a week.

How else will Mr. Powell fill in his leisure (?) days of retirement? Well, he intends to keep up his free lance writing of feature stories on Digby Municipality as have been appearing in the Chronicle-Herald and other publications. Most of these are about small steamboats or rather personalities in the shipping arena.

Added to these Mr. Powell has the honor of being president of the Digby County Progressive Conservative Association which job if true to course can be time consuming during these pre-election days. Mr. Powell at one time was president of the Industrial Arts Association of the Province and also was president of the Digby Home and School Association for a number of years.

Mr. Powell is married to the former Rae Hankinson, of Weymouth. Their two daughters are (Dorothy) Mrs. W. P. Teddie, of Missouri, U.S.A., and (Janet) Mrs. George Mutch, Kentville, N. S. They have 5 grandchildren.

### Mr. Thurber

Melford Thurber, now retired with Mrs. Thurber to their home in Freeport, N. S., had given 33 years of service to the teaching profession. Going back to Freeport was going back to his childhood home. Here he grew up and became educated in the village school.

After graduating from the Freeport High School he entered the Provincial Normal College. His first teaching position was in St. John's, Saskatchewan, for one year, then to Langenburg, Sask., for three years.

Coming back to Nova Scotia he attended Dalhousie University and received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1930. After receiving his degree he went to Montreal and taught for one year at the High School of Montreal, returning to Nova Scotia again to take the position as principal of the Freeport school for three years. He had then taught at the Digby school for four years. When World War II broke out he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Navy as instructor to the new entries, teaching math and physics. ## Dr. Curtis Opens Exhibition

The Digby County Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition was officially opened last week by Dr. S. L. Curtis, Director of Animal and Poultry Services at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, Truro, and who will now become Professor of Animal Science and Director of the Diploma Course. Dr. Curtis is also chairman of the Association of Exhibitors for the Maritime Provinces.

This exhibition should be a picture of what is happening in agriculture here, said Dr. Curtis. This is a demonstration of your work, he continued, is it to your satisfaction? We must take time, he said, to study what others are doing, but too often we stand too much in the shadow of others and say that somebody else does better than we can do. We have much to offer, he said, and must work with a steadfast purpose to make the Digby County Exhibition better for the good of the County and ourselves. This, he said, will need united effort.

People are demanding better products all the time, Dr. Curtis said, and the best product must be put before the public. Even if Digby County is not the best for agriculture it can be made better and give leadership to other parts of the province.

He spoke about the small fruit industry which might be developed in Digby County and Annapolis County which are right in the heart of the area which lends itself to production of small fruits.

Dr. Curtis showed concern over the decrease in livestock raised in Nova Scotia during the past thirty to fifty years.

The opening program was chaired by William LeForte, agricultural agent for Digby County. Other speakers were Mrs. J. M. Wallis, V. G. Cardoza, MLA, Peter Nicholson, MLA, and Chipman Chisholm, secretary-manager of the exhibition.

Mrs. Wallis congratulated the women on the renovations and new ideas they had brought to the exhibition and the committees in general for their renewed effort and success. She urged the expansion of the exhibition to embrace more area and more industries. We cannot, she said, let the Digby County Exhibition slip back, neither can we let it stand still. There is only one way to go and that is forward. To do this, Mrs. Wallis said, needs cooperation from everyone. By helping the exhibition, she said, we help industry and by helping industry we help ourselves.

Mr. Cardoza traced the history of the exhibition since 1873 and the tremendous growth during the years. He said the Digby County Exhibition is a show place for Digby County farmers and it could also be that for commercial and industrial firms. Speaking of agriculture, he felt there was great potential in Digby County.

Mr. Nicholson extended congratulations and best wishes and said the exhibitions are not only a means of fun by getting together and a show place for agricultural products but they are places of healthy competition and a means of learning more about the business in which the people are engaged.

A talent show followed the official opening when Susan Potter took first prize in the primary for a piano solo and Carol Ann Isles took second for a vocal solo accompanied by the guitar. Dixie Lee Sanford took 1st in the intermediate when she did the twist and the pantomime by Lorraine Dunn came second. Luc Gerleigs was the winner in the senior group. ## Digby County Born Minister Passes

Rev. Handley C. Mullen, 77, a minister of the Reformed Baptist Church for fifty years, passed away at the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, on August 26, following a stroke. He had been a resident of Port Maitland, N. S., for the past eight years.

Born at Easton, Digby Co., N. S., in 1886, son of Hartsorne and Mary (Sabean) Mullen, Mr. Mullen was ordained to the Christian ministry in 1913 at Beulah Camp, Brown's Flat, N. B. Married the same year to Ethel Ring Sabine, Riverview, Digby Co., N. S., he and Mrs. Mullen celebrated their fiftieth anniversary on July 30 of this year.

Funeral service was held at the Reformed Baptist Church, Havelock, N. S., on August 29, the pastor of the church, Rev. Marvin Durling, officiating. Words of tribute were spoken by Rev. H. B. Ricker, Digby, N. S., and by Rev. G. R. Symonds, Marysville, N. B. Others taking part included Rev. Jack Dow, Port Maitland, N. B., Rev. N. E. Trafton, Yarmouth, N. S., and Rev. F. A. Watson, Marysville, N. B. Among the many friends and relatives attending the funeral were twenty-three Reformed Baptist ministers, as well as several of other denominations. Interment was in the Havelock Cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Ethel R. Mullen, Port Maitland, N. S.; two daughters, Mrs. K. E. Sullivan (Helen), Wollaston, Mass., and Mrs. H. R. Young (Ethel), Los Angeles, California; four sons, Dr. Wilbur H. Mullen, Wollaston, Mass., Vernon W. Mullen, Kuching, Sarawak, Rev. Laurence K. Mullen, Woodstock, N. B., and Bernard A. Mullen, Binatang, Sarawak; twelve grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Mullen held pastorates in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Maine, eleven pastorates in all. He served two terms as pastor at Hartland, N. B., and at Beals, Maine, his second term at Beals being his last pastorate, which concluded in 1955. He was a writer of religious tracts, having had a number published, and always took a keen interest in public affairs, both religious and secular.

Until his final illness, Mr. Mullen was very interested in outdoor life and activity. Always a naturalist, he loved to graft trees, read natural history, and observe wildlife. It was during his pastorate at Seal Cove, Grand Manan, N. B., in 1925, that Mr. Mullen noted the absence of birch partridge (ruffed grouse) on the island. Come in and listen to the deafening silence.  
Is it quiet in your house today too?

They have started back to school. Except for a few minor changes in the style of their clothes, and in their equipment, they looked like children have looked on the first day of school for a hundred generations. Their mothers had combed their hair in the fervent hope that it would stay neat until this afternoon. Their clothes were newly bought, made or dry-cleaned for the occasion. Their pencils had not yet been sharpened, their note books were free of blots or smudges, and their erasers had not yet been drilled with the point of a pencil, or cut in pieces to throw at friends, and/or enemies. (At this age friends and enemies are frequently the same people.)

Some mothers, particularly those with children on their way to school for the first time are aware of a gaping hiatus in their day — a silence which has never been there before. A few more experienced mothers are blissfully aware of a few extra minutes during the day when they can think their own thoughts and are responsible to no bloody noses or skinned knees.

Some of the children are experienced too. This is their day to renew old acquaintances, and take up dropped threads. To some it will be the first great wrench from home. To some it will be a great adventure, to some another year of major or minor, athletic, academic or social successes. Some are dreading another year of the struggle. Last year someone told my little six-year-old neighbor that grade one was much harder than kindergarten, and he lived a whole summer in a state of dread, but school had only been started a few days when he announced to his mother that grade one might be harder, but it was "funner".

There are so many ways in which a child's enjoyment of, and success in, school are dependent on his parents. It is the parent's job to keep the child in good health. He should have had a complete physical examination before he started school, not neglecting his eyes and teeth. His meals will have to be well-balanced and nutritious to provide all the energy he will be burning. He will need plenty of sleep. Beginners are not too old for ten to twelve hours, preferably in a darkened room.

Your child's physical appearance and motor skills are very important to him, and to his scholastic success. Children prefer other children who are neat and attractive. Their hair should be simple but becoming, clothes neat and practical. If he can do his own buttons, comb his own hair, and tie his own shoes his self-confidence and self-respect will be greatly increased. If his motor development is at least equal to his fellows, he will be much happier than if he has been "helped" to the extent that he cannot do things for himself.

His use of speech should be as good as possible. Many parents permit "baby-talk" to quite an age, because they think it cute. It is a grave handicap to the child in school. A child who has been used to intelligent talk, who has been read to, whose parents have listened to what he has said and have answered him when he spoke — in sentences, not words, is well on his way to reading before he even knows his letters. Any child starting school should be able to say his full name, address and telephone number.

A child who has had the chance to play with other children close to his own age has an advantage starting school, but if he has been encouraged to be polite and friendly with people of all ages he will be doing alright. If he has lived secure in his parents' affection, had a well defined place in the family group, and has had a few regular chores and duties at home, his relationships with people are almost sure to be pretty healthy.

Some young children acutely aware of their new independence, tend to treat school as something very private and precious. If this happens, his attitude should be respected. If you must know something, ask his teacher. This phase, if it happens at all, usually passes very quickly, and you will soon be swamped with examples of your pride and joy's "work", and you will have tuneless songs drummed into your ears until your head reels. Praise his efforts and go easy on criticism. He will thrive on praise.

The best incentive to learning is learning itself. It is unfortunate, but most people do not find out until their school days are over, that perhaps the greatest joy in life is learning for the fun of finding things out, not to earn gold stars, high marks or even praise or approval. If you can encourage your child to learn for the pure joy of opening up this wonderful world around him you have done something very few people can accomplish, but you will both be richly rewarded.

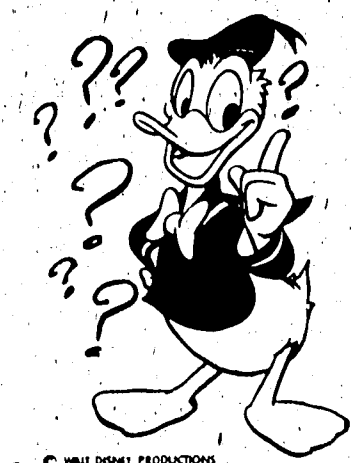

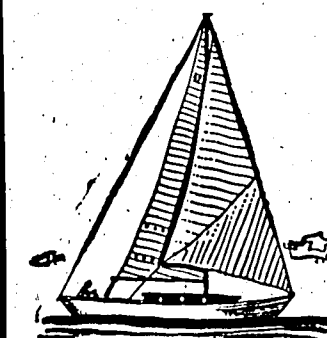

## Why We Need School Music

The answer to this question depends upon our desire (or lack of desire) for a full and richly rewarding life for our children. Of course someone will say, "I can easily enjoy such a life without music" and the musician would colloquize in reply, "I got news for you!"

We have no idea of the immense part which music plays in our lives until we examine the matter in some detail. It would be extremely difficult to imagine for example, a church without organ, choir and singing congregation; a home without a child's lullaby, a mother humming or singing about her daily work or even the bathtub which never hears the vigorous vocal exercises of the male member of the family. Can you envisage a world in which men and women never sing? A world without one single musical instrument? Can you imagine radio and TV with nothing but the spoken word? How many of the best productions of the movie world contain no music? Only one English language film in twenty is produced without music. Granted it is "background" music in many cases but without it, many films and plays would lose their whole range of dynamic emotional impact. The Hollywood film industry realized the value of this impact many years ago, and at least one tenth of the production costs of a modern film is used to provide background music.

Now, I can hear some person say, "Oh that's alright, but I still say I can get along very well in life without music". I say to that person, and I say to you that Riley's donkey lived very well without food - until she died.

The school-music programme is only a small part of the academic whole. In Nova Scotia we do not recognize it as part of what we call the "Foundation Programme". All music is therefore taught in all Nova Scotia schools as a direct result of the public's recognition of music as an essential part of the life of the community. No less than twenty-five full-time school music teachers are required throughout the Province, and the authorities are faced with an impossible task in meeting this need. In some countries the idea of advertising has been abandoned, since the situation is known to be hopeless. In some areas "permissive licenses" have been granted to private persons who possess some qualifications, to teach music on a part-time basis. In other schools, academic teachers with the ability to play some piano, are hired in preference to others. All this is because headmasters, school inspectors, supervisors and many other persons in the education field, realize that music is something more than a "frill", — an extra. They know that it is a vital educational force, bringing together all the elements of many of the kindred subjects such as poetry, literature, language, history, geography and, on the higher planes of school-life, philosophy and psychology. Music is no longer regarded as a social grace, and if we in the smaller communities are to bring our children up with even the basic needs of a liberal education, we cannot afford to neglect the musical advancement of our young people.

We look disparagingly upon the advancing threat of communism. We scorn the ideologies of countries behind the iron curtain. We are smug about state control and mass direction of educational and cultural agencies, but we overlook one very vital and significant thing, that the socialist state, whether ideological or good or evil, provides for the teaching of school music, music-reference, and music history books are considered just as essential as the equivalent academic teaching equipment. School graduates in music receive state scholarships without application in just the same way as graduates in "regular" subjects. All this, in countries on the other side of the iron curtain.

Now let us consider for a moment, the gifted music student. Imagine your child as a talented musician by birth and environment, in a situation where there is no specified school-music course. On ethical grounds alone we transgress, by our treatment of this child the basic laws of human nature. If you are a Christian,

**Drive Carefully**

Jesus has a great deal to say on this subject. Look at St. Matthew, Chapter 25 at verse 14. The issue is stated there quite clearly and beyond any shadow of doubt, in the parable of the talents. The child is powerless to control the matter for himself. The responsibility is plainly that of the parent and teacher. Again, in the 29th verse of the same chapter, Jesus doesn't mince words on the subject. He states perfectly plainly that neglect in the matter of development of our gifts can only result in those gifts being taken from us.

Viewed from any standpoint, we must face up to our commitments. Our children, even if they are not musically gifted, need the artistic and cultural influence of music more than ever before. The general lowering of moral and cultural standards can be felt all around us, and the ennobling and dignifying influence of good music is the greatest single force for good that education can provide. After all, the academic subjects enlighten us. They provide the means of acquiring jobs and conducting the business and professional areas of our existence. Music, on the other hand provides all the elevating elements which normal subjects, by their very nature, cannot.

Music is conceived and composed by men of outstanding talents and merit; often by persons of acknowledged genius. Moreover it is the result, very often, of moods and states of high reverence and lofty and noble thought. It is said that when Handel was composing his great masterpiece "The Messiah", he spurned the meals brought in by his man servant for many days, and finally, during the writing of the Hallelujah Chorus, he was found by his servant in a state of trance. He was sitting transfixed before his manuscript with a look of great triumph on his face, and his servant entered he said, "I think I saw the whole of Heaven open up before me, and even the Great God Himself."

We need not necessarily view this from a religious point of view. Philosophically, music conceived in this state of mind must transcend the mere prosaic and mundane elements of man's existence. It therefore stands to reason that the teaching of such a literature in our schools is highly desirable and commendable.

Acadia University is presently negotiating with the education authorities with a view to meeting the demand for qualified school music teachers. The guidance personnel will be requested to seek out graduate students with musical training and background, and recommend the awarding of scholarships in music to any student successfully meeting the entrance requirements.

The Nova Scotia Department of Education recognizes the urgency of the situation. We at Acadia fully concur. The general public, by its action in filling, however inadequately, the teaching vacancies in the music programme, must also feel deeply that music is essential for our children.

Why do we need the school music teacher? I trust, we no longer need to ask that question.

## Do Parents Accuse Teenager Unjustly?

**THE WEEK'S LETTER:** "I have a teenage problem. I get along very well with my parents. They like me and say that they trust me. Yet, every time I go on a date, they always accuse me of doing things that I do not do. My father, particularly, accuses me of things I do not do. What can I do to convince them?"

**OUR REPLY:** It seems unlikely that parents would make blind accusations when they have absolutely nothing to go on. If this is true, then the parents are wrong. On the other hand, it is more likely that you are mistaking interrogation for accusation. Your parents have a right to know what you do when you are away from home. They have a right to ask—even a responsibility to ask. You are obligated to tell them—just as you are obligated to obey

them. Should they tell you not to go to a particular place, you must stay away from this place. If they tell you not to do something, don't do it.

Make it a policy to tell your parents exactly where you are going and what you will do there. Don't try to hide anything from them. Above all, don't lie to your parents. A little "fib" may seem the easy out sometimes, but this fib takes on big consequences when truth comes to light.

Here is one way to look at your problem: Your parents do have confidence in you or they would not permit you to date. They still have the responsibility to determine that you remain worthy of the confidence they place in you. Make them realize this is true by telling them the things you do without waiting for them to ask you if you did this or did that.

## A Trip Through The Valley

While their neighbours are spending expensive and exhausting vacations outside the province, many Nova Scotians are taking advantage of the numerous attractions in their own province for interesting and relaxing vacations this summer.

With its overall length only 374 miles, the province is also ideally suited for weekend excursion trips for the whole family. A trip from Halifax through the Annapolis Valley to Digby, for instance, is just under 150 miles but the countless historical and scenic attractions along the route would utilize many more hours than those needed to travel between the two points.

