# CIVIC ELECTION RACE ON IN DIGBY

Digby town is assured of an election for three councillors on October 15. At present it is anybody's guess what three out of the five nominations will gain the day. By Monday of this week four nominations had been filed. The fifth was entered shortly before the five o'clock dead-line on Tuesday.

### PAUL WINCHESTER

Paul Winchester, who has been deputy mayor for a number of years has served on the town council for eight years. Born in Digby, he was the son of the late William Winchester. well known throughout the area as an esteemed manager of a trucking and transfer business. It was in this business that his son, Paul, was engaged after completing school and for 54 years until the present year when he sold the Winchester's Transfer. His entire life has been of service to the town in

one capacity or another.

Mr. Winchester has served on many committees during the years on council such as streets, policé etc. His objectives are to finish up the sewer, paving streets and a new town hall, Water is another concern which in Mr. Winchester's estimation should come fourth in priority.

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Mrs. Winchester is the former Laura Amero. They have five children; Lowell, a captain in the Canadian Armed Forces (Navy), Ronald, with Smith's Transfer, F.P.C., Freda, Mrs. Royal Woodworth, Granville Ferry, Lorna, Mrs. David Burnhum and Loraine, employed at the Children's Home.

### JOSEPH HATTIE

Joseph Hattie, another candidate seeking election on October 15, has served on the Digby Town Council for seven years. He was born at Yarmouth where he completed his schooling and became a travelling salesman. He retired as a salesman in December of 1973 and feels that he can now devote his full time to council duties.

Mr. Hattie says he has enjoyed working with council for the past years and his priorities at present are to finish up the sewer, attend to the town water situation and get streets and sidewalks paved.

Married to the former Mable McIsaac of Yarmouth, they have four children; Donald, Digby, Rev. Father Joseph, chaplain at Dalhousie University, Joanne and Judith, Sackville, N.S.

### PHILIP ROBERTSON

Philip Robertson, born in Port Mouton has lived in Digby for twenty-seven years where he was associated with his father,

Bruce Robertson as Canadian Tire Corp. dealers and later managed the business on his own on his father's retirement.

Philip who has offered again to serve the town has had two years on the Digby Town Council. His aim is to upgrade the town generally but admits that there are some things which must get first place, such as paving streets, finish the sewer project and have concern for the town water.

Mr. VanTassell feels he knows what life is about because he was brought up through hard times and hard work, Mr. VanTassell's first job was with the National Sea Products until 1941 when he became employed by the Canadian Pacific Railway. This occupation was halted in 1942 because Guy joined the armed forces and served for three years. He returned then to the C.P.R., working at the federal wharf in responsible positions until the C.P.R. moved to its present location. Since then Mr. VanTassell has been clerk at the C.P.R. ticket office.

Mr. VanTassell is an honorary member of the Digby Volunteer Fire Department. having served on the Department for 27 years. He also served on the Digby Branch Canadian Legion of which he had been president for one and a half as president.

Mr. VanTassell feels that the town needs improving. So many minor things have been neglected, he claims and which could be done without much difficulty. Streets, in particular were named by Mr. VanTassell as being most necessary.

If they borrow from the Chartered banks they need a backer and there is no provision in the town act whereby, the town can give that guarantee. The only alternative would seem to be the issuing of debentures to which the town can guarantee security. We understand about \$12,000 is needed and there seems to be complications on every scene, according to Ricky Olsen, a school teacher, who is much interested in sport for the young people and children. Any of these people, we take it, would be happy to have your suggestions or help to get the complications ironed out and a start made on the children's program for the winter. May we hear from you?

### - A PRACTICAL LESSON

### SURE. IT CAN HAPPEN TO YOU

One of the concerns in our modern times is fire protection for high-rise buildings. The world goes on building homes and factories, hospital and offices, all for the welfare and comfort of twentieth century luxurious living. The trend is up, up, up. The high-rise buildings have their merits, true, but ability to handling fires in them is not one of its merits. The high-rise buildings are subject to the same hazards as most other buildings with one added disadvantage: there are limits to how high the fire department aerial equipment can reach.

At that we leave the high-rise fire hazards and turn. our attention to buildings in use in our area which practically omits anything of a high-rise nature. So, wherever you are, in your own home or office, make sure you are acquainted with escape and safety plans. Also see that babysitters, domestics or any other employees are also acquainted with these safety plans.

There are a few fire safety rules which every person should read and digest, such as:

If a fire starts don't use a door without testing it first to see that it's cool. Peek through to make sure

the passage is safe. Wrap a wet towel around your head and use only enclosed or outside stairways. Never an elevator,

If caught in dense smoke keep close to the floor. If caught in a room, seal the door with wet towels or blankets; then get to an open window or balcony. Close doors behind you to shut off the fire.

If possible call the fire department, give your name, address, apartment number, floor and location in building. Tell them you're on the balcony or at the window. Get some type of signal out, a coloured sheet

You can help prevent fires too. Here are a few suggestions: Never throw eigarette butts into trash or garbage chutes. Get rid of small ashtrays and remember what the Fire Chief said, "Never, ever smoke in bed." Avoid using flammable paints or cleaners. If gasoline must be stored, keep it only in approved containers. Don't overload electrical outlets, keep extension cords from underneath rugs and use only 15 amp fuses for regular household

Don't be complacent where fire is concerned. Sure, it can happen to you.

Dear Sir: At this time the public is being overwhelmed by reassuring statements as to the need, safety and benefits of nuclear power plants

In the August 24 issue of the Saturday Review-World Jacques Costeau, concerned with the growing pollution of the ocean, which he/ terms the earth's "life resevoir", points out that most of the information we receive is influenced by the interest groups, and in all countries today the evaluation of the human impact by such activities as nuclear power plants, or by the company, involved in the production. He also states that research is funded, almost entirely, only if it fits the policy of today's government. "This" he says. "is especially true of the en-'vironmental field." So people have come to distrust the announcements made by their government agencies.

Most of us do not feel qualified to judge the validity of the propaganda fed us, but many knowledgeable persons are refuting it in print.

I have the permission of

Audubon, the magazine of the National Audubon Society, to use some excerpts from an article in its May issue. This article quotes William E. Heronemus, professor of civil engineering at the University of Massachusetts. He is a retired U.S. Naval captain and had postwar service with the Hyman Rickover nuclear wolfpack A concern for New England's economic future caused him to look into various sources of power and he is now interested in power from windmills. He is convinced that "The nuclear route is a one-way road to ruin," and says, "I'm no atomic energy expert, but I have had enough experience with reactors in submarine design and maintenance to know that there is no way they are ever going to make power reactors both safe and economical. The supermen required to build the physicists expectations simply do not exist in the, United States--or anywhere else on the planet. These people are going to bankrupt us, and they're coming damned close to it right now."

The article continues, Besides worrying about nuclear power plants breaking our banks, blanching our brains and curdling our chromosomes, Heronemus frets over what is happening to the biosphere from all that heat released from nuclear and fossil-fuelled plants. As to a future supply of uranium, he states, "I've seen one article that suggest we will simply convert the entire White Mountains to piles of rubble to support our light-water reactors. People talk about there being uranium deposits available for a couple of hundred years...Man, they're talking about whole mountain ranges that will have to be

reduced somehow or other to ore from which you can extract that marvellous stuff!"

In the September 7 issue of the Saturday Review-World, A.Z. Roisman of Washington D.C. writes: Atomic Energy Commissioner William Doub claims that presently operating nuclear reactors have a capacity equivalent to 300 million barrels of oil per year. The problem with this statistic is that nuclear power plants are delivering only about sixty per cent of their capacity. Thus every 1000-mw nuclear reactor delivers only 600mw of power. Because each 1000mw nuclear reactor costs \$600 million, this means a net loss of \$240 million per reactor. By 1980, former Federal Energy Office Administrator Willia Simon predicted 200,000 mw of nuclear. reactors would be operating. With their present cost and operating record, we shall have lost \$48 billion on nuclear reactors by 1980. Before we are irrevocably committed to the super-dangerous nuclear technology, we should carefully examine what \$48 billion invested in alternative energysupply would do by 1980."







# **Digby Striders Win** Twenty-Four Hour Endurance Race

A team of ten runners from the South Western area, six of whom are from Digby were successful in running away with top honors in the first 24 hour rally race held in Eastern Canada.

The race was held in Dartmouth on a 400 meter track. Each runner on the team was required to run a mile at a time. Thie amounted to a total of twenty-six miles per individual runner, and a total of two hundred and sixty one miles for the team without a break.

The team consisted of David Lorramore, Robert Davey, Mike Theriault, Garnet Stacey, Pat Theriault, Ron Fraser, two runners from Yarmouth and two runners from Shelburne. In order to run 261 miles each runner had to average a time of 5:30 seconds per mile over the twenty-four hour period.

A relay of this type is a demanding event since it requires a great deal of endurance and strength. During the period it rained most of the day, making running conditions poor. It became a problem when one wanted something to eat,

since anything heavy would slow one down considerably. Most of the runners lost four or five pounds over the twentyfour hour period. Staying awake throughout the night was extremely hard, and it was very difficult to stay warm with the temperature dropping to 45 degrees.





# It Happened Back Then....



# Dr. Alex Leighton Gets Honorary Degree



Acadia University will confer honorary degrees on three distinguished men at the 1974 Fall Convocation on Saturday. October 19.

Receiving degrees are Rev. Roy D. Bell, B.D., M.D.: Dr. William Terry Osborne, B.P.E., M.A., Ph.D.; and Dr. Alexander H. Leighton, B.A., M.A., M.D., A.M. (Honorary).

