As a young treasurer I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day I was told to write about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read at least two somewhat different versions of the man who was found marooned on a beach at some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Duxbury County. 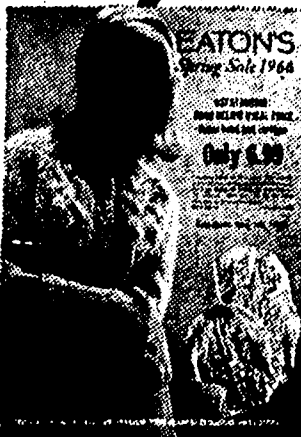

Though ill, Mrs. Robbins still retained her fondness for music and singing. She especially enjoyed having the youngsters gather outside her home to sing Christmas carols.

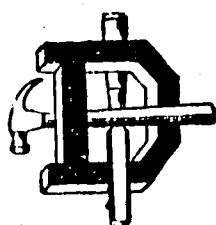

## Public Notice

The following regulations from the by-laws of the Town of Digby is quoted for the information of the public.

### Part 2 - Section 1.4.11:

(1) No person shall light, ignite or allow or cause to be lighted, ignited, or started, a fire of any kind whatsoever, in the open air without first having obtained a written permit from the Fire Chief.

(2) A person to whom a permit has been so issued under sentence (1) shall place and keep a competent person at all times in charge of the fire while burning or smouldering and shall provide that person with sufficient appliances and equipment in order to prevent the fire from getting beyond control or causing damage or becoming dangerous.

(3) This regulation does not apply to small confined fires used to cook food in grills and barbecues.

### Section 1.4.12:

A portable incinerator or other portable device or appliance for burning garbage, rubbish or other waste material shall not be erected or used nor shall any enclosed fire be built, set or maintained outside the walls of a building without a permit from the Fire Chief.

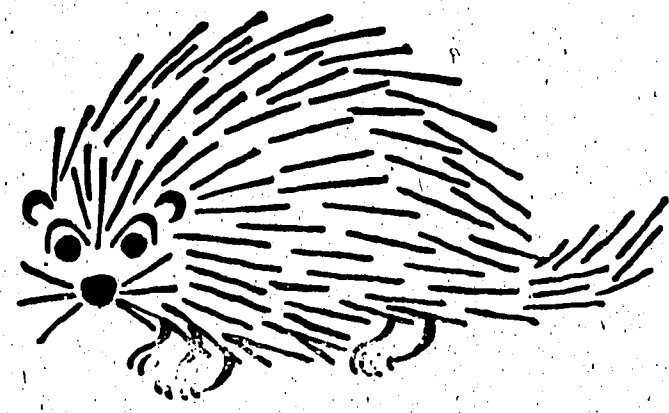

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## About This And That

### The Music Festival

In two weeks the Digby Music Festival will be in progress. To lovers of music this will be an event of interest. To parents and friends of performers, the Digby Music Festival will also be a highlight of the spring season as they listen with pride to the results of many weeks of practice endured by the performers. The planners of the festival will have a number of interests including their interest in seeing that the festival is a total success.

There are others who have an interest in the festival more interest than they realize. We are thinking specially of those business houses who make the festival financially possible by placing an advertisement in the Music Festival program. In most cases this was a donation given without much thought except to help the festival financially. The donation, however, is not only a financial assistance to the festival, but the advertisement pays dividends to the donor in bringing his business name before the public, especially if the festival is successful in attendance and many people make use of the program. There is another way in which industrial firms and businesses get repaid for their assistance in promoting the Music Festival. An interest created in music can reflect in attitudes of future employees. This might come back home sooner than the donor to the Music Festival expects. Personally, this writer is never more at ease than when the voices of employees are heard in song. It usually denotes happiness and contentment and we operate on the principle that an employee, no matter how efficient, is not doing his or her best if disgruntled. Furthermore, the disgruntlement is contagious and causes discontentment among other employees. The reverse, of course, is often true. Then again, expression in music is also a good method in releasing pent-up feelings. This, in itself, is helpful though we prefer to think of singing employees as being contented. To some, this idea might seem far fetched, but did you ever know of company choral groups being organized? We have them in Nova Scotia. There are several benefits from a choral group. There are the advertising, publicity and public relations which a choral group brings to a company. These are worth dollars and cents to the company. But the company chorus goes much further. It can serve as an appealing employees relations program, promoting company spirit, harmony and contentment. These are worth dollars and cents, too. Besides, it has been often thought that music, voice or instrument, helps an employee to discharge the duties with greater ease and efficiency.

There are, of course, many benefits derived from music festivals. What would a church service be like without that special ministry from music? Music helps the individual church attender to express, by song his most reverent form of worship. Someone has said, "If you have any soul worth expressing, it will show itself in your singing." The music festivals help to produce future choir directors, organists and choir members.

We must not overlook the fellowship in music festivals. Nor can we overlook the fact that music, itself, can be the foundation of a fine community fellowship.

The music festivals can start a young person on the road to a career in music. Such a career can be a means of livelihood and also a means of bringing pleasure and happiness to others by voice or instrument. Through music festivals, the student not only learns music but they learn to appear before the public with grace, poise and charm which in most cases are not so superficial as to be forgotten as soon as the performer steps off stage.

An interest in the Digby Music Festival can have far reaching results. Let's show that interest in 1966 and let's work up to a really important music festival event for the centennial year 1967. Let's keep this important institution, the Digby Music Festival, an assured annual event.

### The Challenge Of Cancer

Cancer presents one of the greatest medical challenges of the 20th century. This challenge is being met by the combined efforts of hundreds of thousands of volunteers in different countries of the world. In Canada, the effort is directed through the Canadian Cancer Society. Its function — as stated in its letters patent — "to reduce the mortality from cancer."

The Canadian Cancer Society is the only national voluntary health agency fighting cancer through research, education and service. Its sole source of funds is voluntary gifts from the public collected during the annual April campaign.

The Society was incorporated as a national body in 1938 as a result of action taken by the Canadian Medical Association and lay groups in response to the problem.

It grew out of a request from doctors for a lay medical organization that would help bring cancer patients and their families together.

Today there is a division of the Society in each of the ten provinces and more than 1400 active and paid subscribers from coast to coast. Several of these divisions are throughout Digby County. Their work of raising funds from time to time has been reported in this newspaper. We would commend them to you and solicit your patronage on their behalf.

### Digby Town Taxes

Few taxpayers in Digby, if any, would quarrel with the town that lowered the tax rate from \$4.65 per \$100 of assessment to \$3.50 per \$100 of assessment as was published in the Courier last week. However, if the law of averages works out, none of us had better get too gleeful over our good fortune. So far the tax bills have not been issued (at least, not before this is being written) and it could be that some people might be disappointed if they are looking for a reduced tax bill. If your assessment on your dog house was \$100 last year it likely is \$146 this year. On the \$100 last year you paid \$4.65. On the same \$100 dog house

(equivalent to \$146 this year in 1966, you will be paying 146 x 3.50 or \$5.11. Right? Just don't want anyone to be fooled by the rate. That's all.

We would like to have seen the rate \$3.18. But, we are not complaining. You can't have your cake and eat it, too. The town must provide services for us and we must pay for them.

### Stuck To Their Decision

We cannot help but commend the town council for sticking to their decision of not proclaiming a holiday on Easter Monday. Not that we were against having a holiday. Our plans to spend Easter Monday had already been made, and had to be changed. The reason we commend the town for sticking to their decision is because we feel that the councillors have been put into office to make decisions and they should not be blown about by every wind. We also commend those who stood behind the council in their decision. There are other towns throughout the Valley and South Shore of Nova Scotia which did not see fit to proclaim Easter Monday as a holiday so the Digby councillors were not too far astray in their thinking anyway.

Naturally, a holiday on Monday is difficult at a newspaper office but we have always scrambled out alive when there has been one and have enjoyed the holiday, too. This, of course, demanded every cooperation by the staff, to be sure. But, on the whole, a holiday at the first of the week does play havoc with deadlines and advertising revenue at a newspaper office. When an advertisement is sold, that is not the end of it. Often, it has to be drafted up, it has to be set up in type, the type has to be put together in proper form and it has to be printed. That takes time. Most merchants when they sell a can of peas, just pass the can to the customer and take the payment. They do not have to process the canning of the peas. Neither does the saleslady have to manufacture a dress. When the sale is made, it is pretty well over and done.

But we did get off our subject, more or less, didn't we? We were going to suggest that after the January experience, our councillors might get the feeling of the merchants on the matter before the council meeting which is to consider a holiday. Wonder if the merchants would be unanimous anyway? Your guess is as good as ours.

### Be Aware - Drive With Care

It's easier to get out of jail than to get out of a driveway on Birch Street, said a neighbour lady last week, as she made a half dozen tries and held up a dozen cars trying to make the street in safety. With cars parked, sometimes, over side walks (sometimes not) the view is often closed off in both directions and we really had to agree that you take your life in your hands. Whether you nose out or back out (we've tried both ways) there is little difference. Don't know that we dare ask for "no parking" signs on Birch St., but any of the women on Birch Street, we are sure, would be willing to bear the humiliation of a sign "Beware, women drivers" just to be sure nobody comes along Birch St. at more than 30 miles per hour and go slant bang into a car nose end or a rear end.

Things are getting no better on Birch St. traffic-wise. In fact, there are times like Saturday morning when it seems twice as bad as anytime a year ago. We knew we had found the reason when we counted thirty odd cars in the Liquor Commission yard. Imagine what a problem police would have with thirty cars parked on front street where the old liquor store used to be. We do not envy them their release. They probably deserve it. In the meantime, please "beware of women drivers" on Birch St. By the way, an occasional courteous driver will stop and signal for you to make the brave attempt while he keeps the road clear.

Driving a car is serious business and we do not mean to make it appear otherwise. Take for instance the high number of high way accidents in Nova Scotia over the Easter weekend. A number of these were in Digby County. Streets, highways and cars need to be made as safe as possible but we must never overlook the fact that people cause accidents. More than 60% of all road crashes are directly attributable to driver error of some sort. No matter what, the driver is in control of the highway and the car. Be aware. Drive with care. Every where.

I have a cold coming on, and I intend to make the most of it. As I swirl hot coffee, I am taking a mental inventory of each aching joint. When my beloved comes home, I intend to describe each ache in agonizing detail. If luck is with me, this could be the night when he will close me with hot lemonade, and send me up to a hot bath and bed while he gets the kids their supper and washes the dishes.

It could, I said, be the night. Such things, I have heard, are possible, but in my experience, highly improbable.

The possibilities inherent in this cold began making themselves obvious as soon as I got up this morning. I did not get up, as a matter of fact, until ten minutes past eight. The day since, has been a complete shambles.

People used to think that midnight was the witching hour, but I think they must have miscalculated. If any hour of the day holds real magical properties, it is eight o'clock in the morning. That hour can make or break my day. If I get up one minute, or ninety minutes before eight, the day has a fighting chance to go along smoothly, and I just might get all my work done. Let me stay in bed until one minute past eight, and I may as well not get up at all.

I did not finish the breakfast dishes this morning. Little people who had stepped into mud puddles over the tops of their boots, kept running in and out of the house. I lost track of the number of socks and shoe changes which took place around here.

I did manage to do a wash in the automatic machine. While I was upstairs making the beds, the machine somehow got plugged up, and overflowed about two inches of water all over the kitchen floor. This, at least, forced me to wash the kitchen floor, which I had intended to do, but in view of the confusion of the morning had decided to put off.

When I finally got around to hanging the wash out in the delicious, bird-song laden sunlight of early April, I saw the much changed little people, and a neighbor child, sitting on a bank of snow, joyfully dangling their bare feet into a puddle four inches deep. They were not, they explained logically, getting their shoes and socks wet this time.

At this point, little girl had no more clean clothes, so I brought her in. The dining room, which had been begging to be cleaned for days, gaped mutely at me, but dinner time came, and then the children wanted to go out again, and then the man of the house got ambitious enough to wash some of the April mud off his car, and guess who had to fill up buckets of water.

When, at two o'clock, the combination of breakfast and dinner dishes was not yet finished, and my daughter and I, beneath matted hair, unwashed faces, and grubby clothing looked like refugees from a grease pit, I got around to waxing the floor which had been forcibly washed in the morning. By three, I had gotten us clean, dressed, and looking semi-human. While the floor dried, we escaped into the sunlight. We would, I thought, redeem this lost day by having fried chicken for supper.

The only chicken we could buy in the village was frozen too solid to thaw before suppertime. Little miss three year old distinguished herself by falling flat in a mud puddle, in her new yellow jacket and clean white tights. We came home. The wieners and potatoes are on for supper.

Do you know what I would do if by any chance this cold would get bad enough for me to stay in bed a day or so? I would read all the books and magazines which have been piling up around here for months. I would sit up in bed, and sew on buttons and darn socks, and put in new elastics. I would write stories and articles until my inspiration ran out, and then I would start on the letters I have owed since Christmas. I would doze lazily off to sleep whenever I felt like sleeping. Then, on those days when I will be recovering but will still be much too sick to go about the ordinary routine of housework, I will sew, until I reach the bottom of those ambitious bales of cloth and patterns in the sewing room. If the recovery should really be slow, I would sit in the sun for days, filling canvases with things I have been planning to paint for ages.

But what's the use? I can remember being sick enough to go to bed exactly five times in the past eleven years. Do you know what I did those five times? I read, and mended, and wrote, and slept.

Tomorrow, I will probably be my usual disgustingly healthy self. Do you know what I'll do tomorrow? I'll wash the dishes, change the children, make the beds, do the wash, cook, and maybe clean that dining room.

I will put the coffee pot on around ten. Coming over?

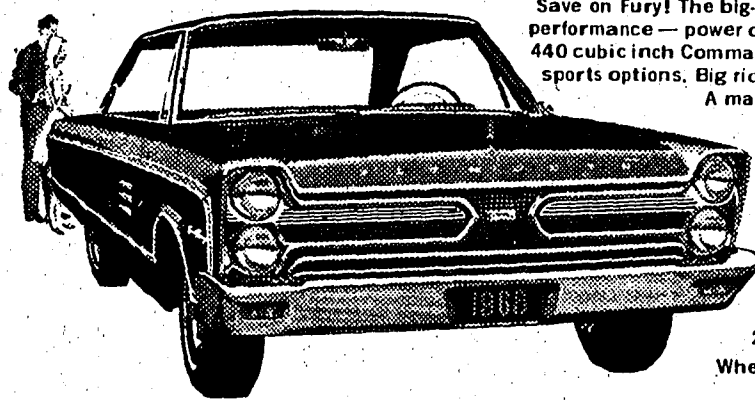

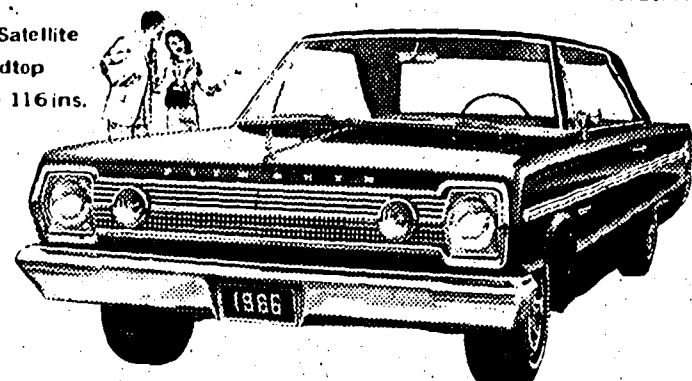

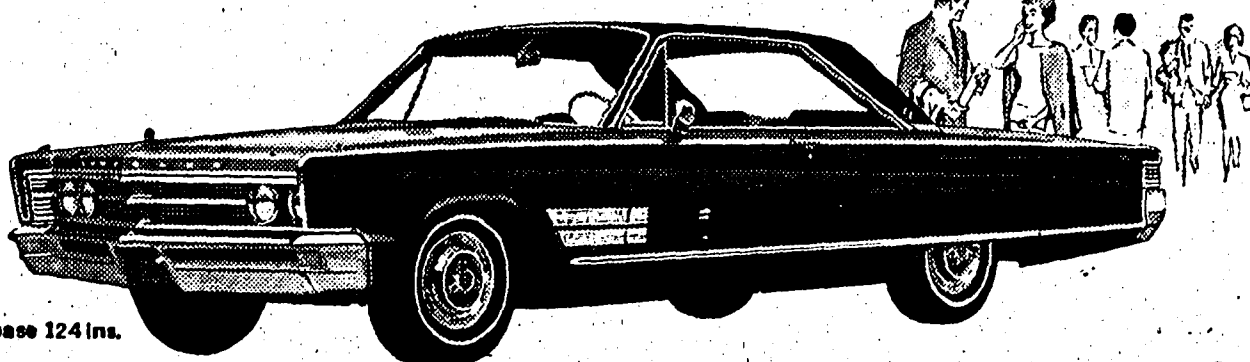

Did you know that Clem-entsdale had quite a few busi-nesses and industries for their people to work at in the good old days.

How many remember when there was a cooper making barrels of many sizes and kinds but mostly apple barrels to pack our own apples in and now most of these trees have been cut down and we buy apples in a plastic bag. Alexander Miller was the cooper and did this work on the place now owned by N. D. Sanford.

Then there was Cameron's Blacksmith Shop on the opposite side of the road from the cemetery where all horses and oxen got their new shoes while the men exchanged many a good story.

Baird's Cobbler Shop, where Mason Wamboldt now lives, where William Baird made all kinds of shoes and boots, including the high button boots which were in style at that time.

The Clute Store, near where the garage is, opposite Maurice Potter's house. The other store first owned by Richard Sanford is now owned by D. W. Baird. The only community hall was on the second floor of the Sanford store where all of the activities of the village were held. This place has long since been made into an apartment.

Don't forget the Pyne brothers. Sam and Will, who did the mason work for many of the buildings now here. The rifle range was enjoyed by the young men on the Potter Road.

The first school house was built on the little hill by the Baptist church. Later years another school was built which has long been forgotten because of the new school in the middle of the village.

The first Baptist church still stands and is used. Although changes have been made to it. There used to be a place for baptism in it and old fashioned lamps. The Methodist church, long since not been used for this purpose, has been turned into a warehouse. The cem-

etery behind the building has been neatly kept up in later years.

John York was the wheel-right who made and repaired all kinds of wheels and wagon parts and for sleds and especially the covered buggy wagons. He had his shop where we call the Harland Trimmer place.

There were a number of mills. One on the Elm Tree Brook owned by Euban Potter. There was another shingle mill on the Black Ash meadow on the Brook Road.

There was still another shingle mill where we now call "Back to the Shack". This mill was moved out to the Nigar Line Road for a while and then as years went on moved back to its original place but has long since been gone from this site.

Melvin Potter had a shingle mill on what is known as the Tommy Trimmer Brook.

The post office was in part of Sanford's Store. Later a building was built by the Trimmer place and owned by Albert Wamboldt. Later this post office was moved across the road and still later it was moved up the hill until finally we have a new building built on the opposite side of the road from the old building.

The tavern where people travelling could "put up for the night" as the folks used to say, and their teams would be taken care of, before the men would even think of removing their "shanks" or heavy coats. These "shanks" were made from oxen.

Everyone had their own "Smoke Houses" where the hams and bacon were smoked for Easter. How many know that the "Poor House" was right here in this village before it was moved to Bridge town? There was a "grist mill" or poor mill as they called it where the inmates of the farm worked. There are graves of some of these people there that can still be found. Ed Wright took care of this place, then later Glidden Final.

There was a shingle mill and a threshing mill on the brook at the end of the Quarry Road where it joins the road leading to Clementsport.

There still remains places where they "mined iron" and hauled it to Moose River to the iron smelter. This Moose River is what we now call Clementsport.

