Sometimes the gasoline engine stopped a piece of machinery would refuse to work, and the "Man" if that man had patiently worked for a certain length of time to get it going again, without results, Man would then stand back and come over dramatically then he would immediately start working. "See," he would say, "all it needed was a bit of coaxing."

On other occasions when some papers refused duty for me and seemed to be brokenhearted, I would say, "use a little oil" and note remark after that all it took. They often since have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I took "Mac" and four teenage boys who in the spring season of 1968 got together and believe it or not, we went and decided to utilize the newly built outdoor Pines Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else wanted to be around except the four of us, nobody else wanted to be around except the four of us.

Who were the four? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Carl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world and Korean, was awarded the Victoria Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent draghead, for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale importer and agent, and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day I was told to write about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did and read at least two somewhat different versions of the man who was found marooned out at sea off some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Dublin County. When found this man's torso had been cut out and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. 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About This And That

The Project Could Grow

In supporting July as salad month the importance of farm produce to the province's economy was emphasized by Trade and Industry Minister W.L.S. K. Jones. In 1965, the farm value of all commercial fruit produced in the province was worth approximately \$5,260,000, while the farm value of vegetable crops exceeded \$1,615,000. Mr. Jones said.

"In addition a substantial industry is built around the production of green house vegetables, including tomatoes and lettuce. Also the marketing of fresh fruits and vegetables utilizes an extensive scope of specialized activities including the use of common and cold storage facilities, packing and grading establishments, various types of transportation services, and specialized organizations engaged in selling, assembling and distributing fresh produce at shopping points both wholesale and retail," the minister said. During July, more than 40 fresh fruits and vegetables are available from gardens and local markets in Nova Scotia, he continued.

In view of the figures above we want to draw attention to the small-fruit project started at Roxville and sponsored by the provincial government. The project has now been developed to Marshfield as well as Roxville and promises to be a most valuable industry for the area. The farms, indeed, impressive looking and is worth a trip to see.

As mentioned by Mr. Jones about fruits and vegetables in general, if the small-fruit project is successful, there will develop other small industries for necessities which arise from growth to market time. Not least of the necessities will be adequate transportation services.

Weymouth Day

Again the Weymouth Kiwanis Club staged a successful day on July 1st. The pleasant weather was definitely in favor with a really chilly wind counteracting any intense heat from the unclouded skies. The comfortable weather, combined with the fact that no other events of its nature were being held for miles around, brought crowds to the village to enjoy the festivities.

Added to the above items attracting crowds was also the fact that Weymouth has built up for itself the good name of giving their patrons something worthwhile on July 1st. Especially have the parades been a drawing card for the July 1st event in Weymouth. This year was no exception and, in fact, according to reports, this year's parade outdid any previous year. It was noted that this year the Weymouth parade had a considerable number of entries from other areas including Smith's Cove, Digby, Belliveau Cove, and other points both East and West. This is as it should be and it is hoped that neighboring villages and towns will support the parades at the Bear River Cherry Carnival and the Acadia Festival in 1966. After all, floats are both expensive and time consuming in preparation. Small towns and villages cannot expect to have sufficient entries without some outside assistance to make an attractive parade to satisfy spectators. It is now, however, a ways most pleasing and even surprising to see what can be accomplished in this line by both the villages of Weymouth and Bear River.

We agree with others who found the Weymouth July 1st parade especially attractive this year giving, as we know, the judges a rather difficult time in making their decisions. Generally, there is one prize for each section, like commercial floats and non-commercial floats, or as there were in the children's parade Digby, May 23rd, several prizes for girls and the same number for boys. The girls' entries outnumbered the boys' by nearly ten times making one very simple decision in favor of boys but making the other extremely difficult when there were so many entries almost equal in quality. In Weymouth on Friday the commercial floats proved to be the most difficult section with a variety of entries from which one winner was to be chosen as to representation, neatness, attractiveness, amount of effort and other factors concerned.

Competition built up to an event that is sure, but it is well that those who enter parades do so because of their civic mindedness and not because they necessarily expect to go home with a prize. With that in mind, we congratulate those who obtained prizes and those who were deserving of recognition, including only a few we can now remember to name such as the H. & S. Mark Ranch, Brion Bros., Weymouth Drug Store, Rhuland Furniture, Evangelina & Gabriel, Clare Electric, Pepsi, Weymouth Motors.

Digby... "Our Cup Runneth Over"

If any community can use the economic punch that will come from a second ferry to Digby, the town is lacking in any large industry with a steady payroll. For some years now, there has been some indication that the CPR may pull out of the ferry service to Saint John at the same time date which would really pull out the economic life.

This may never happen but it would be nice to have the insurance that comes with a second boat and the extra employment. The Digby Courier in two recent editorials has been bristling with indignation that any other town should even think that the engineering firm making this decision should reconsider anything but the Digby site.

While there was a lot of speculation about where the ferry would go and a lot of competition, now that a site has been suggested the competing towns have to a degree ebbed off with the tide.

If it is still the assumption of the Progress Enterprise that wherever a second ferry locates, it creates a new industry but the extra influx of tourists will spread all over the province and benefit every community.

It is still the contention too of this newspaper that the suggested site does not connect with the heavier populated areas of New England. If we are ever to tap this bonanza,

then there should be a direct ferry route. To do it calls for the possibility of a third ferry.

Senator J. J. Kinley, once remarked that his grandmother had advised him, "If you ever want to make money, you must go where money is." This is sage advice, regardless of the circumstances. If the province wants to draw tourists then we must provide the service that will draw them.

The Atlantic Development Board, APEC and the provincial Department of Trade & Industry don't always divulge long range economic plans, and how much or how far they are planning to go to complete these ideas. It is possible that the Digby ferry suggestion ties in with the projected corridor highway to Montreal, either through New Brunswick for an all Canadian route or parts of the U.S. The corridor route has been discussed quite openly, but it may be that among the upper echelon it has been considered for a definite start in the next few years. If this is so there is little use in quibbling about ferry sites. To do so would only defeat a magnificent master plan.

However government officials should actually divulge what they have in mind and when they intend to start on the various segments of the plan. Communities involved in the ferry discussions would then know what to expect and there would be less controversy. It would not put them all in agreement, but at least they might be more compatible.

Drive First. Eat Later

On a long trip this summer, eat a snack before an early start, drive an hour or so, then stop for a good breakfast, warns the Canadian Highway Safety Council. The combination of rising early, plenty of food and relatively light traffic could lull a motorist into dangerous drowsiness or put him to sleep at the wheel. CHSC says the breakfast stop after driving a while breaks the monotony and helps wake up the driver.

Other ideas for a safe journey offered by CHSC include:

Picking up a hitch-hiker, unless he is known to the motorist, could end in robbery, assault, even murder.

Have tires checked before leaving. If the load is extra heavy, ask the dealer to recommend proper tires to carry safely.

Be sure windshield wipers have "live" blades and work efficiently. Nothing, except failure of headlights at night, is as dangerous and as frightening as wipers that fail in a heavy downpour.

Use turn signals at every opportunity. Don't keep the others guessing. They could guess wrong.

First drops of rain turn a dry pavement into a menacing slick according to the Rubber Association of Canada. Heavy rain encourages the car to "water ski" at high speed. Common sense driving will eliminate those risks.

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Clare Students Graduate

The graduation exercises of the Clare District High School of Meteghan River were held at the auditorium of the school under the guidance of Dr. Julius Comeau, president of the Municipal School Board, of Meteghan, who acted as master of ceremonies during the impressive event. Thirty-two graduated in Grade XII and 15 in Commercial course.

Mr. Ernest P. LeBlanc, of Church Point, retired bank manager, was guest speaker. In speaking to the graduates he told them that they will require perseverance, patience and courage to meet the demands of this fast moving world of ours. He explained to the students what is expected of them when they apply for positions in the business world.

Education in our ancestors' time was at a minimum low and only through the courage of the clergy of those times was any education available to the Acadians. Today, with a modern high school and improved educational system in Clare, along with St. Ann's College at Church Point to serve our people, an improvement is shown, stated Mr. LeBlanc.

Principal Stanislaus d'Entremont, of Little Brook, showed that from 1957-58 school year and 1965-66 there was an increase of 209 students from Grade IX to Grade XII. With the increase in the number of students reaching the higher grades, stated Mr. d'Entremont, it can be readily seen that the present school cannot contain more students under its present structure.

The comprehensive school program which will be introduced will offer a variety of courses which the student may follow, according to his capacity and requirements which would prevent many drop-outs in the high school grade group. To you parents, stated Mr. d'Entremont, you must realize that all of your children have not the necessary capacities to follow the preparatory courses to enter a university and it is here that the comprehensive school program will enter the picture.

Warden Gerard d'Entremont, of Meteghan Station, spoke briefly, giving facts and data on the necessity of the construction of an additional high school in the near future so as to include Grade VII. With the present high school being pressed beyond its capacity to house the number of students who wish to continue to Grade XII, something will have to be done in the very immediate future to relieve the present high school building.

A few weeks ago, I finished Catherine Drinker Bowen's biography of Francis Bacon. Biographies are among my favorite reading matter. While this one did not exactly catch me up in the excitement of its lightning pace, or anything, it was an interesting book for quiet reading, and it cleared up a few misconceptions. I think, from now on, for instance, I will be able to keep those two Bacons, Francis and Roger, apart in my mind. I learned a few surprising things about Sir Francis too, although that is hardly remarkable, since all I knew about him before I read the book was that he was not (or perhaps he was) Roger, that he wrote essays, that he most likely did not write Shakespeare's plays, and that he lived (unless he was Roger) during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I. In any case, by the book's end, Sir Francis had evolved in my mind as a three dimensional human being, who had lived in, and seen places I have seen, walked on streets where I have walked, breathed, thought, and was. He will never again be a name, vaguely remembered from some where.

My enjoyment of biographies is a direct result of one of my less socially acceptable hobbies, eavesdropping. I do not listen at keyholes, our telephone is on a private line, and, so far, I have refrained from putting electronic olives in anybody's martini. My form of eavesdropping is more refined and subtle than that. I sit quietly on crowded trains or buses, or in restaurants, and let the titillating little fragments of conversation waft their way to me.

I hear all the gory details of Aunt Harriet's operation, and Uncle Herman's ulcer. I hear reports about how doctors and garage men overcharge, and the most scrumptious little recipe for Marabelle's Canned Beet and Eggplant Casserole Supreme. At these times, I am usually sitting smack in the centre of a little group of my own which is carrying on its own little conversation. I try valiantly to pay attention, but somehow, those shreds about how Mable's petunias got the blight, and how dear old Hector always knows it is going to rain when his corn acts up, which keep drifting in on me, seem infinitely more fascinating than anything which happens to be my business at the moment.

When I read biographies, I can indulge in this sneaky little character trait under an innocent guise. Behind the covers of a book, I eavesdrop on the conversations of the great. I especially like those biographies which are made up of excerpts from the subject's diaries and letters. Whenever I read one of these, I carry the book around with the delicious, defensive, guilty feeling that any minute someone could catch me reading someone else's mail.

Autobiographies are not all the same thing. To write an autobiography to begin with, you have to be somewhat biased in your own favor. There may be some people who write diaries and journals for future publication, on the other hand, but even if they do, I imagine most diary keepers are fairly honest with themselves. The books, after all, if they are published, will not be until they are dead and cannot be embarrassed by their private thoughts being committed to print. As for letters, nobody, as far as I know, writes letters except to editors for publication. To really get the inside story of the great and famous, nothing beats those sneaky little peeks into their correspondence. The more letters which can be crammed into a book, the more complete a picture emerges. You try writing that you made \$1500, selling used post holes, to your lawyer, your landlord, the man who holds your mortgage, and the Department of Internal Revenue. See how many letters you will write.

However, it is not quite fair to myself to say that my delight in reading biographies is due entirely to my innate snoopy streak. Some of it is a direct result of my boundless ignorance. I can pick almost any book blind from a library shelf and find it to be about somebody or something about which I know absolutely nothing. I read a most fascinating story of George Sand a while ago. I picked it off the shelf because I knew little about her but that she wore a man's name, and wore clothing, that she wrote novels, and had once used the mistress of Frederick Chopin. That information I gleaned, incidentally, from a movie, when I was about eight years old.

George Sand emerged from the book, a vivid, vigorous, vital personality, a woman of sincere, if somewhat unorthodox, morality. I found her, although at the opposite pole from Florence Nightingale's unbending Victorian morality, surprisingly like that lady in many ways.

Florence Nightingale is another lady with whom I have become acquainted, and fascinated, within the last few years. Until I snooped into her biography, I thought of her as a sort of colorless Grade VI school lesson about the "lady with the lamp." Florence was quite an amazing woman.

Maybe we could run down to the Digby library and see what fascinating life we can pry into this week. Or would you rather go to a restaurant and see if we can hear what color Henrietta is going to dye her hair next week?

Interesting Personalities At The Pines

Those who are guests at The Pines this summer get not only comfortable beds for sleeping, excellently prepared food to satisfy the most exacting gourmet, opportunity for rest and recreation and all general hotel services, but their stay will certainly be made even more pleasant by the obviously friendly faces of the most interesting staff.

The manager, E. J. Fother, exudes a quiet, friendly personality, which definitely reflects throughout the staff and will both directly and indirectly add to the pleasure of guests.

Then there is the hotel chef, already mentioned in The Digby Courier, W. F. Schmidt, famous for his Seal-

lops, Bonillabasso, as well as being a colorful and interesting personality. Having participated in the Seallops Bonillabasso Digby style last week the editor of The Digby Courier can vouch for the delicacy of this particular dish. Yet to be tried is the chef's newest recipe, a special Digby Soup, which Mr. Schmidt devised some time ago.

Other interesting persons are on The Pines staff. One of the hotel's waiters was the head waiter, the main hotel, whose name is Gustave Chasler, but who is generally known as "Mr. Gus."

"Mr. Gus" was born in the United States and worked there as an apprentice waiter, gradually advancing in his career. In 1926 he came to Canada, where he has been for over 10 years. This stage of employment was short-lived as he again resumed his position in hotels in California, Vancouver, Lake Louise, the Laurentians, Toronto, Port William, Winnipeg and Edmonton. In this time he had served both C.P.R. and C.N.R. hotels, opening several hotels, motels and dining rooms in the course of years. At one time he was chief steward on the Empress of Canada and travelled to the East. For eight years he was with the Sovereign in Bermuda. In the past two years he has come back to Canada. So far as Digby is concerned, he said "I had not been here before but I love it, already."

Speaking of hotel work in Canada, "Mr. Gus" said that there should be more training

in colleges and schools for this type of work. It is a profitable business, he commented, there are all kinds of opportunities. He felt the young people should be advised of the opportunities open to them.

At present there are about 150 on The Pines staff, including waiters, repair crew, etc. The summer staff is expected to number 170, most of whom are from Nova Scotia, many coming from the Digby area, where a large amount of purchasing of materials and stocks is done.

The friendly personalities are not the only attractive features of The Pines. A general air of cleanliness is also maintained from the renovations which in many cases have been done in the thirty some years old hotel.

In the dining room with a seating capacity of 200, the walls have been brightened, the floors refinished and the chairs repainted in attractive tapestry. The completely new dishes are in pyro ceramics with a dainty floral pattern. New silverware has also been purchased. The gift shop and corridor on that floor have been given face liftings with the new gay green furniture prominent among the improvements imposed.

On the first floor lounge an almost complete renovation has taken place. Here the walls have been lightened, a choice green rug covers most of the floor and the concert stage and the hard wood parts of the floor are refreshed bringing out a much admired pattern. The furniture done in brilliant red and orange stripes and floral patterns is arranged in conversational groups and placed so that the high winged furniture is back to walls and pillars. The draperies are to be in orange blending with the furniture hues.

The second and third floors of the hotel and the cottages contain 150 bedrooms, most of which have been redecorated. The twenty-four rooms on the top floor have been completed and the entire second floor rooms have been painted in neutral shades on walls and woodwork.

Notable about the top floor redecoration is that the sunny side rooms are done in greens. The floor covering is in predominate green and the furniture, bedspreads, curtains are in blending greens and floral blues. White vinyl covers much of

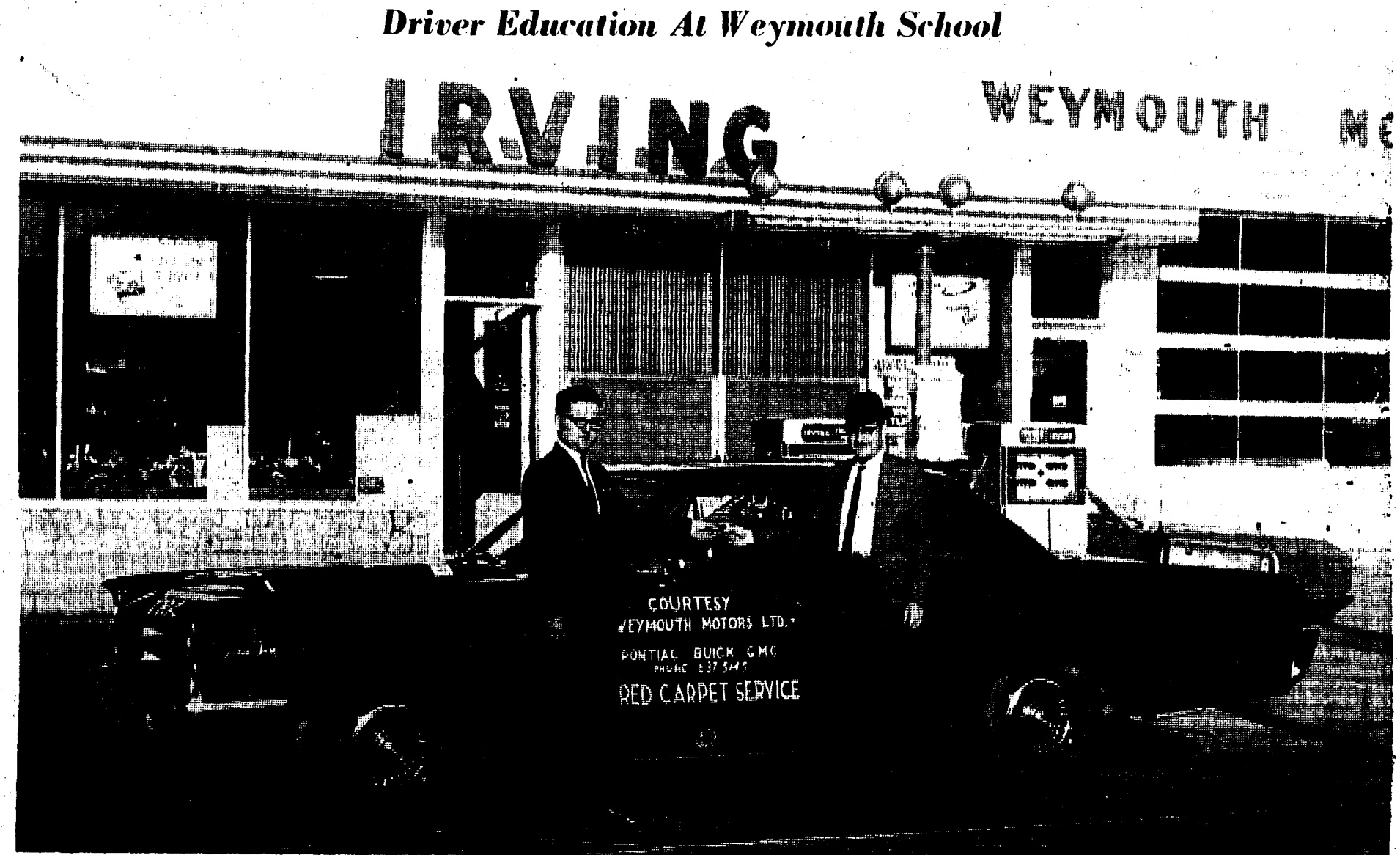

Discuss Acadian Lines Property For Parking

A lengthy discussion on the possibility of the Acadian Lines property for a parking area and rest rooms was held at the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday evening. The Acadian Lines had offered the property on Birch St. for rent to Digby town in lieu of taxes and on a 30 day notice deal. The town turned the proposition over to the Digby Board of Trade but the Board of Trade had not found itself in a financial position to take on the proposition. After much discussion on the pros and cons, Vincent Snow was asked to take over the matter and meet with Mr. Thompson of the Acadia Lines and a committee from town. Several schemes were suggested during the discussion (a) that the Acadian Lines and the town jointly operate the parking rest rooms and bus stop (b) that the town subsidize the Digby Board of Trade in the proposition (c) that the town procure the property for a new town hall (d) that a tourist bureau be part of the proposition with parking, rest rooms and bus stop. To show the urgency for some accommodation, the president, Reigh Jayne, told of an incident which occurred on the afternoon of the meeting. A lady had come to Digby from Trenton, Ont. She had landed at Digby from the Princess of Acadia enroute to visit her daughter in Greenwood. She had been advised to go to the bus stop and wait for the 4:10 p.m. bus. To her dismay there was no bus stop office open, no rest room facilities during her two hour and more stay and no lockers to check her luggage to go down town. The secretary, Mrs. Edith Wallis, who also had conversation with the Trenton lady said that lady admitted the little town so much, except for this unforfeivable omission of facilities. Quoting the visitor Mrs. Wallis said that the visitor's intention was to fill in the time between boat and bus by purchasing some clothing in town. Instead the lady said there was no place to leave her luggage so she stood in the boiling sun guarding it on the sidewalk near the bus stop. She was reluctant to bother private business houses. The president then reported that he has learned that a service station near by is providing much rest room facilities to the public, not willingly, but, because he can't see them turned away. The general consensus of opinion was that facilities of this nature are badly needed in Digby.

Visit Trinity Parish

Miss Brenda Pierce and Miss Elizabeth Williamson, members of the St. George Sunday School Mission of the Anglican Church of Canada, who have been in Trinity Parish, Digby, for the past week, were guests of Trinity Women's Auxiliary at a special meeting held at the home of Mrs. R. B. Lent Tuesday evening. During the evening Miss Williamson, who is a native of Minehead in Somerset, England, told of her experience as a missionary in Borneo where she spent six years. The St. George Sunday School Mission van is subsidized by the Women's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Nova Scotia. The van workers use the vehicle as a headquarters while visiting parishes in the diocese. Their main function during their summer program is to assist the Rector of the parish in which they are temporarily stationed in visiting his parishioners.

