Anderson, veteran of two wars (earned world and Korean), was awarded the Victoria Cross; Santee L. Smith, now prominent druggist; for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale lobster merchant; and myself.

As a young treasurer I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day "Mac" said to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read it aloud to two somewhat different groups of the men who was found marooned on a French Island some place on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Duffy County. When I read this man's tongue had been cut out and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

## DIGBY WATER IMPROVED

Provincial health authorities reported that Digby milk and water were, both satisfactory, it was learned at a meeting of the town council on Monday night. It was also expected that the discoloration through mineral matter would be relieved since the supply would be switched back to come from the lake instead of the lower dam.

It was reported that the lake channel had been dredged and the screen chamber taken care of. The screen is now considered to be effective. There has been no experience of eels in the town lines for some time, it was reported.

## NO REPORT ON SCHOOL EXTENSION

Councillor Gregg Gilliat in his report to the Digby Town Council on Monday night as representative on the urban and Digby Regional High School Board said that he had no report on the proposed new extension to the school. A brief is being prepared for publication, he advised.

Mr. Gilliat reported that there are 1200 pupils in the schools. All teaching posts have been filled. A new industrial arts department has been installed and a new auxiliary class of 12 pupils

has been added. There being no more room in the Digby Regional High School a public school class has been housed in St. Patrick's Convent. This had necessitated the moving of furniture and utilizing basement space for rooms. This, however, has accommodated all classes so that none has had to be staggered as in 1966-67.



## PERFECT SCORE IN TRAP SHOOT

Herbert Margolian, a well known local merchant, won the "Nova Scotia Hunters Meet" Trap Championship at Lunenburg with a perfect score of 50 x 50.

Two building permits were granted. Ernest Balser was given permission for the addition of a room 10 by 18 to his residence on West Street and Jehovah's Witness were given permission to build a library 10 by 15 on Kingdom Hall and an additional room, 10 by 15 to the apartment. Both permissions were granted providing the Building Code requirements were adhered to.

A committee was made to make further investigation into the request by Canadian Petrofina to have a sign installed 48 by 18 inches at the corner of Warwick St. and 1st Avenue. An application for a taxi licence was made by Loran Hayden. Since town by-laws call for ten taxi licenses and there are now ten licenses granted, Mr. Hayden's application was refused.

Councillor Stewart MacNaughton reported that he, along with Councillors Hoare, Paul Winchester, and Gregg Gilliat had met with other members of the arbitration committee at which time the amount of 22.8 per cent of the shared costs of the new Registry of Deeds Office at Weymouth would be allotted to Digby town.

It was announced that Lloyd Hill and Bernard LeBlanc of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade would meet with the town council at their regular session on Nov. 6 at which time they would tell what AVABT had accomplished and what the plans are for the future.

with her husband. Her book "Maritain on the Nature of Man in a Christian Democracy" was published in 1953.

Concurrently with her studies and during the Second World War, Mrs. Michener was the Chairman of the Mothers' Placement Committee of the Committee for British Overseas Children in the University of Toronto. The Micheners also looked after three children, British war guests.

When her husband was Speaker of the House of Commons, she was the Honorary President of the Commonwealth Women's Association and did not leave home together with the members of Parliament and Senators, the wives of the members of the Canadian House of Commons.

In New Delhi, her husband was the first Canadian missionary to India. She was the President of the Digby Commonwealth Women's Association, and worked for relief in the Bengal famine areas.

Mrs. Michener speaks both French and English fluently.

Her husband and Mrs. Michener have three daughters and two granddaughters.

In 1967, Mrs. Michener was made a Dame of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.

## Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 8 to 14

This newspaper has said it before, and it will say it again and again, there is no sadder news than the death by fire of children in the home. And the shadow deepens when the headlines read: "We left them alone only a few minutes . . ."

To parents and guardians of the young let it be known that, besides various provincial laws the Criminal Code of Canada (section 189) reads:

"Everyone who unlawfully abandons or exposes a child who is under the age of 10 years, so that its life is or is likely to be endangered or its health is or is likely to be permanently injured, is guilty of an indictable offence and is liable to imprisonment for two years."

People have a duty to their children, to the community and to themselves to see that the youngsters are properly looked after.

## Have Your Premises Checked For Dangers

Shame (over an untidy house), fear (of consequences), ignorance (of what it's all about) — forget these things if you have an ounce of commonsense. Welcome the fire fighter if he knocks at your door, suggesting a look-see for fire hazards.

Close your door to fire, keep it open for fire prevention. This neatly describes the philosophy of Canada's campaign for greater fire safety in the home, on the job, and everywhere. In plants, office buildings, stairwells, fire doors must be kept closed. Why? To shut off live air (oxygen) from fueling a fire. In the home, too, a closed door will slow down the spread of fire.

But because three-quarters of all fires happen in the home, and because the basic hazards are quite simple (over-fusing, frayed wiring, faulty heaters, careless smoking habits, rubbish and the like) their elimination will go a long way in prevention. Hence the purpose of the fire fighter's call. But why wait for the fire fighter? Check these hazards yourself. Or call the fire chief and make an appointment.

## Newspaper Week, October 8 to 14

The story of newspaper's services to their communities is a never-ending one and illustrates one of the principal concepts of newspaper publishing, to serve the community and its individuals at all times. Newspapers represent the greatest single force that exists anywhere for service to the public.

To inform is the newspaper's main purpose, but it also serves as the community conscience, keeping a watchful eye on government, clarifying public issues, and using its influence as a constructive force for community growth and development. There are thousands of examples of dramatic public services performed by newspapers every year. The list is too long to present here, but they include services resulting in:

- Making the community a better place in which to live Greater health and safety.
- Better housing.
- Sponsorship of sports and entertainment.
- Support of improvements in education and schools.
- Supporting fund raising for social benefits, etc.

Many newspaper community services are especially designed for individual areas or needs, while others are services applied generally in most communities. Regardless of the origin, if a need exists for service to the public or the community, newspapers will normally be in the forefront of the action, either telling the story or leading the way, or doing both.

## Weeklies Are Important

Weeklies are important in politics as well as elsewhere, Harold E. Everson, publisher of the 2,514-circulation weekly Reporter, told the Democratic County Committee meeting in Madison, Wis., recently.

"You can't expect to spend all your money in metropolitan newspapers and with other media," he stressed, "and send the weekly newspapers free press releases and expect to see them printed."

Everson compared the weekly with the all-important precinct worker: "You have to have leaders on top, but it takes the precinct worker at the grassroots level, who knows how the people think and feel, to get out the vote and help win elections."

## Power Of The Press

A speaker at a recent convention provided a humorous but classic example of one way to impress a businessman on the power and influence of newspapers, reports the 2,533-circulation weekly Courier in Thorp, Wis.

Ask the man to imagine, he said, that he has been arrested on the square for being drunk and disorderly with a lady other than his wife.

Then ask him if he'd rather have a picture of the event appear for five seconds on television, 20 seconds on radio, or on the front page of his local newspaper.

Ridiculous? Maybe. But the obvious answer tells it all.

## All Hail! Water Improved

Just when we had started dreaming of a white Christmas when everybody would give us in Digby gifts of clean white (really white) bed clothes, table cloths, towels and necessary white wearing apparel then we hear the water situation in Digby has improved. Gee, the merchants might not clean up on a white Christmas in Digby after all.

Anyway, the announcements at Town Council on Monday night that the milk and water in Digby were free of bacteria and that the horrible colored water would now be as clear as crystal proved that the Digby Water Commission and Town Council had their men working on our behalf all the time. In fact, we understand they tried hard to be ready to switch over from the lower dam to the lake before Monday's wash day but couldn't make it. A little griping in the right places doesn't hurt sometimes but some of these things take time to accomplish and the wheels are often turning when we are so busy griping that we can't clearly see the wheels in action. Dear Sir,

It's a well known fact that Bear River kids get more than average exercise than kids that live in flat areas. Our Bear River hills are noted not only for scenery but a way to build strong legs.

For school children who live about a mile and must take lunches it does present a problem at noon hour. Not so long ago the noon "hour" was a full 90 minutes. Then the busses came and ten minutes was cut off. Not long after this another 10. Now 70 minutes is the noon hour.

It has been hearsay that lunches must not be brought to school unless a child lives over a mile or something to that effect. That's not quite clear.

Now we know the Department of Health recommends a good noon meal, when possible and after sometimes a hasty breakfast (some don't have any appetite in the morning) and it should not be devoured too hastily. Allowing 25 minutes for the walk each way and leaving 20 for the meal should be OK, but it doesn't always work out that way. Most have an up hill walk nearly all the way. For children in grade one and two a near mile walk is quite far, not counting the distractions such as snow ball fights, and the like. Walking is not always the best, and there are times the snow plow "hasn't come yet". Never the less they must not be late.

Noon time lunch periods are a bit noisy and the less the better for the teachers. However there are times when both parents must be away and in this case some parents feel are exceptions, in spite of the fact the teachers feel they are "baby sitting" at school. But really, to expect seven year old kids to walk nine tenths of a mile, get their own dinner regardless of the weather, is a little too much to expect.

There should be exceptions. The length of the hill, the age of the child, the severity of the storm, and in cases of absolute necessary absence of both parents at noon hour. We parents do not want to burden the teachers any more than necessary, as they have them long enough, but I am sure a happy medium can be worked out.

Sitting at home this Saturday, Sept. 30th, reminiscing, wondering what the future holds for us in this part of the province and if our progress will be as backward in the future as it has been in the past, I will try to give you a resume as brief as possible.

Annapolis Royal, oldest town in North America, has become a memorial heritage, plants, factories and wharves have gone. Port Wade had the largest spile pier in North America, that is gone; light-house in cow pasture, railway station, round-house, general store, mill, Port Wade ferry services, ship building, and fishing have all disappeared. Victoria Beach has lost freight service, freight sheds, waiting rooms, ferry service, bus service, school maintenance ignored, fishing wharves, fish plants and stores have disappeared.

Digby had one of the most modern box facilities, mill and everything that goes with its operation, employing at one time more than four hundred men, that is gone. Maritime National Fish had an enormous operation, that is gone. Ferry services and facilities are a disgrace to Digby, it's impossible to get pure water in Digby without boiling it. Petite Passage still employs scows for trans-

portation, not as modern as it was fifty years ago.

Modern education, sophisticated society has done a fine job transplanting our society into a fool's paradise, progress in reverse. Many more issues I will omit, but when you hear conversation as to what our government has done, it is time to stop and ask yourself, have we got a government? If so, who is our representative?, and why have we become apathetic?

Ordinarily the tides rise for six hours, and ebb for six hours, but in the Counties of Annapolis and Digby it is all ebb tide. When there is a rise here, it's another birth, to be taxed to death, to further streamline our modern sophisticated society, that the road of apathy may be glazed with more sparkling mirages.

Why have we allowed sectionalism to drift into oblivion?

The persons whose names follow were closely identified with the early days of golfing. - Aubrey Brown, Dr. W. F. Read, A. Boden, F. W. Nichols, T. E. G. Lynch, P. W. Holdsworth, Fred McBride, Fritz Dakin, Frank Anderson, E. R. Mowbray, and Major Daley.

Miss Edith Lynch informs me that in the beginning, the woodshed at the back of the Lynch residence was used as a temporary club house until one was erected on the west side of King Street, across the street from her home. The Lynch residence was situated on the ground now occupied by the Odd-fellows Hall.

The lady members were important to the club and one of their functions was assisting at V.O.N. teas held weekly at the clubhouse at which a nominal charge of 25 cents was made. Mr. Norman Wright is in possession of a photograph of one of the afternoon teas in which the following can be identified, Mrs. T. E. G. Lynch, Mr. A. Boden, Mrs. Moody, Dr. Read, Mr. T. E. G. Lynch, Mrs. Dakin, Mrs. Frank Anderson. Another photograph shows a member in plus fours getting ready to tee off at No. 4 fairway. In still another picture a large group of approximately 50 is shown at No. 9 green.

In 1915 ticket sales amounted to 90.

The Saint John Globe, June 23, 1916 refers its readers to the opportunity of playing golf on the new Digby Public Golf Course during the four hours the steamer is tied up at Digby. At the beginning of 1917 expenses for the year were estimated not to exceed \$350 and the club was expected to be self-supporting.

In those early days, The Digby Courier, August 20, states, "The 9 hole course is frequently taxed to capacity especially when play is on for the Pines Hotel Cup, Myrtle Hotel Cup, Harbour View Cup, etc." Names prominent in competitions were R. Bostwick, Fensom a scratch player, Dennison, Hogan, Weatherbee, Read and Stewart.

In conclusion may I say that many interesting items, other than those connected with golf, were read while the opportunity existed.

We bought the two pairs of permanent press pants and two easily ironed shirts so essential to us mothers who do as little ironing as we can get away with, which comprise the school wardrobe, some time in August. As a prize for being good at the dentist, he got his school bag, pencil box, crayons and scribbler, which he showed with great pride to anyone who would look. This child, incidentally, who has been brought up in the ball point pen age had to ask me what an eraser was for. What an age we live in! I remember when ball point pens were a new invention and cost thirty dollars each. Tonight my daughter asked me what ink is.

Our boy had talked with a certain amount of anticipation, and a certain amount of apprehension, for about two years about how busy he would be after he started school, doing what he called "license." At least once a day during this past summer, I remembering that baby he was such a short time ago, have made some remark about him going to school. He would glow with modest pride. I wondered if he knew how scared I was about the great event.

On the evening before the great day, he picked out his outfit for morning, and carefully folded it on the little table beside his bed. "Mummy," he asked a little hesitantly, "these license I'll have to do?" "Yes," I prompted. I did not bother to correct the pronunciation. He may as well not lose all his babyhood at once. "Well, Mummy" he asked, ashamed at having to ask about something he had talked about so long, "how do you do them?"

About 8:30 the following morning, the little boys from up the hill called in. The three of them marched down the driveway together, swinging their new school-bags in unison, trying to look nonchalant. "I feel as if I am sending him to prison," remarked our schoolboy's daddy, watching from the front porch. "He has been so free up until now." I returned to the breakfast dishes, and thought about girl oriented schools, and too many women teachers in the first grades, and maybe he wasn't as bright as I thought he was.

Well, the first month has passed. The routine is still the same. He still folds his clothes in the evening, and he generally remembers to take his school clothes off when he comes home. I complained that a krillion was too big for me to write, but father wrote it quite satisfactorily. A krillion, evidently, starts at the top of the page with a one, takes a whole page of randomly spaced commas and zeros, and ends with a two.

Our schoolboy has learned a few words of a singularly useless nature for delving into the world's literature. Very few masterpieces are written about Dick, Jane, Sally, Tim, Puff and Spot, it seems. So far he does not seem to have encountered spelling, or the writing of letters. He loves to taunt his sister that she does nothing but play, while he has to work hard in school all day. He is already worrying about grade three, which he declares will be "real hard." Sister is put out because she has to wait two more birthdays before she can go to school.

I guess we all had to start somewhere, but from here, the road looks mighty long from Spot and Puff and arduously and imperfectly made 3's to graduation.

Two years in evening classes to complete the course covering four school years and including four subjects. The classes are two hours an evening, two evenings a week for approximately 30 hours each year.

Adults who went as far as grade six, seven, eight, or nine in school may register for this course.

Classes are offered in English, general science, social studies and math.

The course was begun in 1964 using books and materials prepared especially for adults. Almost 1,000 adults enrolled in 51 accelerated academic evening classes the first year the course was offered. The following year enrollment increased to 1,600 in 93 classes.

Other popular courses include new math for parents, English for new Canadians, conversational French, typing, current events and navigation.

The cultural services section of the adult education division sets up evening classes, short courses, workshops, conferences and residential schools for adults, offering professional help, advice and instruction in the fields of music, drama, painting, creative writing, sculpture and design and in weaving, silver jewelry, rug hooking, leatherwork, textile decoration and ceramics.

If 10 persons want a specific course not advertised and a teacher is available it can probably be arranged. For most courses there is no fee. For non-academic courses there may be a small charge. Cost of courses are borne by the school board and the Department of Education, and sometimes by a sponsoring organization.

In some centres, guidance counsellors will be available to advise and assist the adult students by furnishing information on the courses and opportunities available, assessing the educational background of the student and helping in selecting a program of study most suitable to the individual's needs.



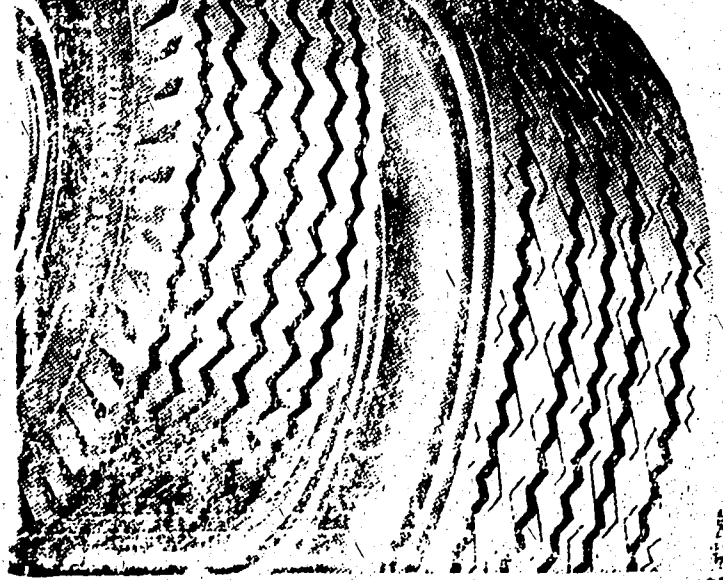

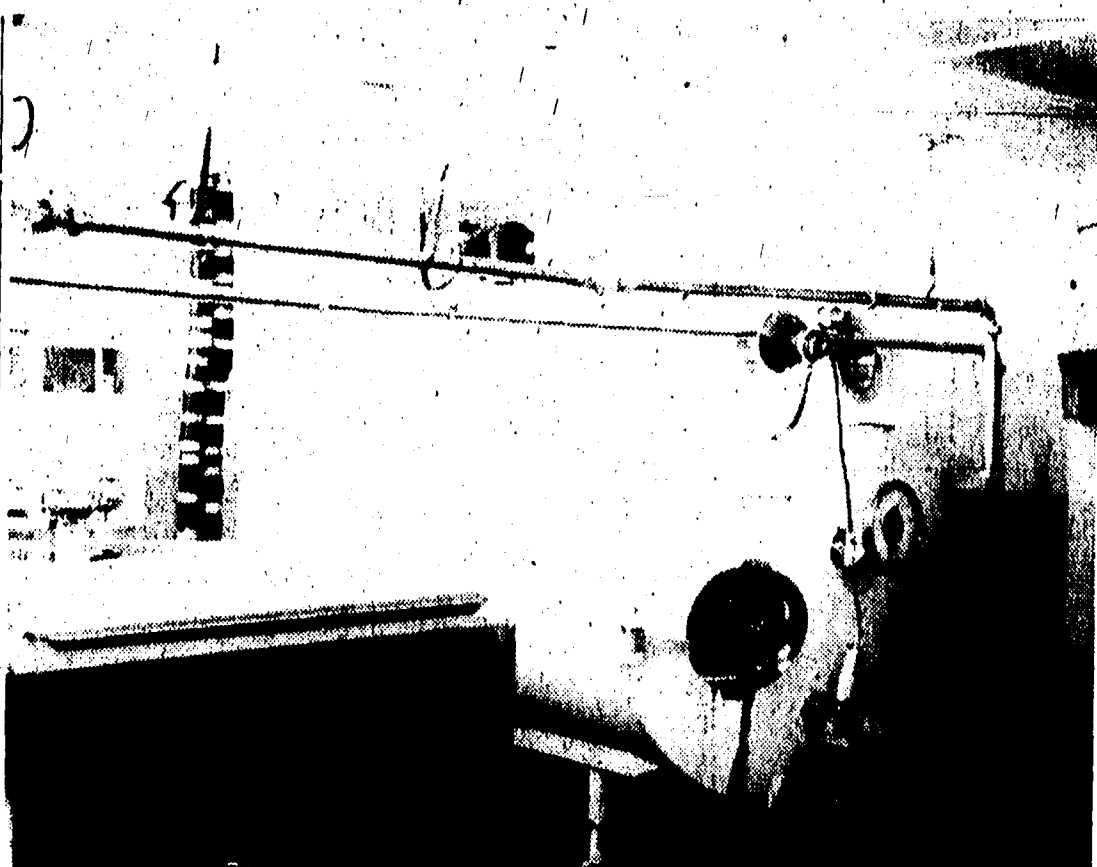


## Refrigeration Most Important In Milk Process

### HANDLING OF MILK AT THE PLANT

At the milk plant the product is first weighed, tested, checked for flavour, and periodically checked for bacteria, etc. Any milk not measuring up to the processing plant's requirements is rejected. Only qualifying milk is processed for consumption by customers of the local processing plant. After the milk is dumped and weighed at the dairy, it is forced through filters into holding tanks which hold the milk at approximately 40 degrees temperature for a period of a few hours until it has been pasteurized.

There are various kinds of pasteurizing processes. Our Digby plant has a vat process which requires that the milk be heated to 145 degrees for thirty minutes. This heating process is recorded, automatically on a chart, allowing dairy officials to check full particulars of any vat that has been treated in this manner. After this process is carried on the milk is then carried through stainless steel pipes to a cooler, where it is cooled to about 38 degrees immediately. This shock from heat to cold gives you the pasteurizing process, and in the interim eliminates any harmful elements that might otherwise be in the milk. The pasteurizing process is very rigidly checked by the Provincial Department of

Health, who meticulously take samples, check the processing plant, and in turn make sure that the consuming public is receiving a properly nourishing, sterile, and healthful product.

After this process of heating and chilling, milk is then pumped to a bottler and filler machine. This is a comparatively simple process, and no doubt many of you have seen the operation at your local dairy. At one end of the operation is a bottle-washer, which receives all the bottles, puts them through a 20 minute sterilization process, which uses steam, hot

water, and a sterilizing agent. The bottle then is passed under the filling cup and with a spring lifting motion the milk automatically seeps into the bottle and passes on to the capper. From there it is checked by the pasteurizing foreman, put in cases and carried to the dairy's cooler.

The refrigeration aspect of milk is very important, as you have read. Immediately milk is removed from the cow it goes into refrigeration to have the animal heat removed. While it is being held for delivery to the dairy it is

kept at low temperature, then, as soon as it has been pasteurized it is again kept in refrigeration. It is a credit to the processing procedures in this part of the area that milk has been known to be kept as long as seven or eight weeks in refrigeration with no apparent deterioration. This speaks well for the processing method and for the product that the farmer passes on to the dairy. From the dairy's cooler the milk is put in our vehicles and delivered to the various consumers, homes, institutions and stores.

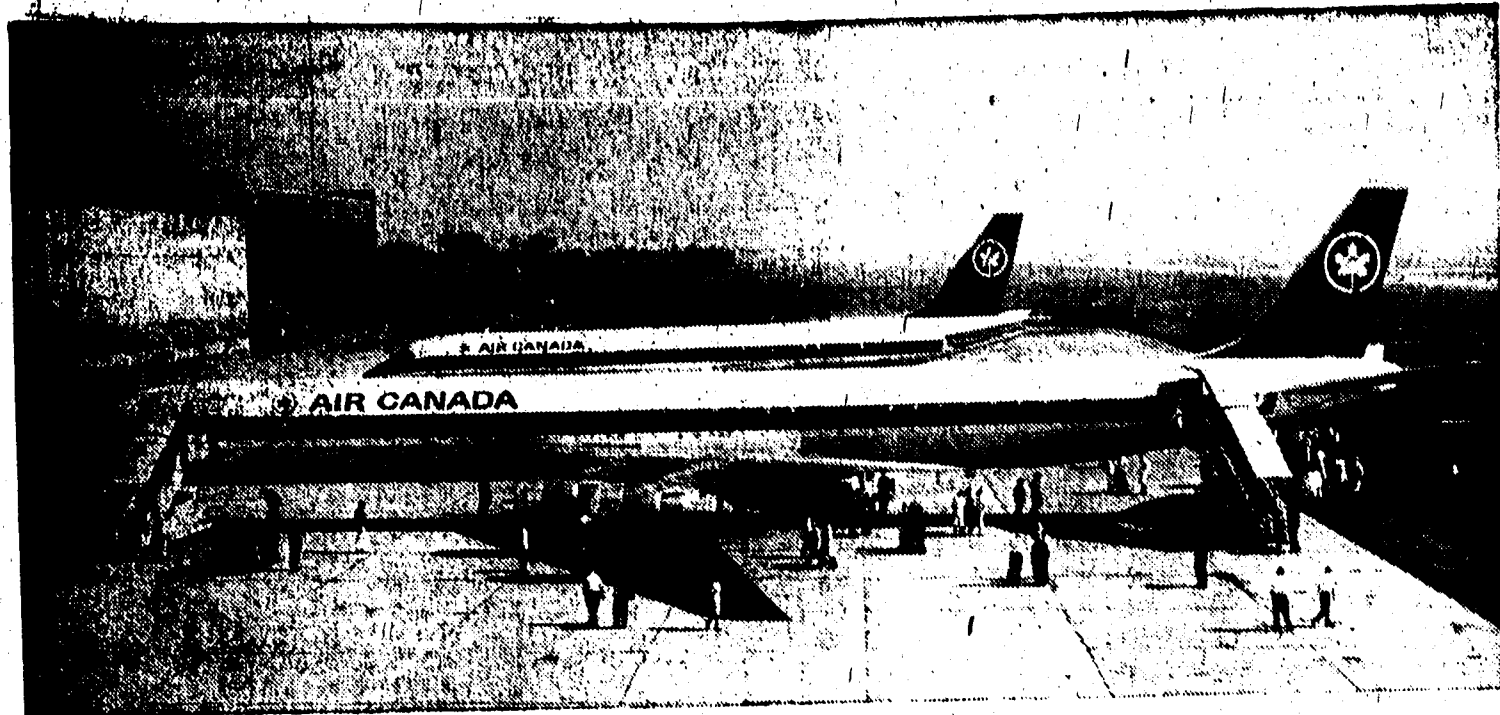

Laurence Dakin, cosmopolitan poet whose poem recalling his boyhood at Sandy Cove was published in this newspaper last May, has recently been accorded the distinction of being received in audience by Princess Grace of Monaco in the palace at Monte Carlo, where the poet now resides.

As a member of the National Writers' Club of America and the Canadian Authors' Association, the poet had arranged for a group of American members visiting Monaco to be entertained at a cocktail party in the palace. This reception was reported in the Rivien's leading newspaper, "Nice-Matin" after the poet had been interviewed in French on Monaco TV.

In response to a request from me, Laurence Dakin provided the following impressions after his subsequent audience, for exclusive publication in "The Digby Courier".

"Monaco is one of the most efficiently-run states in existence. Aided by his beautiful wife, Prince Rainier II has brought the Principality into a position which is the envy of every other Treasury. Monaco doesn't have a red inkwell. It has no National Debt.

"Princess Grace is an extraordinary person. Her great beauty, personal charm, grace of manner and ability to grasp an otherwise awkward situation and turn it into a pleasant informality is remarkable. She is a lovely woman. She said that she had played in a Summer Stock company in Colorado in 1951—it is a well-known place to actors. She spoke with enthusiasm of Canada, in particular of Prince Albert's stay at a ranch near Vancouver, which he liked immensely.

"Princess Grace may have been under-rated by some journalists or over-glamorized by others who have been influenced by her 'fairy-princess' marriage. She is, in fact, as lovely as a dawn cloud. She has great charm and poise."