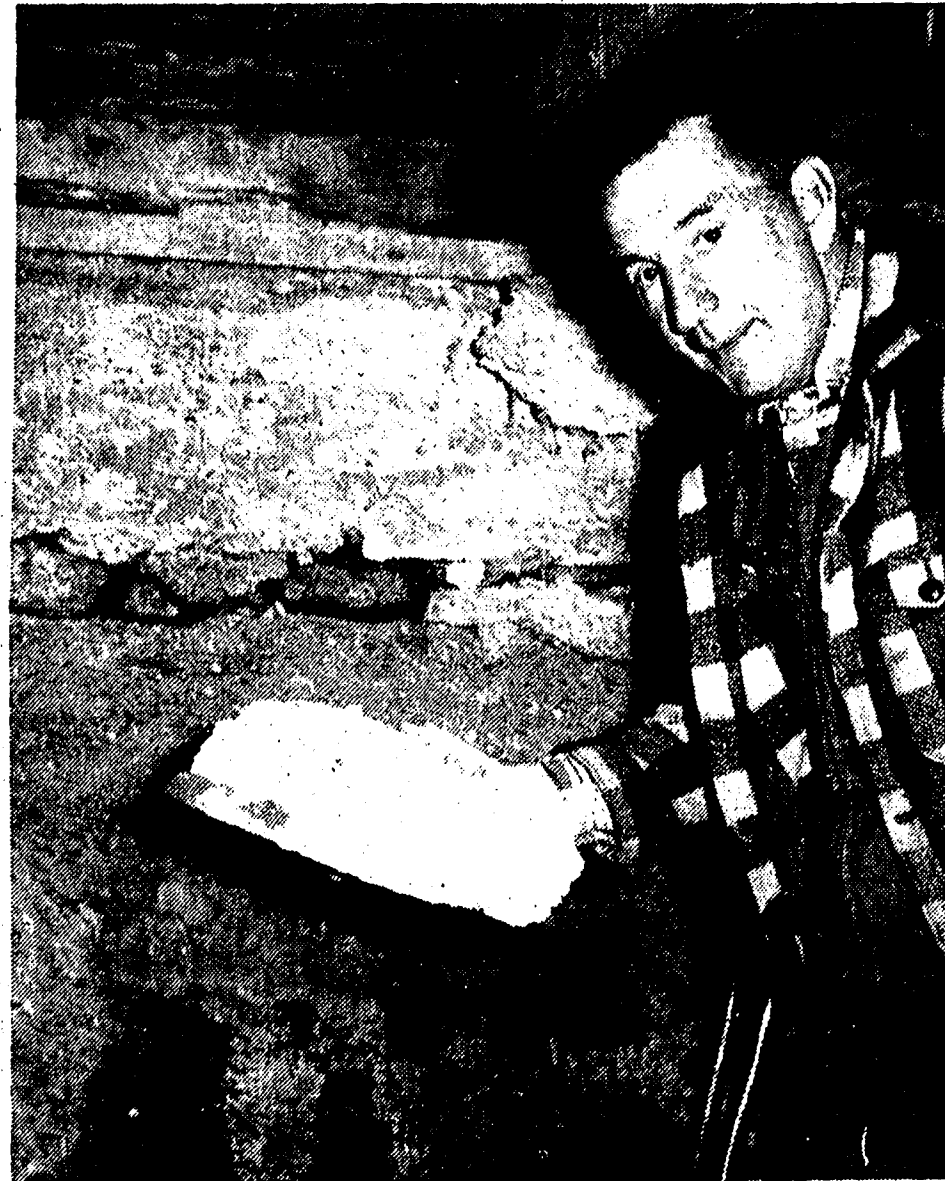

## BURNING PERMITS REQUIRED

FROM APRIL 15 TO OCTOBER 15

The following are the only purposes for which a fire may be set in or near any woods:

(a) clearing land (c) obtaining warmth

(b) cooking (d) some industrial purpose

"Provided that from April 15th to October 15th no person may within 60 rods (1,000 feet) of any woods make a fire for clearing land or any other like purposes, or set up or operate a steam or internal combustion engine at any time without the authorization of a Provincial Forest Ranger or Sub Ranger."

"Any person who is aware that a fire is burning in any forest land shall notify a Forest Ranger or the Department of Lands and Forests."

(Above quoted from a summary of Part II of the Lands and Forests Act relating to forest fires.)

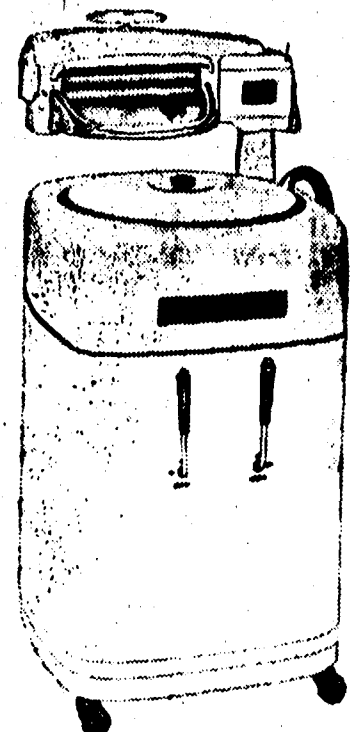

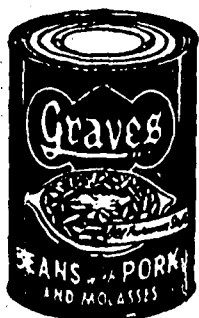

## COMEAU FOUND GUILTY—TO BE HANGED JULY 20

Robert Randall Comeau, 21-year-old Digby fisherman, was found guilty of capital murder yesterday, and was sentenced to be hanged, in Yarmouth, on July 20. The trial was held before Mr. Justice Fred Bisset at the Supreme Court in Yarmouth. Defence was upheld by Philip Woolaver, Digby barrister.

The charge arose out of the death last July of a 16-year-old Halifax school girl, Thais Marie Haskins, whose nude and battered body was found in bushes at Yarmouth early on July 29 after attending a dance at the Youth Centre on July 28.

Both the Crown and the defence completed their cases on Tuesday, the Crown having called 32 witnesses and produced 18 exhibits during the trial which opened on April 12.

Testifying on Tuesday was Inspector D. J. Wright, who was a staff sergeant with the RCMP in Yarmouth last fall. He testified that he took a statement from Comeau in Yarmouth RCMP detachment on the night of August 9.

Inspector Wright, now serving with the RCMP in Newfoundland, told the court that Yarmouth Police Chief Eugene Nickerson was present when he obtained the statement from Comeau.

In the statement, which the inspector read in court, Comeau said he met a girl from Halifax at the dance in Yarmouth Youth Centre. After the dance, Comeau said he saw a girl he did not know walking along the street.

He said he followed her, thinking awful things of killing someone — and hiding them. He said that he grabbed her and covered her mouth with a handkerchief. When the girl screamed, he stabbed her in the back a couple of times with a jack knife he had.

Comeau said in the statement that he "didn't want to rape her — I just wanted to kill her. He said in the statement that after stabbing the girl, while walking along the edge of Tooker Street, they went into the ditch, and he "went completely out of my mind." He said he did not remember anything after that.

Comeau later went into a nearby field and laid down in grass beside a fence, and later returned to the MV Zephyr on the Yarmouth waterfront and put his bloodstained shirt and trousers under the mattress of his bunk, the statement added.

Defence counsel, Woolaver, objected to words in the statement which included "was not threatened or induced," to which Inspector Wright said that these words were his own, but that he had read and explained them to Comeau, and Comeau had agreed to the words and then signed the statement.

Inspector Wright said that Comeau was not told he was under arrest until after the statement had been given.

Corporal Gerald Howard, NCO in charge of Yarmouth RCMP detachment, testified on Tuesday that he took Comeau to the detachment from the MV Zephyr shortly after the dragger docked in Yarmouth August 9.

Corporal Howard said that he and Comeau talked in the detachment office for three-quarters of an hour. He said that Comeau told him that he and Wayne Allen (a fellow crew member) left the vessel about 8:30 p.m. July 28, and went to Allen's home, where they consumed beer. The two arrived at the dance about 10 p.m.

Corporal Howard told the court that Comeau identified Thais Marie Haskins from a photo in his office. He said Comeau told him he had seen the girl at the dance.

Comeau told the Corporal that after the dance, he threw up on his sweater, and tossed it into a garbage can. Corporal Howard said Comeau also told him that he arrived back at the Zephyr about 12:30 a.m.

A witness on Monday was Comeau's uncle, Arthur Everett, of Digby, with whom Comeau had lived since he was eight days old.

She pointed out that in most countries of the world a census was carried out at intervals to take stock of human resources and to use as a basis for public and private planning. The meeting, scheduled for Thursday, April 28, will convene at the Digby Mental Health Centre at 10 o'clock. Similar study groups have been formed in many towns from Yarmouth to Sydney.

Mr. Scott said that alcoholism is among the top four of public health problems and more than a million people in Canada are affected by the disease.

Mr. Scott made it clear that the foundation is not involved in the promotion or prohibition of the sale or consumption of alcoholic beverages. The prime objective of the foundation is the prevention of alcoholism through education and information, to carry on a study of alcoholism problems and focus attention on them and to assist in treatment and rehabilitation programs for alcoholics. The groups study the problem at a local level and work with other civic and service groups. It was suggested by Mr. Scott that the groups consist of 10 or 12 people of open minds who would meet once or twice a month to study the types of alcoholism, alcoholism and the driver and other phases of the problem.

Mr. Scott said that one objective of the study groups is to clear up attitudes toward alcoholics. Nine out of ten alcoholics, he said, are not found on "Skid Row." For the most part they continue to function as members of business and professional society, as husbands and wives, without admitting they have become dependent on alcohol. An alcoholic, above all, does not want to lose his job, Mr. Scott said, and in this way industry can be of great help in assisting the alcoholic to see the danger and seek help. Once the potential alcoholic recognizes the danger signs and seeks help, complete recovery is possible.

Mr. Scott, who resides in Amherst, was in Digby on Thursday to make arrangements for the meeting on the 28th.

### Library Notes

At a meeting Thursday evening of the trustees of the Digby Library Association, June 3 was set as a tentative opening date. A program is being planned to mark the occasion.

Work at the library is being carried out totally by volunteer labour. A number of shelves have been built and others must be completed before the cataloguing committee can get deep into their task. The membership committee is also hard at work.

### To Induct New Rector

Trinity Parish church in Digby will be the scene of an impressive ceremony at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, April 25th, when the service of Institution and Induction of the new Rector, Rev. George Morris, will be held.

The Rt. Rev. W. W. Davis, Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, will officiate at the service. He will be assisted by Clergy of the Diocese of Annapolis and the Diocese of Nova Scotia. During the service the keys to the churches of Trinity Parish will be presented to the new Incumbent by the church wardens.

A general invitation to attend the service of Institution and Induction has been issued by the church and invitations have been extended to civic and municipal officials, to the heads of organizations and to the Clergy of the various denominations.

The Rev. George Morris, the new Rector of Trinity Parish, has been serving as senior Curate in the Parish of St. John the Baptist in Kidderminster, Worcestershire, England. He is a West Indian by birth and received his early education in Barbados. He was ordained in 1962 by the Lord Bishop of Worcester after theological training at Queen's College in Birmingham.

Mr. Morris is married and his wife, Norma, is a nurse. They have an adopted son, Anthony.

### Red Cross Prepares For Clinic

A committee has been formed to prepare and conduct a clinic to assist in the detoxification of alcoholics in the Digby area. The clinic will be held at the Lions Club Hall, which has a large number of rooms available for the purpose.

The Red Cross meeting was chaired by the Branch president, Mrs. R. B. Leach, with Mrs. J. J. Britton and Mrs. B. H. Ruggles presenting the secretary's and treasurer's reports respectively. A bill for \$31.08 was authorized in payment for 6 pairs of canteens recently purchased through Red Cross headquarters, to be added to the Sackoon Loan equipment of the Branch.

The report of the Women's Work Committee, presented by Mrs. H. M. Warne, showed a recent shipment of finished articles which had been forwarded to headquarters and which included 6 quilts, 20 blankets, over 90 miscellaneous items of sewing and knitting and 1,000 gauze wipes for the Blood Transfusion Service. A further shipment was reported to be ready for packing.

Mrs. George Winfield, of the Disaster Relief Committee, reported that two layettes had been given out locally during the past month, upon recommendation of the Public Health Nurse. Mrs. Ralph Berwick's report for the Ways and Means Committee showed receipts of \$12.40 from the Ten Cent Teas for the month, and expressed thanks to those who had contributed refreshments for the weekly meetings.

In reporting on the financial campaign of the branch, Mrs. Allen Harris reported that final returns were expected at an early date. In the meantime, it was stated, the sum of \$500 had been forwarded to headquarters, with a further amount on hand which it was hoped, with the receipt of promised donations, might eventually reach the branch quota of over \$700.

The meeting closed with a motion to hold the branch annual meeting on June 15, prior to closing the work room for the summer holidays, arrangements to be made for a guest speaker and an afternoon tea in connection with the meeting. The usual social hour was held following adjournment, with refreshments served by members of the Ways and Means Committee.

### Firemen Busy

Digby firemen were called out Wednesday to fight a grass fire burning out of control on residential properties near the Elementary School in the south end of town.

During the past week brush fires have sprung up in several places in the Digby area. Fire fighters from the Department of Lands and Forests extinguished blazes near Jackson's Crossing, on the Digby Neck highway; another in Bay View burning between the Shore Road and Lighthouse Road, and one in the Acacia Valley. The Digby Fire Department was also called to some of the brush fires.

### Collect \$112 For Heart Fund

Thirty cities and towns of the province organized campaign units and exceeded the provincial goal of \$61,000 in the Heart Fund appeal for Nova Scotia. The total raised was \$69,031 or 113%.

In Digby the amount collected was \$112.00, which was 74% of the goal. The local organizer was Mr. D. Cummins.

Boards of Trade within Digby County, as well as the Annapolis Valley, affiliated boards of Trade have made plans to hold a "Heart Week" in the province.

A recent week Nova Scotia Fisheries Minister E. D. Robichaud said the federal department of fisheries restrictions on herring operations in the Bay of Fundy should either be justified or drastically modified. He called for Federal Fisheries Minister Robichaud to "stand up in Parliament and justify the closure," which has been in effect since 1964, and which stretches from Grand Manan Island to a point off Saint John's County.

J. Patrick Nowlan, M.P. for Digby-Annapolis-Kings, also asked when the government planned to lift the two-year-old ban on herring fishing along the New Brunswick shore which had forced the Grand Manan fleet into Nova Scotia waters.

It is understood that Fisheries Minister Robichaud has called representatives of the Nova Scotia Government and other interested parties to a conference to be held in Fredericton May 7 to review the federal policy on herring fishing in the Bay of Fundy. Mr. Robichaud asked Mr. Nowlan in the Commons that day he had advised Nova Scotia Fisheries Minister Haliburton of the meeting.

Mr. Robichaud has stated that the purpose of the seasonal closure is to protect the quality of fish in the 177 weirs in operation in the area, and to ensure a continuous supply to the nine sardine canneries during the summer months.

"A dreadful disease?" I echoed, sympathetically, reaching for the telephone. The local doctor happens to be a close relative.

Yes, the pudgy little man almost sobbed, as I started to dial. It called loneliness. You cannot imagine how I long for someone intelligent and educated, like myself, to talk to."

I put the telephone back on its cradle. I guessed, not so much because he so obviously considered himself a bastion of intelligence and education, but because I had heard there was an Irish schoolteacher in town, that he was a schoolteacher. I was suddenly acutely aware of my disheveled state of dress and the disgraceful condition of the house. I rehearsed my how-terribly-embarrassing-etc. expression, and invited my caller to come back in the evening when my husband would be home. Perhaps we would be able to cure him of his dreadful disease.

"Bring your wife along too!" I told him as I ushered him out of the door.

"Oh, I'm sorry, but you see," he said, "my wife is a professional artist — her pictures hang in all the important galleries in the world. She is working on a . . ."

"Commission?" I filled in.

"Commission," finished the little man, pleased at having found the word.

By the appointed hour, the house was arranged in the spare, comfortable manner which I hoped befitted us intellectuals. I had prevailed upon the man of the family to wear his country squireish looking tweed jacket. I would have felt him to be looking a bit more the part had he been smoking a pipe and reading Plato, but he does not smoke, and our last copy of Plato seems to have got lost somewhere among the 1943 Batman comics. I wore my most intellectual looking, tweedy, skirt and sweater, and a pair of deep thinking, heavy brogues. We rehearsed scintillating things to say as we waited to cure our prospective caller of his loneliness.

When our guest arrived, he immediately settled his pudgy frame into the biggest chair in the room, and began his end of the intelligent conversation.

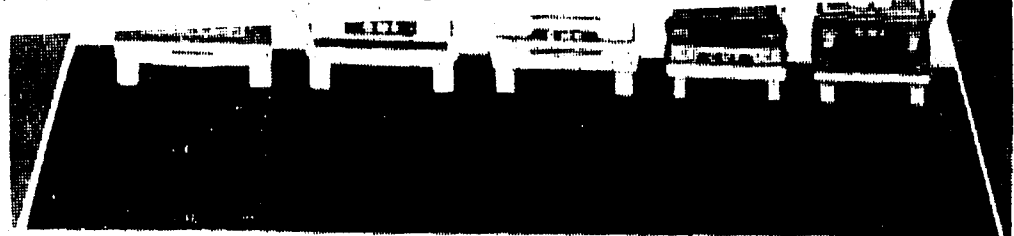

Mr. Everett said he visited Comeau in Yarmouth County Jail last August 10, and when asked his nephew if he had done this terrible thing, he said Comeau replied "I stabbed her twice."

He spoke to Comeau outside the cell block in Yarmouth County Jail, and Comeau told him that on the weekend of July 21, he was disturbed and had the urge to kill.

During cross-examination, Everett testified that he went to visit Comeau in Yarmouth County Jail following completion of the preliminary hearing last October.

He said they talked about the hearing, and Comeau told him "I don't remember saying those things to you, Uncle Art."

Defence counsel, P. R. Woolaver, asked what he meant.

"I took it to mean the things I said at the preliminary hearing," replied Everett.

"What things?" asked Mr. Woolaver.

Everett said he felt it was with reference to his testimony at the hearing in which he related a conversation at the jail with Comeau, when Comeau had told him he "stabbed her twice."

Everett said that during his first visit to the jail, Comeau said that "they" had told him that he had stabbed the girl more than twice. He understood "they" to mean the RCMP.

He said Comeau described being interrogated by RCMP Staff Sergeant Wright, Everett said his nephew told him that he was scared of the RCMP officer, and that he wanted to "jump out the window."

One of the witnesses called was Capt. William Gidney, of the motor vessel Zephyr.

Capt. Gidney said he visited Comeau in Yarmouth County Jail the day after his arrest. He spoke with Comeau alone in the jail.

"I think I spoke first," Capt. Gidney testified. "I said hello and said what kind of a mess did you get yourself into? ... did you do this terrible thing?"

"He just said 'I don't know.'"

I don't know, I don't know," Capt. Gidney continued. "Then he said 'I stabbed her twice.'"

Capt. Gidney said Comeau put his arms through the cell bars and cried. "For a minute or two nothing was said at all. Then we started talking of other things," he testified.

Under cross-examination by defence counsel P. R. Woolaver, Capt. Gidney said that six weeks later, he again visited Comeau in the jail, and at that time Comeau denied having done anything to do with the crime.

Among the witnesses on Saturday was Yarmouth Town Police Officer Eugene Nickerson, who said he was called to "Traker Street" about 6:30 a.m. July 20. When he arrived he saw a body lying in tall grass, about 15 feet from the street.

He was later present at Yarmouth Regional Hospital when the body was identified.

Cpl. Glen Lightle, of Halifax RCMP detachment, told the court he conducted a search in the area where the body was found. He found a number of articles and fibres. He also interviewed some residents of the area.

Also testifying on Saturday was Carol Allen, 14, a Sandford schoolgirl, who said she left a dance in Yarmouth Youth Centre with Ann Bain on the night of July 28. The two girls walked along Main Street, where they met Wayne Allen and an unidentified man.

Shortly afterwards, Carol said a car came along and offered all four a drive. She said the car was driven by a man named Bruce. The girls were then driven home.

Also on the stand last week was Ruth Haskins, cousin of the murdered girl, who said she and her cousin, Thais, met the accused at the dance in the Yarmouth Youth Centre the night of July 28.

Comeau asked her to dance on two occasions, but she refused. He was not rude to her. She said her cousin had been introduced to the accused at the dance, and had been talking to him, but they had not danced together.

Ruth told the court that she escorted Thais Marie to the door at 11:40 p.m., and gave her directions to return to the "Traker Street" home of her uncle, Arthur Haskins, with whom she was staying. Ruth then returned to the dance.

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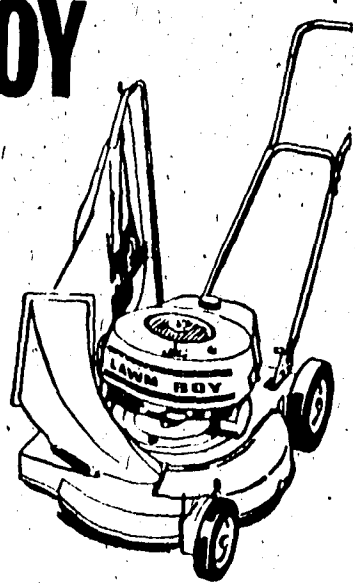

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

In reference to your article in the Digby Courier on Mar. 31, 1966, entitled "Quiet Morning at Fishermen's Wharf in Digby", I would like to state that, if harbour facilities were available at Tiverton, your wharf at Digby would not be congested with the boats of the New Brunswick seiner fleet, they would be all at Tiverton.

In an interview for an article on harbour facilities, Capt. Kenneth Morse of the New Brunswick herring pumper "Mary and Earl" said, "We like to tie up in Tiverton. As I see it, Petit Passage is the only place along these shores where it is possible to build a deep-water harbour to suit the present and growing needs of the vicinity." Unquote. Also, in July last year (1966) a petition was signed by owners, captains and crews of approximately one hundred boats of this fleet and forwarded to the minister of Public Works at Ottawa, petitioning the construction of the proposed Harbour-Causeway complex at Petit Passage.

Whenever possible, during the summer months, the boats of the New Brunswick seiner fleet harbour at Tiverton. Space is limited and there is no protection in time of storm, so our New Brunswick friends have done what they could to help our deplorable situation, realizing also that the Causeway - Complex will be of great benefit to them.

Digby town, I feel, would derive great benefits also, both directly and indirectly. Most certainly there would be fewer boats taking valuable space at your public wharf.

Never before in our history has Long Island, Brier Island and Digby Neck unanimously raised their voices in a request for anything. This Causeway - Complex project is indeed a remarkable effort, in my opinion, and is worthy of the fullest support of our entire country and Digby town, our county seat.

### Digby Day

Who has heard of Digby Day in connection with the Annapolis Valley Apple Blossom Festival for 1966? The day in Digby which is supposed to get the Festival away with a bang-up start? Do you know that when Monday comes that day will be exactly three weeks away? Do you know that right around us are people who, when you mention the day say "Why, is Digby having a special day?"

