in his long been said fhar Digby depends on its shoppers from Digby Meck and Islands. Digby feels it when the fish run scarce. "Good times" depend for a good part on whether or not the fishing industry flourishes Blown the high.

The fact then that Shaw and Gidney fish plant at Centreville closed last week will more than likely be felt somewhat in Digby. Thirty people can spend a con-siderable size pay roll in a year. Worse still is the fact these unemployed feel siderable size pay roll in a year. Worse still is the size these unemployed feel the hardship and probably will have to be uproside from their homes. The worrisome feature is that the same reasons which have coused Shaw and Gidney to disas-might cause other fish firms or other small industries to close. There lust is not enough profit today to make it werthwhile and if soweral of these small businesses close, the overall economical effect is definitely not good.

We can think of a number of reasons which are cutting the profits of a small business. We need not name them, surely that word profit in business should be swest to everyloody's ears. The said part is profit is so often looked at

Digby's third weekly newspaper was the Examiner. This paper, a four page sheek, began publication on May 12, 1865, with John A. Cossets and his son, John Byton Cossett, of Smith's Cowe, as proprietors. The Examiner designated itself as "A journal of art. science, liferature and general information". It continued in population was supported by the control of the Committee of the Country of the

No copies of the trist issue of the Courter seem to be in existence but issue number five, dated October 16, 1874, shows the paper to have been a very interesting journal. As was the custom of the early weeklies, it carried little local news and none at all

on its front page.

Local merchants patronized the Digby Co-Local merchants patronized the Digbty Courier guile extensively right from its first year of pulcifice jibin. The anticipated coming of the railroad to Digbty was capitalized on by a number of the merchants in their advantiang and headings such as "New Era Céming", and "Railway Coming" were to be seen in the early Courier. One merchant in 1874 advertised the arrival of 700 barrels of flour "via Railroad from Canada Direct".

The founder of the Digby Courier, R. S. McCormtick, was a native of Bridgetown. He was descended from Samuel McCornick, of Northern Ireland, who was born in 1741 and emigrated to Nova Scotia in the latter part of the 18th century. Sometime after founding the Digby Courier, Richard McCornick was killed in an accident and the paper for a time was carried.

Farnham, who married a daughter of Daniel McCormick, edited the Courter, Another early editor was W. T. Ford. In 1887 the Digby Waekly Courter espoused the Liberal cause politically and a competing paper was started in the community to support the Conservative cause. This was the Canadian which commenced publication on December 10, 1891. The Canadian cessed publication in 1893 after the Column susumed again its original independent.

For a short time during its early years the Digby Weekly Courier carried a column in French for the banefit of its Acadian readers. This column was upplied by the Rev. E. d'Homme, Pastor of St. Vincens Church in Salmon River. This evidently did not prove too satisfactory to the Acadian people and it was then Yearneonies was started. ngeline was started.





If a person drives an automobile while experiencing this, the chances of accidental death are greatly increated. Also, they are informed that nizaroits officers have observed definite physical and mental deterioration of individuals who have used marijuana over profracted periods of time. For obvious reasons, such persons would not be good risks for life insutance".

This has been true with marrijuana in the past, and the progression has been towards ISD, the amphetamines, and the opiates. Users of LSD, users of amphetamines for 'kicks', and users of narcotics such as heroin,

and users of nacrolica such as heroin, certainly endanger their lives and are not good insurance risks. So perents and adults among our readors, we exhort you to consider seri-ously and immediately this real problem within the tower and environ. Cur youths, whether ignorant of the dangers or not, are precious and our only real asset in life.
