





Stewardship Of Land

National Wildlife Week is an annual National Wildlife Week is an annual observance dealered by an Act of Par-liament in 1947. It is the week which contains the date April 10, the birthday of the late Jack Milner who won world-wide renown so not of Canadá's early naturalists. At the request of the Federal and Provincial governments, the Canadian Wildlife Federalfon provides lead-enship for special education programs during National Wildlife Week each year. This year the Federalfon has propared This year the rederation has prepared for Wildlife Week, April 6 to 12, an article on Ecology and Land Use Planning, excerpts of which we use for our editorial.

The way land is used within the city and on the edge of the city has a very great bearing on the quality of environment it provides for its residents. It is them in provides for its residents. It is becoming increasingly apparent that the crowded, noisy, bustling atmosphere of the city is an unnatural environment to which man has not fully adjusted. It is an atmosphere from which he tends to escape, as often as opportunity permits, to the quieter, more natural surroundings to the quieter; more natural surroundings which represent his evolutionary home-land. But this escape is becoming increasingly difficult as the open countryside recedes farther and farther from the city centre and highways become more crowdown with the country and with weekend travellers all seeking an alternative to urban living. Surely the city itself can be designed to provide popertunities for quiet softwale in numeropportunities for quiet solitude in numer ous natural sattlings located within easy reach of its residents. Land bordering the city, or close to it, must be reserved as

Not all city streets need to be the exclusive domain of the automobile with its attendant noise, odour, pollution and danger. Some streets in the central area can once again become pleasant retreats where leisurely social contact merges with commerce. The decaying ghillito which all too commonly surround the city can be replaced by pleasant residential or business areas combining open space

or business areas combining open space with high-density utility.

Instead of subdivisions which repeat rectangular patterns in monotonous regularity on land from which any vestige of naturalness has been removed by bull-dozing, or which use land wastefully in control large labs planners can design. dozing, or which use land wastefully in overly large lots, planners can design "cluster housing". This relatively new concept groups housing units in individually designed diusters which blend into the landscape and which leave more than half of the subdivided area in natthan half of the subdivided area in nat-ural open space and playgrounds. Besides creating a pleasing atmosphere of spaci-ousness, 'cluster development reduces costs of roads and services without de-creasing the number of dwellings accom-modated within the subdivided area.

modated within the subdivided area. Applying ecological knowledge to planning for use of rural land results in social benefits as important as those to be achieved in the city. The ecologist studies land in terms of its origin, hist-roy and physical and chemical properties to detarmine the use which will produce greatest banefits to soclety. Uses recom-mended on this basis would differ great-ty from existing practices in many parts. by from existing practices in many parts of Canada, Large acreages of land origin-ally cleared for farming but incapable of ally cleared for farming but incapable of supporting economically viable agriculture, or incapable of maintaining adequate levels of fertility, should be returned to forest. Conservation precities to reduce erosion of soil by wind and water would be recommended. Use of some pesti-cides would be reduced through greater emphasis on biological controls of insect pets harmful to agricultural and forest crops. Many drainage programs which reduce groundwater tables and contribute to the problem of spring flooding would to the problem of soring flooding would

be revised. Priorities for water manage-ment and pollution control would come under critical review. The devastation under critical review. The devastation left by strip-mining would be restored to productivity with funds recovered from the mining operation. Good farm-land would be zoned for agricultural time and protected as completely spossible from the encroachments of urbenization and loss to inclusive or highways which coulds be located on less valuable, less productive land. Wetlands and those senic natural corners of land which have we much authentic value would be proso much aesthetic value would be pro so much aesthetic value would be pro-tected from the dragline and the plough. And ecologists would want to set aside many samples of natural communities to serve as datum lines against which to measure the performance of similar areas modified by man.

Comprehensive planning on an ecological basis could undoubledly contribute much to the quality of the environment of most Canadiags, and to the beauty and productivity of the landscape.