Oh, yes, the committee in charge is working hard. They have a great day planned. But let us not forget that a good committee and lots of hard work, while necessary, can't alone make the show a success. You really have to have crowds and crowds of spectators and buyers to make the day successful. To date there has been some publicity on what the committee has planned but we have failed to find much, so far, which we think has been especially designed for luring a crowd. "To Digby" to see what the committee has arranged. We have failed to see much by the time this is being written, which will prevent people from making plans to spend the holiday in "Timbuctoo" instead of Digby.

True, the publicity of Digby Day when it has passed, will be good to remind people there is an Apple Blossom Festival on. That, in itself, is good. The whole Valley needs that. But Digby might as well make the most of her opportunity. We are not being selfish. It is a good idea to know Digby Needs.

### Clean-up

We really should have a bang-up clean-up before the crowds and crowds of people are here for May 23. After all a successful day in Digby will depend not only on what people see, but also on the town. But we have to depend on people from all around. Might even have somebody coming from Boston or New York, Montreal or Toronto. Who knows? We should be as attractive as possible for the day.

But, then, there are other reasons, too, for a good clean-up.

By sprucing up homes and throwing out trash accumulated during the winter, a householder will not only make his home a brighter and pleasanter place to live, but also will eliminate fire hazards. Old newspapers, discarded clothing and furniture, and old paint cans, are combustibles on which fires feed. So be safe. Clean-up.

True, you don't expect many May 23 visitors to your attic. But, for safety you can start the clean-up job in your attic. This is frequently a place where old newspapers, furniture, and other discarded combustibles collect. Go through

the newspapers and old magazines, and throw out those you no longer want. Also, look around the attic and see if there is any clothing you will never wear. Throw it out or give it to a charitable organization which, in turn, will pass it on to some needy person or sell the garment. Many charitable organizations make a good income through selling old newspapers and rags, and you can help the charity by turning these old combustibles into useful dollars.

Basements, like attics, are places where unneeded combustibles accumulate. Throw out any old newspapers or magazines that have collected there during the winter. Store flammables like cans of paint in a corner well away from the household heating unit. If you have been painting, and have oily rags, nearly empty paint containers or worn out brushes, throw them out.

Check all the rooms from attic to basement for fire hazards and don't forget the garage attached to the house.

Of course, you'll clean up the yard, too. If you are in a locality which permits the burning of leaves, never start a fire on a windy day. And before you start it, be sure the garden hose is hooked up to the faucet and ready for use in case the fire gets out of hand. However, it is advisable not to burn leaves and most communities prohibit outside fires or require the householder to get a permit to burn leaves or trash.

### Child Safety Week

Child Safety Week is coming up. Definitely, one week to practice child safety is of little avail. Child safety must be practiced every minute of every day. Child Safety Week can only serve by making us all conscious that constant vigil over children is necessary.

Children, of course, must learn to be independent and responsible for their own actions. Child Safety Week reminds parents to teach children responsibility as well as to give them protection.

According to the Canadian Underwriters' Association more than 550 persons lost their lives in fires last year, and most of these were children under 16 years of age who were playing in home fires. Many times that number received burns in home fires.

Never leave little children at home, even for a minute. The Association warns.

We need not go into details on highway safety for children. Parents and teachers cannot stress too much this important part of the Child Safety program.

Then, among many other child safety practices should be those of keeping matches, medicines, sharp instruments and other dangerous articles out of reach of children.

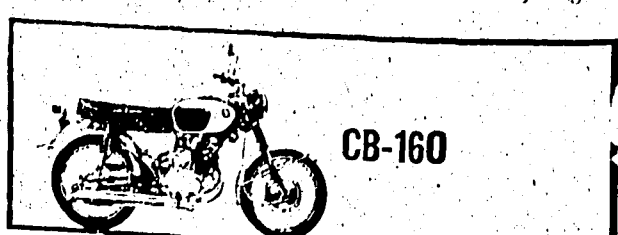

Naturally, you don't look a gift twenty-five dollars in the mouth. When a husband comes across with a twenty and a five, and explicitly states that it is to be spent on a new dress, it is the duty of us wives to see that it is well and truly spent. First, we take into consideration the practicality of the dress. It will have to be able to go almost anywhere. It will have to be almost undamageable by grubby little fingers, or by a couple of hours in a car. It will have to be stylish, but four years from now, when we are still wearing it, we will not want anyone to be able to guess in what year we bought it.

When you live thirty miles from the nearest town, you cannot go examining the dresses in the shops whenever you like. Besides that, salesladies take a notoriously dim view of tired, whining children, who have fallen into two or three puddles on their way to the store. Mine never appear any other way when we go to town. The solution is to know exactly what you want before you go.

The first thing to do is to pore over those wonders of the modern world, the Eaton's and Simpson's catalogues. The dress, you tell yourself, taking your crisp booty out of your purse to finger it one more time, must cost under twenty-five dollars. You examine lace suits, mod dresses, little knits, and skirts and blouses which are in your price range. Already the decision is more complicated than it looked at first.

Your neighbor is going to town. She calls to see if there is anything you want. Yes, you say. Please pick up a couple of fashion magazines. My husband, you tell her proudly, gave me twenty-five dollars to buy a new dress, and I am trying to decide on the best buy. Your friend groans enviously, but when she comes back she brings two dollars worth of magazines. You reimburse her. The dress is becoming a reality.

For days, you live with the magazines. You set one on the window where you can glance at it as you do the dishes. You prop one beside you as you take a bath. One gets coffee spilled on it, and another is dabbed with scrambled eggs as you read at the breakfast table. You give up reading books, and take fashion magazines to bed with you. The magazines advertise other magazines, and you send away for them. One or two come from Europe, and you regard them with a special reverence. You can order fabrics from the magazine from France. The prices range from \$2.00 per yard to \$18.00.

By now you begin to dream dresses. You sigh a deep, blissful, anticipatory sigh whenever you look at the fashion pages in the paper. A-lines, and empire waists, tweeds, and plaids, and Swiss dots flash through your mind at the oddest moments. With so many styles to choose from, the twenty-five dollars seems to diminish each time you gaze longingly at it. Perhaps, you tell yourself, it would be better if you make a few clothes. Then you could have more for the same amount of money. You scour the pattern counters. Although the \$18.00 per yard stuff from France is out, you immerse yourself in the fabric pages of \$3 and \$5 a yard. You mark on the calendar, beginning two weeks from today, I WILL TAKE THIS WEEK OFF TO BUY CLOTHES. You make up an order to mail order house for cloth, thread, zipper, and zippers. You note, with some regret, that the order comes to twelve dollars. You tell yourself that the order is worth it, but you are thinking for so long. Counting the pattern costs, postage, and the magazines, this is going to be an expensive wardrobe. You decide it would be better not to order at all. This purchase is to the family breadwinner.

Just about the time you think your order must have been lost in the mails, one parcel of cloth shows up. There is a note with it, saying that the rest will follow as soon as it is available. One day, both kids take an afternoon nap, and you cut. The week that you promised yourself for sewing arrives, but one afternoon you make a cake, and the next you go out for groceries. The day after that someone drops in unexpectedly, and the day after that you remember that you have owed someone a visit for simply ages and if you do not go today she probably will never speak to you again. Every other day, or so, another piece of cloth drifts in from the mail order house, but somehow all the sewing you promised yourself stays in a heap of patterns and fabrics in the sewing room.

### PREVENT FOREST FIRES

"We are all quite familiar with the tremendous effort being made by the Canadian National Railways in developing the rail passenger business," said Mr. Thompson. Special fares had been well received by the public and had taken profitable business away from the bus operators.

Mr. Thompson said according to reported statements to the federal committee on transportation, the CNR passenger service cost \$60,000,000 to operate in 1965.

"That's \$3 apiece for every one of us whether we ever use the railroads or not," said Mr. Thompson. He said that was part of the "success story" of the CNR special fares.

### Ready for Takeover

George Thompson, president of Acadian Lines Ltd., told the Kentville Board of Trade this week that the eventual end of short-haul rail passenger service, not only in Nova Scotia, but across Canada, was a "fact of transportation life" and, as far as Nova Scotia was concerned, Acadian lines was ready to take over all passenger transportation business.

Mr. Thompson said he believed the Dominion Atlantic Railway wanted to wind up its passenger runs between Yarmouth and Halifax.

"The Valley isn't going to dry up when the DAR rail passenger service is completely finished," said the Acadian president. "It won't be too long in my view before that happens."

"The decline of rail passenger service is a matter of the economic fact of revenue versus expense," said Mr. Thompson. The end of the service was approaching, except for long distance trips, like Halifax to Montreal or Vancouver. The day and the future of bus and air transportation was here and will continue to grow he said.

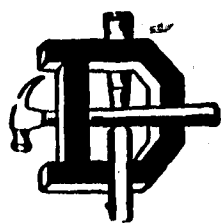

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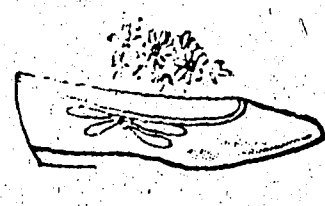

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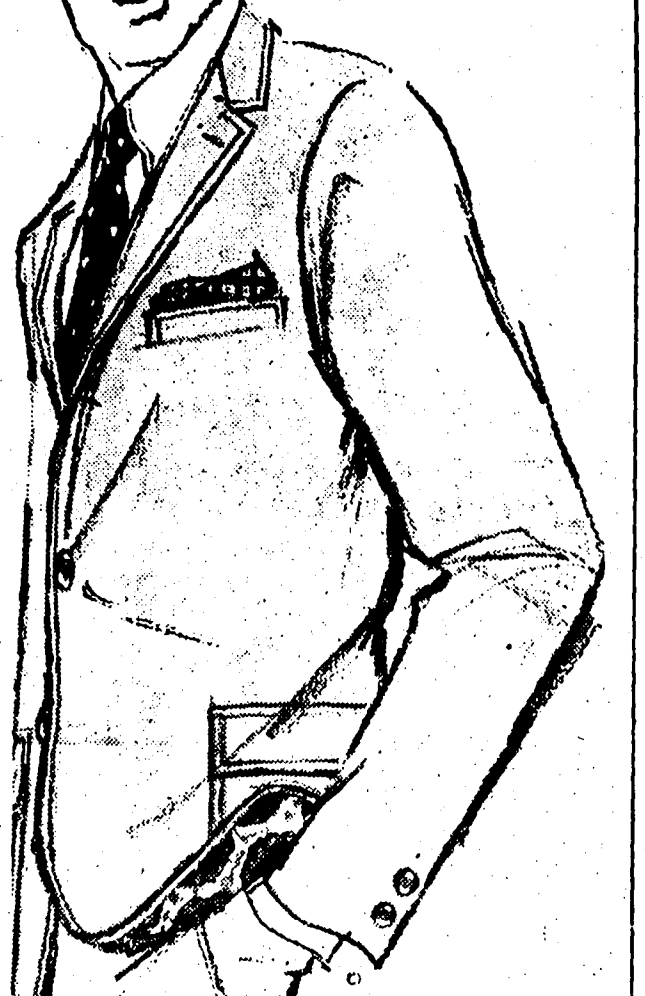

## St. Patrick's Graduation

The annual commencement exercises of St. Patrick's Business College were held at St. Patrick's Church, Digby, May 1st, at eleven o'clock. Change is the pattern. In other words, change is a normal everyday part of life. For the person who looks for the "good old days", these times are going to be particularly distressing.

From this Father developed the thought that woman has to re-define her role or roles in this changing world. Part of her role will be the stability that she will introduce into the changing world. If the woman is not to be affected by the "mad" world, she must have that interior peace and stability that comes from the ability to separate the essentials from the accidentals.

Once the woman knows, accepts and lives these important Christian principles of life, the changing face of the non-essentials loses their threat and confusion for her.

Finally, "no woman is an island." If she finds that peace and stability, she has the responsibility to pass it on. She also has the obligation of looking about her to see how the other half of the world is living. If she is not concerned about the neighbour, seen and unseen, known and unknown, she cannot be classed as a true Christian.

"In a word," said Father Campbell, "the young lady graduating from a Commercial College has the obligation to proceed through life with her eyes wide open, to understand what is going on in the world; how the world is changing. Once she sees what is happening, she must make it her concern to see that all benefit from the changes in society and that some do not become the hopeless victims of the progress of the elite."

## Digby Municipal Council In Semi-Annual Session

Municipal Council opened for the semi-annual session at the Court House on Monday at 2 o'clock. Curtis Prime was sworn in as councillor, filling the vacancy caused by the death of councillor Victor Finnigan.

Councillor Prime was appointed to the building committee for the addition to the Islands Consolidated School.

Regional Turnbull, Emergency Measures Organization coordinator for Digby, was granted permission on Tuesday to address council respecting E.M.O. The council decided to appoint two members to meet with Mr. Turnbull to obtain information about the organization and report back to the 1967 council session.

J. R. Nichols appeared on behalf of the new Digby library and the incinerator operated outside of town by the Digby Salvage and Disposal Co. Charles Halliburton appeared on behalf of those to be operating an air strip at Hill Grove, requesting either a grant or tax concession.

Stewart MacNaughton appeared on behalf of the Digby County Power Board. Council authorized a capital expenditure for 1966 for the hydro distribution system to the amounts of Lansdowne \$1500 and Shore Road \$3000.

Two classes from the Digby Regional High School were welcomed to council by Ward on Ronald Moushore on Monday and Tuesday. On Wednesday the Warden welcomed a class from Weymouth Consolidated School.

In the new comprehensive school program, Mr. Purdy said it is possible to expand under provincial grants and federal aid, especially in the field of commerce. Extension of the commercial area, Mr. Purdy said, is taken care of entirely by the provincial and federal aids if the space is devoted only to commercial purposes. There is a flat grant of \$200 for each student using commercial by fifty percent.

Mr. Purdy expects by 1970 to have 190 students enrolled in commercial, needing 6 shops, 6 classrooms and 6 teachers. Physical area needed will be 15,000 square feet.

Expected enrolment in Home Economics is 200. Accommodation for these could come from reclaimed sections with no new requirements. Other areas could be reclaimed for clothing and home making classes and, according to Mr. Purdy, there would seem little need for more space for Industrial Cooking.

Presently the Industrial Arts Department is most inadequate at D.R.H.S. and with the comprehensive program it would be proposed to have an audio visual centre.

The science rooms, Mr. Purdy stated, were hopelessly inadequate. There should be a chemistry centre and also a physics and biology centre.

Administration and guidance centres, it was decided, should be relocated. A library and auxiliary services should also be provided for.

**Dogs Beware**

After one more reminder, dogs found without a license will be impounded, was the verdict passed for dogs and dog owners when the dog problem in Digby was aired at town council on Monday night.

A special committee consisting of Councillors Thomas Cowan and Gerald Hoare had been named at the April council meeting to consider the dog problem and investigate conditions.

Councillor Cowan reported that a goodly percentage of dogs are not registered in Digby. Owners ignore the town by-laws re dogs because they are not enforced. The present dog-catcher is reluctant to carry out his duty because of the resentment of the dog owners and because of the unpopularity it breeds. There is reluctance also because the dog catcher is not provided with proper equipment.

Councillor Cowan recommended that the town take a definite stand to eliminate this dog problem by seeing that all dogs are licensed or captured and impounded; that the dog catcher is provided with proper equipment and if need be go from house to house to check on licenses and find owners of the dogs.

Wolfville has a new brochure printed to bring more tourists to its very own town. It also had signs done directing people to points of interest. Digby needs both of these items badly.

## Requests School Expenditure Of \$56,000

Appearing before the Digby Municipal Council at the semi-annual session on Wednesday were Keith Raymond, Centreville, chairman of the Digby Regional High School Board; Dr. D. E. Lewis, a member of the D.R.H.S. Board; F. C. Purdy, supervisor of schools in the Digby area; and C. E. Edwards, Inspector of Schools.

The mission of the delegation was to place before council the wisdom of making an expenditure of \$56,000 to bring the Digby Regional High School under the comprehensive school program.

Mr. Raymond brought to the attention of councillors that there was a shortage of classroom space, the school having been built originally to accommodate 300, while the present D.R.H.S. population is 900. Facilities are inadequate, he said, and if they are to enter the comprehensive program they must ask that more space be provided.

F. C. Purdy said that to provide more classrooms the Board has had to infringe on other areas of the school. The greatest increase of students, he said, is in the Grade VII and Grade X range. At present they are short 6 academic classrooms, the science department and commercial departments were both designed for a much less number of pupils and the Industrial Arts and Home Economics departments are overloaded.

Mr. Purdy expects by 1970 to have 190 students enrolled in commercial, needing 6 shops, 6 classrooms and 6 teachers. Physical area needed will be 15,000 square feet.

**Cardoza Speaks At Career Day**

V. G. Cardoza was guest speaker on Wednesday when career day, arranged by the guidance teacher, Mrs. Nola Jeffrey, was held at the Digby Regional High School.

Mr. Cardoza, introduced by C. C. MacInnes, principal, took as his subject "Youth Looks To The Future." The future, he told the students, is your own. It is like a diary. It belongs to the student to open the book and to fill the pages. The ability to fill the book will be given by education, he said, but what the student writes is his to determine.

Many problems beset the student leaving the protection of the school today, the speaker said. Many of these are created by the tremendous change in education in recent years. The fundamental change is in the speeding up of the rate for accumulation of knowledge. This, he said, creates a tremendous number of strains in society.

The number going after higher education today has increased enormously. More are devoting time to the pursuit of new knowledge. Mr. Cardoza said, and the consequence is a rapid growth of new knowledge. Half of what we learn today will be obsolete in 10 years and half of the knowledge we will need in ten years is not available today, he ventured. Graduates of today must prepare to keep step with knowledge, there must be a continuous and ongoing process in order to have security and realize our own competence in the field in which we are engaged. These facts, he said, must be faced both by the graduate student and also by industry and profession in order to keep abreast of new knowledge available. We are caught up in a knowledge explosion, the speaker concluded, and we must use this in moulding successfully our future.

**Why Not Centennial Project?**

Last week we heard some very fine vocal selections (solos and choruses) presented at the Digby Music Festival. It was brought to our attention that no trophies for vocal selections seem to be offered although there have been most commendable performances. The thought has occurred to us that offering a trophy for vocal music in next year's Digby Music Festival would be a most worthwhile Centennial project. How about it? Further, why not make the Centennial year one for establishing scholarships or annual trophies for participants in the Digby Music Festival. Don't wait to be asked. Call up the Digby Music Festival committee and offer now. We are sure that Gifford Lewis, Weymouth, the president, would be most happy to accept. Why not make it a banner year in the musical field? How about choir or choral group trophies? While the purpose of church choirs is not for entertainment or show performance, some recognition might work to spiritual advantage as well.

Centennial might also be a year to revive band music. Of course, since we are writing on Centennial, we might as well suggest that 1967 could be a scholarship or trophy year in Digby County in other fields besides music. And when we suggest scholarships and trophies we are not limiting our imagination to businesses in Digby town. There are some thriving fish farms and other establishments throughout the whole county. There are areas of sports, art, school citizenship and others in which interest can be shown.

Let us not leave you with the idea that Centennial projects must necessarily be the kind that "gives away something", as commendable as this might be. Nor would we want our readers to think that much money must always be involved. Every householder, for instance, can participate in the Centennial by a beautification program on his own premises and for his own benefit. A thousand householders beautifying their own properties can make quite an attractive Digby County. Floodlights installed on personal properties and businesses would brighten up the county for the Centennial year.

It certainly costs nothing to resolve to be especially courteous to visitors in 1967. And the habit could continue. If you are at all in the public eye by nature of your employment you can leave a lasting and favourable impression at any time by being courteous. If you don't believe it, make note the next time you are the customer and the other person is the clerk, the waitress, or the attendant.

It costs very little to make it a special project in Centennial 1967 to drive somebody (local or hotel guest) to church every Sunday. It costs little to take visitors on a picnic, corn boil, lobster boil, fishing, swimming, or sight seeing. Have you ever tried it and found how happy it makes even the rich tourist to just be shown around the country a little bit? If a hundred people in Digby made that a project it would be good advertising for our tourist industry.

Then while we are on this strain, how about brochures, maps, histories and calendars of events as Centennial projects. Want to earn some money for your organization? How about gathering up some historical art treasures or antiques which might be around in private homes and which might be loaned for an exhibition in the Centennial Year?

We are awaiting other ideas from you for Centennial projects in 1967. Can you suggest some? This is May, 1966. In eight more months we'll have come to January, 1967 or Centennial January.

**Congratulations Trophy Winners**

We want to congratulate the trophy winners in the Digby Music Festival last week. The names of the winners appear elsewhere in this issue but we cannot refrain from making special mention of Miss Deirdre Morrell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Morrell, Digby, who excelled in so many performance areas. Deirdre captured four of the trophies, either in solo work or in a sharing basis in piano and duet performances. Both of the highest festival awards - the Rev. E. D. Churchill Memorial Trophy and the Elton Arnold Memorial Cup - were awarded to Miss Morrell. The first was presented to a talented student planning to make music a career, and the second for the best all-around musical performance along with ability. Our congratulations go out to Deirdre for her outstanding ability and to all the other trophy winners. These trophies represent ability, skill, and much effort on the part of the recipients. We are sure of it.

