Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits, so in the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" listened to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story was something like, "Four Boy Swims Officially Open Pease Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the four? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Earl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars (second world war), was awarded the Victoria Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent druggist for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale importer of hardware and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day I was asked to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". A friend and I read at least two somewhat different stories about the man who was found marooned on a beach at some point on the French Shore of St. Marys Bay, Duxbury County. When I read this man's story, it had been cut out and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. free trade with the U.S.A., especially with the New England States. The question was then debated by some Digby High School students, one of which was J.J.'s daughter, Florence (now Mrs. Morton of Tibert, Prescott, Digby Co.). Some days after the debate a man from some part of Nova Scotia came to the printing shop looking for Florence, one of the successful debaters. I had the impression that this man was interested politically but, maybe I was wrong.

Well, I felt that I had learned considerable from my short experience at "The Wallis Job Print." I was learning to do beginner jobs, receiving some knowledge about things like embossing, stamping, perforating, counting, cutting and trimming paper stock, trying like for certain desired values, and so forth, but, the only experience I had at setting type was just enough to make a "go", the printers name for a confused mess.

The Straw That Broke The Camel's Back

According to Councillor "Penny" Gotti who represents Smith's Cove in the Municipality of the District of Digby, the motels from just on the border of Digby town and municipality to the further end of Smith's Cove are about fed up with government forms of all kinds to be filled out. The one from the director of assessment in the Digby and Annapolis Municipalities level of government was only "the straw that broke the camel's back", and, according to Mrs. Gotti, we believe, no more irritating than those received from a higher level of government whether that be provincial or federal.

Mrs. Gotti, of the Hedley House, and her contemporaries, can take consolation from the fact that the motel business is not the only type of business fed up with the hours they must spend filling out government forms of one kind or another, least of which are on town and municipal levels. It seems one has just about finished one form when another is due, leaving little time in between to actually earn a living. In that, Mrs. Gotti will have many sympathizers.

Possibly, too, as Mrs. Gotti has intimated, the forms would have been more appreciated if they had been received at some other season of the year than just into their busy season. But again, this might have been the convenient time for the director of assessment to put out the forms and we doubt if the motels were the only type of business to be notified. The season that is bothersome for one business to fill out forms might be less bothersome for another.

However, there is another untimeliness about the issue made by Mrs. Gotti in such dramatic and obviously incensed manner. Just in the height of the tourist season, we hope it does not backfire by appearing in any manner uncooperative and cast reflection on the tourist industry in general in Digby County. We are sure that is the last result Mrs. Gotti would want to see, even though she was most adamant and rebellious in her stand. While we are not upholding Mrs. Gotti in her refusal, possibly it is just a side-effect showing its wings again to the benefit of more than the motel industry.

Bear River between the old existing highway and railway bridges, and construction of a new limited access highway to provide access between the west end of the bridge and the east end, and the bridge will take place simultaneously with the bridge construction.

A number of studies and reports by the firm of A. B. Margison and Associates Ltd., consulting professional engineers, took place in the period between 1965 and 1968 before a firm decision was reached on the location of the new bridge. Preliminary design work was authorized in 1968.

Replacement of the existing one-lane bridge structure will greatly improve traffic flow on this major east-west Valley highway route and the new facility will intersect the existing Bear River village road west of the river, close to the alignment of the new bridge. In order to produce a safe operating condition of this intersection a portion of the Bear River village road will be relocated westward.

GOVERNMENT HAS FAILED ITS OBLIGATION—NICHOLSON

The Conservative Government of Nova Scotia has failed to meet the objectives it set out to achieve and to live up to its own obligations charged Peter Nicholson, M.L.A., Liberal for Annapolis West, who addressed the Digby Liberal Association at the annual meeting held at the Lions Hall on Tuesday evening. The speakers for his failure, Mr. Nicholson set forth, were because it was victimized by financial pirates, it made poor investigation and had a lack of financial stability. The government, he charged, abrogated its responsibility and gave it to consultants.

Mr. Nicholson continued that the people thought they had elected the government to run the country and not a group of consultants to run the country. A great deal of money paid to a group of consultants and advisers has been wasted when there had been competent civil servants to do the work he argued, although he admitted some consulting was necessary.

Mr. Nicholson said that prior to taking office the Conservative government was going to decrease taxes, eliminate waste and do streamlining. Instead, he said, the total advances through Industrial Estates Limited in 1969 was \$2 million dollars for secondary industry and industrial development. Some of these firms helped by I.E.L. failed, the speaker said, and some were taken over by other firms but no one has disclosed the terms of take-over.

Island at Tiverton and the mainland at East Ferry. However, the new system does not include crossing the snow after dark. People who wish to go to the island after six or seven p.m. during winter months and nine or nine thirty p.m. during summer's longer days will, as in the past, be forced to leave their vehicles at East Ferry and cross in the boat.

It is understood telephones are to be installed, one at East Ferry and one at Tiverton for passenger use and for the ferry boat operators. It is understood sleeping arrangements are being considered for the

crew members who are to be on duty while maintaining the all-night ferry service.

However residents feel the new system does not alleviate problems regarding ferry crossings. They feel the system still unable to cope with strong tides peculiar to the passage and the rough seas created by high winds which are the major factors to contend with, especially in emergency crossings and cannot be overcome by the eight crew members.

The proposed bridge or causeway which would provide a permanent link with the mainland is the only possible solution to Petite Ferry transportation Islanders feel.

Fishermen, has shown a serious decrease in the catch of haddock and cod. The total landings, it was stated, are down one-third from last year and two-thirds from two years ago.

It was felt that pressure should be brought upon the provincial government for financial assistance. Some of the fishermen fished all the month of June and didn't take home \$100. Many of them expressed difficulty in getting enough money to pay weekly store bills amounting to \$30 to \$50.

The fishermen claimed that the small inshore fishing drags and seiners are ruining

the fishing grounds of the trawl and line fishermen. They felt the drags should not be allowed to fish within three miles of shore. Scallop drags were not included, since they do not fish in the groundfish areas, nor disturb their feeding grounds.

It was also stated that government regulations had not been carried far enough concerning Browns and Georges Banks areas. These areas are the spawning grounds for haddock. Government regulations prohibit fishing of these grounds during the spawning period. The Fundy Board of Trade will recommend that this period be extended until the first of June, since many

of the fish are still spawning until this time.

Concerning the drags, the fishermen stated that "they (the drags) have been catching tons of haddock, six to eight inches in length and now they wonder where the haddock have gone." It takes seven years for a haddock to grow to market size, they said.

The Fundy Board of Trade decided to send a delegation to Halifax, in the immediate future, to meet with officials of the Department of Fisheries and discuss immediate assistance for area fishermen. Fishermen from Victoria Beach to Port Maitland will be asked to send at least one

delegate from each fishing community, to join with the Islands group, and meet with government officials.

The delegation will ask for immediate assistance for fishermen, a supplementary allowance for poor fishing seasons, rules and regulations regarding drags and seiners, and government subsidizing of bait.

Also at the meeting, Dr. John Meehan announced that the "publicity stunt" for better ferry service had brought results and that the islands would be getting twenty-four hour ferry boat service. Dr. Meehan will head the delegation to Halifax in the near future.

What To Do When It Rains

More fishing trips have been ruined because of wet gear—sleeping bags, food, clothing—than by any other cause. Yet, proper advance planning can prevent getting everything wet and possibly save the trip.

The trick, says Red Fisher, the fishing expert at Mercury outdoors, is to have stored your boat the few items needed to keep yourself and your gear dry when an unexpected rain comes along.

Red Fisher

portant piece of gear is a large tarp. One that's eight feet by ten feet is suitable. If you're camping and fishing, you'll probably have air mattresses aboard the boat. If not, then a second tarp or plastic ground cloth is needed. The only other gear necessary (if you're fishing from a large boat, you'll probably be able to set up dry camp right on the boat. First stretch out the tarp so that it covers everything. The boat's windbreak will probably leave enough room and breathing space under the tarp so that you'll be comfortable. Next blow up the air mattresses and use these as seats or prop yourself against the boat seat using the tarp pieces of lumber to prop the tarp up over your face.

"CENTRAL TRUST" GETS RELEASE AT LAST

After a ninety-one day stay in Digby, the 435 foot ship, Central Trust was released on Tuesday and set sail for Trieste to discharge her cargo. The ship will be transported by barge to its original destination in Yugoslavia. The crew are mostly from Formosa.

The captain of the Central Trust, L. Sin, who brought his ship in port on April 15th, called at the Digby Courthouse before sailing to express his sincere gra-

titude to the people of Digby for the kindness shown to himself and the crew while they were delayed here. While they were all depressed about the fact that their long delay was losing money for their company (an amount said to be in the vicinity of \$80,000), they were thankful for the kindness shown to them by the people of Digby, the captain said. "We longed with a good impression of the Town of Digby," he continued.

This was the first time the captain had experienced such a peculiar situation, he informed the Courthouse. After the ship was loaded and ready to sail, the trouble began when the ship was seized and a claim issued to Kint Lines Ltd., charterers of the vessel.

Here when the vessel was released was Mr. Chris Cheung, chief of the Central Trust Overseas, Evergreen Corporation, which company found it advisable to make a change of management. It is understood, because for political reasons they could not enter a Communist country. An order for

release from the Digby port was granted by the District Registrar of the Nova Scotia Admiralty Court and the vessel was issued by Sheriff Ralph MacIntyre.

The Central Trust which had been alternating until the wharf collapse between the wharf and being anchored in the Annapolis Basin when other ships needed berth, put in port at Saint John, N.B. for oil and water. The wharf collapsed prevented her from returning to Digby wharf for these provisions.

