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New Year's Message From Joe Casey, M.L.A.

At this time of the year it is customary to extend good wishes for the future to one's friends, neighbours and acquaintances; to review the accomplishments of the past year and to take a look at possible future happinings.

To everyone in my constituency I do most certainly extend every good wish for a happy, healthy and prosperous new year. My hope is that the future will hold a full measure of joy and all that is good.

And now for a review of the happenings of the past year, particularly those that affect this constituency, in which I have been privileged to play a part.

First of all, there is the new Bear River Bridge, a three and a half million dollar link in Highway 101, officially opened last summer. The new bridge in the Village of Weymouth, costing some half a million dollars, was opened to traffic in December. Early in the year work of resurfacing the new Racquette Bridge at the north end of Digby was completed.

Referring to bridges, it is my understanding tenders will shortly be called for the new Weymouth by pass. This bridge is expected to cost in the vicinity of two million dollars.

During the past year some 13 miles of secondary roads were paved in the constituency. In addition about five miles of highway were subgraded for paving. It is also to be noted that 30 per cent more gravelling of secondary roads in the constituency was carried out than in the previous year.

In December an announcement was made by the highways minister of a \$100,000 program to provide an improved junction on 101 at the west end of the Bear River Bridge to Bear River and Smith's Cove, as well as improvements to the Lansdowne-Joggin Bridge junction of the same highway.

On Digby Neck inprovements have been made to the ferry ramps on both sides of Petite Passage. These include lighting, dredging as well as repairs to the ramps. Improvements were also carried out at Grand Passage with more work to be done there.

In connection with the two passages, the new one half million dollar ferry for Petite Passage is expected to be in service early in the new year. The new ferry coming into service will mean that the present converted ferry at Petite will be transferred to the run between Freeport and Westport where 24 hour service will also be instituted.

The provincial government co-operated on a cost sharing basis with federal authorities on the restoration of haul-ups in Gulliver's Cove, Culloden,

Sandy Cove West and Long Beach. I was also involved in discussions with federal authorities with respect to repairs, renovations and extensions of a number of breakwaters, wharves and other installations in the fishing ports of the constituency.

During the past year it was a wonderful experience to take part in the official opening of the new Children's Home in Digby, which is being operated by the provincial Department of Social Services.

The building of Tide View Terrace last year was an example of the value in the provision of human services of co-operation between different levels of government. In addition to its construction support, the provincial government will continue to contribute to the operation costs through patient assistance.

During the past year the



construction of 30 more units of senior citizens' housing in Digby neared completion. Financed through joint cooperation between three levels of government, this new housing will also help to meet the needs of the elderly within our midst. I am pleased that additional housing of this nature is being planned for the coming

year.

In tourism, the work of upgrading the facilities of the Digby Pines continued over the past year and further work will be undertaken in the year ahead. Accomodation was also increased in the local area through the construction of the Admiral Digby Inn and the expansion of the Mountain Gap Inn.

While this review has of necessity been brief and while it may not totally cover all of the items of progress that have occurred in the area over the past year, I do hope it will serve to give at least some idea of some of the progress that is taking place.

It was pointed out a number, of residents might be able to attend the social sessions of the Horizons Club if arrangements could be made. In addition club members could visit the home and provide social contacts for those residents unable to go beyond the home. Mrs. Alice Westcott was elected visiting convener.

An enjoyable birthday party was held following the meeting. During the refreshment period five persons whose birthdays occur in December were hónoured'.

LET IT BEGIN THIS YEAR

HOW MANY METRES IN A FATHOM?

The fisherman's long time standard unit of measure, the fathom, will probably become a thing of the past by the time 1980 comes around. That is the target date for Canada's conversion of weights and measures to the metric system.

The fathom, along with pounds and inches and bushels will fall from use and will be replaced by S.I. units (for Systeme International d'Unites) which is the modern term for metric units. Along with most of the rest of the world. Canada will be using the metre. centimetre, kilogram, tonne (metric ton), the litre and the celsius degree (centigrade).

Conversion to metric is supposed to be voluntary but judging from the various sectors of the economy and of the government which are planning to convert, the change will be irresistible.

Planning committees are now at work throughout the country trying to identify the changes which will have to be made and the groups which will be affected and involved. The task is a huge one because it will require the coordination of primary producers, processors, foreign suppliers, equipment and supplies manufacturers, the education system and the legislatures at every level of government.

- It was ever thus. Credit purchasing in 1974, frowned upon by some and acclaimed progress by others, is not new. Nearly 150 years ago, in the Farmer's Almanack of 1825, there is a bit of advice to farmers which can stand in good stead for all of us today. Quote "Many of us are in debt, which forethought and economy might have prevented. To be in debt, is to be in slavery - the slavery of the mind. The times are hard and we ought to be so much the more close in our calculations. I know a farmer who runs in debt to the merchants for all the West India and dry goods he wants to make use of through the winter, spring and summer, and he pledges his corn, potatoes and other produce in the fall; fall comes the merchant will take the produce only at the lowest price; the consequence is the poor farmer's summer work all goes, to use a homely phrase, "to pay for a dead horse" and the farmer must run into debt for the next year and continues in debt and torment each year. Now the wants of life are but few; had the farmer gone without many of the articles he had bought on credit, and which he could have gone without, the toil of the season he would have performed with a light heart, with a reasonable prospect that another year he might enjoy more of the good things of this life without being indebted for them".

-This should make some Digby Board of Trade members happy. According to the Fisheries Council of Canada Bulletin there is some progress for margarine. The archaic margarine laws in Canada are slowly dropping away. After 1948, when margarine became legal in Canada, the various Provinces enacted restrictive legislation aimed at protecting the dairy industry's butter production. Now that Canada is importing butter - 25 million pounds in the first 6 months of 1973 - the restrictions are gradually being removed. The federal government dropped the 12 percent sales tax in 1971, Alberta and Saskatchewan have dropped their colour restrictions, Quebec has also but has restrictions on permitted wrapping, British Columbia has dropped the requirement that margarine be labelled "a Substitute for butter", Nova Scotia intends to remove colour restrictions in 1974 and Ontario is considering allowing margarine to be coloured yellow instead of orange or white. This will leave Manitoba and P.E.I. as the only holdouts with colour restrictions.

-Another thing which should please the Digby Board of Trade president is The Canadian Chamber of Commerce newsletter The Link has 10 pages this last month, seven of which were in English.

TEACHERS DISAPPOINTED IN NON-PAYMENT

Teachers at Digby Regional High School plan to ask for the resignation of the school board secretary at the next board meeting, it was learned following a special meeting Friday of Digby local, Nova Scotia Teachers Union. The union, which represents the school's 55-member teaching staff is also considering action against the board for violation of contract.

Reason given for the action is the secretary's alleged failure to comply with school board directions in the method of paying teacher's salaries.

Teachers claim this failure to follow directions has placed the

board in violation of its contract with the teaching staff.

They also claim the secretary has failed to honor a board—union agreement regarding adjustment of the method of payment.

It is understood the contract states "the amount of each cheque issued any one month shall be 1-12 of the total applicable annual salary less authorized deductions."

At present teachers are being paid according to a formula which provided 76-195 times salary from August to December, approximately 1-13 of the annual salary.

The matter was brought to the

board's attention last fall and at that time, the board was unaware of the teachers claim that their contract called for a change in method of payment.

In November, the board stated it would comply with requirements. A later meeting of the board with the NSTU provincial executive established the balance owing the teachers from August to December wiuld be paid in one cheque on, or before Jan. 2, 1974.

The teachers stated at their meeting Friday, that this had not been done and they are considering action against the board.

Presents \$3000 Cheque

Joseph Casev. M.L.A. for Digby attended the first meeting of the year for Digby Town Council on Monday evening and presented Mayor Glen Smith with a \$3000 cheque from the government of Nova Scotia to help take care of bills incurred at the local information centre last summer. The Digby Board of Trade and Town Project operated in the former Provincial Tourist Bureau building down town. A letter of congratulations and appreciation for the success of the venture was received by the Town Council from Ernest Ryan, president of the Digby Board of Trade.

In his remarks to the Council, Mr. Casey informed that he was arranging a meeting in Halifax for Thursday, January 10 with the N.S. Minister of Finance and the Minister of Education with regard to a \$45,000 grant expected by the town and other matters. Named to meet in Halifax with Mr. Casey on Thursday were Glen Pitman, town clerk; Mayor Willard Kinney: ex-mayor Glen Smith and Councillors Joseph Hattie and Patrick Comeau. A report will be made at a special meeting of Council on January 11 at 7 p.m.

Mr. Pitman announced that the L.I.P. grant of \$13,200 had been approved by the government to improve and clean the Digby watershed area and streets.

Bills to the amount of \$42,461 for the month of December were approved of which \$29,971 were incurred by the three phase sewer project and \$12,490 current expenses.

The council decided to put the \$30,700 equalization grant into a reserve fund. This grant amounting to \$13 per capita came from the federal government through the provincial government to be administered by town and municipal bodies.

Council on Monday night decided to make available to the Digby Kinsmen Club by lease, the building on the Cannon Bank in Digby. It was stipulated that the building also be made available to the Girl Guides, Brownies and Scouts if they desired it and the Kinsmen would be required to improve and maintain the building. Councillors Philip Robertson and Joseph Hattie were named to meet with the Kinsmen on the matter.

Hope For Band

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

In Audio-Visual Education his record is outstanding. For eight years he was a member of the **CEA-CBC Advisory Council and** for nine years a member of the CEA-NFB Advisory Committee. He was Canada's representative and chaired a Seminar at the UNESCO International Meeting on TV Teaching in Oslo, Norway in 1962, and was Canada's representative and a participant at the International Symposium on Screen

Education in Vienna in 1966. Mr. Edwards, himself, has written many outstanding articles which have been published in various magazines. He has also been widely quoted and recognized for his achievements.

In an article on Mr. Edwards in The London Free Press, February 7, 1968, Jack Hutton says: "Few Canadians have heard his name. But almost the entire country has become

affected by a campaign that began when Cliff Edwards started worrying about TV and films several years ago. And the result is an entirely new subject in a growing number of involved schools - screen education."

In June of 1972 Mr. Edwards' article "What Screen **Education is All About: Essays** in Pictures and Sounds" was printed by the N.S. Teachers' Union magazine The Teacher. This feature story won for The Teacher one of the coveted annual awards from the **Educational Press Association** of America.

Nova Scotia's Journal of Education, Spring, 1973, ran as their lead article "More Than One Road" by Mr. Edwards. This, in turn, was picked up and reprinted in the Chronicle-Herald on March 8th for their Education Week observance. Mr. Edward's definition of a good school from that article bears reprinting here:

"First, the good school is a happy school. It is a place to which children are glad to go, a place where teachers accept children as they are, where there is understanding and respect, and where laughter and work go hand in hand.

Second, the good school is one in which children learn through discovery, a school where there is abundant provision for children to explore, to seek truth, to assess, to evaluate, and to reach conclusions.

Thirdly all activity in the good school, both the structured and the unstructured, in the eyes of the child is meaningful and purposeful. For education to be effective, learning experiences must have meaning to the child at the time he is involved - the subject matter he reads, the topics he discusses, the activities in which he participates, and the problems to which he seeks answers. True education is functional. Children learn what they live and live what they learn.'

Ratepayers Concerned By Increase

Town To Formulate Mobile Home By-Law

Following the reading of a letter of protest from Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Hutchins regarding the placing of a mobile home on First Avenue, Digby Town Council decided to meet with the town solicitor, in committee of the whole, on January 22 at 7:30 p.m. in respect to formulating a by-law in regard to mobile homes. The action was taken at a special meeting of Town Council on Tuesday evening presided over by His Worship, Mayor Willard Kinney. Mr. and Mrs. Hutchins considered moving out of town, according to their letter, rather than look out from their home to the mobile home. Council decided to write to Mr. and Mrs. Hutchins, acknowledging their letter and advise them of the action taken.

Approval of \$18,000 capital expenditure for the Digby Regional High School was tabled until the teachers or parties concerned can appear before Council to defend the expenditure. Of the \$18,000 equipment requested, the town's share of cost would be about \$3600. Sharing in the cost would be the municipality and the provincial government.

Council granted permission to Fraser and Bell Contractors for building a 40 x25 ft house on First Avenue and St. Mary's St. The permit was given with stipulation of adhering to the National Building Code and in view of existing conditions. A request came from Cornwallis Cafe to tear down and rebuild part of their building, from Levy's Drug Store to build an enjoining building on the former Shortliffe property and from Wilson's Hardware Ltd. for renovations and additions to the Digby Auto Supplies building. All three requests were tabled

A letter was read from the Board of Public Utilities requesting a reply to a report by W.L. Child (auditor) which stated that as of October 31, 1973 Digby town was indebted to the Digby County Power Board for \$47,847.85 and the municipality of Digby was indebted to the amount of \$103,768.67, the indebtedness being mostly for furnishing and installing lines

awaiting specific plans.

and equipment. The report had been read at the regular council meeting January 7. Council by motion decided to check out to see what the town does now owe the D.C.P.B. and pay it and also make arrangements to include this in the budget for capital expenditure. The superintendant of the D.C.P.B. will be asked to submit periodically figures for the operation of the Digby utility so this can be placed in the budget.

A net credit of \$1219.72 from a change order in Phase II of the sewer system project was tabled for approval after the W.N. Horner Company sends a complete account of credit from the lift station. These credits are deducted from the contract price and are savings obtained by change in work orders.

Town Clerk, Glen Pitman, presented a bill of \$4200 and working plans for converting the old Information Bureau into a town hall as received from Keith Graham. By motion of Councillor Gordon Ellis, seconded by Councillor Patrick Comeau the plans were to be returned to Mr. Graham accompanied by a letter copies requesting correspondence which authorized the architect to do the job. The Town did not seem to have a record of any authorization for such a proposal.

In reply to a letter from the provincial department of highways, the town clerk was authorized to advise the department that the town would look after the maintenance of the South side of the Racquette Bridge and the department should look after the paving and the North side.

Plans were made to have council members attend the provincial cabinet meeting to be held in Middleton on January 31 as arranged by the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade. Topics for discussion were to be submitted by January 22. One topic which the Digby councillors felt should be discussed was industry for Digby. They mentioned the possiblity of a sardine factory to

district No 8, who presided.

Mr. Casey was most concerned with the plight of spinsters and widows regarding tax exemptions. The government, he said, had increased pensions to compensate for the high cost of living but this aggravated the exemption situation where the spinster or widow's income exceeds the \$1800 municipal exemption for

tax purposes. According to present provincial statutes the maximum exemption is \$2500 but the Digby municipal

exemption had been set at \$1800.

Mr. Casey is looking forward to the next sitting of the legislature to bring up the matter and Mr. Winchester will draw attention of the Digby Municipal Council to the si tuation.

Approximately seventy-five ratepayers from District No. 8 turned out on Saturday afternoon to a meeting called to discuss assessment, particularly as it effected District No. 8. The meeting was held in the Smith's Cove Fire Hall and Community Centre.

While the assessment in Digby Municipality increased from \$21,000,000 in 1973 to \$27,000,000 in 1974, the district number eight, Smith's Cove and Conway, was hardest hit, according to the ratepayers with their assessment jumping from \$2,862,000 in 1973 to \$4,499,000 (before appeals) in 1974.

Of chief concern, however, was the fact that spinsters and widows on pension would also find it more difficult to meet tax requirements since the increase in old age pensions would bring their income above the \$1800 mark which was the municipal figure for tax exemption.

Before answering questions posed by the audience Mr. Dondale explained his role and the origin of the Digby-Annapolis Regional Assessment Board which decides the assessments. Prior to the Board assessors were hired in each town and village by the municipality and town who had little or no training in that specific field and property assessments went through little

change. There are five trained assessors on the staff today and the accounts have increased from 16,000 to over 27,000.

In assessing property, Mr. Dondale informed the audience increase in market valuation, replacement costs, land value, its use, and a number of other factors are considered.

It was brought to the attention of ratepayers that they had the privilege of appealing their assessments on January 21. Discussion arose as to appealing as a group or individually. The latter method was considered satisfactory and indications were that the majority of the seventy-five persons would appeal. Speaking of the dire straits of some older people on fixed incomes, one participant in the discussion drew attention to what he felt was inconsistent to put a man out of his home because he cannot pay his taxes and turn around and put him in a Home where his whole upkeep must be paid.

Councillor Eric VanTassell of Culloden said he would fight for his community but he would also fight for lower taxes. Something is wrong, he said, we are trying to chase young people out of the community. He argued that if the assessment goes up, the tax rate should come down. It is time, he said, for a levelling off.

Mr. Winchester noted that obligations in the municipality were increasing and money must be raised. Some of the obligations are good and need to be supported but he also felt perturbed, he said, in scrutinizing the financial statement for 1972.

Mr. Winchester announced that three of the ratepayers present had offered to be a liaison between the municipal council and the ratepayers. They are Dr. G.V. Turnbull, Basil Porter and David Irvine. Councillor Winchester also offered to do anything he could for the good of the community and urged the residents to make use of the assessment board for answers to their questions and to the appeal board, necessary, regarding their assessment. Special forms or a simple note are both satisfactory to notify of an appeal he advised.

The fire department at CFB Cornwallis was also complimented on their toy repair program which continued over this year.

Mrs. Daniel Comeau pointed out to the committee the large number of mittens and socks which are provided by volunteer knitters for the Christmas gift boxes. In some case wool is supplied by the committee but in others both material and effort are donated. It was noted well over 100 pairs of mittens as well as a large supply of woolen socks had been received. It was decided to vote a sum not to exceed \$200.00 again this year for wool purchase. Clare Hydro Price Increase

The Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities has approved an increase in the rates of the Electrical Distribution System of the Municipality of the District of Clare.