There are others who did not receive trophies but whom we are certain would have been eligible for trophies if there had been more offered for various abilities. These might have been in piano and other instrumental music, or, as mentioned above, there were some very commendable performances in voice. Let us not forget that there is art and there is skill in making the voice a finely tuned instrument to produce tones and to interpret words and put the interpretation over to the listener. It is no easy task to find the proper pronunciation of words (for heard, throat and chest tones) in order to have a full tone and a perfectly adjusted and understandable tone. It is the singing and the beauty in the words of a song or hymn and those must be brought out by the performer in clear pronunciation. Correct diction must accompany the clarity and beauty of tones to make the beautiful voice acceptable. Such skill, too, is deserving of recognition.

Another remark about the Festival. The decision to hold part of the festival in Weymouth was a happy thought. This decision, we believe, was responsible for more participants and a larger audience. We understand there were generally about 250 at the Weymouth performances.

Probably the Centennial year will see more participants from Digby Neck and Islands. So far as we know, Miss Joy Raymond was the only participant this year as far down the Neck as East Ferry. Her participation was appreciated and congratulations are extended to her in receiving the Mrs. Helen Anthony trophy for her piano performance.

Maybe it comes from living in the country, where I cannot run down town every afternoon, or maybe it is simply because we subscribe to more magazines now than we used to, but whatever the reason, I am developing a severe case of itchy coupon clipper. I am weakening rapidly. It is only a matter of days until for my own good, somebody is going to have to forcibly remove me from access to pens, scissors, envelopes, and magazines with coupons in them.

Itchy coupon clipper is an incurable, progressive disease. In its very first stage, the victim thumbs longingly through magazines frothing at the mouth a little, as he realizes what a rich, exciting, and rewarding life he could have, simply by clipping and mailing the coupons in them. He begins his progress down the path to addiction tentatively, by sending for travel brochures, or twenty-five cents and two box tops for a booklet called 95 Ways to Make Canned Spinach Palatable.

Having got his first taste of coupon clipping, the victim of itchy coupon clipper progresses to the second stage. He joins a record club. He places his \$1.98 in an envelope, and eagerly awaits the arrival of his three introductory records (value \$12.00) which are guaranteed to increase his understanding of music, from The Beatles to Bach. He is now hooked on the coupon clipping habit. He will never be the same again.

Hard on the heels of the record club comes the first subscription to a book club. This is the third stage of the disease and it is at this point that the coupon clipper's family begins to notice something peculiar. The field opens wide. Without ever going to the library, the coupon clipper can dramatically increase his knowledge, talk smartly about the latest books, and no longer risk embarrassment when he talks to people who can remember whether a quote comes from the Bible, Shakespeare, or the Reader's Digest.

Nearly all book club ads are accompanied by a little quiz. "How many of these books," they ask, "have you just not got around to reading in the past year? If your score was less than 75, you need help in your reading program. For only \$1.98 you can order any three of the above books and start yourself on the road to success..."

There are children's book clubs, (Are your children getting the stimulating reading they need?), cook book clubs (How many of these famous dishes can you prepare? If your answer is less than 75, you can order any three of the above cook books for only \$1.98). There are classic book clubs, from which all the books are the same color and height so they will look impressive on your bookshelf. There are rare book clubs, and mystery book clubs, and book clubs designed to introduce you to the important works of the century.

After the coupon clipper has passed the book club section of his progress, he moves into the buy by mail section. Here he is offered all sorts of exciting goodies. He can buy bedding, tools, and sword-sharp knives by mail. He can buy paintings and prints, including reproductions of those grotesque, expressionless little people with the big eyes which have achieved fast status lately, and which are described in the ads with such adjectives as haunting, wistful, and waif-like. There are buy by mail clubs, too, for the coupon clipper. He can join an around the world club which will send him a surprise gift from a different country each month. Women who sew, at least in the U.S.A. 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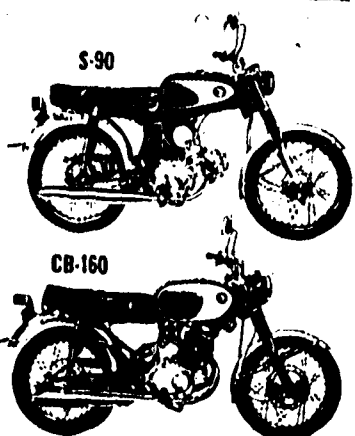

## Bear River Man Assists Training

In an attempt to recapture a colourful chapter of Canada's past, the Centennial Commission, working with provincial governments and a private sponsor, will stage a 100-day Canoe Pageant during the summer of 1967. The pageant will follow the routes of the voyageurs from the Rocky Mountains to Montreal, a distance by water of over 3,500 miles. The canoes will bear the names of the early explorers and their crews will be in costumes of the explorers and fur traders.

It is expected that there will be a brigade of 10 to 12 canoes, one each from the ten Provinces and the Yukon Territory and Northwest Territories. The progress of the brigade along the route will be controlled in such a way as to make possible the staging of Centennial celebrations en route. The intent is that the canoes will start together, follow to an assembly area several miles outside major centres, race into the city or town for special prizes, then group for another lap race to the next assembly area.

The whole program consists of trials in 1965, tests in 1966 and the actual pageant in 1967. Watson Peck, Bear River, is expected to be helping in training of the Nova Scotia crew.

During August, 1965, trials were conducted from North Bay to Gananoque using the route followed by Champlain during his historic voyage of 1615 — across Lake Nipissing to Georgian Bay, through the Great Lakes to Kingston and Gananoque on the St. Lawrence.

At the same time, a survey canoe crewed by paddlers from various provinces and the territories, conducted a route survey from Kenora, across the Lake of the Woods, Rainy River, Lake Superior and the North Channel of Lake Huron to Blind River.

The tests conducted during 1966 will use routes other than that of the 1967 pageant. All ten Provincial governments and the Territories were asked to cooperate in this venture and provide financial assistance. The Provinces and Territories that participate in this pageant will be responsible for recruiting and training of paddlers.

In 1966 the crew will consist of six men in the boat, three men in the car plus gear. In 1967 there will be six in the boat, one in the car plus gear. This is going to be the largest sporting endeavour of any type that Nova Scotia has participated in. To mention the coverage, it is CBS, CBC, CTV, Wide World of Sports, plus many private American and Canadian TV stations, Life, Post and Time Magazines, local radio and newspaper coverage. The Centennial Commission anticipates over 40,000 Canadians to be able to see this first band, that is

without counting those who will watch it on T.V.

The mileage for 1967 will be 3,500 miles beginning at Rocky Mountain House, 180 miles above Calgary, and will end at Expo in Montreal.

The exact mileage for 1966 is approximately 300 miles but it has been tied down secure at this date.

The men need a minimum of \$5,000.00 payable to the Federal Centennial Commission to enter in the world's largest canoe race and for proper training and proper equipment it will take an additional three to four thousand.

## Digby Trade Board Urges 2nd Ferry Here

A resolution was passed at the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday proposing that an additional ferry between Nova Scotia and New England would be best served by using the ports of Digby and a point on Campobello Island near to the ports of Eastport and Lubec, Maine, this being the shortest distance across the Bay of Fundy. The proposal was also founded on the understanding that the proposed ferry is to be Canadian owned and Canadian operated. The resolution is expected to be brought before the annual meeting of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, the federal government and both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick provincial governments.

Other resolutions reviewed from the A.V.A.B.T. dealt with a causeway between Hantsport and Mt. Denson replacing the bridge, a magnetic hill project from Canning to the Look Off, the Fundy Trail project from Blomidon Beach to Victoria Beach and increasing permissive weights for trucks during the road closing period to the same level prevailing in New Brunswick, i.e., 90% on Trans-Canada highway and 75% on all other highways.

Concern was felt by the Digby Board of Trade that no response has come from either the federal government or the provincial government regarding the petition presented requesting a causeway over Bear River.

A letter was read from the Weymouth Board of Trade whereby they gave support and approval to the Digby Board of Trade in trying to maintain and improve the ferry services from Digby across the Bay of Fundy and also fully supporting all efforts made by the Digby Board to improve its terminal and harbour facilities.

A donation of \$25.00 was authorized to be given to the Digby Library Association.

Vincent Snow, C. D. Snow, Reigh Jayne and Stewart MacNaughton were named delegates to the semi-annual meeting of the A.V.A.B.T., which meets in Middleton May 24, when Premier Robert Stanfield will be guest speaker.

The Board decided to ask the membership committee to make a special effort to establish a 1966 membership before the end of the month. Added to the committee on Tuesday was A. Sangster. The committee consists of Charles Haliburton, Graham Saunders, Vincent Snow and Mr. Sangster.

Ralph MacIntyre reported that one repainted sign had been erected to the approach to Digby and that the others were ready for painting.

Mr. Jayne, president, who presided at the meeting, reported that he had correspondence from an oil company in Calgary, Alberta, which requested to hire a boat, from 65 to 90 feet in length, in order to conduct an oil survey.

## Supervisor Visits V.O.N.

Rev. H. S. Hartlin, vice president, presided over the regular monthly meeting of the Digby Local Association Victorian Order of Nurses on Tuesday afternoon. It was reported that Miss Cline, assistant area supervisor V.O.N., had made an official visit in April and Miss Shirley Brown, of the Dalhousie Nursing School, had practiced public health nursing with the V.O.N.

One hundred and sixty-three visits were made in April, 87 were nursing and 18 new patients were received.

The campaign for funds dates were set from June 6 to June 25.

Mayor and Mrs. C. D. Snow and Miss Marguerite Doiron, Digby princess, attended a dance at Greenwood on Saturday night when the Greenwood princess for the 1966 Annapolis Valley Apple Blossom Festival was chosen. L.A.W. Marcelle Langlais was Greenwood's choice.

## Mutual Fire Aid Extended

After a meeting in Yarmouth April 24th and a report made to Digby Fire Department meeting May 4th the services of Western Nova Scotia Firemen's Association in Mutual Aid to neighboring fire departments will be completely organized in Digby County. Further plans are being made to form a division of the association which will include all departments from Cornwallis to Shelburne. A meeting for Digby County departments is being held at the Digby Fire Station May 15th to organize the county.

Communication problems are presently being worked out and it is hoped that boundaries and other items of importance can be finalized at the proposed meeting. This Mutual Aid System set up several years ago has proven to be most efficient in the dispatching of additional equipment when needed as assistance to another department and constant communications are in force during these emergencies by two way radio network existing from Windsor to Digby.

It is hoped that this organization of Digby County will lead to further organizing through Emergency Measures Organization services in the County which is the only County in Nova Scotia lacking these services at present.

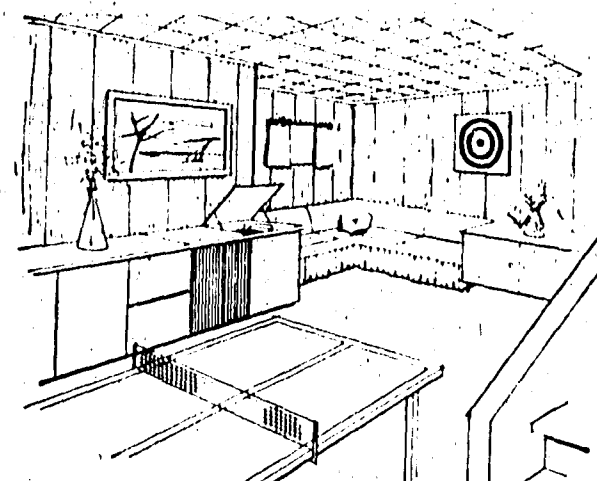

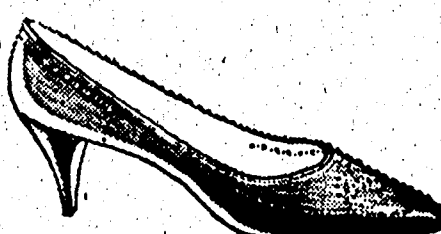

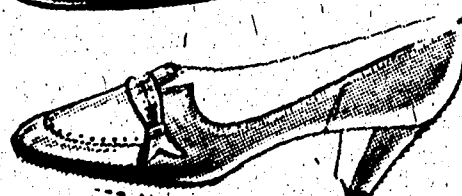

**PROCLAMATION**  
BY THE HONOURABLE E. D. HALIBURTON  
Minister of Lands and Forests

To all whom these Presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern:

Whereas the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia deems it necessary for the protection of the forests to make this Proclamation:

Now Know Ye that the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia under and by virtue of Section 83A of the Lands and Forests Act doth hereby prohibit the setting of fires in woods in any part or parts of the Province except the part or parts situate in the Island of Cape Breton, on, from and after 8.00 A.M. Atlantic Daylight Saving Time (so called) the sixth day of May A.D. 1966 until the fifteenth day of October, A.D. 1966 unless this proclamation is sooner revoked or unless a burning permit has been issued by the Department of Lands and Forests for the purpose set out therein.

Any person setting a fire in contravention of this proclamation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$50.00 for each offence, and in default of payment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding one month, or to both fine and imprisonment.

Of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

### Show Film On Canoe Pageant

The Centennial Commission, working with provincial governments, will stage a 100-day Canoe Pageant during the summer of 1967. The pageant will follow the routes of the voyageurs from the Rocky Mountains to Montreal, a distance by water of over 3,500 miles. The canoes will bear the names of the early explorers and their crews will be in costumes of the explorers and fur traders.

The whole program consists of trials in 1965, tests in 1966 and the actual pageant in 1967. During August, 1965, trials were conducted from North Bay to Gananoque using the route followed by Champlain during his historic voyage of 1615 — across Lake Nipissing to Georgian Bay, through the Great Lakes to Kingston and Gananoque on the St. Lawrence.

A film of such a trial, titled

"The Voyageurs," was shown at Bear River on Saturday night. In attendance were David Caldwell, Dartmouth, Provincial Commodore for the Province of Nova Scotia, and John Duckworth, Halifax, captain of the crew.

The program was presided over by Watson Peck, Bear River, who expects to assist in the training of the Nova Scotia crew.

Stuart MacLean sang "Farewell To Nova Scotia," by Helen Creighton, accompanied by Mrs. MacLean at the piano.

The film depicted the hand-picked six man crew (and one spare), braving the hazards of the rapids and enjoying the peaceful calm of the lakes en route on the trial. In some cases travelling was 70 miles per hour, sometimes 30 miles per hour, sometimes 5 miles and often progress was nil. Eating and sleeping were in the rough, portraying the camp life of McKenzie and other explorers 200 years ago, but dancing and music added

to the enjoyment of the undertaking.

Mr. Caldwell and Mr. Duckworth will be travelling around the province explaining the Centennial Year, showing the film from the National Film Board of Canada and explaining the equipment to be used in Canada's Centennial project which is No. 1 on the Centennial budget. Such equipment consists of a 61 inch paddle, three times the strength of an ordinary paddle and bearing the Nova Scotia coat of arms, tents which can be rolled into small packs, the 25 foot canoe weighing 230 lbs., a replica of 200 years ago, and other equipment. Thistle Knit Mills will provide N. S. tartan head bands and shirts.

Mr. Caldwell and Mr. Duckworth are willing to cooperate with any organization or community which would want to see the film and hear about the event. They would, especially like to make themselves available at large gatherings. Besides informing the public about the canoe pageant,

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## About This And That

### All Roads Lead To Digby

All roads lead to Digby on May 23. Call it Digby Day, call it Apple Blossom Festival (we are never quite sure of our terms) or call it what you will, it really is the beginning of the Annapolis Valley Apple Blossom Festival for 1966. Many who have been or are interested in the festival in general will likely be on hand to see the opening on Monday. In fact, the official opening of "Digby Day" should really be a grand opening of the whole apple blossom event if we are part of the 34th Annapolis Valley Apple Blossom Festival. It should be a gala day in Digby. It should be the best that Digby can do if we are to show ourselves to advantage to people from many parts of the Atlantic provinces. After all, people come from far and near to the Annapolis Valley Apple Blossom Festival. If they hear that it starts in Digby this year, they are more than likely to come to see it start and expect something worthwhile for their effort in coming.

Having said that, we now want to assure our readers that there is a good full program lined up for the day. Preparing a suitable program for such a day as the opening of the Annapolis Valley Apple Blossom Festival is no easy chore. It has been an exceedingly heavy task, particularly for the convenor of the committee, Deputy Mayor Bernard Bell. He has had some willing and faithful workers on the committee but there have been times when it must have looked discouraging when the number of volunteers was so small. Much time, thought and energy has gone into preparation for Monday. It is a new venture. It could be a big thing. We want to commend to those who have been giving so generously of their time and skills. We hope the day will be a grand success for many reasons, one of which, and not the least, is the satisfaction to all those who took responsibility that their efforts were not in vain. Among other reasons we want to see the day a success is that Digby will be judged, somewhat, by the success of the day. The Digby Forum desperately needs any revenue which it might derive from a successful day and, we are sure, the publicity coming from a successful day in Digby will be greatly appreciated by other Valley points which are staging events in connection with the festival, to say nothing of the build-up for the main events in Kentville and area.

As we said in this column before — the program can be planned as a top-notch event but the one thing which will make the day a success is the crowd which comes to Digby to enjoy it.

### Beautification Programs

Rural beautification seems to be the order of the day, especially in some of the Annapolis Valley centres. Every effort is being made in many places to make Nova Scotia as beautiful as possible for Canada's Centennial Year. While an all-out county-wide program has not been undertaken in Digby, there have been efforts made in some of the larger communities in Digby County to beautify surroundings by clean-up programs, tree planting ceremonies and other projects trying to bring about beautification efforts. These are to be commended. There are other properties, though, which leave much to be desired.

There is one fact which is likely to bring to the attention of our readers. Some of the beautification day and neighborhood clean-up programs are carried out in one day. If we are to have a beautification of its best appearance for 1967 we have only a few more days in which to do it. Otherwise, we are going to have our visitors coming to see us while we are in the process of beautification. Any housewife can tell you that such an experience is not a happy one for either the host and hostess or the guest. We should be ready for guests as soon as the beautification is over. Paint-up, fix-up as much as possible in 1966 so that everybody won't be wanting the services of carpenters and painters at once and find themselves disappointed when the Centennial Year arrives.

Most of the clean-up, fix-up program for 1967 is on a voluntary basis by people who have a strong sense of citizenship. There are certain aspects of clean-up, fix-up, however, which might be considered in the form of an order. Things which mar the beauty of the countryside come under "unsightly premises". We don't know of anything which mars the beauty of the countryside any more than car body graveyards. Digby County has a few of these, which, undoubtedly, should be put out of sight of visitors and, indeed, we expect will be put out-of-sight before 1967. Nova Scotia is spending money on beautification within the province. We don't expect the province to hand out money to beautify the country and not enforce the laws already on its statutes to protect that beautification program. We expect car body graveyards will go before 1967. Why not do it voluntarily like any other clean-up, fix-up program for 1967. It would be much more pleasant.

### Hear And Do

During the next week or two there will be a lot of ideas put forward by baccalaureate and commencement speakers for the good of high school graduates of our country. What use the individual graduate will make of this advice remains to be seen.

Attending one community function or another, the thought strikes you that there are a world of good ideas being put forth at almost any meeting of almost any group.

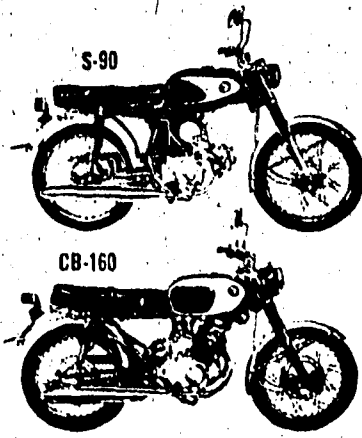
The sad part of it is that every worthwhile enterprise seems to be lacking in attracting people who will grab hold of an idea and work to get something accomplished.

Our clothes had never seen the drawing board of Coco Chanel, or Yves St. Laurent, but they were our smartest. With our gay spring hats, and sparkling white gloves, we felt, and looked, quite suitably attired to attend the fashion event of the season.

The Women's Institute hall was cheerfully decorated in flowers, and bare tree branches festooned with artificial birds. The walkway for the models was of artificial grass, laid on the floor. It was not raised above floor level, but the chairs were artfully arranged along the walkway, so we could get a good view of its entire length. We sat in expectant silence, waiting with the same eagerness with which ladies of a somewhat higher income bracket must await a Christian Dior showing. We glanced surreptitiously at each other, noting with the same interest we would later devote to the fashions, what each other lady in the group was wearing. Then we relaxed, secure in our knowledge that while we might not be the most smartly turned out, we were not the least smart either.

The mood of eager anticipation was shattered only twice. The first time, the interruption was caused when some lady inadvertently allowed a small beagle into the hall when she opened the door. The beagle, happily wagging her tail, made straight for her mistress. She looked up, smiling hopefully, as only a beagle can smile, waiting for an exclamation of joy. There was no such exclamation. The dog's owner marched it to the door, swatted its tail, and ordered it home. From past experience, she knew it was a futile gesture, but, as she returned to her seat, it looked, at least, as if she had done something.

The second interruption was caused, as everybody present could have predicted it would be, when some lady inadvertently allowed a small beagle into the hall. The dog eyed its mistress rather scornfully, then gave the full tail wagging, grin treatment to the woman who she thought might be more appreciative of her charms. She bounded from one lady in her best clothes to another, smiling eagerly. The dog's owner pounced on it, scooped the offending creature in her arms, and marched it home.