Following Route 1, the traveller would drive only 24 miles from Halifax before he came to the first point of interest on his itinerary. Uniacke House, at Mount Uniacke, contains the original early 19th century colonial furnishings it had when it was the magnificent home of Richard John Uniacke, an aristocratic Irish adventurer who became attorney-general of Nova Scotia in 1797. Open to visitors daily between the hours of 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. from June 1 to September 30, the residence on the beautiful grounds of a 5,000 acre estate is a favorite stopping place for those wishing to learn more of the province's early history.

Twenty miles from Mount Uniacke is Windsor, the first town in the beautiful Annapolis Valley: Windsor boasts the highest tides in the world, a nine-hole golf course, a community swimming pool, historic Fort Edward, and "Clifton", the home of jurist and humorist, Judge Thomas Chandler Haliburton, creator of "Sam Slick". Restored to its former elegance, "Clifton" is furnished with the original furniture and personal possessions of Judge Haliburton and is open to the public daily from June 1 to September 30. Windsor is also the site of the first permanent fair in North America and the fair still flourishes as a county exhibition, held annually in September.

The industrial-residential town of Hantsport, on the banks of the Avon River, will interest travellers with its well-equipped recreation grounds and swimming pool. Mid-way between this town and the university town of Wolfville, a side road leads to Grand Pre, site of the expulsion of the French Acadians from the province, and scene of Longfellow's "Evangeline". Visitors to Grand Pre Memorial Park may see relics of Acadian life before 1755 and stand at the feet of the statue depicting Longfellow's imaginative heroine.

Wolfville is surrounded by lush countryside that typifies the memorable scenery to be found throughout the valley. It is the home of Acadia University, whose beautiful campus is filled with students during the winter and theatre enthusiasts in the summer, when, during the months of July and August, the province's first summer playhouse attracts thousands of visitors to see top-notch dramatic and musical productions presented almost daily.

Off Route 1, at Greenwich, one has only to travel 10 miles to see one of the most magnificent views in the valley. From "The Lookoff", on Cape Blomidon, one has a panoramic view of the Bay of Fundy and its tiny inlets, the fertile orchard lands below, and some of the beauty spots of five counties.

Back on Route 1, the next town is Kentville, center of the annual Apple Blossom Festival in late May or early June, when a profusion of

fragrant pink and white blossoms provide a tranquil contrast to gay celebrations in the area.

Beautiful, tree-lined streets of the valley's residential towns greet the traveller as he makes his way on Route 1's winding road between the North and South Mountains. Annapolis Royal, 58 miles from Kentville, contains historic Fort Anne, a national historic park, whose original fort was built in 1635 and whose present museum houses many interesting historic relics.

Seven miles from Annapolis Royal, off Route 1, is the site of Port Royal, which claims many first in Canadian and American history. A replica of the original fort, built by Champlain in 1605 — the first permanent white settlement north of the Gulf of Mexico — stands as a lasting monument to the early settlers of this Habitation. Near here, Canada's first water power grist mill was built, the first vessel launched, the first bricks made, and the first conversions to Christianity took place.

Back on Route 1, the visitor travels through farming, fruit-growing, and fishing communities, many noted as resort areas because of their excellent recreational facilities. It's worth a trip off Route 1 four miles to Bear River, "The Switzerland of Nova Scotia", where the magnificent scenery consists of verdant hillsides and fertile valleys. This community is the site of an annual cherry carnival in mid

On to Digby, the last official town in the Annapolis Valley and terminus for the ferry plying the Bay of Fundy waters to Saint John, New Brunswick. This area is a mecca for painters and photographers who attempt to capture the scenic grandeur of the Bay of Fundy and its sandy coastline.

Overnight accommodation and eating facilities along this route are excellent and many beauty spots are ideal for the family picnic lunch.

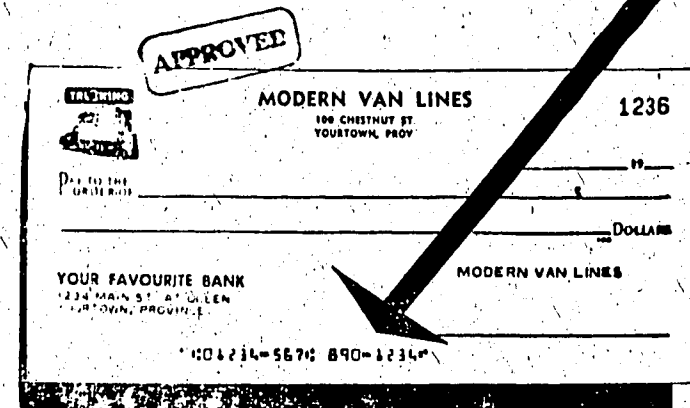

## PC's Nominate Powell



With drive in his voice and punch in his fist, the ordinarily thought of reserved and retiring Robert Baden Powell above accepted the nomination as Progressive Conservative standard bearer for the Electoral District of Digby in the October 8th provincial election. The motion for Mr. Powell's candidacy was made at the Nominating Convention held at the Lions Club Hall on Thursday by Keith Potter and seconded by Jack Connell.

Born at Westport, Mr. Powell had spent his childhood days in villages on the Neck and Islands and in Yarmouth. For some years he lived in Manitoba and Alberta where he was a ranch hand, a teacher and a free lance writer. Later he came back to Nova Scotia and taught school in Weymouth, Ashmore and Digby, having been Industrial Arts teacher for Annapolis and Digby and later for Digby schools until his retirement last year. Mr. Powell had also been engaged in the flour and feed business and poultry raising. He served in World War II and was mentioned in dispatches while serving in Italy.

Besides being industrial arts teacher, Mr. Powell has been administrator for the vocational evening classes and adult education classes in Digby. He is known also for his authorship of plays and articles and stories of the sea. He with Mrs. Powell, the former Rae-Hankinson of Weymouth live in Plympton and Digby.

In his acceptance speech, Mr. Powell said that he had only one promise to make, that he would do all within his power to make for a fuller and better life in the Digby constituency. He praised Mr. Stanfield and the conservative government which has done such marvellous work for Nova Scotia. They have made it possible, he said, for the boys to stay at home where formerly they used to be shipped to Boston. The money paid in taxes to educate went out of the province, now it stays here. He commended Mr. Pyke, Minister of Highways, on the road program. We cannot carry on, he said, socially industrially or economically without good roads. He mentioned many road improvements made in this area and emphasized that these were done by the Stanfield government and not by the opposition.

Guest speaker for the evening was Hon. R. A. Donahoe, Attorney General for Nova Scotia and Minister of Health. He said, "The Stanfield government deserves to be returned by reason of what it has done to create a new spirit of confidence in the future of Nova

Scotia. Nova Scotians now believe that it is possible to develop industry and provide opportunity for our people in our own province.

The government's opening up of the province by reason of its tremendous highway program, its provision of hospital insurance, its encouragement of the tourist industry, its record of accomplishment in the field of welfare all have served to reanimate our people. Nova Scotia will continue to advance with Stanfield."

Mr. Donahoe reviewed the accomplishments of the Stanfield government and said that in all the time the Liberals were in power it was thought nothing could be done for the economy of Nova Scotia but since 1956 the Stanfield government has done much for Nova Scotia. He said that the highways program completed since then had been more than the liberal government had done in all their years of office. He reviewed the work of Industrial Estates and said that if it ceased "to-night" Nova Scotians would still make a profit on the transactions. He criticized against these accomplishments the statement by Walter Gordon that there is no future in Nova Scotia and the Maritime Provinces and the people should move out. A heavy water plant in Nova Scotia would be a boon to the economy and fabric of this country, the speaker said. All we need, he said, is to have the Atomic Energy Committee to say we can have it. This transaction depends entirely on what the federal government does, Mr. Donahoe said, and added emphatically the word "watch".

Mr. Donahoe reviewed the hospital achievements and the Voluntary Planning program of the province in fishing, agriculture, tourism, power, forestry, mining etc. The government has set targets which they will meet. They are adopting the policy which has been so remarkable in European countries since the war.

Speaking of the fishing industry which is so important to the economy of Nova Scotia (the Honourable Mr. Donahoe said that a full Department of Fisheries is to be established with a minister in charge and a deputy.

Assistance to the municipalities in welfare and health as under the Stanfield government had never been done before, the minister remarked.

Mr. Donahoe was introduced by Charles Halliburton and thanked by Dr. D. E. Lewis. The meeting was chaired by Keith Raymond.

A vote of confidence in the Stanfield government was expressed and a telegram read from George Nowlan, M.P.

## Committee Named

A committee composed of Lloyd MacNeil, Marshalltown, Warden, Ronald Morehouse, Centerville, Chipman Chisholm, Bear River, Allen Thomas, North Range, Gerald Chute of Bear River and William LeForte agricultural agent, Weymouth was appointed to contact Dr. William Jenkins and other ARDA officials and to arrange a county wide meeting to organize a complete ARDA committee for the Digby county.

The committee was set up at a meeting of county farmers and others interested in rural development which was held on Wednesday evening at Conway. About 30 attended the meeting.

Guest speaker was A. R. Mace, supervisor of the farm and home administration for Washington, County, Maine, U.S.A. His talk centred around the advancement made in his area by use of a similar program to that designed here by the Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development Act (ARDA). Mr. Mace said that forty seven per cent of the families in the area were in the low income bracket of \$1500 per year per family or less. They chose a committee from a large segment of the population including those interested in agriculture, industry, education, banking, religions and civic groups who made an appraisal of the problems and tried to establish a reason for the low incomes. They studied the raw materials available, markets, ages of population, educational level, water supply, scenic potential, power, transportation, schools, health and welfare services etc. The school's objective was to preserve the family farm and money was loaned to those who would start recreational centres, poultry farms, hard wood mills etc. They made loans, he said on future income and in most cases it succeeded.

The meeting was presided over by William LeForte, Agricultural Representative for Digby Co. He said that ARDA was designed to help marginal farmers and also to help groups which want to work in (Please turn to page 5)

## Bishop Bryan Speaks Of India

Trinity Anglican Church in Digby was the scene of one of the most impressive services held in the church in recent years when the annual Annapolis deanery Service of Witness was held there Tuesday evening.

Music for the service was provided by the massed choirs of the churches of the deanery, which is comprised of all the Anglican parishes from Weymouth to Wilmot. Rev. Louis White, Rector of Bridgetown, presided at the organ.

The service began with a colourful procession from the parish hall to the church. Led by the crucifer, the procession included the junior and senior choirs of the various churches of the deanery, banner carriers, lay readers and clergy of the deanery. Also included in the procession were Very Rev. E. B. N. Cochrane, Dean of Nova Scotia, who represented Bishop W. W. Davis at the service, and Rt. Rev. Ronald Bryan, Bishop of Barrachpore in India, guest speaker at the service.

The service of Evensong was conducted by Rev. James Pike, Rural Dean of the deanery of Annapolis and Rector of Trinity parish in Digby. Rev. W. F. Logan, of the parish of St. Clement, read the first lesson and the second lesson was read by Rev. J. R. McMahon, Rector of Annapolis Royal. The state prayers were read by Rev. S. R. Shepherd, Rector of Granville Ferry. Rev. R. A. Neish, of Round Hill, acted as chaplain to the Bishop of Barrachpore.

Introduced by Dean Cochrane, Bishop Bryan told of the work of the church in his diocese of Barrachpore in India. He said that in India the church has now become in fact as well as in name the church of India rather than the Church of England in India. The vast majority of the clergy of the church in India, he said, are now native and the work of the church is being more and more taken over by native Christians.

In his sermon Bishop Bryan told of the religious, educational and medical service rendered by the church in India. He also told of the great sacrifices that often have to be made by the native Indian who embraces Christianity.

Following the Service of Witness, Bishop Bryan showed slides of some of the work of the church in India, particularly in his own diocese of Barrachpore. In his commentary he told of some of the difficulties faced by the church in carrying on its work and paid tribute to the many native Indians who have taken up the challenge to work for Christ among their own people.

Mr. Cardoza has spent six years as member of the provincial legislature and has been active in civic and community affairs. He was mayor of the town of Digby and served 16 years on the council. He was active in Board of Trade work and Home and School, having

been secretary and president both of each of the organizations in Digby.

In accepting the nomination Mr. Cardoza thanked the Liberals for their confidence in him and said that the election campaign came to him as no surprise. If elected, he told the audience he would work to have a bridge or causeway to connect Long Island with the mainland of Nova Scotia.

Mr. Urquhart in addressing the assembly said he was not impressed with the Premier's reasons for calling an election and he placed no reliance in his promise of no increase in tax for the next two years. He charged that one of the main problems in Nova Scotia today is real property taxation.

The speaker also charged that unemployment had increased under the conservative government and that the fish production had been allowed to decline. The agriculture he said had declined from an \$18,000,000 income in 1956

to \$10,000,000 in 1962. Another charge which the speaker made in his speech was that Premier Stanfield had made a breach of confidence and trust in making an announcement about a heavy water deal for Nova Scotia. He said he hopes that Nova Scotia will not suffer because the Premier had left everything out in the open prematurely.

Mr. Urquhart told that Nova Scotia roads had been neglected and that one of the planks of the Liberals would be better rural roads to benefit agriculture, fishing, and lumbering. He also said he would encourage a program of decentralization and diversification of industry in the province.

The speaker was introduced by Ray Power, vice-president of the Nova Scotia Liberal Association and thanked by Mr. Cardoza. The meeting was presided over by Mr. Nichols, who said that it was each person's responsibility to take an active part in politics.

## Sends Protest

According to Mrs. M. P. Gott, secretary of the Digby Area Industrial Development Committee, a telegram of protest has been forwarded to the federal government in Ottawa protesting the fact that Digby was not named among those towns designated for assistance because of high unemployment and slow growth.

## M. V. Knight Addresses Digby Board

M. V. Knight, Deputy Minister of Trade and Industry for the Province of Nova Scotia addressed a dinner meeting of the Digby Board of Trade held at the new Digby Branch Canadian Legion Hall on Tuesday evening and attended by about sixty.

In speaking on Industrial Development, Mr. Knight said that it is necessary to accept the fact that Industrial Development in any area, subject as it is to such tremendous world wide competition, is a game played with a background of disappointments and frustrations. Hard work is required, he continued, vision, co-operation and patience are necessary.

Every member of this community he said must pitch in and help. Only through enthusiastic support, dissolving differences of religion, political or educational differences can progress be made. In the drive toward community betterment Mr. Knight commented, it matters not to which club you belong or which organization you support.

On an Industrial Development Committee, the speaker said should be people of varied occupations, professions, representatives of organizations and civic associations. An industrial development committee, he advised should have sub committees to look after finances, surveys, advertising and education and zoning.

A survey, Mr. Knight said, should show what industry is operating in a community and what obstacles bar its expansion and progress, what resources are available and what action should be taken to improve the community to make it more attractive to new business. Some places supply better schools, roads, fresh water facilities, better sewage disposal, recreation facilities, reasonable taxes, zoning laws and economically efficient local governments to attract industry. Some contact firms from outside the community and encourage them to locate a plant in the community. He told audience not to forget the possibility of tourists being responsible for industry locating in a community.

### Jayne On Panel

A panel discussion on the subject of "should a funeral director operate an ambulance service" was held at the 14th annual Maritime Funeral Directors convention held at the Brunswick Hotel and Beaver Curling Club in Moncton.

The panel discussion Monday evening had Leigh Jayne of Digby, N.S., as moderator with Clarence Melanson, of Moncton; Jim Allen, of P.E.I.; Griff Laprak, Amherst; and Cameron Lindsay of Kentville as panel members.

Mr. Lindsay said an ambulance service should be operated by a funeral director for three reasons: to render a service to the community, to make a profit and to establish good relations for the funeral business.

Mr. Allen felt that "it was impossible for a funeral director to operate an ambulance service at a profit in the Atlantic Provinces."

Mr. Melanson commented on an article he read in a newspaper which states that: "A funeral director should operate an ambulance service only if he can make a profit and not let the ambulance service interfere with the funeral service; otherwise he should stay away from either the ambulance service or the funeral service."

Mr. Laprak was of the opinion that "since the patient is the doctor's customer, it should be up to the doctor to provide the ambulance service."

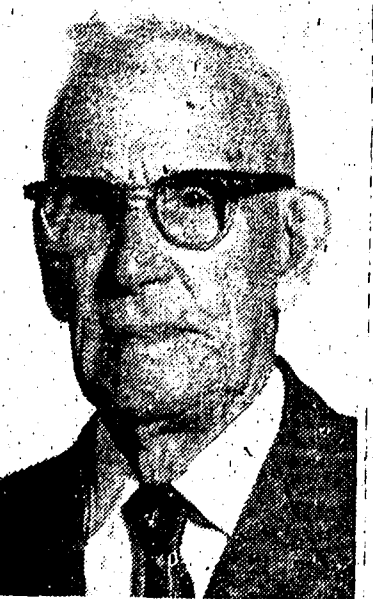

Mrs. George Winfield, convener of the Tea Committee, added her thanks to all who provided refreshments and assisted at the afternoon tea. Mrs. Warne had on display two snapshots of the Flower Show, to be added to the club scrapbook and Mrs. V. G. Cardoza and Mrs. C. M. Levy reported colorful slides taken which would be shown at a later date.