DR. ALEXANDER H. LEIGHTON, a native of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and Professor of Social Psychiatry and Head of the Department of Behavioral Sciences at the Harvard School of Public Health receives a Doctor of Science Degree. He is well known in Digby where he has spent practically all of his summers. Dr. Leighton has had a long association with all Nova Scotia and indeed, Acadia University. He initiated the Stirling County project here which is lauded as a major work in community social analysis. **Faculty members and students** of Acadia were involved in the project research. acted as consultant and advisor in the successful efforts of the Kings County Mental Health Association to establish the Fundy Mental Health Clinic in Wolfville.

Dr. Leighton received the undergraduate degree in Arts from Princeton University in 1932 and the M.A. degree from Cambridge in 1934. graduated M.D. from Johns Hopkins University in 1936 and following internship he served as House Officer in Psychiatry at Johns Hopkins Hospital from 1937 to 1939 and during 1940-41. As a Social Science Research Fellow in 1939-40, he studied at Columbia University and also conducted anthropological field work among Navahos and Eskimos.

In 1946, after five years of service with the U.S. Navy Medical Corps, Dr. Leighton went to Cornell University as Professor of Sociology and Anthropology. He was named Professor of Social Psychiatry Doctor of Science Degree. He is at Cornell Medical College in

# **Endorses Blood Donor Clinic**

"They Give the Gift of Life" is

the title of an article appearing in the September issue of "Readers Digest" It's author, not himself a Canadian, gives the Canadian Red Cross Society full credit for building the largest and most efficient volunteer blood donor system in the world. Incident after incident is cited in which life is saved thanks to the speed and accuracy with which while blood or its fractions can be instantly provided through the Canadian Red Cross blood banking system, with its newly computerized nationwide records of all donors and their types of blood. Not only Canadians benefit from this wonderful system, particularly from the Rare Blood Bank in Ottawa, which is part of the World Health Organization and, in emergencies, has supplied rare blood as far afield as Singapore.

"But the answer to the growing demand of blood lies more with the volunteer donors than with the system" sums up the article. "Thus far their response has been impressive", the author concludes. "It seems that giving blood has become part of the Canadian way of

Next week residents of the Digby area will have their semiannual opportunity to play a part in this nationwide service. E.B. Tufts, Red Cross District Chairman, has announced that on Wednesday, October 16, the Fall Blood Donor Clinic will be held at the Lions Club Hall in three sessions: 10-12 in the morning, 2 - 4 in the afternoon. and 7 - 9 in the evening. Mr. Tufts states that a quota of 225 donors has been set for the Clinic, and that it is urgent that this quota be met because of the recent shortages experienced by the Halifax Blood Bank, which have necessitated at least one emergency clinic. Another fact which makes this Digby Clinic of particular importance is the date, which follows the Thanksgiving weekend, and all too often the holiday accident rate calls for extra blood transfusions in the provincial hospitals.

In recent years the Digby Clinics have es-\ tablished an outstanding record of success. To maintain this record, it requires all our regular donors, plus a goodly number of first-time donors to make up for those who may be

# Editorial

FIRE SAFETY—CARELESSNESS

"Fire safety is anything but nonsense and yet." said Provincial Fire Marshal Robert Kerr, "it almost seems as though many people regard it as such. In spite of all that has been said, and written, and broadcast over the air-wayes, we, in the Fire Marshal's Office, are continually faced with problems involving fires which can directly be traced to human carelessness."

Last year, for instance, according to Mr. Kerr, there were over 1,800 fires in the province. Of these, no fewer than 1,300 were fires in dwellings. Very few of them could be attributed to 'acts of God'. The rest, by and large, could be traced to wanton carelessness on the part of the homeowner, or on the part of some member of his family.

We all seem to have the unfortunate habit of dismissing most fires as unavoidable, as accidents, or as visitations of bad luck. We do not take the time in our daily routine to see what we are doing wrong—or are neglecting to do—that may start a fire.

Right at this season, for instance, Mr. Kerr asks how many have given thought to the household heating equipment? Has the furnace been cleaned and checked? Have the smoke pipes deteriorated to the point where they should be replaced? How close are these pipes to combustible material? And, so on, and, so forth.

"Fire prevention week, Oct. 6th to 12th, is set aside from the rest of the year to bring to the attention of the public the extent / and underlying causes of preventable loss of life and property by fire," says provincial fire marshal Robert Kerr, in his annual fire prevention week message.

"However, fire prevention is an on-going, around the clock, fifty-two weeks a year necessity and should be regarded as such.

"is no respecter of persons. Over the past ten years 326 persons lost their lives in Nova Scotia due to fires - with no fewer than 44 lives having been lost in 1973 alone.

"The tragedy of it all is that most of the fires which do occur, 1,804 last year, and which are responsible for such appalling property damages, (13,000,000) are due to rank carelessness of one kind or another.

"Most of these fires," he continued, "could have been prevented had we realized that we cannot regard fire safety as nonsense. Instead, it is an activity which must be carried out the year around, and carried out be all members of the family.

"If a fire should occur in your home, get in touch with your fire department immediately. Delay in so doing may be disasterous.

"The main causes of fires, as determined by post-fire research and analysis are

- Smokers' carelessness;

- Short circuits and faulty wiring:

- Defective and over-heated chimneys and stovepipes;

- Ignition of fat, grease or tar;

- Children playing with matches.

"Please help us, and yourself, by taking steps to prevent fires.

"O CANADA" TO BECOME OFFICIAL ANTHEM

OTTAWA - A revised version of "O Canada", which will become Canada's national anthem, was introduced in the House of Commons on October 4, by Secretary of State J. Hugh Faulkner

There are differing accounts of the origin of "O Canada", but all agree that the anthem was written well after Confederation, that the French version of the words preceded the English, and that the music was composed by Calixa Lavallee in 1880.

The new English version of the anthem reduces the repetition of the words "O Canda" and "stand on Guard". Lyrics of the official English version follows:

O Canda! Our home and native land!
True patriot love in all thy sons command.
With glowing hearts we see thee rise.
The True North strong and free!
From far and wide. O Canada, we stand on guard tor

God keep our land glorious and free!





The new Levy's Rexall officially opens today giving downtown Digby the convenience of a modern, well equipped drug store. The official opening is being held in conjunction with the annual 1 cent sale, along with other special promotions.

The location, the former Shortliffe's Grocery property was purchased for planned expansion in 1973. Basic planning drafts were done by Patrick Comeau of Digby and the steel plans by Robb Engineering of Amherst. The expansion was started in January of this year with the erection of steel in late March. The building was completed to a state where the store could be moved in August, with the main store being moved first, followed by the dispensary. The new selling and dispensary areas cover over 2000 square feet, as compared to approximately 900 in the old building. The dispensary itself covers 360 square feet, making it one of the largest in the area.

Levy's has a dispensary staff of two full time pharmacists. One full time certified clerk and one part time clerk. In June of this year they initiated a "Sunday Opening" with hours 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. This Sunday routine is now an alternate Sunday basis with the same hours. The old location of Levy's Rexall is now occupied by The Village Wool Shop, which adjoins the new drug store building.

#### Digby Mative Aims For Olympic Refereeing Job

Brad Barton, vice-principal of **Graham Creighton High School** embarked on a journey Saturday that just may land him a position in the 1976 Olympics as an international volleyball referee.

Barton, a 29 year-old father of one has afforded himself the opportunity to become one of only two internationally recognized referees in Canada after only seven years of volleyball officiating.

Barton, native of Digby traveled to Mexico to referee in the 1974 World Volleyball championships and if he passes his practical examination which involves refereeing five international matches under the scrutiny of a panel of judges, the Montreal Olympics will become a reality.

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He was selected for the Mexico trip as a result of his outstanding performance at a recently held International Volleyball Officials clinic in Toronto where he placed in the top two of refereeing hopefuls from Canada, Nigeria, Korea and Costa Rica.

Barton's selection to referee in the world championships qualifies him as an official international candidate and barring any unforeseen misfortunes he should join Dr. Gilles Fortin of Montreal as Canada's only other internationally recognized volleyball official.

He has been in the teaching profession for 10 years, six as a physical education teacher, one as an elementary teacher and three as a vice principal. He received his national referee's badge in 1970 and during the past four years has been a referee at national volleyball championships throughout Canada.

In 1973 he attended the North and Central American zone championships in Tijuana, Mexico which incidentally were a pre-requisite to being selected to qualify for the Toronto clinic.

This summer he was once again active in international circles as he refereed a number of games between the Canadian and Chinese national women's volleyball teams in Calgary

during the month of June. Barton who played high school and college volleyball, said that making the Olympics in any capacity would be just as rewarding for him.

"So far the pressure has been tremendous at the clinics I've attended, but I have noticed quite an improvement in my officiating during the past couple of years and if I get over

United Keno Hill Mines **Exploration** Superintendent, Robert "Dutch" Van Tassell, has not only one, but two, Yukon mine discoveries accredited to him - the Husky Mine presently operating at Elsa, and he supervised the Minto area copper property which will open as a mine in the near future.

Dutch was employed in 1963 to conduct surface exploration for the troubled United Keno Mine.

In 1962 when Falconbridge Nickel became the controlling interest in UKHM, a sudden crash exploration program was initiated, and Dutch was hired to lead the program.

When United Keno Hill Mines. Ltd. was making preparations to shut down

operations in 1966 after 21 years of mining in the Mayo district, Dutch discovered the first new orebody in over 50 years.

Dutch hails from a tiny community in Nova Scotia called Digby, and by fluke Dutch entered geology at Mt. Allison University after his high school principal had asked "What are you going to do with your life?"