After instructing the baby sitter to lock the dog in the house, I managed to get back to the hall, just before the showing started.

The commentator, the wife of a local businessman, began in a voice pitched just a shade too high. The sound of excitement was a bit too evident at first, but she settled nicely, and by the end of the first item, she sounded as if she had been doing this all her life.

When the showing was over, we were served tea. We sat around, eating the exquisite little cakes and sandwiches, and clucking compliments to each other, the models, and the commentator. Then, two or three at a time, we straggled out into the spring sunshine.

I went out to Mrs. Brewer's today, looking for children's clothes. You drive far out in the country, past the last vestige of civilization. After a while, you come to a lonely church on top of a hill. You go down one hill, and up another, past a stretch of woods, and there, nestled in a tiny cluster of houses, where no store has any business to be, is Mrs. Brewer's dress shop. Crowded into a space somewhat smaller than the average living room and dining room together, there is an incredible confusion, and profusion of stock. Nobody who is anybody in the surrounding villages would think of going to town for a piece of clothing before they visit Mrs. Brewer, and in town, the real snobs like to tell their friends about that priceless place in the country. Besides having a genuine, country atmosphere, Mrs. Brewer frequently manages to undersell the town stores with comparable merchandise.

Mrs. Brewer told me she has been doing quite well as a result of her spring showing.

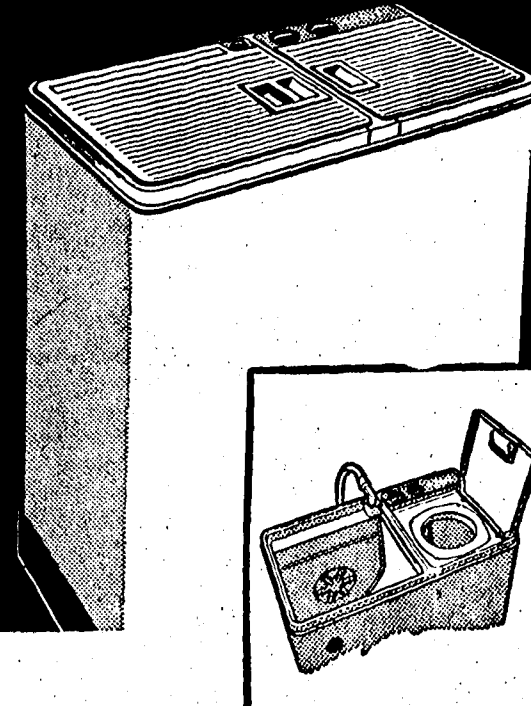

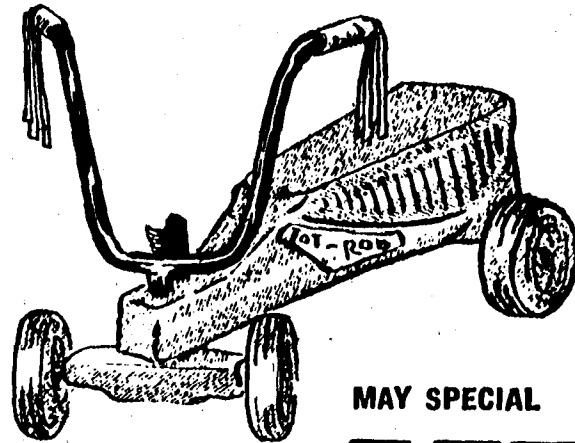

A television "special" designed to reduce death and suffering caused by traffic accidents will be shown on the CBC network Thursday, May 19, from 8 to 9 p.m. (9 to 10 p.m. in the Maritime Provinces).

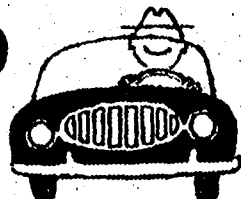

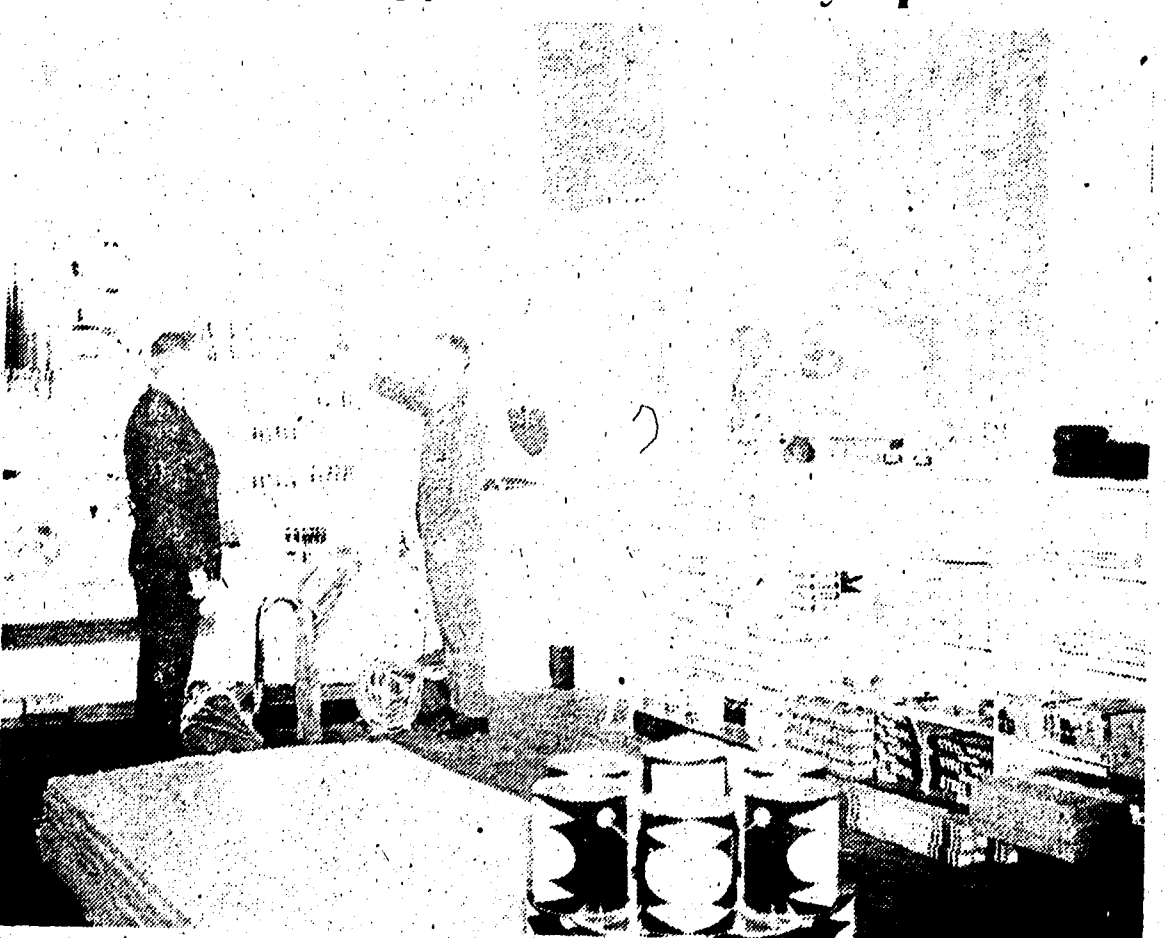

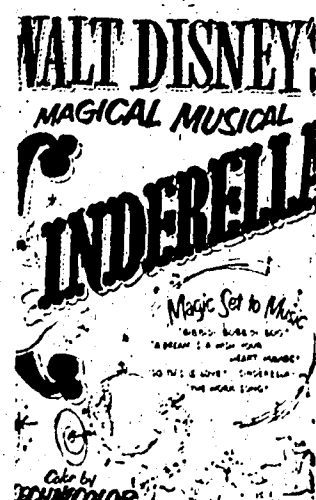
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## Artificial Apple Blossoms?

Mrs. Frank Fletcher, in Wakefield, Rhode Island, sends her best wishes for a successful Apple Blossom Festival which begins in Digby on Monday. In her good wishes was the hope that "you have more apple blossoms for your festival than we did here a week ago yesterday (May 7) Mrs. Fletcher adds that the princess there had to pose with artificial blossoms.

It is to be hoped that when Mrs. Fletcher reads the Courier of June 2 she will see that Queen Annapolis for 1966 had real apple blossoms. At this date, and weather such as it had been, there is no guarantee and Queen Annapolis just might have to wear a symbol of the Valley which is something less than genuine blossoms. She can console herself in the fact that earlier queens and princesses had to do the same, even at such a late date as May 17, 1966, in Rhode Island.

There is hope — good hope — that apple blossoms might appear for the crowning of Queen Annapolis at Wolfville on Friday, May 27. Didn't the valley have snow on Sunday, May 8th Mother's Day? The white "stuff" on the trees might have looked like apple blossoms but analysis proved it to be the same content as the four to six inches on the fields throughout many parts of Nova Scotia. In contrast, on Sunday, May 15, one week later, hammocks were swinging on verandahs, people were sunning in shorts and church goers left their coats at home. Anything can happen to the weather by May 27, just anything. Yes, it could even bring out apple blossoms.

## Ceremony Of The Flag

On the 25th of May at 8:15 p.m. the inhabitants of the western end of the Annapolis valley will have the opportunity to observe the Ceremony of the Flags at CFB Cornwallis.

With the adoption of a new Canadian Flag last year, it was thought that a distinctive Canadian ceremony should be created to honour the new flag and all that it represents. Combining new musical arrangements with traditional parade movements in keeping with the central motif of "Trooping the Colours" this colourful ceremony is appealing to both eye and ear.

The ceremony is performed by a 48 man guard composed of New Entry Seamen from the Navy's New Entry Training Establishment, CFB Cornwallis, accompanied by a colour party bearing the Canadian Flag and Provincial Crests 2 field guns and crews, and the Cornwallis band.

### Student Volunteers For Local Area

The volunteers are members of the Cornell United Religious Work organization, an inter-denominational and inter-faith group at Cornell University which, among other things, sponsors and promotes the involvement of its student members in community programs in a number of areas of North and South America.

This summer will mark the third year that groups from CURW have been in Nova Scotia. In the summer of 1964 a group of students from Cornell spent six weeks in the community of Acadiaville near Digby where they assisted the Community Betterment Association with the operation of a vacation school and a sports and recreation program for the young people of the community.

During the summer of 1965 two groups from CURW were in Digby County, one in Marshalltown and the other in Acadiaville. In Marshalltown the group worked under the auspices of the Community Club, Head of St. Mary's Bay. Among the programs carried on by the students was a vacation school, which was held at St. Theresa's Hall. The vacation school program was operated mainly for pre-schoolers, but older children were also included. In addition to the vacation school program the CURW group also helped with sports and recreation program and members of the group did individual tutoring for students of the community who were required to write supplementary examinations prior to the fall school term. The CURW group also assisted in a number of programs involving adults of the community.

In Acadiaville during the summer of 1965 the CURW group there also assisted the community in the operation of a vacation school for pre-schoolers and older children. A sports and recreation program was also carried out. A good deal of work was also done by one of the members of the CURW team with the men of the community in developing an agricultural program. Programs were also done with older adults in the community and there was some student tutoring.

It is understood there will be two groups of the CURW young people in Digby County this summer. One group will be in Marshalltown and the other in Acadiaville. Included in the group which will be working with the Community Club in Marshalltown will be Dick Feldman, who was with the CURW group which was in Marshalltown last summer, Dave Rothwell, Linda Novik and Rachel Kahn. The group working in Acadiaville will be composed of Steve Ross, Dan Fogel, Epi Epton and Pam Mattee. It is expected the young people will arrive in Nova Scotia at the end of June and will stay in the communities for a six weeks period.

At the request of the Community Betterment Association of Acadiaville, the CURW young people working in that community will assist in the development of programs for older children and teenagers as well as assisting with a vacation school program. Assistance given last year with the community library will be continued this summer. In addition a sports and recreation program will be carried on and the CURW students will also help in adult organizations in the community.

In Marshalltown the Community Club has requested that the CURW group assist again with a vacation school program and with programs for the older children and teenagers. Here, as in Acadiaville, work of assisting with the community library will be undertaken again this summer. A sports and recreation

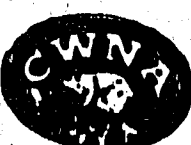

From inside, the weather looked gorgeous. I pulled up the bedspread, and plumped up the pillows. There was a sound of the front door slamming. After a minute, the children appeared at the bedroom door. Their hands were blue, and their noses were running. It was too cold, they announced, to play outdoors. They stripped themselves of their coats, and left the room. Seconds later, they returned, armed with a pile of books, pencils, and a bunch of old school notebooks which the previous owner of this house had left in the attic. They sat on the floor, and began to play their newest favorite game, doing lessons.

It must be because some of their friends go to school. It certainly cannot be from any innate love of the scholastic life, but for some incomprehensible reason, the thought of lessons (they pronounce it more like license) fascinates them. The older one, in particular, thinks that having to do lessons is a sort of status symbol. He really hasn't a clue what the word means. He cannot even make his letters and numbers, but he makes rows of 1's on the paper, and counts them more or less accurately up to twelve. Then he asks endlessly "What's fourteen and fourteen?" "What's fourteen and nineteen?" "What's fourteen and nineteen and eighteen and thirteen?" "What's twenty-three and twenty-five and sixty and thirty-four?"

As I said, it is not due to any innate scholastic ability. This is the child, this one, who loves to do lessons, who, after a brief, disastrous career, became what his father calls a nursery school drop-out.

Last fall, we started him, amid much excitement, to nursery school. When he came home the first day, he announced that he was not going back. After some probing, we discovered that some of the other children had taken lunches, and he felt hurt and left out because he did not have one. We patted ourselves on the back, and congratulated ourselves on our parental understanding, at having so easily reached the root of the problem. The next day, our boy was sent proudly off to the halls of higher learning, toting a shiny new lunch can, filled with jam sandwiches and a thermos of milk. For about two days, he went fairly willingly. Then, with each morning, the excuses got more elaborate and ingenious. "Mommy", he asked one morning, "do I have to go to nursery school today? I am the only one who goes. All the other kids are on their holidays." One day, he burst in the door and announced triumphantly, "Mommy, guess what! The school burned down. I don't have to go back tomorrow." I countered with a lie as inventive as his. I told him I had heard it on the news, but that the newscaster said it was all built up again, and that after all, he could go back. As a last resort, he developed a persistent cold, one of the symptoms of which was a hacking cough which lasted from seven until nine every morning, and was not heard again until seven the following morning.

Eventually the cold won. He was only four years old, and there seemed to be no need to press the matter. That was seven months ago. I am still surprised, every once in a while, to hear a song sung in tune, or a part of a poem I have not taught him. "Where did you learn that?" I ask. "When I went to school," he shrugs.

I left my little scholars and went downstairs to empty the washing machine. I took the basket of clothes outdoors. When I mounted the steps to the clothesline, the wind whipped around the corner of the house with a stinging blast that bit my face and hands, and sent the clothes basket hurtling across the lawn.

I couldn't have been more delighted. The cold outside bore no logical relationship to my work inside, but it was that icy blast that made up my mind for me. I retrieved the scattered clothes from the lawn, brought them in, and popped them into the dryer. The wash was done, the dishes washed, the kitchen floor swept, and the beds made. The rest of the day, I decided, belonged to me, and that biography of Francis Bacon I had been carrying around with me for a week, but had not managed to get beyond the first, not-drawn pages.

The book was up in my bedroom, where it had lain open on the bed when I had dressed in the morning, and propped against the headboard as I made the bed. The kids were still absorbed in their "license". The cold May sunlight warmed itself as it came through the windows, and dissolved in warm golden puddles on the floor and on the hassock. I sat down with the book. My kids stared at me in silence for a few minutes, not quite able to comprehend that I was sitting down reading in the middle of the morning. Then the big one smiled. "We're all doing license, aren't we Mom?" he said.

A few dust moles danced in the sunlight. I felt one of those rare and marvelous surges of blissful contentment. I was warm and happy. My kids were with me, and I was engaged in the most serious business of that particular day — a good loaf.

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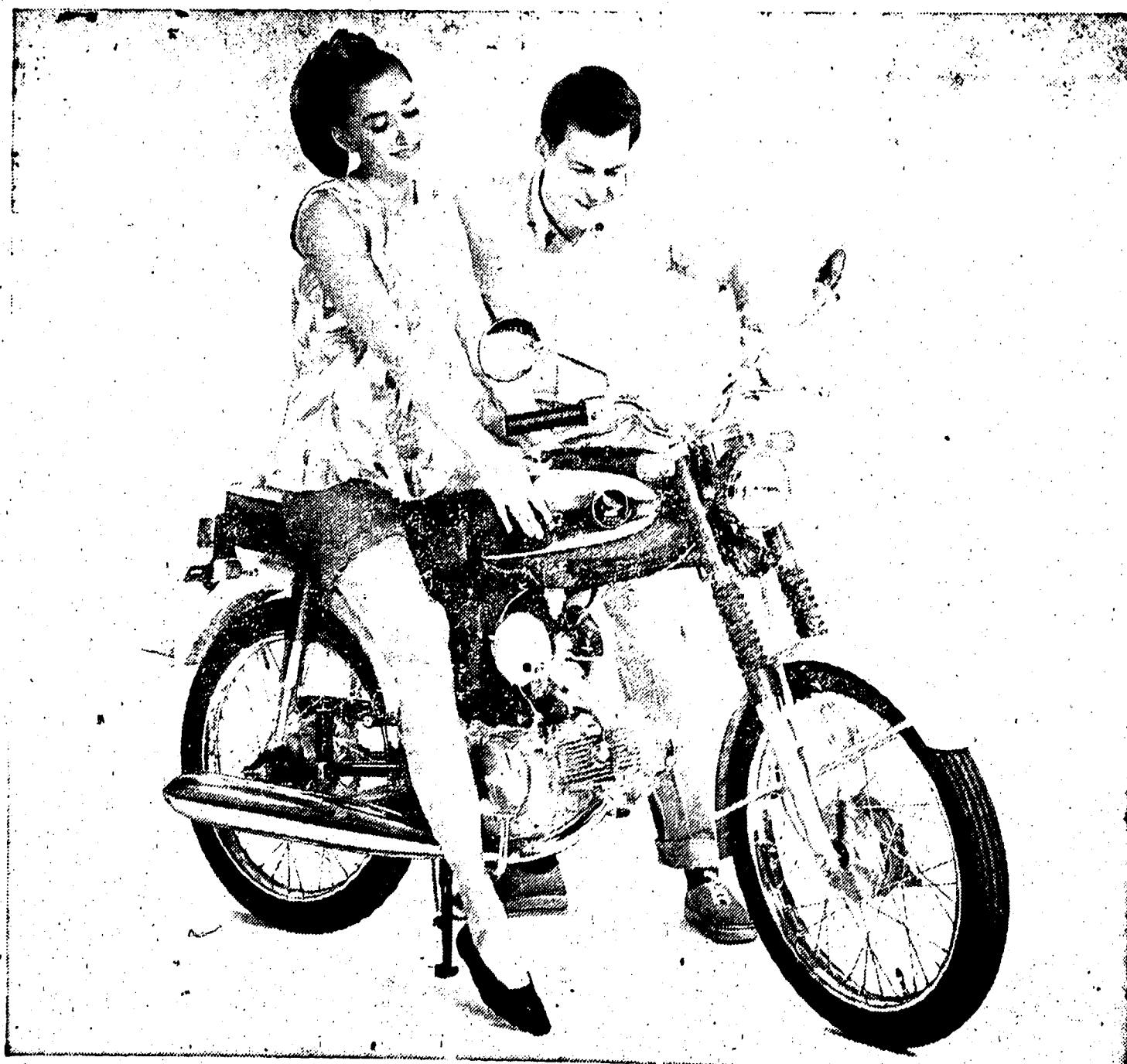
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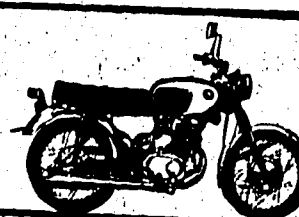

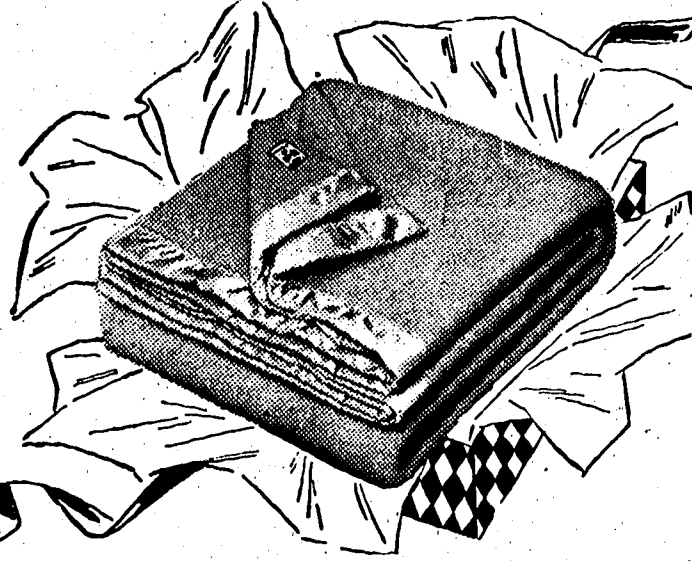
During the Sunday School session he gave an illustrated talk to the children on "grace".