The President, Mr. Beckwith, who had been a delegate to the annual meeting of the N. S. Association of Garden Clubs at Halifax, reported on various topics discussed there, including a proposal to hold classes in flower judging for the purpose of training club members to help relieve the shortage of Flower Show judges. 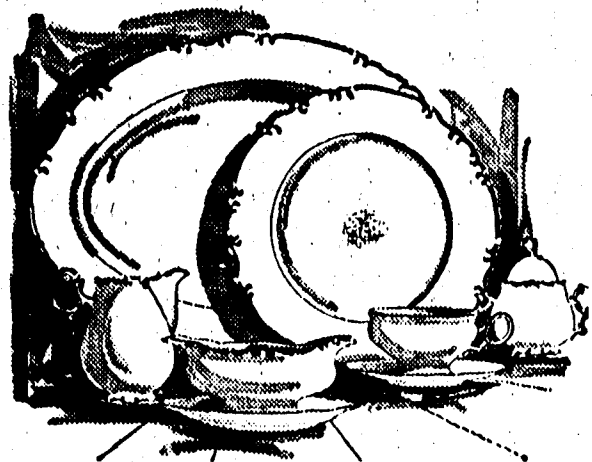

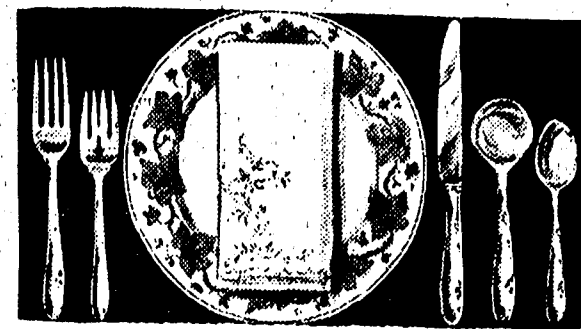

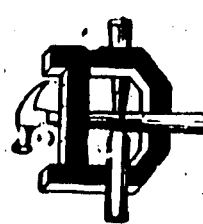

George Whitbread, Toronto, above, claims to be the only man to walk across Canada. He started at Victoria, B.C., and intends to complete his hike to Newfoundland this fall. On Saturday, Mr. Whitbread arrived in Digby but carefully explained that this side jaunt is not part of his feat in traveling the Trans Canada Highway from Victoria to Newfoundland. Mr. Whitbread had

picked apples in the Annapolis Valley at one time and returned again to see the beauties of Nova Scotia. Although born in Toronto, he has other Nova Scotia connections as the now 51 year old was brought up in Glace Bay, N. S.

Mr. Whitbread is receiving recognition of his venture along the way and has received memberships into such organizations as Association Du Loup, an invitation to the World Fair and on the Don Messer program.

On his travels he has been introduced to former Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, and he carries messages from premiers of several provinces, mayors and other civic dignitaries and Cardinal Legere of Quebec. He will present them to Premier Smallwood on his arrival in Newfoundland.

Some of the excitement of his venture was meeting up with a mountain lion and a grizzly bear and wading through roads packed with feet of snow. The venture has cost him \$1200, six hundred of which he had saved and six hundred he earned on the way. One of the feats of the trip was his accomplishment of walking backwards from Kitchener to London, Ont.

For ten years, Mr. Whitbread had been a nursing orderly with the Department of Veterans Affairs, Toronto. He intends going to North Sydney and ferry to Newfoundland but states he is anxious to settle in P.E.I. This, however, is not his final walking ambition. He anticipates walking around the earth.

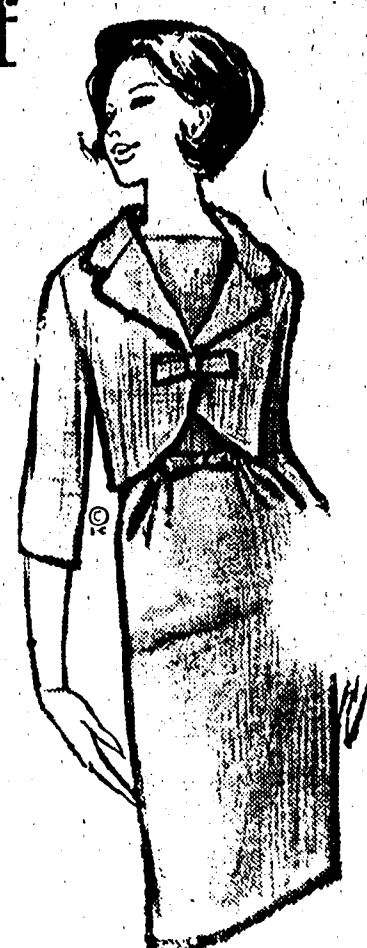

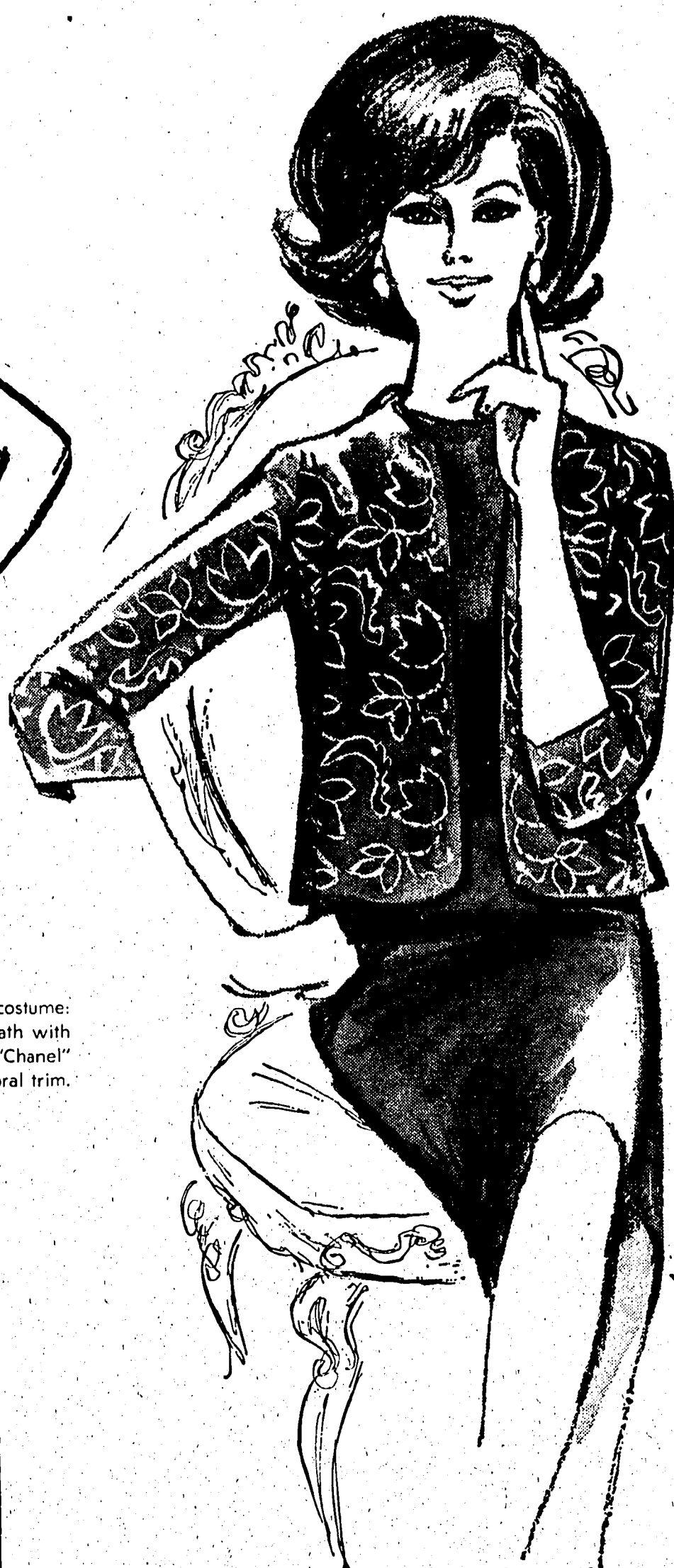

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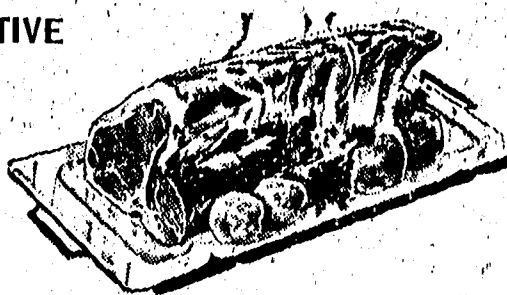

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Now we are so deeply into fall, that the fall fairs and exhibitions have nearly run their course. The largest fall fair in the world, the Canadian National Exhibition has long ago closed its doors to the millions who visit it every year. Montreal has barely closed the doors of her assorted fair buildings, and already she is working toward that greatest fair of all, the World's Fair. I wonder if all other World's Fairs have gone through such dreadful birth pangs as this event to come in Montreal has undergone during the past few months.

Can you tell me how long exhibitions have been held? Where they started? And which is the oldest in the world? I don't know. Certainly "fairs" date back for hundreds of years, but weren't those early European and British "fairs" sort of markets or bazaars? Simple Simon met his famous pieman while going to the fair, didn't he? and surely children have been taught the whimsies of Simple Simon for nearly a thousand years. Anyway, perhaps someone knows better than I where our modern exhibition began.

How much of an exhibition depends on ballyhoo? Of course ballyhoo is magic in itself. Many things would fold up and die without a little of it, but how many modern exhibitions can carry on without a midway, rides and, maybe even a stage show? I hear Bob Coulet was a very large hit at the C.N.E. this year. I thought it was traditional for performers at the C.N.E. to go home rather sadly disillusioned. Perhaps the American boy who got his start in Canada, and whom we like to claim as our own has more than a little honor in his own country.

I wonder if the Maritimes have more fairs per capita than other parts of the country, and I wonder if New Brunswick does not have more than anywhere. In Nova Scotia exhibitions tend to be county affairs with a few notable exceptions, like the Fisheries Exhibition but in New Brunswick, villages with populations of a thousand or less, at intervals of twenty miles seem to hold their own exhibitions. What is more, these are great community projects. Everyone in the community works for them, the best of everything is entered in them, and each village sees fit to hire a midway, and to choose a queen of the fair.

Every time I go to one of these affairs, I am amazed all over again at how talented so many people are. My knowledge of raising either livestock or vegetables is rather sadly non-existent, but I like to consider myself rather talented at handicrafts and cooking. However, these ladies whose talents are displayed quite effectively put me in my proper perspective. How do they make those gem-like jellies, those magazine advertisement cakes, and those flawless lace table cloths? Where do those genius ladies find the time to make crocheted flower baskets, and what little girl will receive that perfect little rabbit fur snow suit for her doll? In general, the stand-

ards for entries are very high. At least one Maritime exhibition, and probably most of them, refuses to accept any entry which does not meet its standards, and refuses to award a prize if it thinks even the best entry in a category does not deserve a prize.

We took our kids to one exhibition this year. The only exhibit the two-year-old liked was a display of two tractors which in spite of a large sign clearly stating CHILDREN NOT ALLOWED ON THESE TRACTORS, he demanded to ride. We steered him away from there, and bought him a balloon on a stick. He had never seen a balloon on a stick before and was baffled by it, so we removed the stick, but our little hero tripped, fell on the balloon and broke it. That lasted approximately five minutes. The day was redeemed, however, when he found a cage with two bear cubs, and a tank of fish, although the fish were not too satisfactory. They did not come when he called, "Here, fish, fish."

Our kids are not old enough to demand food and rides yet. When they are I will tell you if any of that old ballyhoo magic of the country fair has worn off.

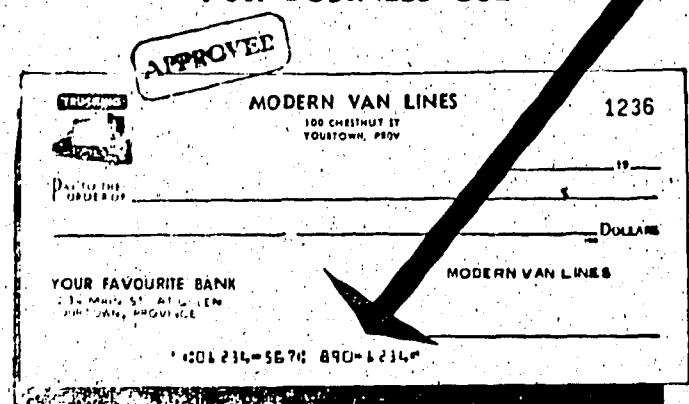
If you tell him again that one more insult means "goodbye," be sure that you mean it. Stick to your guns and let nothing short of a real apology change your mind.

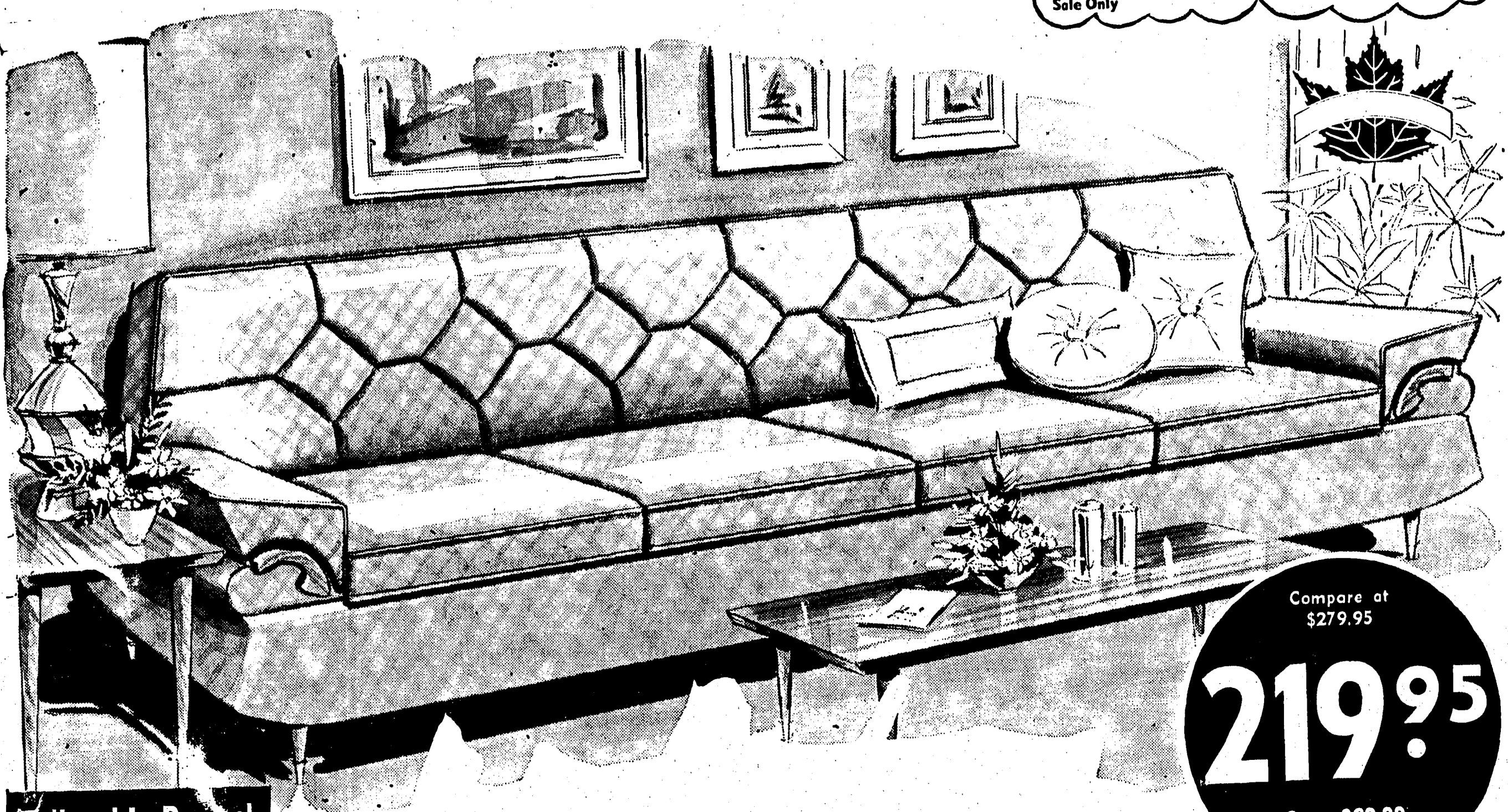
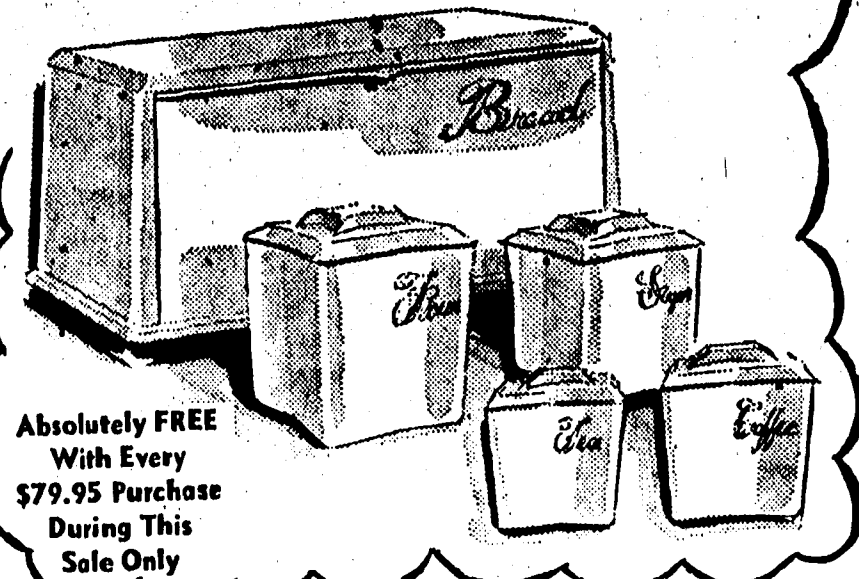