An increase of .25 cents per month in the existing base charges for all services, and a per block increase of 0.1 cent per kilowatt hour per month for all energy charges relating to

Domestic customers will now he paying a base charge of .75 cents per month for a two wire service and 1.25 cents month for a three wire service. Energy charges are 2.6 cents

per kwh for the first 150 kwh per month and 1.3 cents per kwh for all additional consumption; but in no case, the average price per kwh on the whole bill, including the base charge is to be ess than 1.6 cents in any billing

Comparing with the nearest adjoining utilities these new rates now in effect are quite advantageous.

Editorial

WHAT THE RIGHT HAND DOETH

How frequently good things get fowled up because the left hand knoweth not what the right hand doeth. Ratepayers of Digby municipal district number eight met at Smith's Cove on Saturday afternoon to discuss the recent rise in assessment, the assessment in that particular district having risen from \$2,862,000 in 1973 to \$4,499,000 (latter before appeals) for 1974. Chief concern was towards spinsters and widows and, of course, generally people on fixed income.

The Digby Municipality had an exemption for widows and spinsters up to \$1800 income. This was good and was an ease to the ever present tax burden. It was appreciated. Then comes the increase in cost of living and our government decided to compensate by increasing the old age pension. Again, who is there who would quarrel with a raise in pension? One must give credit where credit is due and express appreciation for gifts and mercies of any kind. The whole difficulty could be summed up into the left hand not knowing what the right hand doeth. By raising the pension, the spinsters and widows were brought into an income bracket above the \$1800 exemption which the municipality allows for this category of taxpayer. That means they are liable for property taxes which makes their raise in pension non-beneficial against the high cost of living.

However, there is a solution. The municipality can raise the exemption. We understand that the maximum can be \$2500 but of course any raise over the \$1800 would have to be passed by the municipal council. There could be a further solution should the maximum not be sufficient. Legislation provincially could authorize a higher maximum, for exemptions in the province. We'll wait to see. At least, some members of the various bodies concerned are now in a position for the left hand to see and know what the right hand doeth. In the meantime the blame cannot be placed federally, provincially or on the municipal

level for the confusion. And, as an added note we admire the ratepayers of district number eight for their orderly and intelligent concern shown at the ratepayer's meeting for matters of vital interest to so many. The meeting was well organized and ably conducted by Councillor L.E.R. Winchester.

On his appointments to committees Councillor Comeau said he felt it essential to know the direction to move and to have a base upon which to start especially on the industrial committee. He felt he needed to know about availability of land and ser-

vices. Industry, he said, has many ramifications.



Snow Removal Grant Raised To \$233,000

The cities and towns of Nova Scotia will receive increased grants from the Department of Highways to aid in snow removal and ice control on streets under maintenance agreement with the Department. This announcement was made by Highways Minister

Leonard L. Pace Q.C. In 1973 the grants totalled approximately \$137,000. This year the total amount to be distributed among the cities and towns of the Province will total

approximately \$233,000. The grants are applicable to streets leading imough cines and towns which are used as connecting provincial routes and are under a maintenance agreement with the Department, Mr. Pace explained.

The amount of the grant has been based on the cost of snow removal and ice control for Provincial Highways in the immediate vicinity of the City



New Book On Early Man In N.S.

By Charles Taylor

A : stone spearpoint, discovered by an amateur archaeologist while out picking blueberries with his wife, was to become the vital clue that led to archaeological "digs" in 1963 and 1964 which were to provide the first definite evidence of man in Nova Scotia.

E.A. Eaton and his wife made the find at Debert. The spearpoint was that of early dawn man, or Palaeo Indian, who inhabited the country about 11,000 years ago.

This is just one fascinating segment of the story contained in a new publication, Early Man in Nova Scotia.

Writter by Mrs. Patricia Hayward, Assistant Curator of Education, Nova Scotia Museum, Halifax, this 36-page booklet is part of the cultural services program of the Nova Department Scotia Education.

With illustrations by George Halverson and Edward Claridge, also members of the Museum staff, Early Man in Nova Scotia graphically describes the life-style of early dawn man in this part of the world - the type of person he was, his habits and customs, how he communicated with others, and even what he ate.

Written from a wellresearched base, the book is an intriguing chronology that moves from prehistoric times, through the Archaic (about 5,000 years ago) and Ceramic (about 2,000 years ago) Stages to the Historic Stage ... when the first of the Europeans to land on these shores observed and recorded, at first-hand, accounts of the people they met.



been the so-called oil crisis. The anticipated oil shortages (which the government talked of for weeks and which prompted the Oil Allocation Bill, presently before the House, back in the Senate. It certainly looks as it will be passed tomorrow) has turned to be a crisis all right but not a crisis in supply. The prices are the crisis.

Oil supplies at well head prices last summer when the range of the dollar 90 per barrel (35 Imperial Gallons) that price has skyrocketed as you have already read in the local newspapers; in some instances the prices are as high as 16 or 17 dollars per barrel, depending on what kind of supply mix we have coming into eastern Canada. That obiviously means very substantial increases in the price of petroleum products simply to pay that well head price. Obviously 17.50 per barrel means 50 cents a gallon for crude oil, add to that the cost of transporting from its point of origin to Halifax for example, plus refining costs, plus distributuion costs and you come out with pretty expensive oil. Much has been said of gouging by oil companies, I'm hoping to satisfy myself/with some figures on exactly what the breakdown of costs is which the various oil refiners have to pay however, on the basis of the above figures it doesn't look as if there's a whole lot of gouging

own local consitituency there has not been much of local interest happening heré. For some months now the matter of the Yarmouth Wharf project has been giving me concern and I've been under pretty continuous pressure from interested parties to explain why the project has not already proceeded. In the course of my inquiries on that project have established some pretty good contacts within the Departments concerned but the information that I've been able to obtain was so inconclusive that I had the feeling that I was just getting the run-around. Yesterday however, I talked to the Minister about the project and the amount of information that he seemed to have available to him was even less than the information I had been able to get Designing and engineering work has been completed on the project and from an engineering point of view, it is ready for tender calls. Unfortunately some way along the line somebody forgot to acquire the property necessary to provide the space for the wharf so with everybody keyed up and ready to go there have been prolonged negotiations and obviously misunderstandings about the status of the property transaction.

In circumstances like this the Government always has, of course, the option of proceeding by expropriating the property they desire to have however. due to recent changes in the Federal Expropriation Act that is not a simple matter and has certain statutory delays which will in themselves be a source of annoyance to those who are anxious to see this project completed.

Referring briefly to the statutes passed since January. 3rd. I think they've all had full coverage in the press except for the Election Expenses Bill. One aspect of that curiously has not attracted any comment from newspaper columnists. The Bill is designed to limit election expenses and to curb possible abuses of T.V. and radio time. It seems to me however that one of the most important aspects of the Bill and one which I would have thought the public would want to be fully informed about, is that the Bill does provide for payments to candidates who manage to gather not less than 15 percent of the votes cast in an election. The amount of money which the public purse will be required to pay to these candidates varies depending on the number of electors on the electoral lists. And in our riding it would run to some \$6,000. for each candidate. That seems to me curious that newspaper reporters have not discussed that subject in the press, possibly they're motivated by some sense of delicacy.

As I mentioned above, it appears quite possible that the Oil Allocation Bill will pass tomorrow, in that event the House will not be sitting next week and presumably will be adjourned or prorogued until the latter part of February. I hope that will give an opportunity to get around the riding from one end to the other and see some of your personally. In the meantime a belated Happy New Year.

The "Little Red School House"?

The "Little Red School House" program designed by Nova Scotia's Department of Recreation to fill an urgent need for rural recreation activities has met with enthusiastic response, Recreation Manaster A. Garnet Brown, disclosed

The Department has already received a flood of enquiries about the program which basically provides a \$2,000 grant if a community group can obtain the usage of an abandoned rural school, community hall or other similar building for meetings, dances, crafts, and other recreational activities in rural areas of the Province

An estimated 25 such centres will be in active use during 1974 he predicted

Possibility of the Lattle Red School House" being utilized as a symbol for crafts made in Nova Scotia has also been proposed by a representative of the Nova Scotta Designer Craftsmen and is now being investigated.

The program was proposed by the Minister at the Department sponsored Cultural Policy Conference last November in response to requests in imany of the more than 200 submitted. briefs, for assistance in providing space for amateur crafts, theatries, dance music, club meetings and other recreational activities

He said that besides filling a need in rural areas, the little red school house project also fitted superbly with another Department objective of utilizing existing facilities wherever possible rather than involving massive expenditures for hundreds of new facilities.

"Our only regret is that we were not in operation a few years ago, when many of these abandoned rural schools were replaced by the new consolidated school buildings. Many of these abandoned schools have now been destroyed or sold for private purposes, and hundreds of small Nova Scotia communities have been deprived of any immediate areas where community activities can take place," he said.

The program is very, flexible, requiring only a responsible community group to make the application for help, and assurance that the facility once repaired, will be available to the community for a reasonable period of time. Applications can be submitted both the Provincial Department of Recreation or to any of its six

A check of 1864 specifications for early Nova Scotia school houses, made no reference to any particular color. The "red" for schools appears to have been the usage of "okra" or "venetian" coloring which was often used in early painting. Many Nova Scotian areas before the turn of the century simply used white-wash.

The Department has indicated that wherever possible. it would like to attain an identity for the rural recreation centres by having them painted red, but that if there happens to be local objections to the use of the color that this would not affect approval or legitimate applications for help.

"The Department eventually hopes to plan a series of program guidelines and hints, for use by rural communitiees in creating recreational opportunities in the buildings," said Mr. Brown.

Teacher Training: A Priority

In response to needs which have existed over a long period of time in the public school system of Nova Scotia and particularly in the Acadian schools, College Ste-Anne has decided to offer its facilities and personnel to the task of preparing teachers of French as a second language and to meet the needs for qualified teachers in the Acadian communities of Digby, Inverness, Richmond and Yarmouth counties.

The preparation of teachers at College Ste-Anne has been a serious topic of discussion for over two years in the board rooms of the college and it has been frequently discussed or mentioned by educators and administrators off the campus for as long or longer.

The problem of teacher shortage is one of quality rather than one of number and it is manifested at two distinct levels:

First, the training of teachers at the under-graduate and at the post-graduate level for the Acadian schools has been conducted at English speaking campuses of Nova Scotia because French speaking institutions did not exist. This training, while adequate for English speaking teacher candidates does not prepare sufficiently for school systems in which the language of instruction should be mainly French.

Second, the training of teachers of French as a second language requires exposure to and continued use of the target language over a long period of time. If we believe that fluency in the second language is an essential qualification then time is a prime ingredient. This type of atmosphere does not exist anywhere but on a French speaking campus. 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

Town Population Doubles In 70 Years

The Town of Digby increased its population by 105 per cent in the period between 1901 and 1971, it is revealed in a profile on the town and county of Digby, published recently by the provincial Department of Development. Population of the town in 1901 was 1,150. By 1971 this had risen to 2,363.

Population of Digby County during the same period increased by only 27 persons. During the depression years of the 1930's the county reached its lowest ebb of population. There was increase following those years until 1966 but since then there has been a slight decline. Population of Digby County in 1901 was 20,322. In 1971 the population was 20,349, or an increase of 27 over the 1901 figure.

Some interesting sidelights on population changes in a number of the smaller communities in the County are given in the profile. It is noted that the population of the two inhabited islands in Digby County, Long and Briar Islands, has increased since the census of 1966 by 6 per cent. Freeport on Long

Island with a population of 475 in 1971 showed an increase of 20 percent over its population of 395 in 1966. The increase is even greater over the 1961 census figure for Freeport of 363.

On Briar Island the population of Westport showed a slight increase between 1966 and 1971, going from 367 to 380. A decline from the 1961 figure of 413 is noted. Tiverton on Long Island showed a decrease from 334 in 1966 to 308 in 1971. Population in 1961 was 366.

Weymouth on the Sissiboo River showed an increase of 5 percent in its population between 1966 and 1971. The census figure for 1971 is 604 while in 1966 the population of Weymouth was 573. The 1961 figure was 671 so in fact there has been a slight decline in the ten year period between the two general census takings.

It is of interest to note that each of the two municipalities of Digby and Clare contain 44 per cent of the county's total population. In Clare there has been a 5 per cent increase in population between 1966 and 1971 while Digby municipality

Digby Building Boom Unabated During

The building boom that began in Digby four years ago continued unabated through 1973. Total value of building under

construction and -or completed during the year is expected to top the three-million - dollar mark.

Included in buildings completed during the year is the new Tide View Terrace, the home for aged and infirm, constructed at a cost of \$638,000. This new home, which will serve the town and municipality of Digby, will provide accommodation for 55 elderly people and includes an imfirmary, recreation and occupational therapy facilities.

Also included in buildings completed is the new children's home which was officially opened in August. This new home provides accommodation for 45 handicapped children. Construction cost was in the vicinity of \$900,000.

Thirty additional units of senior citizens' housing were added to those already occupied in Digby. Built at a cost of approximately \$500,000, the new housing for senior citizens is expected to be ready for occupancy early in the new year. In addition, tenders are ex-

A new shopping mall located in the town's south end opened in March. Housing 14 stores and business outlets, the new mall cost in the vicinity of \$1,250,000. During the past summer the large parking area was drained, levelled and paved.

Also included in the number of structures comple'ed in Digby in 1973 is the new Mc-Cleave Funeral Home on Warwick Street, which opened in March. Two new Church buildings, one on King Street and the other on the extension of Prince William Street, opened as well as two new service stations and a new motel, the Admiral Digby Inn, on the outskirts of Digby. A new takeout restaurant is now nearing completion.

The age range of population in Digby County as given in the profile provides some interesting comment. Digby County in 1971 had 42 per cent of its population in the youth category, under 21. This was the same as the province. There were, however, 2 per cent less working age people in Digby County than the provincial percentage and 2 per cent more senior citizens. It is to be noted that fully 37 per cent of the potential work force (15-64) in Digby County was over 45 as compared with the provinical average of 32 per cent and the national average of 30 per cent.

The town of Digby in 1971 had 48 per cent of its residents in the 21-64 age group as compared to 46 per cent in the rural areas. It is of interest to note that both the town and county had 12 per cent of its population in the over 65 age bracket. This fact gives weight to the importance of attention to programs for the senior citizens in the area.

It is expected the building boom will continue through 1974 as already a number of subdivision projects are under consideration and additional public housing will be erected.


The year 1973 saw not only a continuation of the construction boom in Digby, it was also featured by a number of sizable public works projects both in the town and surrounding.

Included in public works projects was the new Bear River Bridge completed at a cost of \$3,500,000. A start was also made on a sewer drainage and sisposal system for the town . Approval was secured early in the ver for a capital outlay on this project of \$850,000. Work of upgrading facilities of fishermen's wharf also continued through the years and a reinforced decking of concrete was installed on the pier. Additional work was also carried out on the new terminal facilities for the Digby-Saint John ferry service.

On the outskirts of Digby, in the community of Acaciaville, a local initiative project grant, totalling \$14,745 was secured, making possible the renovation of 24 substandard homes in the

McBride Memorial Park in Digby was also completed by the Kinsmen's Club with aid from a LIP grant, totalling \$15,000. The Digby branch of the Canadian Legion expended \$9,700 to pave and drain the parking area around their new building, built the previous

During 1973 the town of Digby also saw a significant number of renovations of commercial structures in the town's business area. The former Metropolitan store was completely renovated to house the new Greenberg clothing store. A sizeable addition to the store of E.B. Robertson & Son was completed during the year and a start made on addition to the separately housed service department of the same store. A number of other commercial buildings were also renovated or extended during the year.



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

The long term effect of this system has been that our average prescription price as of 31 Jan. '73 was \$5.01 and as of 31 Dec. '73 was \$4.32. The average for the year was \$4.62. We doubt that much else you bought last year was cheaper in December than it was the previous January.

In 1973 we also became among the first drug stores in the Digby area to:

1. Make exclusive use of child resistant containers for solid forms of prescribed medications. (We use other containers when we are unable to provide safety containers of the right size.

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Other officers elected were Cary MacKenzie, second vicesident and Sam MacKay, wasurer (re-elected). A **Ser**etary will be appointed at a later date and installation of officers will take place. The slate was presented by Vincent Snow with C.M. Levy and David Cosman also on the Nomination Committee.

Reports for 1973 were submitted by the president, Mr. Ryan; the publicity chairman, V.G. Cardoza and the membership chairman, Vincent Snow.

Mr. Snow reported a membership of 73, an increase of nine over 1972. Also on the membership committee was John Englehutt. They reported the Digby Board as members of the A.V.A.B.T. and the Maritime Chamber of Com-

merce and recommended membership in APEC and Canadian Chamber of Commerce. The report also recommended corporate membership and inviting of questions for discussion by advertising. Attendance at meetings in 1973 was reported as good.

The treasurer's report showed receipts of the year to be \$1271.35 with a balance of \$439..51 as of Dec. 31, 1973.

The president reported three dinner meetings held, seven business meetings and eleven executive meetings when much work was accomplished, especially in the field of transportation.

Glen Pitman, secretary of the Digby Regional High School Board, was given an unanamous vote of confidence at the regular meeting of the Board held at the D.R.H.S. library on Monday evening. The motion of confidence was moved by a member of the Board, His Worship Mayor Willard Kinney and seconded by George Barton, a member. Mrs. Shirley Woolaver, acting chairman, presided at the meeting.

The vote of confidence came after William Covert, president of the Digby Local Nova Scotia Teachers Union, on behalf the Union, requested the resignation of the Board secretary on the basis of alleged · incompetence. Mr. Covert began his presentation by requesting written confirmation from the D.R.H.S. Board as to whom is the employer of the teachers. He alleged that decisions made by the entire board were not carried out due to the interpretation of one person.