SEINERS REAP HARVEST FROM ST. MARY'S BAY

Vast schools of small herring, about six inches in length, swarmed in St. Mary's Bay, bringing as many as 25 seiners to the area. Veteran fishermen said it was the first time in many years that the small fish, usually of the sardine size, had been seen in the area in such large numbers. The discovery was made accidentally when a seiner, which had tied up at the wharf here to give the crew some rest after a hard night's work, sprang into action when its sonar revealed large masses of the small fish only about 500 yards from the Meighan wharf.

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Mr. Haliburton noted that Henry became King's Printer at the time he purchased the Gazette but got into difficulties some time later with the Nova Scotia government and was replaced by a Robert Fletcher and the Halifax Gazette ceased publication. Henry did not give up, however, and began publication of the Nova Scotia Chronicle in 1769. Soon after, Fletcher died and Henry regained his title as King's Printer, plus a good deal of extra work in government printing.

In his very interesting historical address to the Queen's Printers, Mr. Haliburton noted that Mrs. Margaret Draper, a printer from Boston, was among the Loyalist settlers to seek refuge in Nova Scotia. Mrs. Draper, who continued to publish her newspaper in Boston until the city was evacuated by the British has been called "the heroine of American journalism". When she fled to Nova Scotia she brought with her, her printing press and her nephew John Howe.

John Howe, Mr. Haliburton said, became the most important printer in Halifax and of Queen's Printers' Association of Canada. Mr. Gordon B. Dibb of Halifax was elected president of the association. Mr. Howe later became Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia and said, "so far as I know was the first printer to achieve this honour".

At the election of officers at the annual meeting of the association, Mr. Joseph Howe was elected secretary-treasurer. Every province in Canada was represented at the sessions. Among possible government in Nova Scotia present were William B. Evans, director of reprographics, and H. F. 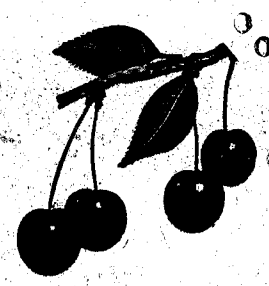

CHERRIES BROUGHT FROM ENGLAND

Bear River has been noted for its cherries for years beyond the time of the first Cherry Carnival in 1910. Cherries, it is told, were introduced to Bear River by the English settlers and credit for this has been given to Captain William Sutherland. From Bear River, the cherry trees, which variety it is understood grow from seed rather than by grafting, moved their way into the Deep Brook, Smith's Cove and Acaciaville areas. Not too many years, ago, and somewhat to day, people come from distances to pick cherries from trees at random in fields and roadsides. Both representatives also attended the session making the public release of the report of the Canadian Commission on Emotional and Learning Disorders in children. This session, attended by some four hundred representatives of educational services, service groups and other organizations was held on the evening prior to the annual meeting of C.M.H.A.

As a result of the one hundred and forty four recommendations of the CELDC report and a review of its findings was presented to the gathering by Dr. Forbes Elliott and Dr. Malcolm Beck, members of the study committee.

Dr. Beck was also guest speaker at the luncheon session of the C.M.H.A. annual meeting.

During his address Dr. Beck noted that availability of services for the overwhelming number of children and youth with severe, disabling problems and social problems present in our society is inadequate.

The numbers of these young people with problems ranging from emotional disorders, juvenile delinquency, parental neglect and abuse, mental retardation, learning defects to the effects of poverty, who are presenting themselves for help is so great, Dr. Beck said, that existing services cannot cope with them.

Dr. Beck stressed the need to involve a wide range of services in dealing with these problems and said these must include many institutions, organizations and individuals, both professional and lay. The total solution with these personal, family and social problems must relate to the personal person, his family and his total situation over a long period of time, Dr. Beck said.

Describes Mental Health Services

A very vivid description of the mental health services of the Kings County Hospital, "One Nova Scotia's Modern Psychiatric Hospital", was given by Loran Fevens of the Valley Radio Network in an illustrated address to the regular meeting of the executive of the Digby County Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association.

In his presentation, which was a synchronized slide and taped production, Mr. Fevens provided his audience with a condensed tour of facilities of the hospital at Waterville and a detailed explanation of the services offered by the hospital. He also explained his own interests as a volunteer worker at the hospital and outlined some of the opportunities for service provided by volunteers.

At the conclusion of the presentation a most interesting discussion period was held during which Mr. Fevens dealt with many matters of interest, particularly on the part of the White Cross Committee of the local branch.

It was the unanimous opinion of the members of the executive present for the programme that a repeat performance should be arranged and efforts made to involve representation from area service clubs and other organizations. Such a gathering will be arranged for early autumn, it was decided.

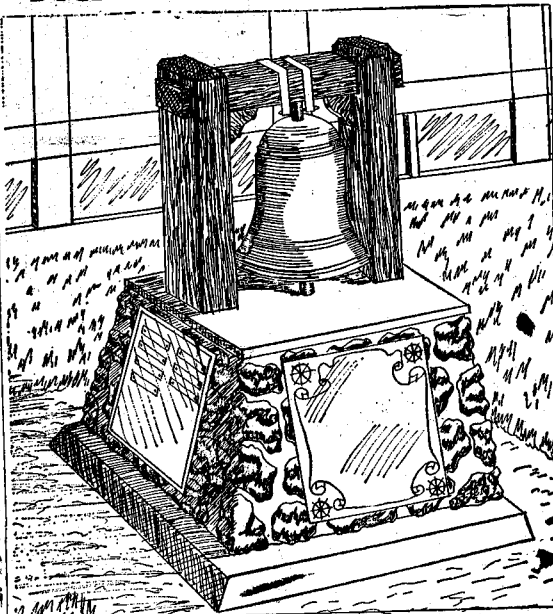

DIGBY'S MEMORIAL BELL



Digby's Natal Day, which is celebrated each year on the last Monday in July, and this year falls on July 27, marks the anniversary of the establishment of the community 187 years ago, in the summer of 1788, but also provides an opportunity for residents of the area, and visitors as well, to recall how closely Digby's history and its present day economy is related to the sea.

In 1967, Canada's Centennial year, a memorial cairn and bell, together with commemorative plaques was erected on the grounds of Digby's new and modern federal building. Established in great efforts of Otton W. Smith, Digby's present Mayor, the memorial cairn, bell and plaques commemorates and recalls to mind the many, many persons from Digby and area including Digby Neck who went down in the sea in ships and never returned.

The large bronze bell which surmounts the memorial cairn has a special historical significance and a connection with the sea all its own and is most appropriate part of the memorial. For quite a number of years this bell, which was placed by the Department of Marine and Fisheries at North Point on Brier Island in 1907, served as a warning to mariners of dangerous shoals in the area. Hand operated, its claxon call continued as the signal to mariners of their imminent danger from the shoals at North Point until it was replaced by more modern equipment quite a number of years later.

With its replacement as an alarm, the bell fell into disuse and it was not until Fisheries Officer Smith and others interested in creating a memorial to area mariners began to consider what form such a memorial should take that the large bronze bell, cast in 1867 in Pittsburgh in 1867, was rescued from its muddy resting place

on Brier Island, given a good cleaning and brought to Digby to contribute to the memorial of a seafaring disaster which claimed the life or lives of people either known directly or whose descendants are known to him.

On the face of the memorial cairn which is located on the grounds of Digby's federal building there is an inscription which reads in part, "In Proud Memory of all the Seafaring Sons of Annapolis Island, Digby Neck and Islands area who were Lost at Sea during the period 1867-1967." The inscription concludes with the quotation, "O Lord Thy Sea is So Great and my Ship is So Small."

The other three faces of the memorial cairn each carry bronze plaques bearing the names of those whose memory is recalled by the cairn. They number in total close to one hundred and fifty and a reading of the names inscribed

must bring to the mind of many a passerby recollections of a seafaring disaster which claimed the life or lives of people either known directly or whose descendants are known to him.

Included among the names of those inscribed on the plaques are those from this area who lost their lives at sea as a result of enemy action or in other marine disaster during time of war.

On Monday, July 27th, as Digby celebrates its natal day, the grand parade will halt for a few moments abreast of the memorial cairn while a short ceremony of remembrance is held. Taking part will be representatives of local clergy and civic and other dignitaries. A wreath will also be laid at the base of the memorial cairn. Later the wreath will be taken aboard CFS Princess of Acadia to be cast on the waters of the Bay of Fundy in memory of the lives of those from this area whom the sea has taken.

Strange Shark Harasses Island Fisherman

(Mrs. John Outhouse) Just how intimate did the strange shark become to become with Reginald Outhouse, Tiverton fisherman? Mr. Outhouse did not tarry for the answer.

While handling stone in his 27 foot gasoline-powered fishing boat in 40 fathoms of Bay of Fundy waters about two miles above the coast of Long Island, Mr. Outhouse became the centre of attraction of a strange type of shark. Said Mr. Outhouse in describing the shark, "It was the strangest shark both in color and behaviour that I have ever seen. I have had sharks come near enough to the boat to scratch themselves on the road, to circle the boat, to even eat our bait we were fishing with. They were the high-finned sharks and would usually leave us alone with in a few minutes. But this one stayed close to the boat - his whole length floated even with the ribbing of the boat. He floated belly-up and with his mouth open. When I moved forward, he moved forward, when I went aft, he followed me. Apparently he was not hungry, because he took no notice whatever of the bait I had over the side of the boat. His coloring was different, too. Usually sharks are dark, but this one had quite a bit of white on it."