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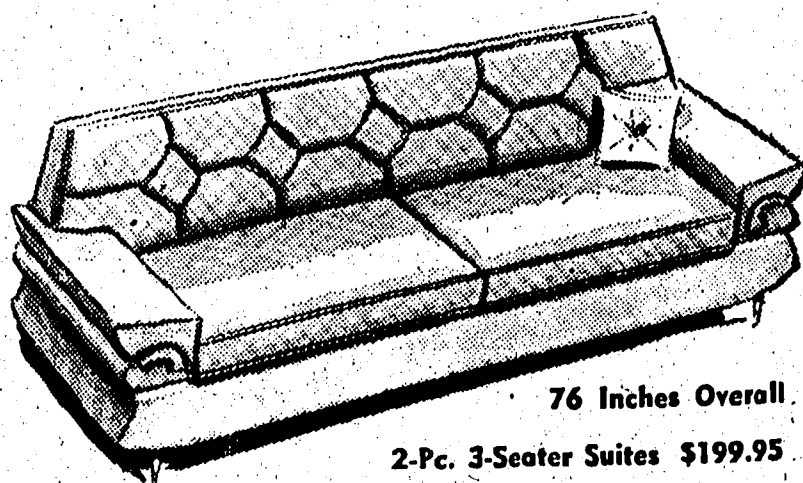
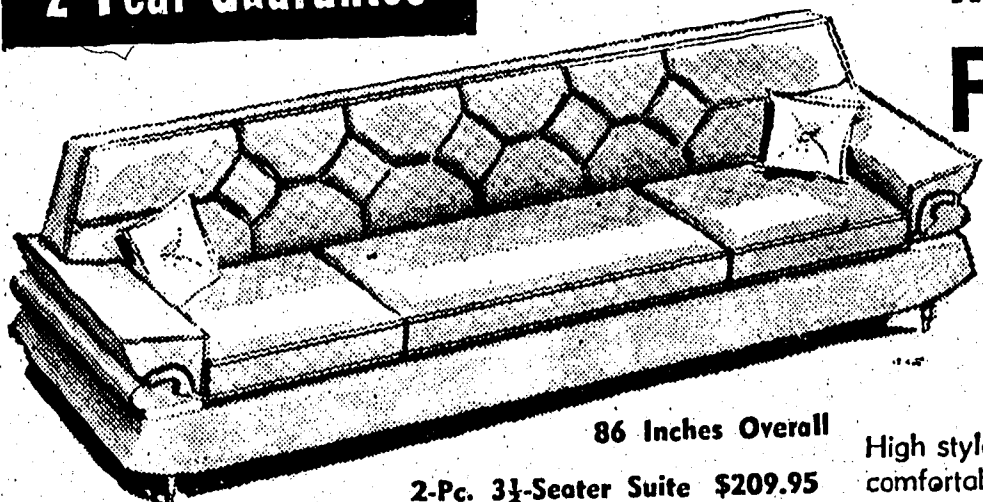
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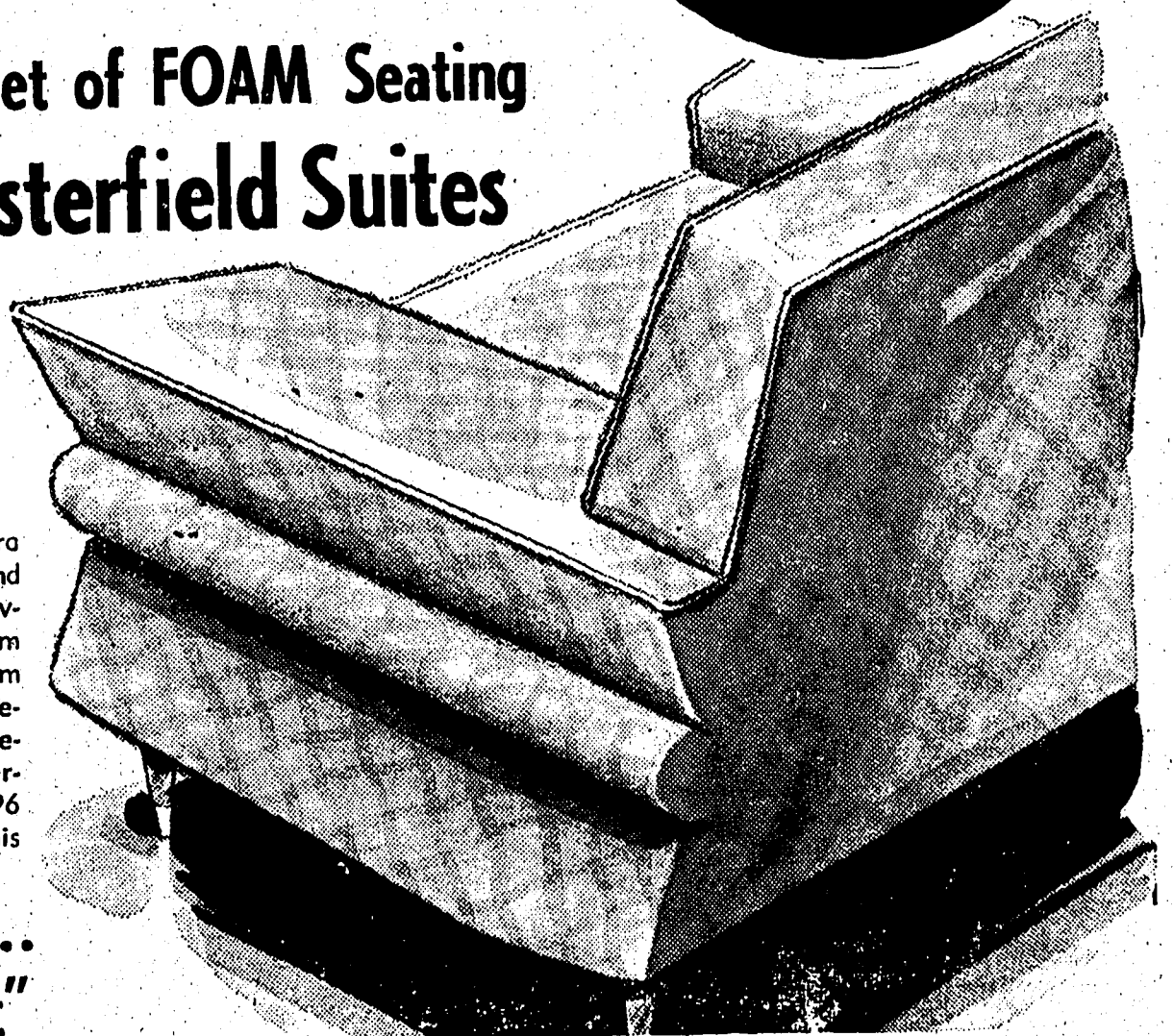
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## About This and That Campaign In Full Swing

The guessing game re N. S. General Election came to a close last week when the date of October 8 was announced by Premier Robert Stanfield. Already the campaign has worked up momentum in the Electoral District of Digby with each of the two major parties announcing their candidates. To date no announcement has been made from other political parties.

"It will be a hard fight in this district" has been the comment of most people along the street. We are inclined to agree. Two outstandingly capable persons have been put up against each other in the larger political party scenes of Liberal and Progressive Conservative. Two people have been chosen who are equally well known in the electoral district they represent — V. G. Cardoza, Liberal, through his active political and civic life, and Robert Baden Powell, P.C. by his many associations through family connections, places of residence, school life, industrial affairs and of late through his writings in Nova Scotia on the shipping life of various communities. Each of these candidates has a wide circle of personal friends on both sides of the political arena which could influence voting decisions in either direction. Each, it has been discovered, are capable, dramatic and forceful speakers. We agree with those people we meet along main street in Digby — it is going to be a hard fought battle in Digby electoral district.

We feel we can pretty well depend that the fight will be fair and that when the result of the election is over, each candidate in the Digby district, the winner and the loser, will be able to look the other straight in the eyes, having stooped to no sneering, nasty and untruthful remarks on personalities or represent conditions in a false light whether in favor or against the present administration. In the latter, we can only blame the listeners if they are gullible enough to swallow fantastic claims and blames anyway. Intelligent voters will use their own reasoning powers and separate the chaff from the good grain. Maybe our local candidates are not so inclined to extravagant and ridiculous claims and blames as are political speakers who come into the district. Again, we say, each voter has intelligence of his own to use. Take an interest in politics, yes. That is your privilege and responsibility. No vote, however, is a true vote unless the voter has used his or her own common sense and intelligence in voting and as his or her conscience dictates.

The fight is on in the Electoral District of Digby. We think it cannot help but be a tough but clean one judging from the main personalities involved to date.

## Digby Not Numbered

A committee instigated by the Digby Board of Trade and known as the Digby Area Industrial Development Committee had been in touch with federal authorities with the view of having Digby designated as an area to receive special tax concessions. This move was taken with the hope that new industry might be located in the area.

We notice by the news during the past week that seven places in Nova Scotia are designated for this special tax treatment. They are New Glasgow, Sydney Mines, Amherst, Springhill, Inverness and Liverpool. Digby was not numbered among them. Does that mean that the request from the Digby committee has been turned down?

If the committee has been turned down in their request we hope they will not be discouraged in their drive for new industry and possibly the federal government will still see fit to designate us as an area of "high unemployment and slow growth" and grant these concessions. We think the committee took a forward step in making the request and we think such a committee can be of immense benefit to the area.

While not a committee of the Digby Board of Trade at present, the Digby Board of Trade can take credit in sparking the idea of an Industrial Development Committee. It was called to convene by the Digby Board of Trade. The committee is headed by the Mayor of Digby, the Warden of the Municipality is on the committee, representations from the Board of Trade, Kiwanis, Lions and other organizations are included in the committee. We are quite definite the committee is a non-political group and this, it would seem, is one of the committees greatest attractions and should be one of its greatest assets. On the committee are persons whom we know have definite political leanings toward both the larger political bodies — Liberal and Conservative — and it is quite possible other political leanings are also represented. This is as it should be but so far as the committee as a whole is concerned we are sure it is a non-political body. More power to the committee as a whole with all its varied possibilities.

## More On Exhibition

Just couldn't help passing along this item from a Yarmouth newspaper. On September 21st there is going to be a dog show at the Western Nova Scotia Exhibition. Kids are asked to bring any dog 6 months or over in age. They'll be judged on the fluffiest, the curliest, the smallest, the largest, the longest tail and the shortest tail. Sounds like fun! Anyway, it goes to show that there can be no end to the variety of entertainment at an exhibition if someone just does a bit of thinking.

While entertainment is not the chief feature of an exhibition, it plays a part in attracting people and keeping them interested in staying awhile. Exhibitions are important things. ## Tuna Caught In Herring Seine

Casey Fisheries Limited, Digby's newest fish processing firm, is presently carrying out an expansion program which will improve production and efficiency and provide for greater employment.

Recently included in the expansion program was the installation of a Baeder 47 fish skinner. This new machine, the

first of its kind in Digby, skins 3,000 pounds of fish an hour. The Casey firm operates two processing plants, one at Digby, and the other at Victoria Beach. Mr. Casey recently purchased the Iron Duke building near the head of the government pier in Digby, to provide housing for a greatly expanded operation in Digby. The firm processes fish for export and also supplies National Sea Products locally. Included in the production is fish for export to the West Indies, Dominican Republic, Haiti, and the United States. Fifty men and women are presently employed by the firm.

## Nomination Acceptance



In accepting the Liberal nomination at the recently held nominating convention of the Liberal party in Digby, Victor Cardoza pledged himself to continue to work, not only for the provision of a permanent crossing of Petite Passage by causeway or bridge, but also for the improvement of rural roads throughout the district of Digby, many of which he said had been sadly neglected during the regime of the present government.

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## About This and That New Stores An Addition

The two new stores in Digby have certainly added greatly to the appearance of the town. They do show up some of the rest of us who haven't "perked up" in appearance for some time but they will probably be our stimulant and the rest of us will have to try to keep pace with the brightness and attractiveness which has been added to parts of our town. There are, however, other stores in the town which have had an uplift in appearance, some within recent months, and some which were made most attractive a few years ago and still remain as the better looking premises. It is quite possible a modern looking structure will go on the old post office property which will give that part of the town a new look also.

Probably the most progressive feature about the new stores is their power of attracting new people into town. Definitely the new stores did a booming business from Wednesday and Thursday on to the weekend and as far as we can ascertain none of the other stores in town decreased to any extent in volume of business. Naturally, curiosity does play a certain part in any new store trade which levels off in time but these two new establishments in Digby evidently are attracting customers who heretofore went outside of Digby for their purchases.

We welcome these new places of business and wish them success along with the other tried and proven places of town. The coming of these stores has given employment to thirty or forty or more people who will be spending their wages in Digby. They will be renting and paying taxes in Digby. The companies, themselves, will be adding to the town tax revenue. If their presence can command more people to Digby, the town and the merchants in general stand to benefit.

## Health Week & Cigarettes

For some time we have had in mind to comment on cigarette smoking by the teenagers. Since Health Week is coming next week, we'll combine the two and save both space and time.

Most of the copy concerning cigarette smoking and ill health during the past few years has been in connection with lung cancer. We have no reason to doubt what medical and scientific studies reveal and everybody is aware of the suffering and misery of lung cancer.

The material which came to our desk for Health Week contains an article on "Cigarette Smoking and Your Heart." It states that while coronary heart disease is common in non-smokers, cigarette smokers suffer three times the incidence and death rate from this disease, according to recent prospective studies of normal men between 40 and 49 years of age. It seems reasonable, the article says, to suggest that those men who are unusually prone to heart disease should severely limit their smoking of cigarettes.

What our own editorial had been planned around is contained somewhat in this last paragraph of the same article mentioned above.

"A recent Canadian survey in an urban community showed that 40% of senior high school students were smoking cigarettes and that 85% of them established the habit between the ages of 12 and 16, inclusive. In view of this information, and the fact that only a small percentage of men take up smoking after this age, it would seem most desirable to take what ever steps are necessary to discourage smoking among teenagers in Canada, in an effort to reduce the toll from heart and blood vessel disease."

We were concerned about the teenage cigarette smoking for we were concerned about one particular lad who had just acquired the habit. We were concerned because of the recent medical reports regarding lung cancer and heart disease and furthermore because of the dollars and cents which were going up in smoke and which might have added substantially to a fund for educational purposes. We inquired of the young lad, "Did you think you would enjoy smoking that you started it?" "Oh, no," was the answer. "Do you particularly enjoy it now?" "Oh, no," "Does it help you in any way? Does it give you any pleasure or satisfaction?" "Oh, no" was still the answer. Well, then, we said, "what was your reason or what is your reason for taking up smoking?" "Oh, well, the other fellows were doing it." True, especially in the teenage bracket, young people do not like to be considered different, they want to conform, but parents can probably do much to help these young people to stand on their own feet when it comes to making decisions on things which really matter. We can see that if the trend is a brush cut or pigtail that all teenagers want to follow the fashion if they like it, but we cannot see that if one teenager comes in contact with poison ivy that all other teenagers want to do the same! We can't imagine that if ten people like carrots that the one who doesn't like carrots is going to eat them just because "the other fellows" are eating them. Why, then, do we think we must smoke (or drink, for instance) just because someone else does it? Very well, if you like it or you see it as doing no harm, but why follow "the other fellow" just for the sake of following? Why not dare to be different. We challenge you teenagers, for the sake of your health and contents of your bill-folds, just to be different, if you want to. We hope our particular young friend will take up the challenge as well as lots of other teenagers who feel they must follow the crowd. Let the crowd follow you for a change. Ever think of that?

Why not start Monday, the beginning of Health Week, to give up the smoking habit, which you really do not want but which "gets" you after a while, if you don't agree with us ask someone who really has the cigarette smoking habit.

## The Beautiful Islands

We began to think on Sunday afternoon that if you want to meet your friends you ought to go to the "Islands". No fewer than ten cars were waiting for their passage across Petrie Passage and by what we learned there was a continual ferry service throughout the afternoon. There were at least

five cars lined up waiting for the ferry across Grand Passage also. The return trip over Petite was even worse, or should we say "even better", for how could you spend a more delightful "wait" than sitting in the quiet atmosphere of the "Islands" amidst such beauty?

While we gloried in our enforced restful wait we could think of other days, either because of storm or rush of traffic when cars which wanted to really make time might be caught there and so we engaged in conversation with a native of the Islands on the prospects of a bridge or causeway. We learned that the ferry had not been very busy during the morning but that in the afternoon scenic motorists and visitors had kept them very busy and that a permanent passage of some kind, to his mind, would be a wonderful thing. Our friend wasn't sure that a causeway could be wisely constructed. At least the rock around the area couldn't be used and he wasn't sure what effect a causeway would have on the currents. The only answer, he thought, would be a bridge! He felt certain that a bridge could be constructed. But, the cost was his remark.