Dutch didn't know. After a two-week session with the principal, he was high tailing off. to University as a likely candidate in geology. After one geology course Dutch was hooked; three more geology courses, and he was a fanatic!

GIANT YELLOWKNIFE During the summer of 1956 Dutch was a work student for Giant Yellowknife Gold Mine, Northwest Territories, and by the end of the season he'd been offered a job and \$75 per month retainer if he'd return after college graduation.

And Dutch found himself between 1958 and February, 1962 in the NWT. He also had found himself engaged to be married immediately after graduation, but went away for 15 months to work-writing back to Nova Scotia telling Carolyn "...the weather's lovely today. Winds calm. The winds never blow in Yellowknife...'

But when he returned to Yellowknife with his new bride and they stepped down from the plane, the temperatures were minus 15 degrees with a 30 mph wind. Actually the wind in Yellowknife never stops blowing!

Then Dutch was shipped out for a five-month exploration program to Hudson's Bay! Five months! And geologists today complain about five days.

With the long field season and a young growing family...Dutch began looking to the mines as a chance for homelife. Half looking for new ventures, partially to appease his family, **Dutch hired on with Dennison** Uranium Mines at Elliot Lake,

At first Dutch had been served with the energeticincentive drive re-doing all the hen-scratched maps after 13 previous geologists had plodded through and over them. But after 15 months, he was bored. United Keno Hill Mines was

his 1963 saving grace as well as vice versa! He arrived just as the exploration program, backed solidly by Falconbridge, was getting underway. Dutch was responsible for the experimental overburden drilling which cost about \$4.09 per foot then, but with his expertise and full consideration of ideas from the experienced drillers. Dutch reduced that cost to about \$1.50 per foot by 1965.

This was the first time in the long years of mining in the Keno area that any funds had been set aside for surface exploration work by a company.

Geologists are always looking back over their shoulders-....What did they miss?

**Dutch discovered the Husky** vein, the first new ore body discovered in the area since the 1920's, mining operations having been working over old

In the fall of 1966 United Keno Hill Mines threatened a shut down because of depleted tonnage and managerial problems, and with reserves quickly depleting the surface exploration program was maintained.

The overburden drilling technique involved collecting overburden samples every five feet, and using geochemistry to locate vein systems. The method paid off...the discovery of a new mine!

With a 30 to 60 ft. overburden cover, the Husky was the first new mine found since the old prospectors couldn't cope with the depth of overburden. But the inferred quartzite horizon with no outcroppings was a good geological bet.

"Length x width x depth x assay values makes a mine," Dutch explained. "Tonnage and grade are the answers desired. Without it you've found nothing."

Rut exploration work is a slow, expensive process, and six years elapsed before the Husky was in full production--and today, out of the six mines operating at United Keno Hill, over 50 percent of the highquality ore comes from the Husky.

#### WHITEHORSE

Finally, the Van Tassells moved from Calumet-Elsa townsites, establishing an exploration department in Whitehorse, Dutch busily getting a map education and organizing the exploration department in the basement of his home until the Whitehorse Medical Building on Main Street was purchased by UKH-

By 1970 exploration was in full

In 1970 a reconnaissance-type program was run and Dutch was disenchanted with the method, the program not offering close-enough surveillance of the tree-covered ground.

The following year the search program commenced east of Lake LaBerge on a geological theory.

A two-man party, consisting of Dick Joy and Peter Pangman, thrashed its way toward Minto, and in July, 1971, found the granite with copper staining that indicated these two geologists had found what they were looking for-Dutch's second mine.

"A geologist lives in mortal fear of having worked an area and having missed something. We're always looking back over our shoulders."

Adjacent to United Keno Hill's DEF properties, across Copper Creek, south of DEF camp, is the copper property belonging to Silver Standard-ASARCO.

Interestingly, Silver Standard-ASARCQ accomplished exploration work on their property, but they were not encouraged enough to return in the summer of 1973.

Meantime a United Keno Hill drill had been taking out excellent core samples-only to later discover that the angle drilling had gone over onto Silver Standard-ASARCO's property.

Well! Talking about some mad scramblin!

The Silver Standard-ASARCO group was notified, and a joint venture proposed, but the Silver Standard-ASARCO group decided to investigate the

potential of their property before coming to any agreement. **PROSPECTORS** 

**Independent** prospectors

stroll in and out of the UKHM Exploration offices, their x 20 prospecting lenses magnifying a chunk of rock. And not one prospector has ever been turned away, even though sometimes they just meander in for coffee or to talk about rocks and minerals. Sometimes a UKHM geologist will accompany a prospector to the bush to examine a find.

Dutch's explanation of all this: "Who knows, maybe someday they'll have a mine."

Today Dutch Van Tassell cannot claim boredom...he's happily up to his neck in rocks. maps, reports as Falconbridge, Canadian Superior and United Keno Hill Mines hopefully join forces with Silver Standard-ASARCO for the next mine in the Yukon-the Minto Copper Mine.

A picnic in the afternoon had been planned in beautiful Eric Park but the weather man did not cooperate with warm weather. Several had gone to the J.A.V. David Museum but all met again at the C.E. Centre where a delicious picnic lunch was

enjoyed. A piece of leather craft was given each Digby visitor, compliments of the Killarney Group. Mr. Tom Wilkins of the Killarney Guide was on hand, chatting with everyone and taking pictures, which has already been sent to our own Digby Courier and published . After supper most of the group proceeded to the Killarney air strip where several had rides in the two and four seated planes piloted by members of the Killarney \Flying Club. Those not going to the air strip went to Pugley North Dakota which is

the geographical centre of North America.

Monday morning all went in several cars to the International Peace Garden situated at Boissevaire, Man. and Dunseith, North Dakota Turtle Mountain is the dividing line between Man. and North Dakota. After touring the Gardens, visiting the gift shops the last stop was at the Chapel of Peace with its sixty quotations, either written or spoken by great men of peace throughout history, which are engraved on the three encircling walls constructed of flat sawn limestone. 

Now that the '50s have been firmly established in the minds of nostalgia lovers, the early '60s get their due in the Lucasfilm, Ltd. Coppola Co. production of "American Graffiti". 

## OCTOBER SNOW STORM HITS AREA

Digby County awoke on Sunday morning as did other areas in Nova Scotia to face an unusually early snow storm which hit the entire province. While not hit to the same extent as Cape Breton, the Valley and other parts of the province, the town and County of Digby was faced with restoring telephone and electric power lines which were damaged by the heavy snow fall and high winds. It was estimated that fifty poles were broken on the Digby Neck road alone. Auxiliary generators provided light to Bear River where power was cut off by extensive damage to lines in the Deep Brook area.

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
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So far as could be determined no boat damage was suffered in the County and lobster fishermen were not effected by the severity of the early October snow storm. Trees in several areas fell victims to the onslaught of the unkindly weather

and traffic was tied up but no serious accidents were reported as a result of the storm which deposited some six inches of snow over the weekend. Without power for considerable time, concern was felt at one stage for the fish in storage at Casey Fisheries in Victoria

While lines and poles suffered damage on the Islands, it was noted that the Islands had escaped much of the snow accumulation and communication was more easily restored.

The greatest extent of the storm which covered the entire Nova Scotia province and Atlantic area was felt on the Eastern part of the province where Cape Breton was pronounced to have an emergency situation.



#### Good Attendance At Nova Scotia Reading Association Conference

Dr. John Manning, University of Minnesota, delivered two excellent thought-provoking addresses to the two hundred and fifty delegates of the Nova Scotia Reading Associates held at Clark Rutherford Memorial School, CFB Cornwallis on Friday, October 4 and Saturday Oct. 5th.

He suggested that the child spend an academic morning at school and the afternoon be spent on visits to the community and recreation.

This would allow teachers time to prepare for class grouping and individual instruction which consumes a great amount of time.

A child's work is very special and should be treated that way, he said. Pupils should not be called upon to fail. Work should be at their level plus permitted time to become familiar with it and asked when all words are known. Much time is lost in trying to get Johnny to unlock a word, he claimed. This makes it boring for the rest of the class and frustrates Johnny. The word should be told and then filed in the teachers notebook under Johnny's name so that he can learn the skill later.

Have the students listed in notebooks in order of highest capability to lowest capability, he advised. This might fluctuate according to improvement. Each student reads poor, good, etc.

Teachers should show an interest in the pupils outside the classroom e.g. "Jonny, I saw a book in the store which you would like to read", he said and children should be read with to develop a sense of reading and should be started as soon as a child can sit up.

Pupils should be completely involved in the lesson when the teacher is making a point on the blackboard by having a worksheet similiar to the teachers. This will hold pupil's attention, he argued.

The greatest problem in oral reading is getting the pupil to follow along and pay attention usually the poorer student is the problem.

The task of the teacher includes (1) Diagnosis (2) Remedy -practice on skillsworkbooks, etc. (3) Improvement of teaching methods. When reading orally in the classroom suit the passage to be read alound to the capabilities of the student, e.g. easiest passage to be read aloud with the least amount of structure words to the poorest readers and the more difficult to the better student and the most difficult the teacher reads.

Each student will be assigned a number and previous to the number the passages in the story to be read aloud, so that she knows exactly who will read what - thus reducing the inattention and increasing learning.

Dr. Manning was thanked by Jack Ritcey, Supervisor of Curriculum, Digby.