Mr. Outhouse said though he has experienced the presence of sharks, even while this was the first time he was ever afraid of one. When

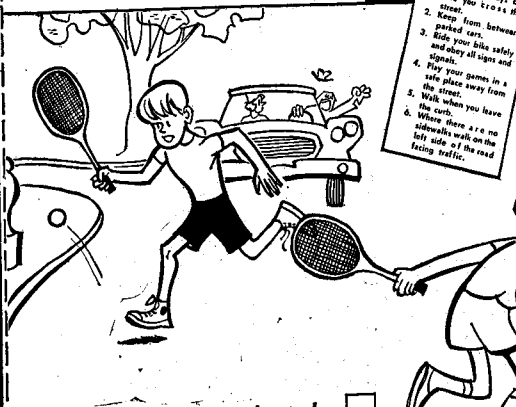

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Need Only \$300 For Land Party

Weymouth Falls wants to purchase four acres of land adjoining the Community Centre in that village. They need three hundred dollars and it was for this purpose that the Council of the District of Digby met on Tuesday afternoon. The Council met in a one day session.

Union's proposal of increasing the membership by three cents per capita making a nine cent cost. The clerk was informed to notify the U.N.S.M. of the objection.

Correspondence between Councilor Goff and Hon. Gordon Tidman was read in which Mr. Goff voiced the Council's disapproval of a cut in Welfare grants for Digby and Clare to \$16,000.

Correspondence was read regarding disappointment in amount of CBC-TV broadcasting which is received in the Digby area and also that new CKDY radio station does not cover parts of Digby Neck and Islands and Weymouth. It was recognized that this was no fault of the station but that it would interfere with the American broadcasting waves of which they had right, it was felt that complaints should go to Washington, D.C. and to American stations with Mrs. Goff advising that letter should go to Washington stating that "your damn stations interfere with us, what are you going to do about it?"

Council decided to provide table accommodation for the press.

Since no home has been provided in the 1970 capital city for a school garage it was necessary to leave garage consideration over for a future meeting.

Requests for capital budget amounts in 1971 and 1972 regarding housing were received from the N.S. Housing Commission. 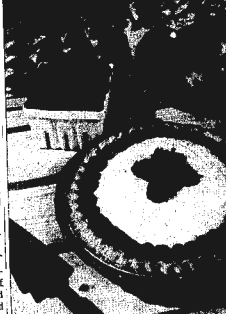

FRESH BLUEBERRY CHEESE PIE

- 1 packaged 9-inch pastry shell
- 1 pint fresh blueberries*
- Sugar
- 1 package (8-ounce) cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup milk
- 1 package (3% ounces) instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice

Bake pie shell according to directions on package. Reserve 3 cup blueberries. Spoon remaining berries to taste, spread evenly over bottom of pastry. Beat cream cheese until smooth and fluffy; gradually add milk. Add pudding mix, lemon rind and juice. Mix blend thoroughly (about 2 minutes). Spread over berries in pastry shell. Chill 1 hour. Before serving, range reserved blueberries over surface of pie. Make 9-inch pie.

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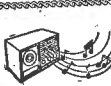

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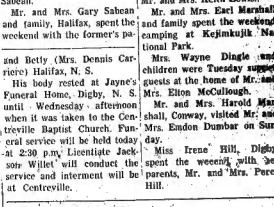

Digby Public School System

Digby Municipal and Urban Schools will reopen on Wednesday, September 9, 1970 when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full teaching day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 P.M. Student lunches will be served at the Digby Regional School on the opening day.

Students registering in the Digby Urban & Municipal School System for the first time, regardless of age or grade, are required to register early. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1, 1970 will not be registered at anytime during the current school year. Offices of the School Supervisors at the Digby Regional, Weymouth and Freeport Schools will be open to receive advance registrations between the hours of 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and 1:30 P.M. to 3:30 P.M. on Tuesday, August 18. Advance registrations will close on August 18 and all other registrations will be deferred until after the first week of school. Principals of the Digby General School will be available at their schools on Friday, August 28 to receive advance registrations.

Municipal students not residing in the area served by the Digby Regional School and seeking admission to classes at this school must have their applications approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Box 760, Digby, N. S. Immediate requests will expedite approval.

Bear River students enrolled in Grades VII to IX who may wish to enroll in the Digby Regional High School during 1970-71 must make immediate application directed to the Supervisor of Schools, Box 968, Digby. This does not apply to Bear River students residing in the Municipality of Digby or Annapolis who have already applied for admission. Bear River students residing in the Municipality of Digby may elect to attend the Digby Regional High School while those residing in the Municipality of Annapolis may elect to attend either Digby or Annapolis Regional School.

Commercial students will be accepted for either Grade XI or XII according to their qualifications, stenographic, clerical and accounting courses will be offered in 1970-71.

PLEASE NOTE:

SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMINATIONS will be written WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 26 in all schools of the Digby Urban & Municipal School System. NO OPPORTUNITY WILL BE GIVEN TO WRITE SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMS ON ANY OTHER DATE. Digby Regional High School, Weymouth and Freeport students of Grade XII who may be writing A.P.E.B. Supplementary exams may obtain required texts at the office of the School principals on the Saturday morning following the release of record of marks. Rental fees: one book - \$2.00; two books - \$3.00; and more than two books - \$5.00. This date will be the only time that texts will be issued for Supplementary Exams.

Students wishing to take advantage of the text book rental plan for 1970-71 should come on September 9 prepared to make payment of the five dollar rental fee.

Before pupils may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia, they must comply with the Department of Public Health regulation regarding vaccination. Students entering Grade VII will be required to be re-vaccinated or present certificate showing vaccination done within the last three years. In September, a vaccination card will be held at the Digby Regional High School for Grade VII students who have not been vaccinated within the last three years.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Mainly for Mothers

Family Health and Safety Council of Brides

Certainly a new bride and bridesmaid should select an area as possibly a family doctor who can become familiar with their medical history and keep tabs on their health.

Keep your physician's phone number on the telephone together with any other you need in an emergency — your dentist's, your fire and police departments, and your local hospital.

The Council on Family Health, a non-profit organization sponsored as a public service by leading members of the drug industry to promote home safety and family health, suggests that the new bride establish good safety habits on the storage, care and use of medicine.

Following are some safety rules for every household:

1. Plan the contents of your medicine chest. Keep medicines and bottles in accurate cabinets, or if they must be kept in the open, store medicines on the upper shelves and toiletaries on lower shelves.

2. Tidy the medicine cabinet into two parts — one for medicines that are to be taken internally, and the other for those that are to be applied externally.

3. Take inventory of the contents of the cabinet at least once every six months. Discard medicines which are damaged or unrecalled.

4. Just as the manufacturer, pharmacist and physician have their responsibility in respect to medicines, the use of medical preparations involves responsibility on the part of the user. One important thing to remember is that at least three times when taking or giving medicines to your family.

5. Take inventory of the contents of the cabinet at least once every six months. Discard medicines which are damaged or unrecalled.

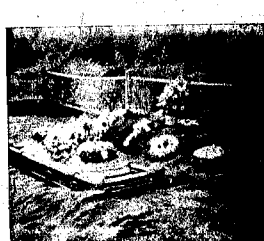

Officials in Shelbourne are interested because the opening of the road would give them a shorter route to the Annapolis Valley. A recommendation will be sent to L. W. Akers, Minister of Highways, asking that the matter be considered and given top priority.

Digby County Roads Contract Awarded

A \$220,300 contract for road construction in Digby County has been awarded to Lathier Construction Ltd., Halifax. Minister of Highways, L. W. Akers, announced today. The Truro firm was the lowest of four bidders on the tender which calls for the construction of subgrade and graveling of approximately 1.9 miles of Trunk 181 from Juggins Bridge to the DASH Overpass near Digby.

Resigns School Board Position

Hospital Association Directors At Mountain Gap

The 77th meeting of the Board of Directors of the Nova Scotia Hospital Association was held at Mountain Gap Inn on July 21st and August 1, 1970. The meeting was chaired by Dr. L. P. Chalmers, President of the Association. Concern was expressed over the 2% cut in hospital budgets since this imposes financial difficulty in providing adequate service to the communities the hospitals serve. The problem has been discussed with the Minister of Finance and it is hoped that, in the end, satisfactory adjustments will be made.

The Joint Labour Relations Committee reported that the survey prepared by the minister to labour negotiations is now ready for submission to the Commission. Recommendations, if adopted, should appear in a new era in hospital labour negotiations and result in a greater degree of uniformity throughout the province with the possibility of negotiations being carried on at regional levels and through an Industrial Relations Committee.

The directors were requested to take a careful look with regard to the demand for laboratory personnel. The Institute of Technology is presently turning out some 90 technicians each year of future needs in this field.

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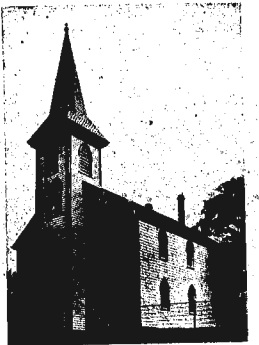

Gideon Guest Speaker

Lawrence Henshaw, Bear River, a member of the Digby-Annapolis Gideon Camp was guest speaker at the Digby Baptist Church on Sunday morning.

A Gideon, he explained, must be a member or an adherent of a recognized church. The organization is an arm of the church and undenominational. A Gideon does not smoke or drink.

The Gideon organization was founded back in early 1900s when a commercial trader, John Henshaw, decided to regularly read his Bible and discovered another man at the same time in the hotel where he was staying. They proceeded to form an organization, mostly for fellowship.

After that they spread to commercial business and superiors, now numbering 187 camps, and 2400 members in Canada. They expanded their work from fellowship to placing Bibles in homes in the U.S.A. in 1908 and in Canada in 1911. Bibles or New Testaments were first placed by Gideons in hospitals in 1930 and in the prisons in 1932. The first Gideon Bible was placed in a school in 1936 and in 1948 they began to put a New Testament in the hands of every pupil in grade V. Since 1941 there have been eighty-eight million Bibles and New Testaments distributed by Gideons.