We do not know if our conversationalist had any engineering ability or not and we are most certain our own engineering knowledge is nil. One thing we do know, we'd most "awfully" like to see a bridge or causeway for the convenience of the people who live on the Islands. We can "dream" anyway and express our views on the matter. Someday, sometime, a permanent crossing might be proven feasible and our long sought "dream" might come true.

## A Rewarding Experience

The other evening, we made a trip to Bear River, commonly regarded as the "Switzerland of Nova Scotia," and paid a visit to the Digby County Exhibition, which was in progress, at the time. Now, although the Digby County Exhibition is one of the smallest county exhibitions held in Nova Scotia, a visit to the show is always a rather rewarding experience.

First of all, Bear River, itself, is a delightful little village nestling amongst some of the nicest scenery to be found anywhere in the province. A month from now, the wooded hills in the vicinity will be a riot of color — the green of the evergreens, the yellow and red of the maples, the yellow and gold of the birches, the bronze of the oak trees, and so on. So those who did not get a chance to visit the exhibition, certainly would find that a trip to Bear River and vicinity would be well worth the effort.

There is no need for anyone to feel strange at Bear River, for no sooner had we stopped the car to ask directions as to parking and so on, than a couple of attendants volunteered the information and, later, others assisted us in finding a place. Then, upon entering the various buildings, and in visiting the various departments of the show, we found people ready and willing to offer every possible courtesy, be it information concerning the entries of livestock, vegetables or handicrafts.

Around the ring, there was assembled an extremely large crowd which had gathered to watch the tug-of-war. Now, to an urban audience, there may not be anything very exciting about a tug-of-war competition, but to a rural audience — and a partisan audience at that — there is lots of local enthusiasm whipped-up in the support of each local team. It is an infectious enthusiasm, too, as we know from experience, for, as we watched the teams tug and strain on the rope, we were touched with the same enthusiasm. It was good entertainment.

Then, on entering the main building, where we inspected the fruit and vegetable show, which although small, was of good quality — and which, incidentally, included a splendid entry of Red Haven peaches, a plate that would stand up well in any competition in this province — we ran across Harvey Chisholm, a former member of the Nova Scotia Land Settlement Board, who, for years, was the secretary-manager of the exhibition, of which his son, Chipman, now holds the same office. Mr. Chisholm has an extremely pleasant personality and, after the usual pleasantries, he gave us a full account of a meeting of the Senate Club — a club composed of Past-Presidents of the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture (Nova Scotia Farmers Association), which he had attended, the week before.

"My," he said, "we had a wonderful time. Do you know, I travelled to the meeting in a car containing four members of the club and our combined ages totalled 398 years."

"Who were they? Well, I'll tell you. First of all, there was Alvert Witticker, 71; Frank Cook, 72; myself, 78; Herb Churchill, 81; and Wallace Cook, who, at 95, was the youngest man in the party. I'll tell you, it was a real experience to travel with those fellows and I am looking forward to repeating the experience when next our club meets."

"Five fellows averaging 79.6 years is a pretty good record, don't you think?" (From N. S. Farm News)

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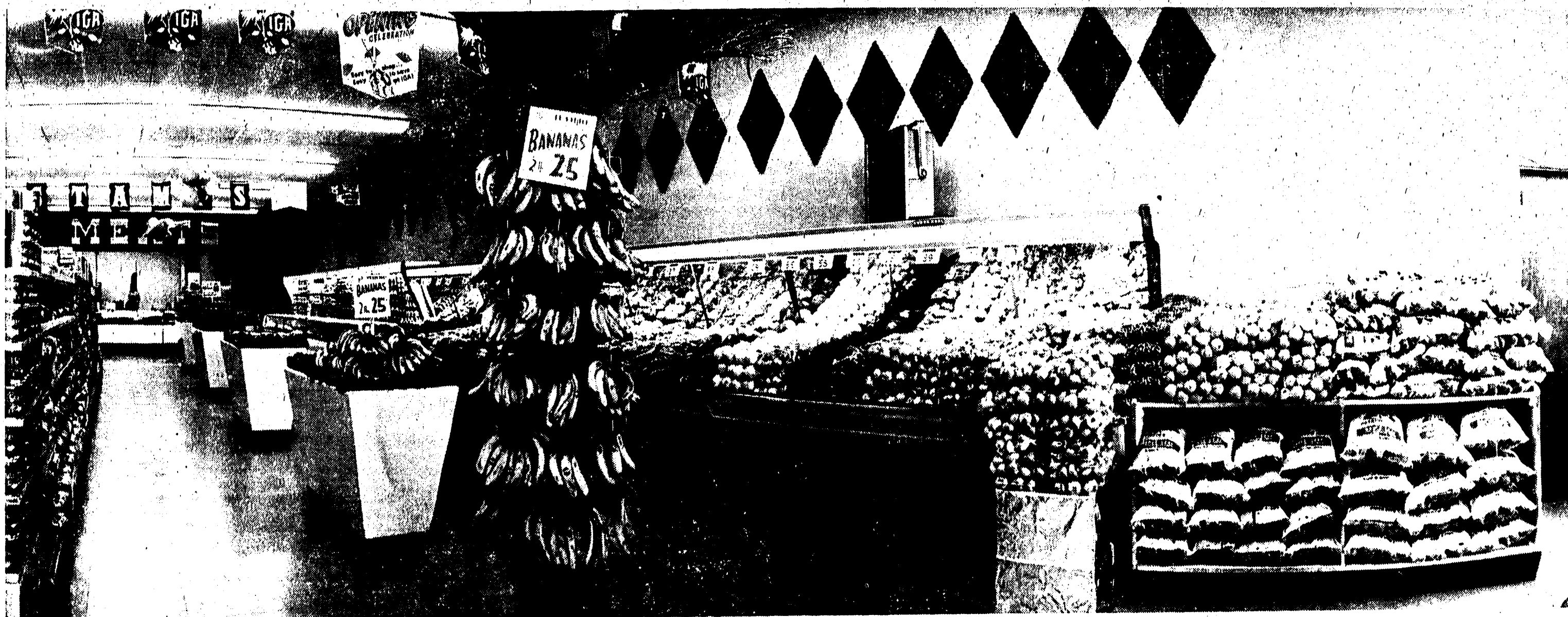

## Coffee

I know a woman who is a house-keeping genius. She is one of those women who always knows the best, the most economical, and the most efficient way of doing everything. Her home is her business, and she is the manager. She is a good cook, a good mother, and a marvelous housekeeper. She puts most of the rest of us mortals to shame.

She is the type of women who reads the grocery store ads every week, and knows which stores offer the best bargains. She knows what time of the year to buy everything for the maximum economy. She plans her menus two weeks in advance, and she buys accordingly. She uses plastic dishes every day to save on her good ones. She can look at a problem and perceive the easiest way of doing it. One of the prize examples is the way she drains her washing machine. She has an old fashioned one with no pump. Does she break her back emptying it bucket load by bucket load? No - she wheels the machine over to her basement drain, turns on the outlet faucet, and the water runs right down the drain.

I know most of these things are the result of forming good habits through the years. Some are the result of a native perception which cannot be cultivated. I don't suppose it is possible to learn to be a natural housekeeper, or mother or artist or house painter for that matter, if you are not one, but I have gleaned a few practical tips from my efficient friend, which can be put to use by any of us.

My friend bought cheap ash trays and ornaments for her house when her children were toddlers. She put her good ones away, but taught the children not to touch the cheap ones. If there was an accident, no matter, meantime, the children "practised" care.

When one of her children is sick and has to be fed in bed, she spreads a large bath towel over the bed to pick up the spills and drips. She also uses a slightly damp towel as a tray cloth. Glasses and dishes tend not to slide around on this, and the bedding is saved.

She keeps a box of bad weather toys, which she keeps new, fresh and interesting. It is good for sick children too. The box contains a box of crayons, and new coloring, paper doll, and story books, assorted buttons, beads, thread, and a large needle for stringing them, modelling clay, paste, magazines to cut out, and a scrap book (she suggests topics for scrap books, such as a hospital, or a school, etc. The children look up and cut pictures relating to this subject.) The box also contains an assortment of miniature toys, very small cars for the boys, and doll furniture for girls, and a large quantity of pipe cleaners and tinfoil for making assorted creations.

She only greases the bottom of the cake pan. She says the cake "climbs" higher up the sides if the sides are not slippery.

Whenever she washes dishes, she takes apart one burner of the electric stove, and washes all the parts. The stove is always gleaming. It costs no more work than to wash three extra dishes, and she never has to have a stove cleaning day. Unfortunately, the oven still has to be cleaned.

When she wants to cut meat into small cubes or any small pieces, she lets the meat nearly thaw out. It cuts beautifully and neatly. It does not get ragged like fresh or thawed meat, but it is easy to cut. By the way, she leaves a steak out of the refrigerator for at least an hour before cooking it. It improves the flavor considerably.

Instant coffee is cheaper than ground. When it is simmered on top of the stove for several minutes, the flavor is no different than that of ground coffee. Of course, nothing but ground coffee will give you that wonderful smell, but you would be surprised how many people can be fooled by this.

But this coffee is real coffee. Smell it. I must get back to my inefficient routine and see if I can do today what my friend could probably do in two hours. — Oh well . . .

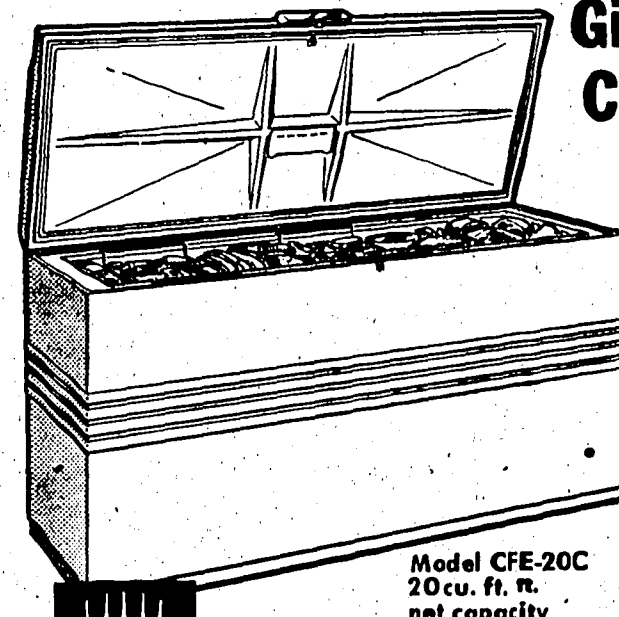

## CN Blood Donors Save Lives

More than half a dozen people now walking around fit and healthy may well owe their lives to Fenton Sanford, a labourer at Canadian National Railways' shops in Moncton.

For Sandy, as he is known, to his fellow-workers, has donated at least 40 bottles of blood at Red Cross blood clinics. Sandy's record is the highest in the shops, but the rest of the men who work there are keenly interested in this life-saving service. Since December 1950 they have given more than 2,600 bottles at 25 clinics held at the shops. Sandy and his friends made their latest donation last week when the Red Cross held a clinic at the shops.

The contribution made by the CN workers was recognized last week when Norman E. MacKendrick, chairman of the local Red Cross blood donor committee, presented a Red Cross certificate to the

men. This document paid tribute to the contribution made by the men to the alleviation of the suffering of mankind, and was accepted by board holder Sand Sanford on behalf of all the men.

Mrs. MacKendrick pointed out that the need for blood was desperate.

Since the beginning of this year the Red Cross has supplied Moncton's two hospitals with 3,272 bottles of blood free of charge. Moncton donors provide little more than half of the blood needed in the city.

Commented Sandy Sanford: "I don't know why a lot more people don't give blood. You feel much better after it." His official tally is 40 donations, but he also gave blood when he was in the army, so that his unofficial count is close to 50.

Back in 1946 his wife needed blood transfusions. Says Sandy: "At that time you had to pay for blood transfusions. But now the Red Cross supplies it all free, and you don't have to pay a thing for blood. It's a great service, and it saves a lot of lives."

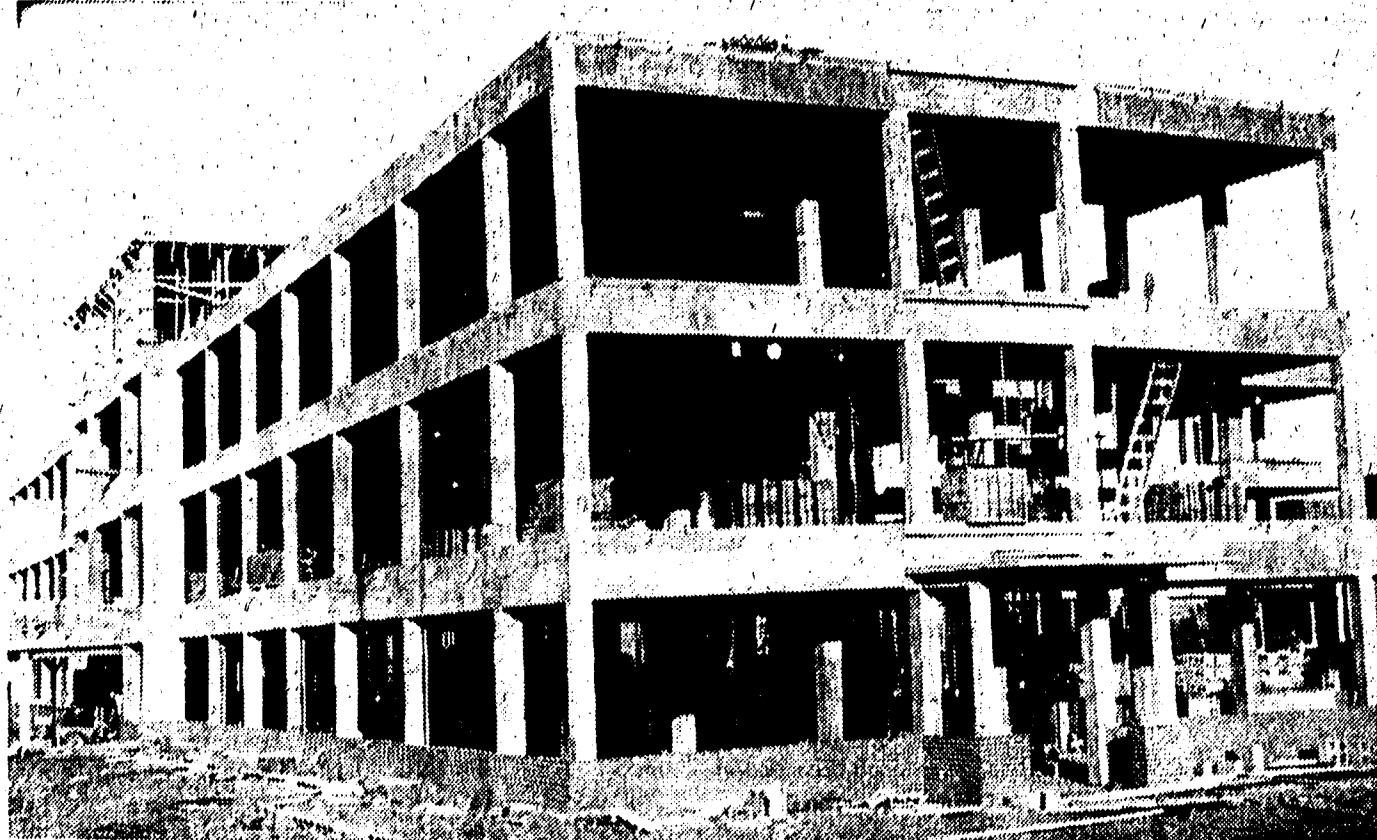

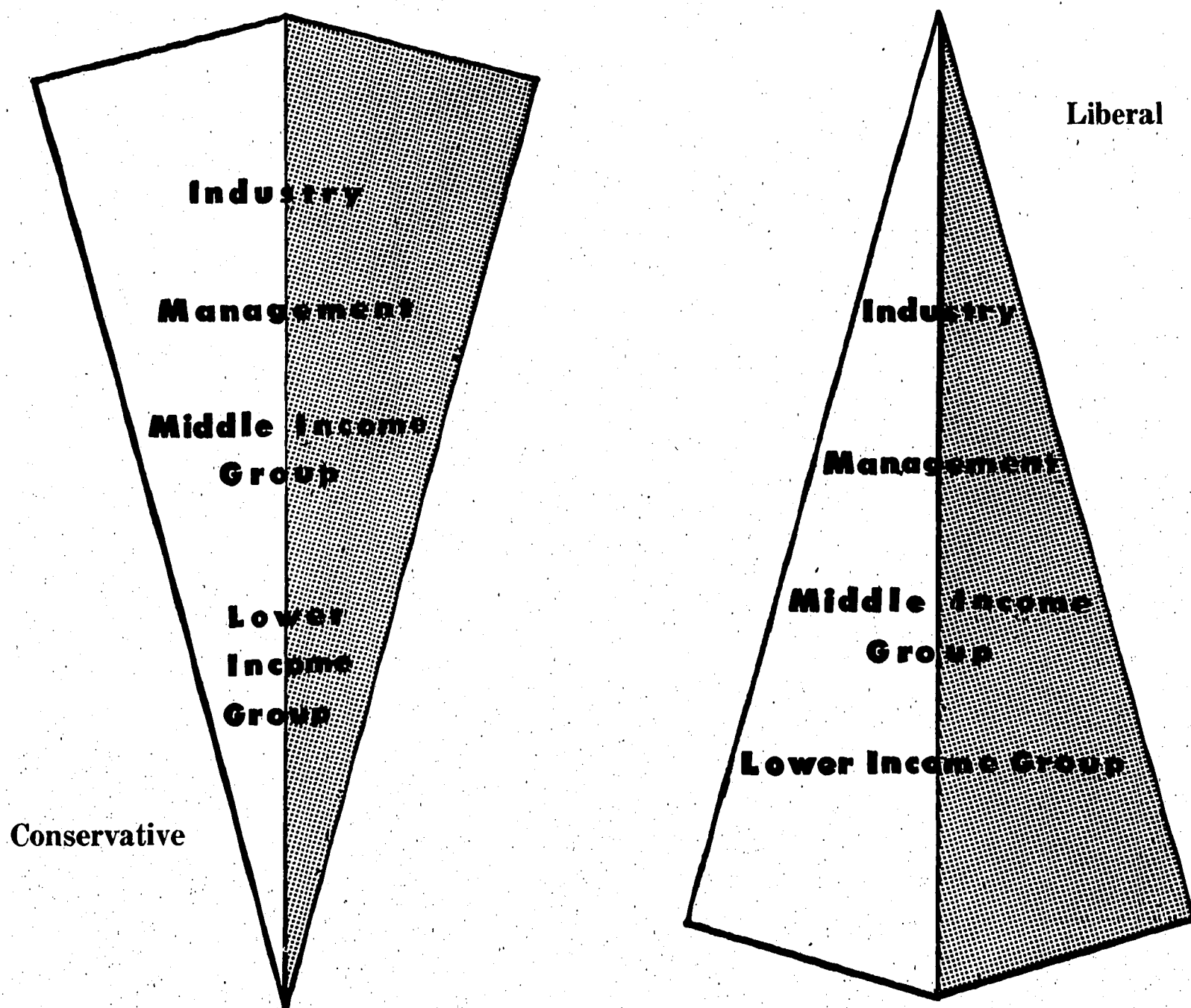

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## CN Blood Donors Save Lives

More than half a dozen people now, walking around fit and healthy may well owe their lives to Fenton Sanford, a labourer at Canadian National Railways shops in Moncton.