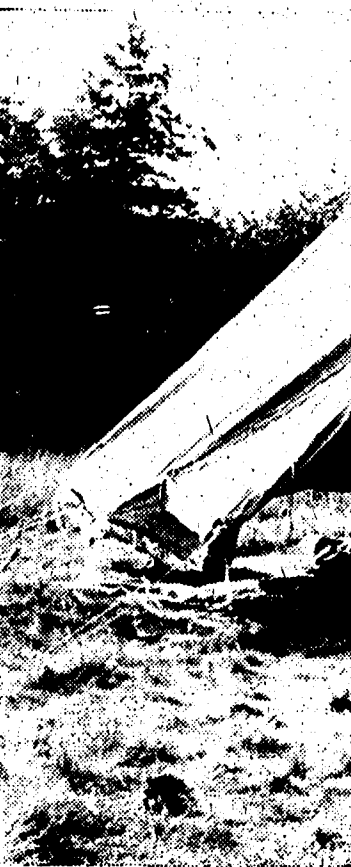
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Eagle Six Were Winners

Nigerian Doctor Visits Digby

Dr. Thomas A. Lambe, O.B.E., of Ibadan, Nigeria, Dean of the Medical School of the University of Ibadan and also Professor and head of the Department of Psychiatry at Ibadan University, will be in Digby this week. While in Digby he will confer with Dr. A. H. Leighton, head of the new Department of Behavioural Sciences at the Harvard School of Public Health, who is spending some time in Digby. Dr. Lambe and Dr. Leighton collaborated in an extensive joint mental health survey of the Western Region of Nigeria in 1961. Dr. Lambe, who is a graduate of the University of Birmingham with A.B., M.B. and M.D. degrees, also has a Diploma from the London School of Tropical Medicine and the D.P.M., specialist certificate. He is also a Chief in the Yeruba tribe of Nigeria. In the mid 1950's Dr. Lambe founded and became the Director of the Aro Hospital in Abeokuta, the first modern psychiatric hospital in Nigeria. He developed an arrangement in connection with the hospital whereby patients could live in nearby villages and come to the hospital for treatment and medicines. This "village plan" made it possible for patients to live in non-threatening surroundings where they could be involved in occupational therapy and could also follow their own familiar ways and religious practices while receiving help through modern psychiatric treatment. Dr. Lambe's program drew world-wide attention. Dr. Lambe, who is a consultant expert to the World Health Organization, has been responsible for developing psychiatry and social sciences in Nigeria. Among his outstanding works has been a study of the problems faced by African students studying abroad. This study has become the basis of government policy in the selection and preparation of Nigerian students for studies abroad. A top adviser in the behavioural sciences to the government of Nigeria, Dr. Lambe is keenly interested in the founding of a behavioural sciences program in Nigeria and this interest has been one of the factors which prompted his present visit to Nova Scotia. Visits Mother Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Masters, Windsor, Vermont, are visiting with Mrs. Masters' mother, Mrs. Laura Burrill at the home of Mrs. George Van-Tassel. Mrs. Burrill was 95 years last December.

That Victoria Bridge

Digby can't complain. In fact, Digby people are not the complaining kind. Maybe that is what is wrong with us that we do not have more industries in the area. No, Digby can't complain too much when there is some encouragement that another ferry might be established on a run from Digby to Campobello. But, another ferry won't take care of our Victoria Bridge problem either. It is likely to add to the problem.

A New Hampshire car pulled into a service station at Smith's Cove, so we are told, and reported that they had waited twenty minutes on Saturday to get across the Victoria Bridge. According to the report there were 39 cars came over the bridge until the New Hampshire car had an opportunity to take its place on the bridge. As the service station owner remarked — "They expect us to cater to American tourists. How can they expect us to have congenial people to deal with in the first place when they strike such conditions on their trip?" He added that he had not heard anything about the replacement of that bridge for some time and he guessed a trip to Halifax would be in order.

True, we haven't heard much of late on the replacement of Victoria Bridge over Bear River. Certainly nothing concrete can be accomplished this summer but it is a subject that needs to be kept before the public. Anticipation of another boat should mean anticipation of release from the bottleneck on the highway — Victoria Bridge. Even the 105 cars which crossed on the Princess of Acadia on Sunday would effect the traffic over the bridge somewhat. There were 800 passengers, many of whom used Victoria Bridge and gave it along with Digby and Annapolis Counties, the kind of publicity which might be uttered from their impression at the time.

The Pines is looking up; the Princess of Acadia is carrying more passengers for the summer, at any rate; we anticipate another ferry out of Digby. Travelling should be made as convenient and safe as possible. Victoria Bridge at present affords neither convenience nor safety.

Digby Parking

Overheard by conversation of a tourist last week — "I wish that Digby had enough parking space. It's those darn trucks double parked that cause the trouble."

We could readily understand his feeling for we tried to drive through Digby streets one day last week and for a moment we thought the liquor store had been moved back to its old premises. Was almost impossible to get through. By the way, we changed our minds about the locality of the liquor store as soon as we continued the loop around town to Carleton St. That special day the liquor store parking lot was jammed full and the highway outside was congested.

We agree with the tourist's conversation on the congestion down town but we still feel that Digby could use more parking areas.

Centennial

By the way, we haven't heard much of late on Digby's centennial plans. We've been reading in the Nova Scotia Centennial News Briefs about what other towns and villages have planned but the name of Digby is not mentioned. Whether or not they are centennial efforts we do not know, but individual properties seem to be getting brightened up. This will be counted in the 1967 centennial effort for upkeep of individual properties means much for the industry of tourism as connected with centennial.

Things we haven't heard much about are the combined religious service that has been suggested for centennial in each community, centennial choir, any centennial contests sponsored by the Boards of Trade or other organizations, anyone writing a history of Digby or preparing a historical drama, what the plans are for the day the Caravan visits Digby, any definite plans for beautifying our civic buildings.

Our readers can add to the list but here is a suggestion — something special for the first couple married in Digby in 1967, something really special for the first baby born, a warm and special welcome for the first new resident in Digby in 1967. Just suggestions which either the town or individual merchants and business men can take up!

Picnic Tables

Several times we have travelled past the Savary Picnic Park at Plympton and the one at Lake Midway on Digby Neck, we have noticed that the parks have been in great demand for picnickers. These are assets to Digby County both for the pleasure of tourists and people of the local area.

25 Years In The Priesthood

Reverend Father Peter Comeau, parish priest of Stanstead, P.Q., but a native of Weymouth, N. S., celebrated

a solemn high mass at St. Joseph's Church in Weymouth Wednesday afternoon at 3:00 p.m. on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of his ordination as a priest. He was assisted by Rev. Fr. Luc Gaudet, parish priest, Digby as deacon, and by Rev. Fr. Delbe Comeau, chaplain at St. Joseph's Home, in Yarmouth, as sub-deacon. Rev. Fr. Raoul Deveau, parish priest of St. Joseph's parish, Weymouth, was master of ceremonies.

The sermon for the occasion was given by Rev. Fr. Leo Mallett, parish priest of Comeau's Hill.

In the sanctuary Mgr. E. Bourneuf, P.A., of Groses Coques, and Mgr. E. LeBlanc, of St. Bernard, were present. There were several other members of the clergy, some of them being in the choir. The organist was Mrs. Dixon Rice.

A large number of parents and friends of the family, with a large number of parishioners, assisted at the celebration. Mass was followed by a banquet at St. Joseph's parish hall.

Father Comeau was born at Weymouth on May 15, 1911, the seventh child of the late Mr. and Mrs. Pius Comeau. At the age of 14 years, he obtained a scholarship from the Historical Acadian Association of Cape Breton which enabled him to take a complete course in the arts at St. Charles College in Sherbrooke, P.Q. In 1937 he obtained his B.A. and in the fall of the same year he started his theological studies at the same institution. On June 29, 1911, he was ordained to the priesthood in St. Mary's Church in Church Point, N. S., by Bishop Coyle, of Victoria, B. C.

After becoming a priest he returned to the same college where he taught for four years. Next he was transferred to the diocese of Halifax and was assistant priest at St. Charles parish in Amherst for two years; he was then transferred to Kentville where he remained for about a year. He returned to the diocese of Sherbrooke P.Q. in 1948 and became the first parish priest of the new parish of Omerville, P.Q. In 1957 he was transferred to Averscliff but six months later, the Bishop assigned him the parish of Stanstead, P.Q., where he is at present.

Father Comeau is well known in Weymouth, and is the brother of Thomas, Louis and Camille Comeau, of Weymouth. Mrs. Frank Comeau, Gilbert's Cove and Mrs. Augustin Lombard, of Corcorrie, Adolphie, of Yarmouth Catherine, of Stanstead.

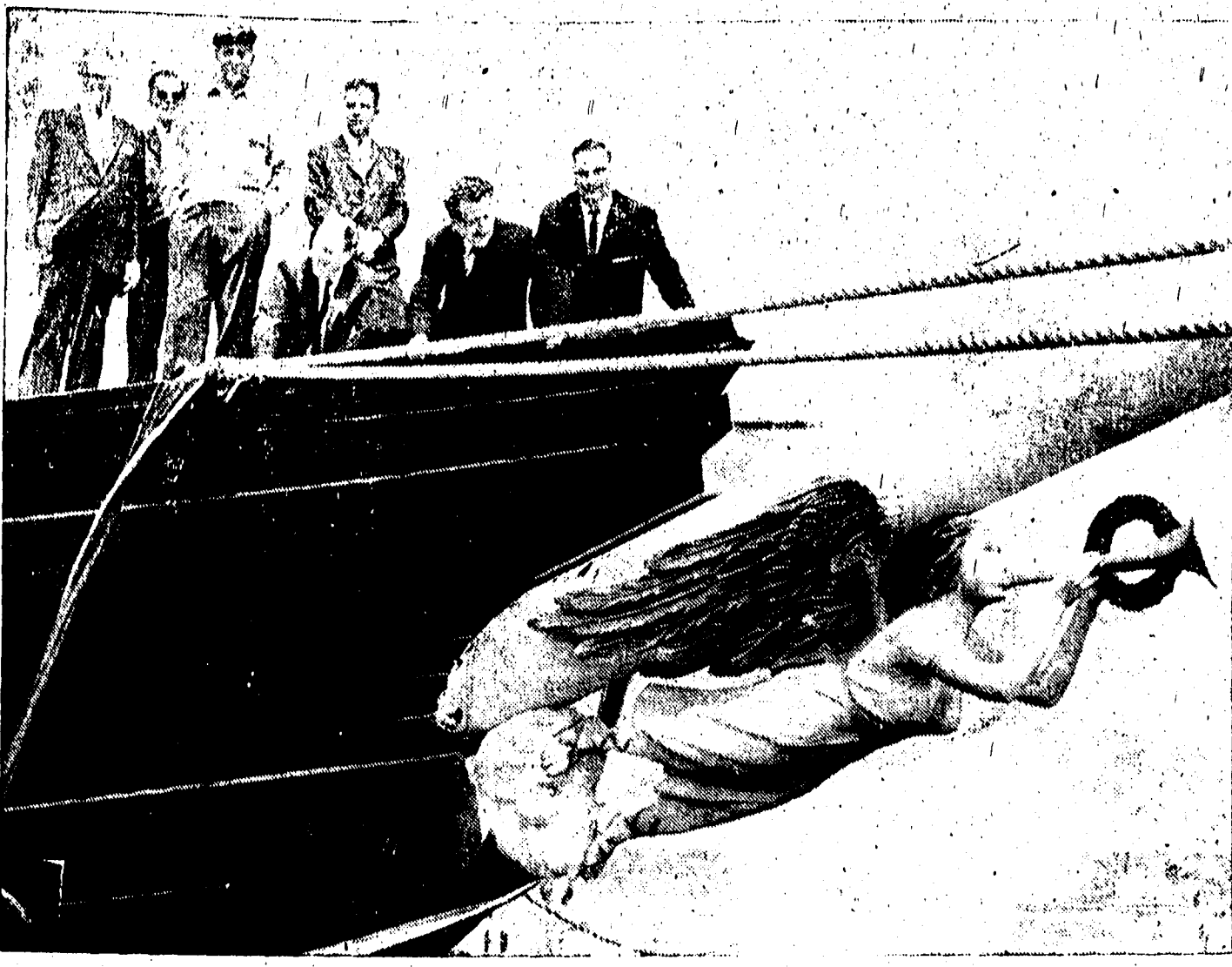

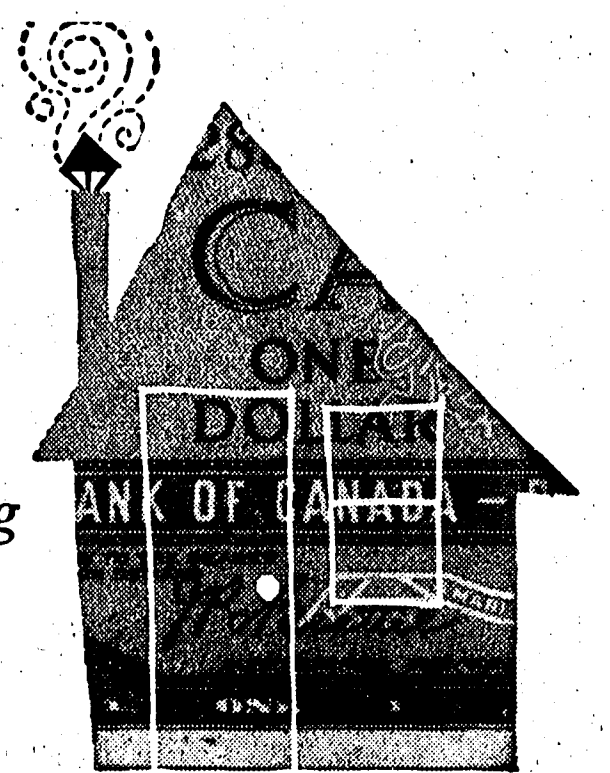

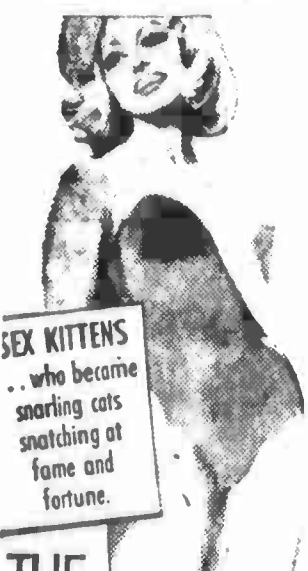

Miss Majumder Addresses Rotarians



Miss Kanak Majumder, psychologist at the Digby Community Mental Health Centre, was guest speaker at the luncheon meeting of the Midcleton Rotary Club recently.

Introduced by C. E. Edwards, chairman of the luncheon session, Miss Majumder spoke on the social life of India and on Hindu philosophy.

Speaking on the role of women in India, Miss Majumder stated that in ancient India women played a prominent role in the religious, social, cultural and official life of the country. They were respected, educated and took their place in the councils of the nation, she said. With the invasion of the Moslems, however, the situation was reversed, Miss Majumder said. The invaders introduced polygamy and women began to be treated at most as slaves. They were kept at home, had no part in decision making or in the official or religious life of the country.

The situation is now changing, Miss Majumder said, and more and more women are playing the part in the life of India that they did in ancient days. Women in India today, she said, are being given the opportunity of university education, child marriage has been abolished and women are again assuming leadership roles in the religious and official life of India.

Although the election of Mrs. Gandhi as Prime Minister of India may have come as a surprise to the western world, Miss Majumder said, it was no surprise to the people of India or to those who had been observing changes underway in the role of women in Indian affairs.

Miss Majumder told her audience that the strict rules that governed the role of widows in India have been changed a great deal and to

Crusader Helmet Hit At Curio Exhibit

More than 200 articles were exhibited at the home of Miss Constance Carr, Weymouth, on Wednesday afternoon when a Curio Exhibit and afternoon tea were held for the maintenance benefit of the new Community Library at Weymouth North. The exhibit was held in the same room of the Carr residence where the first Weymouth Library began seven years ago which culminated in the present library now housed in an attractively renovated building, formerly the post office.

Miss Carr, as hostess, was busily engaged in receiving and entertaining her guests. Miss M. E. Morris, attired in a grey striped taffeta of the late 1800's design, floor-length with flowing ruffled skirt trimmed with silver lace and fashioned with leg of mutton sleeves, was engaged in assisting Miss Carr with her duties and in explaining the curios to curious visitors.

Highlight of the curios, most of which came from Weymouth residents, without a doubt, was the crusader helmet dating back to not later than the 15th century. The helmet still containing the original lining is the property of Stan Hallett and it was evident that visitors doubted whether there was another in Canada like it.

Another fascinating curio was the horse shoe, authentic from "Black Devil", a horse which went to the Boer War. The shoe is owned by an uncle of Mrs. Jeffrey Journey. The story is that Mrs. Charlie Burill got the shoe in Halifax before the horse sailed for the field of battle, decorated it and kept it for a keepsake. It remains to this day.

Still another interesting relic was a goblet made from pieces of the "Shannon" and "Chesapeake" of 1813.

Among the curios were an Indian beaded purse; a covered container of West Indian dried berries; African fans; Old Dutch coffee mill; a Buddha from Burma, made of teak wood; Dutch jewel box; Mexican water bottle with a glass device in the centre to contain ice; articles from the land of the Eskimo, such as the mukluk, fish hooks and ear drums; embroidery work of the Cree Indians; Japanese combs and pins; a knocker from an ancient European castle; old English knife box.

Two wooden dolls of the early 1800's still in their original dresses adorned one of the shelves.

An old water jug containing the imprint "G. D. Campbell, Weymouth Bridge", revealed the approximate date of its manufacture.

A dinner bell curio was a copy of the original Queen Elizabeth dinner bell, the feet of the figure making the clappers of the bell.

A telescope was accompanied by a picture of a woman looking through it and dated 1798.

An iron, more than a hundred years old, had an attachment to contain oil for heating it. A Toddy spoon dated to 1780.

A Bible history, with exquisite etchings, dated to 1826, and school books were of the 1865 vintage.

A pair of tongs to cut loaf sugar was given the date of late 1700's or early 1800's.

Carved walrus tufts made an excellent cribbage board. An iron brew or pop bottle, which had a marble in the neck to prevent fizzing in the glass, was on display. There were opium pipes, boomerangs, shoemaker's last, egg decapitator, abalone shell napkin ring, loofa sponge, daintily patterned dessert molds, Dolphin glass candle sticks, old English hand fire screens to protect the face from open fire, iron string holder, axe-like tool for caulking vessels, petrified fish, pewter and brass beer mugs, carved ivory fan.

Shell art was on display, as well as a few of the Maude Lewis paintings.

Boats Collide At Tiverton

A herring carrier "Delex" and a ferry boat with scow collided in dense fog and heavyrunning tide in Petite Passage.

Hope Takes Nova Scotia Amateur Golf Title

The 10th Annual Nova Scotia Amateur Golf championship got under way at The Pines golf course, Digby, on Friday, July 15th, with an impressive lineup of talent. Par proved unbeatable to the field of 98 competitors who teed off beneath sunny skies and almost perfect golfing conditions.

Halifax Ashburn's Charlie Brace, 1956 Amateur champion, and Larry Marsh, of Greenwood, led the pack on the first round of play and came closest to equalling or bettering the par of 71 (35-36) over the challenging 61-60 yard layout. Each carded a one over par 72 for the first 18 of the 72 hole medal play.

Former two time champion Peter Hope, of Dartmouth Brightwood, and veteran H. E. Casey Power, of Truro, were next in line, one stroke behind the co-leaders with 73's.

Defending champion Jackie Bryant, of Ashburn, came in with a 79, while Don Fleet, of Digby, the host club, who was Amateur champion in 1961, when it was played here, finished the first 18 with a 78.

In the remaining 54 holes the steady playing Peter Hope beat off all challenges to card a 73, 75, 75, and 76 - 299 total. Peter Locke, Brightwood was runner-up with 77, 76, 75, 76 - 304. Don Fleet, Digby, 78, 75, 79, 71 - 306 tied with the Marsh, Greenwood, 72, 75, 82, 77 - 306. Charlie Brace, who led the first round on Friday, finished with a 72, 74, 79, 83 - 308 and tied with H. E. Power, Truro, 73, 74, 78, 83 - 308.

Digby players who survived the cut-off after 54 holes were D. Fleet, J. Turnbull, R. Johnson, J. Perron, R. McCleave, H. Webber, L. Dugas. The cut-off was the top 20 and ties. Forty players of the 98, registered, survived the cut-off.

This marks the third time that Hope has won the Amateur title. The previous wins for Hope were in 1960 and 1962. He was runner-up in 1956, 1957, 1959 and 1961. He trailed co-leaders Charlie Brace of Halifax and Larry Marsh, Greenwood, by one stroke after the first round Friday. Hope was two strokes off Brace's pace setting total after the second round which was played Saturday. In the third round Sunday morning, Hope took over the lead with a four stroke margin over Brace and Powers of Truro. He increased his margin by one stroke in the championship round Sunday afternoon.

None of the players, restricted to a 10 handicap or less, was able to equal or better par of 71 over the 6140 yards during the four rounds. Brisk wind on Saturday and Sunday afternoons may have accounted for some of the high scores.

Two Greenwood entries, Peter Ste Marie and Barry Babcock, survived the cut-off but did not go out for the championship round. The cut-off score was 238.

Other prize winners besides Hope were as follows: Second low gross - P. Locke, Brightwood; 3rd low gross - D. Fleet, Digby; 1st low net - R. Gravelle, Brightwood; L. Marsh, Greenwood; H. Moreash, Ashburn.

The Ashburn foursome of Brace, Bryant, Bryson Crowell and Eddie Moreash won the team prize for 72 holes, while the Greenwood quartette of Marsh, Ste. Marie, Babcock and L. Marsh captured the team prize for 54 holes.

Peter Hope also won automatic selection to the Nova Scotia Willingdon Cup team which will compete in the Canadian Inter-provincial team matches at Summerville in Montreal next month; also the Halifax Herald Ltd. Rose Bowl trophy.

Peter Hope is married to Rosmond Sabine, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Sabine, Bear River.

Order Study Municipal Boundaries

The Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities for the Province of Nova Scotia has given order that a study be made of the number and boundaries of the polling districts in the Municipality of the District of Digby not later than August 30, 1966. The study will also consider the fairness and reasonableness of the number of councillors to be elected by giving consideration to population density.

Application by the council of the municipality to the Board is to be made not later than September 30 for approval of changes in the number and boundaries of polling districts and the number of councillors to be elected from each polling district.

A hearing was held at the Court House in Digby on July 20, 1965 when evidence was given by the clerk of the municipality and by Councillor M. P. Gott in an application for an order approving the number and boundaries of the polling districts and the number of Councillors elected.

The Board reserved its decision in the matter and subsequently on June 21st, 1966 refused to confirm the number and boundaries of the polling districts and the fairness and reasonableness of the number of councillors presently elected from each polling district.

In the month of June, at the General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, Houghton, New York, delegates representing 57,000 members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church voted unanimously to merge with the Reformed Baptist Alliance.

At Beulah Camp, previous to the vote on merger, the Alliance Superintendent, Rev. H. R. Ingersoll, Saint John was re-elected for a two year term, the strongest vote in the history of the Alliance. Mr. Ingersoll has served in this office for the past six years.

day widows are allowed to remarry. Previously, she said, widows had to give up all social enjoyment, they could wear no ornaments or coloured saris and could only eat once a day. They could not remarry and were segregated from social entertainments and festivals.

In her remarks on Hindu philosophy, Miss Majumder stated that Hindu philosophical thought is essentially practical. It teaches methods of permanently overcoming all sorts of pain in this world and attaining a state of perfect happiness. Because of this practical outlook, she said, philosophical teachings and doctrines have permeated every phase of the Hindu's life. Whatever the Hindu does, she said, is sought to be regulated on a philosophical basis.

Hindu philosophy emphasises introspective knowledge of the mind, Miss Majumder stated. It has been observed that certain conditions favor the growth of introspective power in an individual, she said, and certain other conditions retard this. Food, environment, habits of life all have their peculiar influence on the introspective faculty of the mind, Miss Majumder said, and these are taken into account in the regulations governing the eating and living habits of the Indian.

Miss Majumder said that the religion of the Hindu is an offshoot of his philosophy and really consists of practices in conformity with the philosophical doctrines suited to different social and intellectual strata.