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The Digby Courier Lives Through "Thick and Thin" For 96 Years — It Aims For A Century

With this issue of The Digby Courier this newspaper has lived through "thick and thin" for 96 years. Such a record cannot be boasted about in regard to newspapers which have cropped up in Digby County within the last century or more. Newspapers in Digby County have come and gone. In fact, we doubt if too many of our readers are aware of some of the newspapers which have existed for short periods in Digby County. Take for instance "L'Evangeline" at Moncton which was mentioned in The Chronicle-Herald on Tuesday (went off). This paper, "L'Evangeline," was started in Digby on November 23, 1877, by Valen-

Landry, assisted by Joseph Cullen. This paper was later amalgamated with The Weymouth Times, born in 1888 and published by Eugene J. Hainer. The name of the amalgamated paper became the Weymouth Free Press as published December 13, 1889. However, "L'Evangeline" was continued as a paper for Acadians and this is the newspaper published in Moncton today.

But, let us go back to the beginning of newspapers in Digby County. The earliest weekly newspaper in Digby was the Digby Athenaeum. A prospectus for this paper was circulated in the area by David A. Nicholson, a deaf mute, in 1857. This paper was to

begin publication in 1858 but failed because of lack of sufficient patronage.

A second venture into the weekly newspaper field was launched on Tuesday, December 6, 1859, by Albert E. Dodge, of Annapolis Royal, and Ingram B. Gidney, son of Angus Gidney, formerly Editor of the Yarmouth Herald, a native of Sandy Cove in Digby County.

Digby's second weekly newspaper was named the Acadian and was an eight page sheet. Page-size was twelve by eighteen inches and the masthead, carried the inscription, "Mind with Mind Direct Con-

munication Holds". Subscriptions were \$2.00 a year if paid within six months or otherwise \$2.50 per year. The paper was not an outstanding financial success and Mr. Gidney, the junior partner, withdrew in December, 1860. Dodge continued the paper but reduced its size to four pages. It continued publication every week until the fall of 1863 when the building and the entire plant was destroyed by fire. It is interesting to note that the building which housed the Digby Acadian was only a short distance from the structure which today is occupied by The Digby Courier.

DIGBY NECK FISH PLANT CLOSES DOORS 30 Become Unemployed — Had High As 80 On Payroll

With the Shaw and Gidney Fish plant, Centerville, Digby County, closing its doors last week, after operating for fifty years, approximately thirty persons from the village of Centerville became unemployed. About twenty were male

employees and ten were female. The same plant has previously had as high as eighty persons on the payroll. This is the first year that so few were employed.

Donald Shaw, owner and operator of the plant, informed

the Digby Courier that there were not enough fish to assure a profit to cover the overhead which is continually rising. Cod and pollock were available but choice haddock were scarce. Each year, Mr. Shaw said, the Workmen's

Compensation, Vacation Pay, Unemployment Insurance, taxes and deductions of various kinds take their toll leaving little for operation.

Mr. Shaw who intends opening a fish market in New Minas, Kings Co., expects others

plants to close as some are merely hanging on to see if there might be brighter prospects. Already Mr. and Mrs. Shaw have purchased a home in New Minas and they expect to build the fish market as soon as they have a sale for

Digby Girl Receives R.N.

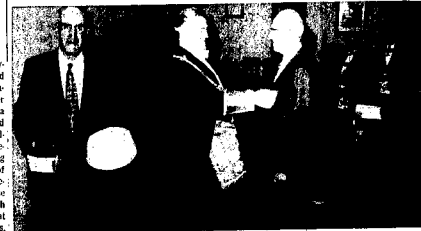

Digby Board Of Trade Says "Yes"

At a special meeting of the Digby Board of Trade held Monday night, Board of Trade members decided to take a "Yes" stand in the upcoming Liquor Plebiscite to be held in Digby on Tuesday, August 18th. The members of the Board of Trade also decided that they should inform the public of their stand and urge voters in the town to vote affirmatively.

Many of the members felt that tourists are being lost to outside areas because there are no licensed premises in the town. It was noted that Digby is one of the few, if not the only, town of its size in the province where liquor cannot be sold by the glass. There is a definite public demand for a service of this type in the town, it was stated, and not only from tourists but from local people as well.

It was noted that it seems rather ridiculous that the town is to be doing so contrary to the law. Members of the Board felt that these organizations should want to legalize their operations. Several organizations that sell liquor within (Please turn to page 8)

Some people tend to think that if the town goes "well" that the town will be wide open with liquor being sold everywhere. This is not so, members stated, anyone wanting a license has to adhere to strict government regulations.

Before a license is granted, an application has to be completed and sent to the government along with an amount of money. After one month's notice and advertising, a public hearing is held to determine the character of the proprietor and determine if the establishment meets the standards required by law. Not anyone can be given a license to sell liquor by the glass, the interior design and decorating has to meet rigid standards.

One restaurant owner, Bill Troop, stated that he will be

applying for a license if the plebiscite vote goes affirmative. Mr. Troop said that he will be licensing the Acadia room and the Harbour room of his restaurant. The front section of his restaurant will remain unlicensed for the use of teenagers.

Mr. Troop said that he realized that the licensing of his restaurant will involve a great deal of responsibility on his part but he is not out to make a profit from liquor sales to youths or minors. He merely wishes to provide a service to the public that the public demands to have. "I still have the right to refuse anyone that I am doubtful about," he said.

The swimming pool committee discussed various methods of raising funds for the construction of the swimming pool. It was noted that pledges of money from organizations and individuals were of little value for capital and that pledges should only be used for maintenance, once the pool is constructed. Digby's third weekly newspaper was the Examiner. This paper, a four page sheet, began publication on May 12, 1865, with John A. Covert and his son, John Byron Covert, of Smith's Cove, as proprietors. The Examiner designated itself as "A journal of art, science, literature and general information". It continued in operation until the end of 1867.

Digby was without a printing shop and weekly newspaper from the demise of the Examiner in 1867 until September 16, 1874, when Richard S. McCormick published the initial number of the Digby Weekly Courier. The new paper had the same dimensions as its predecessor and declared itself independent in politics.

No copies of the first issue of the Courier seem to be in existence but issue number five, dated October 16, 1874, shows the paper to have been seen in its predecessor and declared itself independent in politics.

Local merchants patronized the Digby Courier quite extensively right from its first year of publication. The anticipated coming of the railroad to Digby was capitalized on by a number of the merchants in their advertising and headings such as "New Era Coming", and "Railway Coming" were to be seen in the early Couriers. One merchant in 1874 advertised the arrival of 700 barrels of flour "via Railroad from Canada Direct".

The founder of the Digby Courier, R. S. McCormick, was a native of Bridgetown. He was descended from Samuel McCormick, of Northern Ireland, who was born in 1741 and emigrated to Nova Scotia in the latter part of the 18th century. Sometime after founding the Digby Courier, Richard McCormick was killed in an accident and the paper for a time was carried on by his widow.

The Digby Courier has continued publication without a break from its founding in 1874. Following McCormick, Charles E. Farnham, who married a daughter of Daniel McCormick, edited the Courier. Another early editor was W. T. Ford. In 1887 the Digby Weekly Courier espoused the Liberal cause politically and a compelling paper was started in the community to support the Conservative cause. This was the Canadian commenced publication on December 10, 1891. The Canadian ceased publication in 1893 after the Courier assumed again its original independent standing politically. One interesting number of the Digby Courier came out in 1897 as an Illustrated Magazine. Few copies of this number are still around.

For a short time during its early years the Digby Weekly Courier carried a column in French for the benefit of its Acadian readers. This column was supplied by the Rev. E. d'Homme, Pastor of St. Vincent's Church in Salmon River. This evidently did not prove too satisfactory to the Acadian people and it was then L'Evangeline was started.

Over the years since the founding of the Digby Courier in 1874 a number of local weekly papers have commenced publication in the Digby area. For a short time at about the turn of the century a daily paper, called the Telegraph, was published in Digby by John T. McBride. The Digby County Record also had a brief existence in 1908-09. The Weymouth Gazette was established in Weymouth by J. J. Wallis, later to become editor of the Digby Courier. This paper, started in 1906, lasted only three years. Several attempts were made in Bear River to establish a weekly there but these were short-lived. One of the weeklies established in the county, the Tiny Tattler of Central Grove on Long Island, achieved fame as the smallest newspaper in the world. Its editor and publisher was Ivan Shortliffe who at the time was fifteen years old and is now at Bridgewater representing the Chronicle Herald.

For quite a number of years Oakes Dunham was editor of the Digby Courier. He was succeeded by George Chisholm, who left the Courier in 1918 to go to the Kentville Advertiser. He was succeeded in the same year by J. J. Wallis, who continued to edit the Courier until 1924. In 1929 with a change of ownership of the Courier, J. J. Wallis again assumed the job

the evening discussion and remarked that the black people of Weymouth Falls were getting much help from the other people of the nearby communities and he did not want to see that relationship cut off in any way. 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Financial Help For Ambulance Services

Municipal Affairs Minister W. S. K. Jones announced on Tuesday details of the program under which the province will provide financial assistance to ambulance operators in Nova Scotia. This program is designed to make ambulance service available to all residents of the province.

Assistance will be given to the operators for a call from a hospital to a delivery point, or to a hospital from a receiving point when both are in Nova Scotia. Any person who is entitled to receive insured services from hospitals is eligible for ambulance service, and it also includes persons to whom service for non-emergency conditions is provided by Camp Hill Hospital, Halifax. All institutions supported by the Nova Scotia Hospital Insurance Commission are included under the program.