Incompetency was alleged by Mr. Covert's presentation in that of the secretary's inability to follow the board's initial direction regarding payment of salary according to contract. (The contract required the amount of each cheque issued any one month to be one-twelfth the total applicable annual salary less authorized deductions but the formula used was seventy-six one hundred and ninety-fifths; alleged constant errors in salary calculations and deductions and slow action regarding application for bus

and lunch duty supervision. Of the thirty-five to forty teachers of D.R.H.S. present, six remained seated while the others stood in support of Mr. Covert's presentation. Approximately 55 teachers are employed in D.R.H.S. No members of the Digby Local **Teachers Union from the urban** school staff were present at the D.R.H.S. Board meeting on Monday evening.

Mrs. The Chairman, Woolaver, speaking for the

Board, told the Union members that Mr. Pitman was an overworked, underpaid public servant who is an employee of the D.R.H.S. Board answerable to the Board and not to the Teachers Union. Never has there been a time, the chairman said, when there was reason to complain about Mr. Pitman's service. Mrs. Woolaver reminded the teachers that they, too, are employees of the Board, but it would appear that they do not enjoy working with the Board. She remarked that the Board's method of paying the teachers salaries was used to please the teachers but it was probably a mistake to deviate and perhaps they should go back to the Department of Education system. She said the Board had invited concrete

suggestions from the teachers

for the betterment of their

system but none were for-

thcoming. She told the teachers

that the Board had a respon-

sibility to the students of the

school and she felt far too much

of the Board's time was being

spent on the teachers and their salaries.

Lister Hannah, D.R.H.S. principal felt that the present situation had arisen hah an accumulation of several years. by a break-down in communications and by misunderstanding and tensions until it had developed into sort of employee-employer situation.

He said that he had found the Board very reasonable in all his personal dealings with them but discussions between the Board and the Union had become very



He disliked the image created by T V which pictures oxen. handcrafts and highland dancing as Nova Scotian. We really don't see why Mr. Hill should feel so disturbed about all this. Oxen have been part of our heritage in Nova Scotia and we consider it noble to preserve our heritage on any score. Tourists are not likely to come to Nova Scotia to see skyscrapers but to see us as we live now and have lived in years gone by. Why preserve all these quaint old houses. these relics of the past and samples of our mode of life, if we are going to be embarrassed by them. We'd suggest we use both our past and present, letting our achievements and our best to be well publicized while we feel no reluctance in preserving the past and being ourselves. As for hand outs. Nova Scotia still needs them even if we are doing well in climbing. Many others in Canada got to top postions by taking advantage of hand-outs.

Mr. Hill had a good thought provoking address. That could be seen by not everybody agreeing one hundred percent. He didn't expect them to. He wanted them to be just themselves.

BLUNDERING HUMANS

When the head of the family or any individual loses a job for any reason not of his own making, what a blessing unemployment insurance must be. Can you imagine the hardship which a family would have to endure when not knowing where to look for the next morsel of food. Unemployment insurance was designed to prevent such hardships and to make life pleasant until suitable employment can again be

But alas, blundering humans have spoiled the whole deal by taking advantage and going unnecessarily on U.I. and avoiding work though able bodied and able to find work. But maybe these are not the only blunderers. The very people who are our benefactors have blundered. This was brought forcibly to our attention when the Canadian Federation of Independent Business sent out to small businesses a memorandum and a protest cheque 15" x 36" made out to the Receiver General of Canada to pay income tax deductions. C.P.P. and U.I.C. All you had to do was fill in the amount and sign it. The Federation president explained the protest. "Our long-term objective is to oppose social security programmes that destroy the incentive to work and to oppose the increasing cost and bureaucracy created by our complex system of taxation and social security. The basic flaw in the U.I.C. plan is the payment of benefits based on earnings rather than on need. A system of overly generous benefits influences attitudes toward work and creates problems for employers in attracting and in maintaining staff."

With that we'll have to agree. Another blunder. How simple life could be if we weren't such blundering humans.

WASTED FOOD RESOURCES IN A HUNGRY

Pressures on the world's food supplies because of its too rapidly increasing population are intensified by certain demands: many of which are highly questionable.

For example, our over-supply of pets. In North America 57.4 percent of urban families have one or more. Apartment living tends to reduce their number. but it is believed to be rising. They make inroads on both protein and starch supply.

Another example is deliberate food destruction in world liquor production. Beer takes 16 million pounds of barley malt annually, with a 5 percent yearly increase of which total. Canada's breweries account

for nearly 4 percent 1970 Canadian distilleries use over one billion pounds

of grains, largely corn. If this also is 4 percent of world production not including rice . it means 25.4 billion pounds, which with barley malt comes to over 41 billion pounds, more than 40 pounds each for one billion hungry people.

Besides this, wine production, highly acclaimed by some, destroys great quantities of fresh fruits, also robbing the food supply One B C winery boasts of using 4000 tons 1972 and plans expansion. This doubly offsets the hard-earned 4 million pounds' gain of China's largest commune of 80,000 people. The high cost and shortage of raisins are largely due to their use in wine production.

Clearly, we have yet to use all our resources with conscience, compassion and intelligence in thus encroaching on the rightful claims of the hungry. while manufacturing a product causing our im-

When the UN Food and Agriculture Organization stated last June that wheat requirements of 1973-74 could not be met from 1973 production, it behooves all governments to curtail these wastes, making the savings available to the hungry, who are mostly children

At all times, thought regarding the needs of others should guide our practice.

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

Concern was expressed by the Rector regarding the trend toward non attendance and non involvement in church activities by youth. 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

The Clare Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society held its annual meeting on January 8th at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Leigh Sabine of Riverdale. J. Marcel Valotaire was re-elected president. Other officers elected are : Mrs. Leigh Sabine. vice-president; J.P. Comeau. Church Point, secretarytreasurer; Welfare Chairman. Mrs. Charles (Philomene) Saulnier of Saulnierville Station; Advisors: all doctors of Clare and the village of Weymouth; Campaign Chairman, Mrs. Dora Blinn, Grosses Coques; sportation chairman; A.P. Melanson, Church Point: Education chairman: Mrs. Yvette Valotaire.

The sum of \$1,400.00 was collected in Clare during the fund raising campaign for funds for research program of the Canadian Cancer Society, which is an increase of a couple of hundred dollars over the previous year.

Delegates to attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Cancer Society in Halifax on Feb. 14, 15, and 16th are: Mr. Leigh Sabine and Mrs. Leigh Sabine and Mrs. Catherine Melanson.

The Welfare chairman, Mrs. Dora Blinn, reported that over 2000 pads and dressings were made and distributed in Clare during the year ending September 30th, 1973. Mrs. Yvette Valotaire, education chairman, reported that over 400 pupils of the schools in Clare participated. The following schools participated: Havelock, St. Bernard; Church Point Consolidated; Concession; Saulnierville: Meteghan, St Alphonse, Salmon River in the secondary schools and The Clare District High School in a special contest. Each school was represented in awards with a first and second award being given to winners of each school. The high school had a special program with more difficult questions regarding Canacer.

Mrs. Valotaire stated that this contest, finding answers to questions posted on a circular, was a pleasant success. It not only was good for the children who entered the contest but also the parents of these children. Parents appear to have more

interest in the Cancer Society following the two years of this new program sponsored and organized by the Clare Unit.

A discussion took place regarding a method of letting persons who require to go to the Tumor Clinic at the Victoria General Hospital in Halifax can obtain assistance from the Clare Unit. This also refers to other assistance obtainable such as hospital bed, pads and dressings, pain killing drugs of certain types may be paid by the Unit. It was decided that all doctors in Clare and the village of Weymouth would be advised to tell their patients who have a tumor or have had a tumor or Cancer where they can get assistance. The Health Nurses will be also be asked to help.

It has come to light that some persons do not know of the assistance that can be received from the Clare Unit, and this includes transportation assistance. It must not be confused with the fund raising program, when transportation assistance is mentioned because transportation costs do not come out of the funds raised in Clare but is from the provincial government grants to headquarters.

As mentioned elsewhere, the 1973 fund raising campaign reached the goal set by headquarters with over \$1,400.00 raised and it may interest you to know that over \$1,300.00 was paid out in assistance to persons requiring to attend the tumor clinic in Halifax.

It was stressed that no payment would be made unless receipts for transportation, room or board for the trip is available. Some difficulty has arisen from some persons requesting assistance and no receipts are available.

In order to protect the value of your eventual benefits, the Canadian Parliament has passed legislation which ensures that the contributions you make today will give benefits that maintain the purchasing power of today's wages twenty, thirty or even fifty years from now ... when you need it!

To achieve this, the Government plans to have the earnings ceiling — the maximum amount on which contributions are paid and on which benefits are calculated — increased each year so that it will reach, and then keep even with the average earnings of Canadian industrial workers. This ceiling will be raised from \$5,600.00 in 1973, to \$6,600.00 in 1974 and \$7,400.00 in 1975.



Municipality Considers All Grants En Bloc

Before the present Digby Municipal Council adjourns all grants will be listed and considered en bloc. This motion was passed at the Tuesday morning session of the annual meeting held at the Court House. It was the general opinion that councillors should know the dispensation of the money granted and the necessity of receiving a grant.

Grants requested at the Monday and Tuesday sessions were Digby County Exhibition, \$500 (shared with Clare); Digby County Livestock Health Services Board, \$1250; Emergency Measures Organization (Digby), \$200; Annapolis Valley **Affiliated Boards of Trade \$880** and Digby Mental Health Association \$500.

The Board of Trade is the only voice left to get to the governments to express thoughts, wishes and demands, declared Glen Smith, former mayor of Digby and vicepresident of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, in presenting the case for the \$880 grant from the municipality. Also speaking on behalf the AVABT were the president Marcel Volataire, Meteghan and Lloyd Hill, executive secretary.

Mr. Hill reviewed the accomplishments of the AVABT in fields of tourism and transportation. In 1973 they distributed 150,000 pieces of literature at a cost of \$5000. They worked with the Department of Tourism on long term tourist development and maintaining natural attractions

in the province.

In transportation Mr. Hill referred to freight subsidies in which the AVABT played a part in obtaining, the subsidy level rising to fifty percent instead of thirty percent at an estimated additional cost of \$7,000,000. Mr. Hill also said that the AVABT had spear headed efforts to maintain transportation service via Princess of Acadia. He said the AVABT had done much in promotion improvement of secondary roads in the Valley area.

Mr. Smith said that in the last two years Ottawa has been recognizing the voice of AVABT in the area. He advocated the encouragement of industry which can get along in this area environment so the base for taxation might be broadened.

F.G. Cardoza, president of Mental Health Digby presented the case for a grant on behalf of that organization. Some of the concerns of Mental Health in the area are helping children with emotional and learning disabilities by bursaries to teachers to train in the field: primary prevention of emotional disturbances in the elderly and taking mental health services to people where they live.





In addition to the staff members who will run the activity programme, the grant has also made it possible to hire seven other people to finish work on the house next door to the centre that Hope Fellowship now owns, in order to make it available in the future as a group home for handicapped adults who could then take better advantage of the programme next door.


received a provincial interest-free loan to buy equipment for a youth centre that is situated in the Lower Ciranville Hall.

THE DIGBY COURIER Request Raise

Minimum

Annual Income

Unless a brief to that effect is

already being submitted today at the meeting in Middleton of Premier Gerald Regan and his cabinet and the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, the Digby Municipal Council, through the efforts of Councillor L.E.R. Winchester will present a brief requesting the government to raise the minimum annual income above \$2000 as is presently fixed. Councillor Winchester, who presented the matter before the annual meeting of the council of the Municipality of the District of Digby on Tuesday was concerned particularly about widows, spinsters and deserted wives on fixed income in relation to property taxes, In the Digby municipality widows and spinsters and deserted wives earning less than \$2000 per year were exempt from tax on property up to \$1800 assessment. The recent raise in social assistance payments, it was found, had brought the income of some of these persons just above the \$2000 mark and deprived them of the tax exemption on property. Allowable tax exemption of this type in Nova Scotia is maximum \$2500 on assessment whch is \$700 more than what is allowed in the Digby municipality. No plans were made at Tuesday's meeting to increase this exemption on assessment in the municipality.

James Wamback was reappointed Court Cryer and sheep evaluators appointed were Chipman Chisholm, Guy Outhouse, Melvin Tibert, Glendon Titus and Eli Marshall.

Warden Ronald Morehouse reported that there are now 41 patients at Tideview Terrace, 19 infirm and 22 residents.

Mrs. MacNeil reported for the Digby County Livestock Health Services Board of which she is chairman. Councillor MacNeil also reported for the Digby Emergency Measures Organization which has 421 persons involved.

Digby And New Tusket Get Grants

Recreation Minister A. Garnet Brown told a community recreation seminar group that his department had received more than 200 briefs from people across the Province and found a big concern "For space to carry on amateur crafts, theatricals. dance, club meetings and other recreational activities"

Speaking to a luncheon meeting of Municipal and Town Mr. Brown said that his department has already taken action on applications for grants under the "little Red School House" program. Included in the grants are those to Digby and New Tusket, Digby County.

"We have had a fantastic response to our proposal to provide \$2,000 grants to various community groups which have obtained the use of little one and two-room schoolhouses and other unused buildings so that they can be utilized for recreational activities." Mr. Brown said.

"Nowhere has the response

been greater than right here in the valley region. Five of the 13 approvals to date come from this area. Two others have been recommended for approval and three others are in the final stages of negotiations."

Mr. Brown said that the program which was first announced in November and acted upon in December has resulted in grants in the following communities:

In keeping with the theme of the seminar, "The role of municipal government in recreation," Mr. Brown said that "increasing recreational opportunities for our citizens is an important and deserved public service."

"Balanced recreational programs will fester in all communities a greater awareness of pride and act as a tremendous instrument of communication between all people," the Minister said.

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

The Municipality of the District of Digby on Tuesday in annual session of the Council voted to purchase the Hill Grove sirport for the sum of \$14.000. They will also purchase an adjacent field belonging to J. J. Brittain.

The matter was given serious

consideration after Dr. J. R. McCleave, Millon Turnbull and George Conrad of the Digby Air Services Ltd. visited the Council on Thursday and presented the proposition. Lewis Wiles who accompanied the three as their spokesman explained the possibilities which could be derived from such a purchase. Mr. Wiles went on record as

offering to purchase the property from the municipality if after five years they were not happy with their purchase. Councillors felt the property was worth the price even if it could not be developed for air services.

Working on the project during the week were Councillors

Walter MacAlpine. L.E.R. Winchester and Eric Van-Tassell. The finance committee will take up the proposition now that the purchase is definite.

Privately owned airports are not given grants for development, it was learned, but municipally owned airports can get assistance from the

Municipality Taxable Assessment \$27,395,175

Philip Dondale, chief assessor for the Digby Annapolis Assessment Region presented his report to the annual meeting of the council of the Municipality of the District of Digby on Thursday which revealed the 1974 taxable assessment to be \$27,395,175. The 1973 taxable assessment appeals after \$21.482.265.There was an increase of \$4,370,255 in real property, \$907,885 in personal and a gain in occupancy of \$367,795 together with a decrease in exemptions of \$266,975 which resulted in a net gain of \$5,912,910 taxable. Number of accounts increased from 6,843 to 7,158.

Mr. Dondale reported that there are 112 mobile homes in the municipality assessed at **\$789,000**. There have been 30 new ones during the year.

Much discussion arose on the increased assessment, methods of assessment and people unable to pay taxes and thereby lose their homes when they are sold for taxes.

Dr. G. Turnbull, Smith's Cove, where the assessment in 1974 increased by 57 percent, was permitted to address council. He felt it was time to be getting back to a democratic country and he hoped to see a protest go to the office of the assessor to see if control can be again brought back from "Halifax" and put into the hands of the municipality. It seems, he said, that people are being forced to sell their property. He urged council to work for an increase in assessment exemptions.

Basil Porter, Conway, also appeared before council denouncing taxation which he described as getting out of He felt the big building boom should take care of assessment but instead it doubled and tripled on some people's property.

Deputy Warden Arthur Rice saw education and welfare to be the real problems in high taxation. If brakes are not put on costs people will not be able to pay the taxes. He felt "we are as far away from a democratic

society as we can get." Weymouth Kiwanis Club that organization for 1974. He

Digby Housing Need "Urgent"

Thirty-two wage earners made less than \$1,199 while 30 were under \$2,999. Seventeen were under \$3,999 and only three were over \$4,000.

Almost half of the families expressed interest in rental housing or home ownership and many others were interested in financial help to repair or improve their dwellings.

Twenty-six of the homes were thought to be a health hazard to the inhabitants. Some of the families have as many as 10 children living in a small house. The average family has four children and two adults.

The brief reported that in many of the families several children must share the same room or the same bed while in other cases adults sleep in the

same bed with the children. The brief stressed the frustration experienced by the social services' staff over their inability to help families. In

many situations a great deal of the problems would be eliminated if funds were available to provide housing, it continued.

"Our agency can do little for anyone living in an inadequate home, even though it may reach the point where we remove or apprehend the children."

The brief stated the problem will have compounded itself in years to come and some type of action now would prevent this from happening.

Sooner or later, the housing situation will have to be dealt with, it said, to wait for a period of years will result in a larger and more costly problem to

The brief stressed the involvement of the municipality in low rental housing which, it stated, could be a solution to many of the housing problems at a minimum cost to the muncipality.

These figures were presented to the council of the Municipality of the District of Digby by Mrs. M.P. Gott from a survey she had conducted. While a member of the municipal council, Mrs. Gott represented the municipality on the Municipal School Board and had been elected chairman of the Board. Mrs. Gott was making her final report to the Council in that capacity, having lost the municipal seat in the October municipal election.

The total school budget presented by Mrs. Gott for 1974 was \$1,843,040. "Close to two million,' said Mrs. Gott. The budget in 1973 was \$1,616,925 representing an increase of more than \$226,000. Of the 1974 budget the provincial share in costs will be \$1,384,365 and the municipal share to be raised by taxation will be \$458,675, an increase of 12.2 per cent,. Teachers salaries moved from \$681,660 in 1973 to \$795,840 for 1974. Other salaries also increased from \$59420 in 1973 to \$68200 in 1974.