### ARE YOU VAN VELZER?

The Courier was forwarded a letter from Mrs. David Balser which had been delivered to her and addressed "Mr. Van Velzer, Digby Neck, Nova Scotia, Canada. (Postmaster: Please deliver if possible to a member of the Van Velzer family near Digby, Nova Scotia). We print the letter and other pertinent information at Mrs. Balser's request with the hope that some descendant of David and William Van Velzer might be found.

Dear Mr. Van Velzer:

If you are a descendant of Daniel and William Van Velzer I hope that you can give us some information about our family. Daniel Van Velzer was my great grandfather; his eldest son Jacob was my great grandfather. My grandfather's name was Raymond and my father's name George.

My brother Charles and I are trying to trace our family history. We were born and grew up in Ontario on the farm that Jacob and his sons carved out of the woods three miles north of Lake Erie. We are in touch with some of the family who live at Cold Spring Harbor, Long Island, New York. They too are trying to trace back. To date we are back as far as 1659. But there are many things we do not know. Perhaps you can help us.

The enclosed clippings will tell you what we know of Daniel, our U. E. Loyalist ancestor. Among the papers saved from a church at Cold Spring Harbor is a record of the marriage, in 1773, of Daniel Van Velzer and Elizabeth Beadle. British soldiers tore down the church in 1776 and used the wood to make stables for their horses.

Can you tell us the names of 1. Daniel's parents, his grandparents? 2. If he had any brothers or sisters do you

know their names?

These names would probably tell us where we fit in to the Long Island group. I shall be happy to send you any information that we have. We would like to know more about the descendants of William and Nancy in Nova Scotia.

If you should be not interested in family genealogy (some people are not), is there some member of the family who is and to whom you could hand this letter? There might be some family Bibles, diaries, church records of weddings or baptisms, land records of sales or deeds, or something that would clear up a lot of questions whose answers we do not know. For now I just hope you can answer the questions above. Thank you.

In 1777 Daniel Van Velzer and his wife (nee Botsey Beadle), United Empire Loyalists, sold their farm on Long Island and moved, with their family, to Digby, Nova Scotia. Their son Jacob was at that time three years old. Another son, James, acquired land in Nova Scotia. A great grandson of James, W. H. McKenzie, had an old deed from John Hamilton to James Van Velzer for one hundred and fifteen acres on the Bay of Fundy. It is dated "the eleventh day of June in the year one thousand, eight hundred and three in the forty-third year of the reign of His Majesty King George III". James married a Miss Hamilton and the John Hamilton in the deed is probably his father-in-law. The name in the deed is spelled Van Velzer. James Van Velzer apparently used both spellings but mostly Van Velsor in the later years of his life.

In 1812, according to one record, the brothers Jacob and James, and another brother, John, emigrated to Ontario. A newspaper clipping of the death of James' son, William, says he was born in 1801 in Nova Scotia and that the family moved, in 1812, to the County of Elgin, Ontario. A sketch of the life of Jacob Van Velzer says he married Sarah Raymond in 1800; six of their eight children were born in Nova Scotia and they moved to Ontario in 1817. With the three brothers and their families were Silcoxes and Hamiltons. They came from Digby to Boston by boat and when they were almost there a bad storm drove them out to sea and they were several days getting back to Boston.

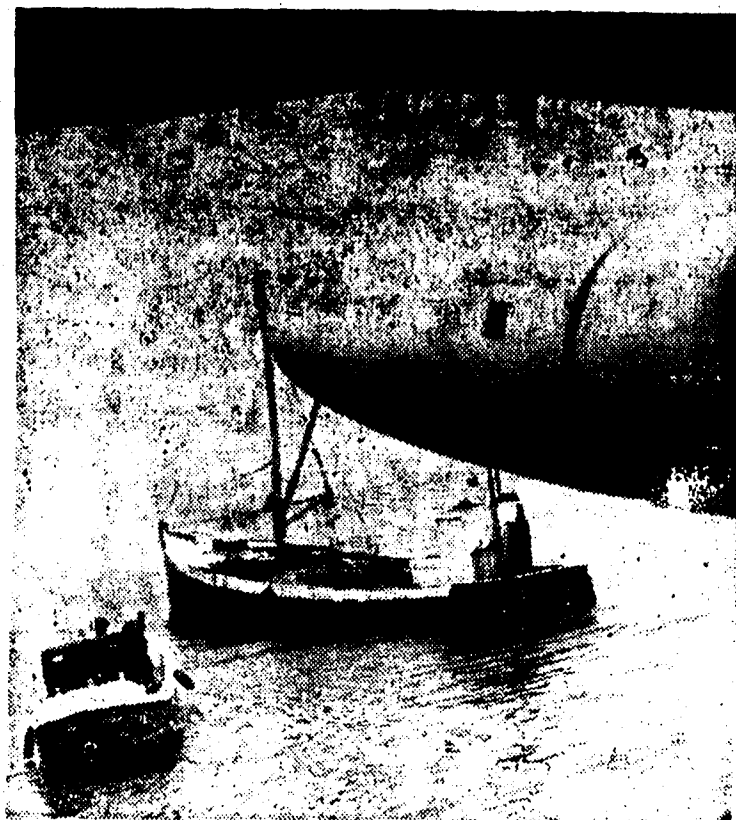

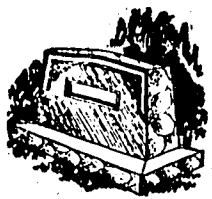

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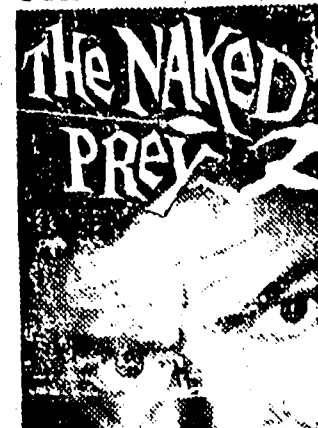

## Digby Resolution At A.V.A.B.T.

Digby delegates called for ferry service between some point on the Annapolis Basin and Campbell Island, at the mouth of the St. Croix River, between New Brunswick and Maine, by resolution, at the semi-annual meeting of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade held in Middleton last week. Official delegates from Digby were Reginald Jayne, Vincent Snow, C. D. Snow and Stewart MacNaughton.

A resolution calling for the completion of the Fundy Trail extending 530 miles from St. Stephen, N. B., to Yarmouth was passed unanimously.

The meeting unanimously passed a resolution endorsing the action of the executive in promoting travel outside the province.

In response to farm vacation promotion, they had received 500 replies regarding accommodation available. Bernard LeBlanc, of Clare, gave a report on a New England tourist promotion tour he had made on behalf of the AVABT. Cities visited included Boston, Medford, Arlington, Worcester, Weymouth, Lawrence and Manchester. His report sparked disagreement with the Nova Scotia government policy which it was stated "brings the tourists to the fence and then you look after them."

Highlight of the meeting was the dinner address by Premier Robert L. Stanfield. Workers must continue to produce a good day's work for a good day's pay and management must be fair, courageous and enterprising," the Honourable R. L. Stanfield told the Boards.

"For all these we, the government, must provide the environment that will be conducive to accomplishment. We must help to provide the people and the facilities that will maintain our reputation as a leader in education, whether at the elementary, secondary, vocational and technical, or university level," the Premier said.

## Improved T.V. For This Area

The inauguration of improved and expanded television reception in South and Southwest Nova Scotia occurred with the official opening of re-broadcasting station CBHT-3 at Yarmouth, Wednesday, June 1. Attending from Digby were Mayor and Mrs. C. D. Snow and Mrs. J. M. Wallis.

This improved service was brought about by relocating the station to permit an increase in the height of the antenna (accomplished by the construction of a new 500-foot tower) and by boosting the power of its transmitter from 429 to 15,900 watts video, and from 256 to 7,900 watts audio.

The new tower and transmitter is located off Highway No. 1 on the South Ohio Road, approximately 5 miles north of Yarmouth.

These changes result in the "A" contour of the Yarmouth signal being extended from West Pubnico in Yarmouth County to Saanichton, Digby County and the "B" contour embracing the area lying west of the outskirts of Digby to the outskirts of Shelburne.

This plan bringing improved reception of CBHT's Halifax signal to larger sections of Yarmouth, Digby and Shelburne counties began with changes being made to the CBC's re-broadcasting station at Liverpool last December. The major change was the extension in the height of the station's antenna.

Viewers in this area of the province watch the program service of CBHT in Halifax via this chain of important television re-broadcasting stations at Liverpool, Shelburne and Yarmouth. Each station receives the program signal, off-air, similar to a home television receiver, amplifying it and re-transmitting it on another channel.

## Fire Destroys Cottage At Smith's Cove

Fire of undetermined origin, late Sunday afternoon completely destroyed a large cottage and its furnishings at Smith's Cove, near Digby. The cottage was owned by Mrs. D. E. Keating, of Moncton, N.B.

The fire was first noticed by a passing motorist about 6 o'clock Sunday. Neighbors were alerted and the Bear River Fire Department summoned. The blaze had gained such headway, however, it was impossible to save the structure or any of its contents.

During the fire flying embers ignited nearby trees and an evergreen hedge. Firemen and neighbors had to stay at the scene until nearly midnight to keep watch.

The cottage was unoccupied at the time of the blaze, although it is understood it had recently been rented for the summer. No estimate of loss was available. It is understood some insurance was carried.



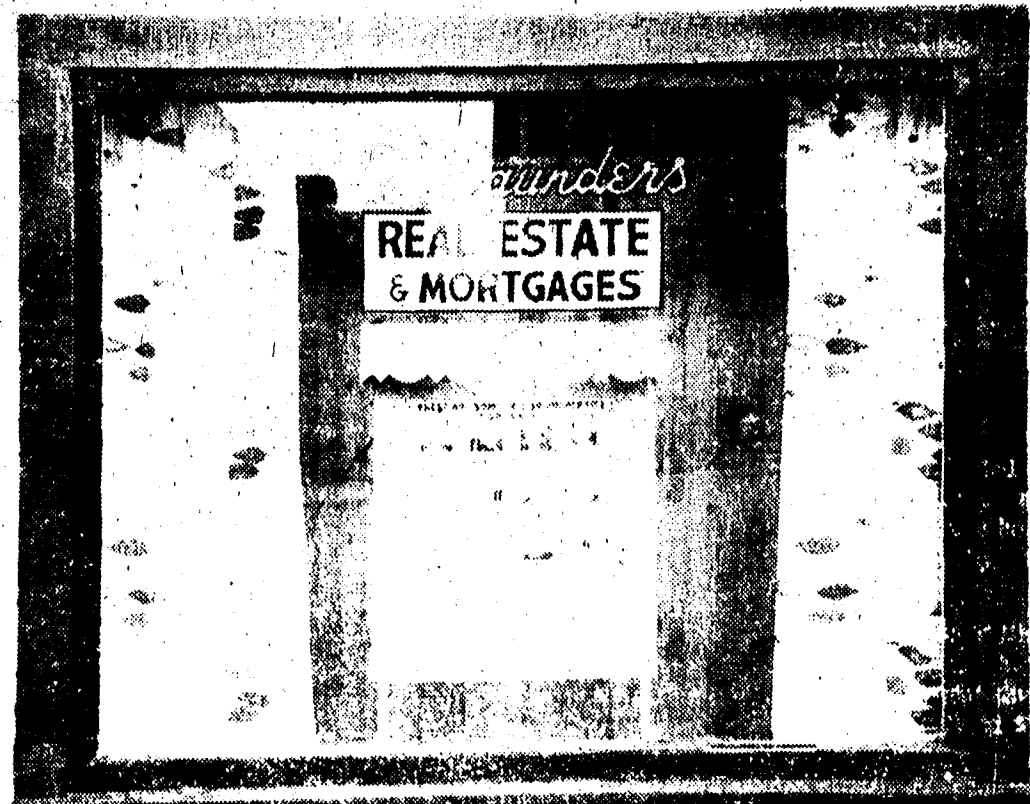

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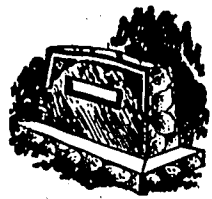

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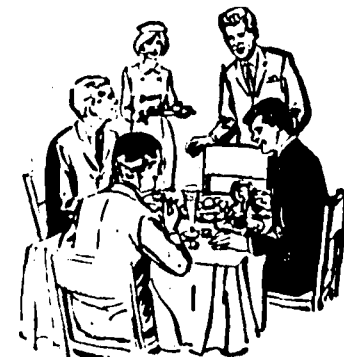

MacNeill, Bear River, was elected chairman of the Church and Industry Committee and Rev. W. D. VanZoost, Middleton, is chairman of Evangelism and Social Service. Mrs. J. M. Wallis, Digby, was named to the Lake Camp Council.

The committee on Evangelism and Social Service studied the report of the India Committee and presented the following resolution: "WHEREAS India is now experiencing one of the worst famines in her long history and

WHEREAS Canada, one of the most prosperous nations in the world on a per capita basis, is spending less than 1% of 1% of the Gross National Product in Foreign Aid (The United Nations recommends a minimum of 1%); BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Government of Canada be petitioned to take immediate action to help meet India's present food crisis; and BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Government be petitioned to review its External Aid Policy with a view to increasing Canada's contribution to at least 1% of the Gross National Product.

The salary level was believed to be a factor in some unrest among ministers in the pastorate, especially in marital and aid receiving charges, the number of ministers leaving for other professions, and the decision of candidates for the ministry to switch to other careers.

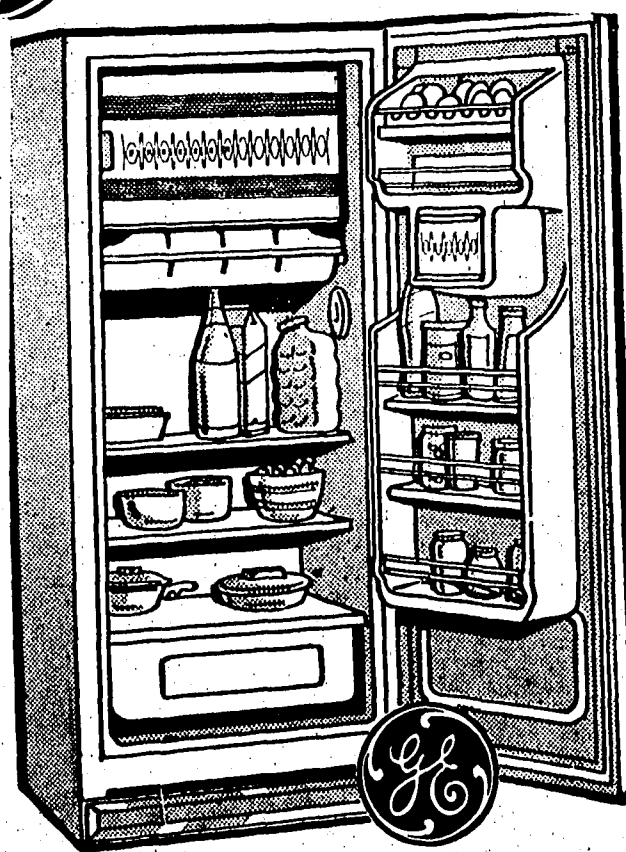

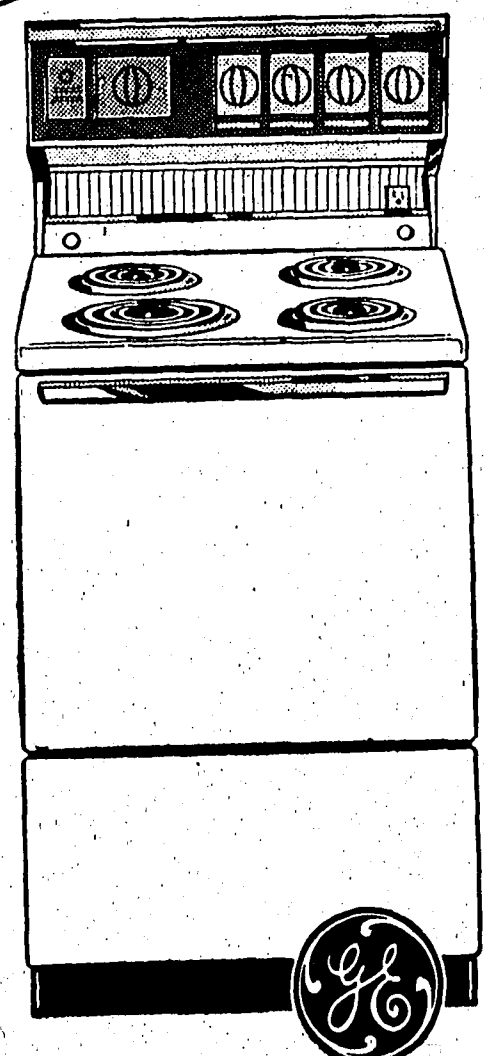

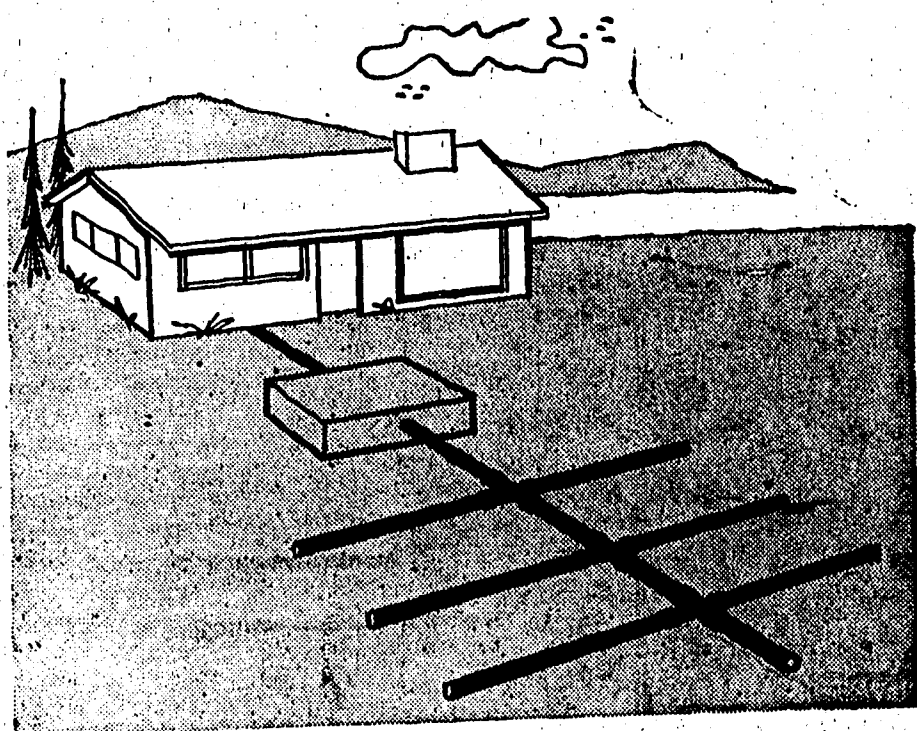

Following the program games were played and a luncheon was served by the social committee.