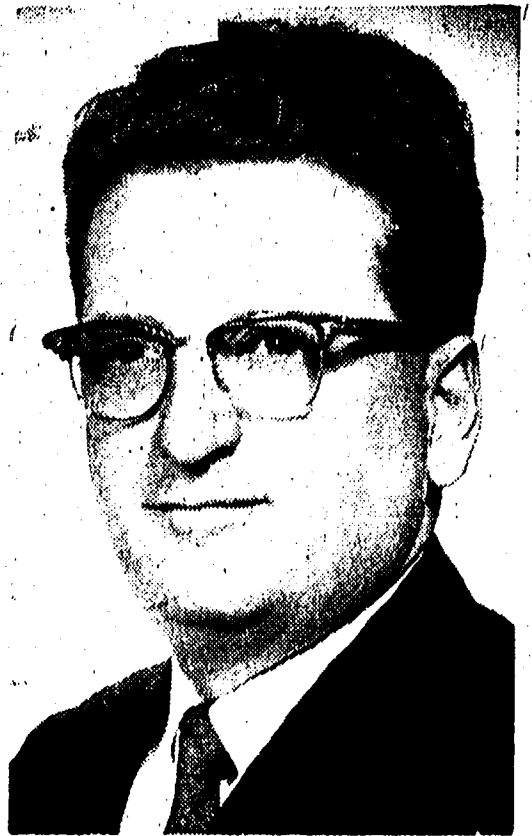

## IVAN SHORTLIFFE ADDRESSES PUBLISHERS

Ivan Shortliffe, manager of the Classified Advertisement Department for the Chronicle Herald, Halifax, addressed members of the Nova Scotia Weekly Newspapers Association on the merits of Classified Advertising. He was speaking at the annual meeting of the association held at Hotel Nova Scotian, Halifax, on Saturday. Mr. Shortliffe, born in Central Grove, is the son of Burton Shortliffe and the late Mrs. Shortliffe of that village. Many remember Ivan as editor and publisher of the world's smallest newspaper, The Tiny Tattler. Mr. Shortliffe paid tribute on Saturday morning to the memory of the late J. J. Wallis and the late J. M. Wallis, of The Digby Courier, whom he said introduced him to newspaper work.

Classified Advertising, Mr. Shortliffe said, is within the

means of everybody; it is the only kind of advertising in which the general public participates. He classified it as news for which the newspaper is paid. Readers, he said, seek out the classified page and the more which is told in the advertisement, the more is sold.

Mr. Shortliffe warned against the fly-by-night advertiser who can make the publisher most embarrassed. Another speaker on Saturday morning was Brooks Hamilton, Professor of Journalism at the University of the State of Maine. Mr. Hamilton is also secretary of the State of Maine Weekly Newspapers association. Mr. Hamilton was interested in a combined convention of Maine weekly publishers and Atlantic weekly publishers in 1970 and spoke of the many things which the 25 State Weeklies and Atlan-

tic provinces Weeklies have in common.

Friday's sessions were highlighted when the weekly publishers were entertained at Government House by Lieutenant Governor, H. P. MacKeen and Mrs. MacKeen. His Honor and Mrs. MacKeen accepted the invitation of the association to attend the dinner held later at the Hotel Nova Scotian. Speaker at the dinner was Bennett Eisener, president of the Board of Moncton Times and Transcript.

Mr. Eisener, who is also president of the Maritimes Board of Trade, said that newspapers have the function to perform of mirroring society as it is and to stir society. He stressed sound business practices and said that a defunct newspaper can tell no story. Speaking of advertising, he said this is the way that consumer demand is created.

Mr. Eisener was introduced by John Murphy of Truro and thanked by Jack Albon of Springhill.

An interesting part of the program on Friday evening was the presentation of Centennial Scholarships and prizes for essay contests.

## About This And That

### Nice To Be Big

Should Sydney in Cape Breton lose the Sydney Steel Works which employs more than 3000 men, it will be a blow dealt by Dosco which will affect more than these 3000 men and their dependents. This is a blow which will have its affect on other parts of Nova Scotia. Take a look, for instance, at the small fruit and vegetables from (not only on Beaverbrook Farms Ltd.) throughout Western Nova Scotia. If we remember correctly, Sydney was one of the strawberry markets from this end of the province last summer. Three thousand men and their dependents make a lot of people to consume strawberries. The strawberry, however, is just one product. There are other products in the Valley area and other areas of Nova Scotia which find a market amongst Dosco's 3000 and more employees in the city of Sydney. We might seem to be far removed from the problem but we really are nearer than we think in Digby County. What happens in Sydney is our concern here too.

For the above reasons and because of our concern for our fellowman, we want to see the Sydney Steel Works continue to work. It is of benefit to all in Nova Scotia to have the plant operating.

On the other hand, we also must consider whether or not it is possible to keep any plant operating continuously. This is one of the questions which our governments must consider before our money and my money, means to keep the plant in small operations, is used to keep it someone's else's large but unprofitable business.

Over the past 20 years it is understood, 254 million dollars of tax money have gone into helping Cape Breton local and steel industry. This is a tremendous amount of money in terms of some of our small operations but it is also a tremendous amount of money poured into the sum total of other large enterprises in Canada.

Higher wages and an added cost but are the hard earned dollars of our small business. The struggling little business which attempts to keep up a wage scale that only large companies can afford (or can they?) The struggling little business which is burdened in its small-time operation by excessive freight rates and other continually rising costs. And who turns to the rescue of the small business? Just nobody. It is left to sink or swim. After all, 25 employees can easily be absorbed in other occupations. It is forgotten that a few thousand of these small businesses across Canada have a right to survive, indeed, add tremendously to the economy of Canada in their struggling survival.

The Sydney Steel Works should be kept operating. To close out the livelihood of 3000 men and their dependents in such a short time is a blow which cannot be allowed for their sales and for the overall economic picture of Nova Scotia. Still, we can't help but say, "It is Nice To Be Big."

Last Wednesday Soon was presented with a certificate which granted him Canadian Citizenship after he had renounced any foreign nationality or State and had sworn faithful allegiance to his new country, Canada, and to Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II.

As we love Canada, Soon, no doubt, had loved his native China. To renounce the land of your birth is probably not so easy. Some of us know nothing about such an experience. But there often comes a day, as it did with Soon, when another country offers greater opportunities and happiness. It is with mixed feelings, perhaps, that one contemplates such a step. Although sorry to leave the old one enters the new with an overriding joy and happiness. To us, we present was the mixed feeling of Soon.

### Election Time Creeping Up

Civic election time is creeping up. The month of October will soon be past. Early in December there will be an election for mayor and three councillors providing there are enough candidates offering to require an election.

Rumors have it, mark you, only rumors, that neither the mayor nor the three councillors presently sitting intend to re-offer. This gives us something to think about. Good men to occupy council seats are not always easy to come by. Not that there aren't some good men around for such positions but we are all aware of the reluctance to take on the responsibility.

Why should they be so reluctant? One reason is that they feel they will continually be under abuse from an unappreciative citizenry. People can be so thoughtless. Constructive criticism, yes, abuse, never. Mayor and councillors in Digby get no remuneration for doing our work at the Town Hall, yet hours of their time are devoted to town work on our behalf. Do you ever stop to think of the motor trips (gratis) which servants of the town often make on our behalf? Communication with other towns, organizations, and businesses are necessary for the growth of our own locality. This cannot be accomplished without expense. Instead of abuse, town fathers should receive praise and encouragement.

Getting qualified and able citizens to offer for candidates should be everybody's concern. Without top quality men for council seats, who will look after our streets, fire and police protection, water, sewage and many other responsibilities connected with the operation of a small town.

### Keep Children Safe From The Hazards Of Hallowe'en

The night of witches and goblins is a merry time for revelers young and old. Keep it fun and don't let dangerous pranks and neglect of simple fire precautions spoil the party. Gay McLaren, general manager of the National Safety League of Canada, warns that vandalism and the setting up of obstructions and other such potential hazards should have no place in Hallowe'en revelry.

Parents are the ones chiefly responsible for their children on this night. It is up to them to accompany their youngest kiddies unless they can be entrusted with a competent older person. It is their duty to protect their children by (a) seeing they are safely costumed (b) enforcing a reasonable code of behaviour and (c) initiating or supporting community activities which will provide a safe and wholesome outlet for a youngster's Hallowe'en spirit. With this in mind, the League offers the following tips:

1. Make up the child's face rather than buy a mask. Textile masks can easily obscure a child's vision. Many have inadequate openings for the eyes and there is always the danger of it slipping down as the child runs. The use of a little rouge, eye brow pencil, eye shadow, lipstick, perhaps corn starch or zinc oxide, can transform a youngster into a ghost, pirate or clown who will be the envy of his friends. More important, he will be comfortable and able to see danger in time to avert it. Cold cream and facial tissues will remove the make-up later.
2. Provide the child with a light-coloured costume so he can be seen more readily by the motorists. Light-coloured shopping bags are also an asset. Dress up the outfit with reflectorized tape or bands that glitter in the light. The costume should be short enough so as not to trip the wearer when either walking or running.
3. Costumes should be flame-resistant and of loosely-woven fabric to prevent a possible flash-fire from a spark or flame. Clothing can be made flameproof by dipping into a solution of 9 ounces of borax and 4 ounces of boric acid mixed in a gallon of warm water. Wring by hand and hang out to dry. While ironing does not affect the flame-resistance, the treatment must be repeated after each washing.
4. Insist that a flash-light, never a candle be used to light up a jack-o-lantern.
5. Urge your child to use the sidewalks rather than the streets and caution him not to dash out from between parked cars. Point out the seriousness of highway accidents and why the soaping of windshields on cars can lead to unnecessary injury and death should the owner have to use the car before he has time and opportunity to clean the glass.

Mr. McLaren also recommended that parents set boundaries for trick-or-treating according to the ages of the children. They should travel in groups of at least four or five and go only to homes with which they are familiar.

The hours of childhood are so precious and so limited. Protect them with love, understanding and sound judgement.

To the Editor:  
During the past six years I was a student at the Digby Regional High School. I began at grade seven and ended my education at this "institution" in the spring of 1967. I left Digby High as a graduate of grade twelve and all of the teachers wished me the best of luck. It was said that my days at Digby High would stay in my heart for the rest of my life.

I am now attending Acadia University working on my B.Sc. degree. When I came home last week-end I was informed that there was a dance being held at the high school on Friday evening. I thought it would be nice to attend and see all my friends. I realize that the "guest list" was to be certified by the principal. I was absolutely enraged by this refusal. However, I was not informed of this until Friday afternoon; therefore, I was not able to find a way to attend the dance.

How good a company is, it cannot coast along on its reputation for long. A plant needs the stimulation of advertising and sales promotion to keep going forward. What applies to the dry cleaning business applies to every other kind of business. Without well planned short term advertising a business will soon be forgotten by its customers.

Because Mr. Henning's message applies to every business as well as the dry cleaning business we copy parts of his address from the Chronicle-Herald for all our business men and merchants to read -

Long term advertising is that from which a company does not expect to get immediate returns, such as signs on stores and trucks. This type of advertising is important because it affects the public acceptance in a community and makes the public think of a certain company when they want a certain product.

More short term advertising should be done, he said, and when done right, it can have very good long term effects as well. Sales promotion and advertising ideas that work for one plant may not necessarily work for another. Different appeals are necessary in different markets, he said.

Today there is still a big waste in retail advertising, and the biggest part of this waste cannot be attributed to weather, media, or the physical make-up of the ad - the fault lies with improper planning the speaker said.

Two events best dramatized the change of mood and atmosphere of this resumed session of Parliament. On the opening day there sat the new Leader, Mr. Stanfield, in the opposition gallery above the Commons floor, and incidentally directly above the heads of the Liberal Cabinet Ministers. Certainly the hot air of pursuit was felt on the backs of some of their necks as the week progressed. While the sentinel was above, the Government ranks were sadly depleted as Minister after Minister was absent through illness, travel or duty. Consequently the Prime Minister had to field the majority of the questions from an active and organized opposition. And to further accentuate the Prime Minister's many problems the Secretary of State, Miss LaMarsh, refused to take her proper seat alongside the Minister of Northern Affairs because of some alleged difference of opinion between constituency demand and departmental policy. This petty exhibition of personal pique amazed all and embarrassed the Prime Minister. Canadians could rightly wonder if Cabinet unity is symbolized by the behaviour of seat mates.

This is a changed place and most objective observers can see and feel it. Certainly the Conservative Members know it what with daily policy and strategy meetings directed to the issues of the day.

It started on Monday with a demand for an emergency debate on the housing crisis. The following day it was wheat, and on the third day the controversial and sensitive issue of national unity.

There is no doubt the Opposition is better organized and ready for battle.

While the press can see some of the changes on the floor of the House they still do not know how to take Mr. Stanfield. In his short speech before the Press Club on Thursday he mildly criticized the press for the criticism of Members when both were pretty poor in attendance in the House. And while some of the press were digesting this advice, and before they had finished their meal, the five minute speech was over. Several of the veteran press members have rebuked Mr. Stanfield for only speaking when he has something to say - this is an unusual happening around here and it is going to be interesting to see who gets conditioned to whom!

Elsewhere in this week's edition of the Courier is a list of officers elected to represent the people of the Town and County for the coming year on the Digby Recreation Commission. With the list is a brief financial report.

The Town of Digby is very well represented on the Commission, and we suppose that those outside the town in the municipality of Digby will echo the famous old adage, "Digby is running it all." That is true but more by necessity than by choice.

Always there will be financial problems when we place service ahead of finances. But as it stands, we are more concerned about our young people than money. However, we feel that finances would be less troublesome if a more active role was played by the municipality and the people of the municipality. The County Council has often been approached for financial assistance in view of the fact that the Forum is used as much, and by more, from outside the town than inside it. It's reasonable; there's 15,000 people in the County and only 2500 in Digby. But each time County Council has been approached by the Commission we have been refused.

But we believe that the people themselves of the Municipality can take the matter into their own hands. First of all, an interested representative of every organization outside the Town-whether service club, Church Group, Parish Council, etc. could be present and become a member of the Commission.

Someone could survey his or her area to see how many people in their community are enjoying the use of the Forum and report to their groups. The Financial Drive, it seems, could be conducted in other places as well. Why could there not be various places to leave donations all through the County? These are but suggestions. We ask every organized group in the Town and in the County to have a delegate at the next Recreation Commission Meeting. Bring your encouragement, your constructive criticism, your good will to serve us.

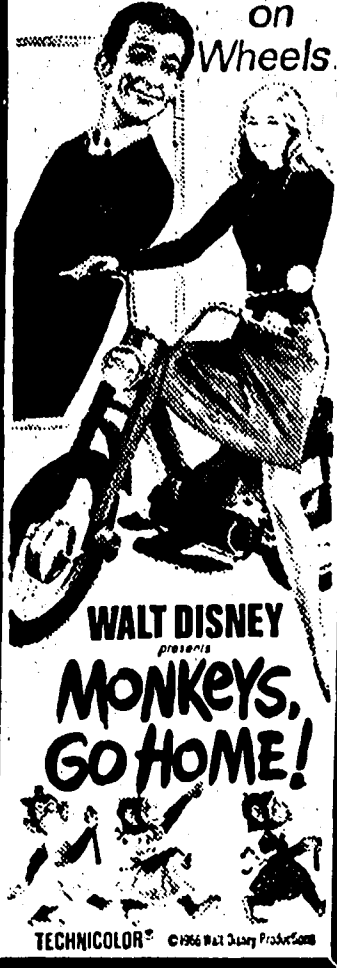

Digby School

Nine Inspectors and Superintendents of Schools from across Canada are "taking a look" at Nova Scotia's educational system. At the same time five of their counterparts from Nova Scotia are looking into school systems of other provinces.

Visiting Digby on Wednesday were Cyril Pyrch, superintendent of schools, Edmonton, Alberta, and Jack E. Beech, Assistant district superintendent, Cloverdale, B.C. They were accompanied by Clifford Edwards, Bridgeport, inspector of schools for Annapolis Co., N.S. and J. A. Comeau, Meteghan River, inspector of schools in Clare, Digby County. After discussions and tours directed by F. C. Purdy, superintendent of Digby County schools and C. C. MacInnis, supervisor of schools in Digby area, the visitors were entertained at luncheon by the Home Economics department of the school.

The interprovincial visit is the number one Centennial project of the Canadian Association of School Superintendents and Inspectors. It is fully national in scope and is carried out in co-operation with Provincial Departments of Education and local authorities. The objectives of the program, regarded as a serious educational effort of national importance, are as follows:

(1) to provide a unique opportunity for the gaining of enlarged "in-service" experience and the growth of professional competence on the part of school superintendents and inspectors employed in publicly supported school systems in each of the provinces and territories of Canada. (2) to initiate in Canadian Centennial Year a programme of inter-provincial visitation by school superintendents and inspectors which may be expected to continue usefully in the national interest in subsequent years.

Briefing sessions for the nine visiting school officials were previously held in Halifax under the Chairmanship of Inspector George Lent, Inverness County, President of the Nova Scotia Association of School Superintendents and Inspectors, an affiliated branch of the national organization. Presentations were made by Dr. H. P. Moffatt, Deputy Minister of Education, who dealt with educational finance, and by Dr. H. M. Nason, Director of Elementary and Secondary Education, who interpreted Nova Scotia's Comprehensive school program. The visiting team took a look at Nova Scotia's School Television program and witnessed a school TV program in actual production. Their program included a visit to the Institute of Technology, Halifax, a visit to the Mobile Reading Clinic and the school system of Dartmouth. Other Department officials participating, included Dr. A. B. Morrison, Chief Supervisor of Curriculum and Research, G. W. MacKenzie, Chief Inspector of Schools, and Dr. R. Philip Carter, Director of Teacher Education.

Participating also were Inspectors C. B. LeGrow, C. E. Edwards, R. G. Bain, and K. L. Perry of Halifax, formerly of Freeport, N.S.

Mr. Pyrch and Mr. Beech will visit other schools in Western Nova Scotia besides Digby and Meteghan. Visiting the Central Counties are Howard Larson, Superintendent of Schools, Athabasca, Alberta, Earle G. MacDonald, Superintendent of Schools, Edmonton, Alberta, Roland M. Ward, Superintendent of Schools, Westlock, Alberta, and J. K. MacKay, Director of Instruction, Winnipeg, Manitoba. Those visiting schools systems of Eastern Nova Scotia and Cape Breton include H. J. MacDonald, Inspector of Schools, Manitoba, E. J. Finan, Inspector of Schools, Whithy, Ontario, and Marvin S. Bruce, Superintendent of Schools, Ryley, Alberta.

Nova Scotia school officials visiting in other provinces of Canada this year as part of the Centennial project include: Tom Sullivan, Inspector of Schools, Cape Breton, to Saskatchewan; Roddie Bain, Inspector of Schools, Victoria County, to British Columbia; Frank McGill, Inspector of Schools, Lunenburg County, to Ontario; Mrs. Madeline Sangster, Divisional Supervisor of Schools, Antigonish, to Alberta; Douglas Moses, Divisional Supervisor of Schools, Halifax County, to British Columbia.

The project is financed in part by the Canadian Association of School Superintendents and Inspectors. To meet the travel costs of participants, the sponsoring Canadian Association is aided by a Ford Foundation grant of \$30,000.

At a short press conference before the general discussions and tour the visitors remarked that the school T.V. program in Nova Scotia is superior to that of the most westerly Canadian provinces, one of the reasons mentioned being a handicap in reception because of the mountains.

In general the visitors had found the education system in Nova Scotia similar to the West in that their composite system is similar to the comprehensive plan in the Eastern province. Possibly because of larger school enrollment in the West in some areas can have a program of much larger scope than the Digby program and can accommodate more vocational programs.

Comparing the commercial programs, Mr. Beech from British Columbia said that the subject which takes four years to do in B.C., is concentrated here to a two year program. In B.C. students start commercial in Grade IX and the High School students in Digby do a similar commercial study to that done in the vocational school in B.C. This can be explained by the fact that junior matriculation in the West is Grade XI and here it is Grade XII.

Differences were also noted in primary grades in that compulsory education here is from 5 years up and in B.C. the children start school at 6 years. Facilities are not available for kindergarten grades and it would mean considerable outlay for education in the West to accommodate kindergarten age. Mr. Purdy explained the system used in Digby and mentioned the accelerated class, including primary and Grade I, for those who were not quite school age the previous year and had missed the kindergarten or can take an advanced program.

In comparing the consolidation program in Digby, Mr. Purdy told of the Digby school pioneering in the present type of program in Nova Scotia in 1943 and with others following with the boom for consolidation around 1947 and 1948. The town of Middleton was also mentioned as having a consolidated school as early as 1911.

The visitors had been brought up to date on the Nova Scotia reading program

and had visited the Traveling Mobile Reading Clinic in Dartmouth. Mr. Purdy expressed the hope that while Digby does not have advantage presently of the Reading Clinic it will have such an advantage it is expected when the new school now proposed for Digby is completed. In the supervisory area the Western visitors explained that the supervisors in their ofulum here which is generally appointed to improve instruction. The Western system it is understood, has more supervisory capacities such as supervision of primary education and supervisors of various subjects such as music, reading, etc.

## Sisters Observe Anniversary

The observance of the One Hundredth Anniversary of the arrival of the Sisters of Charity to serve in Western Nova Scotia was commemorated on Sunday, October 8th by a mass offered at St. Mary's R. C. Church at Church Point at 4:30 p.m. The mass was celebrated by the Administrator of the Diocese, the Most Rev. Hector J. Melanson and six concelebrants.

Those from distant parts attending were: Mother Maria Gertrude, Mother General, Mother Provincial, community councillors, Sisters of Charity, natives of Western Nova Scotia and the Sisters who have been missioned at one time or another at St. Mary's Convent at Church Point.

The Sisters of Charity established themselves in Western Nova Scotia at the request of various parish priests. They opened St. Mary's Convent in 1867, which was the fifth mission of the Institute and the first in Western Nova Scotia. In 1869 they opened the Sacred Heart convent at Meteghan and the following convents followed: St. Anne du Ruisseau in 1872; Saint Peter Convent at Middle West Pubnico in 1876; Saint Ambrose convent, Yarmouth in 1920; Saint Michael convent at Wedgeport in 1924. The convents at Middle West Pubnico and at St. Anne du Ruisseau were closed in 1960 and 1963 respectively.

One hundred and thirteen vocations to the Sisters of Charity of Halifax were taken from Western Nova Scotia, sixty-five of whom are still living. It is gratifying to know that seven young women have joined the order at Mount Saint Vincent at Halifax, dedicating their lives to God and His people.

The Sisters of Charity in Clare at Church Point and Meteghan have dedicated their time to teaching in the public schools of both areas. They arrived on the scene when the teachers' salaries were very minimal and in some cases practically non-existent. The Sisters of Charity not only spent many hours beyond the call of duty in the education sphere, they also assisted the parish priests by their untiring work in the church preparing altars, assisting in many ways in the religious field.

They visited the sick and infirm in the parish to which they were assigned and many persons were consoled and cheered by their visits.

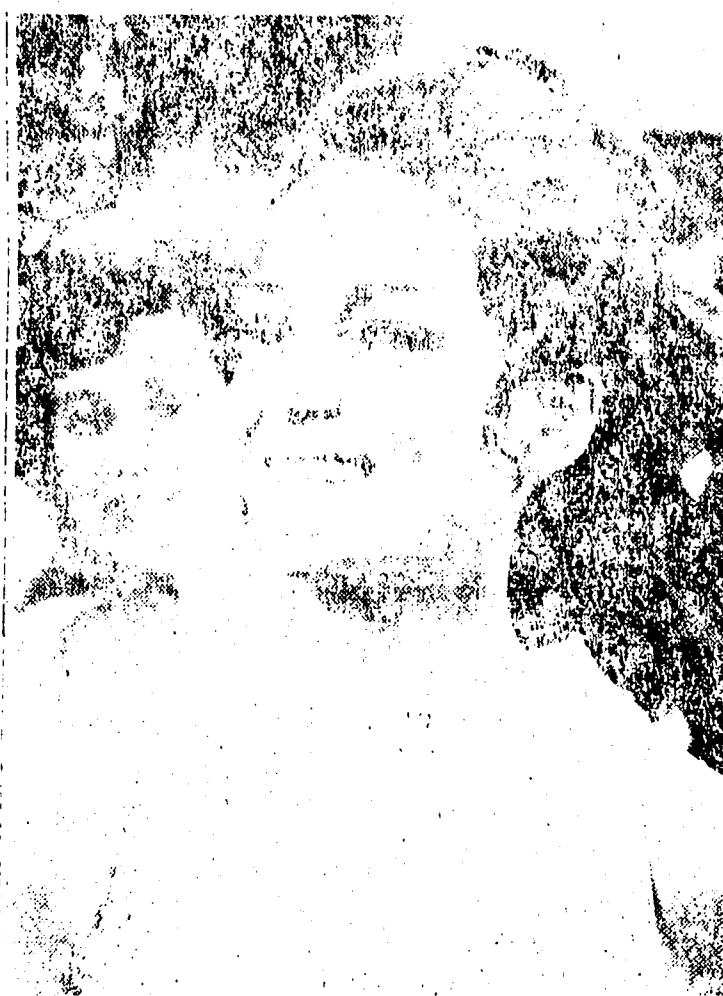

## HOME FROM SHRINERS HOSPITAL



Clutching his paper bag containing cats and other items peculiar to the amusement of ten year old boys, Randy Spechts happily smiled as he stepped off the S. S. Princess of Acadia when she docked at Digby on Tuesday. Randy was accompanied home from Montreal by his father, Carl Spechts, Smith's Cove, and was met by his mother and other members of his family.

Another greeting Randy was Shiner Noble Reidar Bernsten of Digby, seen at right of the picture.

Randy's home coming was from the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, Montreal Unit, where he had been from August 2 to October 23. This was not a new experience to Randy. He had been in and out of hospitals since the sad afternoon of January

30, 1962 in Brantford, Ontario. On that afternoon a can of gasoline exploded in the basement of the Spechts' home in Brantford where Randy then four years old, and his sister Linda, two and one-half years were playing. Both children suffered third degree burns to more than half their bodies. Linda died after being in the Toronto Sick Children's Hospital six weeks. Randy was in the same hospital where he lay on his stomach for eight months in 1962 and returned for plastic surgery and skin grafts in 1963 and 1965. In June of 1966 the Spechts family moved to Smith's Cove.

Medical bills had mounted for the Spechts family in Ontario. Help was received through the Presbyterian, United, Anglican and Baptist churches. Benefit hockey games and skating programs also raised money to aid the stricken family, but bills mounted. Before leaving Ont., a friend advised the parents to seek help from the Shriners who operate Crippled Children's Hospitals for those who cannot afford their own medical bills. Mrs. Spechts when enquiring at the Nova Scotia Tourist Bureau in Digby was referred to Mr. Bernsten who is an active Shriner. Since that time, Mr. Bernsten has been in touch with the family and arranged to have Randy admitted to the Montreal unit of the Shriners' hospital, one of their 22 such hospitals.

Randy, an intelligent 10 year old is back to public school in grade III this week. While he has lost some of his years work, he did have some schooling in hospital and belonged to the Cubs organization while there. On February 26, 1968, Randy will have a clinic check-up in Montreal

and beginning in April it is expected he will spend 6 months for surgery and skin grafts. His most recent operation built on to both of his ears and grafted skin to his knees and hands. Previous operations had work done to his feet and further work will be done, the only part of Randy's body not effected by burns being his chest. Future operations and their timing will depend on the boy's growth, his mother informed.

Mr. and Mrs. Spechts have six children. At the time of the fire, the three oldest children were in school. A baby was asleep upstairs in the crib. Another little girl has arrived in the family since the tragic year 1962 when Mrs. Spechts dragged her two burning children out into the snow and left them buried there until she rescued her baby from the smoke filled house before fire fighters could be on the scene.

Life has not been easy for the Spechts family since their return to Nova Scotia. Unable to find suitable employment Mr. Spechts left on Friday to seek work in Ont., where he had lived for seventeen years. The family expects to follow when accommodation and circumstances permit. In the meantime, Randy will ride his bike, skate and play baseball with his chums around Smith's Cove for Randy is an active boy despite his burned body. For this reason, too, Randy was grateful last week when the mails brought him a special pair of shoes with steel toe protection for his feet, a gift from the Shriners. Mrs. Spechts, too, expressed appreciation to the Shriners and to Mr. Bernsten who was instrumental in getting the free medical and surgical treatment for her son, Randy.