It was explained to Mrs. Gott that the town had no authority to turn over the funds but could only make the request to the Industrial Committee. It was further mentioned that there seemed to be a move to revive the Industrial Committee.

In presenting her case, Mrs. Gott reviewed the projects for the benefit of tourism in the area which the Tourist and Recreation Council had attempted.

Permission was granted to Levy's Rexall Store on Water St. to extend the building over the former Shortliffe Grocery property and to Wilson's Home Hardware to extend the building previously owned by Digby Auto Supplies on Warwick St. Ervin Marshall presented working drawings

in the Digby area in 1973 amounted to \$50,707.11 funds expended according to Vernon Wessell, chief administrator of the Department of Social Services in Digby when he presented his report to the Council of the Municipality of the District of Digby on Monday. The general assistance in

Shareable general assistance

1972 amounted to \$66,567.62, a difference of 15,860. It was felt that the construction boom in the area accounted for the decrease in assistance needed. Net cost in 1973 was \$11,745.81 and in 1972 it was \$15,690.69. Homes for Special Care such as for disabled and aged,

boarding homes and nursing homes cost \$87,355.80 in 1973 as against \$74,391.57 in 1972. This increase was not because of more patients but because of an advanced diem rate. There are 13 different Homes where care is given to Digby County people and the need for nursing homes in Digby area is apparent.

Discussion on the gap which exists for elderly persons to be accommodated at Tideview and hospitalization arose. It was understood that Tideview Terrace did not accommodate those who needed more than two hours nursing care in twenty-four while the hospital does not keep patients who do not require medical treatment. More than 100 are on the waiting list for Tideview Terrace but there is a hold up for bed rails for accommodation.

Following a brief presented to Council by Gerald Walsh on housing in Digby County (story elsewhere in this newspaper) discussion on low-rental housing ensured. It was discovered that no low rental housing exists but the govern-

ment had bought land in Hill Grove to start 12 units some years ago but there were not applications enough to proceed. It was felt that the

people did not understand. The municipal council gave permission to the Digby County Power Board to approach the Board of Public Utilities for a raise in power rates. A proposed schedule was presented to the Council on Monday by Stuart MacNaughton, superintendent and Milton Atkinson of DCPB. The proposed increase would bring an approximate increase of \$28,686 revenue during the

next year. Mr. MacNaughton gave figures of revenue and expenses of the Digby County Power Board for each of the past ten years in relation to the

Digby. During that time the total over expenditure financed by the Digby County Power Board amounted to \$81,196.08. This is the amount which the municipality owes to the DCPB. While this indebtedness was shown each year in the financial statements it was either overlooked or misunderstood so that the debt accumulated to \$81,196.08. The over expenditure was caused by public demands for services which needed lines, transformers, meters etc.

The municipal clerk was instructed to write to the Digby Town Council requesting street lighting for Mount Pleasant. The town owns the utility in that section but appeals for lighting by the residents have received no response.

Winchester Presents Brief On Assessment To Cabinet

Municipal Councillor L.E.R. Winchester, Smith's Cove, presented a brief on assessment to the Nova Scotia Cabinet which met in Middleton on Thursday. The brief presented on behalf the councillors of the Municipality of the District of Digby recommended that the present maximum annual disqualifying income to widows, spinsters and deserted wives of \$2,000.00 be raised to \$4,000.00, and that the assessment of land be guided by its accessibility from established highways and to the present purpose for which it is used.

Mr. Winchester's brief said the assessment in the Municipality of the District of Digby in 1974 had increased 28_

percent over 1973 assessment and in District No 8 in particular 57 percent. Many private homes and properties have an increased assessment of 100 percent and more, the brief continued. All properties, he said, have been classified on a common basis, irrespective of whether they are for private use, such as farms and woodlots as opposed to land for speculative purposes and prime building lots and swamp lands and inassessible property not conducive to improvement. Councillors felt that if this method of assessment is allowed to remain unchanged. many home owners will be denied money for basic needs and will be financially unable to

Wants DAR Operated, By Canadian

National

In a brief submitted by the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade to Premier Gerald Regan and the Cabinet which met in Middleton on Thursday, it was suggested that the time is close at hand when the D.A.R. line should be operated by the Canadian National.

Lloyd Will. executive manager of the A.V.A.B.T. was presenting a brief on transportation generally in Nova Scotin and the Atlantic region. The key to economic development anywhere, Mr. Hill ventured, is the availability of competitive transportation rates. Speaking of the D.A.R. in regard to his suggestion, he said that recent developments along with deterioration of service. increased cost to primary producers and the problem of enticing new industry to Western Nova Scotia would indicate this move.

The A.V.A.B.T. brief felt that the time was long past when the additional subsidies indicated by the Minister of Transport should be implemented. The brief also made a plea for the trucking industry to remove registration plates from trailers and put the combination plate on the power unit.

Another important subject touched in the brief was that of harnessing the Fundy tides for the production of electricity. With the cost of energy increased and a short supply of available fuels being experienced, the brief indicated that the Fundy Tidal Project becomes more realistic each day.

Regarding price differential of fuel oil and gasoline, the brief referred to the impression created that people in the East get the short end of the stick and are treated as second class citizens. The brief urged the Cabinet to work out a strategy which would lead equalization of prices.

On the subject of Tourism, the A.V.A.B.T. brief recommended that the government improve and continue to develop standards for accomodation and eating places, place emphasis on public information and educational programs on the value of the industry, initiate greater promotion for the sale of Nova Scotia products, make better use of historic sites, protect waterways and beaches for enjoyment and preserve our way of life and environment.

Another part of the brief dealt with the unemployment insurance program and its effect on labor. Among the recommendations was one that would require a person to apply for "work" and only receive benefits when work is not available or sickness prohibits his operation.

Edwin Elliott, chairman of the Agricultural Committee. Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, took up the matter of lack of railcars to move feed grains from Western Canada and the high cost of livestock feeds.

Other briefs in the afternoon requested the cabinet to consider policies aimed at giving more financial help to small businesses. Federal Dree grants, the brief noted, were made in the minimum range of \$60,000., which was out of reach of the small business. In reply, Premier Gerald Regan said that if the federal government did not come through with a program for small businesses. the provincial government might have to look into

something of this sort. Other briefs dealt with problems of land use and educational cost sharing.

The street committee was advised to check these and attention is to be drawn to the D.A.R. regarding one culvert near the Digby Dairy.

Council decided to meet on Monday evening in special session regarding building bylaws and other items.

In Annapolis Royal, the highway allowance would not only make a 300 flygash through the centre of the town, so that the old Courthouse and other buildings would totter on the brink of a chasm down which trucks thunder day and night: much of the residential area would be made untenable by noise.

Government Has Open Mind Property values would decline and the precurious tax base of the town would be dealt a serious blow.

Mr. Percy also dealt with the importance of a rightly placed

highway for tourism. Benefits of highway 101 to the South of the Annapolis River put forth by Mr. Percy were that it would pass near enough to the centres of population to give them good service but not so near as to disrupt their life and interfere with their development: it would provide an elevated scenic drive; on the slope of the mountain the highway would pass to the south of all the arable land, saving hundreds of acres for future food production; it would open up many southern woodlots; new areas would be opened up for recreational use: it would preclude the trucking of gravel for many miles from the South Mountain to the north side of the Valley and it would pass well to the south of Annapolis Royal and would not require a causeway at Clementsport North and South routes he felt, meant little difference of costs.

Mr. Percy was strongly supported by Sen. Margaret Norrie, of Truro, a member of the national agricultural committee. She said preservation of the best farm land was most imperative both in the Valley and nationally. "We've got to keep food production up. We will starve if we don't." said Sen. Norrie.

Middleton restaurant operator Ellis Eisner was spokesman for the north side and presented a petition signed by 1,300 persons asking the department of highways to "proceed with 101 as planned" on the north route which would be more to the social and economic well being of the Valley and province. He was supported by Vernon Brown of

Middleton who took advantage of the situation for some humor and presented Premier Gerald Regan with a "mugwump".

Premier Regan said the government has an open mind on the route to be taken by highway 101 through Annapolis County and he hoped to meet all concerns.

Highways Minister Leonard Pace said a thorough study would be made of all the factors involved "then we will be in a better position to say which is the greater advantage to the community and the province in general.

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
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
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Movie Review

Based on a novel by James Dickey who also wrote the screenplay, this is a most unusual movie which has proved to be another big one for Warner Bros. The four male leads, Burt Reynolds, Jon. Voight, Ned Beatty and Ronny Cox, are excellent as the city slickers on a canoe trip down a turbulent river in the wilderness, Each is completely different in personality and their clashes and tensions are handled outstandingly. Unfair Garbage Costs Protested

Lawrence Sabean and Lloyd Grant, Barton, appeared before the Digby Municipal Council in annual session to protest what they considered unfair charges for garbage collection. The system adopted by the municipal authorities is to include the cost in property taxes. Mr. Sabean felt persons with property from which no garbage is needed to be collected were paying the garbage collection in part for others who needed the service. He recommended the amount be raised by occupancy tax.

After much discussion it was agreed that using the occupancy tax was no fairer to all the people than raising the money by property tax. It was felt that the only exactly fair means was by a set amount for each unit and the council when inaugurating the garbage collection system anticipated a twenty-seven cent household charge each week or \$14.20 per unit per year. This method did not comply with the Department of Municipal Affairs in cost sharing.

Estimated cost of garbage

collection in the municipality other than the Islands (which have their own system) was \$33,000. The municipal share would be \$8,250 approximately to be realized from an assessment of \$127,000,000 which amounts to about .03 on \$100.


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

The senior English program in Digby Regional High School has been awarded a grant of \$1200 by the Selection Committee administering this


The English teachers, in conjunction with the school administration, are attempting to develop a more open program in English at the senior high level. Rather than repeat the survey-type courses which have been standard fare for students of English for so long, there is a choice of three different courses offered at each grade level (10-12) each term. By the end of the school year, each student can have taken three completely different courses from three different teachers. This allows students to study in more depth some aspect of the subject which they may find interesting. It also gives a more

To obtain a credit in English for the year, students must complete three courses. The only compulsory course is one in Communications (basic reading and writing skills) at the grade 10 level. This year the courses which have been offered, or are being planned for the third term, include Canadian literature, ethnic literature, modern poetry, creative writing, mythology, Victorian literature, various

With the help of the \$1200 grant, more material can be purchased, it is understood and the senior English curriculum can continue to improve and expand.

Salaries of 80 municipal school teachers and supervisors budgeted for 1974 as revealed in a report presented to the municipal council last week was an impressive figure of \$795,840. A lot of money to come from the pockets of ratepayers, it would seem, and no one will deny the skyrocketing of education costs.

There is another angle, or maybe more than one, to be considered. The provincial share of those salaries is substantial. While provincial payments come from the ratepayers pockets, too, the hurt isn't half so had as from the municipal source.

Add to the 80 municipal teachers, 55 more in the Digby Regional High School plus the urban elementary teachers and we have a good size industry in Digby County. All is not lost. The teachers, hopefully, spend their salaries in this vicinity, supporting grocery stores, clothing stores and buying various kinds of household articles and other merchandise. In many cases the time of the teachers is spent at extra curriculum for the good of the school, church or community as a whole.

Truly, teachers salaries today are a far cry from those of thirty years ago. Teachers truly are doing well financially but let us not forget the rewards. They represent a big industry while they give of themselves in the leadership of youth.

NATIONAL ELECTRICAL WEEK

Like missing the water only when the well runs dry, so we have become so accustomed to switching on the electric power that it takes a major storm disrupting the flow of the current to make us realize our dependence on that commodity. Even electrical weeks set apart make little or no impression at times though they are designed to focus attention on the electric industry, its varied services and their extreme importance to our way of life.

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

Things were different in Grandma's day.

Beside my typewriter is a small account book with an Almanac for 1871 and after each date is an interesting happening such as: "Robert Burns died Friday, July 2nd, 1796." "Louis the XVI was beheaded January 20, 1793"; "In 1871 there will be two eclipses of the sun and two of the moon."

This book belonged to my grandmother Potter, who lived on Brier Island, Nova Scotia (Digby County),

In these days of soaring prices, the prices she paid then, seem unbelievable. I will list a few.: 9 lbs. of pork - 1.17; 24 lbs of flour - 84 cents; 1 bushel of potatoes - 75 cents; 1 dozen eggs - 12 cents; 2 lbs of butter - 45

When grandmother died, this book became my mothers.

She was Myra Potter Coggins and married Edward Thompson, also of Westport. I was born in Digby, but we moved to Centreville, on Digby Neck and my father was Captain of a freight schooner called the "Whistler" that carried fish from the factory in Centreville. Then came a small freight steamer, called the "Centreville". The fish were shipped to Saint John, New Brunswick. As a family, we went to Saint John to the Queens Jubilee. I was four years old.

The price of fish recorded in this book is fantastic. 100 lbs of haddock - \$1.50; 100 lbs of pollock - \$2.00; 33 lbs of napes and fins - 82 cents.

Wages for working in the fish factory for one day was 40 cents, for half a day, 20 cents. They didn't have eight hour days either, a day then was more likely to be ten hours.

When I shop in our big markets and see the prices rising like the Bay of Fundy tide, I remember mother's homemade bread and the delicious butter that we churned in the old-fashioned churn and whisper a Thank-you for all the blessings of long ago.

Q. Is it safe to re-freeze food which has thawed?

A. Do not buy foods supposed to be frozen but which are thawed. Home Economists of the Department of Health and Welfare say that frozen foods which have been completely thawed, or which have been held at room temperature for more than two days, should not be refrezen.

Casey Fisheries Ltd, Digby and Comeau Seafoods Ltd.. Saulnierville, Digby County are among the companies from Nova Scotia participating in "Project Eurotrade". Hon George Mitchell, Minister of Development, announced the combined trade, industrial and tourist promotion project to be held in London and Brussels on March 18 to 29. Some seventeen Nova Scotia firms will participate, representing food processors and light and heavy industrial firms.

"Project Eurotrade", coordinated by the Department of Development, will provide Nova Scotia manufacturers and producers the opportunity o meet United Kingdom and European prospects; increase the province's industrial thrust in these areas, and expand overseas promotional activities of the Department of Tourism, Mr. Mitchell said.

A major element in the promotion is a 2,000 square-foot exhibit containing product displays of the Nova Scotia firms participating, graphic displays in various aspects of the province's economy and tourist attractions, and slide

show presentations. The unique location of the Port/ of Halifax as an interface between Europe and North America will be stressed.

Representatives of business and industry in the two countries will be invited to visit the Nova Scotia exhibit and meet with representatives of the Nova Scotia firms and government officials. In addition, the Department of Tourism will make presentations to travel agents, tour operators, carriers and travel media.

The cost of the overseas promotion is being shared by the Department of Regional Economic Expansion with the Federal Department of Industry. Trade and Commerce providing on-site assistance through its trade commissioner service. The company products and exhibits will be shipped to Europe via Atlantic Container Lines, leaving Halifax on February 11, 1974.

"The promotion will not only be valuable to the participating firms but will provide an important focus point for the office of the province's agent general in London in its relationship with business and industrial interests in the United Kingdom and Europe," the minister said.

SO WHAT ELSE IS NEW?

It isn't new for any one town or municipality to take steps to rectify its mistakes or improve its position irrespective of what another or even all other towns or municipalities do. So, what else is new?

Let us first say that we have been a great admirer of the articles which frequently appear in the Chronicle Herald written by E.D. Haliburton. We feel that Mr. Haliburton writes well on so many subjects. His recent article "Digby Housing Need Urgent - What else is New?" however, gave us the impression that Mr. Haliburton thinks that every other place has a housing problem so why should Digby want to rectify their situation. With this attitude we cannot

Mr. Haliburton's comments followed a news story in the provincial and local newspaper which dealt with a housing survey in the Digby Municipality. The survey was made from the local office of the social services department and revealed substandard housing and low incomes among some of the citizens in the municipality. A total of 105 families were surveyed and a brief was presented to the annual session of the Municipal Council.

The brief stated that of the homes surveyed, only 18 had inside toilets while only 42 had running cold water and 18 had hot and cold running water. Only 11 had bathtubs and showers and some of these had no hot

It was noted only four of the surveyed families were on municipal assistance and 19 received provincial assistance. The others exist on old age security or low wages. Thirty-two wage earners made less than \$1,199 while 30 were under \$2,999. Seventeen were under \$3,999 and only three were over \$4,000. The brief urged that resolutions be adopted to upgrade living conditions "of this growing generation."

We agree with Mr. Haliburton that many of the older citizens of today had not suffered any psychological damage in being deprived of running water and modern toilet facilities but that could be because so many were deprived of these facilities at that time that it could have no psychological effect. We agree with Mr. Halburton that this situation is not unique with Digby but typical or similar in other areas. But, we ask, is this any reason that Digby shouldn't improve its own situation if it can find the means and the opportunity to do so. True, like with unemployment insurance benefits, there would be the deserving and the undeserving. It was ever thus.

We note that Mr. Haliburton said "Digby got a great deal of free publicity". Before Mr. Haliburton's article appeared there were others from Digby who took the opposite viewpoint and felt that such publicity was doing Digby no good. This viewpoint, no doubt, was in consideration of tourism and the attracting of industry but there is something to be said for facing facts and calling a spade a spade.

Digby housing need is urgent. They should do something about it. So what else is new?

RED CROSS NEEDS HELP

Red Cross is suffering from lack of sufficient public support. It is in need of volunteers and money, says C.L.Illsley, commissioner. In 1973, Red Cross, in Canada, had a deficit of \$500,000.