Eight workshops were conducted by Dr. Ruth Seaman for reluctant readers: Ann Blackwood on creative work in Language Arts; Lois Gower on reading readiness. Eric Smith. Reading Records: Rosemary Gilbert on ETV Language Arts with ten students from Miss Cleaves room. Reading Games with Jan Maddison; Kathie Swenson on Development of Personality of self and others and Marion Kennedy On Story Time were received with great enthusiasm by the teachers

#### MORE ON THE BEAR RIVER CANNON By Foster Hall

A great deal of speculation and comment has arisen in Bear River since the subject of the Cannon has been broached. Much of it far from the truth, but some of the information gathered of great interest. Fears expressed that the interest shown was that of a scrap metal dealer anxious to cash in on the present high price of old iron, or an American curio hunter with a desire to own the biggest gun in his home town have been put to rest. The information received as to how the gun came to Bear River in the first place is very interesting. Pending correction from someone who has all the facts, the following version seems to have general approval in the village.

Many years ago a battery of three guns was placed at the mouth of the Bear River, on the east side in the locality of the site of the old bridge, just recently removed. This defensive operation is supposedly connected with the Fenian raids, (1732?) The battery was never called into action; one gun was returned to Annapolis; the clay bank on which the battery was set collapsed and the second gun was buried, and is probably still there; the third gun hauled into Bear River at a later date by a band of youths led by the late R. Purdy. After lying around for some time it was given a sort of semi burial, muzzle up, at its present location. No one seems to be able to say why, or recall its use, either as a hitching post for horses or a ship mooring post. And there it has remained until this day.

At present is serves a double purpose. It helps to support a Power Commission pole; and it acts as a bench marker for the many lot line of the properties clustered around it. Its removal would only pose a small problem for the Commission; but who would dare to disturb so sacred an institution as a bench mark? Perhaps the enthusiast with a concern for local history will have to turn his attention to cannon number two. A good metal detector and a little luck may well bring this one to light and restored and set upon a new gun carriage it could become a community possesion. Who knows, it may even have some of its past honour restored by finding a place in the Bear River Cherry Carnival parade.



#### Borax brightens winter fires

ONCE the daily or weekly newspaper has been read. and articles of interest clipped and put in the kitchen drawer. there still remains a large quantity of paper to get rid of. There are three ways of disposing of these accumulations of news-

You can throw them in with your regular garbage, which we are not encouraged to do in

You can bundle them up for someone comes around regularly to pick up old newspapers.

Or if you have a fireplace you can try your own personal recycling system by making logs for winter evenings. By adding one of several chemicals, you will finish up with an inexpensive log which will burn with brightly coloured flames to enjoy on those dismal winter evenings

All the chemicals listed below are fairly easy to obtain but need to be used with common sense and caution. Keep them out of the reach of children and pets, and mix them in a disposable plastic container as most of them will corrode metals. Don't use a container you might unthinkingly later use for food, it's better to be safe

And remember, in this case red and yellow do not make orange so don't try to combine chemicals for different colours. Rubber gloves are probably a good idea too.

the chemical you choose to a half gallon of water. Soak the newspaper thoroughly in the solution and drain off the excess liquid. Then roll the sheets of newspaper tightly until you have a log of the required size

For a purple flame, use Lithium Chloride; red - Strontium Nitrate; orange -- Calcium Chloride; yellow --- Potassium Nitrate; apple green — Barium Nitrate; blue — Copper Sulphate. All these chemicals can be obtained in a large drug-

Without even leaving the house, you can find chemicals to produce two of the most attractive colours. Common table salt will give you a yellow flame and for a startling green flame use a solution of pure borax such as 20 Mule Team Borax.



Many do feel the worthlessness and bleakness of living. It may be that they are cut off from God and withering like a branch chopped away from the tree.

To spend our years away from vital relationship with the living Saviour is to have a dead existence, and a pointless future.

It doesn't have to be this way. Again this same Word assures the reader, "If Ye abide in Me...Ye shall ask what ve will and it shall be done.."

Prayer gets answered when the lifeline of faith is solid between the Lord and ourselves. Practice is better than theory as we, "Abide in the vine and He in us."

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W. H. Horner of the W.H. Horner and Associates Ltd.. Consulting Professional Engineer made his report of the second study on pollution control for the Municipality of the District of Digby when the Council met in regular sessior. on Monday. Phase one was a preliminary study to determine where pollution control was needed most and phase two looked into ten areas where pollution was worst as found in visiting the sites. Maps were exhibited with the report showing present buildings and future engineering plans in developing a pollution control

In reply to questions posed by councillors, Mr. Horner compared the cost of sewage pumping stations and treatment plants. The decision to have more pumping stations on treatment plants depended on the capacity and the degree of quality of the station. The

lagoon pollution process was placed before Mr. Horner but he said these had not proved to have the best operation.

Mr. Horner reminded the Council of the federal and provincial grants available to municipalities in installing a sewage system and gave a break down of estimated costs in various regions of the municipality. Estimated captial cost in Phase I at Weymouth was \$883,000 of which \$308,960 would ·come in direct grants leaving a balance of \$574,040 to be financed. The annual amortization cost (ten per cent interest for 30 years) \$60,850 with 79 per cent being the effective provincial share of \$48,300 and the 20.6 per cent of \$12,500 the effective municipal share. The estimated annual operating and maintenance costs are \$10,300 making a total annual cost of \$22,850. There would be 259 units served in the Weymouth study making a cost

of \$88.22 per unit.

Similarly Mr. Horner worked out estimates for other villages with resulting figures being Bear River, 90 units at \$87.77 per unit on the Digby County side and 93 units at a cost of \$96.07 per unit on the Annapolis County side; Smith's Cove, 64 units at \$146.64 per unit; Digby North 89 units at \$125.46 per unit (including estimated costs for use of the town pumping and treatment facilities; Digby South, 86 units, cost per unit \$124.83) sharing town facilities; Centreville 35 units, 127.14 per unit; Sandy Cove 60 at \$130.83; Tiverton 70 at 123.42; Freeport 100 units at \$114.50 and Westport, 105 units at \$145.57 cost per

### Seek to Retain Marshlands

Chipman Chisholm, president, presided at a meeting of St. Mary's Bay Marshland owners and farmers at the Conway Co-Op on Wednesday to deal with the matter of retaining the marshlands for cultivation. Present were the **Deputy Minister of Agriculture**, Charles Douglas; Joe Casey M.L.A. and Malcolm Woodland of the Marshlands committee of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture.

The marshland owners had directed a resolution to the Agricultural Department stating the advantages and useful purposes of the marshlands which had been instituted in 1961 at the head of the Bays. At the time the marshlands with the dyke had been instituted at an initial cost to the N.S. government of \$125,000. Today the dyke is badly in need of repairs on the marshlands, which took six years to clear from salt, will again go back to the salt water.

The resolution included the results of a survey which revealed the marshlands at an acreage of 720 with 457 acres in use. Three hundred and fifteen are in pasture, 87 for hay and 55 in grain. Department engineers had

not been encouraging about repairing the dyke but the farmers felt the amount of hay and pasture land produced should not be neglected in such a time when there is such a demand for food. The retaining of the marshlands they felt would stimulate the whole agricultural industry in the area and be of great value to the farmers of today and future generations. Many livestock producers are fully dependent on the dykeland for pasture and other livestock feed production. The aim of the farmers is to maintain 600 head of cattle on the dykeland. It had been found, the farmers said, that this dykeland has more potential for producing good high quality livestock feed than much of the upland produces.

While Mr. Douglas realized the difficulties repairing the dyke because of rock fill having no solid footing but he did gain much information to give the department on his return to Halifax. The possibility of pilings being placed to retain the dyke area was mentioned and the suggestion was made that this should be ex-

perimented upon. Members of the Marshlands development felt that none of the young people would be interested in investing money into the St. Mary's Bay Marshlands unless they can be assured that the government will provide the

Joe Casey, M.L.A. told the farmers that the initial cost

was not detaining a reply to the brief presented but the government had to be assured that the rock or pilings remained secure if repairs were attempted. Mr. Casey and Mr. Douglas hoped for a favourable reply when they returned to the Minister of Agriculture with the information they had obtained at the meeting.

## Mental Health Teach-In A Success

The first national "teachin," organized and carried out by the Canadian Mental Health Association, held October 16 to 18 in Ottawa, has been deemed a real success. Well over 500 delegates from Mental Health Association branches from the North West Territories to Newfoundland as well as mental health professionals and representatives from other helping organizations attended the teach-in which focused on helping troubled people in the community. Included were close to 40 delegates from Nova Scotia. Attending from Mental Health - Digby were Rev. John Stokoe, Vernon Wessell, branch President, and Mr. and Mrs. Victor Cardoza.

The opening event of the teach-in was an exhibition of art work by troubled people across Canada. Held in the National Art Centre, the exhibition served highlight another approach to helping troubled people. For many of these people art has led to a rediscovery of the capacity to feel and to give expression to feeling. Very often this has been a healing process.

Miss Coline Campbell. M.P. for South Western Nova Scotia and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Health and Welfare, opened the exhibition. Introduced by Mr. Travis Cushing, President of Mental Health -Canada, Miss Campbell commended the association for developing the exhibition as a part of their program in connection with the national teach-in.

Keynote speaker for the opening session of the teachin was M. Claude Castonguay of Quebec. In

his address M. Castonguay stressed the need for the creation of greater understanding of the needs of troubled people and the effective ways of meeting these needs. He noted that, while general programs played a part, there is also need for specific projects aimed at meeting specific problems.

The thanks of the more than 500 attending the opening session were expressed to M. Castonguay by Victor Cardoza, former President of Mental Health -Nova Scotia. Mr. Cardoza presented Castonguay with a gift on behalf of the assemblage.

Four main lecture sessions were featured at the two day teach-in. Some 34 subject workshops were also presented as were territorial and provincial workshops. The lecture sessions, workshops and special interest group sessions were repeated so that as many delegates as possible could attend a majority of the study sessions.