It is believed, Miss Majumder said, that actions, good or evil, in the present life will have their consequences in the next for the person who performs them. The belief, she said, is that there is a transmigration of souls through a cycle of reincarnations.

Miss Majumder joined the staff of the Digby Community Mental Health Centre in June, 1964, coming to Digby from Calcutta, India. She received her B.Sc. from the University of Calcutta in 1946 and her M.Sc. in 1948. Prior to coming to Digby she was a research worker with the Indian Council of Medical Research and also served as school psychologist in a high school for boys

The 3,000 books now in the library are classified as fiction, humor, non-fiction, travel, biography, religion, gardening, mystery, etc.

One room is reserved for some 800 children's books for under 14 years and over 14 years, and consisting of reference, mystery, girls' stories, boys' stories, classics, nature, easy readers, travel and bedtime. An interesting feature of the children's room is a mural painted by Mrs. Kenneth Connell. Mr. Connell was also responsible for making many of the book shelves with lumber and nails having been otherwise donated.

A special room has been designated for a reading room. In it are reference books, short stories, poetry, classics, atlases, maps, dictionary.

Most of the books have been donated. Among them was one on The Scallop (studies of a shell and its influence on humankind) by eight authors, edited by Ian Cox, CBE, M.A. This book, along with others, was donated by E. Weyhe, Acaciaville, and tells of the Escallop shells occurring in armorial bearings of the 13th century. A scallop dish mentioned was Scallop's la Nantaise.

The library is located upstairs in the former Salvation Army Citadel, on the main street. Redecorating has been done, old photographs, moth collections and paintings adorn the walls and shelves and add an extra note of interest.

Shortliffe Heads Polling District Boundaries

Hubert Shortliffe, municipal councillor from the Plympton district of Digby municipality will head a special committee to study polling district boundaries within the municipality.

Other members include Councillors Aubrey Forrest, of Culloden; Marion Gott, of Smith's Cove; Walter Wood, of Marshalltown and Municipal Warden Ronald Morehouse of the district of Sandy Cove.

The municipality of Digby is divided into 12 polling districts, each of which elects one councillor to the Municipal Council. Three of the districts have over 700 voters, four have less than 300 voters and one has only 170. Voters population of the other districts ranges from 25 to 589. As reported last week the Digby Municipal Council made application last year to the Board of Public Utilities to have the present number and boundaries, and council representations of polling districts in the municipality, confirmed.

In a decision rendered in June the Board refused to confirm the present situation and directed that a study be made of the number and boundaries of the polling districts in the municipality and the fairness and reasonableness of the number of councillors to be elected, by giving consideration to population density.

It was further ordered by the Board that the Digby Municipal Council make application not later than September 30 to the Board, for approval of change in the number of councillors to be elected from each polling district.

The special committee was then set up.

About This And That

Ordinary Object Can Save A Life

Summer is the time of swimming and boating. This is the time when children wander away on the beach and often get into dangerous tides. The water is fascinating and such happenings as experienced by Peter Dickie last week occasionally arise. Fortunately, Peter was able to see the small girl in the water and the water was probably not too deep making a rescue not so difficult.

Presence of mind prompted Peter to go into the shallow water.

Peter's experience makes us realize that often a rescue can be accomplished by those of us who are non-swimmers and for those who are in danger in deeper waters if we just have presence of mind to use ordinary objects at our disposal. A few of these ordinary things are mentioned in an article by Sue M. Gerard in Family Safety and distributed in a condensed form by the Nova Scotia Accident Prevention Association.

Here are some of her suggestions:
Consider the spare tire. Roll it into the water, and, even with the heavy steel wheel in the center, it will rise to the surface and float. The drowning swimmer - or swimmers - can hang onto it. If everyone keeps his shoulders under water, the tire will support six or seven persons.

If you have a gallon-size Thermos jug, empty it, replace the lids, then toss the jug to a tired swimmer; or swim out with it yourself and let the swimmer hold on while he gets his breath. It will actually buoy him up a bit, and he may be able to paddle his way to safety. Or you can tow him by pulling the jug.

Any large container with a tight-fitting lid makes a good float. A foam-plastic picnic basket is extremely buoyant. Other floatable and potentially lifesaving objects found around most pools and beaches include air mattresses, foam-rubber chaise pads, beach balls, even wooden tables and benches - and, of course, life jackets, inflated toy floats and inner tubes. Even non-swimmers can push these to victims who are not far from shore.

If none of these objects is available and a swimmer is in trouble near shore or dock, you may be able to save the victim by stretching your hand out to him. But lie flat on the dock to keep from being pulled into the water yourself. You can extend your reach by using a broom, an oar, a towel, a pole or an article of clothing. If you wade in, stand with feet apart so you won't be pulled off-balance. Even if you swim out to the drowning person, take a stick or towel or some other object so the victim will clutch it, not you.

Prevent Forest Fires

This is the time of the year when special care must be taken to prevent forest fires. There has been little rain for the past few weeks. While the beautiful weather is a delight to tourists and to ourselves, including the children, sending us to camping and fishing or other sports in wooded areas, it causes a dangerous period for forest fires. Extra care must be taken to prevent destruction of our forests. The surest way of preventing forest fires is to not use fire in the forests in dry weather and when necessary to use fire, make sure it is used in a safe way in a safe place.

Forest fires started by children increased from 37 and 34 in 1955 and 1956 respectively, to 111 and 108 in 1963 and 1964. Parents should make every effort to keep matches away from children and teach them of the dangers of fire.

Fires started by smokers, travellers, campers and fishermen are generally the result of carelessness, thoughtlessness and ignorance in the use of fire. Burning cigarette butts dropped in dry grass, brush or litter do frequently start fires. Although it is a finable offense, many motorists toss lighted butts from cars and trucks. Blown into dry grass or litter by wind from passing vehicles, these do occasionally start fires.

Using figures from the year 1964 in all Canada 24 per cent of forest fires were caused by lightning, 17 per cent by smokers, 13 per cent by camp fires, 13 per cent by railways, etc. While fires started by lightning might be caused by what is often termed "an act of God", the next highest percentage certainly must be considered man's own carelessness. So it is with the next 13 per cent by campers - either carelessness, thoughtlessness or ignorance.

Unless actually engaged in using the forests for a living, few people stop to consider the financial loss when acres of grown timber are lost by fire. Value of merchantable timber lost by fire in Canada in 1964 was \$4,715,002. Add to this the young growth lost by fire and the figure runs to nearly six million. Then, consider that the cost to fight forest fires in 1964 exceeded four million dollars and our figure comes high to eleven million.

Every man, woman and child needs the forests for subsistence either through direct employment or indirectly. It is important that we use every caution to save the forests from the ravishes of fire. In so doing we protect industry, we protect our water supply and we protect the homes of the animals which reside in the forests.

It is important that we use care and not destroy a livelihood by fire.

Charm From Sweden

Her sweet and gentle charm made all who met her really come to love her. Certainly the Lions Club of Sweden can be proud of the girl whom they chose to send to Nova Scotia in the person of Miss Ulla Eriksson.

Ulla's unpretentious and non precocious manner, her neat appearance, her gracious poise, her pleasant face with a beautiful, captivating smile and a charming personality added up to a girl you long remember. We were sorry that more young people in Digby could not have met Ulla on her visit here Friday. True, we are proud of our Digby girls but much could have been obtained by an exchange acquaint-

tance with Ulla. We hope she might return and that Sweden might send more of Ulla's kind to Nova Scotia.
Congratulations to the Lions, here and there, in such a noble project.

Parades

Digby set the pattern for parades in Digby County this year, we believe. Certainly, Digby's parade had improved 80 percent over the quality of the last few years. While Weymouth and Bear River have been credited for a number of years with much superior parades to that of Digby, these villages saw a vast improvement in their 1966 parades. We feel the co-operation between the town and the villages has accounted for the improvement.

While we are on the subject, congratulations to Brinton Bros. on receiving first prize for the best decorated car in the Cherry Carnival parade. Brinton Bros. have been especially civic minded by entering a number in each of the parades for a number of years. They deserve both a prize and special mention.

The whole Cherry Carnival was a success, with the Square Dance adding greatly to the enjoyment.

Centennial Suggestions

The following centennial suggestions were made to us during the past week. We give them for what they are worth and in no order of importance -

1. Plant birch trees on Birch St., Digby, to restore the reason for its name if that was the reason it was called Birch St. Or, was there a family by the name of Birch?

2. Develop Beaman's Mountain for a ski trail and possibly it would be an incentive for The Pines to stay open all winter.

3. Get rid of all car body graveyards, even the "one body" on some of the byways, in Digby County by an Old Car Demolition Jamboree. We might take a lesson from Sweden in general appearance as stated by Dr. G. W. L. Creighton on his return from that country "No waste paper, no old car bodies, no dumps or burrow pits". (Just what Nova Scotia ought to be).

4. Bear River to plant more cherry trees. Cherries had to be imported for the Carnival on Saturday and were quickly bought up at that. We understand a move has been made to bring back the cherries to Bear River with one man planting or grafting 500 trees.

5. Present the mayor in 1967 with a chain-of-office. (How about recognition, too, for town councillors and municipal wardens and councillors. Their work is done free of charge).

DIGBY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Digby Urban Schools will re-open on Tuesday, September 6th, 1966, when all pupils of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full school day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 p.m. Student lunches will be served at the Regional High School cafeteria on September 6th.

Pupils registering with the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to August 31st. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1st will not be registered at any time during the school year, 1966-67. The Superintendent's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Wednesday, August 17th, to Friday, August 19th, between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 4:30 p.m.

Students from the Islands and Weymouth seeking admission to the Grade XII Commercial class must have applications approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Digby, N. S. Immediate application will expedite approval.

For admission to the Academic section of Grade XII a provincial pass of Grade XI or a local pass from the Digby Regional High School will be required. Students seeking admission to Grade XII Commerce must have one full year's attendance at the Grade XI level and have application approved by the school administration before registration in the department may be completed.

Regional School students required to write supplementary examinations will report on August 15th at 9:00 a.m. These exams will be written in the cafeteria and NO OPPORTUNITY WILL BE GIVEN TO WRITE SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMS ON ANY OTHER DATE.

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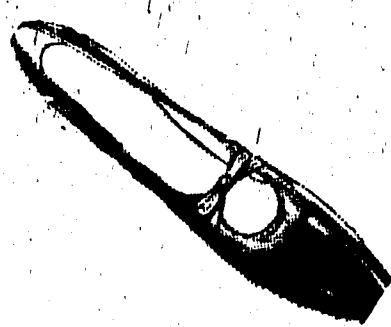
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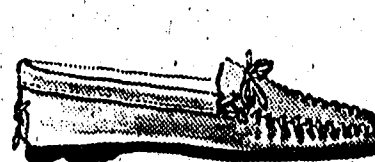
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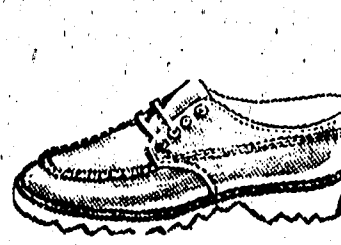


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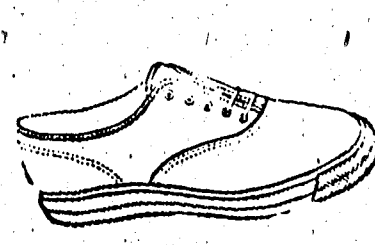
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Describes Trip To Far East

Also Passports obtained from Ottawa which are essential for admission to various countries. Also essential to negotiate Travelers cheques.)

Random Recollections

Left Digby Friday a.m., January 7th by auto for Halifax. Showing the evening before and rather heavy going at first - cleared somewhat further up the Valley and arrived at Halifax Hotel late p.m. to be advised the Italian liner Christopher Colombo, for which we had passage reserved to New York and expected in Halifax on Saturday, January 8th, would be delayed until Sunday, January 9th owing to severe storms on trans Atlantic voyage.

Raging blizzard Sunday a.m., January 9th but received confirmation of 11 a.m. boarding hour which we managed in spite of transportation difficulties.

In spite of previous experience and intention to make purchases on trip our several pieces of baggage already filled to overflowing, we got aboard.

The Colombo is a new and luxurious liner. As the ship was scheduled for a Caribbean cruise upon arrival in New York, departure from Halifax was accelerated and we left Halifax about 3:30 p.m. Snap cold weather and clear. Maximum speed enabled us to dock at New York about 8 p.m., Monday, Jan. 10th. The illuminated New York skyline, including the Statue of Liberty was most impressive as usual.

Disembarking was our first experience with officialdom - preferential treatment to U.S. citizens was the order of the day and when they cleared immigration, the lesser hoi polloi of other nationalities (allens) formed a snake line passing from one official to another in separate lobbies where passports and health documents were examined, stamped, dated, signed by one batch of officials after another. The fact that we were only in the USA in transit somewhat shortened our interrogations. By this time it was 11 p.m. The next item of business was customs and by this time our baggage had been unloaded from the ship to the dock. The baggage is placed in groups under the first letter of the owner's surname. We located our baggage in the appropriate section but one case was missing - moral: travel light - while one of us stood guard over retrieved luggage the other wandered up and down a half mile of dock looking for the missing case which was finally located under a different letter and promptly dragged to rejoin its companions and

a customs examiner quickly summoned who made a cursory examination of one bag and since in transit only routinely passed the remaining baggage without inspection.

It so happened that the transportation strike was in full swing, taxis were scarce as hen's teeth and far more expensive. One was obtained to carry 5 passengers and our multitude of luggage to the hotel at a cost of \$15.00 - about ten times the usual charge. Upon arrival at the hotel where reservations had been made and confirmed and altered by wire re delayed arrival, we were greeted with the announcement that only two rooms were available instead of three, my room having been guaranteed by my brother-in-law a New York resident. After much palaver a third room was provided. Hotel accommodation being at a premium due to the strike, many suburbanites living in the hotels to overcome transportation problems. Shortly after registration was complete and while waiting for the one bell hop to struggle with the mountain of baggage and sensing our precarious situation, one gentleman offered to let us have rooms free of charge which had been reserved for a convention cancelled on account of the strike. The strike situation worsened - one either walked or stayed put. Our ship, scheduled to sail January 11th, was on account of the strike delayed in loading and departure accordingly delayed until 6 p.m. Friday, January 14th. Some relief!

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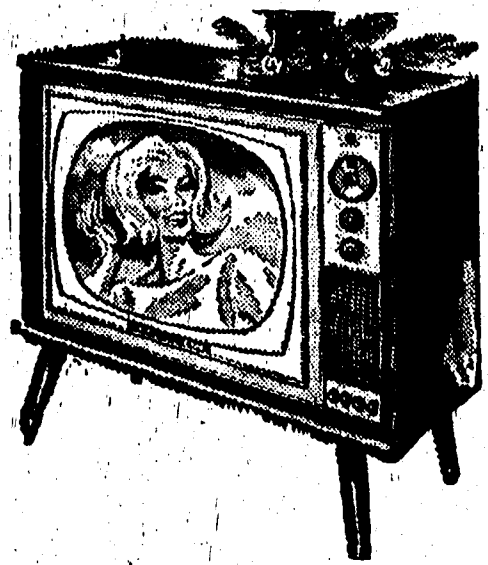
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Seiners To Operate One Mile from Weirs

Fisheries Minister Robichaud has signed a recommendation to the governor-in-council changing regulations governing the herring fishery in the Bay of Fundy.

The changes will result in an earlier closing date for the season on the New Brunswick side, and an increase in the distance seiners must keep away from net weirs.

He told the Commons of the changes following questions from J. Pat Nowlan (P.C. Digby-Annapolis-Kings).

The season in the district running from Grand Manan Island up the New Brunswick mainland will close under the new regulation Sept. 30 instead of the originally scheduled Nov. 15. The season opened April 15.

The new regulation applying to the Nova Scotia side of the Bay of Fundy will require herring seiners to operate at least a mile away from net weirs instead of the 2,000 feet now applying.

Fisheries Minister Robichaud said that both regulation changes followed "full discussion" with the governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

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About This And That

Abandoned Farms

With the visit this week of agriculturists from Oshawa, just having concluded Farm Safety Week, having read an article in the Boston Globe on Yarmouth - Digby Strawberry shipments, we are farm conscious at the moment. And, so, we were concerned about some remarks made in our office by a resident of nearby Digby.

The resident happened to be a census taker. In two miles of census taking around the Hill Grove area, four farm homes were vacant. In the twenty-five years that this particular person had been taking census, farms in the district had decreased from 50 or 60 to 31 five years ago and to 18 this present year.

Of course, knowing that co-operative farming or larger farms are more profitable than the small farm business, we suggested this method of farming might have been used and might be the cause of the decrease in number. Our visitor did not think so and felt the reason was that farming was not made inviting enough or profitable enough to attract the young people.

Considering the visitor's remark we were pleased to look to the Jamerson small fruit and vegetable project and see it as a challenge to young people and as a boost to the whole farming industry here as the project goes through several stages of experimentation. Then there is also the experimental projects at Hill Grove. Much knowledge is available through these government sponsored projects. We sincerely hope that farmers are availing themselves of any knowledge obtainable and profit by an open-mindedness on the subject. City dwellers could learn a lot about farming and grow to appreciate the farmer's lot. We hear much about vacationing on farms for this purpose. Although the old and tried methods have proven well, time conditions change and farmers, too, we believe, can learn something from the more modern and progressive methods of farming. In time, our young people might return to the farm. At any rate, it looks as if Digby is on the way to a "perk up".

Digby Berries Publicized In Boston

Digby and Yarmouth strawberries got a little publicity through the Dorothy Crandall column in The Boston Globe on Thursday. Dorothy Crandall the Globe Food Editor had this to say in part -

This July Nova Scotia strawberries (packed in pint boxes is another first) are being flown by Air Canada Vanguard from Yarmouth to Boston. The trip takes 45 minutes making it only 24 hours from the Yarmouth-Digby strawberry fields to Boston fruit markets. NS strawberry shipments of about 15 thousand pints per trip will continue all season, well into August.

Every berry in Boston would be a delightful addition to this Summer's teen-invented drink, the Sambree. "It's a go-go" takes the sizzle out of summer," one had explained. "Tall glasses, lemon (or other fruit) sherbet, chilled orange juice and berries underneath in the middle, with more on top is the easy recipe."

Trip To Far East

(Continued from last week)

PACIFIC HOLIDAY - 1966

(By E. J. Theriault)

Our journey from New York to Charleston, South Carolina was uneventful, getting used to ship routine breakfast at 7:30; lunch 11:30; dinner 5 p.m., retire 9:30 or 10. Weather cool. Snow in the sunny South at Charleston where we arrived Sunday a.m. This city has nothing of particular interest. In the evening saw "Sound of Music" - very good. Like Digby, taxis are always available except when you want them. After the show it took us about an hour to flag one down and like Digby they were all more interested in transporting service personnel. We finally got one driver to radio his headquarters with the result that in due course at a late hour we were deposited safely aboard ship, which by this time was like a second home. Departure from Charleston 11:30 a.m. Monday January 17th.

Next leg of our journey was to Cristobal the Atlantic terminus of the Panama Canal. From this time on the weather warmed up gradually. Wonderful evenings on deck observing star-studded sky and on the 19th observed illuminated satellite travelling at a very high rate of speed West to East.

January 21st arrived Cristobal 4:30 p.m. Ship refueled at dockside taking in excess of 26,000 bbls viscous oil, thick as molasses and requires pre-heating. Daily consumption about 500 bbls per day. Oil is from nearby Venezuela. Quantity taken when supplemented by small quantity in Japan is adequate to return to Cristobal where further re-fueling takes place for New York and next trip. Re-fueling takes 12 hrs. or so and by morning we were ready for the Canal transit. Incidentally, a few remarks about the Pioneer Class ships may be apropos: Length approximately 700 ft; maximum speed 21 knots per hr. (1 knot equals 1 nautical mile or 6080 feet); crew about 40 men with usual officers. Except in the vicinity of ports automatic pilot steers ship. Supply of fresh water taken on at New York and from time to time supplemented on the high seas by a desalination and distillation plant. The result is a tasteless soft water which is refrigerated and consumed in large quantities for beverage, washing and flushing decks, etc. As is the custom on U.S. ships and required by Union regulations, the food served to officers and passengers is identical to that supplied the crew. It is considered dangerous for health reasons for North Americans to consume fruits and vegetables grown with organic soil fertilizer in contrast to commercial soil fertilizer - natives having developed a natural immunity. However, only fruits and vegetables with an outer shell, ie bananas, etc., are purchased in any case. The chief exercise for passengers is a brisk walk on the upper deck, climbing the stairs to dining room and pushing away from dining table. No evidence of under-nourishment. All food supplies for round trip taken on at New York. No local supplies taken on for same reason as water - to avoid contamination. Enforcement officials of the Lord's Day Alliance Act would have a bromorrhage at the lack of observance of the Sabbath in the various centers visited so far. Stores and most other establishments are open for business. It is just another day. Loading and discharge of cargo is on a continuous basis, round the clock. This feature is highly mechanized and efficient except in Hong Kong and Formosa where labour is cheap and plentiful. In the former, women act as stevedores along with the men and are quite expert also. On construction projects it is not unusual

to see women mixing concrete and pushing wheel barrows full of aggregate - sometimes with a papoose on their back. The Canal, or Big Ditch as more familiarly called, is of course an engineering marvel. All told, about 50 miles in length, including anchorage areas, locks, etc. Both the Atlantic and Pacific termini are protected by concrete sea walls or breakwaters with an opening capable of permitting passage of at least two ships simultaneously. The number, size and nationality of ships using the Canal on any given day is incredible and a pilot is of course compulsory as in some spots the Canal is so narrow that only one ship can pass at a time. The crossing takes about 12 hours. The heat is intense, even in January in the 90's. Vegetation and foliage is tropical. Due to the course of the Canal the Pacific exit is further East than the Atlantic exit. We emerged from the Canal about 5:30 p.m. passing under a huge bridge which by optical illusion appears too low to permit clearance by ships' masts, etc. By the way, steel for bridge was manufactured in Germany and assembled on site with remarkable precision, no part thereof being more than a small fraction of an inch. Course then set on great circle for Hawaii, some 4,740 miles away, or ten days continuous sailing. The ship parallels the West Coast of Mexico for about 4 days with very hot weather in the upper 80's. From Canal to Hawaii all water everywhere - one or two ships, a couple of whales, schools of porpoises and flying fish - nothing else until arrival at Honolulu January 31st, early dawn.

We were warned earlier in the trip to lock stateroom doors and bolt portholes while in port due to thievery. For example: following lunch I brought writing materials to passenger lounge and stepped outside on deck 25 ft. away - on return an instant later the ball point pen magically disappeared. Ordinarily on high seas doors and port holes remain open for cross-ventilation. Also observe ash trays have disappeared from lounge.

Honolulu on Oahu Island is a beautiful city. Rose earlier than usual to observe at sunrise the imposing skyline and background mountains. Our visit or stopover of 2 days, Jan. 31st and Feb. 1st, afforded us the opportunity of visiting famous Waikiki Beach (you hear about it, surf and Hawaiian music on radio). Water is quite warm - went bathing. Plush hotels and tourist shoppers' paradise.

Hawaii is one of the United States and although the people are of various nationalities, Polynesian - Negro - Chinese, and rapidly diminishing native Hawaiians, they are generally pleasant, attractive and smart looking - especially the younger fry. Thoroughly americanized even to shopping centers. Saw the International Market where, as the name implies, are located shops styles according to the country whose merchandise is for sale there. In another must is the Kodak Show (free) where on bleachers under a blazing sun we witnessed a 3 hour show of Hawaiian dancers, singers, etc. Very colorful for movies when taken in conjunction with tamarans and their pictures.