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

Socks, 1 Afghan, 2 Quilts, 350 Diapers and 1475 Gauze Wipes shipped. A letter was read from the secretary of the Provincial Women's Work Committee stressing the serious financial situation which had resulted in cuts in the budget and requesting whatever help the branch could give by making and selling special quilts or holding fund-raising events of any kind. In response to this appeal, it was the opinion of the members that an attractive quilt, now in the frames, might be sold by ticket at the time of the financial campaign in Mrs. George Winfield,

reporting for the Emergency Aid Committee, stated that 3 Comfort Kits had been given out at the time of the fire in Conway last month. This had depleted the supply of Comfort Kits kept on hand for such emergencies and authorization was given to buy the necessary toothpaste, tooth brushes, shaving cream, soap, etc.. required to make up 10 kits for men and women. Mrs. Winfield also reported that she had been discussing "Happiness Kits" for children with Mrs. Baltzer, Teacher-Advisor of the Red Cross Youth Group, and it was hoped they might undertake to make up some of the latter. It was further reported that a request had been received for bedding for the survivors of the recent Deep Brook fire who have now moved to Digby, and the meeting approved that this be given immediately from supplies on hand.

The Sickroom Loan report, also presented by Mrs. Winfield, showed one Hospital Bed and three pairs of Crutches

loaned during the past month, while one pair of crutches had been returned. It was further reported that a generous offer had been received from the Digby General Hospital to give the Red Cross twenty hospital beds which were to be replaced by newer ones. Inquiries had been made and it was found that the Bear River Red Cross Branch would be pleased to have 6, Weymouth Branch would take 2, also the Islands would store 2 for local use rather than having to send to Digby, while the Digby Branch would gladly take the balance. The report of the Ways and means Committee included the sum of \$30 received as donations for the use of Sickroom equipment, also \$3.28 from Afternoon Tea.

Mrs. Allan Harris reported that she and Mrs. Daniel Comeau had attended an Auxiliary meeting of Tideview Terrace and learned that they were in need of a sewing machine for their household use. Mrs. Harris suggested that, since Red Cross sewing is mainly done at home now, the extra Red Cross sewing machine might be donated to this cause. This was agreed to by the members and further arrangements left with Mrs. Harris.

The President stated that he had approached both the Digby Town and Municipal Councils in regard to Red Cross grants for the coming year, and he had been assured that both bodies would give this consideration in their upcoming budgets. This was explained to be one further effort the Red Cross is forced to make because of its financial crisis and its desire to continue all the regular Red Cross services to which people are accustomed. The importance of the March Financial Campaign is greater than ever before and it was reported that the Campaign Chairman, Mr. Fabian O'Neill, is lining up canvassers and that a committee meeting would be arranged at an early date to assist with further details.

Notice had been received regarding the Annual Meeting of the Nova Scotia Division, which is to be held in Sydney early in May. Following a brief discussion concerning the sending of one or more delegates to the meeting, it was moved that Mr. O'Neill be the official representative of the Digby Red Cross Branch.

The meeting adjourned for the customary refreshments served by the Ways and Means Committee.

Albert Melanson A Remarkable Man

from Le Petit Courrier SAULNIERVILLE - "I am glad that you have done this before I die", said Mr. Albert Melanson, a man who has distinguished himself by his service and his devotion to the

community of Clare. Monsignor Nil Theriault giving the biography of Mr. Albert Melanson of Church Point emphasized the life of service which this remarkable man has led.

On Sunday evening, February 3rd, the Minor Hockey League of Clare held a banquet in honor of Mr. Albert Melanson because of his outstanding contribution to minor hockey for about fifteen years. All of the 210 tickets were sold. The banquet took place at the Legion Hall in Saulnierville.

Msgr Nil Theriault who has known Mr. Melanson for over 52 years read his biography.

Mr. Melanson was born in Church Point but while he was still very young his father, a railroad worker, was transferred to Maine. When Albert was seven, his family returned to Church Point and in 1917 he started going to school. However, shortly after, the family moved to Ontario where Mr. Melanson became "a good hockey player" stated Msgr Theriault. The family moved again, this time to Western Canada. Mr. Melanson went to College Ste Anne where he took up Business Education.

Being a good hockey player, he was recruited by the Berwick Bruins with whom he played for two years. Following this he worked with his grandfather who was processing spruce gum in Church Point.

In 1936, Mr. Melanson became sick with tuberculosis and had to go to the Kentville Santorium. He returned home

He immediately began to take an interest in sports and even as coach for the Little Brook hockey club. As soon as the arena at College Ste Anne was built in 1958, he organized teams and until last year he managed the Minor Hockey League of Clare all by himself. This year he is being replaced by 23 coaches and 18 directors.

For health reasons, he has had to retire. He also looked after baseball, and bowling in sports but that is not all. He was president of the Acadian Festival of Clare four times, he held office in various other associations and has served as councillor and warden of the Municipality and member of the School Board of Clare.

He has been honored by the Cancer Society for which he organized campaigns and the Richelieu Club in 1966 when he retired as Postmaster. He was then selected "Man of the Year".

The people in attendance applauded greatly. At the end of the evening celebration, Mr. Melanson spoke to those present saving that he was very happy on this occasion. He stated that he was especially happy that praise had been given to him while he was living because in his words, "when one is dead, it is no good, it is too late then". He said that he was happy that he had contributed to te community because, said he, "I wanted to do it and if I were young, I would do it again."

Mr. Melanson has received gifts as tokens of his distinguished life. The warden of the municipality, Mr. Omer Blinn presented him with a plague with the names of the citizens of Clare. Mr. Victor LeBlanc presented a plaque on behalf of the Recreation Committee. The plaque

presented by the Municipality was inscribed in both French and English.

Mr. Roland Chiasson presented a gift on behalf of the Royal Bank, (the Church Point and Metghan branches), and Melbourne Blinn presented a bouquet of roses to Melanson Mrs. Albert (Catherine).

Mr. Melanson received from the Council of Minor Hockey in Nova Scotia, a pin and a cushion on which is inscribed "We support Minor Hockey". This was presented by Mr. Brian O'Bryne.

Mr. Melanson now deserves to sit down instead of running in every direction looking after organizing hockey.

Honorable Benoit Comeau also presented a gift on behalf of the province. Mr. Marcel Valotaire, president of the Legion, stated his satisfaction on having the Legion join in such a happy occasion.

cost exceed this figure then serious consideration/would be given to providing new construction for the proposed unit estimated at a cost of \$500,000 for the provision of Mental Health Services only, The report suggested that financing of the proposed project would be based on the existing government cost sharing formula requiring 20 per cent from the local community, 40 per cent outright government grant and 40 per cent based on the community's ability to pay, funded by the government.

In view of the federal and provincial funds available for upgrading health care facilities consideration was further suggested to develop a more ambitious program for the Digby area. Such a program would provide a much broader level of services for the future delivery of health care services to an expanding community. Such a program would include the provision of 25 to 30 nursing care beds for our aging population; provide 13 to 15 inpatient mental health beds and day care facilities; an enlarged Public Health Service area; adequate administrative office space as well as recreational and group therapy areas;

adequate office space and consulting rooms for welfare and social services and other facilities that may be recommended by the hospital consultants designed to meet community needs.

Such a scheme would require the replacement of the existing old hospital facilities and would, of necessity, require a reassessment of the developmental plan now under consideration by the Committee of the Joint Boards, the report claimed. The community is rapidly expanding with regard to housing and commercial facilities which will undoubtedly result in a population increase, thus placing additional demands upon existing health facilities, the chairman advised. New construction, carried out with the approval of the Health Services Commission, operating under the direction of and as an extension of the Digby General Hospital as an insured service, would probably cost in the vicinity of \$750,000 to \$800,000, Mr. Purdy stated. Under such a development the local communities would be responsible for 20 per cent of the total cost or approximately \$150,000 to \$160,000.

Insurance on boats was found to be costly when used for tourist recreation for the short summer season.

It was hopeful that the whole matter would be cleared up by June 1974 by the installation of proper equipment but costs other delays could and prolong the correction. The National Sea Products Ltd., which had been ordered to clean up the Mink Cove plant or close up were prepared to install a scrubber and filter at a cost of \$85,000 but it was found that a salt water scrubber would not be effective and only a reagent scrubber would be acceptable for reduction of air and water contamination at Mink Cove. The units of odor measured were 600 which with the installation of proper equipment could be reduced to 200 when smell could merely be detected but with recycling by dryer exhaust this could be reduced to 100. The total program would cost in the vicinity of \$150,000. With the increase in consumption of fish meal and the increase in prices, it was felt by government representatives that the operation could be profitable with the improved housekeeping and raw material handling.

"LETS GET PARENTS BACK INTO EDUCATION" EDUCATION WEEK MARCH 3 - 9. hy Ron Fraser

Education Week: What special significance does it have for the people of Digby County?

During the period March 3-9 it is hoped that the citizens of Digby County will take the time to objectively consider education and all its implications.

Education is a force which reaches into the homes of nearly all families in Digby County and plays a big part in determining the life styles of all members of , the household Education determines what time we will get up in the morning, when we eat, when the chores will get done, when we go on vacation, how much our tax rate will be, what the topic of conversations will be whenever members of the family get together. Many cultural activities are determined by education, how the children think what friends they have, what careers they will follow on leaving school.

Many of these activities occur, with very little forethought given to them. It is only when a crisis situation crisis such as an increase in taxes, or when a son or daughter fails that parents become concerned Then it is too late to look at education objectively since thinking becomes clouded with emotion and the school then takes on a very different perspective then that which it would normally possess

Eduction Week is a period of time set aside so that we may inform ourselves as to what is happening inside those school houses which we pass by daily, yet seldom seem able to find the time to visit

Education today is taking many directions. With the freedom and flexibility given to teachers and students, change has become the word which best describes this concept. Education was formally seen as a static process one in which there was very little input on the part of those teachers or students Education was seen as a process which involved the rote learning of a body of facts which were confined within the covers of five or six books. Now education has taken on new dimensions. Many more people are now involved in the development of the learning environment. Teachers have the freedom to develop their own programs, while students are setting up their own individual learning experiences with the guidance of the professional teacher

Change in education is taking place at a very rapid rate, but those people who should be most concerned and most informed about education are being left behind. These are the parents of the children, those people who are the printary educators in the lives of children. Education in the public school will be of little value unless the parents who begin the process with their children from the time they are born maintain their involvement until the student has left this formal process

Education Week is a time when parents - one of the three most important ingredients in education will be given a chance to become involved, to start thinking about education, to see what is happening in the school, and to take an interest in what their son or daughter is doing

During the coming week the Guidance Department at Digby Regional High School in co-operation with the teachers in the other various departments will be involved in a number of media programs which will enable the parents to become better acquainted with what is happening in the public school.



The aids consist of posters on various types of pollution, brochure, teachers' notes and lesson outlines. Mr. Bagnell expects to personally introduce these packages to as

many schools as possible. Following visits to schools, Mr. Bagnell will provide school authorities with sets of the information materials for distributions and classroom instruction.

Intended for classroom use are a set of four graphic posters and allied teachers' notes with suggested lesson plans. The posters depict pollution causes and remedies in the areas of solid wastes, soil, air and water. In addition, the booket titled "Our Maritime Environment"

acts as a source guide and a comprehensive outline of the environmental problems facing the Maritime provinces. This booklet will be left in quantities for distribution to the school children as will the popular "Captain Enviro" comic book which deals with similar problems of ecological protection and is geared to the under twelve-year-old set. A supply of handy biodegradeable litter bags will fill out the package.

This material is the result of an extensive collaborative effort on the part of governmental information agencies of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick under the direction of the Environment Ministers Committee of the Council of Maritime Premiers. Cooperation through the pooling of efforts and the economies of scale in producing this educational material has resulted in extensive savings in effort and costs.



National eneral Pictures acquired the ghts to this film and another ee starrer, ''The Big Boss.'' ubsequently, NGP changed the ame of "The Big Boss;; to Fists of Fury" and put that to release in April. The ngular "Fist of Fury" was hanged to "The Iron Hand" nd is now being called "The hinese Connection." Despite Il this confusion, "Connection" as been well-dubbed into inglish and looks handsome in s wide-screen and color resentation. In retrospect, the roduction is one of the best of he current crop and already is oing very brisk business.

Set in Shanghai's Inernational Settlement, the ctors are in modern dress. among the attractions are a Chinese inspector who esembles an American cop, an English-speaking Russian oxer, a nude dancer and a ballad for the hero. Raymond chow produced the Golden Harvest film in Hong Kong. Starring Bruce Lee, Miao Ker Hsiu, James Tien, Robert

In 1908, Chen Chen (Bruce Lee) arrives in Shanghai to attend the funeral of his beloved boxing teacher, the famous Ho Yuan-chia, founder of the Ching Wu School of Boxing. A Chinese, who works for the Japanese Martial Arts Ass'n, delivers a challenge to the boxing school. It is a challenge for destruction rather than of battle. Chen, angered by his insult, immediately goes to the arts club and single handedly beats up the entire membership. In a series of bloody confrontations, Chen avenges his teacher's death. His students, anxious to revenge the murders of their friends, are about to march on the Japanese association when the Japanese consul arrives with the chief of police. THE FAMILY

Charles Bronson has become a major international star, although he is still more appreciated in Europe than in the U.S. He received the 1972 Golden Globe Award as the most popular actor in the world. He recently has appeared in such diverse films as "Someone Behind the Door," "Chato's Land," "Red Sun", "The Valachi Papers" and "The Mechanic". As in the latter film, he again plays a professional killer. This time he stars with his wife, Jill Ireland. and Telly Savalas in a tough boss role. The family refers to a syndicate and not to the Mafia. Bronson is excellent as the murderer who finally becomes emotionally upset with some qualms of conscience. There is plenty of action, including a good chase scene. Director Segio Sollima brought his Italian company to New Orleans and St. Thomas Island for location shooting. Coproduced by Unidis-Fono Roma-Universal France, it was hot in widescreen and Technicolor. This is a fastpaced film with enough twists to

keep the audience engrossed. Charles Bronson is a professional killer. His victims had always been impersonal targets, but on his last assignment he looked directly into the eyes of his victim. This experience haunts him and gives him some pangs of conscience. He is in love with Jill Ireland, the girlfriend of reacketeer Coogan, who gave him his last contract. Coogan later tries, to have Bronson killed, but fails, after which Bronson fatally tracks him down. He searches for Jill, but finds her married to Telly Savalas, head of the syndicate, who wants Bronson to join their "family".

A voter must be 18 years old, or will attain that age on or before polling day; must be a Canadian citizen or other British subject: must be resident in the province for 12 months immediately preceding the date of the writ. and in the Polling Division on the date of the writ. The Act states clearly what a resident is, what a place of residence, is whether the voter be married unmarried, school teacher or spouse or dependent of a school teacher, serving in armed forces or a student or whatever class he is under. These latter details are too extensively stated to copy here. Enough here to say that the information is readily obtainable

The important thing is, however, that every person eligible to vote should vote in order to maintain a democratic country. If there is any doubt, go to the trouble to find the answer to your question "Do I Have A Vote?", study the issues, weigh the pros and cons and vote intelligently. Your choice is your own but do make use of your vote.

Educational Revolution

Yes: we are having an educational revolution. Many old practices have become folder for the guillottne Marr new practices have been born Yes, the revolution will conmine. Yes, as it all such events there are those who are for some against and many neural apathenci

The basic cause of our revolution is a shift in philosophy which considers the pupil in a more student centered or humanistic position. This contemporary new is based on the premise that the school should be able to present to each individual student a program. which is most suited it individual interests, abilities and needs as perceived by the student and interpreted by schools relative to contemporary society


How this philosophy is interpreted is reflected in a variety of ways and a number of different concepts have appeared Some approaches could easily be termed radical or extreme as in the Summerhill version which would have a curriculum largely dictated by the students. Few would go this far Several so-called free schools" have appeared. Most public schools have or are developing more humanistic or student centered schools that have "continuous progress curriculum", "individualized instruction", "vertical grouping" OF classrooms" i.e. open wall; programs.

Some of this philosophy is favored in the Digby Schools. At the elementary level there is develpment in the direction of continuous promotion and the consideration of eliminating "grades". A discussion of this aspect has been presented by the Supervisor of Curriculum and others. In the high school there is greatly increased emphasis on the individual resulting in a broadened curriculum offering a greatly increased flexibility with regard to subject selection. That flexibility extends into the various subjects providing for options within the subjects themselves. Students are able to proceed more at their own rate. It is no longer true that our students must repeat entire grades because they "failed" one or more subjects. With subject promotion they are able to proceed uninterrupted where they are having success and to go more slowly or repeat in areas of difficulty. Students at high school are also free to move across traditional boundaries of general. academic, technical and business education courses as never before so as to select those programs which best meet their own needs. This places greater responsibility on the student for governing his own actions and for selecting programs that are in keeping with his interests, abilities and needs. It also places an added burden on each of us as tax-

These changes are not without their critics. Constructive criticism is welcomed. as always, and we frequently wish for more feedback from all those concerned with education. And that should be everybody.

There are several other developments: open school board meetings, the formation of a school band, broadened extra-curricular activities program at the high school, physical education at the elementary level, elementary reading program, music in the elementary schools, our involvement as of January of this year in a learning adjustment

government exerts forces on the schools and so do local special interest groups such as advisory and citizen committees. These forces provide the checks and balances that result in schools primarily reflecting the society they serve. Large curriculum issues are more often determined by forces outside of the institution than by educators who more often are the facilitators or instruments of social action. Their role is to help prepare children for the society in which they exist. I say "help prepare" as the home and There is danger in our current

philosophy. Schools could become RIGIDLY flexible. If we are to provide for the needs of all individuals then must we not provide for those who will function best in a "structured environment"? We should also recognize that there is much in our past achievement that is still relevant and maintain that at all costs. We must guarantee an sincere effort to provide a high quality in all that is a part of the whole school. We must attempt to maintain an atmosphere of stability as a whole and dignity for the individual while all about there is at maximum level.