The four lecture sessions were focused on working with and through the media; working most effectively with others in the community; how to work with and through federal, provincial and municipal governments; how to make better use of professionals and mental health services. All of the workshops and lecture sessions were aimed at bringing more effective and better organized help to people in trouble in the community.

Then again looking ahead without moving, he knew he was yet in St. Mary's Bay, where angels are not numerous, so an idea which made him shudder, came to him, that perhaps his satanic majesty through one of his demons was on the point of carrying himbeneath the waters and so on down till hot coals were reached, for breaking some law, human or divine. But as he had no wish to depart yet awhile, either above or below, he, gaining courage, put his hand around to his back and grasping what seemed to be a warm stick, a great fluttering of wings and feathers flying, soon convinced him it was very queer angel or demon, for on bringing himself to look at what he was struggling with, to his utter amazement it proved to be a crane. Now why a crane should fly onto a man's back seems unanswerable, but as there were some fish in the boat, and being dark, and the young man perfectly still, accounts for it. The crane was simply on a fishing excursion, and he wanted to get some without having to catch them, just as some trout fishermen do. For fear the above may not be believed, we will give the name of the young man, who is Theodore Melancon, the well-known and popular singer of this place.

NOVEMBER 2, 1877 (97 years ago)

#### Agriculture - Farming Technology

Nova Scotia's Minister of Agriculture and Marketing, Hon. Jack Hawkins, today announced a new course in farming technology, starting at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College this year.

"The course is designed to prepare students for careers as operators of modern farms," Mr. Hawkins said. "It is hoped that it will tie in very very closely with both the young farmer policy and the land leasing and land banking policy in such a way that it will encourage and make possible for many of our well trained young men to become future farmers."

The farming technology course will contain on-farm training as well as a minimum of five semesters of courses and projects on the campus of N.S.A.C. A minimum of eleven months is planned on selected farms for instruction and experience under the farm operator.

The prerequisite for admission to the farming technology course is the successful completion of one year of the following agricultural technician courses: agricultural business, animal

science, or plant science. The on farm training requires that satisfactory levels of proficiency be obtained in a number of farm skills, and in the planning and management

aspects of a farm operation. These skills and learning experiences will be the responsibility of both the student and the farm instructor, and they will be clearly established and documented for

## the course of study. There will

evaluate the level of skill acquired. Each student will be required

also be a testing program to

to complete a major farm project which will relate to the course of study at the college as well as to the on-farm training situation. This project will the student's indicate knowledge and ability to apply that knowledge to the resources of a specific farm.

The student will analyze the farm operation in detail. He will develop new objectives for the farm that will demonstrate his ideas of how the farm should develop, and he will lay out the detailed projections in a paper which will show the step by step changes required in financing, cash flow and labour to meet those objectives.

The on campus courses will be centred on management with the student taking a selection from on-going courses, depending on the farm specialty that he wishes for his future farming operation, thus enabling him to major in livestock, field crops, or horticultural production.

"Nova Scotia has opportunities for young farmers who can purchase into existing farm operations," Mr. Hawkins said. "Fifty per cent of our present farmers will be reaching retirement age by 1980. In the case of full time commercial operations, 25 per cent will be reaching retirement age in the next five years. There are also land and markets for new farm operations."

# M.S.I.Pharmacare for Nova Scotians 65 years of age or over

This is a brief description of the benefits and limitations of M.S.I.'s Pharmacare plan — please read it carefully. Pamphlets describing the plan more completely will be prepared shortly and distributed to all pharmacies and M.S.I. offices.

If you have any questions, please contact your nearest M.S.I. office — they will be pleased to help you.

#### **Benefits**

If you qualify for the Government of Nova Scotia's new Prescription drug program you will be entitled to receive insured services when ordered by your doctor or dentist for the following:

- All drugs which by law require a prescription
- Certain other drugs which are normally prescribed and which have been approved as insured drugs by M.S.I. (a list of these drugs has been released
- to all pharmacies). - Prescribed ostomy equipment

#### How to Claim under M.S.I.

Each eligible person should have received a personalized plastic "Pharmacard". Present this card to the pharmacy of your choice along with your prescription. The card can only be used to obtain drugs prescribed for the person named on the Pharmacard.

Participating Pharmacy
If the pharmacy has agreed to participate in the plan your card will be accepted and a claim form prepared listing the medication(s) dispensed and the cost. The claim form must be signed by you or the person you designate. The pharmacist will give you a copy of the claim and send one to M.S.I. for payment. The pharmacist will accept M.S.I.'s allowance as payment-in-full. You will not be required to make an extra payment for insured services provided by a Participating Pharmacy.

Non Participating Pharmacy

If the pharmacy has decided not to participate in the plan, you will be advised immediately upon presentation of your M.S.I. Pharmacard. You will be required to pay for any prescription dispensed. The Non Participating Pharmacy will complete a "Pay Patient" claim form for you, or you will be provided with a form and the pharmacist will give you sufficient information to enable you to complete the claim form. Send the completed form to any M.S.I. office and you will be reimbursed by M.S.I. in an amount equal to what would be paid a Participating Pharmacy for dispensing the same prescription.

#### Other Authorized Providers

Provision has been made to insure drugs dispensed by a physician where there is no pharmacy within 15 miles of the physician's office. Drugs dispensed by other physicians will not be insured.

Provision has also been made for Nursing Homes, Extended Care Facilities and similar institutions to be granted "authorized provider" status by M.S.I. for the dispensing of insured prescription services to registered patients.

**Prescription Quantities** 

A single prescription is limited to a 34 day supply unless your physician and pharmacist agree that a larger quantity can be safely dispensed, in which case a 100 day supply is allowed under the plan. Amounts in excess of 100 days supply will require the prior approval of M.S.I.

#### Limitations


The program is not intended to cover the cost of preparations you would normally purchase from a pharmacy without obtaining a prescription from a doctor or dentist. Unless specifically approved by M.S.I., the following medications and supplies are not covered under the plan;

- Patent medicines and so-called household remedies
- Laxatives, antacids, cough and cold remedies, vitamins, analgesics (pain relievers) and other similar products readily obtainable without a prescription.
- Bandages, dressings and similar
- Trusses, canes, convalescent aids, prescription accessories and other
- similar non-drug items. Any insured service to which the resident is entitled to benefit under D.V.A.. W.C.B. or any legislation of Nova Scotia or any other jurisdiction.

#### Recruit For R.C.M.P.

The first phase of recruiting for the new RCMP auxiliary force will commence this week in the Halifax, Truro and Sydney areas.

The auxiliary police program, a joint undertaking of the RCMP and Nova Scotia Emergency Measures Organization, is intended to provide trained police assistants to the RCMP in natural emergencies or when a national emergency exists.

RCMP detachments in Halifax, Dartmouth, Chester, Truro, Stewiacke, Tatamagouche, Glace Bay and Sydney have been designated as the first units to recruit and train the volun or policemen. An authorized number of volunteers has been established for each of the eight detachments.

The second phase of the recruiting program involving other detachments in the province will commence in early 1975. Eventually, the auxiliary force is expected to number approximately 200.

To be considered for enrollment, an applicant must be between 19 and 55 years of age, between five feet, six inches and six feet, five inches in height and in good physical condition, single or married, established within the community he will serve and recommended by the NCO incharge of the detachment

The volunteer policemen will receive training in criminal law, crowd control, emergency planning, first aid, small arms familiarization and traffic control. They will serve on a part-time basis without pay except during an emergency.

#### Remember ... Think ... Participate

On November 11th, Canadians all across the country will stop and remember the 114,000 men and women killed in wars.

That is why November 11th is called Remembrance Day.

But what about those who can't remember Canada's

Well, let's look at our theme: REMEMBER ... THINK ... PARTICIPATE

What does it really mean? There are more Canadians today who cannot remember war than at any time in this century. Since 1945, we have enjoyed a longer period of peace and freedom from a major war than any other period in this century.

But whether or not one can actually remember war, he should think about it particularly at this time of year. The very fact-that you cannot remember war is something to think about. It means that you are extremely fortunate.

Imperfect though the peace has been, it is much better than war. So when we think about the poppy, we might be reminded that Canadians who died liberating Europe created a world a little better than the one they knew.

We might also think of where Canadians first found poppies. In the First World War, the soldiers noticed that the red poppies often grew over the graves of their friends. And they remembered this later when peace came.

Today, we normally associate flowers with peace. The poppy is the first peace flower, because it is the flower which won the peace.

Another thing to think about is that by the time thousands of young Canadians went to war, Europe was in slavery. They died liberating millions of people. They also died so that we here today could continue to enjoy the freedom which we have. They died so that your home would be safe; so that you would be given the chance to go to school and to the church of your choice. They also died so that you could make friends with whomever you pleased.

You might think about this for a moment: their desire that you live in peace and freedom was more important to them than

Today, some people misuse freedom. They think it is a license to burn buildings or call other people pigs. Freedom without a sense of responsibility is worse than the evil Canadians died trying to destroy.

Therefore, the poppy finally asks you to think about your

sense of responsibility: in your classroom; in your home; in your community.

The poppy – the flower that won the peace - urges you to use the peace to help mankind; to promote a more lasting peace, understanding and above all...the dignity of man everywhere.

The Canadians who died believed in a better future. It is up to you to work for this future. If you do, you will have remembered. And when you wear a poppy, you participate by showing the world that you also care.

#### Red Cross Commissioner Addresses Local Organization

Charles Illsley, Commissioner of Nova Scotia Division Canadian Red Cross was guest speaker and showed a film on Red Cross work at the Digby Branch annual meeting on Wednesday.