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Fish Buyers Warned Of Oil Seepage

Fish buyers in Digby were warned by the Department of Fisheries and the Mayor of Digby that oil had seeped into something, believed to be a ship, into the water around what is known as the Basin at Digby. The oil which has since dissolved into the water could be seen floating for approximately a mile length to a hundred feet width. It was floating in the direction of Digby. The oil which seeped into the Basin was not the heavy black crude oil but of the stove variety which caused no discoloration and mingled readily with the water. Following the heavy rain on Monday most of the oil disappeared from the eye view but it was felt some might have gone to the beaches and would leave a nasty smell or taste if used by the dealers to wash and prepare fish for sale. A pollution officer from the Department of Transport was in Digby on Tuesday and samples were taken for investigation and for report to the dealers. The only statement coming from the departments following Mr. Lewis' visit was that a slick of fuel oil had been found floating on the water and an investigation is being carried out by the Department of Fisheries, the Department of Transport and the R.C.M.P.

The new Digby-Saint John ferry being constructed at the Saint John Drydock is expected to be operational in November of this year. The ferry will be called "Princess of Acadia" and will require a transfer of name only from the present ferry. A temporary docking site at Saint John will be improved until the new terminal is completed. The Saint John construction site has been experiencing difficulties due to construction problems which resulted in a three-week work stoppage. The site is expected to be completed sometime in March of next year. The new ferry will be making two or possibly three trips daily across the Bay of Fundy, once the permanent ferry terminal is completed.

Assured Of French Language T.V.

Word has come from Louis R. Comeau, M.P. for South Western Nova, that he has been assured by the Canadian Radio-Television Commission, Pierre Juneau, that the proposed new CBC French language television station will be established at Yarmouth and will reach the Chatham area. The station, designated as CHFT, will rebroadcast the entire French language network program service of station CBFT, Montreal, the regional production centre of the French language programming in the Maritimes.

Mr. Juneau's assurance is contained in a letter of reply to protests from Mr. Comeau concerning inadequate radio and television service in parts of his constituency. BILINGUAL SERVICE SUPPLEMENTARY - NOTHING TAKEN AWAY

Inclusion in a bilingually designated area removes a stigma from the English speaking people but adds supplementary service to the French speaking people was the conclusion arrived at when Dr. Harry D. Smith, chairman of the Bilingual District Advisory Board for the federal government met members of Digby town council on Thursday afternoon. Dr. Smith, who is a French professor at the Nova Scotia Teachers College, Truro, was in Digby to feel

the pulse of the people in Digby town regarding their bilingual status.

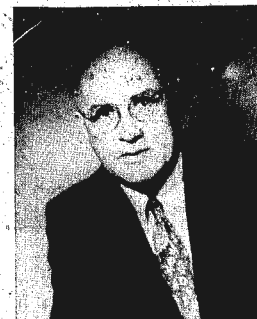

Once the prescription is filled, the pharmacist must give it to a patient and explain its use. This is why it is so important to see a pharmacist at a later date with reference to a particular prescription, the pharmacist is ready from the pharmacist's records.

Like your doctor, the pharmacist must keep up with the latest in medicine and scientific drug research, for according to the Council on Family Health, the great majority of all medicines prescribed today were not even known 10 years ago.

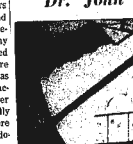
Minister Comes For Exhibition

HISTORY OF DIGBY SCHOOLS

The official opening of the new Composite Wing of the Digby Regional High School will mark another step forward in the job of providing educational facilities for the children of Digby and area, which began with the arrival of the first settlers in this community over two hundred years ago.

Although the Digby Regional High School with its Composite Wing is a far cry indeed from the schools which served the children of Digby and area in the early days of its history, the settlers of the area showed their keen interest in education almost from the very moment of their arrival.

Historical references show that the earliest settlers in the Digby area, the Planters, who came here and established a community which is still called Conway, had among their number a teacher whose name was William Barbanks. Arrangements were made for this man to go from home to home, teaching the children.

The homes in the area in those pioneer days were quite scattered and often Barbanks would stay for a time in various homes. For his services in teaching the three R's to the children he received his board and a small monetary remuneration.

With the arrival of the Loyalists in 1782, came the first effort to actually establish a school in the community. Lieut. James Foreman, a high school graduate and an experienced teacher, set up a school in the front room of his home which was then still unfinished. Lieut. Foreman's home was located, as were many of the Loyalist homes, in the north end of Digby. From the documentary description of the location of his property it would appear it was located along the shore of the Raquette, between Birch Street and Queen Street.

Lieut. Foreman's school actually began operations on the first Monday in November, 1784, and according to (Please turn to page 4)

records, had an enrolment of seventy-five pupils. He continued to operate his school in his home for five years, despite overcrowding and the fact the room in his home was unsuitable for use as a classroom.

In 1798 the first school building was erected in Digby. It was located on First Avenue, just to the rear of the present Metropolitan Store and was built by public subscription. A description of the building states it "was of medium size, with extension desks running its entire length to either side for senior scholars, while elementary pupils were accommodated with smaller ones of less extent, which dotted the centre. A brick furnace occupied one end,

the wardens and vestry met to consider the names of the twelve children for free schooling. It is recorded in the minutes that Lieut. Fore-

man "explained himself what description of children he meant to teach gratis, viz., such as are real orphans, such as are maintained out of the poor tax of the parish, or otherwise recommended as objects of compassion by the vestry."

Of the applicants it is recorded of a girl whose surname was "demolter" that "The mother is dead, the father much in debt in Australia, is in much need of charity for clothes." Another applicant, Betsey Channing, "has her parents here, but the mother has lost her reason and is very indigent."

After considering all the applications the vestry voted favorably on six of them. One of those they rejected was Betsey Jones although it is recorded of her that "her parents are at present in Digby, have three children and are very poor."

Despite the fact Lieut. Foreman stated he would teach

while the other formed an entrance."

Mr. Foreman's school operated for eight months of the year, but education was not provided "free" and as a right of the children of the area, but only on application of the parents and on payment by them of a direct fee.

It is recorded in the minute book of Trinity Parish in Digby, which Lieut. Foreman served as its first Clerk, that on September 29, 1798, Rev. Roger Viets, the Rector, informed the congregation that "Mr. Foreman will teach for the present twelve poor children gratis." Mr. Viets stated that "the church wardens and vestry will meet to receive such qualified children as are offered."

On November 14, 1798, the wardens and vestry met to consider the names of the twelve children for free schooling. It is recorded in the minutes that Lieut. Fore-

Mayor Glen Smith said that Mr. Purdy was a man who could ably meet and cope with every objective and every obstacle. His motto, he said, was always "Fight One More Round" when convinced that the cause was right. He wished the honored guest a happy retired life "filled with activity on behalf of the people."

Mr. Powell reviewed the school life in Digby of which he has been a part and which he saw grow with tremendous strides and accomplishments all because of the vision of one man, F. C. Purdy.

It is recorded that "During summers 1798 and 1799, Mr. Foreman inaugurated and sustained a school for imparting religious knowledge, somewhat similar to modern Sabbath Schools."

This was held in the same room and embraced lessons on tenets of the English church as taught by the approved Catechism and also on general Scripture selections."

The single room school on 1st Avenue served the educational needs of the community until the erection of a five room wooden school house on the south side of Church Street, north of the present jail building. This building served schooling for younger pupils while a high school was located on the upper floor of the original Store building on Water Street, about where the Kerb building now stands. There were five teachers in the system and for twenty days although a number of ladies provided teaching or tutoring in their homes.

In 1890 the Digby County Academy on Queen Street, directly south of the Court House, was built at a cost of \$8,000. It is evident that overcrowding had become a problem for the Digby school system even at that time as it is recorded in April, 1900, that a Miss Parker who had been teaching in Digby for seven and a half years had tendered her resignation. It was stated the "department of which Miss Parker had had charge,

has been so overcrowded that the strain on the teacher is more than can be borne. With scanty room for sixty pupils, there have been as many as eighty, a number far too large for any one teacher to attend to."

The article on Miss Parker's resignation does not place the blame for overcrowding on the school trustees. It says, "The trustees are not to be blamed for this, it is the fault of the people themselves, who are not willing to incur the expense necessary to keep our schools in such an efficient state as they ought to be kept."

It is interesting to note that in 1897 it is recorded that the total number of schools in Digby County that year was one hundred and six. There were eighty school sections in the county at that time. Of the schools in the county, only two were without teachers in 1897. Sixty-two of the county schools were located in the Digby and forty-two in Clare. Of the schools in Clare it is recorded "twenty-two are purely French sections and the services of French-speaking teachers are absolutely necessary."

The Digby County Academy, which was in its early years one of a system of county academies across the province, was in the Digby and forty-two in Clare. Of the schools in Clare it is recorded "twenty-two are purely French sections and the services of French-speaking teachers are absolutely necessary."

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By 1906 the original academy building became too small to accommodate the number of pupils requiring

its teaching facilities and a four room addition was built at the rear of the building at a cost of \$14,500.

The academy continued to serve the educational needs of the area but, even with the addition, rapidly became inadequate to the need. A consolidation program undertaken in 1944, partly because of a wartime shortage of teachers, made the overcrowding so acute that additional classroom space had to be sought within a short time. At the end of the war a former RCMP barracks building on Main Street was converted to classroom use. Classrooms were later established in the Court House and in church halls in Digby.

On March 2nd, 1948, the first sod for the new Digby Rural High School, the first of its kind to be established in Nova Scotia, was turned by School Board Chairman, Dr. J. R. McElliott. The ceremony drew the new school was laid by Premier Angus L. Macdonald later in the year. In his address at the laying of the corner stone, Premier Macdonald stated that the new school marked the new departure in the field of education, "one that would have a marked effect for good on the whole program of education in Nova Scotia."

The Rural High School, built at a cost of some \$250,000, provided a greatly expanded program of education for the area, including industrial arts, home economics, commercial courses, as well as improved facilities for academic instruction.