AWAY FROM THE SEA BUT

ABANDONED URANIUM MINE PLAYS A ROLE IN ANTI-SUBMARINE WARFARE

LONDON, Ontario—An abandoned uranium mine 1,900 miles from the nearest ocean is being used by a television manufacturer to test anti-submarine warfare devices.

Strange?

"Not really," says Nigel C. Eiloart, President of Spartan of Canada Ltd., manufacturer of television sets and stereo phonographs. The company's defence division is using the site to test sonobuoys, which are devices used by the Canadian Government for submarine detection.

The abandoned mine is located west of Bancroft in Hastings County, Ontario.

The land locked mine offers the advantages for testing purposes which could only be found several hundred miles out into the ocean beyond the Continental Shelf, Mr. Eiloart explained.

Sonobuoys, produced by Spartan, are dropped from an aircraft into the ocean where they detect underwater sounds and transmit them to the dispensing aircraft or other suitable radio receiving stations.

They are a challenge to the designer since they must operate perfectly in three environments: in flight, at the ocean interface and into the depths of the sea.



This Spartan engineer is working in the shaft of a 1,600 foot abandoned uranium mine which serves as an underground test site for submarine warfare devices.

Because of the expendable nature of the equipment, production costs must be held to a minimum. Yet its performance and effects of vibration, shock and changes in atmospheric conditions are equal to that of some of the most sophisticated electronic equipment.

Thus, several factors are needed for testing purposes. Among them are a site which has height from which to drop a sonobuoy; deep water for sound measurements; and an area for recovery of test units.

Mr. Eiloart stated that the uranium mine has these features including an 80 foot shaft for drops and 1,600 feet of water for sound measurements.

The mine was abandoned when the uranium lode was depleted. The mine was sealed in 1960 and sold to a salvage company in 1961. At its peak, the mine was a major producer with a payroll of approximately 400 persons. The elevator has long been inoperative, so Spartan engineers use a series of ladders to get from the top of the shaft down to the water level.

Spartan engineers are sure of one thing when testing, Mr. Eiloart said. They have good working units for there is no recovery if one sinks in the 1,600 foot depth.

And then, the coffee table began bearing gifts. The pile kept growing. I sank into a chair, reduced to a blubbing pulp. The only thought in my mind was to try to remember why the idea of a baby shower had never occurred to me. Nobody had ever given me a baby shower before.

The little one, babbling excitedly helped with the opening. When all the presents were piled on the hi-fi, the big one bolted through the house in his wet bathing suit. His feet came to a screaming halt on the hardwood floor when he saw the heap of blankets, diapers, silver spoons, crib sheets, sweater sets, nightgowns and rompers.

"Mom!" he said, in the voice of one who has been double crossed. "You said I would have my birthday before the baby had his!"

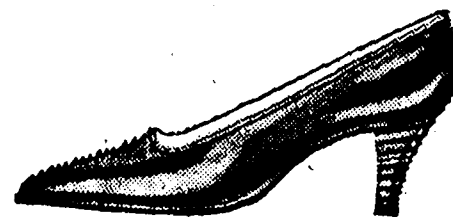

DIGBY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Digby Urban Schools will re-open on Tuesday, September 6th, 1966, when all pupils of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full school day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 p.m. Student lunches will be served at the Regional High School cafeteria on September 6th.

Pupils registering with the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to August 31st. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1st will not be registered at any time during the school year, 1966-67. The Superintendent's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Wednesday, August 17th, to Friday, August 19th, between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 4:30 p.m.

Students from the Islands and Weymouth seeking admission to the Grade XII Commercial class must have applications approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Digby, N. S. Immediate application will expedite approval.

For admission to the Academic section of Grade XII a provincial pass of Grade XI or a local pass from the Digby Regional High School will be required. Students seeking admission to Grade XII Commerce must have one full year's attendance at the Grade XI level and have application approved by the school administration before registration in the department may be completed.

NOTE WELL:

Regional School students required to write supplementary examinations will report on August 15th at 9:00 a.m. These exams will be written in the cafeteria and NO OPPORTUNITY WILL BE GIVEN TO WRITE SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMS ON ANY OTHER DATE.

All prescribed texts for Grades IX to XII are available at a rental fee of five dollars, payable on the opening date of school. Students wishing to take advantage of the rental plan should come prepared to make this payment.

All pupils must comply with the regulations of the Department of Public Health regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia. Students entering Grade VII will be required to be re-vaccinated or present certificate showing vaccination done within the last three years.

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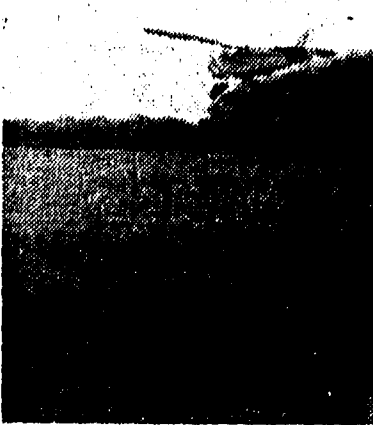

Flying Cloud At Newburyport

It also would rule out plans to use the Flying Cloud as an attraction for a restaurant in Boston, or one owned by Johnston in Philadelphia.

Costs of the voyage would be paid by American industrial concerns, labor unions and private individuals, Bortman said.

Use in the People to People Program would insure that the newly built Flying Cloud "has a life of usefulness, disseminating Yankee know-how and ingenuity."

"The 219 foot replica of Donald McKay's clipper ship, Flying Cloud, is drawing more people to Newburyport than any single event since the conflagration of 1934.

From Dresses To Paintings, They Do It All

The do-it-yourself philosophy has two of its strongest and most talented supporters in Judy Morehouse, 25, and Angela Reynolds, 26, of Montreal.

When they want a new dress, they make it, even down to designing the fabric. If the walls of their apartment look bare, up goes one of Miss Morehouse's paintings or a tapestry they have sewn. If the furniture is shabby, they paint it. If none of their jewellery matches an outfit, they make some more.

The results are so successful that their efforts aren't confined to their apartment. The Cinema Festival Theatre has decorated a lobby with their tapestries. Boutiques buy the jewellery. Galleries Jason Telf in Old Montreal recently showed their work.

The girls are childhood friends who joined forces last year. M. Morehouse, who studied painting and drawing at the Montreal Museum and the Boston Museum School of Fine Arts, passed on her interest in making things to Miss Reynolds, who describes herself as "Judy's assistant apprentice". Both girls also work in Montreal, when they need money to subsidize their artistic projects. Miss Morehouse's jobs have included working in a boutique, designing window displays and serving as a cloak room attendant in a discotheque.

Painting, by contrast, is not work, says Miss Morehouse, "because that's what I enjoy doing best". The bright modern oil paintings she does are only part of her "painting". She paints designs on the ceramics she makes. She covers piggy banks, papier mache figures and jewellery. Kleenex containers and furniture with brightly painted motifs.

She and Miss Reynolds work together in selecting the colors and shapes for their bracelets, earrings and rings, as well as designing and making clothes, and the paper flowers which decorate their apartment. Horses crop up most frequently in their designs, since Miss Morehouse loves to sketch at the stables where she rides.

Miss Morehouse is a strong believer in variety. If I just stuck to painting I'd probably have had more shows, but I prefer to do all the things I like, she said. However, she does hope to go to Europe to study painting in the fall.

MORE SUPPORT DIGBY TERMINAL

The letter stated that it was the opinion of the Bridgewater Town Council that the Margison report received due study and investigation before being submitted. Canoeists Face Two Tests This Month

Canada's centennial canoeists will paddle to Manhattan this month to toughen their skews.

The paddlers themselves come from a wide assortment of backgrounds including everything from guides and lumberjacks to lawyers and sales men.

One of the veterans is Watson Peck, 53, of Bear River, N. S., captain of the Nova Scotia entry. He has been a licensed guide for 25 years and competed in his first professional canoe race at La Tuque, Que., in 1939.

While there is no prize money for the winners this or next year the top teams receive the first centennial cup given for the races. Officials hope the events will be continued annually after the centennial year.

They may also give a little publicity to the centennial and Expo 67 although the centennial commission didn't mention this aspect Thursday as it announced details of two sets of "trials" this month.

The first will be held in British Columbia starting Saturday, from Fort St. James to Victoria. The other will begin Aug. 22 at Lachine, Que., and proceed to New York via the Expo 67 site. Each trip will cover about 1,000 miles.

Taking part will be nine paddlers six regulars and three spares from each of eight provinces and two territories. Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland are not participating mainly because of the costs involved and because they have few experienced canoeists.

The trials are called a preview of next year's centennial canoe pageant, a 100 day, 3,500 mile trek from Alberta to Montreal. The pageant will start at Rocky Mountain House in central Alberta and follow the old fur trade routes east to the St. Lawrence.

While the trials are mainly to publicize the centennial, they are also the final tests for the men and canoes before the centennial run.

The B. C. trials starting Saturday will go from Fort St. James, deep in the interior, to Prince George and then down the treacherous Fraser River to the coast.

The trek will be broken up into 11 laps and seven sprints, with the winners figured on an elapsed time basis combining the lap and sprint times.

The paddlers are to arrive in Victoria Aug. 15. Immediately afterward, they leave for Montreal for the eastern race, consisting of 13 laps and four sprints.

From the St. Lawrence, they will travel down the Richelieu River to Lake Champlain and then along the Hudson River to New York, arriving Aug. 29.

The teams are chosen by the provinces which provide part of the transportation and other costs while the federal government pays the rest.

The canoes, copies of the early voyageur craft, are 25 feet long and are specially adapted for running rapids.

Trip To Far East

By E. J. Theriault

(Continued from last week)

In the evening of February 1st we sailed for Pearl Harbour some five miles from Hawaii. Perfect weather and full moon. On arrival at H. Customs, Immigration, Passport and Health clearances routinely completed. Pearl Harbour debarkation was however another matter. The Dec. 6th, 1942, episode has left a lasting impression. For an alien to go ashore is just about as easy as to break out of Dorchester Penitentiary. Canadians are aliens. No one permitted to leave ship without landing permit — armed guard at gang plank. After considerable wire pulling we were finally conveyed in a naval vehicle to the P. O. and other places on the navy base and thereafter we travelled unescorted at will. Picture taking not permitted such a ban is bound to be difficult to enforce top side on a freighter. Constant naval air traffic, all varieties of planes, solo and formation and naval structure below and above ships of every description, surface of the battle ship

This was our first impression of the massive U.S. military effort in the Pacific area accelerated by the Viet Nam affair. In the early evening of February 3rd we sailed back to Honolulu. Sea Terminals — miles of docks and hundreds of ships loading, unloading, docking and departing. Surpasses the imagination. Following evening sailed for Manila after taking on cargo mostly destined for Korea, including small helicopters on dock and in hold. President Johnson arrived shortly after our departure.

An interesting short trip was taken to the Arizona War Memorial or Shrine. Free transportation provided by Navy Launch. This is a very modernistic building containing exhibits — bronze tablets listing the dead enlisted men killed by the sneak attack by the Japanese on Pearl Harbor. Arizona sunk by bombs from Jap planes. No effort has been made to attempt salvage or removal. The remains of some 1,560 men are on the ship — hence the memorial Chapel. All shipping passing the memorial are required to salute by horn and "Tap" are sounded every evening at flag lowering.

Distance between Honolulu and Manila is 4,783 miles of continuous sailing from Feb. 3rd to Feb. 14th, 10 days, we having lost a day in crossing the Int. date line. It was Sunday and the next day was Tuesday. The change over was smooth as after leaving Honolulu our clocks and watches were retarded one hour every alternate night. The weather got warmer day by day as we approached the Philippines.

Our first stop in the P. R. was at Subic Bay approximately 4 hours sailing time from Manila. It is like Pearl Harbour — a large naval base bustling with feverish activity, air and sea. The usual passport, health, customs routines took place before 7:30 breakfast. These officials remained on ship until arrival at Manila. Outside of armed guards no restrictions on landing. Cargo handling took up the 14th and 15th and in the forenoon the ship left for Manila, passing Fort Corregidor on the way and "Batan Peninsula. Hydrofoil tours to it can be arranged from Manila. On approaching Manila as per custom pilot came aboard with half the Philippine army and a horde of other officials whose main task seemed to be card playing. Also another inspection of passports, health and customs. The heat was overwhelming. Due to large scale pilferage on the docks no taxis are permitted inside the gate. The shipping companies hire special armed police. We were especially warned to close and lock port holes since local citizenry here devised collapsible wire gadgets to gather up room contents through port holes. In the blistering sun we wended our wearily perspiring and panting way to the customs for baggage clearance in this land of the free and dirty. Due to Capt. MacP's connections and savoir faire we were spared the ordeal of baggage inspection although we were there an hour.

Philippine Republic impressions: Heat, heat and more heat. Manila, February 15th

to 24th both inclusive. On Wednesday, February 16th, visited by taxi various places of interest in Manila plus a country tour to Lake Taal where located a volcano which erupted Sept. 1965 with a loss of 600 lives. A slight eruption occurred a few days following our trip. This took up the entire day. Good photo material. People in country desperately poor looking. Took a shot of a family of children by the roadside and on leaving gave them a few coins, a language which these children as in other countries we visited, readily understand. While fumbling in my pocket for coins I was surprised to find small hands already there willing and able to expedite the transfer. All in all an interesting but uncomfortable day. Hot taxi upholstery causes your clothing to stick to body at all points of contact. Adding to the discomfort was the beginning of the mosquito season. They were abundant after sundown. One of our party had over 100 bites. Smaller than our pests but mighty — very itchy and bothersome. Nothing seems to relieve the condition which is almost unbearable and sleep interrupting.

Philippine products are good and reasonably cheap. The better stores have armed uniformed special police at entrance. The clerks, all female, wear special uniforms and quickly spot tourists and on being spotted one clerk escorts you to various departments of interest and stays with you until you are broke. If you venture to return and have any money or luggage space left the same girl continues the shopping service and readily recognizes you. These particular clerks are English speaking.

The dominance of the U.S. dollar is extremely evident. On cashing American Express cheques it is virtually impossible to get your change in U.S. dollars as there is currency control. It is not too important, as you are going to spend your pesos in any event.

We had a marvellous view of Roxas Ave. and Manila Bay from our hotel room but alas, in the afternoon, air conditioning, totally inadequate to compete with the sun. Consequently shopping was simplified by resorting to morning shopping in air conditioned stores. Travellers cheques melted.

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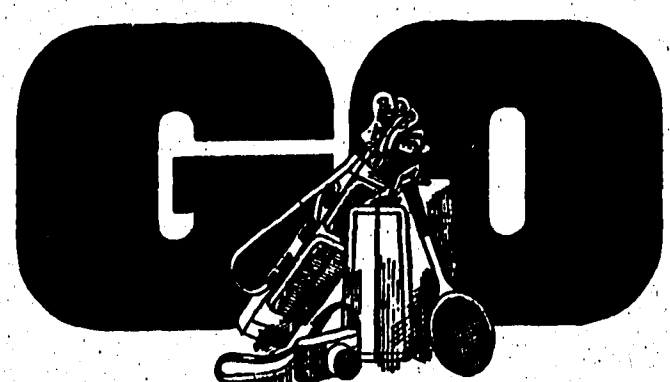

Future For Trawl Fishermen

Looks Grim

(Contributed)

For the second consecutive year trawl fishermen on the Nova Scotia side of the Bay of Fundy are finding that hake are not haunting their usual resorts.

Trawlers equipped with depth sounders have traversed normal hake fishing grounds both inshore and offshore for many miles but have found no signs of the fish. Hake, the most coveted, money-providing fish, are still absent.

Codfish, haddock and cusk seem to be the usual type of catch, and these are not too plentiful. Ready markets can be found. Because of the scarcity of the fish and the distance the men have to go to obtain them, fishermen say they are going in debt and cannot continue trawl fishing much longer. Several have quit, and several are handlining for pollock.

Old-timers speak of years when hake were scarce through June, July and August, but say that in September the hake would strike and last three or four weeks. Most fishermen say they have never seen anything like these last two seasons.

Where are the hake? Several fishermen feel the hake have changed their course and head for warmer waters. Hake are supposedly a warm-water fish and the weather these last two springs has been extraordinarily cool.

The majority blame the draggers for the scarcity of hake. They feel the drags have disturbed the ocean's bed to such an extent the hake can no longer find the environment they require and have gone elsewhere to seek a more natural habitat.

If the draggers are guilty, what does the future hold for the trawler who classes himself as the "little man" in comparison with the dragger?

Some predict that in a few years there will be no fish either inshore or offshore for the trawler, and if he is 40 or over he is not likely to be hired aboard a dragger because of his lack of experience. It is understood that a 50 or 52-year-old man is not eligible to own a dragger. Right now the future of the trawl fisherman in this area looks grim.

Digby County Shares Loss In Tammy's Death

The sympathy of the Courier editor and staff, and on behalf of the readers, goes out to Mrs. T. A. M. Kirk, Yarmouth, and her family in the death of Mr. Kirk. Tammy, as he was so popularly known, was not a friend to us only because of his newspaper association, but the name of Tammy, like that of the late Bannie (Davis), had long been a familiar household name with us. Tammy and Bannie were boyhood chums in Yarmouth of a late associate editor of the Courier. It was in this familiar reference that both their names had been used as well as in the mutual business of the three, that of printing and/or newspapers. In the loss of Mr. Kirk a personal friend was lost to us at the Courier.

Mr. Kirk, who had recently been managing editor of The Yarmouth Herald, had one year been president of the Nova Scotia Weekly Newspapers Association, had made many friends around the country in other fields besides the newspaper business. He was a teacher in public schools, a school inspector in Yarmouth and Digby municipalities and assistant director of vocational education. Mr. Kirk represented Digby in the federal government and became Parliamentary assistant to the Postmaster General.

In his native Yarmouth, he was active in many service and charitable organizations.

The loss of a man so versatile in his abilities will be felt in many quarters, and especially in Digby County where he worked and where Mrs. Kirk has relatives at Sandy Cove.

Air Strip Progress

We want to add to those of the Digby Board of Trade and business men our congratulations to the people responsible for the airstrip at Hill Grove. For years we sat in on the Digby Board of Trade meetings when the possibility of an airstrip was discussed, committees were formed and available lands considered. An airstrip was important then and it is no less so at present. The airstrip long looked for is now a reality and our congratulations are extended.

We visited the airstrip on Sunday afternoon and heard good reports on it from a flier who came in with one of the Saint John Air Services planes. That particular plane had taken four parties of three each into the air for \$3.00 a person. (We wouldn't dare give the free advertising if a competitive field were in existence.) We expect more would have taken advantage if the flights had been advertised.

Another plane landed on the strip on Sunday afternoon. This plane arrived from Greenwood, landed the passengers who were being entertained at supper by a Digby resident, and then took off for Greenwood before dark.

Visitors, we believe, are welcome at the strip though many have refrained from going there because of signs "no trespassing" and "danger, keep out". It is understandable why the signs had to be erected but we now understand that areas for visitors will be marked off and cars will be allowed on the field to a certain distance.

Wishes of success go to those embarked on our different and newest venture for the Digby area. If routing for its success will bring it, then the Hill Grove residents are doing their share to make it a successful venture. They are all for it and no blame to them. Who knows, strawberries might be shipped from the Hill Grove Air Strip one of these days.

Which reminds us to ask, is there anyone who has not seen the beauty as you descend the hill from Hill Grove towards Acaciaville? If so, you have missed something. Be-

sides the beauty, there is an air of prosperity as you view the farm lands. This is true especially for the government projects at Hill Grove and as seen looking towards the Neck. Be interested. Take a ride out there.

We Don't Like It

We note that Digby town has decreased in population from 2,308 to 2,249 in the years 1961 to 1966. The Municipality has decreased from 9,329 to 8,826. Two other Municipalities declined in population, one by 25, another by 330, while Digby had the greatest decrease, in Nova Scotia, viz. 503. We don't like it. We fear our people might be moving away to greener pastures.

Of the towns Pictou seemed to suffer the greatest loss, 389. Others in order were Middleton 211; Stewiacke 91. Digby 59; Mulgrave 37 and Bridgetown 14. All other towns increased in population.

Down Go The Bridges

All the bridges falling down, falling down, falling down. We hope neither Victoria nor Sissiboo is the next.

Not too many years ago the Granville Ferry bridge went into the Annapolis river with a near tragedy. Others have had similar fates. Recently within weeks two bridges went down in the Northern part of Nova Scotia around the Oxford area.

All these bridges have to be replaced. It is more sensible to replace them before they fall than after they fall. If we don't take care Victoria Bridge and the Sissiboo at Weymouth will come in for the same fate. They are the concern of all of us here in Digby County. Are we saying what we think about these bridges at the right time and in the right places?

Want To Buy? Want To Sell?

Of course, the first answer we would give to our question above would be to advertise in The Digby Courier. You can buy or sell anything through its columns once the advertisement is accepted.

That is not exactly what we are driving at, though. We are thinking of all the people in town who never lift a finger through a Board of Trade or other organization in order to make this a better town.

Want to sell your business? Then consider whether your town is growing, standing still or slipping? It might be to your advantage to be able to answer the question for the first part in the affirmative. A shrewd buyer will want to know. He will also ask you what the schools are like? the recreation? What's the transportation like? Other factors?

When you fail to get your asking price for a business then ask yourself "What did I do to help make my town a better town so that my business is worth more?"

Want more industry? What are you doing to help except to complain that there isn't much?

Headlong Rush Into Danger

(Halifax Mail-Star, July 25/66)

Even in the midst of summer fun, at the beach, in a swimming pool, or at a lake, tragedy can strike suddenly, radically changing the lives of those involved.

Eager to escape the heat, many young people dash across the beach and dive into the shallow surf, plunge into a pool full of people, or rush head first into an unknown lake.

And the result, according to the Canadian Paraplegic Association, is a life-time in a wheelchair.

Most diving accidents lead to a broken neck which involves partial or complete paralysis.

At the present time there are three partially paralyzed patients in Toronto General Hospital. They are the victims of diving mishaps.

So far this summer there have been no such accidents in Nova Scotia, but every year there are several and Halifax neurosurgeons do not expect this summer to be any exception.

"People run off the end of a diving board without any thought of what is beneath it," said Dr. William Stevenson, Halifax neurosurgeon.

"With immediate treatment, good first aid and traction, recovery without paralysis is possible," said Dr. Stevenson, although he said he knew of only one instance in which this had happened.

"Just as dangerous as diving into water which is too shallow is diving into a crowded pool. You can break your neck against another person," warned Dr. Harold Tucker, another neurosurgeon.

The tragic part of this type of accident is it nearly always involves a teenager or a young married person with a family.

"Naturally these accidents happen mostly to younger people," said Don Curren, director of the Nova Scotia branch of the Canadian Paraplegic Association.

"The only redeeming factor is the chances of rehabilitation with teenagers is greater in many cases than with older people. Teenagers have a great potential for adjustment," said Mr. Curren.

"They are more co-operative than young children and less hampered by ingrained traits than the aged," he said.

With recreation, and especially swimming facilities expanding, opportunities for diving mishaps have increased, journals of the Paraplegic Association report, and approximately one-third of 50 to 60 accidents during a summer involving broken necks and paralysis are related to diving.