But the benefits it offers must await some fundamental changes in the attitudes which Canadians hold toward the land and resources. We tend to think of land as a commodity to be bought or sold for profit or put to whatever use its owner e is it only the present owne may choose. Is if only the present owner who suffers loss for short-term gain) when his land is made unproductive by creation or other abuses? Is there no responsibility to society and to future generations to maintain this freeploceable resource in a productive stee? We would need to develop a sense of stew-archip based on the concept that we really never own land — we use it carefully white we hold it in trust for those

really never own land — we use it care-tilly while we hold it in trust for those who must use it after us. Comprehensive planning for wise use of land and its associated resources holds promise of rich rewards in terms of opportunity to lead lives of high quality in pleasent surroundings: in order to qualify for these benefits, we must, however, be prepared to re-evaluate some of our time-worn concepts.

The Mobile Clinics throughout Nova Scotia are part of the program, of the Nova Scotia Society for the Care of Crippled Children in its efforts to provide the best possible service for handicapped children. Clinics will be held in Digby this year on April 23 and April 24. Following Clinics, the Society ar-ranges for the recommendations of the specialists to Be carried out, if parents

are unable to finance cost of tran are unable to finance cost of fransporta-tion and/or treatment, the local com-munity group which conducts the Easter Seaf Campaign is called on for help. In Digby the Kiwanis Club sponsors the clinic and conducts the Easter Seal cam-paign. Harold Emerson is chairman of the campaign.

Battle Of Atlantic Sunday

Sunday, May 4th, 1969, is Battle of Atlantic Sunday, the climax of Navy League Week in Canada

ter struggle to maintain the Atlantic sup-ply lines, which began with Great Brit-ain's déclaration of war on Germany on September 3rd, 1939, and ended September 3rd, 1939, and ended with Germany's surrender on May 9th, 1945, is an occasion for Canadians to draw in-spiration from a great victory; to reflect your the teamwork that echieved it; and to pay tribute to those of the Navy and Merchant Morine who gave their lives at sea in this great battle.

Thirty years ago this fall the Royal Canadian Navy Went to war with 11 warships. Within little more than fourand-a-half years Canada had assembled force of 400 warships - most of then built in her own shipyards — and this fleet, played a major role in Battle of the Allantic.

The year 1943 was the one which saw the Allies gain the upper hand over the U-boat menace. Only the year before it had been a tragic period for the Allies In the North Atlantic, During 1942, losses the their cash and 10% to the control of the Allies. eir peak and 1,006 ships totalling 5,471,222 tons were sunk. At that time Canada was providing 48 percent of the escort forces

April, 1943, saw the R.C.N. take over control of all shipping movements in the Western North Atlantic, in ad-dition, Canadian escort and support groups were growing to the point where they would soon be operating the entire they would soon be operating the entire battle area as the major protecting force for all North Atlantic convoys. In 1944, the entire responsibility of providing close secort for the trade convoys was placed in the hands of the Royal Can-dian Navy.

In the summer of that year the largest convoy of them all crossed the Atlantic. Numbering 167 ships, it boyer, its mid-corea largest more than a

on its mid-ocean journey, more than a million tons of cargo. Apart from 4 air-craft carriers within the convoy, an all-Canadian escort formed the protective ring and the cargo-laden armada arrived

Canadian escort formed the protective ring and the cargo-laden armada arrived on schedule and unmolested. Throughout 1944 there was no letup in the war against the U-boats-Canadian warships shared in the destruction 0,14 of them — the most accounted for by the R.C.N. in a single year. But the cost was not light, and in 1944 the R.C.N. paid the heaviest toll of any year of the war.

Q. Is it true that a person who is working not-more than 24 hours per week does not have to psy Unemployment Insurance?

A. It is true only if the person is either a boat fide student, or one who is not ordinarily engaged in insurable employment. He or she must sign a²declaration to that affect.

Q. When should I apply for benefit if I am lald off or lose my job?

off or lose my job?

A. Immediately. Contact the nearest office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission in parson, by slef-phone or by letter, In many areas application forms can also be obtained from the Post Office.

C. I will soon be opening a grocery business and will operate it myself for a period of time. Once I om sufficiently established, I will hitre a full-time clerk to assist me. What are my obligations to the Unemployment Insurance Commission in this regard?

A. 