Expansion of the educational program in the area

and increasing numbers of pupils soon made the facilities of the rural or regional high school inadequate to meet the need, and an addition was built in 1957 at a cost of some \$225,000. In 1960 a junior high school was constructed at the rear of the regional high school, at a cost of some \$50,000. A seven room primary school had been added to the school complex in Digby in 1954. This school, which was the first school in Nova Scotia to be heated with electricity, was at the time a model for other areas because of economies effected in the public school system of Digby and in 1965 St. Patrick's public school construction. Total cost of this building was \$40,000.

In the meantime St. Patrick's academy had been added to the educational resources of the area. This academy, operated by the Sisters of Charity, opened in 1943 and provided, in addition to its academic program, a commercial college grade with high standards brought it wide and most favorable recognition.

St. Patrick's academy was gradually absorbed into the public school system by the Sisters of Charity and turned over to the Board of School Commissioners for operation and maintenance.

The new composite wing of the Digby Regional High School, which is to be officially opened next week, was built at a cost of some \$900,000 and provides vastly increased facilities, particularly in the field of industrial arts, science laboratories, commercial department and library facilities.

Hot Weather Angling

When the sun comes up, the fish go down, and all the good fishermen go to town. This little bit of dejected is for anglers to remember in the summer time, when the sun's rays strike the earth more directly than at any other season.

When this happens, the shallow water warms up quickly as the sun rises, and most species of fish tend to withdraw into deeper water.

Red Fisher, the fish expert at Mercury, says that the best fishing begins near sun up and lasts about two hours. From then on it's a matter of the deep holes and fighting the heat if you want to continue fishing.

Then, again, during evening hours, many insects hatch and small fish return to the shallows. This draws the interest of larger fish which pursue the insects. The fly rod and spinner are a big asset at this time. This evening fishing will extend late into the night.

Great, Great - Grandfather Was Preacher, Teacher, Farmer, Mason

Mrs. A. B. (Grace Moore) Clarke, of Bear River, has handed The Digby Courier a clipping from a Grand Lodge of Connecticut (Masons) journal containing information on the life of her grandfather, Mr. Roger Viets, who came to Digby as an Anglican clergyman in 1788.

Mr. Viets was born 1733 at Turkey Hills and died in 1811. He graduated from Yale in 1758. Although brought up a Congregationalist he conformed to the Anglican church, his entire family following his example. He went to London and was ordained in 1763. Returning to Simsbury with a small allowance from the SFG, he ministered to the parish in addition to his farming operations and his duties as a teacher. He accumulated a large library of books and (Grand Lodge) records in the state.

The copy says that he was an active loyalist sympathizer, and for aiding the escape of two British officer prisoners of war from nearby Newgate he was fined twenty pounds.

Mrs. Clarke says her version was that he insisted on ministering to the prisoners. The copy also states that he was discovered involved in "traitorous correspondence", spent some time in jail, and when released was practically under house arrest. To avoid the unfriendliness which continued after the war he removed to Nova Scotia in 1786, leaving a small estate in Simsbury. He was made a Mason in Hartford in 1785 but on a visit to Simsbury in 1800 he found that St. Marks Lodge had been organized in his home community, then Grand, and preached a valiant cry to them.

Alexander Viets Griswold (1765-1854) was a nephew of Roger Viets and was under his guidance and instruction. An early marriage prevented his going to Nova Scotia with his uncle and made him scramble for a livelihood. While working as a part time teacher, small farmer and sometime day labourer he began to study law, but was persuaded to re-sume his preparation for the church and was ordained in 1795. He obtained the degree of Doctor of Divinity. There is a stained glass window in Trinity Church in Boston in memory of Bishop Griswold.

Composite Wing Officially Opened At Digby Regional High School



Hon. Gerald Duce, Minister of Education for Nova Scotia, cut the ribbon and addressed the audience on Tuesday evening at the official opening of the new Composite Wing to the Digby Regional High School. Assisting in the ribbon cutting was William Stewart, regional director of education and inauguration, substituting for Hon. Alan MacEwen. Mr. Stewart unveiled the commemorative plaque.

For many years, said Mr. Duce, the attitude of the average thinking parent was to hand over the taxes and turn the youngsters over to the teachers. Today, he remarked, there is more criticism regarding education and teachers, administrators, parents and students are analyzing and considering shortcomings in the educational system and becoming more vocal in their comments. Criticism has not been a bad thing, he said, as long as it is based on valid information and not empty criticism coming easily from empty minds should be encouraged by persons in public life, he said. In education, he said, it is the public servant who has to take a clear and honest look at criticism, assess its merits and, if necessary, accept it and make the changes needed. If the criticism is valid, he said that there is rarely a week when some critical group does not attack his activities and decisions. He felt that a good two-way system of communication can be effective.

Speaking further on his own department, the minister informed the audience that there has been completed recently a massive reorganization of the department which he expects will result in more efficient expenditure of public money and a greater flexibility and continued quality in the educational system in changing social conditions. On the local level, he said, they are encouraging the amalgamation of local school boards. In addition to the advantages of educational development and administrative efficiency that can accrue from amalgamation, they feel that with a more rational system of education administration, it will be possible to encourage active and extensive participation by parents, teachers and students in the decision-making process within the schools. This participation, he argued, can be the alternative to criticism, or perhaps his logical and healthy extension.

Where Education Is A Privilege



When the Unitarian Service Committee's social workers in Mokpo, Korea, announced they were opening a night school they expected about 10 children the first day, instead 172 arrived! It was a sad task to choose the final 120. The teachers are all volunteer students from the Teacher's College. Since the USC's Social Service Centre won't hold them all, the oldest children meet in a nearby church hall. In the beginning they sat on Canadian quilts, but now they crowd onto narrow wooden benches. Some of them work as shoe shine boys during the day, or in local factories. The classes were begun because a USC survey among 350 poor families showed that 91 children between 7 and 16 were not attending school due to poverty. This year the Unitarian Service Committee is appealing for \$1,265,000 in funds and gifts-in-kind. USC headquarters is at 56 Sparks' Street, Ottawa.

Town Council Concerned About Low Rental Housing

(by John Thurber)

Councillor Gordon Ellis raised several questions on the Low Rental Housing Units at Tuesday night's meeting of Town Council. Councillor Ellis wanted to know why men with \$6,000 - \$8,000 yearly incomes were accepted in the new units while people in lower income brackets were being turned down.

He stated that these new units

were to be used for the upgrading of the living standards of low income families in the area, rather than for the use of people who could afford a good apartment elsewhere in town.

Councillor Charles McBride also stated that he had been given the same impression. Police Constable Lionel Fournier addressed the Town Council stating that he knew of people accepted in the new units whose yearly incomes

are far superior to his, yet he was told that he will be paying the maximum rent. Councillor Ellis said that "it looks like selected feathers are being picked from the chicken."

Mayor Glen Smith stated that although the new units are mainly for the use of the less well-to-do families there is no reason why anyone who is earning a large income cannot be accepted if they meet the proper qualifications. The rent that will be paid by these

people, he said, is based on their income, so that the higher a person's income the more rent he will be paying.

Mayor Smith announced that a new rent scale for Low Rental Housing Projects has just been handed down by the Federal Government. All applicants who have been considered for the Housing Units in Digby will have their applications and rents reviewed and possibly adjusted. Mayor Smith stated that the review-

ing and selection of applicants is in the hands of the Digby Housing Authority and is not the jurisdiction of Town Council.

It was suggested that the matter should be investigated by Town Council and that the members of the Housing Authority should appear before the Council to clarify the matter. To this, Mayor Smith replied that special information meetings have been held between the Town Council and the Digby Housing Au-

thority and that some of the Councilors hadn't been present for the meetings. The Councilors countered that they had not been notified of the meetings.

Fred Amers was appointed as Building Inspector for the Town of Digby at the meeting. Mr. Amers' appointment is effective immediately and will be received at the end of the year.

A letter from the Royal Canadian Legion stated that they plan to build the new

Legion Hall on property owned by the Legion, situated on the west side of West Street. The Legion requested the town to open the street to the proposed site and to allow them to connect to water and sewer lines if available in that area. The matter has been tabled for further investigation by the Council.

It was reported that Miss Valerie Wagner has been hired as a secretary at the Town Hall.

The Police Report stated that there were ten court actions resulting in \$139 in fines. The Streets report showed that asphalt had been used to repair various potholes in the town streets and that a collapsed culvert at Victoria and Warwick Streets was replaced.

The Fire report showed that there have been no calls for the month with no losses or damage. The report on the town water supply was both quantity and quality are good.

We, The Polluters

A notice posted recently closed clam beds in the area. Contamination was the reason. One man interested in the tourist trade, a man whose clients enjoyed digging clams and whose customers enjoyed eating the delicacies was much perturbed and rightly so. We cater on one hand to tourists and on the other hand be the hand that feeds us. In other words, he felt it was time we did something about pollution and blamed "people". Stand, he said, at Joggins Bridge and see the sewage coming down from

the harbour.

Which all reminds us that, while much is being written about industry being the main pollution factor, there are other factors in life like high powered cars, detergents, pesticides and man's carelessness which account for pollution on land, in sea and air. Maybe we should not sit so cozy in our little corner and give more thought to the future regarding pollution. Should we really have to continue closing clam beds?

B.U.F. - What Does It Mean?

A recent statement by a person of the Black race was to this effect "I find more discrimination between Blacks and Blacks than I do between Whites and Blacks." This started us thinking about the aims of B.U.F. (Black United Front) and what it means. It means simply what it says, a Black United Front and is summed up nicely in article IV of a definitive sheet sent out in its early stages of organization. This article says it promotes pride in themselves (Blacks), dignity as human beings, a sense of worth and respect as a race of people united as one family, all working together to present a united voice.

"In unity is strength and in family there is found love and peace and trust. Who then can quarrel with an organization of strength grounded in such high and noble traditions as love, peace, trust and brotherhood? Only if such traditions become divorced from the organ-

ization can any fault be found. This is entirely up to those who participate in an organization and we have every confidence in the stability of our Black people in this area that they will hold any connection with B.U.F. in the traditions. It was founded on. There is nothing wrong with a united front for a good purpose.