## Strike Ended

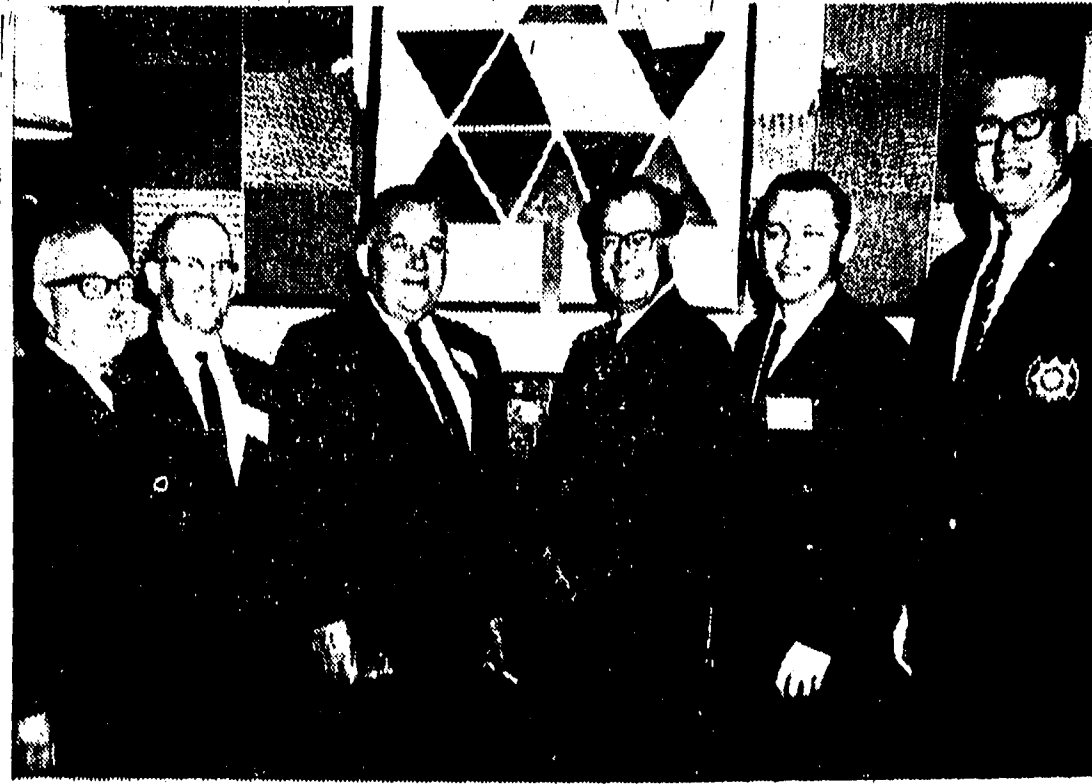
On Wednesday at press time 50 truckers employed in the Digby area by the Eastern Coroner Paving Company, Municipal Spraying Ltd., and the department of highways were back to work after being on strike since Friday noon.

It is understood the picket had been called in sympathy with truckers in Pictou Co. who quit work on Tuesday seeking an increase in axle weight limits imposed on trucks by the highways department.

The Digby truckers' group halted paving on a number of roads in the municipality, including the Town of Digby's main street, which is being re-capped.

It is understood the truckers had no quarrel with the employers concerning pay rates, but were seeking an increase in axle weight limits to permit the hauling of heavier loads.

They wanted the 18,000 weight restriction on single axle trucks raised to a maximum of 22,000 pounds and the 32,000 maximum on tandem axle trucks raised to 35,000 pounds, plus 5 per cent tolerance in both cases.

## SCALLOPER SINKS — TOTAL LOSS

The 40-year-old scallop boat, "LaSirene" went down Saturday off Broad Cove in about twenty-five fathoms of water.

Captain Maurice "Tyke" George told the Courier no explanation for the sinking was known. The boat had been fishing until about 11:30 Friday evening when anchor was dropped and he and his two-man crew went to sleep, he said. "We awoke about two o'clock to discover the boat deep in water. Our pumps couldn't take care of the water, the radar became short-circuited, and the radio was not working properly. We knew of no other boats in the area."

The trio attempted to reach Digby under their own power. No other port was available because of the low tide. "We soon discovered that it would be impossible so a lifeboat was launched," Mr. George said. They rowed to Culloden, about one-half mile from where the boat went down.

Nothing was salvaged. Mr. George estimated loss at \$12,000, part of which was covered by insurance. The other crew members were Leo Haynes and Jack Wanholdt, all of Digby.

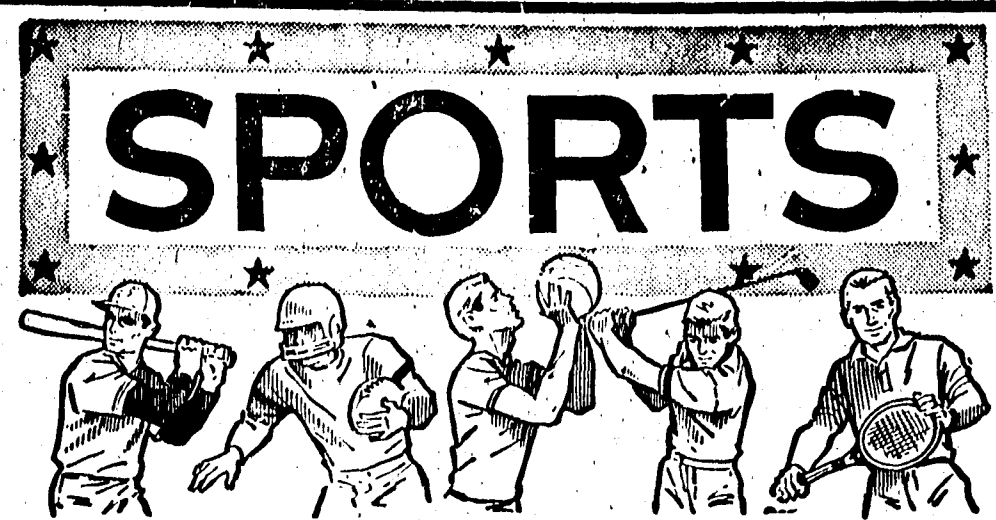

### Letters To The Editor

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

In January, 1967, I was approached by the Executive of the Digby Minor Hockey League to act as President of the Digby Minor Hockey League for the remainder of the 66-67 season as Mr. Morgan, the President up to that time, had expressed a desire to retire due to other commitments. I accepted this challenge. The first meeting of the Executive was called for Jan. 14, 1967, where the existing schedule was rescheduled and teams revised. The need for a new head-coach was discussed and after much persuasion, Mr. Wallace Hodgson agreed to act as a head-coach. The league then took shape as follows:

President, Charlie Fitt  
Vice-President, Tom Cleveland  
2nd Vice-Pres., Rev. Ricker  
Past Pres., Robert Morgan  
Secretary, Dr. Armstrong  
Treasurer, Charlie Hall  
Equipment Manager, F. Smith  
Statistician, Murray Baxter  
Publicity, Wayne Snow  
Head Coaches, Mr. Tom Wood,  
Mr. Stanley Vidito, Mr. J.  
Plomp, transferred during  
season, Rev. Ricker took his  
place, Mr. W. Hodgson.

The leagues were Junior, Midget, Pee Wee and Squirt. There were only three teams in the Junior League and as the wheels were already in motion to interest a Junior League team from Cornwallis to join the league I took up the reigns and persuaded the team to join. This did not prove successful. For one thing, the replaying of the games in the dressing room caused hard feelings and allowed players to dwell on the past instead of striving to do better next game.

During the Festive Holidays, an invitation was extended to the Digby League from the Cornwallis League for an All-Star team to play an exhibition game at Cornwallis. Arrangements were made and the game was played on Jan. 2, 1967. I believe that the game was enjoyed by the majority of players.

A hockey clinic was held at

the rink on Jan. 14, '67. Player attendance good, parent attendance poor. This was the attendance record throughout the entire Minor League Season for all events, at the rink.

Young gentlemen from the Midget League were chosen to play on a Centennial Team made up of Cornwallis and held in Cornwallis. Transportation supplied by Cornwallis. The majority of the players appreciated and enjoyed this experience.

Referees — A sad situation. My Saturdays were completely tied up either at the rink or on the telephone trying to beg someone to referee games, then received mostly complaints when a referee was obtained. Mr. R. Schafer from Cornwallis and Mr. R. Cummings were the main standbys and neither of these gentlemen have children in the Minor Hockey League. A small nominal fee was paid to each referee.

Minor Hockey Week - 21 Jan. '67 - 28 Jan. '67 inclusive. With no data to guide the Executive, a programme was planned to the best of their ability and letters sent to each parent. A copy of this letter and programme was also published in the Courier. A copy is on file. See recommendation at the end of this report.

Hockey Banquet — 12 June '67. Arrangements were made with the Legion for the use of the hall with the Women's Auxiliary for catering and with Mr. Bruce Oland of Halifax to allow Mr. Wayne Maxner to address the banquet. As I was away on duty, I arranged with Mr. Morgan to meet and escort Mr. Maxner to the banquet. Mr. Hall

ordered trophies for the award winners and these were presented during the banquet. Crests were ordered for the winning teams but due to an oversight on my part, were not picked up from the post office the night of the banquet. However, they were given to the players later. The Vice-President presided over the banquet in my absence. He was provided with a programme for the evening and a list of trophy winners. From all reports, the banquet was a success. Again, as with Minor Hockey Week, there was no data to use as a guide. Copy of letters and arrangements placed on file. See recommendation at the end of this report.

1. President of a hockey league is no easy job and taking over without any data of previously run leagues makes the job even more difficult. I therefore recommend that a file be kept during the year and turned over to the new President at the beginning of the new season. If a new President has not been elected and the old President wishes to retire, then the file be left either at the town hall or with the Rink Commissioner. This could also include the minute books and a Treasurer's report. File that I kept during the year was turned in to the Rink Commission meeting, 19, Oct. 1967. File included, lists of players, schedules, requirements for Minor Hockey Week and banquet (letters which were written, etc.).

2. Minor League Hockey Week — Prizes which are donated by merchants should be recorded. Some people like to use these donations as income tax deductions. If

ticket and prize system is used a black-board should be set up in clear view of spectators and the numbers of winning tickets printed large enough to be seen, also the name of the prize and the donor. Because of activities being carried on in the rink, voices over the Public Address System cannot be understood.

3. Registration time limit be strictly adhered to.

4. Leagues are governed by ages — Junior league under 21 on 31 May, Midget under 16 on 31 May, Pee Wees under 12 on 31 May and Squirt under 10 on 31 May. In some cases, a player had the hockey sense, ability and size to be in a more advanced league than his age allows. After reasonable observation, consideration should be given to advancing him so he will learn competition and to work with those of his own calibre instead of being the star of a younger league.

5. Parents must be made aware that the rink is not a playground for their youngsters on Saturday morning and that coaches and executive are not glorified babysitters. Parents must support and attend games and help when requested.

6. Executive meetings must be held bimonthly on specific nights to air out parent, player, referee, protests and any other problems which may arise.

7. Coaches and anyone, for that matter, should re-

frain from re-playing and blaming others after games have been played. If there is a legitimate "beef" save it for the executive and discourage players from discussing games when they have lost — no one likes to lose, however, someone must. Remember, it isn't whether you've won or lost, it's how you played the game. These young gentlemen are easily influenced so influence them to forget that lost game but go out to win the next one.

8. If arrangements for a special speaker are to be made for the banquet, action should be started in January.

9. I see by last week's Courier that the president should have been busy all summer and had the league started for 67-68. Perhaps, as I stated before, if data of some kind had been available, I would have known this. Having no intentions of being president for another season I naturally assumed that the duties ceased with the banquet in June.

10. That a nominating committee be set up and new officers be elected at the banquet for the next season.

May I take this opportunity to thank all who have helped in any way to make the 66-67 season a success.

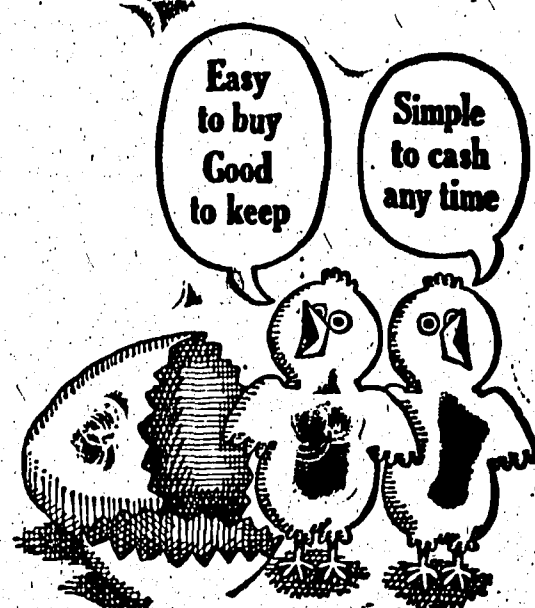

**Speaks On Bible Society**

Ninety-three million scriptures were printed last year but still this is not enough said Rev. M.C.P. MacIntosh, district secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, when speaking at the Church of God, Digby, on Sunday night.

Mr. MacIntosh's visit precedes the beginning of the annual canvas for funds in Digby on November 6.

The duty of the Bible Society, Mr. MacIntosh said is to translate the Bible into the languages of the people and to publish it and make it available to the people at a cost which they can afford.

He cited an instance where the Bible cost the Society \$1.20 each to print but the people to whom it was sold could pay no more than their whole day's earnings of eighteen cents a copy. Bibles are also printed in Braille and are distributed free.

Mr. MacIntosh said the church amounts to nothing without the Bible, you cannot have church without the Bible. The Bible or parts of it has now been translated into 1280 languages, with the scripture translated in another language every 12 days.

There are one million new readers every five days in the world's population of three billion, said the speaker, with the result that the demand for the scripture is so great that distribution should be doubled. He compared this with the figures of the year 1867 when comparatively a small percentage of the world's one billion people could read. The Bible Society is 163 years old.

Mr. MacIntosh was introduced by Rev. R. H. Hughes, president of the Digby Branch Canadian Bible Society.

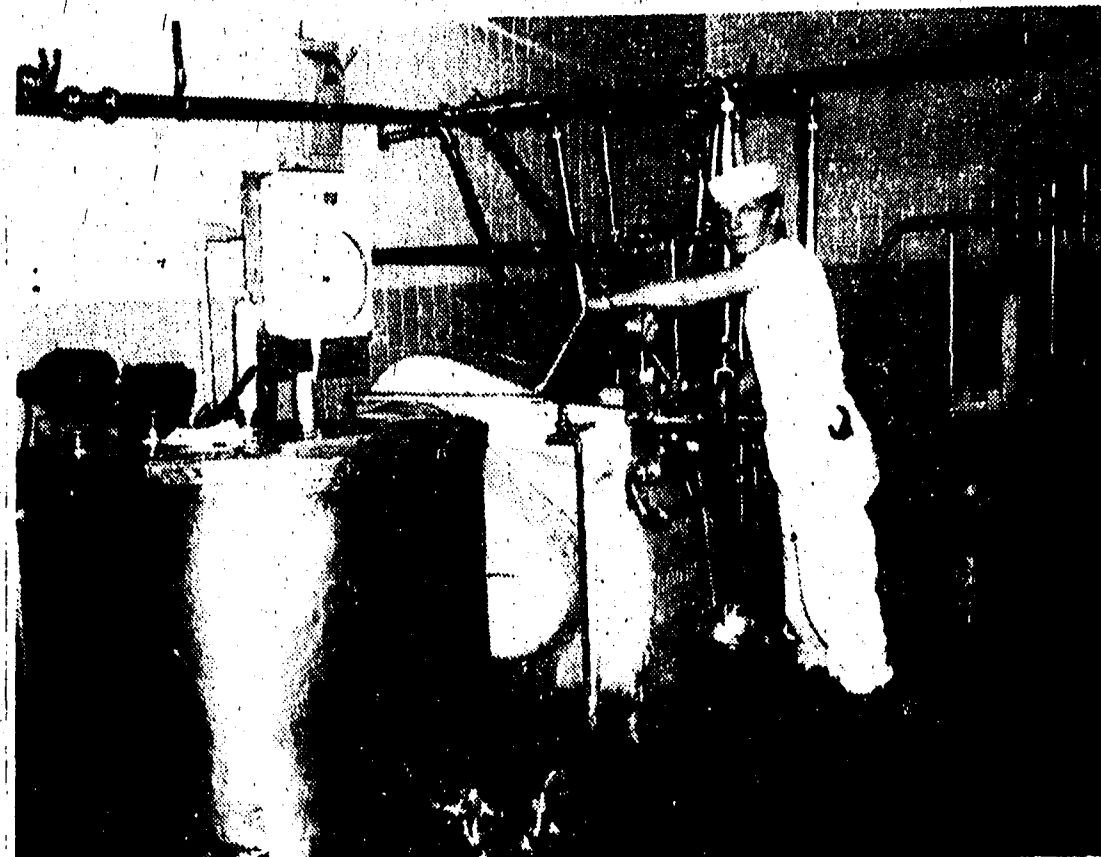

## FARMERS WORK LONG HOURS TO PRODUCE PURE MILK

According to some authorities MILK is the most perfect food for humans. Actually, it is perhaps the most common word in food language.

The MILK INDUSTRY, from the farm to the processing plant to the store, has seen many changes in the last two or three decades. The farmer must have an economic unit. He needs cows that will pay their way. He has now become selective with his cattle. He records their MILK WEIGHT. He watches the various breeds. He determines that a cow that has 10,000 pounds of milk a year is the type of cow that he wants. This cow will provide him with a living. If his cow goes below that, he is then in the position of supporting a boarder.

The farmer's next problem is meeting health regulations. This is necessary in order that the eventual customer may have a pure product. This work starts right on the farm. The cattle must be cleaned before milking. The barn and facilities must conform to rigid health regulations. All

his utensils have to be sterile and clean. He can only milk when the barn is suitable for the reception of milk.

The farmer's problem increases due to the fact that MILK is easily contaminated. It must be handled carefully. Once a cow is milked the farmer is required to

remove the animal heat as quickly as possible. It is this heat that can generate some of the problems that are encountered with milk if it is not initially handled correctly. By various methods, it is required that the temperature must immediately be brought to about forty degrees. Contact with

outer air, etc., is completely minimized if there is any at all. The product then on the farm at forty degrees is carried to the local milk plant.

So you can easily see that the dairy farmer's lot is not an easy one in the producing of a pure product.

### How To Find A Family Doctor

People moving from one community to another often experience difficulty in finding a family doctor in their new surroundings, especially if they didn't have one in their former home.

The Canadian Medical Association says that those who have a family doctor and are contemplating a move to another community should have no problem. All they need do is ask their doctor to refer them to a family physician in their new community. Ideally, the former doctor will write a letter of introduction and send along a summary of the family records to the new doctor.

People who did not have a family doctor in their former community will be on their own in the new community. As soon as they are settled they should set out to find a doctor. The nearest hospital will provide a list of family doctors on its staff, and this list can be screened by neighbours, fellow workers or others whose judgement you trust.

Once a name is selected, an appointment with the doctor should be arranged at once, when the family is well. If his practice is not overcrowded, he will accept the new family and there will be no problem when illness strikes. Unfortunately, most

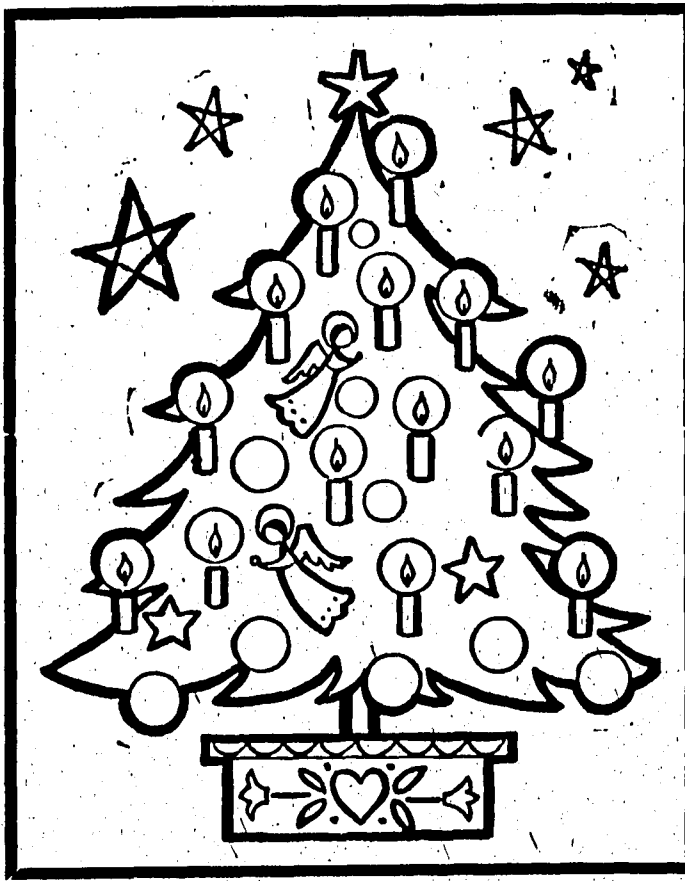

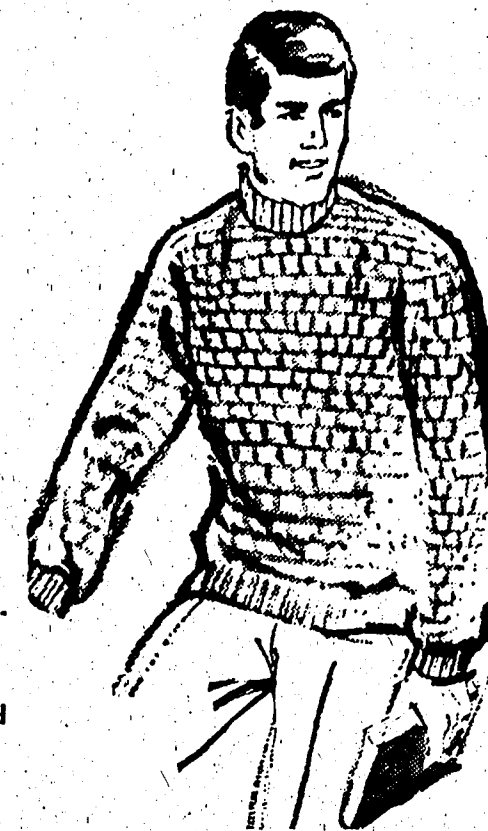

## WESTPORT MAN HEADS DIGBY LIBERALS

Raymond Robicheau, Westport, was elected president of the Digby County Liberal Association. Mr. Robicheau succeeds Emanuel Adelaar, Weymouth. Other officers elected were John Nichols, Digby, vice president; Mrs. Roy Robinson, Conway, Secretary, and Richard Warner, Digby, re-elected treasurer. On the nominating committee to present the slate of officers were Maurier Dunn, Mrs. Leigh Sabine and Keith Finigan. Nominations from the floor resulted in voting for several offices.

Guest speaker at the annual meeting held at the Lions Club Hall was Gerald Regan, leader of Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition in the Provincial House.

Dealing with the Bosco steel crisis in Cape Breton, Mr. Regan told the audience he felt February was too late to report to the elected representatives on steps being taken to deal with the problems in Sydney as that would be only a month and a half before the

deadline for closing the plant. One of the greatest virtues of parliamentary government, he said, is for the various parties to meet and solve problems by discussing together and offering constructive criticism. Mr. Regan said the government wants to use legislation as a "rubber stamp" after they have taken action on Dosco but they were not seeking advice.

The government insists on "playing Russian roulette with the financial future of Nova Scotia by investing vast sums of the people's money in long shot industries that employ few people to be of help to the economy of Nova Scotia," Mr. Regan said.

He disagreed with the government's proposed undertaking to increase the sales tax and said "the government should carefully examine other possible sources of revenue including the money which could be saved by less waste in purchasing practices and more efficient administration." Mr. Regan objected to an

## Three Will Not Re-Offer

Mayor C. D. Snow and councillors Greg Gilliat and Gerald Hoare made it plain at Digby town council on Monday evening that they will not re-offer for seats on the council. Deputy Mayor Stewart MacNaughton had not made up his mind whether he would reoffer or not. Candidates elected in the December 5 election, will be elected for a three year term. Mayor Snow has served for two years each, two terms of two years each.

Nominations for candidates to fill the seats of Mayor and councillors will close November 21. Nominations can be filled from November 14 date. Present councillors may re-offer but this does not prevent names of new candidates being submitted. If there are more than three names submitted for councillors, an election will be held. Likewise if there are more names than one for mayor an election for mayor will be held.

A councillor must be a British subject of 21 years of age or more, a ratepayer for at least a year and a resident or has principal place of business in town at least a year.

The office of Mayor must be filled by a person who is qualified to be a councillor, is a resident and ratepayer for at least three years preceding the nomination, rated on real property assessed not less than \$500 or upon personal property not less than \$1000 or real and personal not less than \$1000.

All rates and taxes of candidates for councillor or mayor must be fully paid at least ten days before the last day of nominations and persons must give written consent to their candidacy.

It is understood that the Digby Board of Trade is interested and active in submitting names of candidates. It was suggested that they look around for men who would be capable and willing to assume civil responsibilities.

In event of an election it will be at the Fire Hall on 1st Avenue, it was decided at Monday's meeting. Presiding officers will be Harry Titus and Alfred Grimmer. Poll clerks will be Mrs. Barbara Weir and Mrs. George Winfield.

The street height was raised above the height of the sidewalk with the recent paving project.

The police report was given by Councillor Gerald Hoare who revealed 15 complaints laid with the police in October. All were terminated to the satisfaction of those involved.

## Town Employees Wage

### Average 6.9% Increase

The Wage of the Digby town employees will average out to an average of 6.9 per cent increase according to a resolution presented by Deputy Mayor Stewart MacNaughton and adopted by the council at Monday night's regular meeting. The crew will have a 44 hour week and after 48 hours, time and a half will be paid. Two weeks vacation will be granted each year. After 10 year service the employee will be entitled to the three weeks vacation each year. The increase in wages, retroactive to October 5, had a variation of increase for employees of different years service.

Mr. MacNaughton reported that 635 hours had been spent by the street crew in October on the water project at a cost of \$738.34 wages. 2053 hours were spent on the streets at a cost of \$2466. This included widening and ditching, rock filling, gravelling, grading, etc.

Sixty-four hours at a cost of \$75, were spent on sewers. Mileage on the superintendent's car was 590 miles at an expense of \$59. The latter expense was requested to be kept at a minimum now that a half ton truck had been obtained by the town.

The superintendent of streets, Everett Hall, reported that intention was to build through the winter work's program a compound for storage of town equipment. The fencing had arrived for the project. This will be erected soon and the compound gravelled to overcome the wet ground. The compound is on St. Mary's St.

By motion a \$10,000 borrowing resolution was renewed. This resolution went through a year ago for the purpose of constructing a pipe line to the lake from which the town gets its water supply. It is expected this work will now be done before winter sets in.

## Valley Radio Network Seeks To Expand To Digby

A letter from W. A. Bishop, managing director, Annapolis Valley Radio Network, noted interest in providing more satisfactory radio service to the Digby-Annapolis area. Interest was aroused by a request from the Digby Town Council and Digby Board of Trade that better radio news service from Nova Scotia be provided listeners in Digby.

Mr. Bishop's letter read at

the Digby Council meeting on Monday night revealed that they had been unsuccessful in obtaining a suitable frequency for a station location in the Digby-Annapolis area which would provide service beyond the period from sunrise to sunset.

A change of location, power and frequency of transmitter from CKAD, Middleton, would provide service; it is understood, giving a stronger signal than two of the sta-

tions now heard in Digby from Saint John and closely equal to the third. Although signal strength in Digby would not be one hundred percent effective, a study of American interference and observation of present signals being received from Saint

John would indicate service would be satisfactory, Mr. Bishop stated, under most interference conditions.

Application for change must be in the hands of the Department of Transport by January to meet deadline hearings in April.