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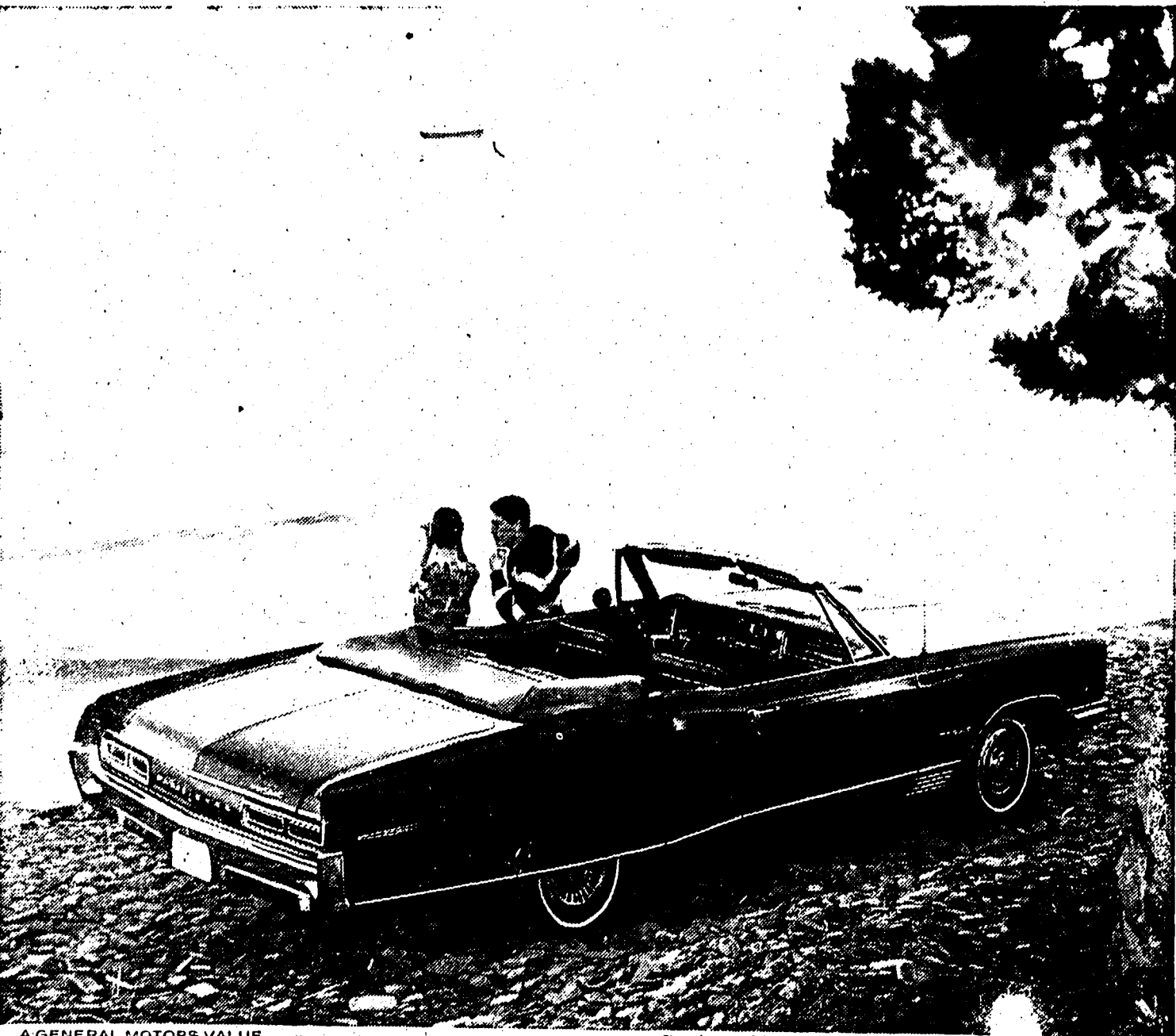

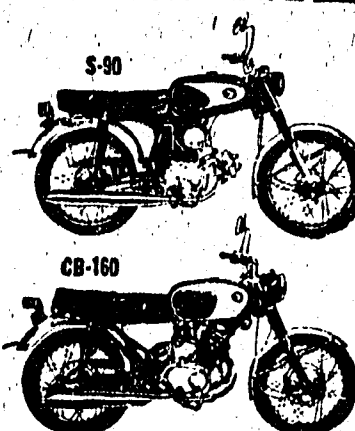

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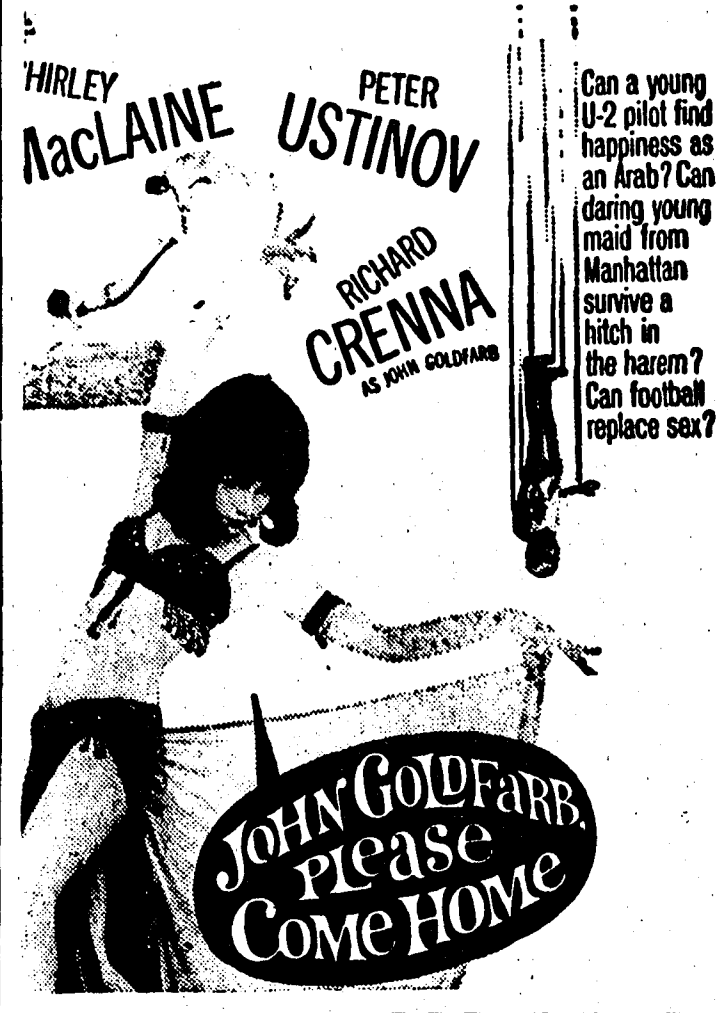

## CBC-TV To Present Story Of Jet Black Mink

The story goes that the man asked his wife what color of new coat she would like... and his wife replied, "any old color at all dear... as long as it's black."

On Saturday, June 4, at 6:30 p.m., CBC television presents "Black Gold", a look at the first jet-black mink ever bred in captivity. The program will be seen on the Life and The Land Series, and was produced in Halifax by the CBC Farm and Fisheries Department.

In the 1930's, in the small community of New Tuscot, Digby County, N. S., two brothers, Wallace and Edsel Mullen, began breeding mink after capturing a half dozen of the wild animals with their dog. As their herd grew, the brothers, then in their late teens, added other animals to experiment with breeding and color.

In 1960, some 35 years after they first began breeding, they discovered that they had two jet black male kittens among the new arrivals. At first the brothers crossed the pure blacks with other higher animals in the herd and, to their delight, found that the blacks were breeding a single mutant gene — the jet black males were capable of reproducing jet blacks.

"Black Gold" had been discovered; black gold that sold at \$2,000 a trio — a male and two females; black gold that in the space of five years has turned Wallace and Edsel Mullen into millionaires and the leaders of the biggest breakthrough in mink breeding in the entire history of the mink industry.

In general, we must be able to say without any reservation at all that Nova Scotia is the best place in which to live, to work and to invest. Board members were told.

Premier Stanfield said that this is a great challenge, and he cannot afford to have school dropouts or untrained workers. Nor can he afford complacent management, he said. In Nova Scotia's Economic Planning, the Premier said, "the plan is to build from the bottom up, from the segment up to the sector, then to the provincial plan. This is different from most others where policy is dictated by the government and the sector and segment plans are then fitted into the main structure."

The main objective of the plan he said is "to achieve a maximum rate of growth with equitable distribution of income; maximum employment; maximum increase in productivity; development of our resources to their highest efficiency; a sound and confident economic climate." A 1967-1970 statement by the board in its plan for 1965-1969 points out that we must provide 3,400 new jobs during each of the four years. The figure may seem frightening if we were not aware of the fact that over the last five years, an average of more than 2,000 new jobs have been created up in the province annually.

## Five Days On A Water-Logged Schooner

The depression of the thirties had an adverse effect on the coastal shipping of Nova Scotia. All loading space was used when a cargo was secured for a sailing or motor vessel. Weymouth, Nova Scotia, witnessed many of these small coasters sail down the Sissiboo River, lumber piled on the deck, as high as the intrepid skipper dared to stake.

With skill, fair weather and good fortune, the captains were able to bring their vessels to their destinations. Occasionally an unpredicted storm caught these crafts unprepared and only luck and skillful seamanship averted disaster.

Captain Ernest Anderson, who now resides at Newellton, recalls one such voyage, which appeared to be routine but resulted in loss of a vessel and a member of the crew.

Mr. Morris Nickerson, of Clark's Harbour, in November 1932, secured a cargo of lumber at Weymouth for his schooner, Clemencia, but he lacked a skipper. He heard that Captain Ernest Anderson was ashore for the winter season, after a summer position as captain of the yacht Leada on the American coast.

Captain Anderson was well known for his ability as a skipper of schooners, so Mr. Nickerson engaged him to make this short trip from Clark's Harbour to Weymouth.

The trip to Weymouth was uneventful and the Clemencia loaded at George Hankinson's wharf and immediately set out on the return trip to Clark's Harbour. For such a short trip it was unnecessary to lay in a large supply of provisions. Although it was November, the forecasts were good and, to Captain Anderson, it was just going to be a short routine trip to Clark's Harbour.

Off the Yarmouth coast a north-east gale bore down on the schooner without advance warning. The skipper, experienced in such emergencies, used his knowledge to save his ship and his crew by riding out the storm.

The seas mounted until they swept across the deck, breaking the lumber loose and scattering it in the wake of the vessel. The sails were torn loose and water poured down deck, water-logging the craft until she refused to answer the helm. Rain, driven with the high wind, soaked the crew and added to their discomfort.

It was impossible to go below decks, so without food, the crew fought for their existence. A wave broke over the stern and carried Douglas Kenney of Clark's Harbour with it. His shipmates could give him no help and he perished.

The Clemencia was driven farther off the Nova Scotian coast, wallowing in the trough of the seas. There was nothing the survivors could do to better their lot. They were on a water-logged vessel. Their only hope of survival was to remain on the Clemencia and hope that the vessel would withstand the punishment of the seas.

Back at Cape Sable Island all hope had been given up for the survival of the men on the Clemencia. It was felt that no sailing vessel could withstand the fury of the gale.

After five days, drifting before the wind the Clemencia arrived in the Gulf Stream and it was here that she was sighted by the S.S. DeGrasse, of the French Line. The luxury liner hove to upon sighting the vessel as survivors could be seen on the deck. But the seas were running too high for a small boat. However, the DeGrasse stood by overnight and the next morning a boat was lowered and Captain Anderson and his crew were taken aboard the liner. The steamship then proceeded on its way to New York. The Clemencia was blown up as the derelict presented a hazard to navigation.

On arrival at New York Captain Anderson and his crew were taken care of by the British Consulate in New York and passage was arranged for their return to Nova Scotia. Although Captain Anderson had many trying experiences during his life on the sea, the short strip between Weymouth and Clark's Harbour stands out with more clarity than any of the others.

Captain Ernest Anderson's father, Captain Charles Anderson, came to Nova Scotia from Sweden as a boy. Although he could not speak English he soon conquered the language and adopted the sea as his

natural environment. After serving his time he successfully wrote his captain's papers at the Yarmouth Navigation School. He skippered his own ships until his son, Ernest, was prepared to take over their command. Among the ships which Captain Charles owned or held major shares in were, among others, the Beatrice L. Corkum, The Palmetto, the Empress and the Alcaia.

At the age of 14, Captain Ernest packed his dunnage bag and went to sea on his father's vessel. Six years experience and he qualified to take over the command of the schooner Hazelwood. Later he commanded the Beatrice L. Corkum, the Palmetto, the Empress and the Alcaia. All of these vessels were engaged as freighters on the Atlantic Coast carrying bulk cargoes.

The Empress was a three-master, built at Montague, P. E. I., in 1901 and of 335 tons. In November 1915 the Empress loaded lumber at Bridgeport consigned to New York. Off Cape Sable Island fire broke out and the vessel had to be abandoned. Captain Ernest Anderson was confined to his bunk at the time of the fire, suffering from typhoid fever. It was necessary to carry him to the boat and then to the shore when the crew abandoned the burning ship.

In December 1918 Captain Anderson was again forced to leave his ship to preserve his life and that of his crew. This time from the three-master Alcaia, when she was wrecked on a trip from New York to Halifax with a cargo of hard coal.

During World War II Captain Anderson skippered the duty boat which ran between Halifax and MacNabs Island. After the war he settled in Little River, Digby County, and engaged in inshore fishing until age compelled him to leave the Atlantic and the Fundy where he had, on numerous occasions, survived their intention of his destruction.

In 1950 Captain Anderson and Mrs. Anderson moved to the South Shore and settled at Newellton. Now in retirement at Newellton, Captain Anderson recalls the days when it was necessary to abandon ship driven before

the onslaught of flame or sea. Here he recalls the days when he pointed the bows of his command towards the New England coast with a cargo of lumber, depending on sails for propulsion and his skill as a skipper to bring his crew safely through dangers presented by the Atlantic and the lower waters of the Fundy.

Captain Anderson is one of the few remaining skippers who today can stir our imagination with first hand knowledge of the time when Nova Scotian economy depended, in large measure, upon schooners to carry bulk cargoes to markets.

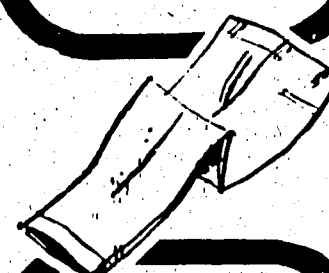

## DIGBY — CAMPOBELLO FERRY ROUTE FAVORED

A firm of consulting engineers retained by the Nova Scotia Government to survey terminal locations for a second Nova Scotia-New England ferry service has recommended an all-Canadian route between Campobello Island in New Brunswick and Digby in Nova Scotia.

Completion of the study which was financed jointly by the Nova Scotia Department of Trade and Industry and the Department of Transport, Ottawa, was announced by the Hon. W. S. K. Jones, in Halifax.

The study, prepared by A. D. Margison and Associates Limited, was to recommend the most advantageous terminal points in terms of convenience and service to the public having regard to the cost in relation to the economic benefits of a possible second ferry.

The main conclusion of the consultants is that "If a policy decision is made by the Federal Government, taking into account the findings of this report together with any additional factors outside the scope of this study, to provide an additional ferry service for people travelling between New England and Nova Scotia, it should be on a shorter route across the Bay of Fundy than is now provided by the existing Bar Harbor-Yarmouth route. A shorter route could better satisfy the present and future demands and thereby provide a better level of service to the tourists."

The consultants recommended a route between Welshpool on Campobello Island in New Brunswick and Digby in Nova Scotia as satisfying these requirements.

The report is now being studied by the two governments in Halifax and Ottawa.

### Frost Found Not Guilty

Judge L. D. Currie presided at the Supreme Court of Canada when it met in a three-day session in Digby last week.

Louis Keith Frost, of Mink Cove, was found not guilty of dangerous driving and not guilty of criminal negligence. He was represented by Irving C. Pink, of Yarmouth. The case arose out of a highway accident on Route 17, December 19, 1965, when a vehicle operated by Frost was in collision with one driven by Richard Gidney. Ralph Eugene Newell, a passenger in Frost's car, was killed.

This was the only criminal case on the docket. There was one civil case and two divorce cases.

### Overtime Wages Claimed

Digby Town Council on Monday night was faced with a problem as outcome of the new minimum wage law. A letter was read from Donald Jayne, of the town police force, in which he claimed under the minimum wage act, overtime wages from May 5, 1965 to May 5, 1966 for 1095 hours for a total of \$2381.62.

The matter was tabled by council for further investigation and to await the outcome of a similar case in Shelburne.

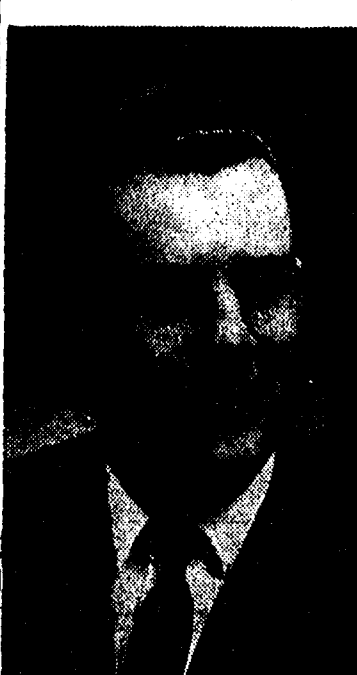

### Shrimps Found In Bay

2,000 lbs. First Catch

Where do the shrimps go when they leave the coast around Portland, Maine, in March? was the question which led to discovering of shrimp beds in the Bay of Fundy and landing a catch of 2,000 lbs. on the first trial run. All voluntarily, Keith Raymond, of Centreville, started out last March for Portland, taking along with him Captain Reginald Hazelton, Robert Raymond and Glendon Outhouse. They went out on the shrimp boats at Portland and in conversation with the fishermen there learned that it was thought the shrimp went to the Bay of Fundy after leaving that coast in the month of March.

The report of the men to the Provincial Department of Fisheries on their return soon saw Capt. Hazelton engaged on a 6 weeks trial run for shrimp in the Bay of Fundy. Capt. Hazelton returned from his first trip with 2,000 lbs. These were taken to the plant of Keith Raymond where the heads were removed and the fish frozen. On board the Hazelton boat are Peter Johnson and Mr. Smith of the Provincial Department of Fisheries who are keeping data on the survey.

While not enough shrimp have been taken to find out whether the venture would be commercially a sound one, the trials will continue for a short time and will again be conducted in the fall, it is understood. This will give data on habits of the shrimp at different seasons of the year.

The shrimp are dragged from the bottom of the sea by fish nets with small mesh.

### Three Parking Lots Available

Acadian Coach Lines offered the Town of Digby use of their land at the triangular section between Prince Wm., Water St. and Jew Cove, for parking, it was learned at the meeting of the Town Council on Monday night. Recompense requested for the use of the property was forgiveness of taxes amounting to \$420.00. It was suggested that the Digby Board of Trade might want to look into the proposition and it was decided that a committee of the council meet with the merchants committee of the Digby Board of Trade to make a study of the offer.

It was reported that the Maritime Tel. and Tel. Company parking lot has been made available to Digby town.

It was also reported that property near the former railway station was to be converted into parking area by a private concern.

### News-Councillor Puts "Bite" On Dogs

Councillor Thomas Cowan made news, again, on Monday night at the regular town council meeting when he put things in reverse by "man" putting the "bite" on dogs. Councillor Cowan was adamant in his demand that the town have a dog catcher equipped with what is necessary to catch and impound dogs. It was regularly moved and passed that the town advertise for a dog catcher. Complaints, it is understood, have been laid against dogs knocking over garbage cans and also destroying gardens. According to town clerk, Jack Whalley, there have been 78 dog licenses paid and he is in possession of a list of 76 dogs for which no licenses have been paid.

Buying a license and having the dog wear a tag does in no way give that dog privilege to run loose, it was stressed at council. The tag does help to find the owner and have him notified if a dog is on the loose. Warrants can be served for dog tax just as they can be served for non payment of other taxes, the council was advised.

### Dredging Contract Let

Hon. Allan MacEachen announced last night, it is understood, that a dredging contract for the Digby harbor area amounting to \$155,000 has been awarded to the McNamara Construction Company of Halifax and Montreal. Work is to begin on Monday, it is believed.

### To Enforce Parking Laws

Enforcement of parking laws, especially in connection with collection of fines, was given some stern consideration at the meeting of the Digby Town Council on Monday night. Fines should be followed up by letter if the offender does not appear to settle the fine, the police was informed, and every step should be taken to see that fines are paid was the advice given.

James Dunn was hired as special police in the absence of his father, Police Chief Webster Dunn. He is to be sworn in by the town clerk.

Eighteen complaints were laid at the police department in May, seven needed investigation with all terminated satisfactorily except one still under investigation. Thirteen offences received court action, 9 under the liquor control act, one motor vehicle, one criminal code, two persons were convicted on sale of liquor. Fines collected, \$79.00.

### Mayor Snow Confident Of Ferry



An announcement was made by the Nova Scotia provincial government this week that the A. D. Margison Associates Ltd. findings were as follows: "The most economic route by water to the New England States would be from Freeport to Jonesport; the second being Digby to Campobello Island, N. B. Whereas, there is no bridge or causeway connecting Long Island with the mainland, this would eliminate Freeport as the Nova Scotia terminal."

The Digby Board of Trade recognized and supported a resolution to build a bridge or causeway to Long Island and also supported Freeport as the second ferry terminal to the U.S.A. Since, Digby has been established by the Margison report as the most desirable location for the terminal for Nova Scotia and would serve the public to the greatest advantage, both travelling to the U.S.A. and Canada via motor vehicle, it is reasonable to believe that the people of Nova Scotia will support the findings of the engineers who made a very intensive study as to the most desirable route.

For many years there has been inadequate ferry service to western Nova Scotia. Modern transportation service is an essential factor to the maintaining or expanding of the economy of any area. It is the hope and desire of the people of Digby that a new ferry terminal will soon be under construction at the port of Digby and one at Campobello Island and that the new proposed ferry service will be in operation as soon as possible. It is with certainty that as soon as the people of Western Nova Scotia have the opportunity they will expand their trade and industry with the establishment of such a ferry service, they will take advantage of the opportunity.

As our Premier, the Hon. Robert Stanfield, has stated, it is the responsibility of government to create the right environment for economic growth. It is then up to the people to make the most of the opportunity provided.

With confidence of a new ferry the people look forward to this opportunity.

### Town Gets Pines Taxes For 1966

A letter from the Nova Scotia Minister of Trade and Industry, Hon. Kennedy Jones, assured the Digby town councillors on Monday night that the town would have \$11,250 tax revenue from the Pines Hotel in 1966. The letter stated, however, that while the department is in sympathy with the town and realizes its difficulty, it could not be assured that the tax revenue from the Pines would be forthcoming in the future. The Pines formerly owned and operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway was last fall purchased by the provincial government and ordinarily exempt from tax because of it being government property.

The resignation of J. D. Hubley as town assessor as of June 30 was regretfully accepted at the meeting and appreciation for past services expressed. Mr. Hubley's resignation was necessary because Digby comes under the Annapolis-Digby region due to the new assessment act. Philip Dondale is the director of assessment for the region.

It was learned that the boat of Capt. Reginald Hazelton, Digby, was not correct in being assessed in Digby as it is registered in another province.

An appeal for lower assessment of a property belonging to Hymie Webber was not allowed. Charles Halliburton appeared before council on behalf of Mr. Webber.

Reginald Turnbull appeared before council, on request, respecting insurance coverage for firemen. The policy adopted covers the firemen while at a fire, going to or coming from a fire, training, committee meetings, participating in sports under the fire department or in any and all activity authorized by the fire department.