# Hon. A. M. Cameron Disappointed Treaty Not Signed



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Hon. A. M. (Sandy) Cameron, Nova Scotia Minister of Fisheries expressed disappointment that a treaty was not signed at the Caracas sea conference last summer for a 200-mile coastal limit. Mr. Cameron was speaking at the annual meeting of the Digby County Liberal Association chaired by Emanuel Adelaar, president, and held in the Digby Lions Hall.

Mr. Cameron felt that if Canada does not obtain jurisdiction and management of the territorial limit off its coast. it would be a most serious matter for Nova Scotia fishermen. Fisheries resources, he said, are only renewable as long as there are fish to reproduce. He particularly mentioned the dwindling herring stocks. He felt that all aspects of Nova Scotia fishing such as packing, operating and marketing would be benefitted by a 200 mile limit.

Referring to the Caracas conference and the delays, Mr. Cameron pointed out that 149 nations were involved and there were six official languages to translate.

Although Mr. Cameron would like to have seen the Law of the Conference come to agreement on the 200 mile limit, he did feel that progress was made at Caracas. Negotiations around the conference table brought out issues which will

facilitate the resolving of problems more quickly. He stressed that fisheries was a provincial concern as well as federal.

Mr. Cameron was introduced by Joe Casey, M.L.A. and thanked by Victor Cardoza.

Other speakers were Coline Campbell, M.P. and Mrs. Casey. Miss Campbell was presented a bouquet of red roses by Keith Finigan on behalf of the party and Ronald Morehouse gave a coffee cup gift to Mr. Casey.

Both Miss Campbell and Mr. Casey referred to the three F's of importance to the area fishing, forestry and farming.

Miss Campbell told of her work in Ottawa and the establishment of an office in Yarmouth as well as in Ottawa where she also is parliamentary secretary to the Minister of Health and Welfare.

Mr. Casey reviewed some of the accomplishments during the Liberal Government in Nova Scotia such as ditching and paving, completing the Weymouth bridge, purchasing a liquor store in Weymouth, introducing new farm policies.

He spoke of the packing place for herring in Digby and hoped that this would also lead to establish barrel making in the area. He said this is a market for large herring which was not here before and he hoped it would also open to small herring.

Mr. Casey reminded the audience of the ferry service at Tiverton and Westport and the dredging and extending of the wharf.

He cited such accomplishments as free dental Department Recreation, full time Minister of Fisheries and Pharmacare. Minimum wages were raised to 2.00 per hour and it will be 2.25 in January.

Cost of living Mr. Casey is being combatted by taking tax off footwear and clothing and by subsidy to fuel oil and gas reducing oil by 13 cents per gallon. He also noted that the domestic rates of electrical power from the Nova Scotia Power Corporation were not increased.

Five scrolls were received. They were for Edgar Wetmore, Beaver River; M.P. Oickle, E.F. Trimper and A.M. Harris of Bear River and J.H. Thorburn, Granville Ferry.

Mr. Tufts extended thanks to Mrs. A.L. Robinson, Mrs. Joseph Currie and two daughters, Miss Linda MacIntosh and the youth group, Layton Hinxman, Mr. Lister Hannah of D.R.H.S., the radio station and the press, Roderick Milne who is a director for Blood Donor Services and his assistant Mr. Joergensen. Mr. Tufts thanked all who had assisted as area chairmen and district committees.

The Women's Work Committee report was given by Mrs. H.M. Warne. The finished articles numbered 1452 which was decidedly down from the 2341 total of the previous year. Mrs. Warne attributed the decrease to the fact that Mrs. Oscar Van Tassell was not able to do as much work as former years because .of health reasons. Mrs. Warne itemized the articles to include.

# Legislature Sits Nov. 7

The official reopening of the 51st session of the provincial legislature will take place Nov. 7. Speaker Vince MacLean announced after consultations with Premier Regan. The official ceremony will be at 3:30 p.m.

Premier Regan has indicated the government plans to introduce several new pieces of legislation as well as complete the business left over from the spring.

The major item to be dealt with has already been virtually guaranteed passage through the legislature. Legislation gran-

ting teachers the right to strike and including non-teaching personnel in the Nova Scotia **Teachers Union bargaining unit** will be introduced by the government, and has already gained opposition support.

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



unapproved plastic containers are "out". The hazard of breakage of one and rupture of the other, too often, are major causes of accidental fires.

In fact, as A.P. Doney, Supervisor, Gasoline and Salvage Yards Licensing Division of the Board of Public Utilities, pointed out, it is not only against the law for any person to dispense gasoline into any portable container that fails to comply with regulations under the fire prevention act but, also, an offence to transport gasoline in such containers in any passengercarrying vehicle.

"That", Mr. Doney says, "is what the regulations made under the gasoline and fuel oil licensing act say. They are regulations which retail gasoline dealers wish to respect and which they endeavour to explain to their customers."

"And yet," he continued, "there are many customers who get pretty nasty and give these same dealers a hard time because they won't put flammable liquid in old vinegar bottles, or in thin, plastic containers which were never meant to carry anything but water."

Another regulation stressed by Mr. Doney is that people who fail to obey the regulations might very well, upon apprehension, find themselves in court and faced with a \$100 fine.

What such people overlook entirely is that there is good, sound reasoning behind such a regulation - an attempt, as **Provinical Fire Marshal Robert** Kerr pointed out at a firefighters seminar recently, to reduce a potential fire hazard which attends the breaking of a

She was one of the early teachers of home economics in Nova Scotia prior to moving to Winnipeg where she directed the Women's Work Program of the Manitoba Extension Service in 1918-1919. She resigned when she was invited to accept similar duties in her native province. Miss MacDougall held the Nova Scotian post until her retirement in 1945.

She was Superintendent of Women's Institutes in Nova Scotia for over a quarter of a century.

The late F. Leslie Wood, 1894-1974, a New Brunswick native, also appointed to the Hall of Fame, was a graduate of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College where in 1915 he was awarded the Governor-General's Medal for academic excellence and first prize awards in both livestock and seed judging. Graduation from the Ontario Agricultural College, where he obtained his B.S.A., followed in 1921.

Mr. Wood's career covered a space of well over four decades as Poultry Superintendent and Director of Poultry Services on the staff of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture.

He is remembered, particularly, by many ex-service personnel of World War II who enrolled for the Canadian Legion Educational Services Correspondence Courses in Poultry which Mr. Wood had

prepared. It was he, too, who marked the 19,124 examination papers submitted for review and correction.

For this effort to assist in the rehabilitation of ex-service personnel, Mr. Wood was made a Member of the Order of the British Empire, and elected a Fellow of the Agricultural Institute of Canada.

The third Atlantic Hall of Fame recognition honored the late Almon Boswall, 1883-1967, whose achievements in the breeding of sheep and swine were recognized not only in his

native Prince Edward Island but throughout Canada.

Mr. Boswall was a familiar figure in the show-rings of Eastern Canada and at the All-Canada Swine Show, held at Brandon, Manitoba in 1957, his entries had the distinction of being awarded no fewer than twelve prize ribbons.

In 1961, Mr. Boswall was made a member of the Canadian Agriculture Hall of Fame, the first Prince Edward Islander to be so honored, and the only living member then of the Hall of Fame Association.

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# FOR MARSHLANDS

Nova Scotia's Minister of Agriculture and Marketing, the Honourable Jack Hawkins, announced that rock facing and dvke reinforcement estimated to cost \$75,000 will begin this winter on the St. Mary's Marsh in Digby County.

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The improvements will be made to approximately 2500 feet of dyke, protecting 700 acres of marsh. Four hundred acres of this is under good nroduction and on the balance the salt level has declined to a point where production will increase in the next 2-3 years. About 125 acres of the marsh is used as community pasture. This pasture had a carrying capacity of about 175 head of cattle in 1974.

There are about 15 major farm operators involved who maintain approximately500 head of cattle. "Large blocks of good farm land in Digby County is not readily available," said the minister.

Engineering and soil reports indicate that the type of soil on the dyke makes it difficult to get an adequate footing, and while there is concern over this problem, I feel that the interest in the agricultural industry in Digby County is such that we should do everything possible to expand and develop the land hase and I am very pleased that we are going ahead with this dyke improvement," said Mr. Hawkins.

"The potential for future agricultural development in Digby County is very encouraging," said the Minister. "Many Digby County farmers are young and livestock numbers on farms are continuing to increase. Digby

County also has excellent potential for horticultural crops and is the centre of our fur farming industry in Nova Scotia."

"With this kind of potential we feel that all agricultural land possible should be made available to the developing agricultural industry in the country," said the minister.

Mr. Hawkins made the announcement before a group of farmers at the Co-op, Conway on Tuesday afternoon. Present with Mr. Hawkins was D.C. Milligan, superintendent and engineer for Nova Scotia Marshlands. At a previous meeting the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Charles Douglas, was in attendance and heard first hand the needs of the farmers and their dependence on the St. Mary's Bay Marshlands.

Present at both meetings were Joe Casey, M.L.A. and Bruce Gilliatt, agricultural representative for Digby County.

The meeting on Tuesday was presided over by Chipman Chisholm who thanked Mr. Hawkins for coming to Conway and for the decision arrived at. Others who expressed appreciation were Joe Casey M.L.A., Councillor Helen McNeil, Leonard Boudreau and Wayne Comeau who said he had a great deal invested in the marshlands and this will give him an opportunity to go ahead with his plans.

# New Councillors Take Oath Of Office

Digby Town Council on Monday evening at regular session ran into the wee hours of the morning, finishing the business of the session at 2:30 Tuesday morning.