## Base To Expand

Newly appointed Defence Minister, Leo Cadioux announced in Halifax last week that CFB Cornwallis would be expanded next spring to become a major training centre for Canada's armed forces. It is understood that about 60 instructors will be added to the staff. Cornwallis is expected to become the basic training base for all English speaking air force and navy men and for all women from the three forces.

Mr. Cadioux said the expansion will take place about April or May and the average number of recruits taking the eight-week course will be 1000.

# 90 Years Back

FROM EARLY FILES OF THE DIGBY COURIER

November 9, 1877.

Thirteen years before the incorporation of the town of Digby, in the year 1877, the Grand Jury that administered the affairs of the Township of Digby decided the large bills for maintaining prisoners in idleness in the county jail were not necessary. "We therefore put into the estimates the sum of \$20 for the purchase of old 'junk' to be converted by them into oakum, and will also appoint energetic officers to purchase the raw material and dispose of the oakum manufactured and allowing them 10% on the oakum sold and would also empower this committee to see that they do the work or cut them short in their board."

"Liverpool, N. S., has a posse of five men who will patrol the streets at night. That's what Digby wants."

"The skating rink fever has again taken hold of the minds of quite a large number of our young men and women; and there have been one or two unsuccessful attempts made before. The project, at present time, bids fair of success. On Wednesday last some eight or more men were employed to make a commencement on the available site of land owned by the Hon. E. R. Oakes, near Quirk's Tannery, this gentlemen having kindly granted the privilege. We understand that a suitable dam for the overflow of half an acre at least can be erected at a small cost; and as other means outside of the general subscription are to be augmented, we trust that this attempt will not meet the fate of those which have preceded it."

### Indigestion And Patent Medicines

Different people associate different symptoms with indigestion, the Canadian Medical Association reports.

The most common symptoms are pain in the stomach and chest, fullness or bloating in the abdomen, an excessive amount of gas, heart burn, loss of appetite and even nausea. Most people find these symptoms occurring soon after meals, and more frequently after eating certain foods. Sometimes they associate headache and constipation with indigestion.

There are many patent medicines available without prescription which are supposed to be useful in the relief of any or all of these symptoms. The three main groups are antacids, laxative and headache remedies.

Antacids are taken to coun-

teract the effect of the hydrochloric acid normally present in the stomach. Taking large amounts of antacid may, however, disturb the chemical balance of the body and cause such complications as kidney stones.

The constant taking of laxatives to relieve constipation may interfere with the absorption from the intestine of vitamins and other important food factors.

Some of the drugs commonly used in headache tablets have been shown to cause inflammation of the kidneys.

The C.M.A. says, these are but three examples of why it is unwise for people to administer to themselves large amounts of patent medicines. The other very important factor, of course, is that the symptoms they are treating may be due to an underlying disease. It would be more sensible for the individual to consult his doctor.

## Report From Parliament Hill

While the Commons has often been criticized for its division and dissent, in time of National emergency, mourning and local loss, it has the capacity to consolidate the mood of the Nation, region or province. Such was the case this week when Donnie MacInnis rose slowly, and under obvious strain asked the Speaker to set aside the regular business of the House so that a matter of urgent public importance could be discussed. All in the Chamber knew why he spoke and the rustle of papers and whisper of conversation stilled as Members thought of a City which had been given five and a half months to live. The concern and consternation for the fate of Sydney was shared by speakers on all sides of the House in a rare display of unanimity.

Also shared by all was the shock at the suddenness of announcement. Friday the 13th will long be remembered by the people of Cape Breton, and indeed across the land as the extreme in corporate callousness. After 67 years of business the absentee owners from Britain think crippling a city is like closing a door. The lack of concern for those behind the door makes a charade of 20th century capitalism. In fact a capitalist of some note, the Hon. George Hees, staled with deep feeling that the officials involved should remember it is 1967 not 1867.

The Hon. Allan MacEachen in closing out the one day debate correctly stated the feeling of most when he said that immediate solutions to such a complex problem were not possible, especially where everyone was still bewildered by the decision of the Company. The shock was compounded by two fairly recent events. Firstly, it was only this Spring that an agreement was made between the provincial and federal governments and Dosco whereby the governments loaned over 4 million dollars to the Company to expand dockage facilities at Sydney, and only last month a report of a steel making study was released outlining some of the problems of the Plant, but not one tittle of suggestion was made that it would be shut down and this report was produced under the joint auspices of the Atlantic Development Board, the Nova Scotia Voluntary Planning Council and officials at Dosco.

Because of the rules of the House and the strict time limits imposed on this special debate, it was not possible for all Members to speak. While one does not have to elaborate on the obvious, most Members talked in general about the economic catastrophe which would follow closure of the Plant. This Member wonders if all Nova Scotians, let alone Canadians, fully appreciate the economic impact. The 3200 workers at Sydney exceed in number 20 of the 40 towns and cities in Nova Scotia which have a population of 1000 and over; they comprise 11% of males engaged in manufacturing in Nova Scotia and in 1967 the plant contributed 10% of Nova Scotia's manufacturing output. To achieve the same relative economic impact in Ontario, on the basis of wages from manufacturing in 1964, you would have to close down all the paper and allied industries, the food and beverage industry, the printing and publishing industries and the industries making cars, trucks and buses in Ontario. Those 4 groups of industries produced approximately one-third of the wages of manufacturing workers in Ontario in 1964, almost identical with the wage impact of the Sydney steel plant as related to the rest of Nova Scotia. The closing of Ford and General Motors in Oakville and Oshawa respectively, the shut down of Inco at Sudbury and closure of COMICO in Trail, B. C., would be the only potential comparisons for economic impact. Even the move of Ottawa's 50,000 civil servants would not relatively be any more disastrous. If that mass migration occurred then By-Town would have double, and poignant meaning. The fate of Sydney looms as large!

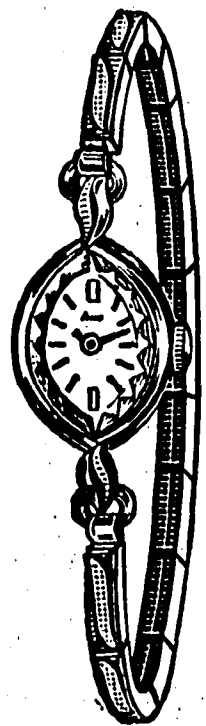

Refreshments were served and a social time enjoyed.



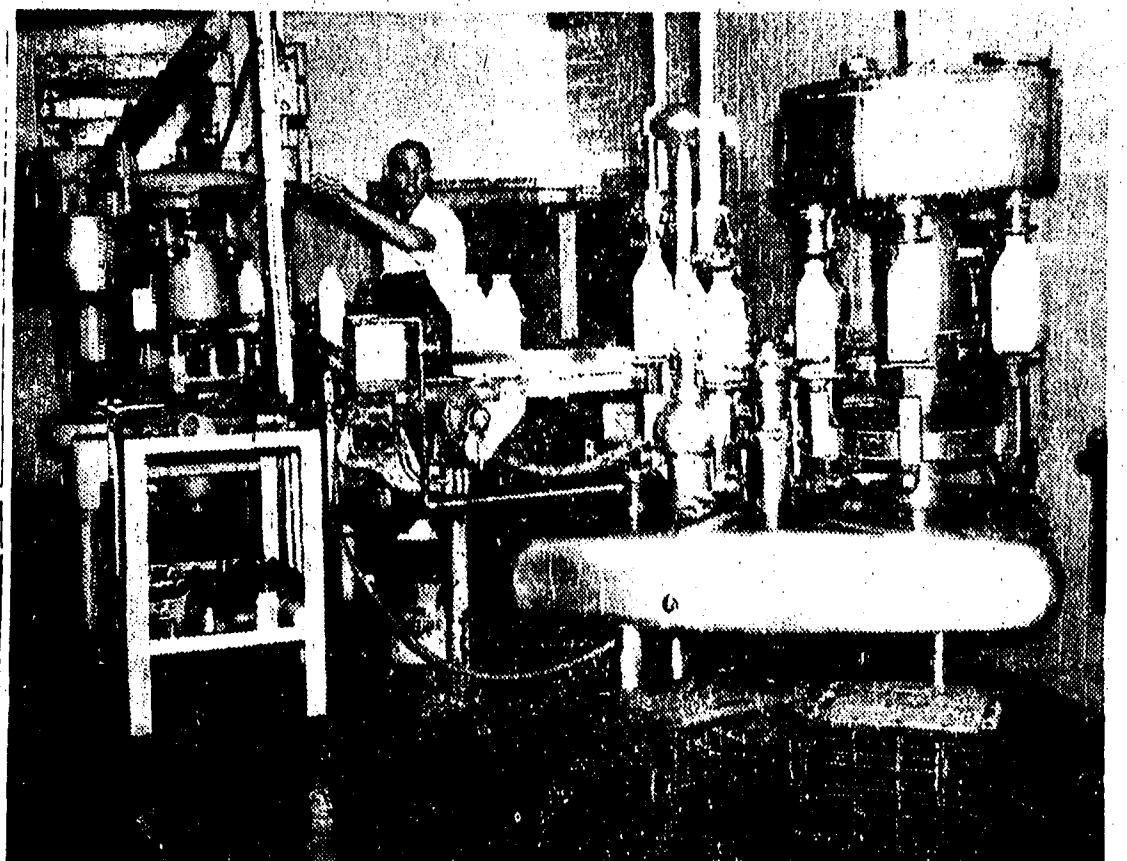

## Copy of 300 Year Old Treaty Found

The original published copy of a 300 year-old treaty by which Acadia was given back to France has been located in Halifax.

Found by a local amateur historian, Gerard O'Brien, the treaty, known as the Treaty of Breda, was published in 1667 by the printers of King Charles II.

Dr. Bruce Fergusson, Nova Scotia Archives, verifies Mr. O'Brien's claim that his copy is the original printed version. The treaty, signed in 1667, ended a war between England and France. According to its terms, Acadia was returned to France while England gained concessions in the West Indies.

The treaty is important in Nova Scotia's history because without it the expulsion of the Acadians in 1755 might never have occurred.

Without it, Mr. O'Brien claims, Longfellow might never have had the inspiration for his immortal "Evangeline."

The modern highway is one of the important elements contributing to the economic well-being of any geographical area. Industry depends on rapid, year-round transportation to maintain a competitive position with products produced by other geographical rivals.

Nova Scotia, anxious to provide the basic facilities required by massive industrial development of the past decade, is working toward a satisfactory system of main trunk highways to service the entire province.

The goal is to achieve sometime within the next four to five years a system of all-weather arterial or trunk highways accommodating all of the major industrial and population centers in the province.

Yet at the same time the plan is to continue a substantial program of improvement, building, and paving of the vital secondary road system made up of local and collector roads.

Controlled access highways benefit the province as a whole by ensuring orderly and rapid admittance of traffic from secondary roads only at interchanges designed for this purpose. Traffic can flow at high speed with the assurance of unimpeded progress, a great boon for the trucking industry as well as the motorist.

The second vital adjunct in building the modern highway system to serve the province is to couple controlled access with all weather construction, where possible.

"All-weather" implies standards of construction permitting use of highways year-round, thus ending the perennial bugbear of maximum axle weights during the spring when frost leaves the ground.

This is not to say that Nova Scotia shuts down during the spring break-up, rather the annoying detours as well as

time consuming shipment breakups, are necessary at present, where sections are not yet designed for year round use. Sections of highways now in use and others under construction and planned, will be built to conform with all-weather requirements throughout their length.

The Nova Scotia Department of Highways, which is responsible for maintenance, construction and planning of the province's road system is embarking on this ambitious program under what might be loosely referred to as a three pronged attack.

(1) Where existing roads are suitable, extensive widening and "weather proofing" is being carried out along with realignment and isolated major diversions to avoid traffic congestion and winding curves.

(2) In other areas, totally new, controlled access, all-weather highways are being built parallel to existing highways which are unsuited for improvement due to excessive congestion and indirect routing.

(3) Completion of final sections of the Trans Canada Highway for 1968, providing complete all-weather construction along its entire length from the New Brunswick border to North Sydney in Cape Breton. Construction of traffic flyovers and access roads will continue on past 1968.

Nova Scotia's drive for increased productivity and industrial expansion will soon be made over modern all-weather highways.

Here is what the final picture will look like in four to five years time when the road gangs lay the final mile of asphalt, complete the bridges, causeways and traffic interchanges.

The section of Trunk No. 3 running from Bridgewater to the Halifax-Dartmouth metropolitan area; Trunk No. 2 running from Truro to the Halifax-Dartmouth metropol-

itan area; the Sydney bypass running from North Sydney to Glace Bay as well as the section of Trunk No. 1 running from the Halifax-Dartmouth metropolitan area to Middleton will consist of totally new, all-weather, controlled access highway.

Running from Amherst to the Nova Scotia border to North Sydney, the Trans Canada Highway stretches

for a total of 270 miles; 171 miles will be new, parallel to existing road resulting in all weather but not controlled access highway. Here, present 10 foot traffic lanes will be widened to 11 and 12 feet. Four foot shoulders will be increased to eight feet. Alignment, removal of extreme curves and isolated major diversions will complete the picture of this area.

The section of Trunk No. 1 running from Middleton to Yarmouth as well as the portion of Trunk No. 3 running

from Bridgewater to Yarmouth will consist of upgraded existing road resulting in all weather but not controlled access highway. Here, present 10 foot traffic lanes will be widened to 11 and 12 feet. Four foot shoulders will be increased to eight feet. Alignment, removal of extreme curves and isolated major diversions will complete the picture of this area.

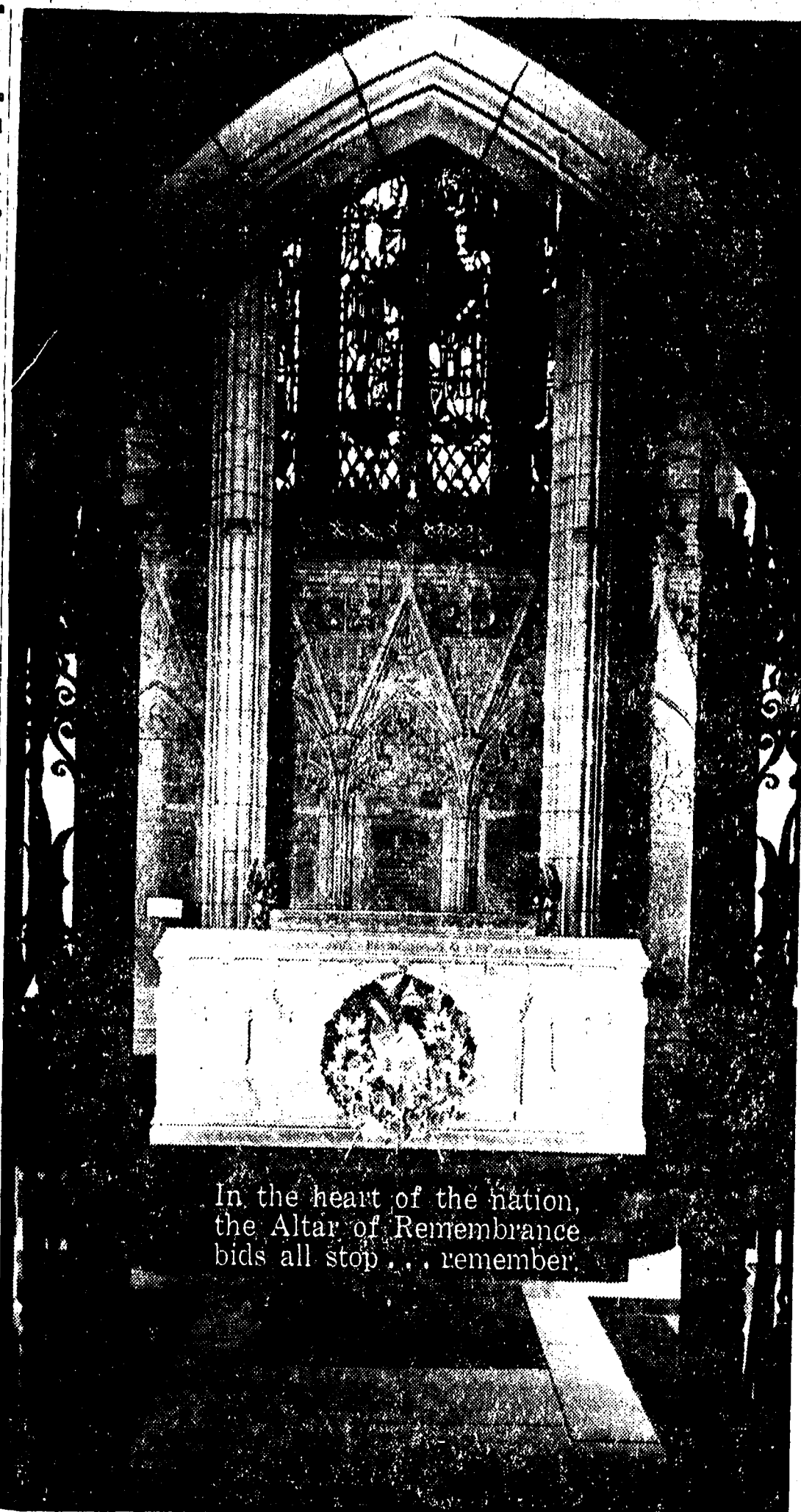

## Clare T. B. Outbreak Under Control

The Cape District High  
School tuberculosis outbreak  
is now under control. Dr. V.  
K. Rideout, director of the  
Western Health Unit, told the  
annual staff meeting of the  
Nova Scotia department of  
public health. The school had  
been tested in September.  
There were no new positive  
reactions reported.

Dr. Rideout said that during  
the period of November 1966  
to February 1967, two hun-  
dred and twenty-three conver-  
sions were reported at the  
school. A conversion is a  
change from a negative reac-  
tion to a positive reaction, af-  
ter the infection has entered  
the body. However, from  
March to May, eleven were  
found, making a total of two  
hundred and thirty-four.

Of the two hundred and  
thirty-four, thirty-four were  
tuberculosis cases, and were  
confined to the Nova Scotia  
Sanatorium, in Kentville, Dr.  
Rideout said. Since the out-  
break, sixteen have been dis-  
charged and have resumed  
normal life.

The remaining two hundred  
put on preventative treatment  
and at the present time, the  
treatment is continuing. Dr.  
Rideout stressed the infection  
was purely a school one, and  
the community had no part  
to play in its spread.

continuing at Meteghan.

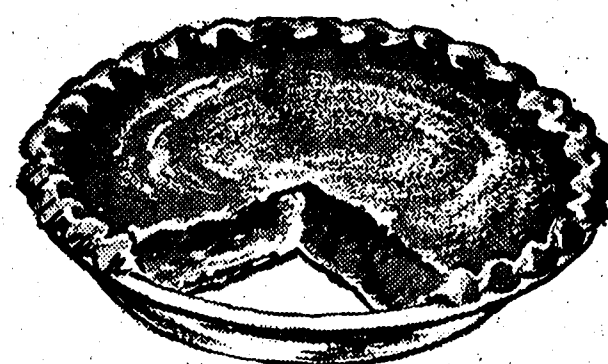

## SEEKING COUNCILLORS SLATE

President Reigh Jayne of the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday evening reported that the civic committee from the Board had contacted numerous persons regarding serving on the Digby town council as Mayor or Councillor. Owing to an interpretation of the occupancy tax which has been substituted for tax on personal property in town several of the prospects were not confident of their qualifications. Mr. Jayne said. This limit, the number of prospective candidates until a ruling can be obtained. (At time of press no ruling had been received.)

Among the names of persons who might consider the office of mayor as reported by Mr. Jayne were Stewart MacNaughton, presently deputy mayor of the town; Glen Smith, fisheries officer and E. Y. Porter, administrator at the Digby General Hospital. The name of Mrs. A. J. Dillon was also mentioned. It is understood that while these persons have not definitely given their consent to seek election, they have indicated they would con-

template the matter if a decision was reached in favor of becoming a candidate, both the office of mayor and that of councillor would be considered.

At press time on Wednesday evening no official nominations had been received at Digby Town Hall. Nominations can be submitted until November 21, it is understood.

A councillor must be a British subject of 21 years of age or more, a ratepayer for a least a year and a resident or has principal place of business in town at least a year.

The office of Mayor must be filled by a person who has qualified to be a councillor, is a resident and ratepayer for at least three years preceding the nomination, rated on real property assessed not less than \$500 or upon personal property not less than \$1000 or real and personal not less than \$1000.

All rates and taxes of candidates for councillor or mayor must be fully paid at least ten days before the last day of nominations and persons must give written consent to their candidacy.

Mr. VanTassell referred to the fact that this general area was started by the Klondike Gold Rush. His mine was the largest silver producing mine in North America until recently.

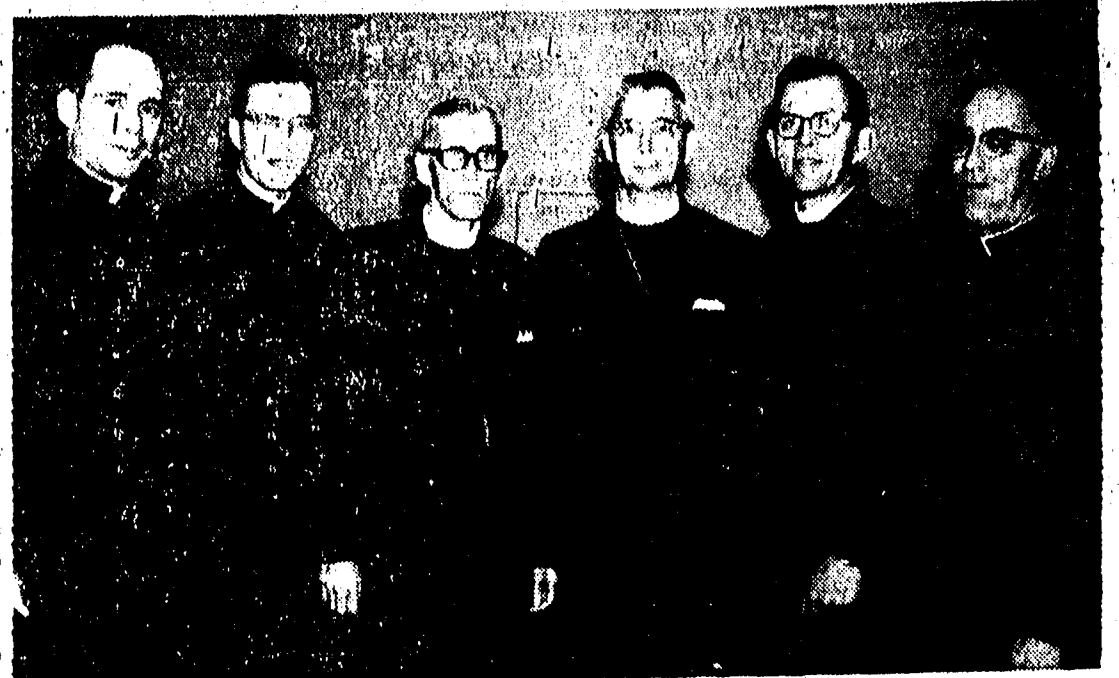

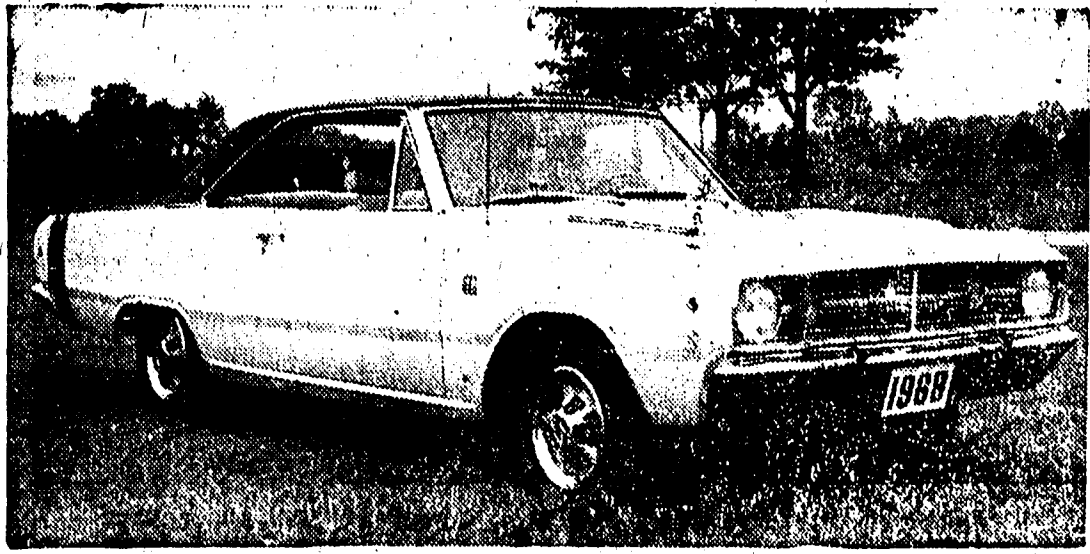

## Cabinet Holds Historic Items

At the close of the church service at the Hill Grove Baptist Church on Sunday afternoon, November 12th, a cabinet containing several items of historical interest was dedicated in memory of all the members who had formerly served the church during the 130 years of its existence.

Rev. H. S. Hartlin conducted the Dedication Service, explaining the significance of each item and speaking of the members who had been faithful to the church and dedicating the cabinet and contents to their memory, and closing the service with prayer.

## Mission To Ottawa

Quietly departing to Ottawa. Quietly making a week long visit. Quietly returning. What was the quiet mission? It is understood that Bernard had been getting a bit jittery about this "mini-austerity" program that has been talked about and his object was to see that it didn't spread its tentacles as far as the Bay of Fundy ferry service. Mr. LeBlanc believed more could be accomplished in a quiet orderly manner and so took off for the capital city. The Courier source of information informed that Mr. LeBlanc was able to see Hon. Alan MacEachen and other officials on his visit. In fact, further information revealed he was able to see all the persons he had proposed to see and came home just as enthused, even more so, than when the delegation presented the brief in Ottawa re the Digby-Saint John ferry, a couple of months ago.

On Saturday, Mr. LeBlanc, president of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, will preside at the annual meeting of the organization to be held in Middleton. Guest speaker at the

meeting will be Hon. Alan MacEachen, federal minister of health and welfare, who will deal at the time with transportation across the Bay of Fundy from Digby to Saint John. Whether there will be any specific announcement from the Department of Transport through Mr. MacEachen at that time is open to speculation.

Also present at the annual meeting on Saturday will be J. Patrick Nowlan, P.C. federal member for Digby-Annapolis-Kings.

## Boat Owners Have Difficulty From Lack Of Crew

Fisheries Minister, Robt. Chaud has called a special federal provincial meeting for November 15th in Moncton where he will discuss with provincial fisheries ministers the subject of Unemployment Insurance to fishermen and fishing problems. The Fisheries Council of Canada, had petitioned the government not to make further increases in U. I. C. benefits as this would lighten the problem of boat owners not finding full complements of crews for their boats.

Fisheries Council claims that the UIC has created a situation where many fishermen can draw almost equal

pay at home rather than fishing full time. The intent of the insurance is to protect the fishermen from being out of work through no cause of their own, but this situation does not prevail in today's fishing industry.

The fishing industry can not get enough skilled fishermen and yet \$10,000,000 a year is being spent supposedly because these men cannot find work.

The federal government, who have paid out more than \$40 million since 1962 for the construction of modern fishing trawlers, are vitally concerned with the crew shortage and the fact that many boat owners are in financial difficulties because of lack of crews.

The meeting will also look into other claims that the fishing fleet expansion has led to the construction of too many boats of the same design which could become obsolete in a few years. Most of these new boats were constructed under Federal shipbuilding subsidies, and provincial government fishermen's loan board money.

In 1966-67, \$18 million in subsidies were paid out in the Atlantic Provinces for 28 new vessels. In addition about \$7.5 million have been paid out for 101 wooden vessels, most of them scallop draggers in Yarmouth Shelburne and Lunenburg during the past 5 years.