Councillor Stewart MacNaughton reported that mercury lights were being installed on the Shore Road from the Racquette to the Pines Hotel at the cost of about \$1,000. This was considered necessary for security of visitors travelling in that direction as well as for local people.

Mr. MacNaughton, reporting for the streets committee, said the town employees had spent 301 hours on water system; 1,132 hours for \$1,274.25 on ditching, gravelling, grading and patching streets, preparing parking area; 76 hours laying sewers for \$83.20 and 111 hours repairing sewers for \$123.50. The foreman's truck had been used for 433 miles costing \$64.95. Councillor Cowan suggested that after severe rains and the streets are gullied out flares should mark damage for protection to vehicles.

Permit was granted to Digby Branch Canadian Legion to hold a cowboy show at the Forum in October. The show is from Florida. The V.O.N. was given permission for a Tag Day in August and the Digby Fire Department given permission to hold Firemen's Day on Labor Day.

The sewer committee reported that the Department of Municipal Affairs, Ottawa, had granted an extension to 1967 on grants and loans for municipal works.

Councillor Gerald Connolly reported 15 members had recently finished a Civil Defence course, 27 are registered. (Please turn to page 10)

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## About This And That

### Digby Rejoices In Study Results

Digby residents rejoiced this week that the result of the A. D. Margison and Associates Ltd. study re New England-Nova Scotia's ferry service resulted in favoring Digby as the terminal in Nova Scotia for such a ferry. True the report has yet to be studied by the two governments, federal and Nova Scotia provincial, but residents here can see no reason why the Margison study should not be conclusive.

Looking at the map prepared by Margison's and which appears in this issue, and on reading the twenty-six page report, one is convinced that A. D. Margison and Associates Ltd. left no stone unturned to come to a just conclusion. Their job was to recommend the most advantageous terminal points in terms of convenience and service to the public having regard to cost in relation to the economic benefits of a possible second ferry. This entailed much research and much hard work.

Surveys were made by the company engaged to make the study. A. interested towns and communities were encouraged to make presentations at public hearings which resulted in eight different origins and six destination routes by water. To these were added other possible routes including the one Weymouth-Digby as suggested by Margison's as being the most feasible. Each route was given, according to the report, and a dual study for passenger, travel, automobile travel and truck travel both for the present and in projection into the future. Time savings and cost savings were gone into.

The report suggests that a ferry route with its Nova Scotia terminal at Digby, has several advantages over other locations. Digby is located just off a major highway, Route 1, from Halifax to Yarmouth. It is more centrally located relative to both East Ferry and Yarmouth, and is more readily accessible from the commercial centres of Liverpool, Bridgewater and Lunenburg. Digby provides the advantage of a ferry terminal where the economic effect would be of greater benefit than if a second ferry uses Yarmouth as a terminal.

A Weymouth-Digby service, being on an all-Canadian route would eliminate the need for terminal custom facilities, would reduce the parking areas required, all of which would result in reduced terminal construction and operation costs. A terminal construction would take place in Canada. Both crews and terminal staff could reside in Canada.

Digby residents would find it difficult not to agree with the Margison Associates Ltd. conclusions, not because Digby is the favored terminal, but because of the common sense which has led the firm to choose Digby. Indeed, though Digby would be governed by whatever decision was made, Digby would have found it difficult, from a common sense approach to have seen justification for any other conclusion.

The final decision is yet to be made but it would seem very strange for either government to come to a different decision from the result of the Margison study.

Digby rejoices in the conclusion of the study. Digby looks forward to a favorable final decision. Digby needs a favorable decision.

### Trees

It is a fortunate fact that trees do not wash after forest fires. A forest fire and its aftermath, however, does not wash away the thousands of seeds which are scattered in the air. 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When a forest burns there is not only the fact that the tree stumps are no more to be considered. There is the loss of all those engaged either directly or indirectly in the product of the forest.

Carried to and used, forest products in Nova Scotia contribute close to \$100,000,000 annually to the province's economy. The primary forest industry, manufacturing and construction, including wood products, provide for one dollar in every six dollars of the value of goods and services. Sawlogs and pulpwood are the main raw materials supplied by the forest industry. Also there are pulp, paper and wood products, lumber, and Christmas trees.

To supply the demand for these products, probably over 20,000 full-time jobs are created every year. The available statistics indicate that 40,000 jobs are employed in the extraction of these products from the forest. These are regular woods workers, but there are also many other jobs, such as those on a part-time basis, including logging and pulpwood from the woods regions and through the various phases of transportation, equipment and more people. Office and other direct services for a transportation business, create the total number of employees. There would be at least 12,000 persons in the extraction and primary manufacturing phases of the forest industry. Transport is an essential part of their livelihood from the foresting areas of the forests. Naturalists derive a great deal of pleasure from the study and camera studies of wildlife. Hunters enjoy the recreational values of game. Fishermen take great delight in a fast stream of water, well-stocked with trout. Forests play a large role in recreation.

Forests have a tempering influence on local climate, making for less harsh extremes of weather. Waterflow from rains and melting snow is regulated by forested lands. Streams and rivers are able to take care of the more even flow. Water erosion of land does not choke these natural drains with silt washed from flooded agricultural and other lands.

## New Way To Cook Rhubarb

This is the time of the year when we like to go to the garden and pluck the tender stalks of rhubarb. Mrs. Florence M. Hickey, Supervisor of Home Economics, claims to have discovered an exceptionally good way to cook rhubarb. In fact, it is so good that she maintains that anyone who cooks rhubarb this way will never want to stew it again.

4 cups rhubarb (cut in 1 inch pieces)  
1/4 lb. sugar (scant)

Place layer in top of double boiler, rinsed with cold water. Add layer of fruit and sugar. Repeat layers until rhubarb is finished; the last layer should be sugar. Cover closely. Cook about 40 minutes; steam over boiling water until sugar and rhubarb juice form a syrup and rhubarb is tender, but unbroken. Chill; then serve with cream or custard sauce.

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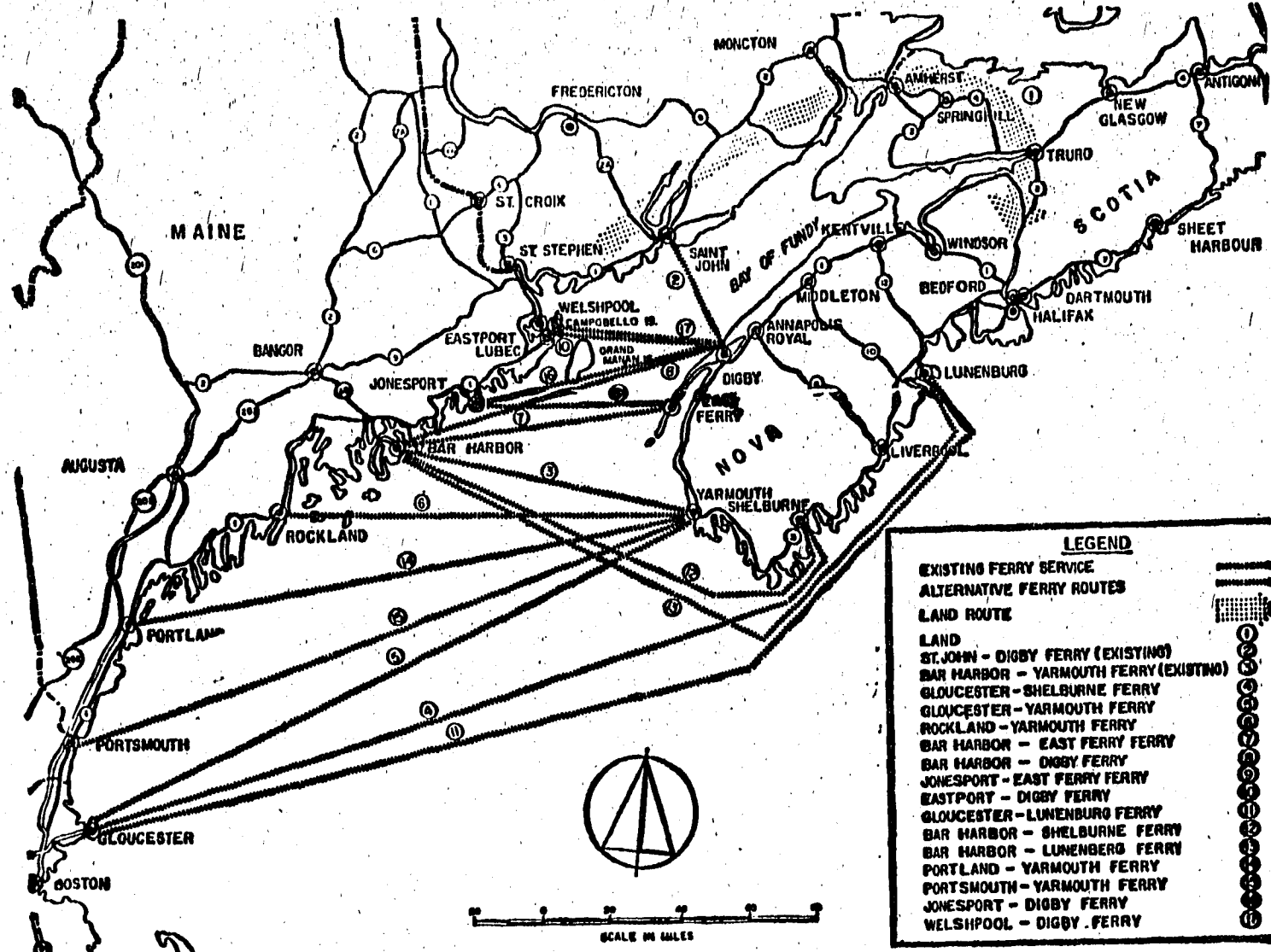

## Margison Report Recommends Digby



The map shows existing ferry service between Nova Scotia and New England and the alternative ferry routes, including the all-Canadian route between Campobello Island in New Brunswick and Digby in Nova Scotia as recommended by A. D. Margison and Associates Limited.

## Study Concluded

(Summary and conclusions which resulted in Digby-Campobello Island in New Brunswick and Digby in Nova Scotia as recommended by A. D. Margison and Associates Limited.)

In summarizing the findings of this study, a brief review will be made of the comparison of travel times, automobile travel costs between New England and Nova Scotia; the comparison of ferry traffic generation areas; the estimates of future automobile and truck traffic; site investigations; the comparison of economic benefits to the Province of Nova Scotia; and the comparison of costs.

The comparison of time taken to travel between the origins in New England and the destinations in Nova Scotia via the seventeen alternative routes indicates that a Jonesport to East Ferry route would produce the best travel time rating with Eastport-Digby and Welshpool-Digby routes rating second and third respectively. The existing Bar Harbor-Yarmouth route rated seventh and the land route tenth. The seven alternative routes which have either the south shore Nova Scotia ports of Lunenburg or Shelburne, or the New England ports of Portland, Portsmouth or Gloucester as terminals, all rated lower than the land route and, therefore, would provide no travel time advantage over the land route.

The comparison of automobile and truck travel costs for the trips from New England to Nova Scotia produces results similar to the comparison of travel times. A Jonesport-East Ferry route would produce the best travel cost rating with Eastport-Digby and Welshpool-Digby routes rating second and third respectively. The existing Bar Harbor-Yarmouth route again rated seventh and the land route tenth. Also, the seven alternative routes, which have either the south shore Nova Scotia ports

of Lunenburg or Shelburne, or the New England ports of Portland, Portsmouth or Gloucester as terminals, all rated lower than the land route and, therefore, would provide no travel cost advantage over the land route.

be \$87,890,000 on an improved Bar Harbor-Yarmouth route and \$70,798,000 on the combined Welshpool-Digby and Bar Harbor-Yarmouth routes, a difference of \$17,092,000. This comparison of costs indicates that it would be less costly to establish a new ferry service

between Welshpool and Digby than to provide an additional service on the Bar Harbor-Yarmouth route.

# Find Your Purpose in Life, Strive Towards That Goal

"Every temptation you resist, every evil thought you repress, every unkind word you withhold, adds greatly to your stature, to your effectiveness, and to your usefulness. Find your purpose in life, then be prepared to face many disappointments and failures while striving to meet that goal." These were words of C. E. Edwards, inspector of schools for Annapolis County and the Municipality of Digby, as he addressed the 1966 graduates of Digby Regional High School, Tuesday evening. He was speaking to what was probably the largest group ever to graduate from DRHS.

132 in the combined grades XI and XII - and also to the largest audience ever to attend such a ceremony in Digby.

"In spite of what you may hear, today's youth is a pretty splendid group," Mr. Edwards said. "There is more talent today than perhaps any other time in history, and the youth of the present seem to bear a better talent for tolerance. Of course there is far more to be tolerant about. Today's world is ever-changing. Tomorrow is here and we are all set for yesterday," Mr. Edwards told his audience. "Computers are taking over and many of today's graduates are entering trades and fields that soon will no longer exist." He told the graduates they have to share the responsibility to further the great ecumenical movement when racial and religious prejudices will be erased forever.

Basically, our thoughts are of most importance, Mr. Edwards said, because they determine what we say and what we do. "Get your thoughts by being knowledgeable and conversing with persons with good thoughts." We are not educated until we are knowledgeable with the Bible, the graduates were told. "He who lives must first have a purpose for living."

Out of our thoughts we develop our character, Mr. Edwards said. We must learn the meaning of and practise discipline, reliability and understanding. Disappointments are inevitable, the speaker stated. "What you do with your disappointments and failures is what counts. No one fails who tries and does his best." Develop a strong faith, in yourselves, in people, and in God, and be ready to serve, the graduates were told. "Society owes young people nothing but the opportunity to grow and develop in stature. The only ones among you who will be really happy are those who seek and find how to serve. Prepare yourselves for the uncertain world ahead by continuing to build a better you, and in this way contribute to the building of a better world, the kind planned by the creator."

Mr. Edwards complimented the Digby high school system, and called P. C. Purdy, one of Canada's ablest administrators. His life is wrapped up in people. He has two hobbies, the development of the school program to meet the needs of individual children, and the care of the sick and aged. The speaker was introduced by Dr. D. E. Lewis, vice-chairman of the high school board, and thanked by Ronald Morehouse, Warden of Digby Municipality.

In her valedictory address Heather Sherman said, "tonight marks the achievement of one goal which is the stepping-stone to the attainment of others. It represents a beginning from an end. The completion of our fundamental education closes one chapter of our lives while simultaneously providing the setting for new ones by the opening of innumerable doors to the future. We are embarking on a journey on the roads which lie behind these doors. One question must still be asked - which door shall we open? The choice is ours and it is a choice facilitated by the training and guidance we have received here. As much as we hate to leave, at the same time we

## Each Mink Brings \$5,000

Twenty black male mink bred on the Mullen ranch at New Tassel have been sold to United States and Canadian breeders for a record \$5,000 each. The Mullen brothers, said that 20 mink were advertised two weeks ago and all were immediately spoken for. They said the price of \$5,000 is the highest ever paid for a mink.

Three of the high-priced animals will go to breeders in British Columbia and Ontario, while the remainder have been sold to breeders in Minnesota, Colorado, Wisconsin and Ohio.

The Mullens have been breeding mink since 1930 and a jet black strain of mink since 1960, but only produced this new strain - "Homozygous" - last year. This is the first year they have been put up for sale.

This new strain will produce 100 per cent jet black kittens when the "homo" males are bred to standard females, it is understood the best that could previously be expected was a 50 per cent jet black litter.

## Henshaw Speaks On Gideons

Lawrence Henshaw, Bear River, speaking at Grace United Church on Sunday morning explained that the Gideons were not ministers but laymen who attempt to follow as God will guide.

He traced the history of Gideons back to the 1800's when John N. Gideon, a commercial traveller, promised his dying mother that he would read a portion of the Bible everyday. In a hotel in Chile he discussed with his roommate the possibility of forming an association of fellowships. In 1898 there was formed the association. By 1911 Canada had its first Gideon camp. The group then began placing Bibles in hotels, the first one placed in Canada being in the King Edward Hotel in Toronto in 1911. By 1939 they were placed in hospitals, in 1933 in prisons and in 1936 in schools. White Bibles are given to female student nurses when they are capped and blue Bibles go to the male nurses at graduation. Over 63,000,000 copies of Bibles of New Testament have been distributed throughout the world by the Gideons.

The Gideons are nondenominational. To be a member the person must be a member of a recognized church. No smokers or drinkers are allowed in the organization. The purpose is personal witness and placing of Bibles.

Mr. Henshaw belongs to the Annapolis-Digby camp of Gideons which consists of eight members. There are 2146 members in the 160 camps in Canada besides women auxiliaries. There are 23,000 Gideon members in 73 countries.

The Annapolis-Digby camp members have spoken, at 63 services in the past year. They have distributed 1342 copies of the Bible and 6445 of the New Testament since they were organized.

Mr. Henshaw was introduced by Fred Fullerton who conducted the service in the absence of Rev. R. H. Hughes.

Port Wade, who was given the trophy for keeps in 1912, had the trophy in her possession since 1936, it having been left with her by her mother, the captain's widow.

The Britain trophy was the first trophy ever awarded for schooner racing in Nova Scotia and was awarded annually to the winners of the 90 ton and over schooner races at Digby. Winner of the trophy for three consecutive occasions was the Albert J. Lutz commanded by Capt. Apt. The vessel had been built in 1908 at McGill's shipyards in Shelburne.

Present when Mrs. Nichols presented the trophy to the

museum this week was George W. Lutz of Halifax, grandson of the man for whom the vessel had been named. Mr. Lutz, it is learned told the following story about the Albert J. Lutz and its final disposal.

During the 1914-18 war, the vessel was commandeered by the Navy, and converted into a 'Q' ship which sailed the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the waters of Nova Scotia hunting German U-boats. 'Q' ships were warships in disguise. Dressed up to look for all the world like innocuous commercial vessels, they were intended to lure U-boats to their death. Once the unsuspecting U-boat surfaced, and approached for an expected easy kill by gunfire, the 'Q' boat

would whip off camouflage hiding her own guns and let fly at the U-boat.

Dories hid the Albert J. Lutz's deadly artillery. But the schooner had an uneventful war, and never fired a shot in anger. During her Navy days she was commanded by Capt. Frederick W. Wallace, who subsequently became Canada's foremost marine historian, author of, "Wooden Ships and Iron Men," and "Roving Fishermen," among numerous other books.

After World War I, the Navy sold the vessel to Newfoundland fishing interests, and the schooner was wrecked, and sank while being ferried from Halifax to her new owners in Newfoundland.

The Britain trophy was accepted on behalf of the museum board of trustees by the chairman, Capt. D. G. Padmore, RCN, CFB Stadacona.

the action of a rational human being.

No evidence of the mental state of the accused was given at the trial said Mr. Macintosh, but ComEAU had said "I was crazy. I did not know what I was doing." And he alleged there were indications of mental instability in ComEAU.

Judge Currie asked if the comment about being crazy may not have been in the vernacular and he pointed out that ComEAU went on to say what he did, and that ComEAU knew he killed a girl and wanted to go to the police at the time.

Mr. Macintosh said there was no evidence of planning or deliberation to commit murder on ComEAU's part. "The only evidence of deliberation is that he had morbid thoughts about killing someone some time before," he said.

Malachi Jones appeared for the Crown, assisted by David Thomas who conducted the prosecution at ComEAU's trial in Yarmouth.

Mr. Jones said the rule about circumstantial evidence did not apply to this case as it was not mainly supported by circumstantial evidence.

The confession made by ComEAU was direct evidence, he said.

It was within the limits of a defence counsel to blame someone else for the crime, but it would be going pretty far, and unjustified by the evidence, to say that the Crown witness referred to committed the offence.

An accused had a right for inclusion of manslaughter as a possible verdict, said Mr. Jones, but "hitting someone on the head with a 40-pound rock is hardly evidence to support manslaughter."

If there was diminished responsibility, it should have been clearly pointed out by the defence at the trial, he said. Chief Justice Hsley said they would deal with the appeal as

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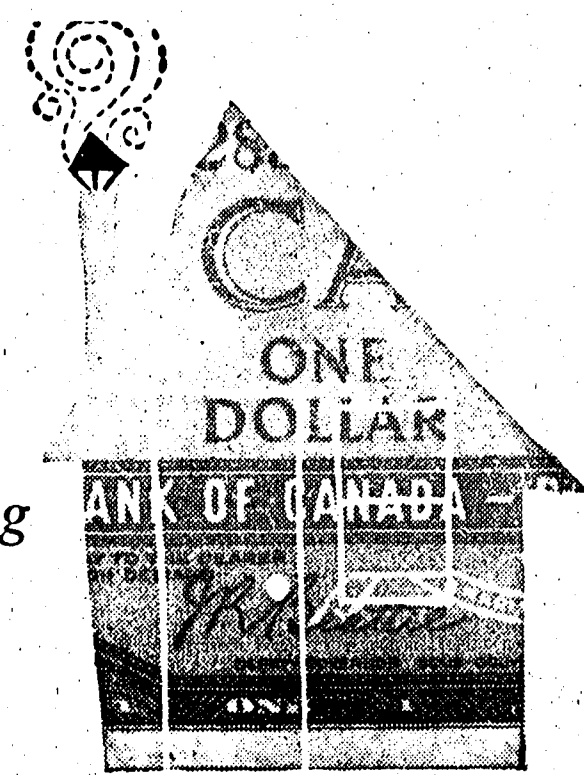