Three councillors took the oath of office and promised to do all in their power for the good of the people of the Town of Digby. The oath was administered by His Worship, **Mayor Willard Kinney to Eileen** Chipman, new comer; Philip Robertson, re-elected and Guy VanTassell.

Following the ceremony the councillors took their appropriate seats and were welcomed by His Worship and the remaining councillors.

In response the three new councillors reiterated their promise to do to the best of their ability a service for the town and the people who had elected them.

Mrs. Chipman wanted the people who elected her to know that she intends at all times to do everything that one councillor can do to guard the interest and rights of all towns people with equality. Under no conditions, she said, will she be influenced, tempted or swayed in any other direction.

Mrs. Chipman saw a great need for improved communications between the citizens and councillors and she intends to work, she said, for that goal with the hope that the people keep in touch with her and she will keep her mind open to suggestions and opinions and constructive criticism.

Councillor Chipman said she intended to keep taxpayers informed on her position in all matters relating to her duties as one of the six custodians of their tax dollars. Her message said that wrong would not at any time pass by her seat unprotested.

The first item of business to come before the council was honoring a committment of years ago by giving the deed of a Mount St. property to Mrs. A. Winchester.

Eric VanTassell, Mount Pleasant appeared before Council to request that street lighting be installed at Mount Pleasant. The cost to install would be \$1750 and \$33 per unit for maintenance. A system of payment had not been established.

Council signed an agreement to lease the Canon Bank building to the Kinsmen for

their use and permitted the Club to sponsor a Cystic Fibrosis Tag Day, November 16.

MacDonald Motors were granted permission to construct a warehouse, 40 x 80 on their property on Warwick St. The building would be of steel construction with concrete floor.

A motion to abolish occupancy tax in the town was defeated.

Discussion arose on whether or not parking meters should be covered for two weeks before Christmas as a courtesy to people. It was expressed that business people of the town and the staff take advantage of the free parking and shoppers cannot have the privilege. It was found that the traffic authority has sole authority and power to make regulations under the motor vehicle act.

Councillor Chipman raised the question of how much the town might profit or lose in the appointments of a meter reader or special constable and also the method of engaging a town solicitor. She asked council if they had ever considered to employ a town solicitor as needed rather than on regular basis with a retaining fee.

Reports were heard from

Frank Robinson on sewer and water services and from Webster Dunn on parking meters. In October Mr. Dunn collected \$481.70 from meters, 120 tickets were issued, 52 collected and four cancelled. Seventy-five dollars worth of damages had been done to the meters.

Councillor Patrick Comeau displayed a model of a new town hall for Digby which he had constructed.

Glen Pitman, town clerk, in his report gave the result of the town election when 354 votes were cast for Eileen Chipman; 215 for Joe Hattie; 352 Philip Robertson; 294 Guy VanTassell and 270 Paul Winchester. He said the presiding officers were given \$35 and \$25 instead of \$25 and \$15.


# See New Fire Truck

He informed the guests about The Digby Courier, the home-town paper and the printing plant which will be paying out approximately \$70,000 in wages for the year. This money, he told the guests, is spent by members of the staff in and around Digby and means much to the economy of the area.

Discussion centered around Christmas advertising, Christmas Shopping Party down town, Christmas store hours and other subjects dealing with the Christmas trade promotion. Several merchants in the down-town stores are finalizing plans to proceed with the 1974 Christmas promotion

requested to bring back some pertinent information.

The estimated total cost of purchasing the required truck and attachments was given by Mr. Cummings as \$50,000. This was calculated on the prospect of obtaining a chassis for \$16,000 to \$17,000 and have it rebuilt to requirements and provide the necessary attachments. There was an urgency to complete such a deal which prompted the firemen to request an immediate decision on Monday evening. If their proposition was accepted there would be delivery of the truck by April or May of 1975. Otherwise it would take more than two years to obtain a suitable fire truck, the firemen advised.

There was a difference of opinion on the percentage shared by the government on such a purchase and the town clerk was asked to find out what might be expected in this respect.

His Worship Mayor Willard Kinney, who presided at the meeting and councillors were cognizant of the need of the fire equipment, knowing that in accordance with the fire underwriters their 20 year old truck should be replaced. Their delay in the decision was to find a way that the purchase could be financed. Mr. Kinney also suggested that other possibilities of purchasing might be looked into and found more reasonable.

It was estimated that the town would have to find \$20,000 at once, to which Councillor Guy VanTassell expressed that he'd sooner see a deficit in the yearly statement rather than wait and lose the purchase opportunity and lose out financially in the long run. A government letter was shown which revealed access to \$15,000 grant towards the purchase.

After further investigation on Tuesday the Council and firemen were to meet for further discussion and come to a decision within a few days.

BEWARE, HUNTING SEASON IS HERE Two of our correspondents this week remarked in

their copy or by phone that shots from hunting ammunition had been heard so near to their homes. This gives one a scarey feeling but their mention of it prompts us to send out a word of caution, not only to the hunters but to all the residents near hunting areas. Beware of accidents which could happen.

All too frequently the sad story is told of persons being shot in mistake for a deer. All too frequently an accident will happen to a careless hunter in handling or carrying his gun while loaded. And the story has been told of residents going about their daily chores on the farm only to see or hear a bullet whiz by or even cause injury or death.

Hunting can be for some a happy sport but needless accidents take all the enjoyment from the art. Hunters should be stable enough to remain from shooting unless they are doubly sure of the target at which they aim. Farmers should not have to worry about the lives of themselves or their dependents while enjoying a stroll or work on their farm during hunting season. Hunting should have a price tag on it. The hunter should have to prove his skill and responsibility before he is issued a license to hunt.

The hunting season is on us. We should become aware of the fact.

HALLOWE'EN SPOIL SPORT

There is no question about it. Hallowe'en in Digby town, so far as we can see was a quiet one with little or no rudeness in celebrating the event. We feel that credit on this score can be given in much measure to the Digby Lions Club which extends "itself each year to entertain and find treats for approximately 600 children. The idea of the party in itself seems to lend a positive atmosphere instead of one of destruction.

However, villages and towns in surrounding areas and through the Valley were not as fortunate and buildings were destroyed by fire in the hands of Hallowe'eners. Dangerous tricks were played and accidents followed in the wake of the Hallowe'en spoil sports.

To spoil Digby's record, we are sorry to admit, came the news that some 35 to 40 windows were damaged the following night at the Queen St. School known as the Digby Academy. It is difficult to understand the warped mind that can deliberately set out on such a destructive mission yet if you pick up any newspaper between here and the Southern States you read of this ruthless destruction of property and food. There seems to be something amiss in the lives of people who resort to such destruction in today's society. We hope it is not past correction and that the country's leaders might take stock of the way life in these parts is shaping up before it is too late. The remedy, of course, might be difficult to find.

We can, to some degree, excuse the Hallowe'en spoil sports who get caught up in a cloud of excitement and gang spirit but what about those deliberate whirls of destruction. They are hard to understand when there could be so much done in a positive way to make life enjoyable.

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

# Dangerous We e d Discovered

Jimson-Weed, a poisonous plant especially dangerous to humans and livestock, has been found in two areas of Bear River and in Joggin Bridge, its first appearance in Digby County.

In County

Bruce Gilliatt, Digby County Agriculture Representative, points out that the weed is extremely dangerous and should be destroyed immediately. The seeds, of which hundreds are located in each pod, are now ripening and he advised that anyone seeing such a plant should burn it before the seeds are spread.

The plants located in Bear River were found near a manure pile and an old hay pile, with the one in Joggin Bridge being found in a vegetable garden, Mr. Gilliatt reported.

Jimson Weed (Datura Stramonimu, otherwise known as Jamestown Weed or Thornapple) can prove fatal if four to five grams of the plant or seed are ingested by a child. Skin eruptions can result on some indivduals by coming into contact with it.

The weed is a tree-like, course annual, reproducing by seeds and growing to a height of from two to five feet. It exhales a heavy nauseating narcotic odour and has egg-shaped leaves that are coursely wavytoothed.

The flowers, usually pretty and white to pinkish in color, are tabular and two to four inches long.

The plant contains highly poisonous alkaloids such as hyoscyamine, daturine, atropine and hyoscine. All parts are exceedingly poinsonous, especially the seeds.

Symptoms caused by the plant include headache, nausea, vertigo, extreme thirst, dry burning sensation in the skin, dilated pupils, loss of sight and voluntary motion. In extreme cases it can cause mania, convulsions and death.

It was originally introduced from a tropical climate and is found mainly as scattered plants in cultivated land, waste places and about buildings on rich soils.

The plant can be controlled by clean cultivation and weeding of seedlings, and by cutting and burning larger plants. Some herbicides effectively control it in the seedling stage.

# M.S.I.Pharmacare for Nova Scotians 65 years of age or over

This is a brief description of the benefits and limitations of M.S.I.'s Pharmacare plan - please read it carefully. Pamphlets describing the plan more completely will be prepared shortly and distributed to all pharmacies and M.S.I.

If you have any questions, please contact your nearest M.S.I. office — they will be pleased to help you.

### **Benefits**

If you qualify for the Government of Nova Scotia's new Prescription drug program you will be entitled to receive insured services when ordered by your doctor or dentist for the following:

- All drugs which by law require a prescription
- Certain other drugs which are normally prescribed and which have been approved as insured drugs by M.S.I. (a list of these drugs has been released to all pharmacies).
- Prescribed ostomy equipment

# How to Claim under M.S.I.

Each eligible person should have received a personalized plastic "Pharmacard". Present this card to the pharmacy of your choice along with your prescription. The card can only be used to obtain drugs prescribed for the person named on the Pharmacard.