Estimates for 1967-68 indicate that another \$24 million

in subsidies will be paid out for another 36 trawlers.

With many fishing boat owners finding themselves in serious financial difficulties because their boats sit idle without adequate crews, both Federal and Provincial governments are having growing concerns over their investments.

to service a fast ferry connection across the Bay of Fundy to the most easterly point of the United States. There to connect with a direct line through New England to Central Canada and the center of the continent.

At the Nova Scotia end other expressways could in time provide transfer service from Yarmouth to the Annapolis Basin terminal and from Sydney via Canso Causeway to Halifax. All with sufficient interchanges to service inland and coastal areas and create suitable locations for industrial parks and distributing centers. Valuable water supplies, drained from inland areas during the spring freshets could be held in storage for industrial and power potential, by the expressway roadbed.

Modern thoroughways of today gain simplicity of construction and more interesting design by the separation of multiple lanes. This permits the construction of two lanes first, followed by another two lanes later to establish the required four lane expressway. The saving of miles and time possible by such an all weather direct highway could favor a toll charge to assist in the overall cost of the completed expressway.

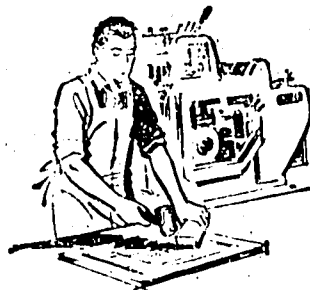
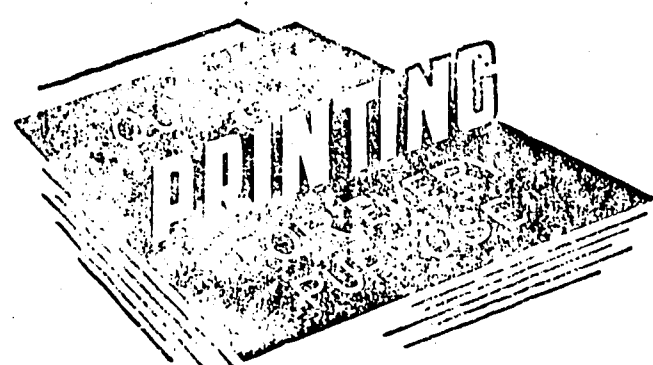
While antihistamines can help to relieve the annoying symptoms of a cold, they have nothing to do with curing a cold. The Canadian Medical Association advises that general measures such as warmth, sufficient rest and sleep, and the avoidance of exposure will do much more to help the patient when the cold runs its course.

People who use antihistamines should remember two important points:

1. It might not be a cold they are treating. Many other conditions can cause the same symptoms as the common cold, including allergies, measles and other infectious diseases.

2. Antihistamines have side-effects. They cause drowsiness. Pilots are not allowed to use antihistamines while flying, and drivers of automobiles should be extra careful if they're taking antihistamines. Sometimes antihistamines will upset the stomach or bowel, and occasionally will cause an allergy.

The C.M.A. reports that some people find that paper tissues aggravate colds. While rare, it is possible for the tissue fibres, certain dyes or chemicals used in the manufacture of tissues, to irritate some people. Most of these people discover this for themselves and use cloth handkerchiefs.

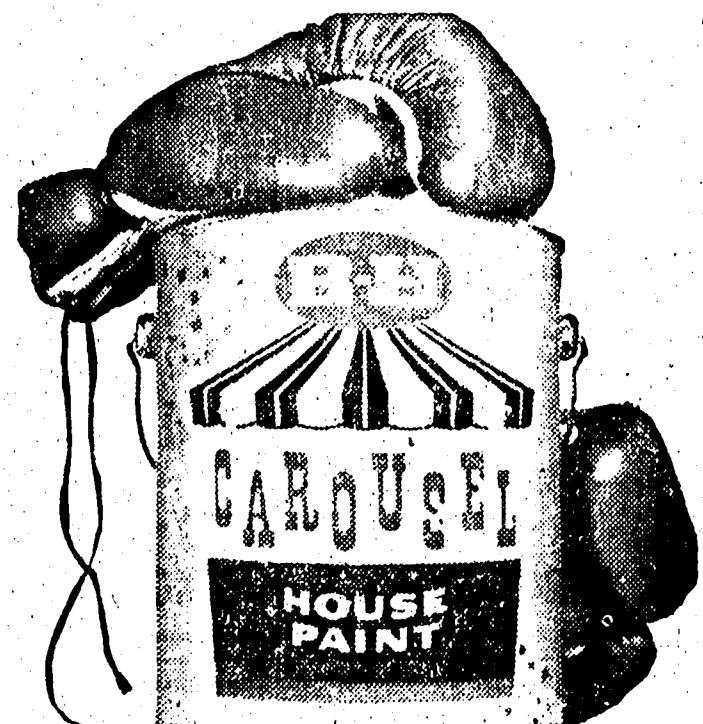

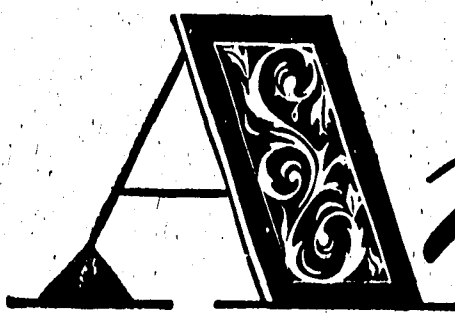

## Appeals For Wharves Saulnierville And Meteghan

John O. Bower, (P.C. Shelburne, Yarmouth and Clare) said in the House of Commons this week that the port Meteghan River, one of the few more natural harbours on the St. Mary's Bay, had been shipping industry there. 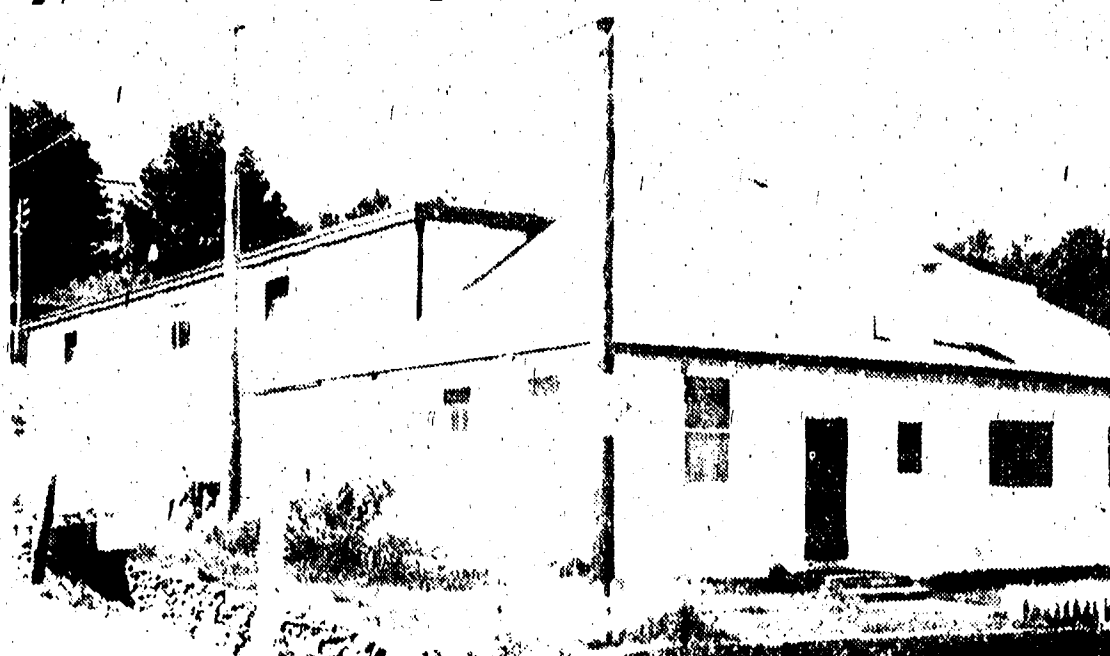

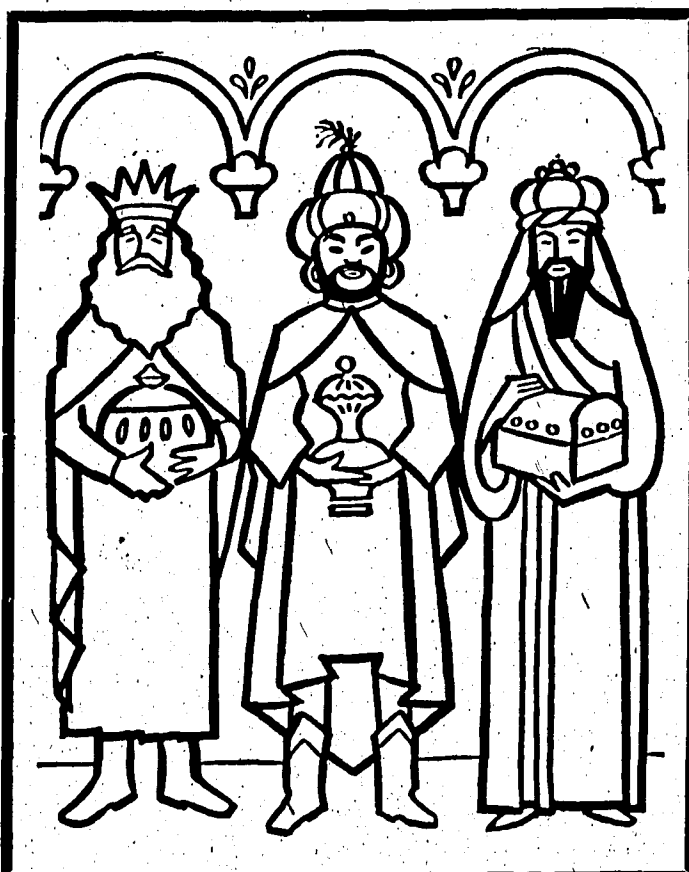

## Multi-Purpose Patrol Boat Joins Fleet

A multi-purpose patrol boat with two sets of engines, a fully equipped radar dome and special "anti-rolling" devices, has joined the fleet of the Maritime Safety Agency in Japan.

Setting a new standard for versatility, the 1,820 ton Izu can travel half way round the world without taking on fuel or supplies. However, its main operating area will be off the Marianas Islands where it will assist and, if necessary, rescue vessels of the Japanese fishing fleet.

Meteorological equipment on the Izu, with a range of 300 miles, will chart typhoons as they develop in the South Pacific. The Izu's radar will also explore iceberg-infested northern waters.

On an emergency mission the Izu operates with twin 5,200 h.p. diesels with a cruising speed of 20.3 knots. On rescue duty, twin 850 h.p. diesels take over, providing greater maneuverability at 12.7 knots. With its double engines the Izu has two sets of steering wheels.

To minimize rough seas, the Izu has a built-in self-operating tank of water that reduces pitch and roll. The anti-rolling tank is cheaper to operate than conventional controlled tank stabilizers. With the new tank system, the Izu travels at faster speeds.

Built at a cost of \$2,207,000, the Izu has modern living quarters — including air conditioning for the 72-man crew. The ward room and clinics have been moved from the heart of the ship to the upper deck.

The Izu — 313 feet in length, 38 feet wide, and with a depth of 22 feet — was constructed by Hitachi Shipbuilding and Engineering Co. Limited. Anti-rolling equipment was supplied by Nippon

We were on our way to spend the weekend with the Old Lady, at her pad in the city. What a peculiar feeling to enter a strange apartment building, go up an elevator, walk along a hall, knock on a strange door, and have your

own wife answer! It seems almost indecent or something, as though you had a kept woman.

That air mattress allowed me to deliver one of the last great puns of my life. I knew this cute gal on our staff had a mattress. We talked about me borrowing it. And the other day, in the staff room, I asked, in loud clear tones, "Miss S... Could we get together on that mattress?"

As all heads swung toward us with fascination, I waited to see whether she'd slug me, or laugh. She laughed. So did the others, but some of the old ducks rather nervously.

My wife has a nice little apartment, but one weekend it nearly drove me up the curtains. There's no place to hide and read, or look at yourself in the mirror, or cut your toenails. Except the bathroom. And you can only stay in there so long. At home, there are all sorts of nooks and crannies for looking at your navel, or picking fluff out of your belly-button.

The Minister of Lands and Forests declared that a recent notice regarding the removal of rock, sand and gravel from Provincial beaches will not be made applicable to commercial lobster fishermen who take some quantities of rock for use as weights for their lobster traps. This is a traditional practice by fisherman to which no objection is being taken.

We are calling to the attention of the public that lands below high water mark and under water and the rock, sand and gravel thereon, unless granted or leased, or permission has been obtained from the Province, are the property of the Province of Nova Scotia and should not be removed.

The intent of the order is to prevent commercial exploitation of an area by contractors who are using heavy equipment to remove large quantities of beach material without permission. This practice may result in alteration of the shoreline or cause erosion.

Requests for permission to remove material from these Crown lands should be addressed to the Deputy Minister, Department of Lands and Forests, P. O. Box 698, Provincial Administration Building, Halifax, Nova Scotia.

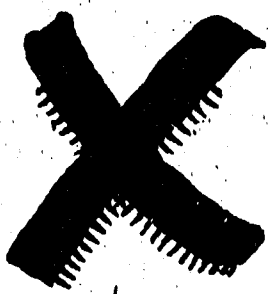

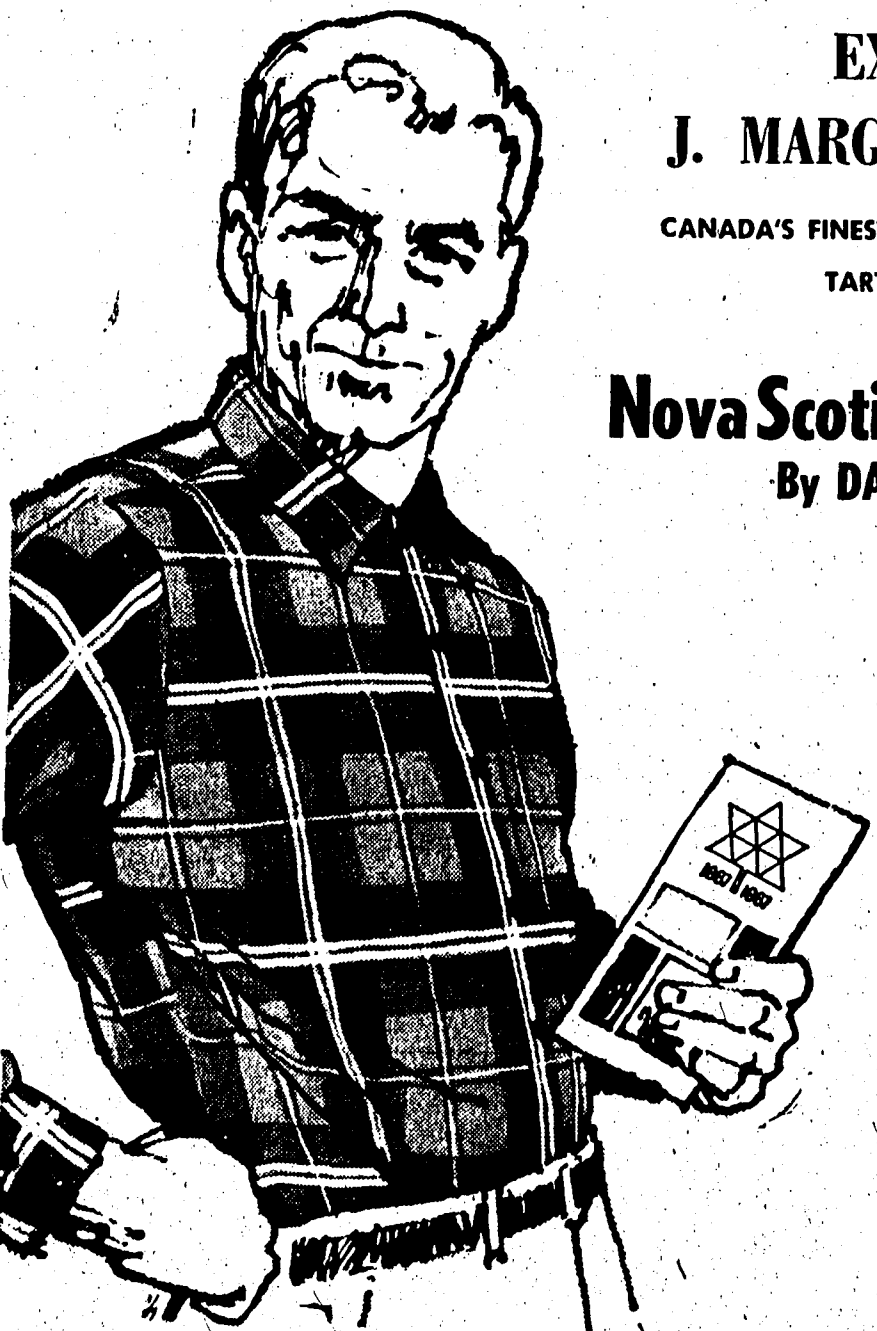

## NOWLAN IRRITATED

Pat Nowlan, M.P. for Digby-Annapolis-Kings, was irritated when attending the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade on Saturday evening. The president, Bernard LeBlanc, reported that Hon. Alan MacEachen, scheduled guest speaker could not be present because of foggy atmosphere conditions preventing aircraft from landing and intimated that if the minister had been present he would have made a statement on the Digby-Saint John ferry service. Mr. LeBlanc said that any such report would now be given by Transport Minister, Paul Hellyer to the Kingston Board of Trade on Saturday, November 25.

"I personally do not believe there will be a conclusive statement," Mr. Nowlan said in an evidently irritated voice. Mr. LeBlanc's statement gives a reasonable stimulus to ask another question in the House of Commons, Mr. Nowlan said. Mr. Nowlan stated that the transport minister indicated in recent correspondence with him that, "it would not be in the interest of negotiations that were going on, to have further questions".

Mr. Nowlan expressed his deep disturbance with the fact that this ferry question has been kicked around since 1960 and for fifteen years before that. He took exception with and expressed irritation with using the Digby-Saint John ferry for political purposes.

## Light Keeper Retires

After more than forty years as keeper of the light at Shaffner Point, Port Royal, B. Lloyd Shaffner has retired. Mr. Shaffner assumed his duties in September 1927. At that time the light was operated with kerosene oil, which required daily cleaning and filling. His duties also involved other maintenance work. Some fifteen years ago the light was converted to electricity. In October of this year, Mr. Shaffner, in his eighty-fourth year, and with failing eyesight, decided to relinquish his position.

and in the U.S.A., to find opportunities.

Mr. LeBlanc scored the lack of modern transportation in the area and said the area would be in the "dark ages" for a long time since the whole economy of Western Nova Scotia is tied up with transportation. The proposed updating of the Digby-Saint John Ferry Service, he said,

is seen not as an isolated phenomenon, but rather as a symptom of a larger and broader industrial complex which is becoming more and more evident in the entire Valley region from Windsor to Yarmouth.

Mr. LeBlanc said that the assured permanency of CFB Cornwallis, the proposed expansion of St. Anne's College and the acceleration of the fishing industry in Clare suggests a new pattern of action. He proposed a consolidation of existing industries in Clare and Digby with the view of establishing a research centre for the purpose of exploring more imaginative and lucrative ways of utilizing local raw materials, whether fish or lumber or other products. He said that small industries are now too small and too weak (See LeBLANC page 5)

## Improved Ferry Service Urged

Raymond Thurber, Freeport, speaking before the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade meeting here said that because "of antiquated and poor service to Brier Island and Long Island, he along with three other delegates would have to spend the night on the mainland as the ferry service stops at dark."

Mr. Thurber said for years a permanent crossing of Petite Passage has been sought to no avail although Digby's largest single industry, Connor Bros. Fish Plant on Long Island employs about 100 persons all year round. He said the Company cannot expand because of transportation difficulties but this is only one of the reasons a crossing is needed as it is often impossible to get the ill to hospital.

He said ferry services begin at 7 a.m. and end at dark and later added "that the operators could do 24 hour service if compelled to."

His resolution, which passed unanimously, asked the Department of Highways to provide 24 hour service, to and from the islands and the Nova Scotia Government to operate these antiquated services free

to stand alone to face the bitter competition from large national corporations or even to approach those departments of government that can assist when speaking with a united voice. Mr. LeBlanc suggested that the full industrial potential of Clare and Digby be assessed in a bold forward thrust which will justify a parallel expansion in transportation and education.

Because of certain labor disputes experienced in the Valley, Mr. LeBlanc recommended that ways and means be considered for better communication between labor and management. He suggested a seminar or conference for the Valley area to study the problems of management labor.

Concern was expressed at the A.V.A.B.T. on Saturday that the multi-million dollar expansion by Annapolis Valley industries may be jeopardized by what the Valley Boards of Trade considered to be delay by the Port of Halifax in modernizing methods of landing agricultural products.

Productivity, Mr. Eisner said, is not keeping pace. Increased wages are not in keeping with output. Individual workers, he said should work harder. You can't earn more without producing more, was his caution.

Speaking on business, Mr. Eisner said the only reward is profit and that is what business is established for. Business, he said, is to make a profit and to create or meet a need. Profit is good for welfare as taxes are paid on business profits. Profits on business provide jobs for people because the business can expand and add to its work force.

Mr. Eisner reviewed a few of the accomplishments of Boards of Trade in communities and their relationship with governments. He emphasized three important aspects of Canadian life as good government, good business and good citizenship.

"Construction of Expo was responsible for the almost runaway inflation that we are now experiencing" Mr. Eisner charged at the annual meeting of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade in the afternoon.

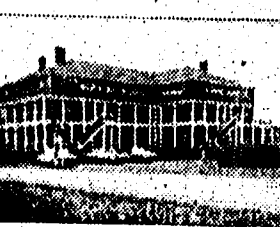

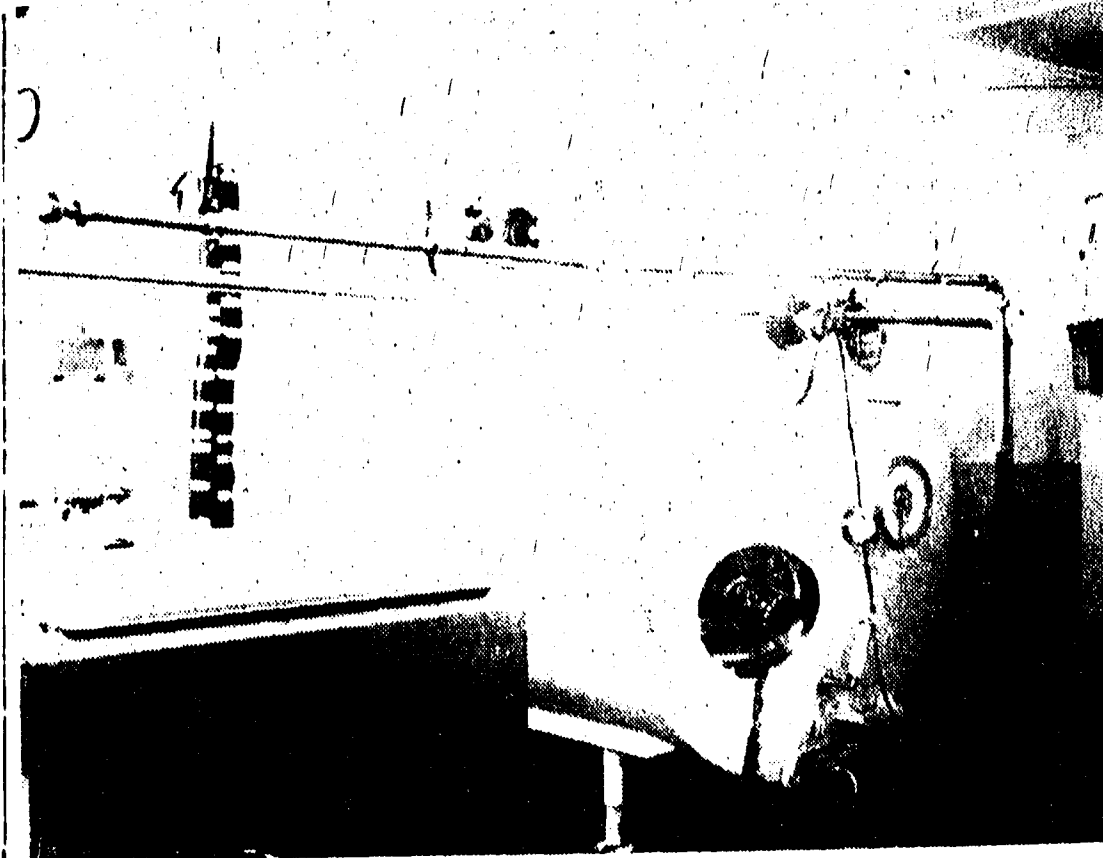

## Refrigeration Most Important In Milk Process

### HANDLING OF MILK AT THE PLANT

At the milk plant the product is first weighed, tested, checked for flavour, and periodically checked for bacteria, etc. Any milk not measuring up to the processing plant's requirements is rejected. Only qualifying milk is processed for consumption by customers of the local processing plant. After the milk is dumped and weighed at the dairy, it is forced through filters into holding tanks which hold the milk at approximately 40 degrees temperature for a period of a few hours until it has been pasteurized.

There are various kinds of pasteurizing processes. Our Digby plant has a vat process which requires that the milk be heated to 145 degrees for thirty minutes. This heating process is recorded automatically on a chart, allowing dairy officials to check full particulars of any vat that has been treated in this manner. After this process is carried on the milk is then carried through stainless steel pipes to a cooler, where it is cooled to about 38 degrees immediately. This shock from heat to cold gives you the pasteurizing process, and in the interim eliminates any harmful elements that might otherwise be in the milk. The pasteurizing process is very rigidly checked by the

Provincial Department of Health, who meticulously take samples, check the processing plant, and in turn make sure that the consuming public is receiving a properly nourishing, sterile, and healthful product.

After this process of heating and chilling, milk is then pumped to a bottler and filler machine. This is a comparatively simple process, and no doubt many of you have seen the operation at your local dairy. At one end of the operation is a bottle washer, which receives all bottles, puts them through a 20 minute sterilization pro-

cess, which uses steam, hot water, and a sterilizing agent. The bottle then is passed under the filling cup and with a spring lifting motion the milk automatically seeps in to the bottle and passes on to the capper. From there it is checked by the pasteurizing foreman, put in cases and carried to the dairy's cooler.

The refrigeration aspect of milk is very important, as you have read. Immediately milk is removed from the cow it goes into refrigeration to have the animal heat removed. While it is being held for delivery to the dairy,

it is kept at low temperature then, as soon as it has been pasteurized it is again kept in refrigeration. It is a credit to the processing procedures in this part of the area that milk has been known to be kept as long as seven or eight weeks in refrigeration with no apparent deterioration. This speaks well for the processing method and for the product that the farmer passes on to the dairy. From the dairy's cooler the milk is put in our vehicles and delivered to the various consumers, homes, institutions and stores.

## Two Hours Earlier For Lobsters

Under a new arrangement announced today by federal Fisheries Minister, H. J. Robichaud, lobster fishermen in Districts 1 and 4 may set their gear two hours earlier than permitted under previous regulations. The season opens after midnight on November 14 in District No. 1 and after midnight on November 27 in District No. 4.

Previously fishermen in these Districts were permitted to leave the shore and place gear on the fishing grounds 14 hours before the start of the lobster fishing season. Under the new ar-

range ment lobster fishermen are allowed to leave shore and set gear 16 hours before the prescribed opening of the season in the two districts, that is, at 8 a.m. on November 14 in District No. 1 and 8 a.m. on November 27 in District No. 4.

District No. 1 comprises that area of the Bay of Fundy off the New Brunswick counties of Charlotte and Saint John.

District No. 4 comprises the area off the Nova Scotia counties of Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne, Queens, Lunenburg and part of Halifax Co.