There could be many reasons or answers, but if a parent is interested in his child. he most definitely should show this attitude by participating in some way. Perhaps we will try again.

The basic goal in school systems have not been changed; it is to inform

people, so that they may have a broader span of knowledge and experience. One must learn, also, how to manage with other persons; you see their reactions, they see yours. It is a time of experiencing group ideas and ideals.

It must be taken into consideration that there is much to learn in these times. Attitudes, theories, world situations change almost daily.

Discipline. Another controversial topic. I feel that in order to have any change in this area, the whole society must change. It has done just that; lowering of the voting age. the alcohol consuming age, the socalled sexual revolution, and so on. The freedoms we students have may seem trivial to others, but important for us. The dress now includes slacks for young woman, which is particularly good in the winter, not to mention the fact they allow for more comfort. We have a student government, but to be very truthful, for truth is obvious, all important final decision lay in the hands of the administration.



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Petite Passage Ferry Boat Christened

The Department of Highways' new ferry boat, for service at Petite Passage. Digby County, was dedicated christened on Tuesday, March 5th at 3 p.m. The ceremony took place at pier 36 on the Halifax waterfront. The vessel was christened by Mrs. Joseph Casey, wife of the MLA for Digby County. In charge, was Minister of Highways, Leonard L. Pace, Q.C., and the president of Halifax Metalworkers Limited, D.J. Oulton, whose firm constructed the boat. This type of ferry has been developed by the Department of Highways and the present boat was designed by the marine architectural firm of Evans. and Yeatman Endal

(Associates) Ltd., of Halifax. The new ferry boat will carry 15 cars, double the capacity of the vessel she will replace. The old ferry, known as the Petite Ferry II, is scheduled to be moved to the Grand Passage run when the new vessel goes into full service at Petite

Driven by two 185 horse power Caterpillar motors, the new ferry boat has high manouverability seaworthiness and is specifically designed to cope with the tide and current conditions encountered at Petite Passage. It features the right angle drive propulsion system that allows the propellers to steer the craft.

Pension Payments Rise In April

Increases in Old Age Security pension and Guaranteed Income Supplement payments. effective in April, were announced recently by Health and Welfare Minister Marc Lelonde. This represents the second quarterly escalation based on the cost of living, as provided for in Bill C-219.

The basic Old Age Security pension will rise in April to \$110.09 from \$108.14.

The maximum Guaranteed Income Supplement for a single person or a married person whose spouse is not a pensioner will go up to \$77.22 from its current \$75.85. Added to the basic OAS pension, this payment will produce a monthly total of \$187.31.

The maximum supplement for a married couple, both pensioners, will increase to \$68.58 each from the present \$67.37. Added to the basic pension, this will give each pensioner \$178.67 for a combined payment to the couple of \$357.34.

Mr. Lalonde estimated that, in April, more than 1,870,000 Canadians will be receiving OAS payments, and of that number, some 1,079,000 will be receiving the supplementary payments.



Instead of eighty per cent of the population being rural only twenty per cent are living in rural areas at present and one out of four move each year.

Organizations with competing groups and multiplicity tend to fracture a community, he remarked. He went so far as to say that religious denominationalism adds to the fracturing of society.

He noted the change of society where it has now become almost totally a welfare state and felt the V.O.N. was in a position to keep the humane aspects in a society so totally governed by government. He felt the organization should be saved from being swallowed up in bureauracy and the loss of identity and that people should have a right to decide policy for their own community. In referring to the pilot project with the V.O.N., Mr. Butler welcomed the joint project but felt it important to be in on writing of terms.

The paradox to the fracturing process he concluded is that the very things which fracture society also have qualities to heal society.

Mr. Snow accused the present government of having something to hide in calling an election at this time. He said most people are wondering what it really is and what kind of a mess the province is in financially. He said there were three budgets in the Regan government while only one had been accounted for and no indication given of where the taxpayer's money is going. He felt the people should have had answers to these questions before an election was called. The provincial budget, he said, had risen from 300 million dollars to 609 million dollars in? the past year.

He spoke of the Nova Scotia Power Corporation which is in debt millions of dollars and wondered who will pay the bill and whether the rate of powerwill be doubled as most people feel it will. It was reported that the corporation was losing a

million dollars a week. Another "mystery" referred to by Mr. Snow was the financial situation of the Sydney steel plant. Why all the secrecy, he asked.

Mr. Snow charged that the increased spending of the Liberals and their taxation policies contribute to inflation and the high cost of living. Mr. Snow criticized Premier

Regan's lack of concern for the fishing industry and decried the proposed tanker route off western Nova Scotia which would have dealt a "death blow" to fishing in Digby, Yarmouth and Shelburne. He spoke of Walton Cook, a Liberal

member for Lunenburg Centre in the last House, who was a good chairman when serving on the fisheries committee but ways were found by the Liberals to ignore his policies. Mr. Cook, who was kicked out was defeated by James Kinley in the Liberal nomination at Lunenburg last week.

Mr. Snow cited members of the Liberal cabinet who were disenchanted with their party and resigned or left for various reasons.

Mr. Snow said that John Buchanan, the opposition leader is concerned for the people and will bring honesty, integrity and responsibility to the government. His platform he said, will include financial assistance to small industry.

Mr. Nichols, in addressing the audience, said he goes along with the P.C. program of the province bearing full cost of education to relieve municipal taxation but he feen the administration should be with the school boards. He said, to encourage the building and repairing of homes he would like to see the seven per cent sales tax on building materials eliminated. He supported the policy of full rights to offshore minerals and felt basic industries like farming and fishing should achieve acceptable standards.

Mr. Nichols, a contractor, has had wide experience in many fields. He had an interesting and brave experience in service for his country, he worked in jobs related to the tourist industry, did fishing, transporting and has been active in many community endeavours.

If you wish to have your name added to the list or corrected on the list of electors before ordinary polling day, April 2, you can appear before a Revising Officer on Thursday, March 21, and Friday, March 22, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., from 2 to 6 p.m. and from 7 to 9

Some people missed by the enumerators are registered by Revising Agents. If Returning Officers are aware that an area of a constituted has been missed by enumerators, they appoin one or more pairs of Revising Agents, each member of a pair representing a different political organization, to register persons in that area. These names are sent to the Revising Officer in the revisal districts set up by the Chief Electoral Officer.

At the revisal sittings representative from each political organization is permitted by the revising officer to be present and to object to or support applications.

If a person cannot appear during revisal sittings he can appoint anyone as "agent" whose name appears on the list of electors in the polling division for which that person is applying to have his name registered. This "agent" if he appears before the Revising Officer with a form completed by the applicant naming him as agent can apply for that person.

A person absent from the district during the revisal sitting can have a relative by blood or marriage or an employer appear at the revisal sitting with an affidavit signed by the applicant apply for the absentee's name to be registered on the list of voters. Whatever you do, be sure to vote on April 2 and do it with the respect due so an important obligation

PREMIER DEALS WITH HIGH COST OF LIVING

interest rates.

Mr. Regan claimed the provincial government had kept down the cost of living but recognized that many things like meat, pork, cars, refrigerators etc. are imported and when inflation hits the areas from which these are imported there is little that Nova Scotia can do. One way to combat the high cost of living he said was to cushion the impact on people with fixed or low incomes and the disadvantaged. This has been done, he said and will not be stopped just because an election is coming.

In dealing with the energy crisis the premier noted that the price of oil didn't jump higher because of the federal government subsidizing the cost of oil to Eastern Canada and in Nova Scotia oil companies were persuaded to roll back fuel prices.

Mr. Regan said the Liberal government would not ruin the provinces finances by making promises it cannot afford. They will, he said, say where the money comes from and how. Despite the adverse cry of the opposition, the premier claimed the finances of the government are good and Nova Scotia potential high. The gross product has surpassed three billion dollars, unemployment is down with 16,000 new jobs having been created. The population of Nova Scotia has passed 800,000 not because of larger families or influx of outsiders but because young people can find jobs at home. Minimum wage has been increased the premier reminded his audience and will be further raised to a living wage.

Mr. Regan in reviewing the past remarked on the elimination of poll taxes and elimination of sales tax on clothing which provided twelve to fourteen million less for highways, education and health but finances were in such good condition that they could do without the twelve to fourteen million.

Mr. Regan was introduced by the newly nominated candidate. Joe Casey and thanked by Emanuel Adelaar, president of the Digby Liberal Association, who presided at the meeting.

Builders Of Bridges Or Walls -Jordan

The World Day of Prayer Service in Smith's Cove was held at the Smith's Cove United Baptist Church on Friday evening, March 1. Women from the host church, St. Anne's Anglican Church, United and Roman Catholic Churches participated in this special walls.

Speaker for the service was Rev. Wallace H. Jordan, pastor of the host church. In his message on the theme, "Make Us Builders of Peace",

he brought out the fact that we are all builders. In introducing his message, Mr. Jordan pointed out that a bridge is a structure built over a river or a gorge to provide a way across from one side to another; that its purpose is to provide freedom of travel and access to new areas of discovery. On the other hand, a wall is a structure built between or around a certain thing serving to enclose. divide, protect, hold back or hide; that its purpose is to exclude the outside and protect or hide the inside.

In one sense or another, he said, we are all builders. Some of us have been building bridges in the process of growing up. We have been opening ourselves to the new possibilities, experiences and realities which God places before us. He went on to say that in this processof building bridges we are diccovering the new freedom and purpose that Christ gives to our daily lives.

Others, however, have been

buliding walls which is basically a defensive style of life. We have got to protect what we have known to be. People are not to be trusted. The status quo must be maintained. And the more we feel threatened, the higher and thicker we build the

Mr. Jordan stated that, to be builders of peace, we must be bulding bridges, not walls. Bridges that enable us to extend over the troublesome areas that causé division and dissection, instead of walls which only intensify the situation.

In speaking on the text, Mathew 5:9, one of the beatitudes: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God," he spoke of the word "peacemakers" péace builders as being a very unique word. He stated that this is the only time it occurs in all of Scripture and its use in the ancient world was limited, if not altogether absent.

Mr. Jordan went on to say that a peacemaker, or builder of peace, is of necessity a person who is peaceable - whose very nature and disposition exemplifies the characteristic of peace.

Mr. Jordan concluded with the question "Is that your prayer tonight Lord, make me a builder of peace"? Being a builder of peace is more than a wish or desire for peace, it is an activity. It is experiencing the peace of God in our own hearts and minds and allowing the Spirit of God to make builders of





Time To Abolish "Grades"

In Our Elementary Schools



By J.E. Ritcey Supervisor of Curriculum, Digby

Everybody is very familiar with the "graded school system" where pupils, grouped mainly by chronological age, are expected to remain in a given grade for one year. They are taught content material considered appropriate for children at that grade level. Associated with this structure is the idea of a pupil being "promoted" or "failed" at the end of the school year, depending upon the child's achievement.

Two new, closely related concepts of school organization: Continuous Progress and the Nongraded School System, emerged during the 1960's and have proven to help create better student-centered schools. Both recognize differences among students and recommend a school organization that provides for the unbroken, upward progress of all pupils. The Nongraded School replaces grades with a continuous procedure for this upward progress.

Schools in our Digby System began to adopt the principles of Continuous Progress about six years ago. Since that time, the goals associated with these principles have become increasingly closer to realization in two basic subject areas: language arts (integrating

reading, speaking, listening, spelling and writing), and

mathematics. School work in language arts has been organized into levels rather than grades. A level is a smaller, complete unit of work than the old, year-long grade unit. The shorter levels enable the teacher to make closer and more frequent checks on a child's individual, educational progress. Depending upon the reading program selected by a particular school, there may be a maximum of from 9 to 16 levels included in the seven years during which a child is enrolled in the elementary program. Curricular materials in other subject fields are also now being published in "level" organization rather than "grade" orientation.

We know that children do not learn at the same rate and in similar ways. They have different rates of progress and development. Even the rate of learning for a particular child will undergo changes. In the Continuous Progress Program, the pupil does the work required for a particular level in accordance with his ability, learning style, rate of learning, and interest.

The abolition of grades or the implementation of the Nongraded School Organization is the next step to better facilitating the development of Continuous Progress. There are , no failures under this plan. The repetition of a particular grade by a pupil, who is for the moment learning more slowly than others, is eliminated. The accompanying boredom and sense of failure are abolished as well. The pupil, at the end of the year, will have completed certain levels of assigned work at his individual rate of learning. He therefore, should have a better understanding of the subject and be achieving at a level commensurate with his

The child's progress is assessed through continual daily evaluations by his teacher and through regulated testing given at the completion of a level. Promotion certificates (report cards) issued to pupils at the end of the year to take

particular class may be a member of a group that has completed four or five levels in one year while another may be with a group that has completed two levels. Even though both pupils are said to be in the same "grade", they certainly will not be doing the same work at the end of the year. These pupils will change classrooms and teachers at the beginning of a new school year and will continue to progress from where they left off in June. The "grade concept", therefore, has no functional purpose from an educational point of view. The so-called idea of "grading", in addition to no longer having any meaningful relevance, has in conveyed misconceptions and incorrect information to parents. It may, therefore, be concluded that since: 1. the basic school program is becoming organized into levels, and 2. the term longer "grade" communicates a true picture of where a child may be achieving, there is no reason to continue the "graded school system". The grade, like such antiquated devices as the zeppelin and the steam locomotive, has become

We have not been getting what we should have in western Nova Scotia and valley, even before the last election, said Mr. Sheehy. The present government has done even worse. 
When elected we intend to take the cost of education off the property taxation and we have carefully studied and are convinced that it can be done without a raise in taxation.

Charles Haliburton, who arrived late at the meeting due to commitments in Ottawa during the day and connectons by plane made it difficult for him to arrive before the time he did, said Mr. Haliburton. Cattle prices have dropped, stated Mr. Haliburton, from \$10 to \$15 per hundred pounds and this means a loss of \$160 per head of cattle to the farmers in some cases. The farmers find it too great a risk to raise cattle with the fluctuation of prices, to raise cattle for the market. The market is not stable and the risk is grat, market is glutted with American cattle, said Mr. Haliburton.

Last year a consultant firm was hired by the federal government to make a study on the replacement of the Bluenose. It was to be ready for the month of October and nothing has been presented about this report yet. The federal government found the report to be in a horrible mess and has not been able to unscramble it at this date. The provincial government has committed itself of a very large sum of money towards a new replacement ship. government finds it easy to make a commitment and the other cannot do so.

The PC party in Clare has a hard road to go in this election. A great deal of effort will have to be put out by you people and Mr. Doucet, your candidate to take this seat. It can be done.



Information Canada

Q. Is the old age security pension paid to persons residing outside Canada? A. If you are entitled to the old age security pension and you have lived in Canada for 20 years since the age of 18, you can receive the pension whether or not you live in Canada. Otherwise, you are entitled to the pension for only six months after the date of your departure.

Q. What is the purpose of the **Public Service Commission?** A. The Public Service Commission's main responsibility is to provide the personnel requirements of the federal government's departments and agencies.

Q. I want to take my portable radio when I go to Europe Will there be a problem at Customs on my return?

A. Before leaving Canada, travellers who are taking valuable items with them which bear serial numbers, as: such cameras, binoculars, radios, portable TV's, etc., may have them identified at local Customs offices or at the port of departure to facilitate their re-entry without payment of





The Koran, the Midrash, the Mishnah and the works of Philo, Josephus and Eusebius were searched to fill in the 30-year period of Moses' life that is omitted in the book of

Filmed against natural backgrounds, the film eloquently traces the story of Moses - from the time his mother set him afloat on the Nile, through his years as a young general in the Pharach's army, to his betrayal and exile, and finally, his deliverance of the Israelites and his receiving God's Commandment.

The dramatization of Moses' life presents such spectacular sequences as the Plagues, the building of an Egyptian treasure city, the parting of the Red Sea, the Burning Bush, and Moses receiving the Lord's Commandments on Mount Sinai.

The entraordinary Red Sca episode took three years to execute and consumed more than \$1,660,000 of the film's mammoth budget. The fearsome panorama of the army consumed by towering walls of raging water was made possible by the wizardry of Academy Award winner John P. Fulton, one of Hollywood's most gifted special effects geniuses.

On location shooting began on October 14, 1954, in Egypt and followed the path of Moses across the Red Sea, the Wilderness of Shur and the Wilderness of Sin, to the top of the Mount of Moses in the Sinai range where Moses received Gods laws, through the months of production in Hollywood extending well into 1966.

More Relief for Taxpayers

Premier Gerald A. Regan announced that an additional \$10.6 million is being made available to the municipalities of Nova Scotia for the benefit of the municipal taxpayers.

Mr. Regan said that a payment of \$7 per capita will be made to each city, town and municipality in the province. These funds are to be applied by the Municipal governments to the reduction of tax rates which would otherwise have been payable for the 1974 year.

Payments totalling \$5,522,720 will be made within the next few weeks, so that the Municipal taxpayer will obtain the benefit on the next property tax billings issued by the municipalities.

In addition, the premier said that a further \$5 million will be appropriated, and set aside to help finance the cost of municipal programs and projects.

"Several departments, including municipal affairs finance and environment are presently reviewing various types of programs and capital projects, and will be developing criteria for the allocation of this fund", Mr. Regan said.

"Distribution will be based on ability to pay, the need for infrastructure and provision of priority municipal services. The projects will not be restricted to any one type of facility or program, but will include those more urgently required in the community."

Last year, the Provincial Government made a special grant of \$10.2 million to all municipal units on a per capita basis at the rate of \$13 for every man, woman and child in the province.

Mr. Regan said the Minister of Municipal Affairs and the Minister of Finance have had discussions with the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities, and the per capita basis of distribution was strongly recommended by its executive.