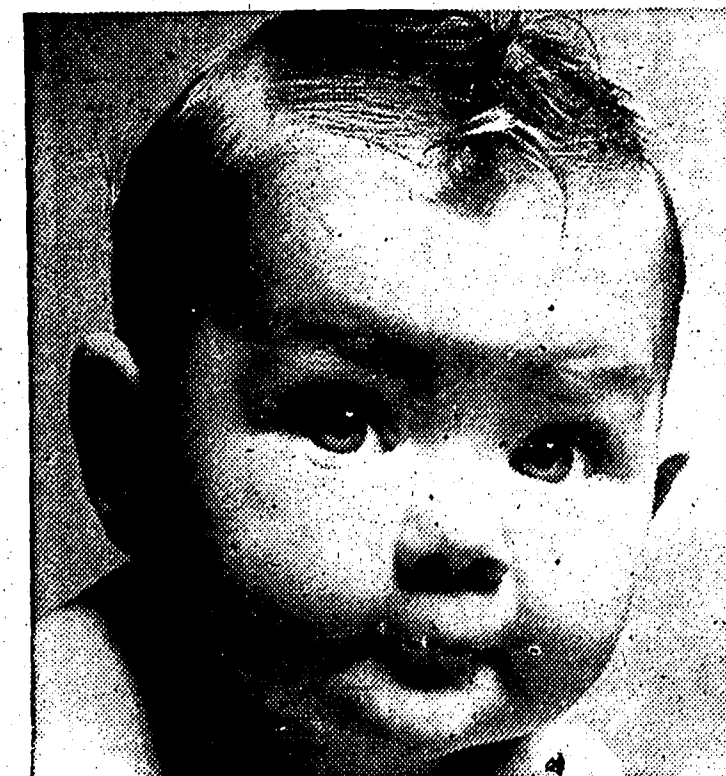

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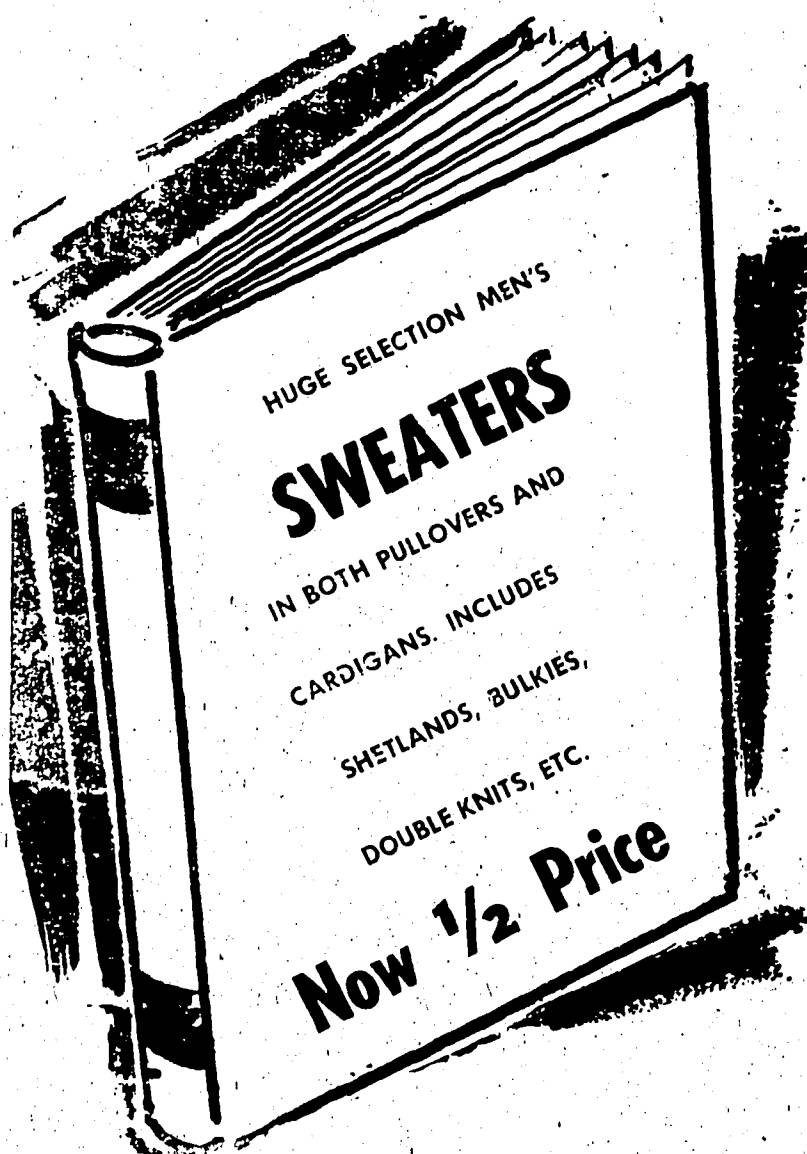

RAIL STRIKE TO GO ON — ACADIA LAST RUN TODAY

The Canadian Pacific Railway's passenger-auto ferry "Princess of Acadia", which operates on the Bay of Fundy between Digby and Saint John, N. B., will be the only ferry within the Maritimes affected with the start of the country-wide strike, scheduled for noon regional standard time Friday by some 120,000 railway employees.

The CNR has announced that its ferry services will not be halted in the Maritimes. The CNR ferries from Yarmouth, N. S., to Bar Harbor, Maine, and also the New Brunswick - Prince Edward Island, and Cape Breton Island - New Brunswick will continue to operate.

Both railways have also announced that their public telegram services will be discontinued at midnight Thursday and that telegrams received from other countries during the strike will be mailed rather than delivered to customers.

Announcement of Friday's official strike date was made in Montreal on Monday by officials representing three groups of non-operating rail unions — the 22,000 member associated shop crafts, eight

residual unions with 54,000 members, the 22,000 man Brotherhood of Railway Transport and General Workers, and a fourth group of 20,000 trainmen and conductors. The first three groups have turned down conciliation reports recommending pay increases of about 45 cents an hour and are demanding increases ranging from 55 cents to \$1.23 an hour from the CNR, CPR, and five smaller railways. These men now make an average wage of about \$2.22 an hour. In a national television-radio hookup Tuesday evening Prime Minister Pearson appealed for "moderation and common sense to settle the strike. He said he could not see it continuing for a prolonged period. He said there must be some increase in railway employees' wages but not to the extent that rising costs and prices would offset the increase and "seriously threaten" Canada's competitive position as an international trader. The Prime Minister said when Parliament returns next Monday it will be asked to approve legislation to modernize the rail system and permit the railways to grant reasonable pay increases.

Strawberries In August



If Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Jamerson of the government sponsored small fruit and vegetable project at Roxville have anything to do with it, there will be a continuous crop of strawberries from June to August. Above are Mr. and Mrs. Jamerson. The "proof of the pudding" is seen in the truck load above. The strawberries, above, picked last week, were ready to go to local markets.

The special variety above is the Acadia, bred by Dr. Donald Craig, Acadia University. The vines had been planted just forty-two days before they were harvested. Picking began August 13th off the Beaverbrook Farms at Roxville and continues at the present time.

Mr. Jamerson was "elated" by the crop, according to an interview by the Courier's editor. The quantity was good and the strawberries were referred to as good size golf balls. The editor witnessed the measurement of one berry 2 1/4 inches in diameter and was told they had averaged 1 1/4 inches in diameter. Special fertilization made the excellent crop possible, it is understood. Flavor? "Yum."

yum," as the children would say. Again, the editor can vouch for their sweetness of flavor and the excellent manner in which they endure the several days or weeks after picking.

Other varieties planted were Guardsman, Red Coats and Sparkle. Also awaiting harvesting on the farm are tomatoes, cucumbers, potatoes, squash and cabbage.

As one casual remark leads to another the concluding remark was "We need ferry transportation year 'round but air transportation for summer freights would be excellent."

Old St. Edward's Marks 169th Anniversary

Rt. Reverend H. F. Appleyard, M.C., D.D., Bishop of Georgian Bay, Ontario, was special speaker on Sunday when the 169th Anniversary of the consecration of Old St. Edward's Church on the Hill, Clementsport, was celebrated. If the people of 1797 were to speak to the people of 1966 they would advise us never to let go of God, said the Bishop. If these people could come back to us, Bishop Appleyard said, they would find many changes but in most part they would be superficial change and not changes in the areas where they expected changes. They would find the gods of today to be freedom and personal independence and uprooting of respect of traditional values. They would find that scientific knowledge leaves not much room for God and the affluence of our day not much necessity of God. Bishop Appleyard told the audience that if these things do not disturb us then we are too dead to be disturbed.

Bishop Appleyard turned back the pages to the Loyals of 1797 and saw their allegiance to the Crown and to their God as their stabilizing factors in turbulent times. He charged the congregation to find where our stability lies and cling to those things which are good and important in our turbulent times. The only place, he said, where stability is found is in the Holy, Infinite and Eternal God.

The service was conducted by the rector of the Parish of Clements, Rev. A. Francis Sheward. Others participating were Rt. Reverend R. H. Waterman, D.D.; Captain J. M. Paul, Commanding Officer, C.F.B. Cornwallis; Rev. George Bell, Sr. Chaplain (P) C.F.B. Cornwallis; and Rev. George Morris, Digby. The C.F.B. Cornwallis choir led in the singing.

A Canadian Flag was placed in the church by the West Nova Scotia Regiment. The flag was donated by William Curphy, of Clementsport, and was dedicated and blessed by Bishop Waterman. The flag was later placed at the entrance to the church so as to represent the past looking into the future.

Miss S. E. G. MacDonald, Windsor, who has been curator of St. Edward's Museum, was presented with a scroll in appreciation of her work and was also made honorary curator. The presentation was made by Bishop Waterman.

Bulbs Used As Heart Stimulant

(By Mrs. K. M. Hankinson) A recent article in a weekend publication, regarding "The Healing Star of Bethlehem", brought much interest to people in the Weymouth area.

The tuberous roots of the plant have been found to contain a heart stimulant, similar to digitalis, and when extracted, and used, has proven to produce dramatic results. It is desperately needed for the cure of certain heart diseases. An appeal was made to flower growers and homeowners to look for these flowers in their gardens and fields — to dig up the bulbs and send them to the University of Toronto for processing. Kiwanis Clubs and service clubs in various parts of Canada became interested — and began planting the bulbs, and sending them in.

Miss Greta Journey became interested in the article, in Weymouth, and contacted the Weymouth Garden Club regarding this project. They in turn have taken this on as one of their many projects. Miss Journey has sent in several cartons of the bulbs herself, and given many of the smaller bulbs out for transplanting (which, incidentally, should be done in September). Letters from the University of Toronto have been received, expressing appreciation for the bulbs already received from Weymouth, and asking for all that can be supplied.

Perhaps all of us might look in our gardens for this old-fashioned Star of Bethlehem, and see how many bulbs can be ready to ship next summer. Transplant bulbs now, so large ones can be shipped immediately after flowering next summer.

Trip To Far East

By E. J. Theriault

(Continued from last week)

The P. R. comprises several thousand islands and has many and varied scenic spots, but to a Nova Scotia Eskimo, even with our pre-heating period, travelling to them in the unbearable heat and humidity is too much of an effort. City people are smartly dressed and attractive looking. A conglomeration of races, nationalities and mutations thereof. The people are predominantly R. C. due to Spanish and Portuguese Christianization. The former influences pre-war architecture. Churches are crowded.

Manilla itself still shows signs of heavy bombing by U. S. Air Force to drive Japs out. Large buildings wrecked but not demolished. U. S. funds allocated for re-construction absorbed by grafting politicians and successive corrupt governments. Each government worse than predecessor. Presidential palace and executive mansion open to public. Very elaborate. The President also rates an official yacht (gun boat type).

Other facets of P. R. were: (a) the numerous jeeps of all colours and combinations of colours, these are used extensively for general passenger transportation;

(b) the prevalence of weapons carrying—theatres and other public places have receptacles bearing the sign "Park your weapons here";

(c) traffic control by horn-blasting works out O. K.

(d) torch light night parade staged by communist U. of M. students protesting Vietnam participation by P. R. on the occasion of V. P. Humphrey's visit to P. R.

Random impressions:

(a) Foremost the unbearable heat.

(b) The filthy conditions of even the main streets. Cause: (1) lack of rain (2) the oriental habit of spitting (3) deposits of offal from thousands of domestic pets (dogs). Walk-

ing is a hazardous performance. (e) The neatness and politeness of uniformed school children who will surely transform the future of P. R. and other nearby countries.

(d) The musical appreciation of the common people listening by the hour at the stadium to Band performances of operatic music. Small children keeping time to the music by foot and gesture.

(e) The heat. Then finally departure on the 24th of February from this earthly paradise after permission to leave graciously given by the same parade of immigration officials who duly stamped our passports aboard ship.

Arrival at Hong Kong, about 11 p. m. February 25th 637 miles from Manilla. Territorial rainstorm. Brilliantly illuminated. Hotel bus picked us up at dockside at 10 a. m. Feb. 26th. Our constantly increasing items of luggage, safely landed at Chungking House in Kowloon (on the mainland). Hong Kong proper or Victoria is an island. Kowloon is on the opposite side of the harbour connected by continuous vehicular and passenger ferries—10 min. trip. A tunnel is under construction. Completion date 1967. Kowloon, Hong Kong and New Territories which is adjacent to Red China border contains 3½ million people—95% Chinese, remainder world assortment. A Crown colony—English Administrators, Judges and urban officials. Of the Chinese at least two-thirds must be tailors. Every other shop is either a tailor shop or a jewellery store. All sorts of sales gimmicks for instance, I had bought a pair of light weight, no crease trousers in Honolulu which were a little on the long side. I was accosted on various occasions with an offer to cut them down to proper length free of charge which would be followed by a sales pitch to make a new suit of the best material and workmanship at a reasonable price.

There are thousands of small shops. If a passerby glances at the displayed merchandise in an instant one of the clerks is at your side importuning you to examine the wares. Hong Kong is a free port and really the display counter of world wide products mere words cannot give an adequate description. It must be seen personally.

Here again the U. S. \$ is tops even though it is a Crown Colony. Prices are quoted in U. S. \$ or Hong Kong \$ (1 U. S. \$ = approx 3.72 H.K. \$). For convenience and rapid calculation we assumed 1 U. S. \$ equal 4 H.K. \$. Choice of Western (N. A.) or Chinese food. We were not sorry after 12 hectic days in Hong Kong to board our next ship, and back to our accustomed food. Our return to Shipboard was all the more welcome due to depleted state of treasury. Hong Kong and Kowloon were in holiday attire for the visit of Princess Margaret and Lord Snowden and their stay was marked by street lighting, fireworks, gun salutes, water fountains, vast decorations, etc. The visit was to promote British trade. Due to crowds I was unable to get

The weather even in early March is exceedingly humid. Relative humidity as high as 94%. Temp. 60-70. Hotel rooms individually air conditioned by window installed air conditioning unit.

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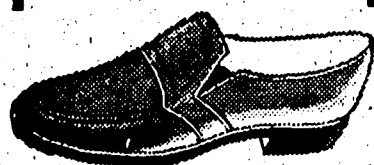

I am not a gardener, and I am not an antique collector. These are sort of strange confessions for the beginning of a column, but the trouble is, it is my ambition to be both. That is, I adore flowers, and I adore antiques in that slightly phony way in which people who have eaten Chinese food only once adore Chinese food, and that people who once hired a pony adore riding. In my case, I am terribly interested in becoming interested in both flowers and antiques, but as yet, I have not acquired either the knowledge or the confidence to enter into the mystic realms where those people who have progressed beyond the point of being interested in being interested, to the point of being interested, dwell.

It was in pursuit of one of these interests, antiques, that I was walking up a street, in a strange city one bright day last spring. We had hired a housekeeper, and escaped from telephones, dishes, responsibility, and dridgery for a few days. Stashed in a remote corner of my purse, was a tightly rolled wad of money which I had saved for the express purpose of buying some treasure I might find while haunting the antique shops while I was away from home.

Something about his bright manner inspired timidity rather than confidence. My ignorance, and lack of either money or experience began to show all over me. "Well-uh, I wanted to see your shop," I stammered into his expectant smile.

"Yes," he said, still smiling, but the brightness was fading somewhat. "What would you like to see?"

"I - uh - just thought I would like to see what you had," The performance did not seem to be going as well as the rehearsal had.

"You mean," he asked without smiling, "you had nothing in particular you wanted to buy?"

I hung my head. "No," I answered meekly. I traced my initial on the sidewalk with my toe.

"You were going to browse?" It was an accusation, not a question, delivered in icy tones.

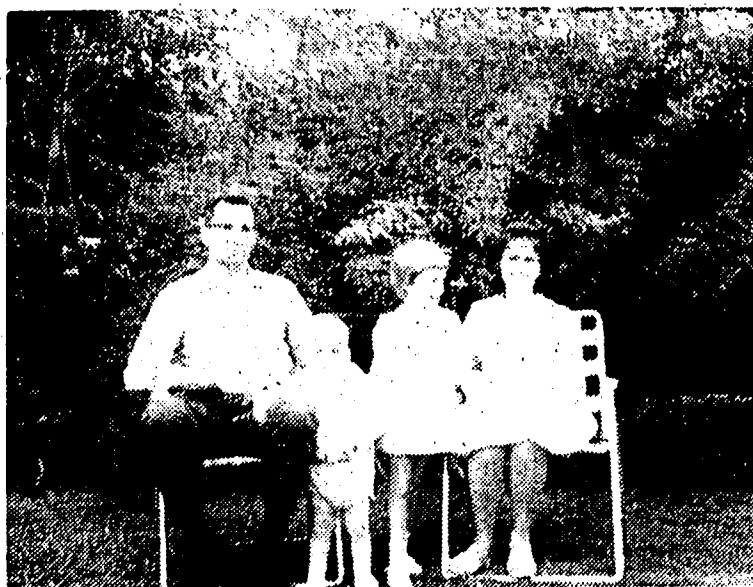

Commerce has been in the corridor and the Industrial Arts room has been utilized. There being no way of expanding for the present school year, classes will be held in the once condemned St. Patrick's school after being brought up to acceptable standard. This is for temporary use only.

In the Digby school delegation which appeared before council were Mr. Purdy, Keith Raymond, chairman of the Digby Regional High School Board, and Dr. D. E. Lewis, vice-chairman.

Ronald Morehouse mentioned that 200 students have applied for admission to D.R.H.S. in September on the Grade VII level. Anticipation is that the school will be full of students in all and there is a shortage of the Department of Education withdrawing accreditation if the students are not properly accommodated. He also related the type of the program available in the Department of Education in the Digby area.

Faculty's meeting also dealt with municipal and provincial boundaries, the report of which will be released at a

later date.

The municipality went on record of supporting the Digby-Welchpool, N.B., route for a second Nova Scotia-New England ferry and requested the federal government to implement the findings of the Margison report as soon as possible. The resolution mentioned the necessity of such a ferry to accommodate the tourist, fishing, lumbering and farming industries of the area and commended the Margison Associates Ltd. for a painstaking survey and analysis.

Paving In Clare District Progressing

Paving in Clare is progressing favorably with the section on the main highway, No. 1, paved from Weymouth to St. Alphonse, a distance of about 20 miles. The Weymouth-New Edinburgh road is being paved, which is approximately 5 miles. It is rumored that the Church Point wharf road will

be paved soon and the frontage of the Bellevue Cove, Church Point, Little Brook, Saulnierville and Meteghan federal buildings, which house the Post Offices will also be paved. The paving of the frontage of the Post Offices is a separate contract, it is understood. Many persons in Clare are taking advantage of the paving company being established in the area to have their driveways paved.

FORMER MAYOR MENTIONED FOR SENATE APPOINTMENT

The name of E. J. Theriault, Q.C., a successful barrister in Digby for the past 39 years and a former Digby mayor, is becoming more and more prominently heard among names being proposed by Acadians and other friends as a suitable person for a senatorial appointment expected to be made in the near future.

An honor was bestowed on Mr. Theriault in 1955 when he was given a D.C.L. (honoris causa) from St. Ann's College in 1955.

Mr. Theriault's religion is of Roman Catholic faith. He is bilingual. Mr. Theriault has given of his abilities to civic affairs, having been a councillor in the town of Digby and Digby's mayor from 1939 to 1943.

During his mayorship he organized a local company of the 2nd West Nova Scotia Regiment Reserve and attained the rank of Captain.

Politically Mr. Theriault has been active as secretary-treasurer of the Digby County Liberal Association and after the division of constituencies was president of the Digby Municipality Liberal Association until his resignation in 1956.

Prominent Digby Businessman Passes

Forrest Reginald Eisener, 71, a prominent businessman in Digby, died in Digby General Hospital on Monday. Born in Clementsport, he was the son of the late Charles and Mabel (Yarriagles) Eisener.

Mr. Eisener came to Digby in 1916 and had been president and proprietor of Digby Motors Ltd. since 1923.

Active in the community, he served two terms on the town council and was president for several years of Digby General Hospital.

Mr. Eisener was interested in provincial and national politics, and was the last honorary president of the Progressive Conservative Association for the Digby electoral district.

He was a charter member of the Digby Kiwanis Club, and also an executive member of the town's board of trade. He was a member of King Solomon Lodge AF and AM and attended Digby Baptist Church.

Surviving are his wife, the former Agnes Height, Plympton; a daughter, Marie (Mrs. John A. Woolaver), Digby; four grandchildren; a brother, Curtis, Bear River; three sisters, Hilda (Mrs. Walter Berly), Smith's Cove; Leola (Mrs. Aven Sanford), Smith's Cove; Doris (Mrs. Sheldon Sproule), Deep Brook.

The body will rest at his late home, 159 Queen Street, until funeral this afternoon (Thursday) at 2:30 p.m. Rev. H. S. Hartin will officiate. Interment will be in Digby Baptist Cemetery.

Colin Stephens, president of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, accompanied by the executive secretary, Lloyd Hill, other board officials and business men, appeared before Nova Scotia Premier Robert L. Stanfield and Cabinet on Wednesday advocating a blurring of the Digby-Saint John ferry service and the proposed Digby-Welspool on Campbell Island ferry service. Their suggestion to the premier and cabinet was that the funds which would be made available to the Welspool ferry be offset by the Canadian Pacific Railway in exchange for their agreeing to provide a service which would include all routes of that which is proposed to be offered from Digby, Nova Scotia, to Welspool, New Brunswick, but at the same time provide a service including all the commercial and tourist aspects of the same, necessary to answer needs at present and those which will follow the implementation of such improved service, including piggyback service and trailer transportation between Digby and Saint John. In other words, the delegation said, their suggestion is that the Canadian Pacific Railway be assisted to take over the complete service anticipated of the Welspool ferry and that which it was their intention to establish some time ago between Digby and Saint John and which they would have implemented had it not been for the cost involved.

The AVABT delegation sought the endorsement of the proposal by the government and asked for their active support in petitioning the federal government on the matter and pledge financial participation.

The implementation of the suggested improved ferry service between western Nova Scotia and southern New Brunswick, the delegation said, would serve as a token of endorsement of faith in the economic future of western Nova Scotia.

The delegation was a cross section of business men and municipal leaders of the Annapolis Valley, all of whom have been affected in their business career by transportation conditions. They asked that tremendous transportation problem and bottleneck in western Nova Scotia be alleviated so that better economic conditions could be developed. The question was posed: "Would not the proposed Digby-Welspool ferry service take away from the present Digby-Saint John ferry service, to such an extent that it might conceivably result in such a loss of revenue that the CPR may find it impossible to continue even the drastically reduced service provided on its DAR at the present time?"