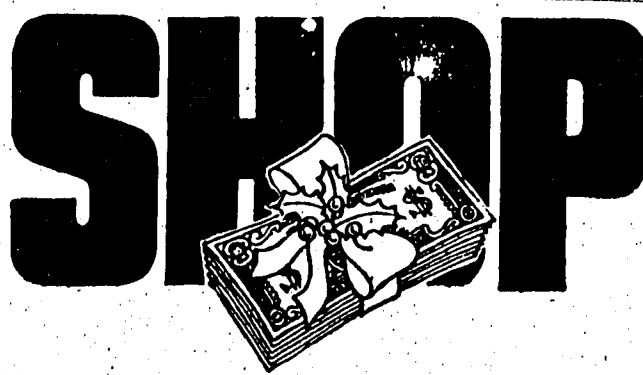

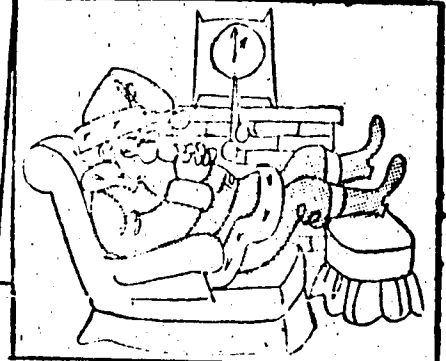

**Cold Vaccines — A Problem**

Vaccines are designed to prevent, not to cure, illnesses. The Canadian Medical Association reminds readers. There are more than 100 known viruses or other germs, any one of which may cause a cold. More types of viruses and germs are being identified every year. A vaccine prepared against one of these germs, might stimulate the body to manufacture antibodies that would prevent him from getting a cold caused by that one germ. BUT it won't protect him from the other 99. Another problem is that immunity thus created is not permanent, it generally lasts only a few weeks or months.

There are on the market the so-called polyvalent vaccines, which are a mixture of several of the most common known causes. However, the person who has received this vaccine is protected only temporarily from some of the common germs known to cause colds.

Remembering these limitations, it is recommended that persons with chronic conditions, such as chronic bronchitis, emphysema, or any chronic ailment, that might be aggravated by a cold, ask their doctor about cold vaccines.

Statistics show that in industry, time lost due to colds can be substantially reduced if all personnel receive polyvalent cold vaccine during the autumn.

In summary, the C.M.A. advises that not all colds can be prevented through the use of vaccines — but the vaccines do help and are advisable for some groups of people.

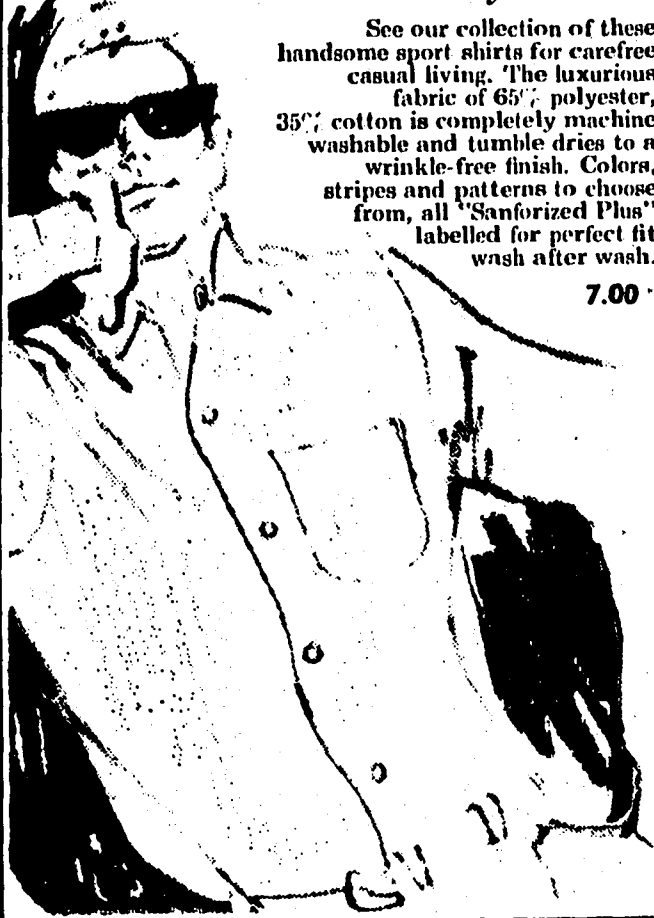

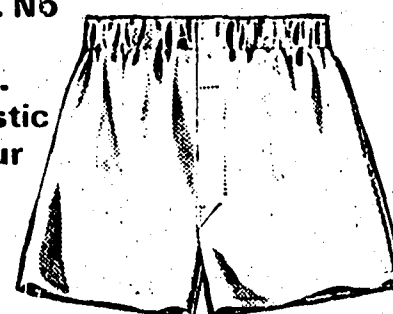

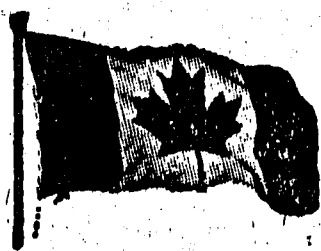

Stuart MacNaughton, deputy mayor of the town of Digby, E. J. Theriault Q. C., town solicitor, and Jack Whaley, town clerk, along with Dr. D. E. Lewis, chairman of the Digby Regional School Board and other school officials were in Halifax on Wednesday to present a brief to Premier G. I. Smith expressing concern with the legislation dealing with the new occupancy tax.

The brief called for urgent and immediate clarification of two items (a) eligibility of a person assessed only for occupancy tax to sit as an elected member of a town council or occupy the mayor's office (b) the eligibility of a person assessed only for occupancy tax to vote at a town ratemakers' meeting.

Dealing specifically with Digby, the following problems were stated as facing

civic authorities (a) the possibility of impending legal action designed to upset the election by acclamation of at least one town councillor (b) the eligibility of one nominee to stand election to the office of mayor at the December 5th election (c) the pending court decision which is presently delaying action on urgently needed school facilities.

The brief submitted from the mayor, town council and Digby Regional School Board petitioned the government of Nova Scotia to introduce at the emergency session of the Nova Scotia legislature on December 1, 1967, legislation designed to (1) amend the Town's Act (2) approve special legislation validating all ratemakers' meetings held during the period January 1st and December 1, 1967, at which occupancy taxpayers were permitted to vote.

### No Answer Digby Ferry

#### E.M.O. WARNING

During the past weekend considerable difficulty and confusion was experienced by the fire department and emergency measures organization (E.M.O.). This was due to a local fire siren system which apparently had a short circuit and resulted in a siren sounding for no particular reason. Many phone calls were received from individuals inquiring about the reason and if an emergency existed.

Emergency Measures Organization and Fire Department officials feel that the local warning system should be explained to the public and all concerned. Fire Chief Dandiker advises that any fire call now is indicated by the sounding of the sirens for three blasts and if the fire is serious, there would be a repetition of this alarm. There is no longer the one long blast indicating that the fire is "all out" as was the practice in the past.

EMO Director, Reg. Turnbull advises that there is one type of siren warning signal in Canada which is a wailing (undulating) tone on the sirens of three to five minutes duration or short blasts on horns or other devices repeated as necessary. This warning means: (1) An Attack on North America has been detected or (2) There is danger from fallout. When this warning is heard the public should take protective action and listen to the radio for instructions. This is also a warning for all EMO personnel with assigned duties to report to their headquarters.

Reg. Turnbull has advised that municipal planning is currently being taken to advise all EMO personnel and the public of the plans should an emergency develop.

Twice within a week, Valley Boards of Trade were disappointed in not getting a specific answer from government ministers to their questions about the upgrading of the Digby-Saint John Ferry Service.

On Saturday, November 18, the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade looked for an announcement from Hon. Alan MacEachen, who was to be guest speaker at the annual meeting in Middleton. Mr. MacEachen failed to arrive because of foggy weather. According to reports the "good news" was supposed to be announced at the Kingston Board of Trade on Saturday, November 25, when Hon. Paul Hellyer, Minister of Transport was guest speaker. Mr. Hellyer gave no specific announcement and referred only briefly to the Saint John-Digby ferry service. He commented when questioned "What we want are the right solutions — not headlines halfway through negotiations."

### Has Doubts On Medicare

Dr. N. J. Belliveau, of Montreal, president of CMA and a native of Belliveau Cove, Digby County, told the annual meeting of the Medical Society of Nova Scotia in Halifax that the association doubts "it is the most responsible and conscientious deployment of government financial resources in Canada to insist on universality in all social welfare programs."

He said CMA fears the cost of such a universal program would be such that other and more urgent needs may not be met.

It is hoped, he said, that the federal government would change its medicare legislation to provide the provinces with a great deal more flexibility.

He reminded the audience that health care in Canada is not "traditionally and legally" a provincial responsibility and felt indications, given by the premiers at their meeting in Fredericton, that the present federal proposals for medicare were not acceptable to many provinces, were "encouraging."

Dr. Belliveau said no matter what kind of medicare system is worked out, it could only be successful if the problems of shortage of doctors and other medical personnel is solved.

He feared Canada's preoccupation with what has been done concerning the "universality principle" in other countries represented "failure to come to grips with a contemporary Canadian problem in a contemporary Canadian context."

A "system analysis" of methods of delivering medical care, followed by data processing that could increase hospital efficiency, was his suggestion for increasing the amount of medical care available to the public.

## VALLEY BOARDS OF TRADE PASS RESOLUTIONS

Bernard LeBlanc, Belliveau Cove, presided at the annual meeting of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade held in Middleton when more than a dozen resolutions dealing with Valley problems and projects were passed. Mr. LeBlanc was re-elected president at the afternoon business session and presided at the evening banquet.

Among the resolutions were (1) to petition the provincial department of highways to include in their estimates for 1968 early upgrading, reconstruction and for resurfacing number one highway from Kingston to Bridgetown. (2) that the attention of the Provincial Government be directed to taking action in further developing the centennial project undertaken by the Cadets University Naval Training Division CFB Cornwallis in locating and marking the old original military

Annapolis road connecting Halifax with Annapolis Royal. (3) request federal authorities to supply necessary ferry service as a direct government operation between Digby and Saint John, N. B. if unable to reach an agreement with the C.P.R. and provincial governments. (4) that the provincial government authorities be contacted regarding a Harvest Festival in the Annapolis Valley area to complement the Apple Blossom Festival. (5) requesting the Department of Highways to treat the calcium chloride used on the highways with an inhibition in order to save citizens a large sum of money in repair bills on cars. (6) request the Hospital Tax Commission to levy a tax on all articles for sale to avoid confusion and complicated bookkeeping as with the present system. (7) recommending to the Department of Highways for the province of Nova Scotia that immediate consideration be given to having the proposed improvements on Nova Scotia Highway Route 1 completed earlier than 1972 due to the immediate need for better highway facilities from a commercial and residential point

of view. (8) requesting a brief to be presented to the Department of Transport regarding establishing separate terminal facilities for industrial flying into Greenwood (9) request improvement of transportation by a Maritime — New England — Upper Canada Expressway and connecting ferry service (10) requesting assistance of the Industrial Development staff of the Department of Trade and Industry in setting up a Regional Development Seminar in the Annapolis Valley (11) requesting the provincial and federal governments to make necessary repairs

and extensions to existing Annapolis Valley wharves (12) request to proper government and municipal authorities to provide funds to properly develop the Waterville airport (13) requesting immediate representation to the Minister of Transport and Minister of Consumer Affairs to make a study of the impact of the increased freight rates including L.C.I. rates, on the development of industries in the Atlantic region and if it be found an adverse affect then the Government of Canada take such action as is deemed necessary to alleviate such adverse affects.

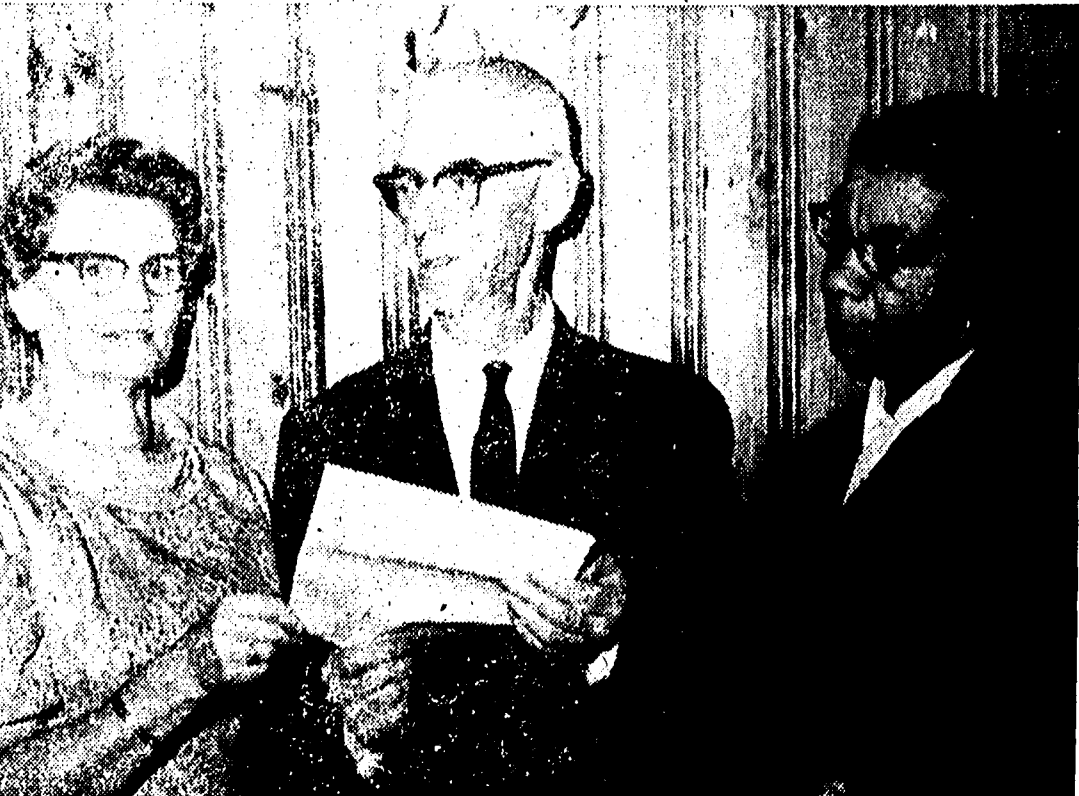

# Lady Anna Lands 220,000 Pounds

## Need For Better Wharf Facilities Seen

Wharves in Digby County in many places need upgrading to keep in pace with the advanced fishing possibilities of the day. This was especially noted when some members of the staff of The Digby Courier visited in Little River on Friday, the 24th, November.

The Lady Anna had come into port that morning with 220,000 lbs. of pollock, the largest catch ever to land at Little River and the largest catch ever taken off Cape Cod, where the Lady Anna was fishing. Under command of Captain Guy D'Entremont, Lower West Pubnico, the three year old Lady Anna, owned by Comeau Sea Foods Ltd., out of Saulnierville, fished about fifteen miles East by North of Cape Cod. Other landings by Lady Anna this month were 96,000 lbs. on November 11 and 208,000 lbs. on November 18. All were landed at the Clyde Denton Ltd. wharf in Little River. The only other boat seen off Cape Cod by Capt. D'Entremont was a Polish mothership with feeder boats.

The Lady Anna has been chartered by the federal and Nova Scotia provincial governments to experiment for six months in the mid water trawling method. Actually, the boat was chartered for dragging herring but who would pass up 220,000 lbs. of some 20 lb. size pollock when accidentally coming upon them? Capt. D'Entremont's judgement was good.

The Lady Anna used about 70 hours for the trip which brought in the big catch. Twentythree hours to reach the grounds, 23 on return and 24 hours for fishing time were used. On board were the captain and a crew of five men.

The new mid water trawl and the trawl door originated in Germany. The trawl is of a dragging type and can be used at any depth and anywhere. Captain D'Entremont in personal conversation praised the mid water trawling as being most profitable and superior to the old methods and looked forward to this way of fishing for his future livelihood. He considered the mid water trawling a good method for Cape Cod area. Captain D'Entremont has been captain of fishing boats for eight years and has spent considerably more years in some type of fishing such as scallop fishing and bottom trawling. The Comeau Sea Foods for whom he sails have fourteen boats operating.

It was a stormy day when the Lady Anna arrived at Little River with her 220,000 lbs. of pollock. At first it looked as though a return out into the Bay on account of the storm was necessary, but the north westerly direction of the wind persuaded the captain to stay put. It was found that the boat could not lay across the wharf. Lines had to be slackened so the wind would push the boat away from the wharf so not to break her. Already some little damage had resulted.

Why didn't you come directly in to the Denton wharf, it was queried of the captain. The reason, he replied, was because there was not enough water to bring the boat in. "Little River is a good place to unload fish but with low tide you have to lay off," said Captain D'Entremont. "If the government wharf were longer we could get inside," continued the captain. Lengthening the wharf and dredging the river, the captain considered to be essential projects and should be carried out at once.

Clyde Denton, owner and operator of the Clyde Denton Ltd. plant, where the 220,000 lbs. fish were landed, also expressed concern that facilities at the wharf and the river depth were not

adequate for full time use. Two other boats besides the Lady Anna had unloaded at the Denton plant on Thursday. They were the Harlen D., owned by the Denton's and skippered by Rodney Denton and the Cindel. Besides the Harlen D., Mr. Denton also has three regular suppliers. There are two sixty foot draggers from White Head, Grand Manan with Captains M.bury Ossinger and Malcolm Banks and the 45 foot dragger from Little River skippered by Chesterson Denton. In all they buy from fifteen to eighteen boats. Mr. Denton recognized that the road approach to the wharf was being widened but he expressed disappointment that the dredging of the river and extension to the government wharf which was promised had not been fulfilled.

The 220,000 lbs. of fish landed on Thursday was the largest ever landed at the Denton plant. Trucks from Digby to Pubnico were on hand immediately. The Denton plant is geared to handle 200,000 lbs. cod and haddock or pollock in a week. They also handle lobsters. There are two buildings, the salting building and the processing plant and included in these are a set of up-to-date offices. During the past week more than a

half million pounds of fish had been landed at the wharf and shipped or processed. Many of their products go to the West Indies markets and others go to the National Sea Products. Lobsters go to Boston markets.

The fish landed on Thursday from the Lady Anna took about 15 hours to unload by truck. They were then taken to the wharf where they were weighed, put into pellets and fed.

The history of the Denton plant goes back 14 years when Keith Raymond, Centreville, and Mr. Denton founded the Bell Rock Packing Company and the St. Mary's Bay Packing. The

old Bell Rock plant was torn down and a new building erected for the processing and freezing. The plant is now owned by the Dentons with Mr. Denton's sons, Allen and Harley, both working in the business. Mrs. Denton at 50 led the office work until Allen took over that duty in recent months.

Foreman at the plant for fourteen years is James Graham. He also stressed the need of more wharf space and dredging of the river.

It has been three years since the Dentons moved to their new plant. They report having been extremely busy and intend expansion for 1968. Already the keel is

being laid in Port Greville for their new 65 foot dragger. Besides those indirectly employed through their operation they have at peak periods between 30 and 35 directly involved in employment at the plant.

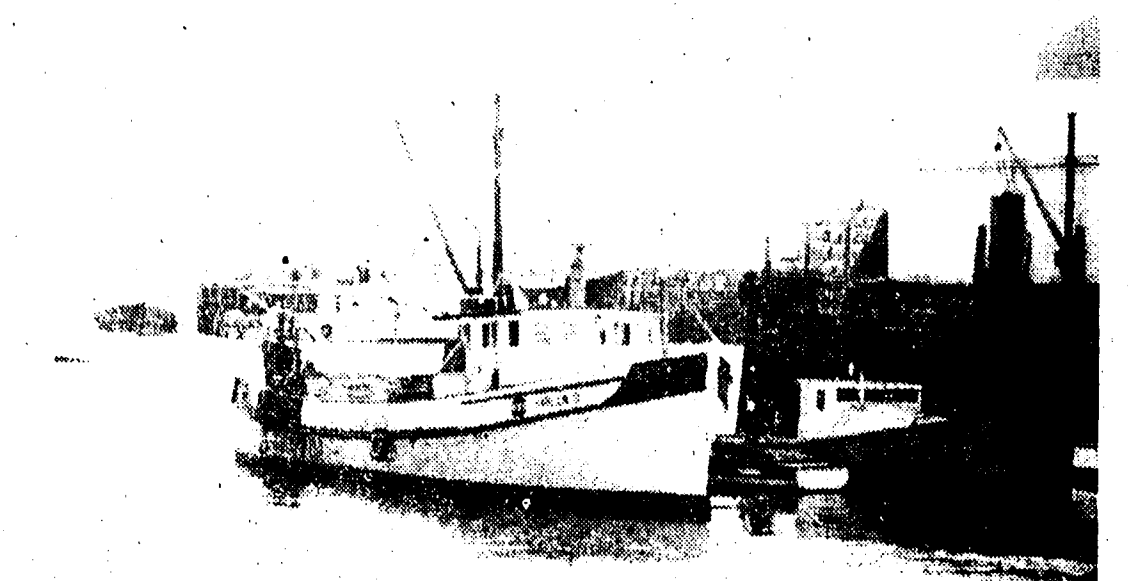

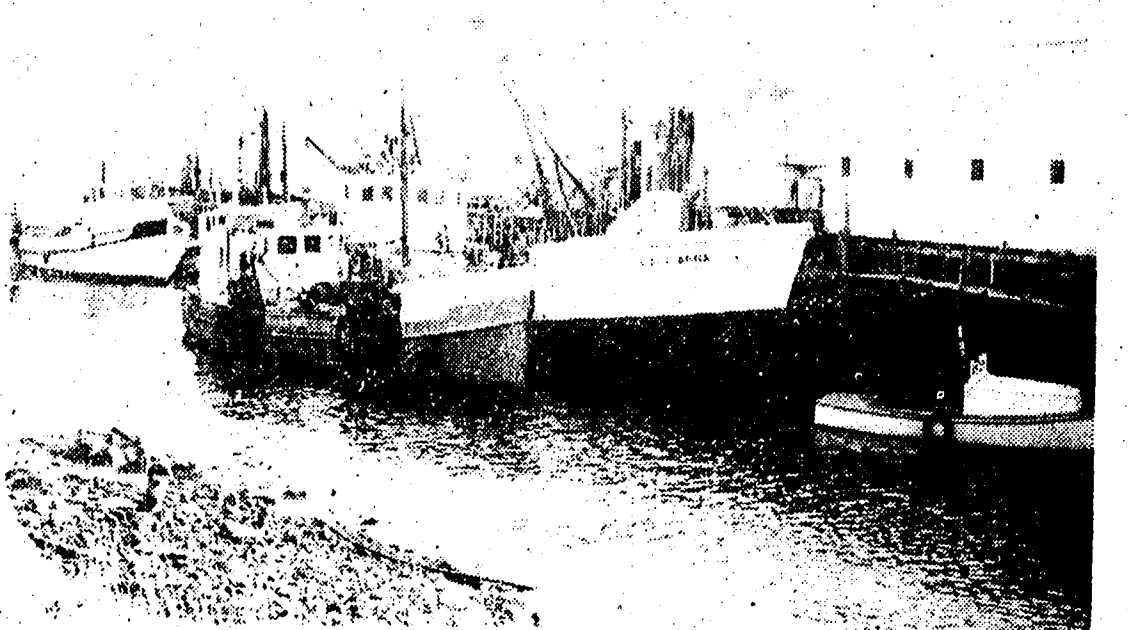

## Coq Au Vin Is A Gourmet Treat That's Really Easy To Prepare



It's always exciting to discover a new gourmet restaurant where you can entertain friends or visit with the family to enjoy a very special occasion. It's even more exciting to discover a simple recipe for a gourmet meal which can easily be served at home.

Coq au Vin is one of the most popular French gourmet treats and yet it's sometimes prepared in different ways. Some recipes for it may appear a bit complicated but Coq au Vin can be one of the easiest things in the world to make if you follow the recommendations of Roger Jones, Chef de Cuisine, at Toronto's Constellation Hotel.

One of the most popular and skillful chefs in Ontario, Mr. Jones has created a Coq au Vin gourmet recipe which can be made at home with very little fuss or trouble. The ingredients given are sufficient to serve eight people. It's a taste treat so deliciously blended that your entire family is likely to insist that you serve it many times again.

In addition to its simplicity of preparation, this particular gourmet recipe has another advantage. Any left-over portion can be placed in a covered casserole, kept in the refrigerator, and reheated in a couple of days with equally good results.

### Coq au Vin Ingredients

- 4 lb. capon or roaster
- 3 tablespoons of flour
- 1 medium sized onion
- 2 glasses dry red wine
- 2 Oxo chicken bouillon cubes dissolved in 1 cup of boiling water.

### Method Of Preparation

Take the capon or roaster and separate legs and breast into eight pieces. Season them with salt and white pepper, roll in flour, and fry until golden brown. Finely chop one medium sized onion, saute until brown, and then add three tablespoons of flour.

Place the capon and onions into a deep casserole, add two glasses of dry red wine, and one cup of boiling water in which two Oxo chicken bouillon cubes have been dissolved. Add sufficient extra water to bring all the liquids up to the level of the capon.

Put a cover on your casserole, place in a 350 degree oven, and bake for about 1-1 1/2 hours. Serve either directly from the casserole or, if you prefer, arrange the Coq au Vin on a hot platter and decorate with sprigs of parsley.

In France, Coq au Vin is usually accompanied only by parsley potatoes but buttered peas or beans can be included if you wish a green vegetable. Some Canadians enjoy serving it with rice and a green vegetable.

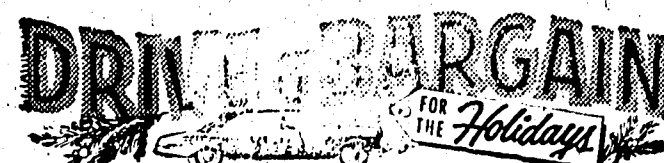

### High Blood Pressure — A Danger?

Whether or not high blood pressure is a dangerous condition depends on many factors, especially the cause, says The Canadian Medical Association. For example, certain cases of severe high blood pressure are due to tumors of the adrenal gland. With the removal of the tumor, the blood pressure returns to normal. Certain abnormalities of the heart or major blood vessels can be the cause of hypertension and with correction of these conditions, by surgery, for instance, the blood pressure in many cases returns to normal.

If the high blood pressure is due to severe and chronic kidney disease, the outlook is not so good.

In other words, in some cases high blood pressure is not a disease in itself but a symptom of some underlying condition. All cases of hypertension have to be considered individually. Complete physical examination must be carried out, with any necessary diagnostic procedures such as electrocardiograms, x-ray for heart size, and kidney examinations. Only after a complete assessment of the individual case can the doctor make a definite diagnosis, prescribe proper forms of treatment, and make a reasonable prognosis or outlook for that particular case.

## MILK HAS UNDERGONE MANY CHANGES

Milk has changed considerably. Years ago there was one type of milk, which today we call "creamline." As you will recall, the milk always had a considerable creamline, and in some cases the cream was poured off separately and the remaining product consumed as beverage milk. Today, with modern equipment and machinery, almost all milk is not only pasteurized but as well is homogenized. The homogenization of milk is a process whereby milk is exposed to considerable pressure, the butterfat globules being broken down so that when the product is put in the bottle it is the same consistency from top to bottom and no creamline develops. This homogenization process is much the same process as would take place in a human being's stomach where the milk is not homogenized. For this reason it is more easily digestible, and finds greater acceptance with people who have digestive problems.

### KINDS OF MILK

Today milk is consumed in more forms than ever in

the past. In more or less, be left on the table to absorb heat. For the best milk to be served with the best flavour, it should be refrigerated continuously. Today also the consumer has a wide variety of containers. Therein one may number the standard glass bottle, which accounts for the majority of milk sales. In addition, there are paper, plastic and polyethylene box containers. This latter item is not too much in evidence in this part of the country, but in some parts of Canada and the U.S. it is being processed in 4 qt., 8 qt., 12 qt., and 16 qt. boxes, which fit directly into the refrigerator, and are provided with taps, which allow the customer to merely turn the tap and draw what milk is desired. In addition to milk as such, there are many other complementary products, such as whipping cream, coffee cream, blend, sour cream, buttermilk, cottage cheese, etc.