B.U.F., as we stated in this newspaper before, has other high motives, programs, and aims, such as Afro-History and Culture, promoting of business and enterprises, drama, recreation, conferences, rallies, education, housing and employment. All are noble ambitions, none of which can be achieved without those other ingredients found in article IV, viz. pride in themselves, dignity as human beings, a sense of worth and respect.

This is what B.U.F. means. Could anything be more noble in motive and ambition.

Nine Cats Less \$46

In seven years one resident of Smith's Cove has had nine cats, all strays, on which she spent \$46 of her own money. A recent cat, a stray, cost her \$16 in one day for veterinary services.

Our informant called Smith's Cove a dumping ground for unwanted cats,

the latest of which she was witness being one hurled through the window and landing in a passing truck. It was up to her informant to find a suitable home for the stray feline and so did. Our informant cited a number of instances when cats

have been abandoned in the neighbourhood and we recall writing some time ago about similar instances in Deep Brook. We can only guess that Smith's Cove and Deep Brook are not alone.

As I leafed through the paper over my second cup of coffee, on the morning of August 22, my eye fell on the name PLANTAGANET in the death notice. It was an odd name, but since there are people around named Tudor and Windsor, to say nothing of Shakespeare, there seemed no reason why there should not be Plantagenets. I read the notice. It said:

"PLANTAGANET, Richard - Died this day, August 22, 1485, Richard III, lawful king of England, Pelegrin by Lords and Commons to ascend the throne June 1483, and crowned by general consent, July 6, 1483. Defeated in battle against traitors and rebels. His name has been defamed by unprovoked accusations of premeditated and vicious enemies. Loyalty me Lie."

King Richard III has come down through the history books as a wicked hunchback with a withered arm. He is supposed to have usurped the throne on his brother's death by claiming that Edward's marriage was illegal, his children illegitimate. In order to secure his position he had his two little nephews murdered. Most of us have seen Sir Laurence Olivier's masterfully villainous portrayal of him in Shakespeare's RICHARD III.

On the day of Richard's death, these words were written into the records of the town year book. "This day was our good King Richard pitifully slain and murdered to the great heaviness of this city." And, four hundred and eighty-five years later, somebody cared enough for "our good King Richard" to pay for an ad in the paper on the anniversary of his death.

Richard III reigned only two years. He died in the Battle of Bosworth field, the battle which put Henry VII the first of the Tudors on the throne. Shortly after, Henry married Richard's niece (the sister of the murdered prince), uniting the houses of Lancaster and York, and ending the Wars of the Roses.

The history of Richard III on which all the school book accounts have been based was written by Sir Thomas More, who later died a martyr for the Catholic faith. Said Sir Thomas, may have been. An accurate chronicler of history he was probably not. Sir Thomas was born in 1468. He was seven years old when King Richard died. He secretly makes him an eyewitness to Richard's reign. More got his information from a history written by John Morton, Archbishop of Canterbury under Henry VII. Morton had made a career of shifting his loyalties with the shifting fortunes of the Lancasters and Yorks.

It is most probable that for these past four hundred and eighty-five years, we have been reading the "official" history of Richard III created by Henry's propagandists. Documents and accounts written when Richard was alive lead to quite different conclusions, some of which are:

Richard was not hunchbacked, nor had he a withered arm.

On Edward's death, he was made protector of the young heir to the throne. Richard himself arranged for the child to be crowned on June 22, and even had his coronation clothes ordered.

On June 8, the Bishop of Bath disclosed that Edward IV had been married to one lady Eleanor Butler, whom he seems to have neglected to divorce before his marriage to Elizabeth Woodville. It was quite true that Edward's marriage to Elizabeth was illegal, and his children illegitimate.

There is no hint of the boy's disappearance during Richard's lifetime. The recorded activities, and letters written by the boy's mother are not those of a woman whose sons have mysteriously disappeared. Elizabeth seems to have been well-disposed toward her brother-in-law throughout his lifetime. In any case, there was little proof in Richard having the boys killed. Richard had several nieces and nephews, all of whom had a claim to the throne. It seems that the princes outlived their uncle, and disappeared during Henry's reign.

Several historians through the centuries have tried to clear Richard's name, but their writing has had little impact on the history texts, which prefer the story of a treacherous murdering hunchback to that of a king who ruled briefly, but well.

There is a fascinating detective story about the life of Richard III. It is called THE DAUGHTER OF TIME, by Josephine Tyle, published by Penguin Books.

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Nova Scotia Has Good Business Men

"Nova Scotia businessmen are just as good as you'll find anywhere in Canada," says Wallace Jamieson, "but they should start thinking bigger."

Jamieson is a marketing expert on one of the three management engineering teams set up by the Nova Scotia government in a unique program to help manufacturers boost efficiency and speed up industrial growth.

He believes Nova Scotia manufacturers should make more products for distribution in the national and export markets, though they need more market information to do so.

The reason more Nova Scotia manufacturers haven't penetrated the national market, Jamieson says, goes back to their beginnings. Many small businesses here were devoted to serve local markets only, and find they can survive at a modest level in this region, outside the reach of Montreal manufacturers.

A. C. Burns, another member of the same management engineering team at a specialist in finance and administration, says Nova Scotia businessmen suffer from what he calls the "Upper Canada syndrome."

"They look upon industrial Ontario with far too much reverence," Burns says. "No doubt Nova Scotia businessmen have their own unique problems, but we've found some excellent managers here."

Burns and Jamieson, who are on loan to the Management Engineering Service Program from Montreal consulting firm of P. S. Ross and Partners, say the team approach works well in the reception given them by Nova Scotia manufacturers—so far is excellent.

"Most of the executives we've talked with," Burns said, "already have a fair idea of what they should be doing, but need advice to get into action."

He said Nova Scotia businessmen have a lot of excellent ideas, and are now using the consultants as catalysts in putting some of these ideas into effect.

Financial Responsibility Is The Law

Driving a motor vehicle on Nova Scotia highways without evidence of financial responsibility will become an offence under the Nova Scotia Motor Vehicle Act on November 1, and violators will be liable to a range of penalties including fines ranging from \$50 to \$200, and, or jail sentences ranging from 7 to 90 days, or both.

The new law will affect only those drivers not currently insured with the appropriate amounts of public liability and property damage insurance, or those who fail to maintain the required insurance coverage. The move is designed to fur-

ther accentuate to Nova Scotia motorists that unless they are prepared and able to display evidence of financial responsibility, they must not operate a motor vehicle on the province's highway system.

The Motor Vehicle Act provides for a financial responsibility program for motorists establish, three ways in which the average vehicle operator can show financial responsibility. The most common and accepted evidence of which is the familiar public liability and property damage insurance card issued by an insurance company to its client.

Other accepted proofs are in the form of a surety bond acceptable to the Superintendent of Insurance in Nova Scotia, or a certificate from the Minister of Finance and Economic Development verifying that cash or acceptable securities to the minimum legal limit of \$25,000, has been posted with him.

The new legal requirement for evidence of financial responsibility does not change other sections of the Act which provide for suspension of driving privileges and vehicle registration of motorists involved in an accident and unable to show evidence of financial responsibility.

The new amendment, however, leaves it wide open to police agencies to require drivers to show evidence of financial responsibility, along with a driving license — on demand. Failure to produce the documents can result in charges being laid.

Anyone charged and convicted of this offence, in addition to the penalties outlined above, will be subject to suspension of both driver's license and vehicle registration and will be reinstated until proof of financial responsibility can be shown.

Dear Editor:

At the monthly meeting of the Digby Housing Authority held on September 14th, at the Town Hall, it was agreed that a letter be written to the local press clarifying statements made at the council meeting of September 8th, regarding Senior Citizen Housing and Public Housing.

Councillor Gordon Ellis at the monthly meeting of the Digby Town Council raised several questions

on "Low-Rent Housing". First I would like to say the expression Low-Rent Housing is in error. These homes are Senior Citizen Homes and Public Housing (subsidized rental homes). The homes are designed to release more homes to the public and also to upgrade living standards.

The rents are designed to allow the Authority to "select feathers from the chicken", if Councillor Ellis will arrange to have the Town Council to subsidize these rents with the ratepayers' taxes over and above the subsidy the Federal and Provincial Government

is now giving. We would be very pleased to pluck more of the unfortunate feathers from the chicken.

The members of the authority appreciate the Council's concern but we feel he should have been at one of the three meetings the Authority had with representatives of the Town Council and the Mayor before expressing his views.

The authority would like to say to Police Constable Lionel Porrier that his concern with regards to the rent was not warranted and would like to point out to Constable Porrier upon receipt of a Lease there will be attached a copy of the scale of rent to tenant's

income. Tenants please check your own rents.

The only paid personnel of the Digby Housing Authority will be the Manager. The authority has been composed of public spirited citizens of the community who are willing to give freely of their time and talents for the administering of the Digby Senior Citizens Home and Public Housing.

We as an Authority were concerned with the questions raised by these gentlemen but not impressed as we are instructed by the Nova Scotia Housing Commission.

FERRY BOAT CONTRACT TO METEGHAN FIRM

A \$375,200 contract for construction of a 121 foot wooden-hulled ferry boat has been awarded to A. F. Meteghan and Sons Ltd. of Meteghan River, Digby Co., the Nova Scotia Highways Department announced today.

Highways Minister Hon. J. W. Akerley said the new ferry will replace the thirty year old Joseph Howe, presently used on the Bras d'Or crossing and is scheduled for completion by next June in time for the 1971 tourist season.

The Thurlow shipyard is one of the few wooden ship-building yards which still exist in Nova Scotia. The firm was the lowest of three bidders on the highway ferry project.