The meeting closed with a hymn and bendiction.

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
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IT FINALLY HAPPENED

In the near future a group with local participation will start the upgrading of the airport. This is hoped to be accomplished in such a manner as not to be a cost to the municipality.

John Buchanan **Visits School**

John Buchanan, leader of the opposition in the provincial House and a candidate for the P.C. party in the provincial election of April 2, was in Digby on Thursday and visited Grade 12 in the multi-purpose room at the Digby Regional High School where he answered questions posed by some fifty students of which a good percentage are of voting age.

Rupert Haley, vice-principal, presided at the informal gathering and John (Jack) Nichols, Digby P.C. candidate for the election introduced Mr. Buchanan.

The first problem posed came from a Digby Neck student who claimed that the highway down Digby Neck was not even fit for a tractor for the past three or four months. He claimed a new car would not last long on such a road full of potholes and claimed they contributed to accidents. Mr. Buchanan said. n course, mai weamer ditions effect roads and the secret is to get at them quickly enough in the Spring. He informed the students of several transport and highway items in the P.C. election platform. He said a P.C. government will establish a department of transport to develop and implement adequate transport policies and which will assume all responsibilities of the present department of highways. This will include all maintenance, operation and capital construction on all highways in Nova Scotia. Public transit, he said, must be available on trunk roads where required for the benefit of all citizens.

The next question dealt with land ownership. Mr. Buchanan said his party was concerned about the ownership of large tracts of Nova Scotia land by nonresidents and that a P.C. government would establish a land purchasereview board. All land sales to nonresidents would be reported to the board which would have the right, if public interest warrants, to purchase the property. The board would protect the rights of Nova Scotians and insure the individual right of the property

owner by a right price. To the question of student

loan, Mr. Buchanan claimed that students as well as others are victims of the high cost of living and therefore, the student loans and bursaries should progressively increase according to the cost of living.

Questioned as to finding the money to pay all the items on the P.C. platform, Mr. Buchanan said the program is estimated to cost \$90,000,000 and which would not be implemented in one year but by four year phases. In the past three years, he remarked the budget had increased from \$300 million to \$600 million so it would be reasonable to be able to raise the \$90 million in four years. He drew attention to the natural revenue which increases each year, \$45 million equalization (new money) over and above the 1973-74 grants and other sources of revenue.

Mr. Buchanan said that a P.C. government would take over full cost of education and administration of justice leaving the municipal governments responsible only for service to property and thereby reducing property tax.

When asked his stand on health in Nova Scotia, the P.C. leader informed the students that the P.C.'s are committed to assume the cost of prescription drugs for all Nova Scotians. They will provide free dental care for school children, those on social assistance, senior citizens and the low income people.

Mr. Haley brought up the subject of the nuclear power plant which had been proposed for Stoddarts Island. Mr. Buchanan expressed himself as being totally opposed to the construction in South West Nova Scotia where lobster beds are located and other fishing is

The P.C. party, Mr. Buchanan said would concentrate on secondary industry as the province is not big enough, nor has it enough money for heavy industry. They would, he said, take advantage of the resources in agriculture, fish and forest. So often, the speaker said, big industry gives employment not to the ordinary Nova Scotia, but to outside technicians.

This is education week. We repeat that despite the fact that there are those who will try to refute that statement with the comment "the editor is a whole week behind the times, last week was Education Week". But what week isn't education week. The soaring costs of education is being aired particularly now before the election and the pinch of "education taxes" is before most of us on a weekly basis. There are children to get away to school each day, home work to be dealt with, provision made for school supplies and activity and teachers and children spend hours each week under what has become our master - education. So each week is education week. There is no denying it. 

Wants Third Coast **Guard Vessel**

C. E. Haliburton, M. P., M. P. for South Western Nova has made representations to the Minister of Transport for an additional coast guard vessel based in the Yarmouth area.

In a letter directed to Honorable Jean Marchand, Mr. Haliburton noted that the department of transport presently operates Coast Guard Vessel 101 and 102, operating from Clark's Harbour and Tiverton respectively. By the shortest route these boats are approximately four hours running time from each other. In the event of some marine incident occurring somewhere halfway between the two locations there would be a 2hour lapse in getting assistance in the event that the closest boat was not already engaged.

It was reported that the Coast Guard Vessel 101 carried out approximately 65 missions during the months of November, December and January. With that degree of use obviously there are frequent periods when that vessel is engaged in such a way that its ability to answer a call would be impaired, said Mr. Haliburton who assumes that the same applies to Coast Guard Vessel 102.

He said that both these boats are located in the center of active fishing areas so that they are not only required to cover

the area between them, but in addition, they necessarily cover the areas in the opposite directions.

Fishermen operating between West Pubnico on the east and Yarmouth Bar on the west cannot rely on assistance from these vessels to the extent which would be desirable in order to reasonably insure their safety, he remarked as he urged the third Coast Guard Vessel for the area.

Seek Trap Landing Gear

It was not a hurried voyage for Joshua Slocum. As she is not a conventional sea going vessel, she harboured each night. The captain and crew members kept an eye on the unpredictable weather conditions usually experienced at this season of the year.

Crew members are going through a period of training on the Petite Passage.

The Joshua Slocum is a special type of vessel developed by the Department of Highways and was built by Halifax Metalworkers Limited. She was designed by the marine architectural firm of Evans. Yeatman and Endal (Associates) Limited.

She carries 15 cars, is driven by two 185 horsepower Caterpillar motors and has high manouverability and seaworthiness. She is specifically designed to cope with the tide and current conditions encountered at Petite Passage. The ferry features a right angle drive propulsion system, allowing the propellers to steer the vessel.

The estimated total cost of the Joshua Slocum was approximately \$450,000.



New Move To Improve Fish Quality

A further step in the Fisheries and Marine Service program to upgrade the quality of fish was announced today by Fisheries Minister Jack Davis.

Effective immediately, all new fishing vessels must have fish holds and other fish handling facilities of approved design and construction to ensure sanitary conditions and to protect fish quality. These requirements will also apply to vessels being converted under government subsidy. Briefly, the surfaces of all fish storage areas will be smooth, of noncorrodible material, and designed to facilitate proper cleaning. Wood will not be an acceptable surface material

Federal M ulticulturalism Grant

The Minister of State for Multiculturalism, the Honourable Stanley Haidasz, announced the awarding of 27 new grants representing a total of \$132,802.42 as part of the federal multiculturalism program.

This program is designed to promote an awareness of the country's multicultural diversity and to encourage Canadians to share their cultural heritage with their fellow citizens.

except in the case of open, undecked vessels such as trap boats and dories, having no below fish storage area. In the latter instance, wood covered with an approved durable

coating will be acceptable. In addition, a program to improve the handling of fish on existing vessels is to be introduced in stages over the next several years. Meetings are to be held with fishermen and vessel owners to discuss the problems of improving the quality of fish and the implementation of a national vessel inspection program for the protection of fish quality.

"Every year millions of pounds of fish are landed that are of such poor quality as to be rejected in the processing plants." Mr. Davis said. "We must stop this waste of valuable food resource."

"We must encourage improved design and construction of fish holds and provide fishermen with all possible assistance to ensure the proper handling of fish on vessels, at landing sites, and in vehicles transporting fish to plants. These measures, together with good operating practices such as adequate chilling of fish, can eliminate unnecessary wastage and increase overall returns to industry and the individual fisherman," Mr. Davis added.

A 4.5 million dollar federal program announced last year provides financial assistance for additional ice making, ice storage and other fish chilling facilities for use by fishermen.

Freight Subsidies Increased

The Federal Government has agreed that current rail and highway carriers' westbound subsidies on selected commodities from points within the four Atlantic provinces will be increased from 30 to 50 percent on a wide selection of goods commencing on or about April 15, 1974, Transport Minister Jean Marshall announced today.

The higher subsidy will cover selected commodities ranging from raw fish to trailers. The subsidy region includes the area south of the St. Lawrence River and east of the line drawn along Highway 23 from Levis, Quebec, to the United States

The Federal Government will lower the overall subsidies on rail and truck freight shipments within the Atlantic Region from 17½ to 15 percent early this year. This is a part of a reallocation of the total subsidy resources to make the overall

program more balanced.

The 20 percentage points increase on selected outbound goods is being given on condition that rail and highway carriers will make appropriate reductions in their freight rates within the Atlantic Region on the westbound movement only.

In addition to agricultural products, raw fish and nonprocessed goods, the other items included in the list of selective goods were chosen basically because they give products manufactured in the four Atlantic provinces a wider market in Central Canada.

Included in the selective list are such items as furniture, bricks, paper and related products, carpets, electrical components, textiles and glass products, trailers and prefabricated homes, plastic and resin products, alcoholic beverages, tires and automobile assembled in the four Atlantic provinces.

Canada Withdraws Reservation

Canada has withdrawn its objection to the ICNAF (International Commission for Northwest Atlantic Fisheries) subarea 4X (Southwestern Nova Scotia) haddock proposal, H. Douglas Johnston, Regional Director of Fisheries for the Maritimes Region, announced

Mr. Johnston explained that "this means the haddock spawning area on Brown's Bank is now legally closed to all vessels of the sixteen member nations, including the United States." "It also means," he added, "that, effective March 19, all elements of the Canadian fleet must abide by the 5,000 pound or 10 per cent by weight, whichever is greater, per trip incidental catch haddock allowance."

Mr. Johnston went on to explain that "This action was necessary by Canada in order not to jeopardize the haddock conservation program which has been in effect since 1970 and is now beginning to show some positive results in so far as the rebuilding of the Brown's Bank haddock stock is concerned." He stated further that "as long as Canada's objection remained in force, there was a very real danger that prior to the expiration of the 60-day period provided by the convention for the Northwest Atlantic Fisheries, other nations might find it necessary to raise further objection to the haddock proposal. Another objection would delay the coming into force of the haddock closed area on Brown's Bank for all ICNAF nations for another thirty days

fishermen of Southwestern Nova Scotia are so heavily capendent on the survival of the haddock stocks in that area."

Mr. Johnston also pointed out "that Canada's lodging of an objection has allowed a certain element of her fleet, namely the longliners, to land 10,000 pounds or 10 per cent haddock per trip rather than 5,000 pounds or 10 percent, and this has enabled them to sustain a financially viable fishing operation during the most difficult period of their fishing season when the catching of haddock is so important to their well being." He added that, " since international scientists have recently intensified their program of haddock stock assessment, it is hoped that the Commission will in the coming years be able to introduce less stringent haddock conservation measures."

As with Canadian vessels, the fishing units of the ICNAF countries involved have been notified by their respective governments of the closed areas, with specific marine coordinates.

Protection vessels of the federal Fisheries and Marine Service will patrol the closed haddock-fishing areas, as will vessels of the United States Coast Guard and aircraft of the armed services of both countries to regidly enforce these regulations. Vessels entering the designated ICNAF closed areas will be subject to prosecution, the exception being that scallop draggers and offshore lobster boats may carry out their operations because of their method of fishing. 

was a sincere effort on the part of our Party to have the time span for this scheme extended so that eligible veterans, who may still be serving in the Armed Forces, or who may for other reasons not have wished to settle in their final or permanent place of residence, would have an opportunity to do

Mr. Stanley Knowles of the N.D.P. has been very vocal in the House demanding just such an extension of time. However, when the crunch came on Tuesday, the N.D.P. voted with the government. Once again they foresook their principles in favour of the political expendiency of supporting the Government,

There is increased speculation on the possibility of an election on the Federal scene this week, I think prompted partly by the fact that there is a provincial election in Nova Scotia, and some people feel that Mr. Trudeau may have persuaded Mr. Regan to test the water for him, and I think there is a general feeling abroad that economically things may get rougher before they get better and that if the government sees a reasonable opportunity for success, they would go for an election either at the initiative of the Prime Minister or, by being defeated in the House on some issues that he knows full well the Democratic Party would be unable to support. Several Bills have already

been introduced for the consideration of the House: one, is an Act entitled "The Export Development Act", essentially it increases the financial ability of the Export Development Bank which is used to finance exports for Canadian corporations; there's a Customs Act, Combines Act, which will have very broad reaching effects as a number of provisions related directly to consumer packaging and marketing, double pricing on loss leaders, and that kind of thing. We are pressing to have the Second Reading of this Bill delayed for 6 weeks or 2 months in order to provide an opportunity for consumer groups to review the Bill and make their views known. If any of my readers should want to have a copy of that Bill for that purpose I would be more than happy to arrange to send them upon request.

There are other Bills amending the National Parks Act, providing money for C.N.R., amending Export and Import Permits Act. A further Bill the Environment Act is designed to protect communities against the released substances that can contaminate the atmosphere.

Possibly of more interest than most Acts to our constituency is Bill C-2, an Act to amend the Fisheries Development Act which provides for the making of grants for the modification and conversion of fishing vesseis.

Most of these Bills are proposed legislation that was left over from the last Session and which did not get dealt with.

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IMPORTANT NOTICE regarding CONSUMER REPORTING ACT

Declared by Proclamation by Governor-in-Council on February 1, 1974 to be in force on April 1, 1974.

CONSUMER REPORTING AGENCIES

- 1. (a) Must register with the Director of Consumer Services Bureau, P.O. Box 998, Halifax, Nova Scotia.
 - (b) Comply with all provisions of the Act, including adopting all reasonable procedures to make certain that information reported on a consumer is accurate and fair. Certain information cannot be included in any consumer reports.
 - (c) Shall not report any information that does not come from files of consumers stored in Canada.

USE OF INFORMATION OBTAINED FROM CONSUMER REPORTING AGENCIES OR FROM OTHER SOURCES

- 2. (a) Briefly that Act states that no one can obtain a report without getting permission from the consumer himself or advising him in writing that they are going to obtain one or have obtained
- (b) Anyone using this information from a Consumer Reporting Agency or from any other Source must supply certain details to the consumer if he denies him a benefit or increases the cost of the benefit to him.

CONSUMER RIGHTS

- 3. (a) The Act gives the consumer the right to know if a report is being obtained about him, to know what is reported about him, who the information is reported to and the source of the
 - (b) The consumer is able to have any errors or omissions on his file corrected and if he is dissatisfied with treatment received he may complain to the Director of the Consumer Services Bureau who will be administering the Act.





Continuous Progress -A Blessing Or A Hoax?

Educators are denied that finality, that definity afforded others who operate in such fields as industry and commerce. Educators cannot readily weigh, measure, examine, nor even test their "products" as can operators in the business world. Educators find that it is their lot to wonder about the effects of their decisions and their practices. School Boards, rate-payers and members of the public at large may demand accountability for the actions of educators; research may be launched by school departments; however, the fact remains that we cannot know for certain the effects of educational policies.

Then if the most desirable outcomes from any educational endeavour cannot be guaranteed, how can any educational action be justified? What determines educational course of action? Upon what are educational principles and practices based?

Probably the majority of educators have determined that there is only one consideration - consideration for the child. They realize that their decisions must be based upon what we currently know about the child, about how he learns and how he does not learn, what motivates him, what is important for him to learn, and why it is important.

If we can accept the proposal that a child learns best-

-when he is happy

-when he is succeeding -when he understands the aims and purposes of these activities

-when his exercises are geared to his learning style, to his abilities, to his needs, to his interests

-then we might accept a system of Continuous Progress as being a desirable educational practice.

While acknowledging the dangers and short-comings of a definition, let us tentatively look at Continuous Progress as a system wherein a child's advancemennts throughout his school year is characterized by assignments to him out of tasks that take into account his learning style, his interest, his needs, and his abilities. He advances through these assignments at a continuous rate while experiencing every present challenge and success. It is a system based on success, not on failure.

The reader may well wonder whether such a system exists in reality in our schools, An honest answer is probably in the negative. Continuous Progress exists in some degree in some schools, and may be confined exclusively to elementary school. Continuous Progress is an emerging system something developing not developed.

New versions of Continuous Progress may be indeed be hoaxes if they are characterized by the following:

-laxity in extablishment and maintainance of aims, goals, and purposes

\-absence of careful planning -lapses in carrying out of sound, educational practices inadequate evaluation of achievement.


A bona fide system of Continuous Progress would have as its hallmarks the following essentials:

-Having classroom activities



Tax Rate Increased 39 Cents

Municipal Ratepayers Get Rebate

Twenty cents on one hundred dollar 1974 assessment will be rebated to Digby municipal taxpayers when they pay their 1974 taxes. This decision was made on Monday at a regular meeting of the Council of the Municipality of Digby held at the Court House and presided over by Warden Wilfred Swift. The rebate represents the recent equalization grant received from the Province of Nova Scotia on the seven dollar per capita basis. The grant amounts to \$63,000. Administrative costs were considered in the 20 cent decision.

m.

A previous equalization grant of \$13 per capita and amounting to \$117,000 was put into the general fund to keep the tax rate down and to eliminate indebtedness after it was discovered it could not be used for the Weymouth School extension as originally hoped.

Councillor L.R.R. Winchester, chairman of the Finance Committee, gave reports 'for January and February expenditures amounting to \$131,000, leaving a credit balance of \$12,000 at the end of February and \$14,795 on March 14. Mr. Winchester

reminded Council that \$112,000 is owing to the School Board.

The Digby County Power Board was given authority to purchase transformers and meters to the extent of \$11,400. The recent severe wind and high tide had damaged much of the Utility equipment at East Ferry. Discussion arose on the manner in which the municipality will acquire financing for their debt to the D.C.P.B. of \$92,000 plus the authorized equipment.

The Municipal Council formed a Recreation Committee with Walter McAlpine, Parker Thurber and Eric VanTassel on the committee. There will also be a School Board representative and residents from town and municipality. The committee provides a means of securing financial grants for recreational projects.

The Council supported a resolution from the Barrington Council which opposes the construction of a Nuclear power plant in its area until it has been substantiated that the plant will not cause environmental defects.