Another drawback drawn to the attention of the premier and Cabinet was the chagrin experienced when endeavouring to obtain ferry reservations during the tourist season on the present Digby-Saint John run.

Along with the brief presented were letters from business men and municipal leaders stating their difficulties in (Please turn to page 10)

OLD DIGBY HOSPITAL HOME FOR RETARDED

Welfare Minister James M. Harding announced the establishment of three Children's Homes for the care of severely retarded children, one of which will be at the old Digby General Hospital. The provision of these regional facilities was forecast in the Speech from the Throne to the 1966 House of Assembly. Mr. Harding said.

The first of these Homes, which will be opened early in September, will be located in temporary facilities on the former RCAF Base at Beaverbank in Halifax County. Some 40 children will be cared for in this institution.

The Home in Pictou is being established in the former Sutherland Memorial Hospital which has been purchased by the Province and is being renovated to accommodate approximately 40 children.

The former Digby General Hospital building is being renovated by the Digby Hospital Board and will accommodate 32 children.

Mr. Harding said a fourth institution to serve Cape Breton Island with facilities to care for 40 children is now under consideration.

The Homes will be operated by the Child Welfare Division of the Department of Public Health.

Mr. Harding said that for many years the provincial government through the Department of Public Health had provided institutional care, training and education for retarded children at the Nova Scotia Training School. He noted that a more recent development was the provision of foster home care for retarded children.

"This is the first time the Province has undertaken to provide extensive facilities and care for severely retarded children and marks a milestone in the provision of services by the government for retarded children in Nova Scotia," Mr. Harding said.

It is understood that twenty to twenty-five of professional and non professional will be employed at the home with as many as possible from the local area. The Digby General Hospital will service in food and laundry.

The Digby Home will serve Western Nova Scotia and it is understood will take children from infancy to 12 or 13 years.

A play area will be provided.

Twin Papers

In conversation with the editor of The Digby Courier, Mrs. Lewis complained that the ceiling in her house was so low that some of the visitors had to bend over to stay inside. Hanging her head to demonstrate the embarrassment she felt she said "It makes one feel so foolish."

Mrs. Lewis plans to arrange her trailer to accommodate her work and be able to make a light meal there if she wants too.

Decorations? The door will be decorated with flowers or other paintings similar to her house. The trailer will bear the sign "Maude Lewis Trailer."

John, who sided with the British (Loyalists), finally took refuge in Nova Scotia along with thousands of others who were enraged with the American stand of independence and in sympathy with the British.

In his new found land, John Edison, according to Francis Trevelyan Miller, LL.D., Litt. D., married and settled with his wife in Digby township where their son, Samuel, was born in 1804. Later they moved to Ontario, eventually arriving at Vienna, Ontario on Lake Erie. Other records show the family of John Edison to be Samuel, Adonijah, Thomas, Margaret, Catherine, Mary and Moses with Samuel having been 14 years old in 1783. Thus we would note two by the name Samuel Edison and expect the 1804 man was a son of Samuel Sr.

Nice To Be Missed

Where was the editor? That was the remark heard various times last week when the Courier came out, the first in a long time, without an editorial of any kind. Indeed, we were flattered. If the editorials were missed, then we take for granted there must be something good about them, whether or not we are in the "top four" in Nova Scotia who are designated as editors who "say what they think" (whatever that means).

We didn't want to miss writing an editorial last week. It was a special issue for us in that it was the first issue of volume 92. Along with other subjects our intention was to draw attention to our ninety-second year. But we succumbed to something for which we have no name. It might have been generalizing or compromising or anything you wish, but the editor couldn't see much pleasure in having a half dozen grand children if you couldn't take one week-end, at least, for the pleasure of baby sitting. Coupled with the baby-sitting activities there was also a strange combination of confusing pressures. There were chores for a half dozen or so organizations or committees to be done with no clear path to accomplish them. On the other hand, a most pressing inertia developed. The inertia overruled and psychologically, at least, we found ourselves working out of a dilemma and three lively little girls to use as a crutch for our own shortcomings.

We even had plans last week for our readers to help us give them the kind of paper they want by answering a few simple questions on what they like most about the Courier. We'll do it another time.

Along with all other confusions we are preparing our basement at the plant to install another newspaper press. It won't be a new one, granted, but it should save us hours on labor and dollars on newsprint. But, believe us, old or new, this installation is going to cost us a pretty penny and let this be a warning to "them there" who owe us money for a long time - we might get pretty tough. We can't smile on paying interest on money when others use our money to avoid paying interest. We are even banking on those who do not owe us for a very long time to help us out by paying at this time we most need it.

The weekly press in Canada is on the move as can readily be seen. We at The Digby Courier are not in a position to invest \$250,000 or even one tenth of that amount for improvements. Our present investment is actually only a pittance but to us it is big stakes. All we can say is that it is an advancement and should help us to give you better service. A weekly newspaper is a must in any progressive community. It's chief aim is to support the community in all that is worthwhile but the newspaper on the other hand cannot survive to fulfill its purpose without the support of the community in which it exists. For ninety-one years, this newspaper has been a responsible and effective organ of information and leadership. We go into our 92nd year with the resolve to improve that effectiveness. That will be possible by your help.

We'll try not to give you too many opportunities in our 92nd year to ask: "Where was the editor last week?" but we appreciate the fact that you missed the editorial column. Our "other" press (not new) when it is installed should keep you from missing any issue of The Courier for some years to come. We were not banking on such a feat by the present press which we are operating.

School Request Laid On Table

In our story last week on the request of the Digby Regional High School Board for an extension to the school, and which request was laid on the table by the Municipal Council in special session, we did not mean to reflect the idea that this was a proposition of the school supervisor F. C. Purdy. Keith Raymond, chairman of the board, presented the cause before the councillors on behalf of the board but as usual F. C. Purdy was asked to explain a few figures, answer a few questions and hand out some prophetic as well as professional information.

Why F. C. Purdy? Simply because he is supervisor of schools and has all the information at his finger-tips. Not that this would be Mr. Purdy's school or that he would stand to gain by the extension. Simply because he has the ready information and the ability to impart that information readily.

Come to think, why is it that F. C. Purdy is so often called on to present cases, be it school, hospital, or whatever? For one thing, he is a "wizard" with figures, and that is meant to be complimentary. Secondly who has such an orderly and systematic mind? Who is there who can present a case, step by step, in such a concise, clear and understandable fashion as F. C. Purdy? Who is there who has a better voice, with so much resonance, and who has learned to use that resonance properly? You can add to this clarity of diction. And no doubt about it, F. C. Purdy is a clever man. You now have some of the answers why F. C. Purdy is so often called upon to present a cause for the benefit of the people of this community.

Yes, Purdy can always put it across and he's always sought to do the job. You might not have analyzed why you've just asked him to do the job - but there have been reasons. Digby has profited by these reasons or qualities which have made F. C. Purdy outstanding in Digby and in areas much afield than the few square miles of our town. Among his monuments of achievements will always stand foremost, a school and hospital.

We take our hats off to F. C. Purdy. We say again no matter how the Municipal Council felt inclined to deal with the school request, the request was that of the school board and not that of the supervisor. We would want no misunderstanding through our columns.

Effect of Rail Strike

By the look of the town on Friday and Saturday, we thought that Labor Day must have come and gone. It was even worse than most years after Labor Day. There wasn't a ferry whistle or a train bell to hear. The town sure looked as though some catastrophe had happened, and sure enough a railway strike had occurred, and that was nothing short of catastrophe. Undoubtedly, the down town merchants will feel the loss of revenue from these last two weeks of lessened tourist traffic.

Fortunately, a convention was on at The Pines and that hotel looked prosperous and full of life. Not so with some of the hotels and motels. A Digby municipal councillor, as early as Tuesday last week, mentioned of five or six cancellations that day at one of the motels. Reason was the pending railway strike.

Yes, the railway strike has far reaching effects. The first to be noticed here was the reluctance of the Digby Municipal Council to vote an extension to the Digby Regional High School because of the expected economic instability due to the then impending railway strike.

The strike is on. Railway employees are idle; those engaged in tourism here are affected; merchants are experiencing less trade, normal economic functions have been impeded and people are being inconvenienced right in our midst. The change of the transportation is bound to effect prices to consumers which are likely to remain. We can only hope that by the time this is read, the strike will be over.

The strike is costing plenty here in our midst. What about all Canada? If it is of much longer duration it will have a crippling effect on the economy of the whole nation. Export and import trade will be hampered as well as a lack of communication and rail movement within the country. In general, business throughout the nation will be hindered and that is just the thing that Canada does not need.

There was a day when labor unions were probably necessary, but like many things the labor union pendulum has swung a bit too far for the good of the country. Even members of the union admit that.

Maybe it is just as well we thought Labor Day had passed. While we appreciate those in our employ, the sound of Labor Day rings an ugly note in our ears when it is associated with strikes, generally doing more harm than good. Labor Day was first celebrated in 1882, eighty-four years ago. Let's not turn conditions back to 1882 by crippling strikes.

Digby County Exhibition

Some of these railway employees, most of them around Digby unwillingly on strike, might turn their idle time into some good use by helping to prepare for the Digby County Exhibition. Usually there is plenty to do to get the exhibition on its way and we have no doubt but what somebody would supply paint brushes, tools or anything necessary for working. After all, the exhibition at Bear River is a Digby County Exhibition and we are sure that Bear River would appreciate co-operation and assistance from anywhere in Digby County.

Despite little participation from many parts of the county, Digby County Exhibition has taken on a new lease to life. Last year for the first time in several years, we believe, the exhibition showed a financial profit. A little tightening of the reins, a little of new life and ideas, a few more attractions with greater imagination and the show made an improvement in a short time. Credit, however, must go to the Bear River people. The enthusiasm outside Bear River is still of minor quantity and the burden of the fair continues to fall heavily on Bear River. This should be changed.

Why a Digby County exhibition anyway? It gives Digby County farmers an opportunity through competition and observation and by conversation with other farmers to improve their product. Wonder if anyone thought of approaching the new small fruit producers for a booth at the exhibition? A grand opportunity to improve farm education.

Then what is good for the farmer is good for the fisherman and all other industries. Exhibitions should be a place to learn about operations as well as to see handicrafts, cooking, industrial arts, livestock, and pretty flowers. Exhibitions were specially inaugurated to improve production of foods, to produce better barnyard animals and to widen knowledge on industrial products.

Digby County Exhibition gives the school children an opportunity to display their work to a wider circle of friends. It creates an incentive for the children to work, to aspire to excellence and to gain confidence in their endeavours. The same applies to talents of any nature, be they singing, dancing or talents especially developed through 4-H. To be effective, however, they must be exhibited with pride and fresh imagination and not just as one more entry.

Then let us not forget about the social aspects and the fellowships and new and old acquaintances enjoyed at the Digby County Exhibition.

The exhibition at Bear River is on September 8, 9, and 10. If you really can't participate, if you really can't enter some item of interest, then at least, do the next best - be present.

 - (c) Concrete septic tanks only with a minimum size of 400 gallons.
 - (d) A disposal field bed required.

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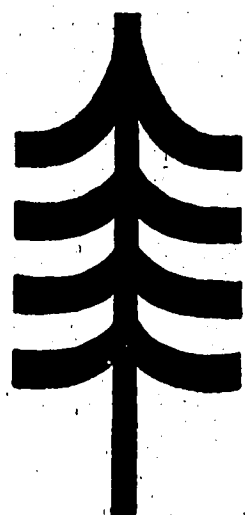

Regulations:

A woodlot owner is defined as a person owning 1,000 acres or less of woodland. The acreage can be in one block or consist of a number of blocks, but the total must not exceed 1,000 acres.

Ltd. said the establishment of a modern ferry service between Digby and Saint John would be an advantage to the trucking industry of western Nova Scotia and the Annapolis Valley. It would cut down the time by approximately ten hours in moving agricultural and fish products as well as manufactured goods to upper Canadian and U.S.A. markets.

Beaver Brook Farms Ltd. stated that one of the major limitations on successful farming in Western Nova Scotia, and indeed in Nova Scotia as a whole, is the lack of adequate transportation to the U.S.A. markets. Within a thousand mile radius of Digby is a full 25 percent of North Americans, their letter stated. Setting forth expectations from the Beaver Brook Farms Ltd. it was stated that 300 acres of farm land is now being actively worked. It is anticipated that this will increase by 50% or an additional 150 acres for next year's plantings. They anticipate that during the 1967 season they should be shipping from the farm 100 trailer transports loaded with straw-

berries, 20 loaded with lettuce, 30 loaded with cabbage and 25 loaded with potatoes. They presently hope to increase this production by something in the area of 25% each year for the next five years. It is understood. In addition to these shipments outlined above, they anticipate shipments on behalf of other growers from Yarmouth and Digby counties, for which they will act as brokers, of approximately 150 transport loads of strawberries, lettuce and cabbage.

Mayor C. D. Snow, Digby, submitted a letter in which he stated that the present ferry requires the goods to be handled by hand six extra times as compared to truck service of door-to-door pick-up and delivery. He said that the fishing industry of western Nova Scotia is at a disadvantage and markets that were available are no longer available because of high cost of transportation and elimination of fast service to markets.

Seven other letters told similar stories to those mentioned above. In presenting the cause of the tourist industry the AVAIFT pointed to the small percentage of the 902,000 visitors entering Nova Scotia in 1965 who came via Princess of Acadia because of lack of proper transportation. The present ferry cannot carry buses and trailers. Modern transportation across the Bay of Fundy would be a boon to the tourist industry. It was stated.

As related in history, Samuel Edison, who became father of Thomas Edison, the inventor, had married a school teacher, Nancy Elliott, in Ontario. At the time of the Canadian Rebellion Samuel Edison also found himself, because of his views, in the predicament of a man without a country and left with his wife for the United States settling in Milan, Ohio, in 1842. It was in Milan where Thomas Alva Edison was born in 1847.

From Milan, the genius, who is said to have declared that "Genius is one per cent inspiration and ninety-nine per cent perspiration" moved out to various parts of the United States and Canada as a young man. In all this time the boy of whom his teacher had said "That Edison boy is 'addled', he is not worth keeping in school any longer" continued to invent and discover. It is to this man, Thomas Alva Edison, that the world owes credit for the benefit of electric light, improvements in telephone and telegraph, the phonograph or recording machines and some nearly 3000 other inventions, all of which were achieved through courage and perseverance against odds.

The inventor, Thomas Alva Edison, was twice married. His family from his first marriage being Mrs. Mary Edison Osler, Thomas A. Edison II and William Leslie Edison. Children of the second marriage were Charles, Madelyn (Mrs. John Sloan) and Theodore. The son, Charles, who

Supports In Principle School Expansion

At the regular monthly meeting of the Digby Town Council Tuesday evening, September 6, the council supported in principle a proposed expansion of school facilities for the Digby area amounting to the sum of approximately \$300,000. Digby town's share in the proposed improvements would be approximately 50 to 60 thousand dollars. These improvements would, it is estimated, take care of school needs for 10 to 15 years. Supervisor F. Courtney Purdy, Dr. D. E. Lewis and Inspector C. E. Edwards brought the submission to the council from the Regional School Board.

John Raymond addressed the council on conditions at the former town dump. He claimed the dump was still being used and demanded it be looked into. Mr. Raymond claimed, also, the road leading to the dump, as well as part of the dump itself, belongs to him. Council promised to investigate.

The Mayor, on motion of Council, signed an agreement, approving the leasing of the former DAR station and grounds to Fraser Supplies Limited.

Police brought in its regular report which was read by Police Committee chairman, Michael Surette was appointed full time constable.

The Streets report included a request by the town streets crew that the present 44 hour week be cut to a 40 hour week for the same pay. It was pointed out that four hours on Saturday morning did not allow enough time to accomplish anything of importance. The crew has already agreed to be available at all times for emergencies.

Councillor Cowan brought a request to the council to remove one parking meter in front of the new Dry Cleaning establishment on Water Street. Chief of Police Dunn said he already was in process of adjusting positions of meters to allow room for loading.

The present storing yard for town equipment at the town hall is to be moved to the South Commons land. Fencing to enclose the new yard is to be tendered for by local business houses.

The town water supply has been switched during the past two weeks from Lily Lake to Lily Lake reservoir. Considerable dissatisfaction with the muddiness of the water has been voiced by town water users and council said this is the reason. The lack of water in the lake has been a source of worry to the council, but it is felt the emergency conditions are past for the year.

Approval was given for Elliott's Shows, under the sponsorship of the Legion, to be allowed to come to town.

Relief costs were up this month \$100. over July.

The old hospital building has been rented to the Province for the schooling, housing and feeding of retarded and mentally disabled children. At present the building and grounds are being renovated to come up to specifications insisted upon by the Provincial authorities.

The grounds in back of the new Digby General Hospital are to be graded and made adequate for airlifts of patients to larger hospital areas.

Building permits were given to Henry Lewis for additions to the property formerly owned by Hector Jourdain. Directional signs for Pines Hotel at various places in the town have been erected and approved by the council.

The parking situation near Water street has been considerably eased over the past months. Council learned. The motoring public is urged by Council to use the parking area established on First Avenue. A sign has been erected at the entrance and lights will be placed here later.

Councillor Connolly reported for the E.M.O. Regular activities have been started for the fall and winter seasons, he said.

Cost of the pump was \$14,000.00, paid for from profits made at fairs and bingo.

Winners of prizes were Wilfred Fontaine, Princess of Acadia, first prize and Vaughn Adams, second prize. Winner of the special donation card prize was Morris Haynes.

This year a Blood Donor booth was held at the fair. The booth, arranged by area chairman E. B. Tufts, was staffed by Red Cross workers.

Cyrus S. Eaton was quick to note that a former governor of New Jersey, Charles Edison, had visited Digby. From his Deep Cove Farms in Hubbards the distinguished Mr. Eaton wrote to Mayor C. D. Snow congratulating him on extending to the honourable Mr. Edison a fine welcome to the town. Mr. Eaton informed the mayor that he had been a friend and associate of Charles Edison's famous father, Thomas Alva Edison.

Mr. Edison added that it would mean a great deal to Nova Scotia if members of his distinguished families, whose ancestors lived here, could come back in the summer to enjoy the beauty and charm of the province.

Engineers At The Pines

More than 300 attended the conference of the Maritime Professional Engineers held at The Pines last week when Hon. Robert Winters, Minister of Trade and Commerce, addressed the closing banquet on Friday evening.

In his address Mr. Winters spoke of the need of foreign investment in Canada if growth is not to be seriously impaired. He said Canada would be a different country without the degree of foreign investment which we now have. Mr. Winters said while some may express fears that we may be influenced from abroad in making decisions about Canada's best interests because of foreign ownership, he was more concerned about Canada losing economic and political strength through failure to maintain the economy in sound economic health than by foreign ownership of Canadian enterprises. He said one of the greatest problems is in losing the best trained persons to the United States and other countries, because greater incentives and opportunities are found elsewhere than in Canada.

Unless we take measures to get our economy in the position to resist strong pressures toward inflation and provide equivalent incentives to the United States, we will experience a greater threat to Canada's economic and political strength than the current degree of foreign ownership. The minister said.

The conference was addressed Friday morning by Dr. M. Limbour, near Hull, Que., and F. Goudge of Ottawa who spoke for the most part on the subject of water pollution in Canada and the United States.

Dr. Goudge said that the United States and Canada as well, should stop polluting their waters. It is easy he said for young developing countries to use streams as sewers, but this must stop.

He said that water is the most essential of all minerals and if we continue to pollute our lakes and streams we will be in trouble. He said that already in Canada water is being brought into Southern Ontario by pipeline from Georgian Bay where the water is still clean. This is necessary, he said, because local sources are too polluted for use.

The cost of treating polluted waters to make them fit for use, runs into millions of dollars, Dr. Goudge said. He said this expenditure would be unnecessary if pollution was stopped.

Most pollution could be stopped, Dr. Goudge said, if present industrial wastes were utilized. He said that what industry now throws away, will be a big factor in the future. Utilization of industrial wastes is coming, he said, and is already here, in many industries.

Mr. Goudge is a widely known consulting engineer and chief of the industrial minerals division of the federal department of mines for thirty-five years.

J. O. Holt of the atomic power department of Canadian General Electric spoke on nuclear power development at the opening session. He said that nuclear power is now competitive with other energy sources in many locations. It would not supersede other sources of power, the speaker said, but would complement them.

Lucien L'Allier, Montreal, spoke on the Montreal Subway System. Other speakers were Dr. J. M. Hambley, president of the E.I.C. and Dean W. M. Armstrong, president of the Canadian Council of Professional Engineers.

The conference included the Association of Professional Engineers of New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia and branches of the Engineering Institute of Canada of the Atlantic Provinces.

On Sept. 2, 1966, Gateway Leatherette and Canvas Converters, Ltd. of Belliveau's Cove were charged under Section 107 of the Unemployment Insurance Act for failure to renew their unemployment insurance books. The fine of \$10, with costs of \$5.30, imposed by Magistrate H. B. Dickey was paid.

L. d'Entremont. Rev. LeBlanc was born at Church Point, attended public school here and received his bachelor of Arts degree at St. Ann's College. He attended the Eudiste Order's novitiate at Charlesbourg and spent two years at Washington, studying theology.

He was ordained at Church Point on April 24th, 1949 along with Rev. Maurice LeBlanc of West Pubnico by his Excellency Mgr. Leverman of Saint John, N.B., at St. Mary's R. C. Church. This order also has charge of several parishes along the North Shore of the St. Lawrence River in the province of Quebec, Ste. Famille parish in Bathurst, B. C. Saunierville, Concession and Church Point in Digby County; St. Peters in Cheticamp, Cape Breton in Nova Scotia. The order also operates a school in Buffalo, the Cardinal Dougherty High School, seminaries in Venezuela with native and Canadian priests in charge; also in Columbia, South America which is operated by South American clergy of the Eudiste Order. They operated colleges in Spain, the Gold Coast in Africa and in France.

Nowlan Departs From Caucus View

P. Patrick Nowlan, Member for Digby - Annapolis - Kings, departed from the usual form in the debate in the Commons last week on the railway strike by breaking away from party loyalty and voting with the government bill.

In addressing the House, Mr. Nowlan said "Frankly, as a new member one of the pressures I have felt most has been the pressure to conform whereby independent judgment and objective judgment are subject to the pressure of the necessity of loyalty to party and party principles. I think the caucus is at times a collar around the necks of many members. It chokes the expression of independent thought and judgment. However, caucus and the solidarity of caucus are most necessary when dealing with the ordinary issues of party politics, the issues which make elections and party platforms."

He said after cogitating for three days and listening to the debate (railway) in this chamber I have not been able to resolve my conflict of conscience with the consensus of my Caucus.

Mr. Nowlan stormed at Members of Parliament who didn't have the courage of their convictions when they emerged from behind their lobby curtains and into the House Chamber and said "I think that in many respects this parliament could be called a parliament of phantoms. In it there are potential leaders who shadow-box continuously, hesitant to take strong stands and lead rather than be led."

Mr. Nowlan considered the railway strike as a national emergency and said that if there ever was a time to vote from convictions and principle this is the occasion.

Mr. Nowlan said he felt that the bill before Parliament left the workers "as the underdogs" and this was the role in which they had been cast for many years. But he appealed to the union leaders to direct their followers back to work for at least another six months while conciliation and arbitration processes took their course.