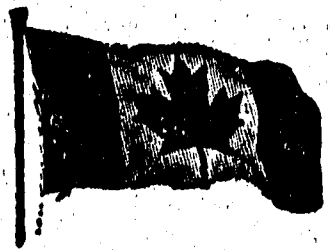

## REPORTS ON NEGRO ACTIVITIES

Gordon Earle of the Digby Welfare Department was in Halifax last week to take part in the annual conference of the Nova Scotia Association for the Advancement of Coloured People. Over two hundred delegates from all over Nova Scotia attended. The theme of the conference was "The Nova Scotia Negro 1967". Reports were given from Digby by Mr. Earle, New Glasgow, Amherst, Truro, Preston and Halifax.

Chairman of the conference was Donald Oliver, Halifax lawyer and keynote speakers were Daniel Hill, Toronto, and Miss Wilhelmina Williams, of Windsor, N. S. Other conference speakers or discussion leaders were Gus Wedderburn, president NSAACP who spoke on education; Lonnie White and Buddy Day, Youth and Recreation; Dr. William Oliver, Housing; Edmund Morris, Human Rights and Les Bryant and Bill Devoe on Employment.

In his address the president said that while the position of the Negro in Nova Scotia is improving, there is no doubt that prejudice, segregation and actual discrimination still exists.

"We have made strides, but I'm not satisfied with the progress," said Mr. Wedderburn. "The future depends upon people willing to come and work for the betterment of coloured people."

"Before the NSAACP was formed," he said, "there was little opportunity for discussion and exposure of racial problems. Things we take for granted today had to be fought for yesterday."

He outlined the aims and purposes of the association as furthering the interests of the coloured people of the province, improving their educational opportunities and raising their standard of living; and co-operating with governmental and private agencies for the promotion of the interests and welfare of coloured people in the community.

# SMITH ELECTED MAYOR

With a sweeping victory of 329 over his opponent, Glen Smith's 437 votes ushered him on Tuesday into town office and right to the top seat of honor. That of mayor of the town. Stewart MacNaughton, presently deputy mayor, the only candidate opposing Smith received 108 votes. One spoiled ballot was in the box making a total of 546 persons, the highest number for some years voting in Tuesday's civic election. There was a possible vote of 1200.

Mr. Smith came to Digby in 1959 after having served in the second world war with recognition and as an employee of the Federal Department of Fisheries in Bridgewater.

Active in Digby community and church life, Mr. Smith is a member of the Royal Canadian Legion, Kiwanis Club, Board of Trade, Navy League of Canada, director of the Mental Health Association of Digby and is District Deputy of the Knights of Columbus for Western Nova Scotia. He is a charter member of the Fish and Game Club and also of the Fish and Game Association, was primarily responsible in planning

and erection of the Fisher's Memorial Bell, as a Centennial Project for Digby and is active in Cub and Scout movement.

Mrs. Smith is the former Lorraine Martin of Yarmouth. She too is active in church and community, having been secretary and vice-president of the Saint Patrick's Women's Guild and a member of the Digby General Hospital Ladies Auxiliary and community organizations.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have seven children and four grandchildren. Their children are Glendon H. married and living in Antigonish, N. S., manager of T.C.C.; Gail, Mrs. James Webster, Florida; Karen at Halifax; Indrany, Robert, Maureen, Ronald and Debra at school in Digby.

Mr. Smith will succeed Mayor C. D. Snow. The councillor with him will be Fred Amero, Howard Croteau, and Paul Winchester and the newly elected councillors, Mrs. Ina Dillon, Gordon Ellis and E. Y. Porter. The new councillors were elected by acclamation.

Retiring councillors are Stewart MacNaughton, Green Gifford and Gerald Hoare.

## LEBLANC ADDRESSES DIGBY COUNCILLORS

Bernard LeBlanc, president of the Annapolis Valley Agricultural Board of Trade on Monday night addressed the Digby Town Council on various matters of mutual interest to the town and to the A.V.A.B.T.

First Mr. LeBlanc said the tourist trade in Nova Scotia during the summer of 1967 was not as disastrous as reports in the press indicate. Possibly he said there might have been a ten per cent decrease due to Expo. He spoke of the value of promotion trips made to New England and the British Isles to inform the people what the Annapolis Valley is like. He spoke highly of Mayor C. D. Snow's efforts in this respect and said that in many places he had visited Mr. Snow's name was raised.

Mr. LeBlanc stated that there is a great future in agriculture in this area but shipping should be done in cardboard lots to make it profitable. He felt agriculture could be recaptured for the future of our young people who he termed growers instead of farmers. He proposed the product of sugar beets to be grown here. New England, he said, could use a load of sugar beets a day.

In relation to industry, Mr. LeBlanc advised that "we must help ourselves if we want others to help us". He felt a full-time promotional office for the area would be beneficial.

In regard to promotion of industry, Mr. LeBlanc felt the air strip could be beneficial as those interested in industry often fly to the free Moncton airport and then stop at Amherst and Truro.

Most of all, Mr. LeBlanc said, the subject of transportation is the important thing. This is on everybody's lips. Mr. LeBlanc said he is optimistic about the future of the "bottleneck" in transportation between Digby and Saint John. This problem, he admitted, has been frustrating. Until this problem is solved and the bottleneck opened, Mr. LeBlanc could not expect to see industry come to the area. He felt that if everybody worked together the difficulties should resolve themselves. He said the federal cabinet has approved in principle the upgrading of the facilities and they do not

generally go back on their word unless something serious arises.

Continuing on industry Mr. LeBlanc reminded that while tourism is important it was only of six months duration so it was important to also promote other industry more than has been done in the past.

Mr. LeBlanc solicited support for the A.V.A.B.T. with the remark that when helping the Board of Trade you help yourself.

The award was made in recognition of Mr. Hartlin's interest in Boy Scouts and the service he had rendered to the organization during his pastorate in Digby. In receiving the award, Mr. Hartlin expressed his appreciation for the privilege he had in giving some of his time to encouraging and promoting boys work in the church. He also praised in high terms the leaders of boys in the church, and for their Christian character and dedication.

The meeting was called to acquaint the parents of the Scouts and Cubs with some of the requirements of the Scout organization and to enlist their cooperation and support. The meeting was presided over by Thomas Cleveland, chairman of the Boy's Group Committee. ## Digby County Recommended To Be A Bilingual District

Digby County with its 37.7 per cent French speaking population has been recommended by the Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism report as a district which should be required to recognize French as an "official" language and provide all the rights entailed. Four special districts in Nova Scotia were suggested for this recognition — they were Digby County; Inverness, 23.4 per cent French; Richmond, 46.7 per cent and Yarmouth, 32.8 per cent.

"The French speaking community of Nova Scotia is relatively concentrated, has long established roots in some regions and has close practical ties with the French speaking community in New Brunswick which would be an 'officially bilingual province,'" said the report.

A similar situation existed in Manitoba, it noted. In "bilingual districts" — areas which have language minorities of more than 10 per cent — municipal councils should be required to permit other official language to be used in their deliberations, the commission stated.

All by-laws and regulations should be recorded and printed in both English and French.

All court proceedings should permit pleadings in either language, orally or in writing.

All federal and provincial offices would be so staffed that residents of the area could communicate in either language, orally or in writing.

All local governments would make all administrative services, written or oral, available in both languages with priority given to such personal services as those rendered by police, firemen,

municipal hospital staff and welfare officials.

To bring in such a new deal, the commission recommended that provincial governments amend their municipal legislation "to remove all obstacles to the use of both French and English languages in local governments."

## COUNCIL RULES NO SIDEWALK PAVING IN 1967

Despite efforts on the part of the streets committee headed by Deputy Mayor Stewart MacNaughton and by the superintendent of streets, Everett Hall, the Digby Town Council on Monday night was informed at that time that sidewalk paving would not be done this fall. Contractors did not favor doing that type of work so late in the season. It was decided to use catch-basins in some parts of the town where the street paving was high and caused sidewalk flooding. The council was pleased with the report that the paving of Prince William St. amounted to \$300 less than estimated.

The old abandoned dredge at the Racquette came in for discussion and the town clerk was advised to inform the harbour-master, Vernon Everett, that a letter had been forwarded to the Minister of Transport for its removal.

Several permits were granted on Monday night. William Ross was given permission to

open a Fish Market on Water St. in the former Italy Furniture & 150' building. Donald Brown is granted permission to erect a garage, Bx21 on his property on Second Avenue. The garage will have cement walls and floor and shingled roof. Permission was given E. V. Porter to erect a house on the East side of Lighthouse Road.

It was decided that the band stand would neither be sold nor rented to Mrs. Helen Thirner for a museum and handicraft shop. Mrs. Thirner had hoped to class in the stand for the purpose. The council members considered this useful public property which would be missed for public functions if rent or sold. During the past few months, the parking area around the band stand had been extended for the benefit of residents and tourists.

Councillor Paul Winchester reported two new members of E.M.O. bringing the total enrollment to 250. Three had

attended courses in Yarmouth and five in Kentville. A fire fighting course had been held in Miramichi.

Mr. Winchester reported two fires in Conway during the month with estimated

total loss of \$16000. A smoke and soot call and a chimney fire were also attended. Fall lawns on the Fire Prevention Week inspections were being made.

## SAFETY TIPS For The FALL SEASON

### SAFETY — A PROVINCIAL PROBLEM

Each year in Nova Scotia, scores of farm people lose their lives; many are injured and millions of dollars are spent because of hazards and carelessness. Safety — on our farms and in our homes — is really a provincial problem. Sure, it's the individual, who must remove the hazards and learn to be careful, but we too, his neighbors in the provincial community, must do all we can to assist him, for we too have a responsibility to him.

### PESTICIDE CLEANUP

Now is a good time to clean up the pesticide containers and store all poisons away, now that the field production season is over, down on the farm. You did this long ago? Excellent? But let's just check around the stable, the driveway and even in the woodshed and the house to make sure that all empty pesticide containers are disposed of, and that partially used containers are safely red away. Don't take chances with poisons.

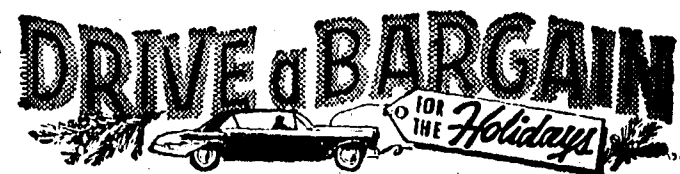

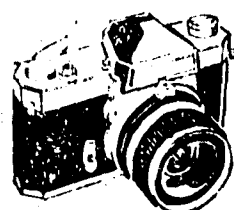

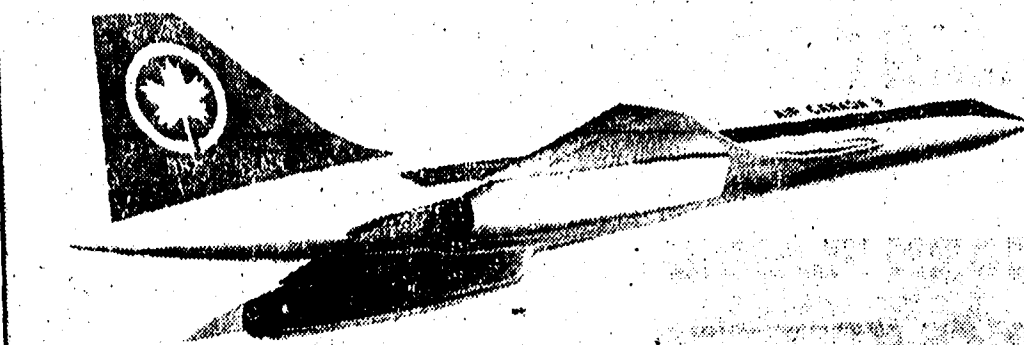

### Hypertension and Its Problems

In using the term "hypertension", the doctor usually refers to the condition in which the very small blood vessels of the body show increased resistance to the flow of blood. This, according to The Canadian Medical Association, is associated with an increase in the blood pressures.

This is the so-called essential hypertension, probably the commonest form. Approximately 5% of the adult population of Canada is affected, and the disease is somewhat more common in females than in males.

The association of diabetes, kidney disease and high blood pressure is well known. Certainly being overweight is a definite factor, although the exact reason is not completely clear.

Thus the person who is overweight, or who has a family history of high blood pressure, or diabetes, particularly during middle age, may disclose the presence of hypertension long before the patient develops symptoms of it.

The C.M.A. reports that the judicious use of reducing diets, salt restriction, and if necessary one or more of the many prescription drugs available, can contribute a great deal to the patient's well-being. In many cases this type of treatment can delay or prevent the serious complications of high blood pressure that occur in such vital organs as the heart, kidneys and brain.

### Report From Parliament Hill

Canadians got their Christmas message from Mr. Sharp this week, and it means an additional 280 million in the federal coffers. Two taxes hit most Canadians. The first is a 5 per cent surcharge on personal income tax, and the second is an increase on government taxes on liquor and cigarettes.

Mr. Sharp, who has been preaching restraint for some time, has now made his effort to practice it. His intent is primarily to raise more money to meet government spending, but it is also to put a brake on the spending trends in the economy by reducing disposable income. It is one of the ironies of politics that when governments get into money trouble the hapless citizen is blamed for spending too much.

Aside from the purely financial measures announced there were other indications that the Minister is taking himself seriously. Although he continues to treat the economy as a firm father would an errant son he seems at least to have come, albeit reluctantly, to grips with the problem. That he is some months late in his endeavours goes without saying.

Mr. Sharp always speaks of the economy as if it were live and human. And he always attempts to give the impression that his relations with this offspring are correct and proper. This attitude no doubt led to the moralistic imposition of further taxes on those who partake of alcohol and tobacco. That group of burdened Canadians, with no pressure group to represent them, are forever the target whenever a government hits bad times.

But there were in the statement two points which indicate that the Minister is worried about the extra-curricular activities of his ailing policy. Civil service growth is to be restrained and lending programs, including those connected with housing, are to be reduced. The nation's prospective home-buyers will wince at that.

The question most citizens will ask is this: did we get ourselves into this mess, or is it the government's fault? Opposition Leader Robert Stanfield opted for the latter, saying that the issue was that of confidence in the government's abilities to manage the country's financial affairs. Certainly government spending has been lavish; there is proof of that on all sides. The Finance Minister ignored the abundant signs in his June budget speech, preferring to let the forces of spending and restraining find their own balance. The problem was that there were precious few forces of restraint, and they had to be imposed. But the simple fact is that the government could have avoided unpalatable measure of raising taxes with just a little foresight. Mr. Sharp, speaking to reporters after his announcement, refused to make any predictions about the future of his prodigal son. He continues to imply that he really is in complete control of the circumstances, but the sad truth is that he is not. The Mini-budget, which was never denied as a course of action in June or afterward, is the proof that the economy was getting away from its keeper. With his Christmas present to the Canadian people Mr. Sharp is trying to win back the prodigal and the confidence of the public.

It is extremely unlikely he will be able to do both.

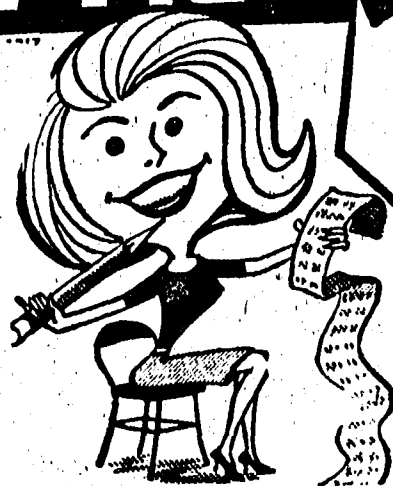

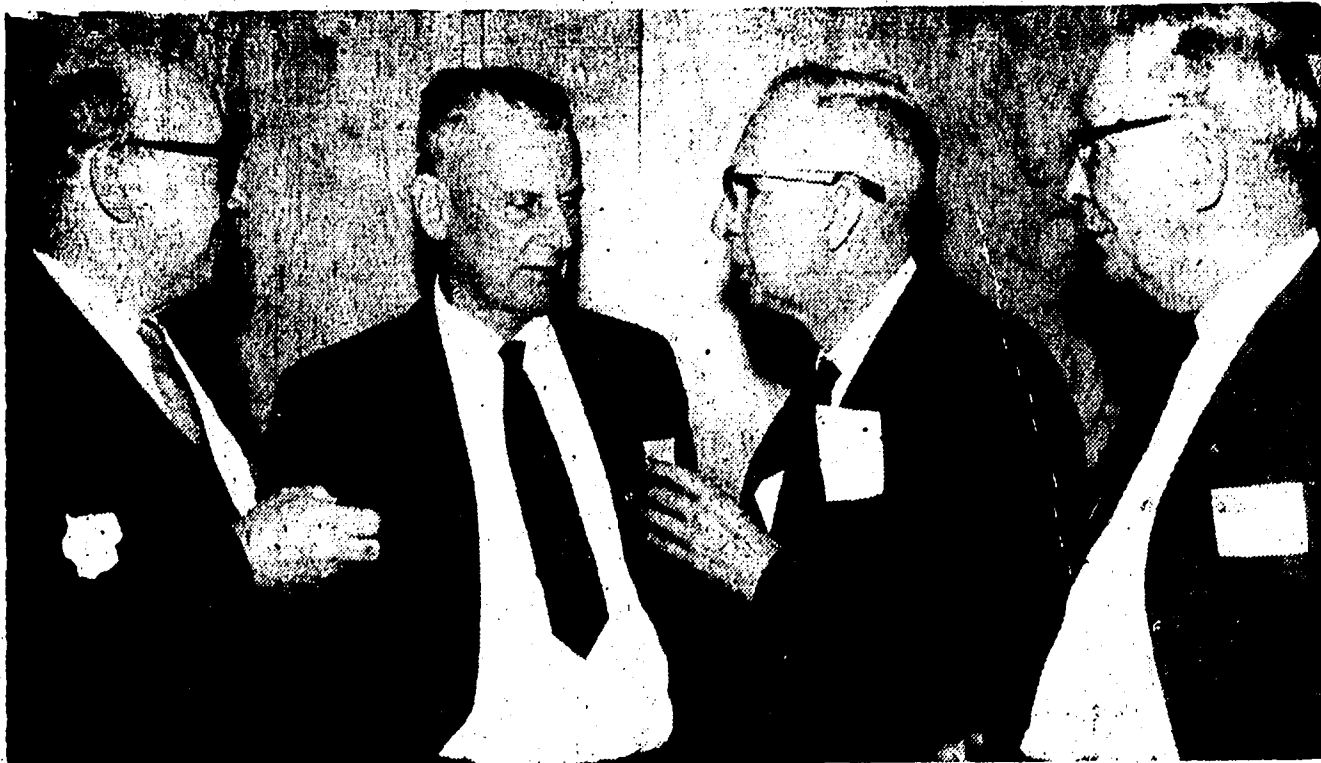

Our fathers have told us what work thou didst in their days in the times of old," Mr. Werman said one of the main purposes of the church in the world today is to reflect the light of the life of Christ in light of the lives of Christian people so that darkness might be disseminated and doubt, depression and wars eradicated. He said the gift dedicated was an appropriate gift. One of the Lord's best known sayings was "I am the Light of the World" and one of His greatest compliments to Christians was "Ye are the light of the world," the speaker said. The speaker traced the history of the Loyalist families, making special mention of those honored by the lamp presentation and also back to the time Jacques Cartier founded Montreal in 1534 when the only inhabitants in Canada were Eskimos and Indians. History, he said, is the story of man's experiment with citizenship.

Early records give the name of Jan Jansen Van Dittmarsen, born 1603 at Dittmarsen, Schleswig-Holstein. He went to New York where he served as a

gunner at the fort 1638, receiving 16 florins a month. Later he lived at Flatbush (Plateneus) and owned 24 morgens of land on Manhattan Island, 1647. (A morgen is 2,069 acres).

Reading through the genealogy one sees the surname gradually changed to Dittmars, and records list John, born March 31, 1752, and married November 29, 1776 to Magdalen Vanderbilt in New York. In 1783 this couple, with Brook, formerly part of what was known as the Clements four children, arrived in Nova Scotia and settled in Deep Shore. Headstones in Old St. Edward's Churchyard, Clementsport, parish of Clements, give dates of death as 1822 and 1824 respectively.

A son Jeremiah married Elizabeth Lowe, Oct. 12, 1805. Their youngest son, Jacob William Dittmars, born July 21, 1821, married Bethiah Andrews, daughter of Captain Thomas Andrews of England and Bethiah Purdy. The fourth generation in Canada was John Chipman Wade Dittmars, married to Leah Withycombe, St. John's Nfld., and sister of the Rev. John Medley Withycombe, rector, parish of Clements 1890-92.

It was their daughter, Laura Isabel and her husband who donated the gift. Following the service a re-

Their mother was Rebecca Dittmars who married Robert Jefferson Harris. They are related to Vrooms, Voorhees, Dittmars, Amherstians, and Spurrs, all descendants of the Loyalist family.

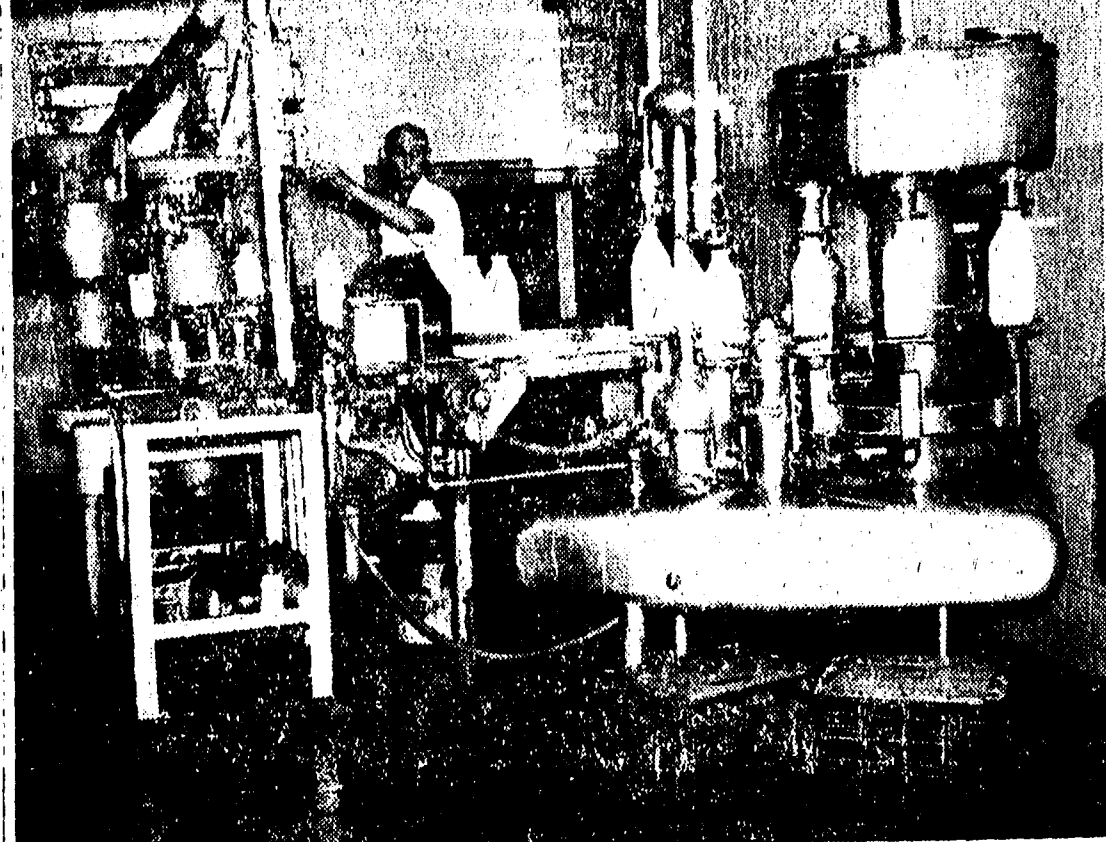

## LIMIT LOBSTER TRAPS

As a result of a general demand among lobster fishermen a program of limitation of the number of lobster traps per boat will be introduced in all of the lobster fishing districts in the Maritime provinces commencing with the 1968 lobster fishing season. Fisheries Minister H. J. Robicheau announced today. The numbers of traps will be reduced further in most districts in 1969.

A limit of 375 traps is to be applied in Districts Nos. 1, 6b, 7A, and 7C and in that portion of District No. 4 between Burns Point and Baccaro Point off the southern coast of Nova Scotia. In these districts the limit is to be reduced to 300 traps at the commencement of the 1969 lobster fishing seasons. This year there was a 500 trap limit set in the northern portion of District 7B.

In District No. 3 there will be a limit of 300 traps, and this will be reduced to 200 in 1969.

These lobster trap limits are based on extensive studies by both the Department and the Fisheries Research Board of Canada. Mr. Robicheau pointed out that the majority of lobster fishermen in all districts favour some limitation of the numbers permitted to engage in the fishery and, in addition to the trap limits, consideration is being given to means of restricting entry into the lobster fishery in an equitable manner. Earlier this year Mr. Rob-

icheau pointed out that lobster fishing is a vital resource for thousands of Canada's inshore fishermen. This made it imperative that this resource be managed as wisely as possible to ensure its continuance on a profitable basis to the fishermen.

District No. 3 is in the Bay of Fundy off the Nova Scotia coast of Annapolis, Kings, Hants, Colchester, and Cumberland, and the New Brunswick counties of Albert and Westmorland.

District No. 4 is off the Nova Scotia coast of Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne, Queens, Lunenburg and part of Halifax county.