For Sandy, as he is known to his fellow-workers, has donated at least 40 bottles of blood at Red Cross blood clinics. Sandy's record is the highest in the shops, but the rest of the men who work there are keenly interested in this life-saving service. Since December, 1950 they have given more than 2,600 bottles at 25 clinics held at the shops. Sandy and his friends made their latest donation last week when the Red Cross held a clinic at the shops.

The contribution made by the CN workers was recognized last week when Norman E. MacKendrick, chairman of the local Red Cross blood donor committee, presented a Red Cross certificate to the

men. Mrs. MacKendrick pointed out that the need for blood was desperate.

Since the beginning of this year the Red Cross has supplied Moncton's two hospitals with 3,272 bottles of blood free of charge. Moncton donors provide little more than half of the blood needed in the city.

Commented Sandy Sanford, "I don't know why a lot more people don't give blood. You feel much better after it." His official tally is 40 donations, but he also gave blood when he was in the army, so that his unofficial count is close to 50.

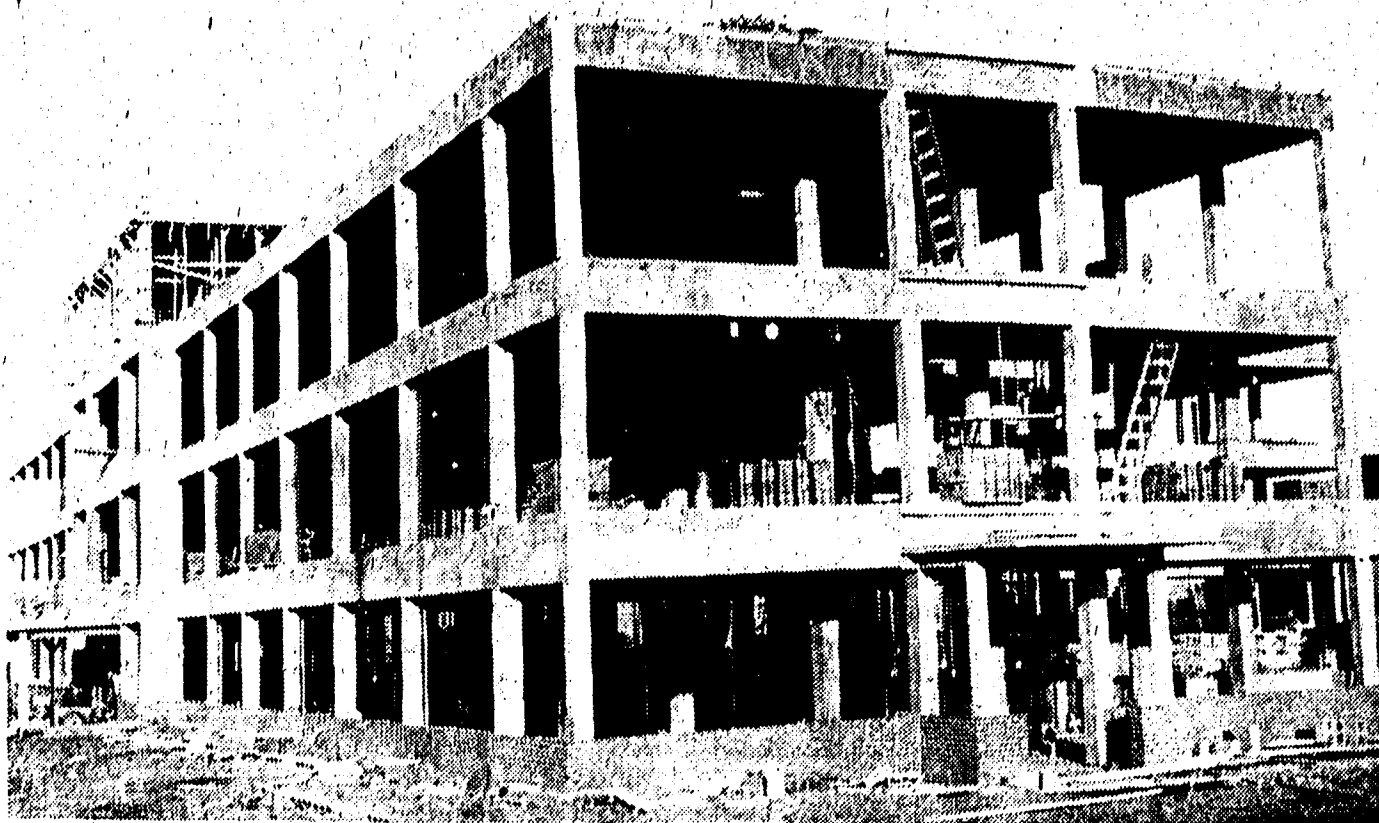

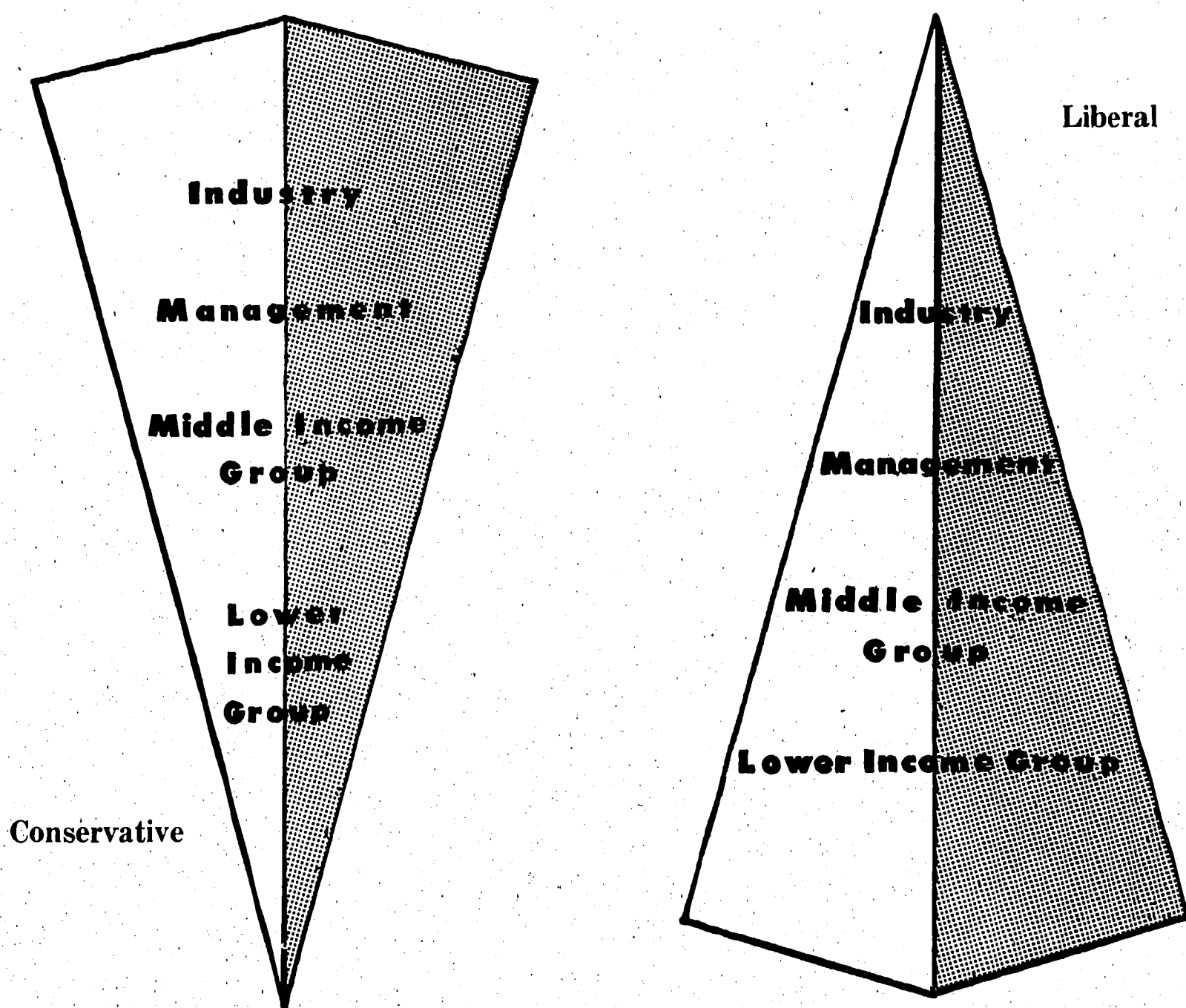

Brown. In 1925 the Hillsburg  
congregation became part of  
the United Church of Canada  
and has continued its rich min-  
istry under able ministers and  
devoted members. The present  
minister is the Rev. Elmer  
William Asaph, B. A., B. D.,  
The Rev. F. Jefferson Neal, a  
retired minister living in St.  
Martins, N.B., preached the An-  
niversary Sermon from Psalm

ground. One was deeply root-

## "Commodore IV" Launched



The 102 foot longliner "Com-  
modore IV", namesake of the  
late Commodore George Rad-  
cliffe Parry, R.D., R.N.R., was  
launched in an impressive  
ceremony at the shipyard of  
A. F. Theriault & Son Ltd.,  
Meteghan River, on September  
5. Mrs. Clara Parry, widow of  
the late Commodore, was pres-  
ent at the ceremony. The  
"Commodore" was christened  
by Mrs. Arthur J. Hill, of Yar-  
mouth.

The boat is owned by Laur-  
ence Sweeney Fisheries Lim-  
ited and will be captained by  
Loran Ritey, of Lunenburg.  
It is so constructed that it may  
be used for either fish or scal-  
lop dragging. This is the tenth  
ship to have been built for  
Sweeney Fisheries in a period  
of three years. Despite an an-  
nouncement by an official of  
the Department of Fisheries  
last year to the effect that

scallop fishing in the Mari-  
times was just about ended,  
Sweeney Fisheries continued  
with their expansion program.  
Their faith in the fishing in-  
dustry was justified when it  
was learned that this year will  
be the biggest one in terms of  
the amount of scallops landed.  
Sweeney Fisheries is the larg-  
est producers of scallops in  
Canada and offers a great  
deal of employment in south-  
western Nova Scotia.

Due to be launched in ap-  
proximately six weeks, is a  
sister ship of the "Com-  
modore" which will be captained  
by Lorenzo d'Entremont, of  
West Pubnico, which will  
engage in the scallop fishery.  
In the building berth vacated

also is for Sweeney Fisheries.

## Costly Promises, No Price Tags



Premier Robert Stanfield charged at a Progressive Conservative public meeting in Digby on Monday night that the Liberal platform was full of promises without price tags.

Speaking on behalf of R. Baden Powell, P.C. candidate in the Electoral District of Digby, before getting into the Liberal platform discourse he said that education and the problems of financing is one of the greatest challenges of the government and that Mr. Powell's experience and background would be good for this constituency and good for the government. He will be able to speak as a man who knows education first hand, its problems and what is required, he said.

In speaking of the Progressive Conservative government record, Mr. Stanfield said that the P.C.'s are prepared to stand judged on their record and while they take satisfaction in what the people of Nova Scotia have accomplished, no one is more aware than the government that there is more to be done to improve highways, education, health and welfare, and produce more jobs. The government, he continued, cannot take all the credit for progress for the government by itself can't do all. The government can create climate and assist energetic people and make resources available. He found, he said, a great change in the attitude of Nova Scotians. They take advantage of opportunities instead of emphasizing handicaps and the Nova Scotia government has been able to have many people participate in programs of development in Nova Scotia.

In examining the platform of the Liberal party Premier Stanfield said that in his opinion it was a curious combination of "me too" meaningless platitudes and costly promises without price tags. With regard to "me too" proposals, there are more than 25 individual items in the Opposition platform that are either a matter of Government policy now, or are, to the public knowledge, a matter of active Government consideration. It is of some satisfaction to the Government, he remarked, to find its own present policies echoed and confirmed by the Party of the official Opposition.

The document illustrates one simple fact, he continued, that is, that in the view of the official Opposition, industrial development and expansion has been relegated to a sorry second as a matter of importance. We had been led to expect a more definitive program for what the Opposition has called "industrial decentralization." They had given every indication that they had some quick and easy solution to the problem but no solution is to be found in the platform.

The Liberals' continuing frenzied interest in Industrial Estates Limited is also significant, continued the Premier, but what is more apparent now than ever is the fact that they still do not understand its function and they still will not admit to its importance. Their promise to lay bare the details of confidential negotiations between private business and Industrial Estates is a promise to cripple the effectiveness of this Crown Corporation and to limit the scope of its activities. Industrial Estates was designed to be and soon will become an enterprise that will pay its own way. It should be realized that Industrial Estates Limited not only receives income from (Please turn to page 8)

## Powell Reviews Road Work

"When the Hon. Stephen Pyke, Nova Scotia minister of Highways visited Digby Co., this summer, it was not a handshaking tour", said R. Baden Powell at a Progressive Conservative meeting held in Digby on Monday night. He was shown all the roads in the county. Mr. Pyke, he said, saw all the crib work which had to be kept up in the county because of our geographical situation and as a result an extra grant was given Digby County to keep the sea from stealing the land.

Starting at Brier and Long Islands and following up Digby Neck in his address, Mr. Powell who is the P. C. candidate in the Electoral District of Digby, pointed out all the roads which were constructed under the present P. C. provincial administration. Among the roads to resources he mentioned the road at East Ferry which was built so that the four fish plants could more easily transport their products up the hill. This road he said would in time be paved.

Mentioning the work which was done at Little River, Sandy Cove, Centreville, he said he realized there had been a bad situation at Culloden which was rectified, paving had been done at Mount Pleasant and others ready for paving. He mentioned the improvements and paving done at Bear River, the Ridge, the new construction at Barton, Plympton and the work done on both sides the river at Weymouth.

Speaking of the Liberal platform which had just been released, Mr. Powell said that there wasn't anything new in the field of education. Everything mentioned had been in operation in Nova Scotia for years. Having had experience himself in the educational field, he asked "when can you put a student in technical education without high school education? If you can I want to see it."

Touching on industry, Mr. Powell said that you cannot force people to establish industry in an area, they must have the necessary conditions to induce them to come here.

In closing, Mr. Powell said he was not going to make any false promises which cannot be kept. He felt, he said, that it was not necessary to get mixed up with a lot of falsehoods just to win an election. The government, he continued, has no money to throw away, only money to invest in the future, it is big business and we must have a case when we go to the government.

Mr. Powell said he was visiting all the people in the constituency whether progressive conservative or not for he feels an obligation to all the constituency. He wants to know, he said, the wants and problems of all the people to place before the government in Halifax. He said that the Stanfield government would be elected, and that he, himself, would do his best for the people here whether he is successful or defeated but "I can do a better job as a member of the Stanfield government" were his closing remarks.

Other speakers were George C. Nowlan, M.P., for Digby-Annapolis-Kings, Premier Robert Stanfield and Mrs. MacDonald, president the Nova Scotia Women's Progressive Conservative Association. Mr. Nowlan was introduced by Ray Rice, Weymouth, and Mr. Stanfield by Dr. D. E. Lewis, Keith Raymond, Centreville, presided at the meeting.