It could have been that it sounded much longer because our ears had become accustomed to the silence in one week or it could have been that the trainmen were giving an extra warning to motorists and pedestrians who had become accustomed to no trains during the strike. Anyway, the impression was that the trainmen and even the train rejoiced with the rest of us that the strike was over.

And with the Princess of Acadia and the D.A.R. train back on schedule the old town came back to life again for a few days anyway. This flow of traffic was also augmented by the Engineers Convention at The Pines. Labor Day weekend has no doubt brought us its usual cutback on traffic which comes every year but the inactivity of last week surely gives us some idea of what a ghost town we would have without the Princess of Acadia and the D.A.R. The railway strike is over and while most of us rejoice and railway employees in Digby seem to be happy to get back to work, there are those of the railway personnel throughout Canada whom, we judge by news reports, are still disgruntled. We know for certain that workers in some areas of employment look with envy at the wages of railway workers, though, certainly too, there are others who have fatter pay envelopes than railway employees. Be it railway wage disputes or any other wage dispute, there are many factors to be considered in wage arguments and there will always be the disgruntled either legitimately or not so. Everybody can't live and work in that part of Canada where wages are highest because of thriving industrial activity. All persons, even in one town or village, are not educated for the job or cannot find employment in those businesses which can afford the highest wages yet this does not seem to be a consideration when demands are made.

Further still from the minds of some workers is the effect that strikes and demands make on the nation as a whole. With this in mind, we offer some thoughts by C. J. Harris on How To Survive taken from The Clip-Sheet: "It has been said so often that for most of us it is now almost without meaning: We cannot sustain our prosperity, or even survive as an independent nation, unless our industry can successfully meet international competition."

Conceding that the point is beyond argument, the question is what must a Canadian industry do to keep pace with foreign industries that have longer production runs, lower wages, government subsidies or other advantages? It's a complex problem, involving more than just good management. But solving the survival problem is not solely a matter of finding the capital to introduce new equipment and products, as this excerpt from the annual report of Dominion Textile Company explains: "Both labor and government must recognize, in their own long-term interests and for the welfare of Canada, that the powerful downward pressure of foreign competition does not weigh alone on industry, but represents an equally powerful limitation to wage demands and to the spending programs of governments."

"There is no discrediting Canada's ambitions for all its citizens to live better and earn more. But the reality of financing our ambitions is that the industries and business of this country are the primary sources of its tax funds. They provide not only corporate taxes but the payrolls from which taxes are drawn."

"They can continue to do this only if all Canadians foresee the certainty of rising costs clashing with strong foreign competition, and accept as fact that social welfare ambitions, wage ambitions, taxes and industrial health are all tied together in one national economic package."

Survival is a joint effort — for public, government, labor, management.



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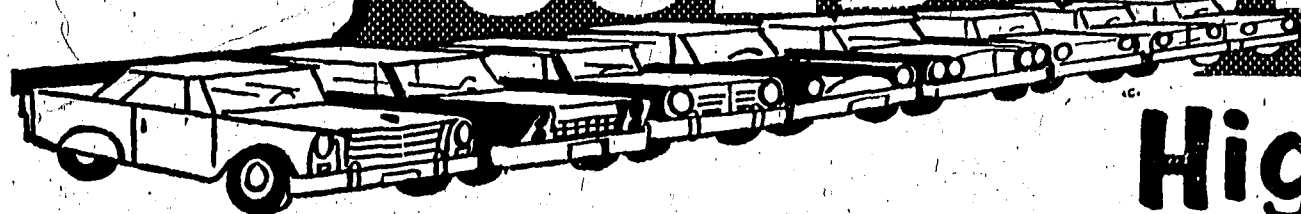

Digby Board Insists Digby-Welshpool Ferry

A long drawn-out discussion which intensified with every passing moment, ended on Tuesday night by the Digby Board of Trade passing a motion to go along with the resolution passed at a previous meeting of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade held at Middleton, which supported a proposed second New England - Nova Scotia ferry running between Digby and Campobello Island. Another motion passed at the meeting on Tuesday night was that the Digby Board of Trade go on record as being highly in favor of the up-dating of the present CPR service across the Bay of Fundy, but that this not be done in any way which would jeopardize the inauguration of a New England - Nova Scotia service via Digby - Welshpool as was recommended through the Margison Associates report.

The whole discussion arose when reports were given by Reigh Jayne, president, and Charles Haliburton, who were part of a delegation which submitted a brief before Premier Robert L. Stanfield and members of the Cabinet of Nova Scotia in Halifax on August 31. Other members from Digby who were in the delegation were C. D. Snow, A. L. Robinson and Edward Twoght. The brief proposed that "the funds which would be made available to the Welshpool ferry be offered to the Canadian Pacific Railway in exchange for their undertaking to provide all aspects of that which is proposed to be offered from Digby, Nova Scotia, to Welshpool, N. B., but at the same time, provide a service including all the commercial and tourist aspects of the same, necessary to answer our needs at present and those which will follow the implementation of such improved service, including piggy-back service and trailer transportation between Digby, N. S., and Saint John, N. B." Such agreement was to contain necessary safeguards in the event the service does not prove adequate. In other words, the brief stated, "our suggestion is that the Canadian Pacific Railway be assisted to take over the complete service anticipated of the Welshpool ferry and that which it was their intention to establish some time ago between Digby, N. S., and Saint John, N. B., and which they would have implemented had it not been for the cost involved.

Mr. Jayne and Mr. Haliburton reported that the Digby members had not had access to the brief before going to Halifax and that there was not an unanimous opinion on the content of the brief as presented. From discussion at the Digby Board of Trade Tuesday night it was sensed that members of the Digby Board feel that the proposed Digby-Welshpool service and the Digby - Saint John service are two different services and that each has a distant purpose.

A resolution from the Municipality of the District of Digby read at the meeting supported the Digby - Welshpool proposed ferry. Letters from Liverpool town and the County of Queens Municipality did not offer support as the County had already supported Shelburne's bid. Appreciation sent by the Board to Hon. W. S. K. Jones on the Margison report was acknowledged by Mr. Jones.

Vincent Snow, having had no reply to his letter to G. C. Thompson of Acadia Lines Ltd., re proposed use of his terminal building and grounds in Digby, said that he would follow this up.

It was decided that until the membership committee had an opportunity to complete its work for 1966, the membership roll of 1965 should be used for sending out notices for the regular meetings.

The president reported that the chairman of the special brochure committee was arranging to have brochures done for the town. These were to be

Digby Clinic Has First

The Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic held in Digby this week had the distinction of being the first in Nova Scotia to use the new plastic bottles which are being adopted for blood donations. From a technical standpoint, these bottles are a great improvement over the glass bottles previously used, and the Halifax Blood Transfusion Depot is justifiably proud to be near the head of the list of users in Canada.

Present at the Digby Clinic were several distinguished visitors who were busily engaged during the afternoon and evening instructing the Nova Scotia Red Cross staff in the new technique required for handling the equipment. These included Mrs. Marjorie Ferguson, National Supervisor, Red Cross Nursing Services, Toronto, and Miss N. Layton, Supervisor of Red Cross Nursing Services for Newfoundland. Also present as an observer was Miss Bourget, of the Montreal Blood Transfusion Depot, where they have yet to introduce the new equipment. Two representatives of the Fenwall organization, Chicago, which supplies the plastic containers, were also in Digby to observe the operation of the clinic and to visit the Digby General Hospital to explain the technique of the new equipment in transfusions before its introduction into the hospital.

The Digby Clinic was held at the Lions Club Hall, sponsored jointly by the Lions Club and the Digby Red Cross Branch, under the direction of E. B. Tufts, Red Cross area chairman. Miss Campbell, R.N., of Halifax, was the nurse in charge, assisted locally by Mrs. Sidney Smith, R.N., and Mrs. Clayton Snow, R.N.

Although the quota set for the clinic was 200, the number of donors registered fell somewhat short with a total of 173. Donors in attendance were from Digby and the surrounding areas as follows: Digby, 75; Bear River, 66; Freeport, 13; Weymouth, 8; Smith's Cove, 4; Deep Brook, 2; Gilbert Cove, 2; one each from Brighton, East Ferry, and Little River.

During the business session, it was reported that an effort was being made to prevent cars from parking in the flower garden area at the approach from the Digby wharf. It was also reported that vandalism was taking place there with refuse cans being overturned, the contents strewn over the grass and one bench so badly damaged that it will have to be replaced or extensively repaired. This garden is maintained by the society as a beautification project within the town and for the convenience of the public and involves much hard work and expense.

Miss Edith Lynch, convener of the annual flower show and tea which was held at the Digby Regional High School, Aug. 10, gave her report. She expressed appreciation to the chairman of the flower committee, to those who brought exhibits, to members and non-members and to all who assisted in many ways to make the event a success. The ox team of Bert Seamone, Baker Settlement, Lunenburg County, taking first place in the light draft pulling contest was nominated to represent the Digby County Exhibition at the Atlantic Winter Fair in Halifax.

The most outstanding display at the exhibition was credited to the Hill-n-Dale Club of Bear River. Each year the club makes an outstanding contribution both in exhibit or display and also by work contribution in various aspects of the fair.

The exhibition opened on Thursday with a special feature of the evening being the CFB Cornwallis band. Jack Harris, president of the Digby County Exhibition extended a welcome and appreciation to those who were present and to all those who had contributed or participated in preparations. Howard Yorke, manager of the exhibition, said that in many areas the number of exhibits had increased substantially over previous years. Chipman Chisholm is secretary.

Help, Help, Help

Help, help, help. That was the cry this year at the Digby County Exhibition. In fact, we understand there has been serious thought given to closing the exhibition because of lack of help.

The Digby County Exhibition is over for 1966. According to the books, there were greater gate receipts than last year. Even though more money could be used, the exhibition is making progress financially. But, as the president said "a dozen people cannot carry on this job". Somehow more people must become involved. We think the Digby County Exhibition is necessary. We think it can prove an asset to the County. We already have given our reasons why we think so. We would, now, like to hear what others think.

The Digby County Exhibition this year was an improvement in quality in many respects. We had heard names mentioned who deserve praise for what they have done to bring about improvements, but for fear of leaving out any one name, we shall not mention any. The result of their labors is their reward.

There was, however, one area in which a drastic improvement was needed this year. In fact, this area has slipped tremendously of late years and this is an area which should be good for revenue. We refer to the Commercial building. Thanks to the Hill'n Dale Garden Club two spaces on each side of the doorway, were taken and this made an attractive entrance. A little further on to the right was a large space occupied by Bear River Home Furnishings Ltd. And here we go out on a limb and against our rules and regulations we congratulate Bobby Benson for a fine commercial display. He sure deserves credit. We are to credit he also assisted with the Hill'n Dale. We believe that besides the ones mentioned there was only one other booth in that commercial building. Where were other business men and firms from all of Digby County? We were told that two car companies had cars displayed there some years ago and each company made a sale of the car on display. We are curious to know how many business houses of any nature would have bought space in that commercial building if they had thought about it earlier. It could be that the committee needs help here. It could be that someone should make the rounds in Digby County to sell that space not only for the extra revenue but to make the exhibition a bigger and better exhibition.

Now, that we have aired that grievance about the lack of occupied space in the commercial building, we want to mention a few other things which showed improvement. There were the quilts. A fine display of thirteen quilts, neatly hung on a line to give full view of their patterns rather than folded in a case. The hooked rugs, too, were of specially fine quality. We want to mention one which definitely took our fancy. It was one with the three dimensional effect containing a pair of yoked oxen. It was done by a man not so young in years who made his own design and dyed the materials himself.

We'd like to comment on the fine display from Beaverbrook Farms Ltd. with their Acadia strawberries, high bush blueberries, celery, squash, cabbage, potatoes and v-count tomatoes. A real asset to the farm products at the exhibition, we are sure. The floral table was well done school exhibits were up to par and were enhanced by a fine seascape mural. The oil paintings, water colors and pencil sketches have added much to the last few Digby County Exhibitions. The home cooking, though probably not as many entries as previously, was all of good quality cooking in 1966.

We are sure those women who put in the hours of scrubbing would not want us to slip up on commenting on the fine scrubbed-clean appearance of the building interior.

Then, while we are on the subject, we might pass on these bits of conversation which we overheard - "If one home in every five brought something to the Digby County Exhibition the show would be made"; "The agriculture industry should gear the exhibition to town people, agriculture is important to the people who sell other commodities"; "all considered, the benefits to the community and all, the exhibition deserves a greater municipal grant".

These things are for us to think about before the fall of 1967. It sounds worth while. But does it matter to you whether or not we have a Digby County Exhibition? Remember, the Digby County Exhibition might not exist for long unless it gets workers to help, help, help.

What One Industry Can Do

We might want to run out and drag an industry into Digby when we read this from C. J. Harris in the Clip-Sheet. We quote "When a town acquires 100 new factory workers it is obvious that the local economy must receive many indirect benefits from the industrial growth. But the extent of these benefits is quite surprising."

"On the average, according to a conservative calculation made by the Canadian National Railways research department, 100 new factory workers means that there will be an additional 117 more people employed in non-manufacturing jobs. There will be three more retail establishments, and \$939,000 more in retail sales per year. The population of the community will increase by 427 more people, of whom 66 will be school children. There will be 131 more households, 393 more telephones, 187 more pas-

Beach cemetery.

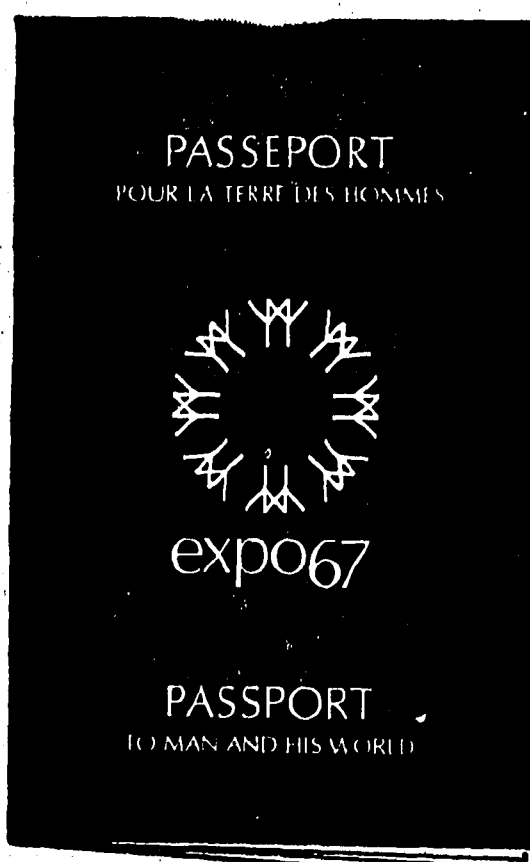
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Rev. Donald P. Amirault Installed At St. Patrick's

An installation service for Rev. Donald P. Amirault, pastor of St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church, Digby, was held at the church on Wednesday evening. The installation ceremony proper was performed by Right Reverend J. Nil Theriault, pastor of St. Louis Church, Annapolis Royal, before a large congregation of priests and parishioners, clergy of other churches in the vicinity and representatives of civic councils and organizations.

Father Amirault was ordained at Yarmouth in 1952 and since then has served in the parishes of Kentville, Digby, and Wolfville before his return to his present parish.

In his remarks His Excellency, Most Reverend Albert Leminger, Bishop of Yarmouth, spoke highly of Rev. Father Amirault's predecessor, Rev. Luke Gaudet, who in his 12 years service in Digby had seen erected the Digby Neck Chapel, parish hall at Marshalltown, renewal of the rectory and the construction of the school occupied by the children. This was accomplished, he said by the priest and parishioners with the help of Almighty God.

One of the most important functions of a priest, the Bishop said, is to preach the message of the Gospel. It is the duty of the parishioners to listen to the voice of those who preach. He spoke of parts of the world where they do not believe in Christ or even in God and try to destroy religion in the world. This, he said, must be resisted.

Rev. Father Amirault in his words to the parishioners and guests pledged his concern to the community as a whole as well as to his duty as a priest of the church. He said a priest must help to build a world where people can live in a manner becoming a human dignity and a child of God. The life of a priest and the ordinary Christian must be concerned both with the things of heaven and those of this world. The priest must build up an earthly city and society guided by the principles of the gospel so that all might live in harmony.

The new priest of St. Patrick's was robed with the stole emblematic of the powers and functions of the priesthood by Rev. Father Theriault who also emphasized the close relationship between bishop & priest.

Father Theriault said it was a boon and mark of the times to see those of other congregations participating in the installation service and noted the progress towards the time that the goal of unification might be obtained. He told the congregation that it is being seen to-day that Christ is far bigger and more expansive than just the sacred spaces.

In the installation service Rev. Father Amirault was conducted to the altar, the tabernacle of the blessed sacrament, to the church doors, symbolic of the caretakers of the House of God, to the bell where the ringing represented an invitation to come, the baptismal font where the gates of love are opened to little children and to the confessional where broken lives come seeking advice and forgiveness. One of the greatest functions of the priest is to teach, charged Father Theriault, and Father Amirault proceeded to the pulpit to address the audience.

Randall Comeau's 2nd Trial Opens In Yarmouth

Robert Randall Comeau, 21-year-old Digby fisherman went on trial for his life for the second time this week, as a new trial ordered July 5 by a full bench of the Nova Scotia Supreme Court opened in Yarmouth, Tuesday, before Chief Appellate Justice, L. D. Currie.

Comeau was sentenced to hang when he was convicted April 20 of the capital murder of 16-year-old Halifax school girl, Thais Marie Haskins. Her nude, stabbed, and battered body was found in a clump of bushes off Yarmouth's Tooker Street not far from a relative's home where she was returning from a teenage dance.

After an appeal, the full bench of the Supreme Court ordered a new trial on grounds that the jury in the first trial should have heard more psychiatric evidence. A new 12-man petit jury has been chosen.

Witnesses called on Tuesday were Cpl. Clifford Follet, Yarmouth RCMP; Killam Noah, who discovered the girl's body; Timothy Moulaison, foreman of Yarmouth's public works department, who testified that he and a crew of six men found a knife with wet blood on it and its blade broken, while cutting grass and alders on the north side of Tooker Street on the same day or the day following the murder.

Comeau is represented by Philip R. Woolaver, of Digby, and James Reardon is Crown Prosecutor. The trial continues.

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About This And That

Digby Board of Trade Stand

Knowing all the problems encountered in the past years in Digby's push for improved ferry service, we cannot help but be in sympathy with the Digby Board of Trade in their stand to stick by their bid for a proposed second New England - Nova Scotia ferry between Digby and Campobello Island, the idea of which had been put into a brief and had also been supported by the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, we believe, after changing Digby to "somewhere in the Annapolis Basin".

Already when in Digby in the month of June, Hon. Allan MacEachen had stated that the federal government regards the Digby - Saint John service an essential one and does not intend to permit the service to be discontinued. In elaborating on that statement he said a comparative study of transportation services in the Atlantic provinces was undertaken last year by the federal government. This study is still in progress and includes a detailed assessment of the best way of maintaining and improving the transportation of passengers, motor cars, trucks, buses and so on, across the Bay of Fundy, between Digby and Saint John. I think it is only right and sensible that we wait until this study is completed and its findings considered before we contemplate any definite and specific plans for the Digby - Saint John Service. This would indicate assurance of this route, we would think.

Further in mentioning the proposed second N.E. - N.S. ferry the honorable minister said "the federal government has consistently recognized the importance of economic transportation facilities for Nova Scotia and I am confident that this recognition will be continued and extended in the immediate years ahead." Referring to the Margeson Associates Ltd. report he said this would be considered carefully by both the Canadian government and the government of Nova Scotia.

It has already been established that a second ferry between New England and Nova Scotia is necessary. A survey by competent people has recommended Digby - Welshpool as the shortest and most economic. This, we would think, is totally apart from the already established and still necessary Digby - Saint John route. We therefore find a little difficult to see why so suddenly there was necessity for a brief to be submitted by the A.V.A.B.T. to the Premier of Nova Scotia and members of the Cabinet. The brief requested "Canadian Pacific Railway be assisted to take over the complete service anticipated of the Welshpool ferry and that which it was their intention to establish some time ago between Digby, N. S., and Saint John, N. B., and which they would have implemented had it not been for the cost involved".

Maybe we need to be enlightened. Maybe we are in the dark on certain facts but we are not inclined to think that a second N.E. - N.S. ferry, even out of Digby, would be detrimental to the Digby - Saint John service, which by all means, warrants some updating, if possible. We do still suggest that a good wharf to be used by both ferries is essential.

She told her prospective employer that she could make the laundered clothes the snowiest white you ever saw (she didn't name the soap brand) and if her hoped-to-be employer didn't like them like that she could make them the prettiest "yaller" you'd ever want. Maybe, for the sake of the art gallery, it was better that they did.

Father and I took twins. He took first shift in. I took first shift out, minding the kids. The father of the family is the sort of art viewer who knows what he likes. He can do an art gallery in twenty minutes when he is alone, although when he is with me, we stop and talk, and discuss, which is more fun.

I am less certain, and more snobbish. I don't know very much about painting, but having read Time magazine, I know what was current the year before last, and can put up a fairly knowledgeable front about it. When father came out to watch the children, I went in. I was a bit disappointed at not being able to impart my meagre knowledge to my culture-starved children, but I was determined to soak up culture for the whole snobbish family.

His Majesty had suggested I start in the basement. The major exhibit down this time was a display of Maritime artists. It rather flattered my snobbish ego to read the base plates under the pictures and realize that I had more than a nodding acquaintance with at least four of the artists exhibiting. Only one artist in the group, a woman from Halifax, showed the amorphous, thickly painted, abstract type of position which about five years ago made up the major part of painting. Maybe it is the influence of the new plastic paints, but artists are using thinner coats of paint these days. Lines are harder now, edges are well defined and meticulousness is the keynote of Maritime paintings. There are abstracts, but they are done in definite shapes. One Sackville artist does more intricate, scroll-like patterns on board the size of a card table. Alex Colville, as he has done for years, weaves in a painted brush strokes of single colors into a whole which the eye translates into a photographic sort of realism. Christopher Pratt and Tom Forrestall, both of whom shared credit for the growth of their precise painting, which in a very obvious way stops short of being a photographic reproduction, and near the essence of the artist. Pratt's pictures, with water and paint, the flowers on the table, the background, the boat, the cluttered details, the figures, and a variety of every trade of grass, when you see a photograph of a Forrestall painting, it is as if you were looking at a photograph.

On the main floor of the gallery, two rooms flank a central hall. The room to the left houses Canadian paintings. Alex Colville and Tom Forrestall are represented there, in several works, company as Cornelius Kraghoff, Emily Carr, and the outstanding Group of Seven. There are several works by early amateur painters as well, so the room is fairly representative of Canadian painting throughout our history, and through a change of style.

Across the hall are the European paintings. I like, here, to try to convince myself I have not forgotten what little I ever knew about painting, by trying to guess the artists and dates of the works. This trip was made, when I guessed, in front of a portrait of a peasant girl, Dante Gabriel Rossetti, 1865. The brass plate under the picture read Dante Gabriel Rossetti, 1862. I patted myself on the back all the way out to the front hall.

Like a child, I leave the best for the last. The best picture in the Lord Beaverbrook Gallery, to my mind, is the great Salvador Dali, Santiago El Grande, in the main hall. To my mind, the museum could have been built for that picture, and if it only housed that one, it would be worth visiting.