Breathalyzer Tests Save Lives

in Canada every year and probably about 16,500 injuries could be avoided from car accidents if breathalyzer tests were car decidents if breathalyzer tests were used in Canada, the Digby Alchollism used in Canada, the Digby Alchollism Study Group, sponsored by the Alcholla Research Foundation, heard Constable H. F. Wheaton, RCMP, Yarmouth, say resently. That the consumption of alchol in Varying degrees and within different expanses of time correspondingly effects, the consumer's brain, and accordingly effects bit extreme ability was most effects, bit extreme ability was most effects, bit extreme ability was most effects. effects his driving ability was most ef-fectively shown by a film. Armed with this knowledge and convinced by the film no one in the study group raised a film no one in the study group relised a word of protest against the Breathalyzer -tests. Instead, they gave expressions of approval and would, apparently, encour-age use of the tests as verification of im-pairment of a motor vehicle driver. No person has a right to operate a

vehicle unless he has a license to say he is capable of operation. This is a safe-guard for the protection of human life guard for the protection of numan liter and property, Certainly no one would wish to see an incapable person at the wheel of a powerful machine which can inflict misery on the driver himself or other person. Not fully aware of his impairment, it is up to someone else or something else like the breathalyzer to convince him and actually teach him to estimate his own degree of folerance. Just how the breathalyzer test will

While point zero eight blood alcohol content might, make for loud talkers, it might not be necessarily "drunk" by outward appearances, Nevertheless, the breathalyzer test will provi judgement impaired and incapability of judgement impaired and incapability of properly and safely operating a car. The argument, however, should be consider-ed only from the point of lives saved and injuries avoided. When seven hun-dred and fifty lives (which could include yours or mine) can possibly be saved in one year through breathstyzer tests, then the testing lis too important to pass by. They should be instituted in the province for our protection. Besides, since the mejority of people become vehicle operators the caution necessary for the road should have a pronounced effect in vari-

It is also an established fact that the seiners tear up the Bay grounds, and destroy the natural spawning places and feeding places for lobsters. 

Q. Having worked one full year and paid Un-been at school-9½ months when I look for work again at employment insurance, I returned to school. I shall have the end of the school year. Am I entitled to credit for my end of the school year. Am I entitled to credit for my ributions and can I apply for work through Unemploy-t Insurance?

ment Insurance?

A. You have established unemployment insurance contribution credits of 52 weeks in the last 10d weeks, ten of which are in the last 52 weeks. These contributions are difficient to establish your eligibility for Unemployment insurance if no suitable employment is available. If you wish to file an application for Unemployment Insurance you can obtain a form from your nearest UIC office.



Those three letters stand for Vic-torian Order of Nurses, a publicly spon-sored home nursing service. A graduate nurse with public health training, wear-ing a blue uniform and under the juris-diction of a physician, attends ill patients. in the home. No one is denied the serv-ices no matter what race, color or creed.

Who pays 'the nurse? Well, if we refer to the Digby nurse then we must say the Digby Local Association V.O.N.

Where does the local association Where does the local association get the money to pay the nurse and all other, experies involved in keeping the service operating? There are a few grants, The Province of Nova Scotla gives a yearly grant. So does the Town of Digby, the Municipality of Digby and the Digby school boards. All in all, these grants probably raise something around \$2,000. But the year's operating costs of the Digby Local Association V.O.N. amounts to more than \$9,000.

Where does the rest come from? Part comes from nursing fees. The V.O.N. is not a free service. That is, it is not free to those who are able to pay. In fact, those who have the means pay the total cost per visit, petients who can pay three-querters or half or any other free-

tion of the cost per visit do so. Those who cannot pay at all still receive the service if required.

Who makes up the remainder of the \$9,000 or more? This is made up by tions from Mr. and Mrs. Public there would be no V.O.N. bedside care, health instructions, well baby clinics or school instructions, well baby clinics or school health program. Give your most to keep the service in our midst. M.S.I. will scarcely lessen the need of the V.O.N. and it could possibly increase home nursing care service.

No, the Nova Scotle government does not operate the V.O.N. as was erroneously thought by some. Grains from all levels of government make up a small part of the financing. Without contribuous and by me — the general public. Some is raised from the public by pantry. 