Mr. Dewan is presently making a tour of clubs within his jurisdiction. Purpose of these visits is to see if each club is properly organized, to find what projects are planned for the coming year, and to study the rules of the club in general.

Other guests at the special meeting included Deputy District Governor, Amos Stevens, Bridgetown, and E. Wheeler, president of Bridgetown club.

## Appointed To Centennial

Charles Halliburton, secretary of the Digby Board of Trade was on Thursday evening named to the Digby Centennial Committee to represent the Board. The Centennial committee is called to meet on Monday, September 30 at 8 o'clock. The meeting is called by the Centennial Committee of the town headed by Deputy Mayor, Helen Anthony.

The special meeting of the Digby Board was held on Thursday evening to make a point by point study of the talk given at the Board of Trade dinner by M. V. Knight, Deputy Minister of Trade and Industry of the province of N. S. One of the items in Mr. Knight's talk discussed at length was membership of the Industrial Development Committee. His talk stated that ideally its (the committee) membership should be broad enough to include all important segments of your community. Three general types of people are necessary — leading interested citizens; representatives of labour, organized and unorganized; representatives of manufacturers, tradesmen, bankers, lawyers, ministers, educators, public officials and representatives of civic associations. Discussion followed on whether the ten members of the Digby Area Industrial Development Committee were broad enough in scope. There was divided opinion on the matter. Consensus of opinion was that the committee should be given encouragement from the Digby Board of Trade, which instigated the committee, to greater activity. A letter from the Digby Board of Trade was also to be sent to government officials including Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson, expressing disappointment that Digby was not designated as an area of unemployment and slow growth to take advantage of tax concessions for new industries which might come here.

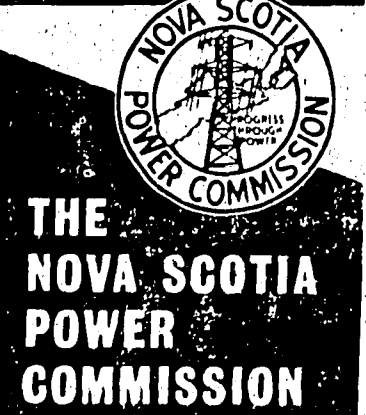

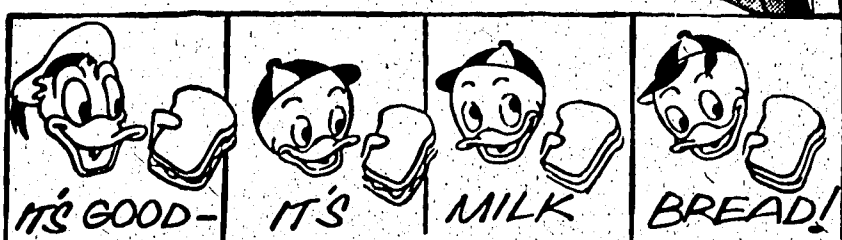

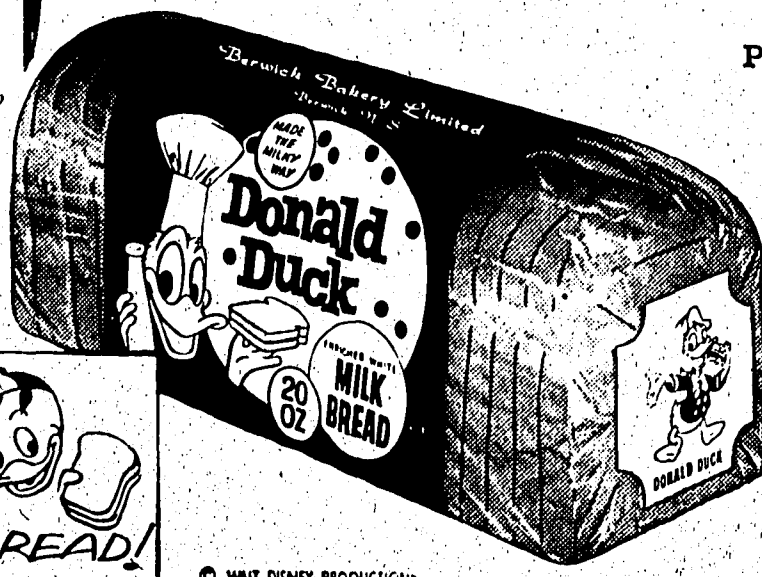

## Tuna Catch Shows Jump

With more than 63 giant tuna landed at Cape St. Mary, Digby County, since August 20, the Cape is proving that it is the best sport fishing area for tuna in the province.

In 1959, the first year tuna fishing was started here, 75 were landed, and if luck holds out the amount caught on the cape's fishing grounds, this year will exceed that number.

Sport fishermen say that they never had so many strikes as this year. Tuna were schooling in thousands. But it is not the number of tuna schooling that counts, but rather how they are taking the bait.

Last year, large quantities of tuna were around but they were fussy about taking bait and only about 26 were landed.

Various reasons for tuna not biting have been advanced by fishermen along the cape. Some say tuna will not bite unless it has a stomach full of feed.

Cape St. Mary, a fishing village on St. Mary's Bay, is noted as a commercial fishing area and is fast becoming known as one of the best sport fishing areas in western Nova Scotia.

One of the best features of tuna fishing at the cape is that a fisherman can put his line in the water only a short distance from the wharf and have a chance of hooking the giant fish. The distance to the tuna schooling grounds may vary from day to day according to the mood of the giant fish.

This year, extra excitement was stirred when a 25-foot shark competed with two tuna fishermen. It was a matter of who was going to get the tuna, the shark or the fisherman. In both cases the fisherman won. The shark took huge chunks out of the tuna which were hooked and unable to defend themselves.

Ever since tuna fishing was introduced at Cape St. Mary's in 1959, the tuna have arrived on the grounds around August 20.

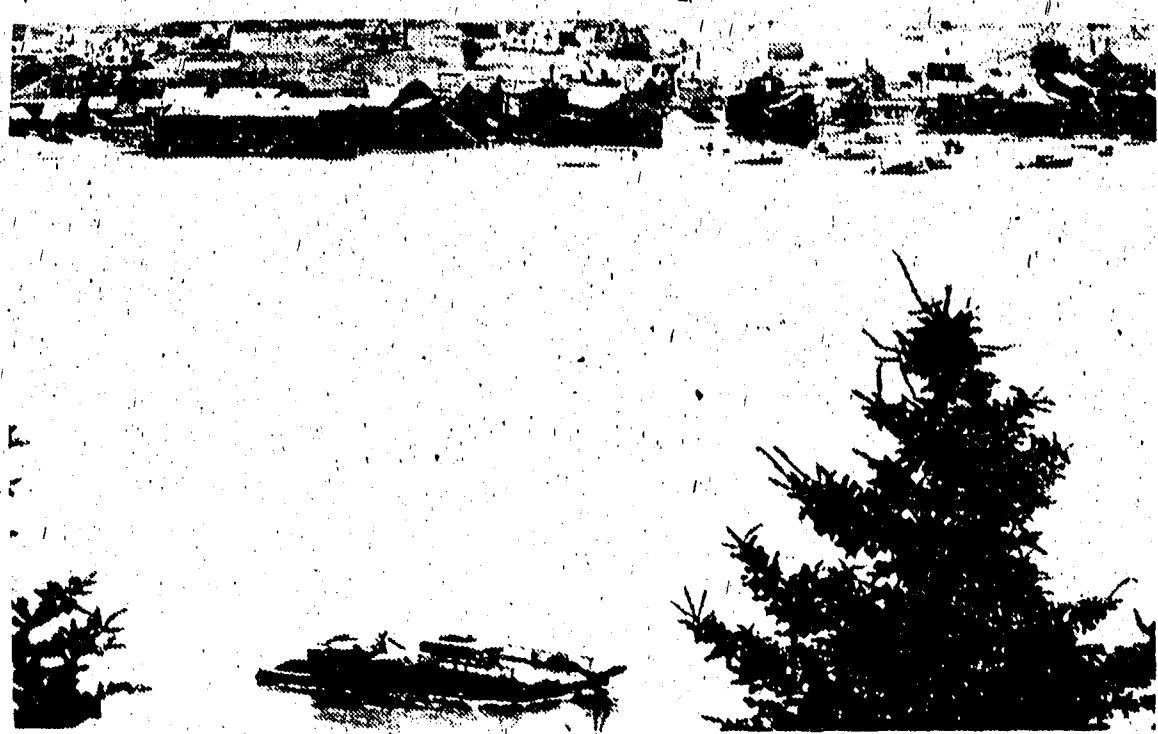

## Petite Passage

Petite Passage, the half-mile stretch of water that separates Long Island at Tiverton from the mainland at East Ferry, is the greatest obstacle facing industries on both Long Island and Westport today. Here, the tides run swiftly, relentlessly and sometimes dangerously. High seas resulting from gale force winds have prevented ferry service and isolated the islands from the mainland for several days at a time during fall and winter months. Fish loaded on trucks ready for exporting have been known to rot while waiting for the waters of Petite Passage to abate sufficiently to allow crossing.

Progress is inevitable, imperious and perpetual. New industries are coming to the fore, and old ones are being expanded. New fish curing establishments are being built while old ones are increasing their output of cured fish to help satisfy the greater demands of outside fish markets. To meet these demands, prompt, dependable and efficient service is necessary. The ferry accommodations, similar to that of 40 years ago, and still in operation today, is not sufficient to permit required service. A permanent crossing — a causeway or bridge is a necessity.

From an article written by Doris Outhouse, former cor-

respondent for Halifax "Herald" and published in same on Thursday, August 18, 1960:

"More than three years ago the Fundy Board of Trade supported by affiliated boards from Annapolis Valley submitted resolutions to the Provincial and Federal governments at Halifax and Ottawa urging the construction of a bridge or causeway across Petite Passage. It was understood that both governments gave the matter their careful consideration."

Residents hope that the governments will once more consider the construction of a bridge or causeway and that their decision will result in the long awaited necessary permanent link with the mainland.

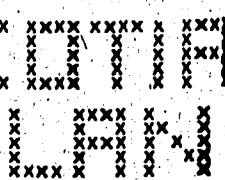

## Witnesses Meet At Yarmouth

Some 70 delegates from the Digby, Yarmouth, Digby and Yarmouth congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses have completed plans to attend a three-day convention being held September 27, 28, 29, in the Consolidated High School, Parade Street, Yarmouth, said Thomas Holmes, presiding minister of the Digby congregation.

Sponsored by the Watchtower Bible & Tract Society, the program arrangement will be under the supervision of Levi Wall, District Supervisor, assisted by Gary Godwin, Circuit Supervisor.

The convention opens on Friday evening with a number of delegates being interviewed relative to their ministerial experiences by J. Crandall, of Centerville, Kings Co. Mr. Wall will welcome the visiting delegates to the convention, using as his subject the convention theme, "Feed My Little Sheep" (John 21:17).

"MacPherson knocked out his pipe and went aboard to meet his crew..." he turned toward the bridge, his reit pipe showering sparks "... Capt. MacPherson, his pipe dead in his mouth, was braced in a corner of the wheelhouse "... Capt. MacPherson his pipe still in his mouth". These were some of the expressions contained in an article about Capt. James Ian MacPherson in The American Legion Magazine of June 1961. MacPherson's pipe was mentioned no fewer than six times in that one article which related a story of 1942. If one were to speak of Captain MacPherson today one would have to say "The Captain, his pipe still in his mouth" for that is the way we usually see Capt. MacPherson at his home in Smith's Cove or as he engages in activities in town and County.

But Captain MacPherson's pipe smoking was but a trivial matter. The article to which we refer showed Lieutenant Commander James Ian MacPherson as a man of heroic conduct, gallant perseverance a man with strength to stand against odds. Captain MacPherson was given the Navy and Marine Corps medal with a citation in recognition of his behavior which stated "For heroic conduct as commanding officer of the U.S.S. Lakatoi while the vessel was engaged in transporting supplies to forces on Solomon Islands, August 19 and Sept. 2, 1942. The ship foundered but the crew was brought safely with loss of only one life." His gallant perseverance and great personal risk in face of grave danger were mentioned in the citation.

The article we referred to in the American Legion told of the ship being loaded to within inches of the rail, the heavy storm which sank the ship within minutes and the trying time the commander and men had to navigate a life boat and two rafts for a distance of some two hundred and fifty miles. The story has been repeated in The Digby Courier of 1915, it has been read in the San Anselmo Herald (California) of 1946 and the San Rafael Independent of 1942. In each and all, Capt. MacPherson has been given credit for strength of character and bravery in bringing the men to safety. In the book "This Is It", by Harry Davis, Maurice Raderman tells the story of the thirst hunger and sickness which dogged their fifteen days in the flimsy crafts which eventually brought them through stormy seas to land. In it he writes "From then on (10th day) it was the commander who kept us alive. Little by little every one got into the habit of watching him. He sat there at the tiller like a man of iron, getting more and more thin, but without any other evidence of exhaustion. So long as he looked like that we knew we had a chance. Once in awhile he would glance around — see all those twenty-eight pairs of eyes staring at him, and smile a little. By the tenth day the smile of God couldn't have meant more to me. "The heart rendering story of that 15 day ordeal speaks of the fortitude of several of the men, including their only negro companion who sang spirituals to the sick and suffering and at the burial of their only companion who failed to endure. But, as one writer put it "the strength of MacPherson carried them through" and "surely some eye peered out of the void and saw them and had mercy".

Capt. MacPherson takes a certain "humble pride" in his medal, presented by C. W.

Nimitz, Commander in chief of the Pacific fleet, in recognition of those fifteen momentous days but recognition for services did not end there, for the captain. In 1946, he was awarded the Legion of Merit for the performance of outstanding service as commanding officer of the U.S.S. Saratoga from August 1944 to November 1945 and which ship was sunk at Guadalcanal. The citation read "By his initiative, perseverance and outstanding ability he brought a comparatively untrained crew to a high state of combat efficiency. ... His thorough planning, extensive experience, and tireless vigilance in discharging the responsibility of his command contributed to the success of those amphibious landings".

Friends of Capt. MacPherson and readers will recall that in the Spring of the present year Captain MacPherson flew to New York to attend a dinner in New York on the occasion of his retirement from the United States Lines, which ships he commanded before and after his naval career. He was presented with a barometer clock in recognition of his services.

Captain James Ian MacPherson was born in Glasgow, Scotland. He received his schooling in Edinburgh. Before World War I, he had served in the British Navy and later he was on torpedo boats and destroyers. In fact at the age of 45 years the Captain had spent 27 years at sea as a destroyer and at the Battle of Jutland, in the British merchant service to India and around the world in American merchant marine. He went into the United States Lines, sailing out of New York and remained with them until his retirement last January except during the years he saw service in World War II, 1942 to 46. Speaking of the United States Lines, he proudly said "they are owners of the fastest passenger ships in the world — also freighters. The Captain is in the possession of both a British Master License and a United States Master License.

And where is home to Captain MacPherson? Florida and California could be called home, but if his wife and family are at Smith's Cove, Nova Scotia, that too is home to the Captain for he has spent each summer of his married life here except during the war years. Here at Smith's Cove, he and the family enter into the community life as well as enjoying friendship and activity in the nearby towns and villages. Here in their attractive home by the sea, the Captain gets but a mild tinge of the tangy salt as he engages in recreation with his sail boats, the dinky and the canoe. Here too, away from the rattle and crash of the ocean waves, he can enjoy for a change, watching the slow, steady but always sure growth of vegetation unknown to the sea for their property contains fruit trees, a vegetable garden and a flower garden. When the garden clubs and exhibitions are ready for display you will find that something will be there to represent the MacPherson gardens.

Probably to Mrs. MacPherson more than to the Captain Smith's Coves is home. Mrs. MacPherson has been coming here since she was two years old. She was the former Sibyl Norton Vadder of Washington, D. C., daughter of Edward Bright Vadder, who was colonel in the United States Army Medical Corps, and Mrs. Lily Norton Vadder. Her grandfather was Dr. Henry C. Vedder, a Baptist minister, and Mrs. MacPherson came to Smith's

Others on the program from this area are J. Herd and W. Holmes, Digby; Warren Baker Annapolis Royal; N. Hodges, Weymouth, and T. Holmes, Digby.

## Alfalfa Profitable Crop

Experiments with alfalfa, commencing in 1957, have demonstrated the value of this crop in the Yarmouth-Digby area.

Two good crops a year can be harvested, it has been found on the Canada Agricultural Research Project Farm operated by J. R. Deveau and Son, in Maville.

Thirteen varieties of alfalfa have been tested out. In a personal message to J. R. Deveau and Son, the Hon. E. D. Haliburton expressed great interest in the work with alfalfa, a crop which he said should be more widely grown in Nova Scotia than it is. Alfalfa, the Minister said, has tremendous feeding value, and in addition was extremely valuable as a soil builder.

## H.T.T. Survey

The Heaf Tuberculin Testing Survey, sponsored by the Nova Scotia Tuberculosis Association, that was recently completed in Yarmouth County and Shelburne County, will now extend its operations into Digby County.

This free public health service is carried out in cooperation with the Department of Public Health, under the direction of Dr. V. K. Hildout, Director, Western Health Unit.