Like all of Dali's paintings, this one is full of enigma and paradox. Mostly, the picture is blue, an intense, electric emotion - charged blue which always moves me to tears. The figure of Saint John, on the great, rearing horse which is the central figure, is foreshortened as we look up at it. The head of the horse is painted hard, as if it had the texture of stone, but it is unmistakably flesh. The outline of the body and legs of the animal are blurred, so faintly, that they seem to be quivering. The rider and his mount cast a shadow on the sea from which they are rising, as if the sea were solid, but it is unmistakably liquid. A woman (Dali's wife) stands in the lower right hand corner of the picture. She is draped in a grey cloak, from which only part of her

I realize the government is behind most of these things for adults and tourists to do but what is there for the children between ten a.m. and six p.m. except play around on their bicycles or go from yard to yard continually crossing the streets. - So I guess its up to us parents to start something in town so come on some organization get behind us and I'm sure you'll have full support from the parents.

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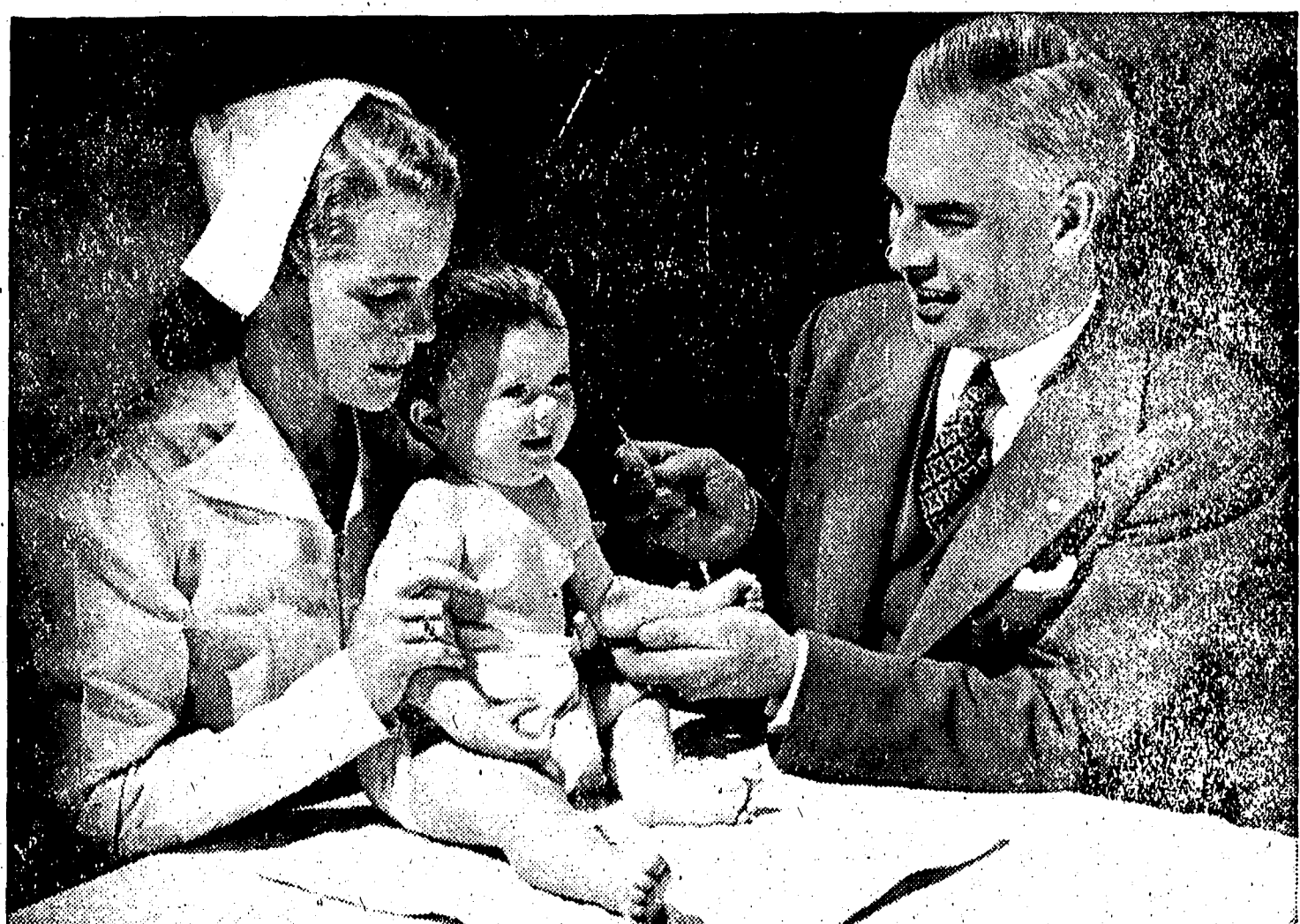

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Plan Centennial Reformed Baptist Merge At Clare

A general meeting of various organizations of the Municipality of Clare was held at the Little Brook court house with Dr. Julius Comeau of Meteghan as chairman. Special guests were Squadron leader Madill, representing the various armed force branch and Lorne Huff, co-ordinator for Provincial and local Centennial celebration.

Bethany Bible College in Sussex, New Brunswick will be the church's only Bible school.

E.M.O. Notes

This series of notes is written for the purpose of informing the general public on the structure, aim and functions of the Emergency Measures Organization.

The Emergency Measures Organization involves the three levels of government: The Federal Government by authority of "The Civil Emergency Measures Planning Order P. C. 1965 1041", which supersedes previous authority; The Provincial Government by authority of Provincial Legislation (in Nova Scotia the authority is "Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1958, Chapter 2", assented to May 3, 1958); the Municipal Government by authority of Municipal Legislation (this authority is a Municipal By-law in the case of a single Municipality, and a Municipal By-law and a Mutual Agreement in the case of an organization of a joint nature, involving two or more municipalities).

The Canada Emergency Measures Organization (Federal level) comprises the Director General and Headquarters Staff, Regional Directors in each province, the Canadian Emergency Measures College, Federal Government Departmental Planning Staffs and Federal Government Organizations in the Provinces.

The Canada Emergency Measures Organization Headquarters is located in Ottawa. Regional Offices are located in each of the ten provinces.

In order to facilitate administration, assistance and training, the provinces are divided into Zones. The Province of

The Duplex Is Running

We have many people to thank for being able to print The Digby Courier on our 16 ton Duplex press this week. First and foremost, we have to thank Vernon Bent who took almost complete responsibility in arranging and planning towards this big day right from the day we rushed home from C.W.N.A. in Saint John and dashed immediately to Yarmouth to buy the press. Then, too, we had several men from the shop who used not only their brain but also their brawn in getting this giant into the shop and set up. We're not sure what we needed the more of those two capacities but we know we would have been completely sunk without the brawn.

There was Ernest Lohndorf from the Goss Printing Company in Chicago. Ernie took a "few dollars" back to Chicago but without Ernie the press would still be in totally disassembled mess on the floor.

We certainly can't forget Charles Balser from Bear River and his crew. How that man was able to keep his sanity in all that jumbled up mess and commotion only himself will know. Having been first given the wrong blueprints from Yarmouth, Mr. Balser had to bring some semblance of order out of chaos. When Balser wasn't in Ernie's way Ernie was in Balser's but eventually it all worked out without the man from Chicago and the man from Bear River getting into too much turmoil.

Then, too, the work in the back shop had to go on while three and four good men concentrated on the duplex assembling. Those who carried on deserve our appreciation.

As for the front shop, they survived under cold and trying circumstances. With the furnace of necessity disconnected often three and four of the staff huddled around electric heaters in a 6x9 office. We hand it to our female office staff. Somebody of less staunch calibre would have quit, we are sure, but they saw us through.

As for the editor, someone who has always cringed and found a better place to be even when two-ton machines were moved in, refrained from picking up and moving to warmer climes, despite the temptation. A right noble character that editor was, no doubt about it. Lack of personal finances, however, we're sure, played the greatest part in keeping her so staunch and sterling like.

Then, there were all you understanding people to be thanked. We can count on our one little finger the number of people whom we might say were in the least bit rude. But, we, too, were understanding of their distress.

There were the transporting people. Their job was a big one. There was Stan Vidito who saw that our forms got to the Monitor Office in Bridge-town Monitor. Of course, they'll be paid but you don't throw in another newspaper to print for two weeks without disturbing routine somewhat, to be sure.

Oh, yes, there are those of you who sent cheques. They were a most necessary part of the operation and continue to be. So, folks, we're still expecting cheques from those who have not remitted. Maybe you'll save us from calling on you by just dropping your cheque in the mail.

And now to tell you something of the "Monster" a term which seemed to delight so many of our readers. Our old press, a "Whitlock" was capable of printing four pages of 8 columns each at the rate of 1,000 impressions per hour. Our circulation being in the vicinity of 3,500, it therefore took about four hours to print four pages. If we printed eight pages it took in time of course eight hours and another four hours on another machine to fold. This made a total of twelve hours.

On the Duplex, which we have just erected, we print eight pages at a time and it comes out of the press folded, ready for mailing. The time taken is one hour.

An Early Start

We were delighted to hear that already plans are underway for next year's Digby County Exhibition. That is, we are told, if enough workers can be obtained. Other years the first meeting used to be in March, but, encouraged by the result of this year's fair the committee has already had its first meeting and laid plans for 1967. (That's Centennial year, too.) In some ways the 1966 results were above all expectations and much greater than previous years.

The exhibition is actually sponsored by the Digby County Agricultural Society. Their annual meeting is October 15. With this rejuvenation of the exhibition, the Society is expecting more interest in the annual meeting. They expect more people to come with their membership of one dollar per year, we are told. They are urging new members to come forward. 1966 season tickets, the spokesman encouraged every day. 1966 season tickets have been available each year.

The Butcher, the Baker and the Candlestick Maker

Tomah (Wis.) Journal

"From the time the first newspaper was published, the state and national governments have been asking things "for free" from newspapers under the guise of "news," — and "patriotic duty."

"Many years ago, most people stopped working for nothing, because the butcher, the baker and the candlestick maker had to be paid for the services which they rendered and a money income was therefore needed. At that time the daily newspapers established a pay-as-you-go policy and drew a definite line between news and propaganda. The mail was sorted carefully and the free advertising and propaganda mail were dropped into the wastebasket."

"Weekly newspaper publishers were operating with a shortage of help and didn't have the time to smell of the various releases to determine if they carried news, free advertising or propaganda, with the result that much tripe found its way into print in the small-town newspapers."

"Because free advertising and propaganda were getting into the smalltown papers, government and big business said to themselves — "Why pay the smalltown publisher for his wares when he will give it to us free?" Following that thought, public relations men were hired at big salaries to prepare news copy containing hidden advertising and propaganda until today every editor in the rural area gets three loads of junk mail (with a release date) each day."

"Here at the Tomah Journal office we have to hire a boy to empty seven wastebaskets each evening."

"The thing about the requests for "free" that gets me is that everyone connected with the publicity project gets paid but the publisher. The man who writes the copy is not a poverty problem individual, the paper used is paid for at regular prices, the stenographers who are connected with the project get the going wage, the machines that produce the copy are bought at standard prices — in fact, everyone but the publisher gets his just cut on the deal!"

We felt the Tomah Journal had expressed our sentiments better than we could so we use their words in preference to our own. The truth of the matter is that we were planning to write a similar thing when our eyes spied the above in the Publisher's Auxiliary. We hope our sentiments reach the desks of many public relations personnel for last week we had occasion to call the attention of a certain company to the fact that they were expecting us to use their free publicity releases in our columns but as far as we could see their paid advertising was going other places. Just didn't seem to add up right for us.

In fact, we might as well make a further comment while we are at it. Just as we cannot give away space free or do our printing free of charge, neither can anyone else. So don't be fooled by the word "free". We are thinking particularly of the hundreds of dollars going out of Nova Scotia for cook books. The line here isn't quite as bad as free for at least they request some price per copy for the book even if it is a low price on the surface of it all. Remember that to the price of the book you must also actually figure that you are paying what the firm, instead of you, collects in advertising revenue. That could be a hundred dollars or a thousand. Any hometown printer would like the same deal of keeping the advertising revenue but the most annoying part of the outsider's game is that they make it appear that the money is going to the local organization or the job is being done locally by tagging along some hometown person in the sales campaign.

There is no difficulty in finding out whether or not you paid too much for your whistle. Get the price per page and multiply by the number of advertising pages. The Kiwanis Clubs of Digby and Weymouth (we don't think this is any secret) have been making a tidy sum off their advertising pages in the Courier at Easter and July 1st respectively. They pay the regular rate for the space and the rest is their profit. Cook books and brochures can be done the same way. Right now we have before us a booklet with 38 pages of advertising. We expect it was \$25 per page. That was \$950. Must have been a fair profit.

Costs Nothing To Create Good Feeling

A Board of Trade receives many inquiries in a year that many do not know about. It is little things that are done that sometimes blossom out to something well worth while. 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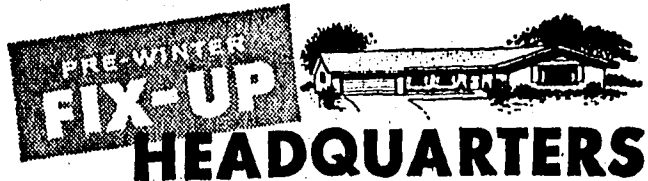

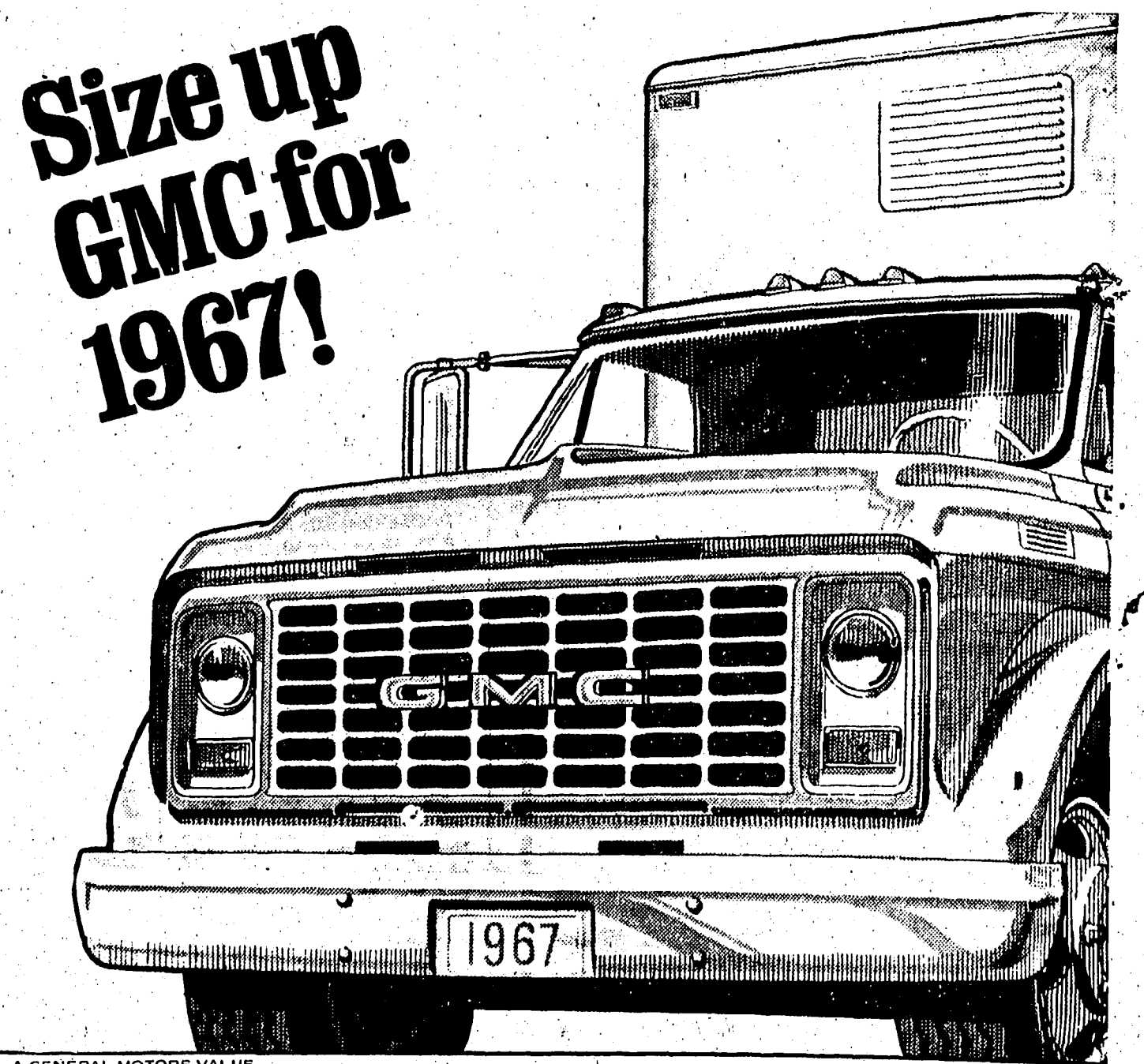

Milk Price Jumps On Islands

Increase of three cents in milk price is felt at Islands Consolidated School at Freeport.

Coming into affect last week, school children paid ten cents for their white or chocolate milk.

Most parents of the children attending school are protesting the rising cost of milk. They feel that such a small amount of milk (a little more than a cupful) does not warrant such a price. Those who refuse to buy the milk are resorting to the not-so-nutritious drink powders, and syrups, canned milk with water added and chocolate milk made at home for their children's lunches.

When the Islands Consolidated School first opened about four years ago milk at that time cost six cents. Toward the closing of last year school term the price rose to seven cents. Last week to ten cents.

Parents who have three or more children in school feel they cannot readily afford the extra amount. For three children, milk would cost thirty cents per day, \$1.50 per week.

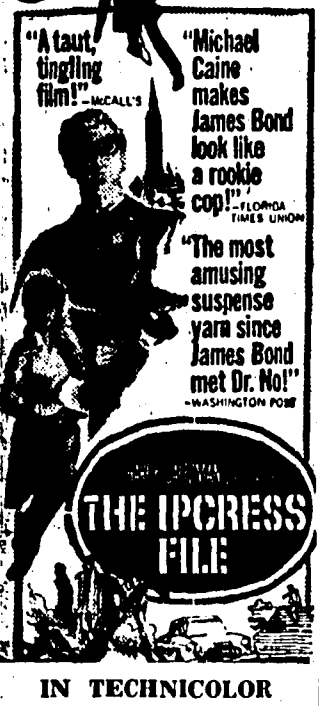

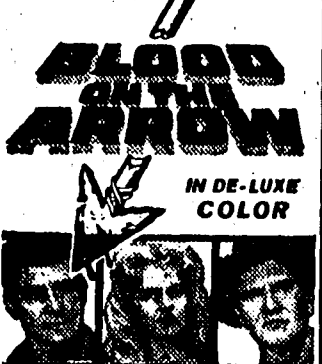

The girl and the girl's mother, who had been screaming and shouting, were told by the jury that they had experienced this scene before - once in Halifax after an incident near the Angus L. MacDonald bridge where he and a friend with whom he was visiting came upon a large crowd gathered about an injured man lying on the ground, covered with blood. He had returned to the friend's house and they talked about what it would feel like to be beaten up. He fell asleep and when he awoke later there was "a great noise of yelling, shouting and screaming, as it seemed to him, going on all about him".

Dr. Angus said Comeau had told him that another time while walking after midnight in Digby a "noise of shouting, screaming and yelling broke out all about him again" - he was frightened and when he saw people approaching he hid until they passed and then the noise stopped. Dr. Angus concluded that Comeau was probably suffering from a Comeau Convicted Non-Capiform of hysteria - a definite and accepted form of mental illness - and was incapable of deliberating upon an act which lead to death of another person, or of formulating a plan for such an act.

Dr. F. L. D. Young, senior psychiatrist at the Nova Scotia Hospital, said he examined Comeau August 18 and was given a similar account about hearing the great noise and of following and stabbing a girl. He said Comeau told him of hearing sometimes, particularly at bedtime, female screaming and jumbled voices. He also said Comeau stated he had had a number of blackouts. Dr. Young said he was impressed by the accused's complete emotional indifference to the crime. There was no evidence of physical brain damage in the accused, he said. Comeau couldn't have planned such an act or deliberated upon it, he concluded. At the time of the stabbing, he said, the accused would have been in a state according to the law.

Psychiatrist Donald L. Stacy, also with the Nova Scotia Hospital, said he interviewed Comeau briefly August 26, 1965, and was told a similar story of the night of the murder. He concluded as did Dr. Young, that Comeau showed no signs of psychosis - but he had tentatively felt that "at the time of the crime he probably was in an emotional state I would consider would be compatible with hysteria". He said Comeau was not insane in the medical sense. Dr. Stacy added that he felt Comeau "did not have the mental capacity to plan or deliberate on this act".

In a twenty-minute address to the jury, Yarmouth Crown Prosecutor James Reardon reviewed the evidence and said it left "no reasonable doubt the accused committed this brutal act of murder". Defence counsel Philip Woolaver of Digby argued in a forty-minute summary that no one had identified the murder weapon (a pocket knife)

Immediately prior to the time the statement was said to have been given, he said, an RCMP officer had talked with Comeau for three-quarters of an hour during which Comeau described his activities the night before and that story in no way connected him with the crime. Finally, he referred to the psychiatric evidence and said it was unanimous in indicating that the accused's mental state was such such that he would be unable to plan or deliberate on the act he was accused of. If the jury agreed, he said, they had no alternative, if they found the accused guilty at all, but to find that he was not guilty of capital murder but guilty of non-capital murder.

Westport Tourist Haven

Westport, Brier Island a small island at the tip end of Digby Neck has been placed on the map this summer. Hundreds of tourists have crossed the ferries connecting it to the mainland of Nova Scotia. Route 17 from Digby brings the tourist along paved roads to East Ferry by ferry to Tiverton on Long Island still on route 17 to Freeport, thence by ferry to Brier Island.

There are numerous sights to see. Western Lighthouse and look up the shore is a beautiful sight. At Northern Lighthouse on a clear day a person can see for miles out to sea. The high cliffs at Green Head towering one hundred feet in the air, the cairn erected at Southern Point in memory of Capt. Joshua Slocum.

As one visitor to the island was heard to say, he came with the impression that the island was just a place for the birds to nest and a few shacks built out over the water for the "natives" to live in, but once he arrived his mind was changed.

The island is approximately three miles long by a mile at the widest. It is far from the description above, maybe not fancy but it can boast of paved roads, beaches for swimming, electricity, telephone and most of the every day necessities.

There is "fishing", for a living and for sport, as has been witnessed this year at Southern Point, in the passage between. The best fishing is when the Brier Island and Peters Island, tide is on the ebb (that is running out). Cod and pollock weighing 30 to 50 pounds have been caught, on feathered jigs by the local fishermen and on rod and reels by tourists, some of whom were Randall Spooner and family of West Peabody, Mass.; Dan Hunt and family of Rhode Island; Robert Hunt and family of North Carolina; Joseph Hunt of Maryland.

Another interested visitor was Charles R. Meyer who is with Sportfishing magazine. He came by trailer and stayed a few days taking pictures of local fishermen, some sport fishermen, even took pictures filleting the fish. He spoke highly of the fishing and said anyone could go a long way before they would find a spot more suitable for salt water fishing from the rocks.