Job Information Centre Opens

So you're looking for a job but you don't want to fill out a form, answer a lot of endless questions and then sit twiddling your thumbs while somebody arranges an interview for you.

Good ... because your Canada Manpower Centre in Digby has introduced a new service that will allow you to "help yourself" to all the information that is available locally on job opportunities.

Mr. Jules Pottier, Manager of the Manpower Centre in Digby today unveiled his JOB BANK ... or as it's known in official circles ... The Canada Manpower Job Information Centre the J.I.C.

Although the J.I.C. is located under the same roof as the regular Canada Manpower Centre ... the similarity ends

The J.I.C. simply puts out on view, and for direct access to the public "everything you've always wanted to know about jobs in the area but previously had to ask about", Mr. Pottier

said. "This special system is based on the premise that job seekers know best what skills and experience they have to offer to potential employers, and can best choose for themselves what they want from the job openings available."

The main feature of the J.I.C. is the orange colored job bank board. On this board are listed the up-to-date job vacancies in the Digby area. Every day Digby and area employers contact, or are contacted by the local office for job vacancy requirements. These vacancies are then placed on special job "cards" for display on the job bank board.

Job seekers just walk into the J.I.C. and look over these job cards. These cards contain information on job salaries, the duration of the job, where the job is located, hours of work, and usually the necessary qualifications. The employers' names and addresses are not included. Only after the job seeker

selects the job he or she is interested in, does contact with the manpower counsellor become necessary. This counsellor then reviews the individual's qualifications and if satsifactory, provides the employer's name, address and phone number. The job seeker can then arrange an interview by phoning the employer (free phones are available for this

purpose in the J.I.C.)

"To control the number of applications going to an employer it is necessary to keep their name off the job card. Each employer advises us how many people they are willing to interview for a job so we must keep track of how many people are referred." Mr. Pottier said.

"A central control unit has also been set up within our regular operation to provide the J.I.C. with its up-to-date job vacancies listing as well as to provide a "follow-up" service to ensure that we do not continue to refer people to jobs that have already been filled."

"By allowing people to "help themselves" in finding employment, manpower counsellors are now free to devote more time to other people who may not be quite sure what job vacancies they are qualified to fill, or need other guidance on training of vocational upgrading, education opportunities. They can also provide the special counselling some unemployed people need before they are ready for the job

Rash Of Thefts

Digby R.C.M.P. investigated Juring the past week the theft of two rifles, two hunting knives, tow portable radios and \$50 in cash stolen from the Department of Lands and Forests office in Hillgrove. Also a quantity of gas was taken from the Town and Country Service Station, Marshalltown.

Two of the four cars which had been stolen from the MacDonald Motors Ltd. yard were recovered by town police; within the town and two others were found on the road at

Digby town tax rate took a iump from \$2.15 on a hundred dollar assessment in 1973 to \$2.54 on a hundred dollar assessment for the year 1974. This was revealed at the budget meeting held at the town hall on Thursday evening and presided over by His Worship Mayor Willard Kinney. Assessment for 1974 had increased by approximately one million dollars to \$15,161,000.

The biggest increase in the budget was for education which was budgeted for \$232,000 as against actual costs of \$192,000 in 1973, representing an increase of \$40,000. Next sizeable increase was in welfare which was budgeted for \$44,000 as against \$22,800 actual cost in General government

services budgeted was raised by \$6000 and protection by \$5000.

A general increase was budgeted in all/departments but according to the figures presented there were no major increases in these departments other than above. (See 1973 statement in other columns) An amount of \$25,000 was allotted for the paying of St. Mary's Street.

For three years, according to the record, there had been only a ten cent total tax increase on a hundred dollar assessment leaving a deficit in 1973 of \$44,000. Both equalization grants (\$13 per capita and \$7 per capita have been used to offset the deficit and control the tax rate, it is understood.)

Municipality Will Abolish Deed Transfer Tax

On motion of Councillor Arthur Rice and Councillor Walter McAlpine and passed unanimously, the Municipality of the District of Digby will abolish the Deed Transfer Tax as of January 1, 1975. The municipal deed transfer tax was adopted in July 1973. The question came before council again in February 1974 at a morning session when a voice vote seemingly rescinded the July motion. A standing vote taken in the afternoon retained the motion on the books as of July 1973. Councillor Rice at that time gave notice of motion to have the question brought up

again in March. The deed transfer tax was introduced in Monday's program when J.J. Brittain was given permission to appear before council. He claimed the deed transfer tax to be a vicious tax violating all principles of taxation. He said no one receives benefit from the tax and it is unfair as it provides no service nor does it add to the property. He felt that if the transfer tax information is available to an assessor it also should be available to an appraiser. He mentioned the burden it loads on individuals buying homes and declared the tax to be basically not acceptable in Nova Scotia.

While many of the councillors agreed in many respects with Mr. Brittain and realizes there was much opposition to the tax they also considered the fact that the anticipated \$10,000 revenue from the deed transfer tax had been included in 1974 budget.

MacNutt Denies P.C. Leader Statement

THREE HOURS TO VOTE

On voting day, April 2, if an elector does not have three consecutive hours of his own time, while the polls are open, for voting, the employer must allow the employee such time off, with pay, as may be necessary to provide three consecutive hours.

This does not mean that all voters should be given three hours off if the time is not needed to provide the three hours

If an employee gets off duty at 4 p.m. the emplover should allow that person to leave at 3 p.m. thus providing three consecutive hours.

The additional time off for voting will be granted to the employee at a time of day that best suits the convenience of the employer.

The section of the Elections Act providing three consecutive hours off when necessary, does not apply to an employee who is engaged in the operation and dispatch of scheduled railway trains, buses, motor transports; ships and aircraft and to whom three consecutive hours cannot be allowed without interfering with the scheduled operation or dispatch of these vehicles

An employer who refuses, or by intimidation. undue influence, or in any other way interferes with the use by an employee of three consecutive hours for voting, or who fails to pay the employee for those hours, is guilty of an offence against the Elections Act."

It is sometime now since I have written to my constituents in this way and a lot of water has gone under the bridge.

As you may know Parliament sort of ground to a halt around Christmas time and for about 10 days in January and then adjourned until a couple of weeks

To a certain extent, no government, at least in the Western World, is in complete control of the situation. Many Fountries are operating with minority governments and governments faced with civil insurrection on a daily basis. Canada, fortunately, has a long tradition of stable government and deep reserves of public. confidence in government. Unfortunately this may not Continue to be so for our government has not, since coming to office, been able to plan any co-crdinated program. Rather they have gone from political expedient to political expedient and, from crisis to

The result is that spiraling prices, spiraling unemployment and potential shortages of goods have developed across the country withing effective action. wither taken or planned by the 20vernment

In relation to our whiriding there are a couple of things. which have happened, which have been encouraging. During the last Session of the House the Public Works Committee did some extremely, worthwhile wirk in the budgeting procedures for harbours and if those hearings, which I think were spearheaded by Con-Servatives even me, the budget of the government for this purpose was increased from something in the area of 8 million dellars a year to a proposed 30 million a year. This proposal was not accepted fully by Treasury Board, however, the budget was increased to approximately 24 million. On this subject I should stress that I have no reason to believe that the Department is comtemplating doing away with the Base, however, there are expansions taking place at other Bases in Canada which might affect its operation and I have simply been unable to btain any assurance from the Minister that such a move is not contemplated. It would obviously be better to insure that no adverse decision is taken before it happens than to attempt to reverse a decision and program which has already been put into place.

There are many areas of concern which I would like to discuss with you in this letter but which would take too much space. There is a tendency on the part of government to feel that it should be involved in every area of human activity This carried with it an inreasing bureaucracy, rising taxes and seems to apply to federal, provincial and even municipal administrations There is a rising concern among some Canadians that, with the increased pressures on taxation resulting from this growth, it is putting new and unusual strains in bur democratic system. In addition to that there's a whole new concept being promitted by the "Club of Reme" and many

thers which will require some major adjustments in our society. It is the belief of these re-ple that population. productivity, standard if living. etc., cannot continue to grow without limits. They lite some very frightening statistics and propositions in support of their ase Thoughtful Canadians. and in sparticular Neva Scotiaris, will have to take a hard look at exactly what kind if community, and society we: wish to live in in the future-

Liberal Meeting Told 1974 Tax Lowered

In a surprise announcement at the Liberal meeting in Freeport Monday evening, Municipal Councillor Parker Thurber stated the Digby municipal council had decided to reduce by twenty cents the amount payable on the 1974 tax rate. He said this would mean! those paying their 1974 taxes would pay only at a rate of \$2.60 per hundred rather than the rate of \$2.80 set by council on March 1st.

v rt

Mr. Thurber said the decision to provide the tax relief to those paying 1974 taxes had been made at a lengthy council session Monday afternoon. He said tax payers should make sure they paid only at the \$2,60 on 1974 taxes and stated this would apply whenever the 1974 taxes were paid.

The action taken by the council was arrived at, Mr. Thurber said, by application of funds received from the

provincial government for tax relief. His announcement on the tax relief came after Joe Casey, Liberal candidate in the district of Digby had concluded his address. In his address Mr. Casey outlined to the more than 200 attending the rally the steps taken by the Regan government to provide tax relief measures for municipal tax payers.

Mr. Casey enumerated some of the measures taken by the provincial government to make tax relief available, through distribution of equalization and other grants. He also explained that the adoption by the province of a greater share of education costs in the municipality meant that the province would also assume a langer proportion of all shared costs in Digby municipality. In his remarks Mr. Casey also referred to the additional 25 percent direct rebate, recently





Information Canada

Thursday, March 28, 1974

Q. Is there such a thing as dual-nationality?

A. Yes. Canadian citizens born abroad, or whose parents were national of a foreign country, may, under the laws of the country of their birth or descent, be nationals of those countries even though, under Canadian law they are Canadian citizens. Similarly, Canadians married to aliens may, by marriage, have acquired their spouse's nationality.

Q. How does one go about getting a small business loan?

A. A Business man seeking assistance should discuss his financial requirements with the manager of the lending agency of his choice, and from whom application forms are available. A small business enterprise is eligible if its estimated gross revenue does not exceed \$500,000 during the year in which the application is made.

Q. If I accept another job, what happens to my Canada Pension contributions?

A. The benefits are portable: If you move from one job to another, or from one province to another, you do not lose the contributions you have already paid.



which he said was not "stolen" from somebody else but had been worked on for three years. He presented the P.C. plan to take over the cost of education which he also said would aid in home ownership by alleviating property tax from thirty to forty per cent.

The speaker admitted that the P.C. program is an ambitious one but it is not a one year effort. It will , he said, take four or five years to implement fully.

In outlining the P.C. platform, Mr. Buchanan stressed the need of greater social assistance for senior citizens, free prescription drugs for all Nova Scotians and free dental care for all Nova Scotia school children.

Charging that the Liberal government had spent much on sports and recreation, Mr. Buchanan emphasized the need to promote and assist secondary industry which can make use of Nova Scotia's natural resources. He deplored the Liberal spending of money without it giving employment and said the P.C.'s would develop the province economically, socially and culturally. He felt that Nova Scotians should know where their tax money goes but the Liberal government had not given account of its stewardship. He said the government had budgeted \$300,000,000 in the year 1970-71. but by 1973-74 they budgeted \$600,000,000 and he was wondering just what they were spending the money on. He argued that the election was called on April 2 because there was much to hide

but he couldn't see how people could vote intelligently without knowing the facts.

The meeting was presided over by Richard Levy, president of the Digby P.C. Association and other speakers were Jack Nichols, Digby P.C. candidate in the April 2 election and Charles Haliburton, M.P. representing South Western Nova.

Mr. Nichols felt the Liberal government had given an insult to the people of Nova Scotia in calling an election with finances undercover as they are. He also deplored the Liberal promises to western Nova Scotia which he claimed had not been fulfilled and said that Mr. Buchanan, as premier, would attend to the fishing needs, help the forest industry and associated industry in the area. Mr. Nichols dedicated himself to getting

Digby County a new deal. Mr. Haliburton dealt with matters of a federal nature such as mineral rights, energy conferences and fishing subsidies. He claimed that Digby County fish catch had lowered more percentage wise than in any other part of Nova Scotia and there was definitely a lack of co-operation by provincial and federal government members and between provincial and government members.

During the short period of time allowed to cover my constituency of Digby Municipality, I have found the following facts and conditions that need looking into immediately.

The No. 217 Highway from Digby to Westport Light House which is a responsibility of the Department of Highways is in a deplorable condition and in immediate need of recaping and repair. The paved roads on Brier Island need recaping and repairs as nothing has been done in this respect since they were first built many years ago by a conservative Government.

All roads in general are in a state of disrepair due to poor supervision from all levels of the Department of Highways. I would suggest a 24 hour maintenance on all Digby County roads during the winter months when the road and weather conditions are at their worst. Roads such as the one from Sandy Cove to the Bay of

Fundy and St. Mary's Bay need widening and repairs, Little River Roads from the No. 217 to St. Mary's Bay, Gulliver's Cove Road, Timpany road, Centreville road from the No. 217 to the Bay of Fundy, in fact, all the roads that branch off the No. 217 are in similar need of repair.

The Gulliver's Cove road was widened last year and left without culverts which has caused the water to back up and flood private lands and the Highway in places. Roads in North Range, Weymouth and Sissaboo Area

have been widened in some cases and left that way without ditches to take care of the water during heavy rains. Roads in North Range and Sissaboo area have been widened but left that way with little done in the way of dit-

Public roads built and maintained to help people in the lumbering Industry get their logs and fire wood out, such as the Road from Doucetteville to beyond the west branch of the Weymouth River are in poor shape and stringers on the bridge which crosses it are broken down.

The Ridge Road from No. 101 to North Range is in need of recaping and new paving between Fred Height's Corner to North Range which has been ready for some time needs

immediate attention. Back raods in Bear River also fall into this category of needing immediate repair and attention.

Potential death traps such as exists at the Racquette Bridge Intersection, Route 217, Victoria Street, Intersection and approaches to the No. 101 Intersection at Conway, Smith's Cove and Bear River Intersection at the new bridge. These situations are a must now, not after it has taken any more human lives and caused injury and damage to







Concern Shown Over Fishing Industry

Present concerns of the provincial Leader of the Opposition for the fishing industry and the fishermen of Nova Scotia were questioned by Hon. Benoit Comeau, Minister of Public Works and Liberal candidate for the district of Clare, in an address at Weymouth Tuesday evening.

Speaking to an audience of more than 250 in the Weymouth Legion Hall, Mr. Comeau asked why Mr. Buchanan has not at least, attempted some of the measures he was now advocating when he was the province's Minister of Fisheries. He reminded the audience that the Opposition Leader is not a newcomer to provincial politics but had been a Minister in the former Stanfield-Smith government.

In his remarks Mr. Comeau was critical of what he termed







Handicrafts Display At Granville Centre

A display featuring handicrafts provided the evening's programme, at the regular monthly meeting of the Granville Centre Women's Institute, held 11th March, at the home of Mrs. Wyman Hall, Granville Ferry.

After a short business meeting, presided over by president, Mrs. Leona Guest, Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Karen Casselman, East Margaretsville, addressed the meeting.

Presenting a brief resume of history of jewellery-making from early times to the present day, Mrs. Hall explained how the modern day jeweller is usually a shop-keeper, rather than a maker of jewellery. Most handmade jewellery is made by craftsmen who work in a variety of precious metals. Mrs. Hall showed samples of her silver jewellery, and described a variety of processes used to make it. She explained the technique of hand-polishing a piece of work until its surface is "mirror perfect." "There are no scratches, file marks or blobs of solder on good handmade jewellery", she said, and "Findings" are most often handmade, as are settings for stones. Mrs. Hall's work carries the hallmark of the

Carries the hallmark of the Metal Arts Guild of Nova Scotia, and she is a member of the Nova Scotia Designer Craftsmen.

Mrs. Cassleman's topic was

"Consumerisom in Buying Crafts." She explained that in a time when shoppers are careful about purchasing articles of food and clothing they often buy carelessly when it comes to crafts. She described what features to look for when buying handmade articles, and suggested that the prospective customer ask the shop-keeper questions about the work before making a purchase. "A reliable shop-keeper will know about the work they are selling, or at least they should know. If they can't answer your questions, don't buy." Explaining consignment and commission charges, which constitute part of the price of a piece of handmade work in a shop, Mrs. Casselman explained how the craftsman, selling from his own studio, prices a piece of work.

A graduate of Nova Scotia Designer College of Art and Design, Mrs. Casselman is also a member of the Nova Scotia Designer Craftsman. She is a weaver, and also works in macrame and does natural







Three of the original cast members repeat their roles: Hawaiian-born Yvonne Elliman (Mary Magdalene), Bob Bingham (Caiaphas) and Barry Dennen (Pontius Pilate). While there obviously is a ready market for the Universal release, more conservative patrons may have to be sold on the film's merits. Several of the songs have become standards - the title number, "Everything's Alright" and particularly "I Don't Know How To Love Him" - and most are performed with large production numbers. Only Joshua Mostel's "King Herod's Song" can really be called irreverent, Ted Neeley is a visually perfect Christ.

The rock opera tells of the last seven days of Christ (Ted Neeley) as interpreted by a group of young people who arrive in the Holy Land by bus. There are modern touches in the weapons used by the soldiers, but the dress is traditional. Jesus is chastised for his kindness to prostitute Mary Magdalene (Yvonne Elliman). High priest Caiaphas (Bob Bingham) and aide Annas (Kurt Yaghjian) realize that Jesus is a threat to their existence with His Teachings. A disciple, Judas (Carl Anderson), is persuaded to betray Jesus and feels he's really helping to fulfill Christ's Destiny, King Herod' (Joshua Mostel) ridicules Jesus, who is flogged by orders of Pontius Pilate (Barry Dennen). The crowd demands that Christ be crucified and Pilate washes his hands of the matter. Judas