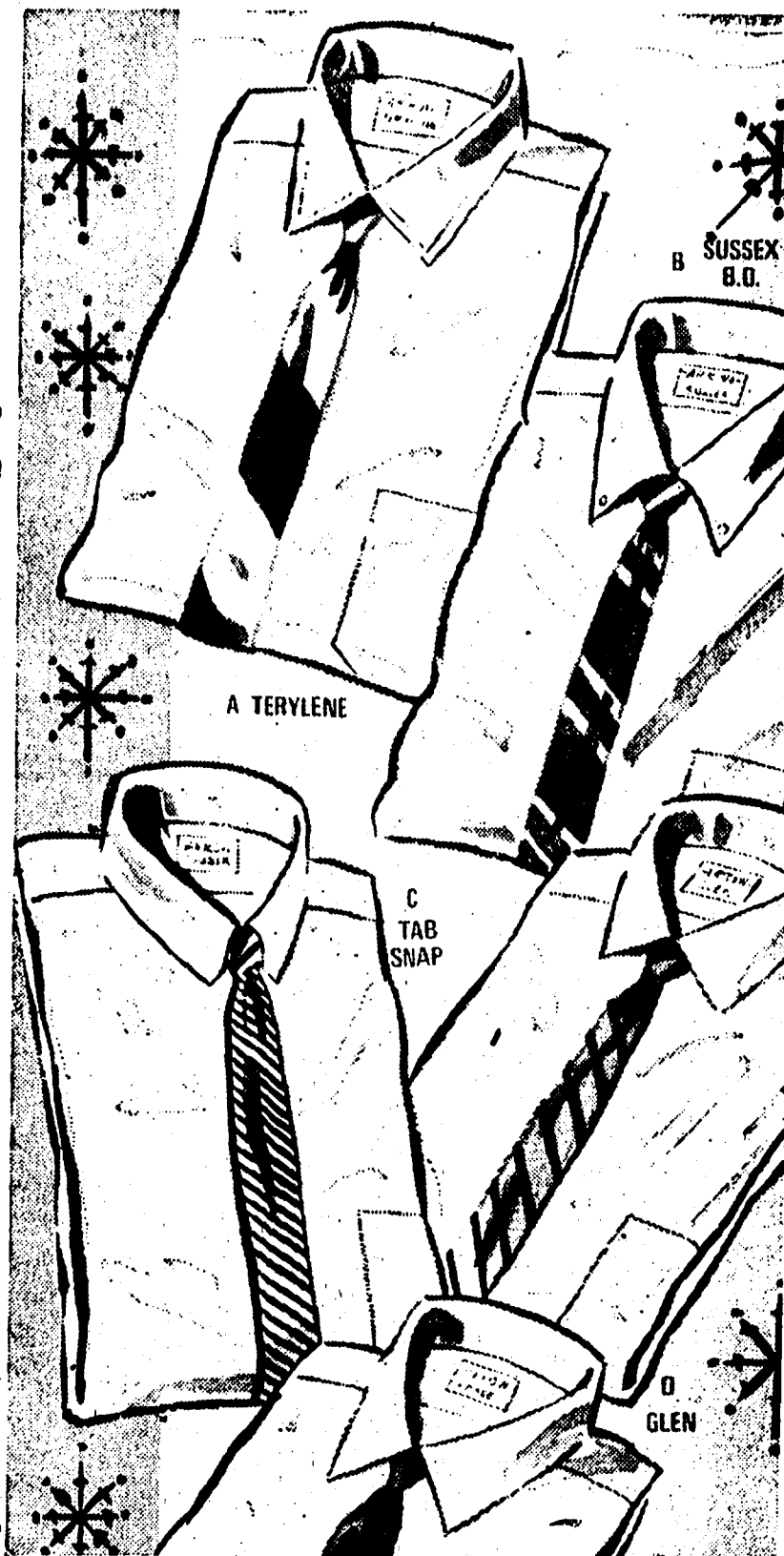

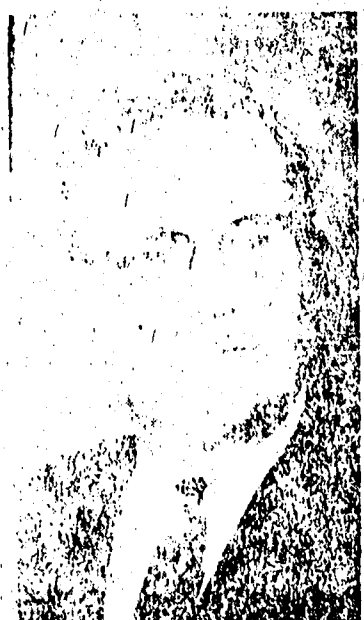
Mr. Cardoza reviewed tourism points made at the November Board of Trade meeting when he was guest speaker on the subject and reported on a study group on tourism which he directed in the spring of 1967. Mr. Cardoza took his audience back to the early years of tourism in Digby when people came with servants and remained all summer. Some owned their homes in the area. Motor cars, vacation with pay and general post war prosperity brought an entirely different type of visitor, Digby, he said, had failed to provide for change and improvements to establishments and those in the tourist business found themselves starting from scratch to get the things of vital importance.

Mr. Cardoza had outlined

the various factors involved in the tourism industry, local organizations, and the importance of human resources. He stressed the need for a coordinated effort to develop the area's potential for tourism. He mentioned the need for improvements in water, land and air transportation. He further stated that it is of little use passing resolutions to send to outside persons unless something is done here. He advocated a program of action which is realistic and which deals with projects in order of priority.

The committee in charge of acting on the suggestions put forth by Mr. Cardoza is the tourist committee of the Board named on Tuesday evening.

Mr. Bridge reminded the Board that people today are spending more to do than to see things. There is a new age of tourism in the

future when the best sales piece is the people of the community, the speaker said. Mr. Bridge suggested using high school students for tour guides and other occupations during the tourist season.

Mr. Bridge referred to tourism as an industry without smoke stacks. If you get 24 persons to stay one extra day, this amounts to the same as an industry which employs 100 people. He advocated not to overlook the near-at-hand tourist potential.

## About This And That

### Where Is Christmas?

Don't look far. Don't seek history. Don't look any further than your own heart and soul for Christmas is very near each individual. You'll find Christmas nowhere else if you have not found it within yourself. The simple message of Christmas is that Christ is born and lives with us in our hearts to-day as the hope and light of the world. Any other thought is a denial of Christmas at all.

We have trees and bells and gifts all packaged. There is tinsel and snow and holly and candles. We have pies and cakes and turkey for eating. There is even the joy of the beautiful carols and the sermons of song. There are the family and friends to come home. But, try as we will, we'll not find Christmas or hear its sounds unless Christmas first shows up in the individuals heart and soul.

Where is Christmas? If we haven't found it, there's something wrong. It needs correcting.

### We've Paid The Price

Digby like every other town or municipality in Nova Scotia using the occupancy tax would have gone on with the obvious interpretation meant for the newly created tax rule except for one incident. Somebody was opposed to Digby building a new school and this occupancy tax was one loophole to grab upon. We are not quarrelling with the opposers viewpoints. This is a free country and each is entitled to his own opinion. But, we are making the point that this rule regarding occupancy tax like many rules in the past, would have gone on for years with the interpretation designers had meant it to have if some other designer had not for another purpose unearthed the loophole. There was only one thing to do, wait until the designers of the occupancy tax came out with their interpretation. No amount of words we could have written could have changed the rule or could have written an unified interpretation into it. We can imagine that the nature of the uprooting of the ambiguous or not too clear understanding of the rule delayed clarification. Anyway, the long awaited clarification has arrived and we wouldn't be surprised to have the occupancy tax jovially tagged, "Digby School" tax.

But let us analyze the situation. What do we have? We have the reflection of some horrible, uncalled for, adverse, not quite truthful and detrimental out of town publicity which the town received. This adverse publicity which seemed to enter more than one phase of Digby town business nearly a year ago won't erase easily by piling up a lot more unmeaningful words. We, the citizens of Digby have already paid the price.

What else do we have? This question might better be answered in the negative. We do not have the proposed school and we are probably the worse off for the delay. If, for instance, another ratepayer's meeting should be called and, as is quite likely to happen, the majority again decide in the affirmative for constructing a school, where are we? Well, Mr. Sharp's budget might give us some idea. Again, we'll wait to see. We fear we have paid the price in dollars and cents also.

### Not All Bad

Isn't it strange how the attitudes and practices of a few people can damage the image of any otherwise purposeful organization. Take the case of labor unions, for instance. It took a visit to a small union group in town on Monday night to change our impression of the kind of people who join labor unions. We were of the impression that people who joined unions were greedy people desiring power and who in prejudice, jealousy and in ignorance were destroying the very hand that feeds them bread. Evidently all unions are not the same. We were greatly impressed with the prayer which opened the social function of the union meeting on Monday night. We believe it is the invocation at each business meeting. It is as follows.

"O God, guide us in our deliberation, that we may advance the interests of our working brothers and sisters, ever mindful of our responsibilities as we are of our rights.

Grant that our motives may be worthy, our decision wise and our actions just."

Worthy motives, wise decisions, just actions, mindful of responsibilities, thoughtful of working brothers and sisters. If that prayer is taken to heart then the labor union cannot be wrong in its purpose.

The other act which impressed us was the generous gift to the Digby General Hospital by 43 employees, members of 1027 Canadian Union Public Employees. These people must appreciate "the hand that feeds them" to do such a kind deed. They must be interested in the Digby General Hospital which employs them to a much greater extent than just receiving a pay envelope.

By the way, it might be good for each Unemployment Insurance book to have a similar prayer or pledge attached making each user, mindful of both rights and responsibilities. It might prevent some of the abuses in this otherwise worthy area of social benefits and privileges.

## The Many Hazards Of Christmas

"A thing of beauty is a joy forever," wrote Keats almost a century and a half ago.

Such a thing is your Christmas tree which, with its decorations, does much to enhance the beauty and festivity of the holiday season. But these very accessories can pose a threat to life and well-being.

The Christmas tree when sapless, can burn in less than 27 seconds. Thus it makes sense to retard the drying process of the tree as much as possible. Choose a small tree and see that the needles are not already falling. Stand it in water or snow outdoors until you are ready to put it up in the house.

Bring it in a few days before Christmas. Saw off the trunk at an angle at least one inch above the original cut. This provides a greater area of porous wood for soaking up water. Set the tree away from sources of heat, flammable items and avenues of escape such as windows, doorways and hallways.

Support it on a sturdy stand that has anchor clamps and a container for holding water. Use plain water in it—chemical solutions have been proved impractical. Check the water level in the container daily. When the needles of the tree start to fall, it is time to take it down.

Before putting up lights, check your present lighting sets for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets. These are potential fire hazards.

For outdoor wiring, run the wires overhead and use only weather-proof cords and sockets. Follow explicitly the directions provided by the manufacturers. They didn't print them to ornament their product. Often improper installation and misuse destroy the built-in safety features of such equipment.

These lights should be taken down after the holiday season as they may deteriorate in the sun heat if left up throughout the year. For extensive wiring, call an electrician. He knows his job and you can rest assured that your wiring is properly and safely installed.

Do not use candles on trees and never use electric lights on metallic trees. A voltage leak from faulty lights or wiring could result in severe shock or burns should someone come in contact with the branches.

Instead, use an off-the-tree spot or floodlight. These can give a colourful effect and still protect your family from harm. Use a fuse of no more than 15 amperes for the electric circuit serving the tree. Have fuses on hand and do not be tempted to use a penny in a fuse socket.

Do not permit children to run electric trains or toys around the tree's base. Keep metallic tinsel and decorations away from the electric outlet bases or plugs. Before leaving the house and always before going to bed at night, turn off the tree lights.

Have the decorations close to the ceiling and away from doors and other places where people are likely to smoke. Glass, metal or non-combustible materials are safest for ornamenting purposes. Do not hang metal icicles around the tree lamps or on wires.

Angel hair and snow spray, used together, can be a combustible combination. Use only one. Treat paper ornaments and cotton batting to make them flame-proof. This can be done by dipping them in a gallon of water mixed with 9 ounces of borax and 4 of boric acid.

When decorating mantles, buffet tops or tables with greenery, keep it away from fireplaces, hot objects and candles. A hurricane lamp placed over candles looks very attractive and is a simple, effective safety measure.

Life is an intangible spark. No one has ever seen it isolated. But how dear—how frail that infinitesimal force.

At Christmas especially, we are reminded of the magnitude of God's gift to us. Let us, each in his own domain, renew our efforts to preserve and sustain that gift by controlling the accidents which constantly threaten and, too often, extinguish it.

(If it seems you have heard or seen all this before — you have. We keep warning people of these hazards every Christmas and yet, year after year, several hundred Canadians are injured or killed by ignoring the cautions. Take care!)

Highway Safety News

### Indians Recognized

The Canadian Indians here in this country long before the English or the French or any other nationality moved in are being recognized and helped.

Over six million dollars have been spent during the last six months to improve living conditions on Indian reserves, Indian Affairs Minister Arthur Laing announced today. The 5-year, \$112,000,000 reserve improvement program was designed to hit hard at the low standard of living in many Indian communities. "The Indian people want more and better-quality houses, with electricity and proper plumbing," the Minister said. "This is what our program is here for, to bring the standard of living of every Indian on every reserve in Canada up to the level enjoyed by other Canadians."

More than three quarters of this money has gone toward housing. Five hundred and eighty houses have been built so far this year, and another 1,178 are under construction.

Electricity has been extended to 991 Indian houses at a cost of \$274,198, making power available for small appliances and light for children studying at home.

A total of \$357,693 has been spent to install pressurized water in 330 homes and to provide another 232 with sewers or septic tanks.

One hundred and seventy miles of new roads are making it easier for Indians to get to and from schools and centres of employment. Another 170 are being constructed, bringing the total cost to \$602,403.

"We are spending more and more money each year on this program," the Minister said, "to make our goals realities, and we shall keep spending this sort of money until they have been reached."

Then, there is the Indians of Canada Pavilion at Expo which has recently been offered to Montreal. This pavilion was rated nationally and internationally as one of the most thought-provoking at Expo and it had over two million visitors. The pavilion told the Indians' story from earliest times to the present. It has given the Indians a stronger sense of pride and a common identity as they

Let me carry it for you, my son."

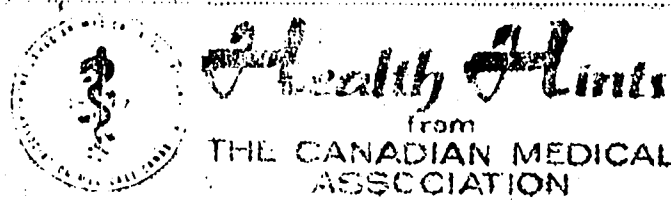
But the traveller said, "I do not see,

### STROKES — THEIR CAUSE AND CURE

Strokes are usually caused by one of three varieties of disease processes. The Canadian Medical Association reports. The most common of these is thrombosis, which is plugging of the arteries of the brain. Beyond the point of the plugging of the artery, the brain tissue dies.

Symptoms of thrombosis include short episodes of weakness, dizziness, difficulty in seeing, numbness and tingling in the arms or hands. Relief from these symptoms sometimes can be brought about by the use of blood-thinning agents known as anticoagulants. These medications must be used with extreme caution by experienced physicians.

Cerebral hemorrhage, or bleeding into or around the brain, is the second most common cause of strokes. There are two varieties of cerebral hemorrhage: one related to high blood pressure, which is often fatal and the other a rupture of a berry-like swelling where the arteries divide, which is less often fatal. Cerebral hemorrhage often can be prevented by the control of high blood pressure.

The third most common cause of strokes is the release of an embolus or small blood clot into the circulation, which in turn plugs a brain artery, causing paralysis. These embolic strokes usually follow changes in the heart valves brought about by rheumatic heart disease. Blood-thinning agents, frequently used by doctors caring for patients with rheumatic heart disease, sometimes reduce the frequency of embolic strokes.

The C.M.A. advises that many strokes can be prevented, or reduced in severity, if treatment is commenced soon after the first symptoms appear.

### Head-On Collision Deadly

Head-on car collisions are the most deadly, says the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

During Safe-Driving Week, being held from December 1 to 7, the Council suggests the following rules to avoid head-on collisions.

Be especially careful on curves. Don't pass on a curve (it's illegal) and be ready for the oncoming car that may swing out of its lane.

Slow down on wet or icy roads. Skids can kill.

Watch your passing. Never take a chance that the road is clear. Be sure there is no dip in the road or curve that conceals an oncoming car. Never pass on a hill.

### Two Rules For Car Safety

Do two simple things every time you enter your car and your chances of death or serious injury in an accident are cut in half, says the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

1. Fasten seat belts.
2. Lock car doors.

The greatest single cause of death in a car accident is being thrown out onto the road or pavement. Fastening seat belts and locking doors eliminate this possibility. Seat belts also prevent injury within the car.

### EVERY FREEDOM IN CANADA

Dear Madam:

We are getting rather bored with hearing and reading about the woes of Quebec. It has become a vote-collecting political football, kicked around by all parties in their desire to appease that province, and to look forward with optimism towards the next election. The people of Quebec are Canadians with exactly the same outlook and prospects speaking Federal, as all other Canadians, no matter in what province they are located. In our very humble opinion the primary need for the Quebecers is to take a psychological onslaught and look at themselves from the perspective of the other provinces and other ethnic groups in Canada. As they exist now they are the exact product of their own culture and environment. They have voluntarily, or perhaps by the imperiousness of their erstwhile leaders selected a peculiar status in Canada, and are now with that most destructive of human emotions — self pity — endeavoring at the expense of the rest of Canada to secure a position of pre-eminence.

The claim has several times been made that they are an inferior second class citizens. If that obtains in any case, it applies equally to the individual and springs from the desire to remain isolated from English-speaking Canadians. We may say that we have not heard occasional examples of this in Montreal, where we spent a couple of months last winter. If on the other hand they consider their French ancestry to be responsible for their outlook, why does the same condition not apply to the people of French descent in the Maritimes and parts of the Canadian West, and in fact in all parts of Canada? Many of our foremost citizens, farmers, politicians, doctors, city professors are of French descent, and they consider themselves and are considered by all as the very best class. As this seems to be the position the people of Quebec are expecting, all they have to do is to forget their imaginary grievances, and act and behave like that which they are supposed to be — first class Canadians.

Why should Quebec have an especially favored position in Canada? If any part of Canada should have special attention, it is the Maritimes. We would consider ourselves fortunate indeed, if we had the natural potential of mineral rich Quebec. However, neither the Maritimes nor any other part of Canada should expect to be set on a pedestal for the revered attention of the rest. The vapors of Quebec have had entirely too much notice. When de Gaulle had the colossal ignorance to come to our shores and either without thought or with malicious intent, gave vent to his infamous "wave to Quebec line" he merely carried across the Atlantic a sample of the political disintegration that has obtained in France since the Revolution.

We have already substituted a flag of little distinction and no inspiration, for our beloved Red Ensign, as a national flag, and even went so far as to put "Bureau de Poste" over the door on the St. Peters Post Office by way of sympathetic appeasement. I suppose the demand from certain elements in Quebec for the deletion of the word "Royal" from all captions in Canadian affairs will be met with approval by some weak-kneed, power-seeking government of the future, unless the other provinces of Canada take a good long look, and see the potential for national disintegration in such sterile suggestions.

The vast majority of us are satisfied with our status within the Empire, and I feel sure that the more enlightened elements in Quebec also consider that they have had the exercise of every freedom in Canada, as it now stands, a boon in the British Commonwealth of nations.

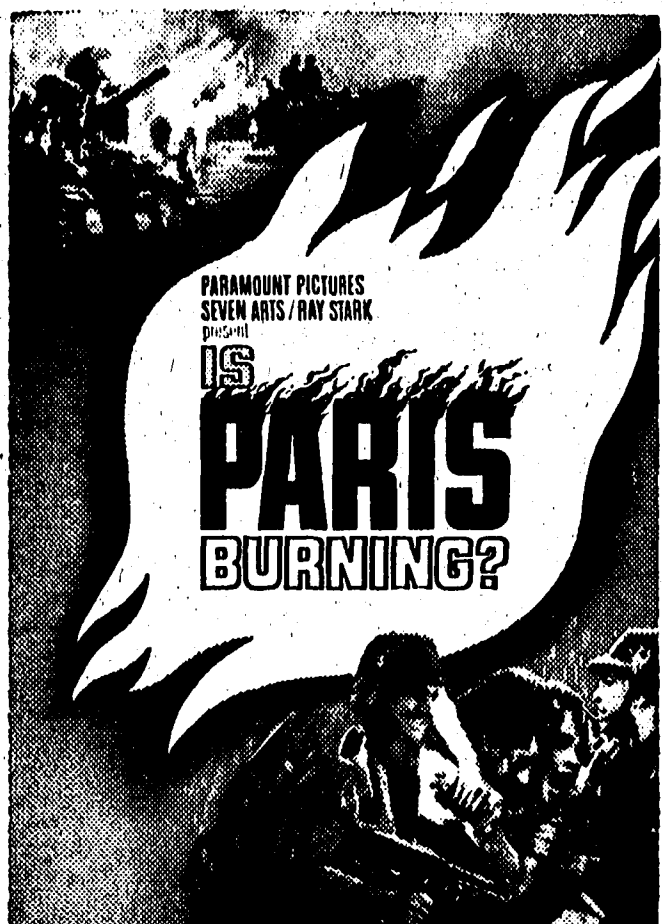

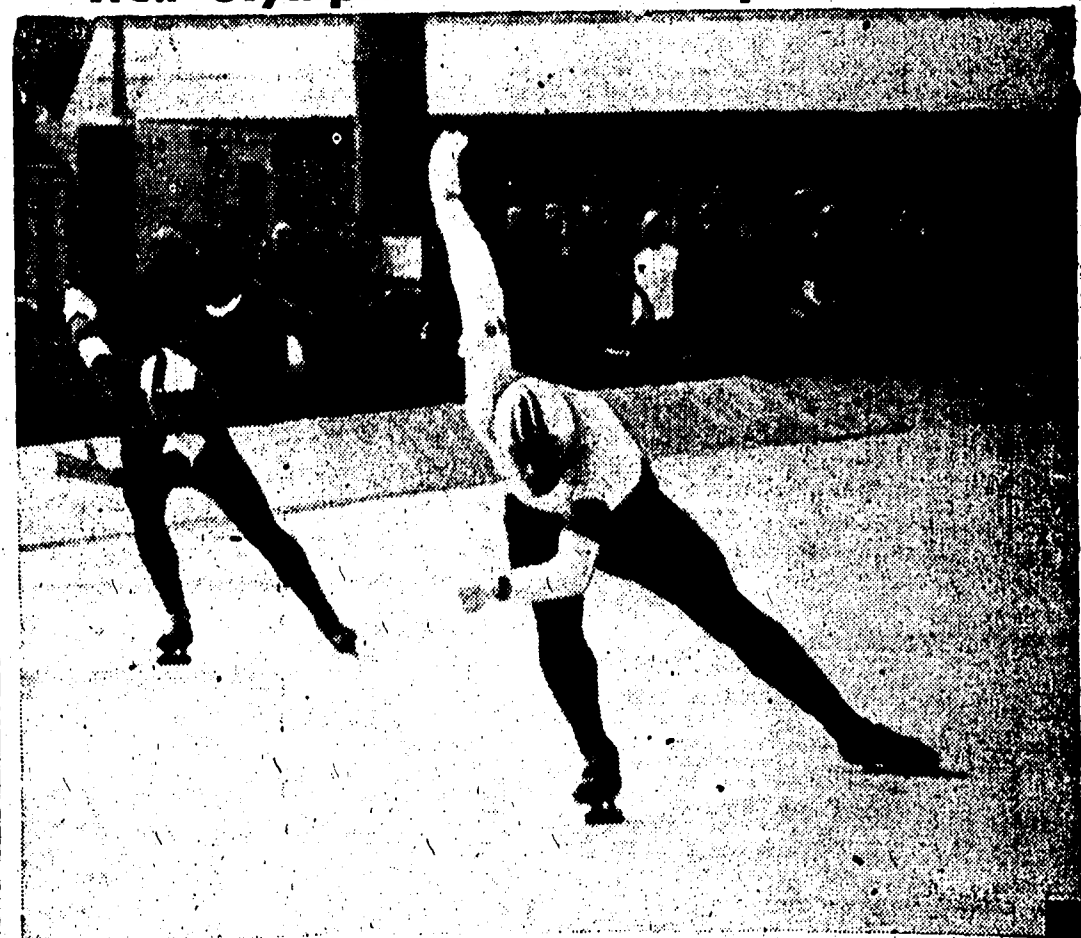

## New Olympic Records On Special Ice?



Here's winning form of Cees Verkerk of Holland, one of the world's fastest skaters.

**GRENOBLE, FRANCE** — Skaters practice on what may be the world's fastest ice at this French Alpine town, site of the February Winter Olympics. A special mineral-free ice is being used, produced by new Culligan water conditioning equipment. Deionized water, normally used for industrial purposes, such as washing of electronic components, contains less than 2 parts per million of dissolved minerals. The potential importance of low solids ice was first noticed by the Russians whose skating times were faster just after a rain. The simple scientific explanation is that as hard water freezes its minerals separate, making ice uneven in texture and hardness and causing the skaters' blades to become dull.

When found by his brother, Bruce had been burned from the waist up and including his face.

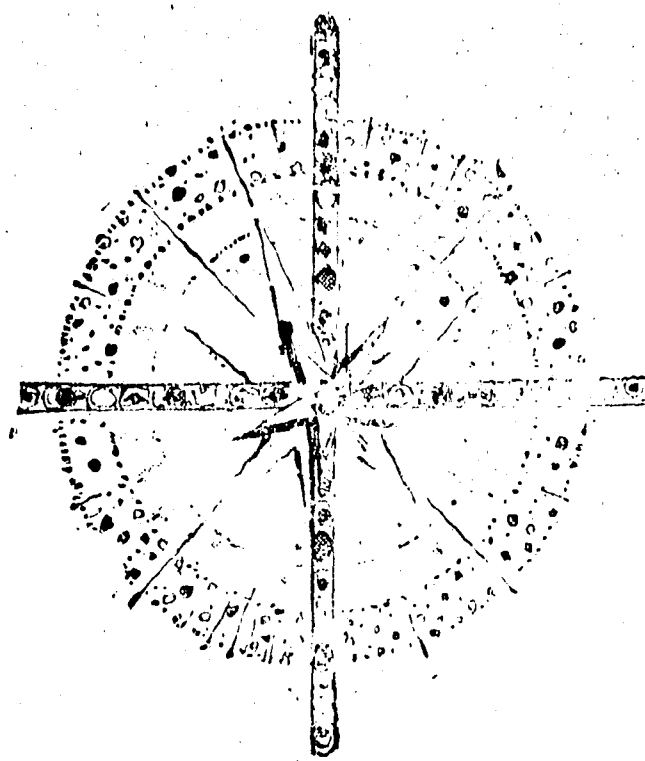

**90 Years Back**

FROM EARLY FILES OF THE DIGBY COURIER

December 14, 1877 -

"It is the opinion of many medical men that much of the disease which prevails at this season in many of our towns and villages is preventable; for instance diphtheria, typhoid fever, dysentery, typhus fever, etc.; and perhaps no one thing is more fertile in evil results than filthy drains and outbuildings. All such sources of disease should be disinfected which can easily be done by the frequent use of copperas water, carbolic acid, chloride of lime, or dry earth."

"Although the weather the past week has been mild, there has been sufficient cold towards the evening to make the skating on the rink fair. The lamps which have been placed around the rink make a good and necessary addition."

The Courier of above date noted the death of Maurice Taylor, Valley Mills, who died 'in his chair' at the age of 77 years. The deceased was a son of Colonel Taylor, 'one of the old revolutionists'.

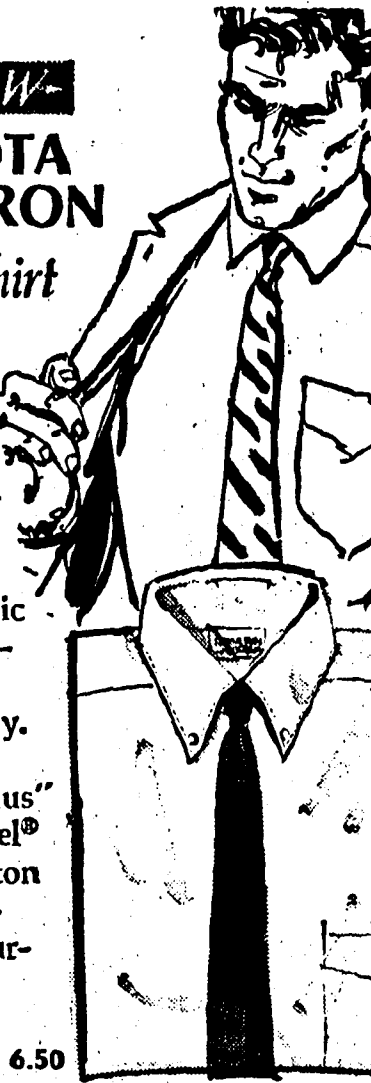

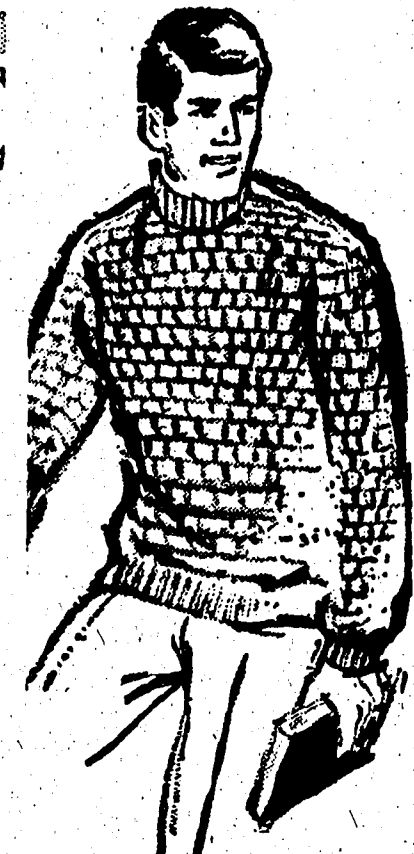