Preliminary organizing has been underway for the past few weeks. The week of September 23rd, a house to house testing is being carried out in Danvers, Riverview, Southville, Easton and Hill town. A clinic for Havelock, Hassetts, and New Tusk has been arranged for October 15, at the Havelock Consolidated School; this will be followed by Corberrie and Congression, and then the entire Municipality of Clare.

While there has been a sharp decline in the number of cases in the past decade, tuberculosis is still considered a menace to the general public and too many new cases continue to be discovered. Therefore, the co-operation of the general public is strongly urged in the fight against tuberculosis. The test, given the Heaf method, is very simple and is given to everybody from the age of six months up.

Clinics, under the direction of Mrs. Allan W. d'Entremont, Middle West Public, will be organized in the forthcoming future in different localities.

At North Weymouth a large space of ground has been cleared and recently oil tanks placed there for ultimate (two hoped) burial below ground.

On enquiry we are told that Mr. Fred Delon, who operates a store nearby, has initiated steps to the clearing of the land and the ultimate opening of a service station in conjunction with the well known "SHELL" company and the course of a couple of months should see this project well on the way to completion.

Progress is proceeding apace in the new bit of road and bridge designed to by-pass the heretofore rather dangerous

narrow bridge and awkward turn in the road at Kinney's Brook, near Gilbert Cove. All summer work has been underway by the Lombard Brothers. the loans it makes to establish industry, but as well, service fees, and these will in the near future, more than offset its operating and promotional expenses.

Explaining Industrial Estates further, Mr. Stanfield pointed out that it is no matter of subsidizing industry with the people's money, as the Opposition has charged, it is a matter of establishing industry using public funds to provide loan capital, all of which in the natural course of

events, is recovered, together with interest charges and service fees. Nothing could be more hazardous to the future growth of the vital enterprise of Industrial Estates than to subject it to the harassment of politicians, he said. The Corporation's affairs are managed by dedicated and responsible Nova Scotia businessmen who are making a selfless effort to assist in the task of industrial development. Their success in the past is a matter of record, and the confidence that business and industry enjoy in negotiating with them is realized and appreciated. The official Opposition's

program for industry, the speaker said, suggests neither development nor expansion. Throughout this campaign they make effort to use the vague term "decentralization" in order to exploit for political purposes narrow sectionalism and resentment. Every one knows, he said, that the initial and overwhelming problem seven years ago, was to find new industry, large or small, primary or secondary. Our policies, he continued, to develop the whole of Nova Scotia are specific and definite, and we will continue to develop these policies. A program for industrial development is the only direct and practical program to create jobs, opportunities and incomes for Nova Scotians, the Premier emphasized.

We believe we must continue to put economic development, expanded opportunities for jobs and better incomes foremost in any program for the future.

The program of industrial development in the province, the Premier continued, has gained momentum but calls for further emphasis and encouragement. It would be a mistake, he said, if we thought we had done enough or to indulge in costly productions. We can't attempt to live beyond our means, he remarked, but we must put Industrial Development foremost. We are not interested only in developing new industry, but also in developing traditional industry.

Mr. Stanfield spoke of the progress made in fishing and farming. Farming, he said, is no more a way of life but a business requiring investment. Last year Nova Scotia farmers made history with a record \$15,300,000 cash income. Farm loans in the past few years had increased from \$8,000 to \$25,000 and father and son loans to \$50,000. The government, he said, proposes making full use of the ARDA program which holds great potential and which was originated under "Hamilton" by the Conservative federal gov-

ernment. Speaking of the tourist industry Premier Stanfield said the province has a responsibility in advertising, providing good roads and scenic roads, etc. Feeling the tourist industry in the western part of the province needed something more to bring the tourists here, and supplement the camp sites, a second national park was proposed to the federal government. His government is also anxious to see a new boat service between Nova Scotia and New England, he said, and the Nova Scotia government is prepared to participate in the cost.

The Premier further dealt with education in the province, saying that the most important resource we have is the human resource, so education is important. Every industry he said requires skilled men and technically trained men. To help Nova Scotians take their part in the increasing industrial development of the province, a new technical institute for adults has opened in Halifax and four new vocational high schools have been built.

Besides, the Premier said, every career needs general education so the university must not be forgotten and the government must accept a larger share of responsibility there.

The speaker spoke of the importance of good highways, not only for convenience but also to industry — fishing, farming, tourist, etc. There is still much to do to bring people out of the mud and dust there are trunk roads and arterial roads to be maintained and bridges to be built, so the program must be stepped up and attacked more energetically than ever before.

Among many other things such as pensions, mother's allowances, hospitals, the premier dealt with the humanitarian aspects of the government plans. Discrimination must be eliminated and increased opportunities be provided for all Nova Scotia people. Speaking of the negroes, he said there must be an opportunity for the people to obtain skills or there is no use to increase job opportunities. Parents must accept responsibility and see that children finish their education and employers and citizens must give all an even break.

**About This and That**  
**Crosswalks**

Over in Saint John, N. B., they are experimenting with a new material, yellow in color, to mark off crosswalks. Crosswalks are safe only as long as drivers can see them. Over the winter usually the white markings wear off and drivers often cannot see the walks between the worn-off times and the newly-painted times. And besides, strangers in town are not expected to know where the crosswalks are and unless prominently white cannot see them. It will be interesting to watch how the experiment pans out and if an improvement is seen.

The crosswalks in Digby are still freshly white from their latest coat of paint and can fairly readily be seen, especially by those who are expecting to see them. Drivers and pedestrians alike, are beginning to depend on these crosswalks in town. This can be noticed by the confident way in which most grown-ups walk across and by the number of cars which stop when a pedestrian is on the walk or slow down on approach to the crosswalk. Children, too, confidently walk across showing that their every trust is put in the driver's care at the white crossings. So far they have been fortunate in their journeys across the street. We feel the crosswalks have been a decided safety measure.

Nevertheless, there are times when we fear even some of the crosswalks in Digby are not as safe as they might be. Granted, cars are supposed to slow at an approach to a crosswalk but unless you know it is there a crosswalk isn't likely to be seen from too far away. Add to this the danger of people who are just starting across being obscured from the driver's view by cars parked near the crosswalk and you do not have too safe a crossing after all. Children in particular often confidently dash out from behind a car as they confidently travel across on the white lines. Unless the driver can see the pedestrian before he reaches the centre section of the crosswalk he is in a rather helpless situation. Special care must be taken by both driver and pedestrian or we must put the pedestrian in greater view to the driver.

**Ratepayers' Meeting**

Just a week from tonight will be the regular meeting night of the Digby County Ratepayers' Association. That the Digby County Ratepayers' Association has seen some stormy sessions is no secret. We do not intend taking sides, but we do hope that the air will have soon cleared and that the Digby County Ratepayers' Association can get on with some constructive thinking.

We are not blaming the ratepayers for wanting questions answered, for only by having intelligent and truthful answers to their queries can the people belonging to the Ratepayers' Association really do their constructive thinking. We feel their questions to the municipal council have been answered generally to their satisfaction and it is hoped that the answers are just as frankly and forthrightly being answered by the municipal school board. Again we say that only by having the air cleared can the association get on with something constructive. The disagreement and contention which has been festering month after month between the association and the municipal bodies is only one more indication that public information should always be placed before the public without reluctance even when no questions are being asked. By that we do not mean that we feel the ratepayers of the municipality have been denied information nor do we mean that our own municipal authorities have intentionally or otherwise withheld information. We simply want to point out the wisdom of informing the public with facts and figures before the public has an opportunity to form adverse opinions. Informing the public is not always done whether regarding municipal affairs or other organizational affairs. Information, we feel, is often withheld not because of some intention to cheat the public but simply because the disseminating of information requires either work or expense. Again, we say, the public is entitled to know and at times it is less costly in effort and dollars and cents to give information. The satisfaction of the good-will which it engenders is worth much.

Getting back to the Digby County Ratepayers' Association — we recall a comment of the president, Harold Sulis, when he said that the Digby Ratepayers' Association was not set up with the purpose of antagonizing the municipal council, the ratepayers or anyone else, but to try to get answers to questions of interest and try to help the municipality to progress. He further stated at one meeting that he felt the type of meeting held was detrimental to industry locating in the area for industry is not inclined to locate amongst turmoil. These statements of the association president are so very, very true. It is hoped that the differences can be easily settled, that hatchets are buried, that the association, above everything else, will continue to live and perform the functions it was intended to perform on organization.

And what could be more beneficial to ratepayers anywhere than to have industry come into the area? Again, we say the ratepayers are entitled to have their questions answered but having them answered let them get on with the business at hand. Let them not waste time on bitterness — time which they could be using in effort for bringing industry here rather than chasing it away through dissension in the house. There is so very much truth in the president's statement — industry is not inclined to locate amongst turmoil.

**Work Towards**

The provincial election is less than two weeks away. It is good to know that the two major parties, at least, have their platforms prepared and that they now have something to really talk about. That is much more to the point than trying to cook up something to undeservedly and even untruthfully blame about. It is so much pleasanter for listeners to hear future plans rather than to listen to tirades aimed at belittling the other party or personality. That type of campaigning might be considered part of the game of politics but it is most unpleasant to listen to and does much to destroy the fine principles of democracy and the franchise in which we have been taught to believe. It is one of the "freedoms of democracy" which should be abolished.

The platforms are out — the promises are being made. At best, in most cases, these promises cannot be or shouldn't be promises at all. They can only be something to **work towards**. Finances and other questions enter the scene before they can become realities.

**Varied Topics**

This is the eighth week that our column "Coffee at janes" has appeared. We are delighted with the column which has something to appeal to the imagination of every woman. And why shouldn't women be interested in every one of these subjects? We are right proud of our "jane" and her charming self as our hostess. She has even asked if there is something special the editor would like for her to write about. Any suggestions anybody?

**Happy Medium News**

"You should hear the gripes". That was the way one correspondent put it when she brought to our attention that the village notes she had sent were not in the paper. We know she was telling the truth for other correspondents have told us the same. Readers want to see the ordinary village notes in the paper of who visited here or there. We appreciate this fact and try to use as many of the village notes as possible. We do delete any items suspected of being next door neighbors staying for dinner or people from the same village running in to spend the evening.

But not everybody thinks alike and there are readers who do not think too highly of items which say who visited who and when and where, whether these are village items or town items. We had this comment during the past week, "All too often Mrs. Blank visited Mrs. Double Blank and they spent a pleasant afternoon together. We suppose that may be news of a sort but somehow it is not really very inspiring or even interesting news."

So you see, readers, there is a difference of opinion. What suits one reader does not suit another and what seems important to one is not important to another. We who put the paper together try to use a happy medium but you just can't please everybody all the time. We try to average out by pleasing all of the people some of the time. **Child Pedestrians**

Driver — don't neglect those school crossing signs just because it's summertime. More youngsters will be attending classes this summer than ever before. And school playgrounds often become summer gathering places for the neighborhood kids. The Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council asks you to slow down for those signs. Be ready to give children the right-of-way to a long life.

**Twilight Driving**

Twilight is the most difficult driving period of the day — as well as the most dangerous. So it's an ideal time if you're on a longer trip, to pull off the highway for a leisurely dinner. But if you must drive at dusk, flick on your low-beam headlights — not your parking lights. Full headlights enable you to see and be seen more clearly. Twilight driving also requires super-alertness, because half light can seriously affect distance judgment — a vital factor in avoiding accidents. So make extra allowances for distance, and keep a sharp eye out for the unexpected.

**Driver Education**

If you have a youngster who's nearing the legal driver licensing age, do him a big favor. Don't teach him to drive yourself. Instead, insist that he enroll in a recognized driver education program. Studies show that students who complete driver training courses have only half as many accidents resulting in death and injury as students who have not had such preparation. It makes sense to have him learn the fundamentals from experts who'll teach him not only the proper skills and attitudes, but the mechanical operation of a car as well. You owe it to your teenager to see that he makes the best possible beginning in his driving career.

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How many covered bridges are there in Nova Scotia? It seems to me I can remember being told at one time that there were three, but I only remember ever seeing one. That was near Windsor. About ten years ago it was replaced by a Bailey bridge, which has since been replaced by a new piece of highway, and a new modern bridge. Are the other two still in existence?

There are over three hundred of these bridges in New Brunswick. More than in any other province in Canada, or in any state in the United States. They were built because they were easy and cheap to build. The roof kept rain and snow off the floor, eliminating slipperiness, and in the days when the horse and buggy was the standard method of travel, the bridges offered security to those horses which may have been afraid of water.

We have travelled a great deal in New Brunswick during the past two years, and are getting to know that province quite well. Only a short time ago, while driving along a very picturesque country road in northern New Brunswick we came upon another of the three hundred covered bridges. Our first glimpse of this one came as we rounded a bend in the road. It was old and dilapidated. There were boards missing. In front of it stood the wheels of a wagon someone had abandoned long ago. The wagon had gone the way of abandoned wagons, wherever that may be. It was sunset. The river caught the reflected lights of one of those glorious sunsets which seem to be the exclusive property of northern New Brunswick. The old wheels and the old bridge stood in semi-silhouette against the luminous water and sky. It was very beautiful.

These old covered bridges appear out of nowhere. They are on busy highways, and on lonely woods roads. They are far inland, and they are on the sea coast. I have a picture in my dining room now of one of these. The reflected light from the sparkle of the sun on the water dances along the sea-wet sides of three glistening white fishing boats in the foreground. On the beach nearby is a hap-hazard pile of lobster pots. The road winds along the sea shore, and there at the exact spot where a small river suddenly becomes part of the sea stands a grey, weather worn, New Brunswick covered bridge. We had a picnic on that beach some weeks ago. Whenever I look at the picture, the warmth, sunlight, and peace of that summer day has come back into my dining room.

Everybody knows that the longest covered bridge in the world is in Hartland, New Brunswick. I am not sure how great a distinction this is, covered bridges being relatively rare, and not noted for any great length. This one, however, is about a quarter of a mile long, no mean length for any kind of bridge. We saw it once, about two years ago. It, too, was on a bend in the road, and quite picturesque, but I confess to having gone through and past it so quickly that I have no clear mental image of it. Perhaps we will see it some time.

I wonder how long it will be before these "living" links with the past give way to progress, and are torn down to make way for more modern structures. Modernization and progress, of course, are the very blood of our way of life,

## To Study In Jerusalem

Dr. and Mrs. Westcott, of Syracuse, N. Y., will be attending "The American School of Oriental Research", which opens October 1st. Their study includes Biblical Archaeology and field trips to recent excavations in Jordan. Several months, also, will be spent in Israel in pursuit of the same studies. The Westcotts left New York September 4th, sailing on S.S. Olympia for Greece and Lebanon. For the past several weeks they have been visiting Dr. Westcott's native village of Freeport, N. S., where he has been guest speaker in the Baptist Church on occasion.

Following Dr. Westcott's farewell sermon at his church in Syracuse, the following story appeared in a Syracuse newspaper:

"The two services yesterday at the First Baptist Church brought to a close the long and useful pastorate of the Rev. Dr. S. Arnold Westcott. He has been one of the longest tenures of that church.

Dr. Westcott recalled that he and Mrs. Westcott were serving a church near Toronto, Canada, when he accepted a call to the pulpit of the First Baptist Church here in September, 1951, convinced that it was the will of God that he should be the minister of an inner city church.

We came to Syracuse seeking a new way of life and we have found another new way of life, said the pastor who departs for a year's study in Jerusalem.

The question has frequently been asked, "Why are you leaving?" It is not easy to answer this, for our roots have gone deep into the life of this community. This city has become our home. We have found here a friendly people, and whether with the work of the church, the community or the county, we have found ourselves most hospitably treated, most graciously received," said Dr. Westcott.

I dare say to you now that following us for the rest of our days from this point onward we shall never know any city with the same degree of intimacy and enjoyment. It is good to know as one leaves, one carries into a distant place

warm reflections, hallowed memories and treasured thoughts of a life that has been lived to the full with you and with this great city.

If leaving a pulpit is predicated on the fact that one ought to go after a certain number of years, then we have fulfilled that destiny. I one wished to leave a church in a happy condition, we could honestly say that condition is obtained at this moment. There has never been a greater degree of unity, a finer demonstration of fellowship, more loyal courtesy toward the ministry, nor has the financial status been sounder. This is the psychological time for leaving, for you can't blame me for disunity, for deficits, well - don't blame me for anything," said Dr. Westcott whimsically.

Dr. Westcott traced the growth of the church in structural improvements and membership. He emphasized his pastoral services marked by more than 12,000 parish calls. He touched upon his own personal dedication to the ministry of the church, declaring this to be his sole and primary objective. Dr. Westcott declared that over the 12 years he had grown in the Word of God through the response and encouragement of his people, their constructive criticism or commendation.

Dr. Westcott stressed the spiritual value of the various church services and declared that worshippers have found in this place "a quiet sense of the pervading Presence and have left with the peace of God forever in their hearts."

The church has been made attractive and function for young people. It has been a home-like place of worship for families and for those of golden years.

"No one can challenge me on my dedication to this church. In point of dedication, we have given the best we had. I want this to stand in the record of your thoughts for ever as far as we are concerned."

Perhaps at this point we are at the end of an era. We are facing shattering changes in this city. A new city is rising in our midst which will produce economic, social and religious changes and in this world of change the First Baptist must confront that challenge.