The new wooden hulled, double-ended, diesel powered ferry will feature a remote control wheelhouse from which the ferry's entire operation will be conducted.

Heavy vehicular traffic utilizes the lake ferry crossing system which has been operated by the Highways Department at the Barra Strait crossing point for many years.

Traffic is primarily local until the summer season when tourists flock to the site for the ten minute boat ride and its access to the Sydney and Cabot Trail areas.

The Highways Department also operates ferry service at Little Narrows and English town in the Cape Breton area. The Little Narrows crossing is a cable ferry.

The opposition leader assured the audience that Nova Scotia has at the present time many assets for industrial development which did not exist in the past. Industry wants to come here because of the advantages he offered, he said, and geographically, we are the best equipped and closest to a European country has in North America.

Mr. Regan said there are job opportunities to be developed and expanded in Nova Scotia to provide that decent standard of living while we share a unique and satisfying way of life that can be the envy of Canadians living elsewhere. One of the obstacles to this he said is the unsettled situation in labour-management relations.

Independent observers are already expressing the opinion that Nova Scotia is becoming known for its labour-management discord, he said. That kind of reputation is not one which can be expected to encourage industry wishing to locate here; industry that means jobs and payrolls for more and more Nova Scotians, the speaker declared.

That climate of antagonism between labour and management can only hurt Nova Scotians where it hurts most—in the payroll and the pocketbook. That climate of antagonism seriously affects the existing economy, and at the same time stunts the growth of the future economy.

Nova Scotia, now and in the future, cannot afford it if we are to achieve that greater measure of prosperity for our

people, that decent standard of living, that unique and satisfying way of life.

He said he fully recognized the right of Labour Unions to run and control their own affairs, to seek the best possible deal for their members but he recognizes as well the right of management to protect its own interests.

All those people not directly involved got hurt by a bitter and prolonged labour dispute. We must recognize the rights of the old age pensioner, he said, the clerk in the corner store, the doctor, the lawyer, the farmer, the small businessman and all those other people whose lives and well-being are important. They are materially affected when the climate of labour-management relations becomes so bad that the economic progress of an entire province suffers a major setback, and they deserve consideration as well as those directly involved, he ventured.

Government must change its laws and create new machinery to meet today's problems with today's solutions. Government must be prepared always to move to protect the public interest in a just and equitable manner. Mr. Regan charged, it must provide leadership in getting management and labour to work together in an orderly manner that will prevent disputes from developing into crises.

More Support For Shelburne Road

The news handed on to The Digby Courier by Mayor Glen Smith that the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities had backed up a resolution to have the Digby-Shelburne road re-opened and completed, was truly encouraging. Up to this time Digby Board of Trade, Digby Town and Municipality, along with Shelburne, seemed to be the chief fighters for this cause. True, the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade supported the move to some extent but it was not a subject for the forefront.

According to the Mayor Smith, the endorsement of the resolution did not get immediate response at the conference. Indeed, the matter had to be brought to the floor the second time. This is an indication that all the benefits of the road had not been seen and no indication that the wardens and councillors usually waver in their decisions. Having

had the fact pointed out that a number of municipalities on the 40 mile stretch were affected by the resolution and that a south shore for products between the South Shore and the new Saint John-Digby ferry could be made possible by the road, the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities reversed their decision and gave full support to the cause.

This backing by the municipalities in Nova Scotia will add much weight to the Digby and Shelburne efforts when a resolution or brief is presented to the Nova Scotia Cabinet for consideration. It will be up to Digby and Shelburne, however, to take initiative in plugging for the Digby-Shelburne Road. Don't fall down on the job. It should be a project of interest to every man and woman in the two towns and counties and could well be made a special project for the Board of Trade.

Your Home And School

Apart from October's particular meeting on amalgamation, the Home and School is the link between parent, teacher and child. Few parents are so non-concerned about the child's welfare that they cannot spare a couple of hours each month to keep abreast of information concerning the child's development. No state is so poor it cannot be remedied if the fact is known and no state of the child is so perfect that it cannot be improved upon if desired. For those who do not have their own children to be concerned about there is plenty to be done in the name of community spirit. There is a place in Home and School for everybody. The day is gone when H. S. needs to buy a water cooler or new blackboard for the school, but the project convenor, Mrs. Macleod (Anna Ruth) Rogers had a fair list of projects in mind when the editor enquired the first part of the week.

Plan now for attending the October meeting to "hear all about it" and to offer your services for a successful 1970-71 school year. Remember, a Home and School organization cannot exist without three ingredients — the parent, the teacher, the child. Only one and you have no Home and School. The teacher is there, the child is included, where is the parent? At the Home and School making it function. We hope we can say just that on the 20th of October.

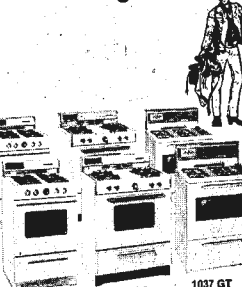

Chilled ingredients are important for success in pastry making. A cold solid fat and ice water are essential. Melted fat gives a mealy texture; soft fat gives a greasy product.

Work quickly and gently. Cut in fat until particles are $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ inch in diameter. Sprinkle water, a few drops at a time, over the flour mixture, while tossing quickly with a fork. As lumps form, push to one side and sprinkle more water over a dry portion. When mixture will stick together with gentle pressure and may be flattened somewhat without the edges breaking, enough water has been added.

Turn dough onto a piece of waxed paper. With hands under the paper, press the dough together lightly to form a ball. Chill before rolling. Using a pastry cloth and roller, roll the dough to the desired thickness. Requires the use of little additional flour. Rolling the dough between two sheets of highly floured waxed paper or foil also avoids adding unwanted flour.

Creaking and crumbling during rolling is caused by too little water, too much fat or fat cut in too finely. Tough pastry is caused by too little fat, too much water, overmixing or too much flour mixed in when rolling out.

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FRESH CRANBERRY NUT BREAD

1 cup fresh cranberries
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 1/2 cups sifted flour
3/4 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1 cup milk
3 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
1 cup chopped walnuts

Chop cranberries; mix with 1/4 cup sugar. Sift together remaining sugar, flour, baking powder and salt into medium bowl. Beat egg slightly; mix with milk and butter or margarine. Add to dry ingredients. Mix just enough to blend ingredients. Gently stir in cranberries and walnuts. Turn into greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Bake in 350° F oven 1 hour. Remove from pan. Cool on wire rack. Cool thoroughly before slicing. Makes 1 loaf. (United Fresh Fruit & Vegetable Association)

the industry to include different species and the exploration of new grounds for fishing. An influx of tourists came with the establishment of the new car ferry, Prince of Fundy. This is a ferry service made possible by the co-operation and the involvement of the government of Nova Scotia, said Mr. Snow. What we have seen in the tourist industry this year in our end of the province shows us its great potential and number is it more promising than here in Clare. With your unexcelled local craftsmanship, your interesting shoreline, beautiful beaches, and your very distinct culture, you can make the growth in reflected in the housing development with the province where in spite of the great achievements of both government and industry, we still have housing needs in many areas. This is a healthy sign of growth and an indication that Nova Scotia is moving ahead. During the past

three years, under Premier Smith's government, the Co-operative Housing Program which incidentally is one praised by the Federal Minister responsible for housing. This programme has produced as many units of co-operative self-help type of house as were produced in the other 29 years since the programme was started by the Nova Scotia Housing Commission in 1939," said Mr. Snow.

These years have been good years for most Nova Scotians, years of growth; years when the people realized their potential but they have also been years during which we have been relieved of some of the fears which haunted us all and particularly those of the older age group, said Mr. Snow. Gone now is the fear that a prolonged illness or serious operation would be borne for a lifetime. The N. S. Hospital plan and more recently the Medical Services Insurance Plan, both introduced in N. S. by the Hon. R. A. Donohoe, minister of health, have removed from us that fear, that dread, which stood over us at all times.

The future for us looks bright and we can move ahead in the 1970's. We are going to move ahead, more roads under the capable leadership of Premier G. F. Smith. During the next few days he will be presenting the people of N. S. with a programme carefully planned to continue the development and growth of our province.

Our development depends upon our human resources, our work force and its involvement and it depends as well upon our natural resources. In this part of N. S. and particularly in Clare, we look both to our fisheries and to our forestry resources. The forest industry in N. S. has a great future and it is the aim of the government of N. S. that you people of Clare have every chance to share in it. Prior to the 1960's the forest industry used only high grade trees and the remainder, except for firewood, was left in the forests to be wasted, said Mr. Snow.

Special efforts have been made to establish new markets to provide a use for these lower grade softwoods and hardwoods. This has been achieved in some areas within the province. The future looks bright for the forest in N. S.

Further development is expected for Western N. S. It is hoped that within a few months, agreements will be reached which will provide a market in this area for those species of wood and grades of wood, which now are left in the forest to decay. The forests of N. S. have great potential and a great future. With good management, full utilization, and proper planning, with a step up in our planning programme and with increased fire protection, the \$100,000,000 industry can be developed to generate twice that amount to the economy of our province, stated Mr. Snow in terminating.

Louis R. Comeau, federal member for South-Western Nova constituency, said to Paul Comeau the newly appointed P. C. candidate for Clare, "you can see the support you have and congratulations for accepting the challenge. It is not easy but I know that you can handle the job." He said that Paul was a man of the people. "I have nothing against your opponent but I do question his ability to represent us. Last week at the Liberal nomination meeting, it was mentioned that roads had been promised and nothing done. I say to you that this is the members job to see that it gets done," said Louis R. Comeau.

It is not good enough to make one speech on the road situation, in three years. You have to keep reminding the government and you have to convince them that things are to be done.

The Progressive Conservative party is the party of the people. The Federal Liberals are involved in creating unemployment, while the Conservatives in N. S. find jobs.