**Participating Pharmacy** 

If the pharmacy has agreed to participate in the plan your card will be accepted and a claim form prepared listing the medication(s) dispensed and the cost. The claim form must be signed by you or the person you designate. The pharmacist will give you a copy of the claim and send one to M.S.I. for payment. The pharmacist will accept M.S.I.'s allowance as payment-in-full. You will not be required to make an extra payment for insured services provided by a Participating Pharmacy.

Non Participating Pharmacy

If the pharmacy has decided not to participate in the plan, you will be advised immediately upon presentation of your M.S.I. Pharmacard. You will be required to pay for any prescription dispensed. The Non Participating Pharmacy will complete a "Pay Patient" claim form for you, or you will be provided with a form and the pharmacist will give you sufficient information to enable you to complete the claim form. Send the completed form to any M.S.I. office and you will be reimbursed by M.S.I. in an amount equal to what would be paid a Participating Pharmacy for dispensing the same prescription.

# **Other Authorized Providers**

Provision has been made to insure drugs dispensed by a physician where there is no pharmacy within 15 miles of the physician's office. Drugs dispensed by other physicians will not be insured.

Provision has also been made for Nursing Homes, Extended Care Facilities and similar institutions to be granted "authorized provider" status by M.S.I. for the dispensing of insured prescription services to registered patients.

**Prescription Quantities** 

A single prescription is limited to a 34 day supply unless your physician and pharmacist agree that a larger quantity can be safely dispensed, in which case a 100 day supply is allowed under the plan. Amounts in excess of 100 days supply will require the prior approval of M.S.I.

# Limitations

The program is not intended to cover the cost of preparations you would normally purchase from a pharmacy without obtaining a prescription from a doctor or dentist. Unless specifically approved by M.S.I., the following medications and supplies are not covered under the plan:

- Patent medicines and so-called household remedies
- Laxatives, antacids, cough and cold remedies, vitamins, analgesics (pain relievers) and other similar products readily obtainable without a prescrip-
- Bandages, dressings and similar products
- Trusses, canes, convalescent aids, prescription accessories and other similar non-drug items.
- Any insured service to which the resident is entitled to benefit under D.V.A., W.C.B. or any legislation of Nova Scotia or any other jurisdiction.







# Constituency College Ste Anne Gets \$860,000 Begin Dyke Repairs Immediately

A grant of \$860,000 from the federal government under its languages program was announced for College Ste. Anne by Hon. Hugh Faulkner, Secretary of State, at a meeting in Church L'oint on Saturday. The grant will be put toward the increased operating costs of the Additional excollege. penditures will be shared with the provincial government.

The Secretary of State took part in the official opening ceremonies of the new Gymnasium at the Church Point college. In his address at the opening Mr. Faulkner said the new gymnasium would provide immediate benefit for the area's Acadian population through carefully planned programs.

Mr. Faulkner also expressed approval that College Ste. Anne has been "proceeding quietly in the domain of bilingualism by offering courses leading to degree status in French for the past several years."

The new gymnasium was officially opened by Nova Scotia Premier, Hon. Gerald A. Regan. Speaking alternately in French and in English, Mr.

Regan said that College Ste Anne can be justly proud of its contribution to the culture of the area and to post-secondary education for the past 84 years. He traced the recent developments in the history of the college which now has a lay board of governors and paid tribute Board and to the work of college President Louis R. Comeau.

Mr. Regan noted that in the late 1960's existence of the college was threatened. In response to these difficulties, he said, the province established an on going aid program for College Ste Anne. The Premier said that the institution has been the heart of Acadian culture in Nova Scotia. The province, "would not only see it maintained but expanded as well," Mr. Regan said. He said that, like other colleges, expansion is necessary if College Ste Anne is to meet the needs of students

Coline Campbell, M.P. for South Western Nova, who introduced the Hon. Hugh Faulkner to the more than 300 people gathered in the gym-

nasium for the opening, paid tribute, not only to those who have been involved in recent developments in connection with College Ste. Anne but also to those who over many years helped to maintain the existence of the college. this is under good production and in the balance production will increase during the next two to three years as the salt level in the soil diminishes.

One hundred and twenty-five acres of the land is community pasture and had a carrying capacity of 150 head of cattle this year.

"With the expansion taking place in the agricultural industry of Digby County everything possible should be done to develop the land base and this dyke improvement is one step in that direction," said Mr. Hawkins.

"The potential for future agricultural development in Digby County is very encouraging. Many of the farmers are young and the livestock numbers on farms are continuing to increase. Digby County also has excellent potential for horticultural crops and is the centre of the fur farming industry in Nova Scotia," he said.

"With this kind of development taking place in the county. we feel that more good farm land should be made available to broaden its agricultural industry," the minister said.



# Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

"Of all sad tales of mice and

The saddest are these, "It might have been."

These lines filtered through

my mind after a lengthy and arduous endeavour to relieve the homeowner and tenants of Digby of a most unnecessary and unrealistic tax. The Occupancy Tax was

introduced in late 1966. It was never mandatory and the maximum amount the towns and counties were allowed to charge was 20 per cent of the assessed value of real property. Digby town imposed the tax in January 1967 and took advantage of the full 20 per cent. while some of the other areas in the province set the rate at 10 per cent. Most of the town and county councils have now abandoned this tax or will do so as of January 1975.

At the regular meeting of Digby town council on November 4th. my motion to abolish the occupancy tax was supported by Councillors Guy VanTassel and Patrick Comeau. Councillors Phillip Robertson and William Reid voted to continue this tax in 1975, and the Mayor cast a vote in their support, resulting in a tie. Ironically, I believe this was the only motion on which the Mayor voted. Had he not done so, the occupancy tax would have been abandoned in Digby in 1975.

(Councillor Gordon Ellis was absent from this meeting.)

It is encouraging to note that the abolition of the Occupancy Tax may, at some future date, become mandatory if the provincial government adopts the recommendations of the Graham Royal Commission to abolish it.

It is lamentable that Digby, which was one of the first towns in the province to impose this tax, may be one of the last to abolish it-unless, or until it is required by law to do so.





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# Math Teachers Discuss Graham

A Brief will be sent to the Minister of Education by Senior High Math teachers from the Digby-Annapolis Inspectorate. The Brief will reject provisions in the Graham Commission Report which would end the teaching of Algebra and

Geometry to most Senior High students. The teachers met in Annapolis Royal on October 25 to discuss aspects of the report and matters of concern regarding local math curriculum materials. It was felt that algebra and geometry should be taught formally to all those students desiring to learn

these subjects. The teachers present, representing most local High Schools, were in agreement that the math taught presently in High Schools has immense practical value. The present program is comparable to that offered in other parts of Canada. The program is being

continuously updated, with the introduction of a wide choice of textbooks, possibilities for study about computers, and about calculus.

At a recent conference of Nova Scotia Math Teachers in Halifax, it was pointed out that many of these topics involve practical math which can be used in everyday life, in a technological society. It was felt that all citizens deserve a basic understanding of the mathematical principles underlying modern technology. A wide choice of courses is presently available, especially

in the larger high schools. There was agreement with provisions in the report emphasizing the importance of teaching basic math skills, with a partial return to the use of drill in the elementary grades. The whole matter is to be further discussed at a meeting of math teachers in Halifax.

# Federation Annual At Bridgewater

The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Federation of Alcohol and Other Drug Problems will be held at the Bridgewater United Church Hall on November 21st, starting at three o'clock p.m.

The FEDERATION ON ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG PROBLEMS is an organization made up of interested people from various Church Denominations who are endeavoring to do something constructive about the problems caused by beverage alcohol and other mood modifying drugs. It is involved in many aspects of a complex and serious social problem. The modest investment made annually by many who share such a concern make the program possible. Research indicates that teenagers experimenting with alcohol and other drugs, impaired driving, alcoholism in industry and alcohol related professional and family problems are all on the increase. The Federation does not have all the answers, but it is making a constructive and much needed contribution toward better solutions.

Originally the Federation was

supported by interested Churches, Church Groups and Individuals. Businesses were > approached for support and

many business Firms seeing the importance of Preventive Education were pleased to give financial support as did other Community and Fraternal Groups. But this combined support was not adequate to meet the changing demands in this complex field. The Government was next approached for support and for the past number of years the Provincial Government has provided a Basic and a matching Grant. The Federation is deeply grateful for the Grant provided by the Government on the recommendation of the N.S. Commission on Drug Dependency, without which it would not be able to carry on the program in which it is engaged

The single most critical element of the Federation's program which contributes to the achievement of the above objectives is its emphasis on Preventive Education. The more that is done in prevention, the less will have to be done in the field of Rehabilitation.

Mr. Brown noted that in less than one year the number of municipal recreation directors in Nova Scotia had increased from seven to 25.

Mr. Mooney explained that the Amendments to the Municipal Act and town's act would permit the Municipal units to utilize tax dollars for materials, services and equipment for recreational programs without requiring special legislation.

Pending the approval of the Amendments, some municipal units in Nova Scotia were limited in expenditures for recreation to only parks and playgrounds.

The new Bill also establishes a new formula for determining the earnings ceiling of the Plan, called the Year's Maximum Pensionable Earnings (Y.M.P.E.) in the legislation. The new formula provides that the Y.M.P.E. (the amount up to which a person may contribute) will be increased by 1212 percent each year until it catches up to the average earnings of Canadian workers as represented by the Industrial Composite of weekly wages and salaries published by Statistics Canada. After this transitional

period, the Y.M.P.E. will be kept parallel with the average earnings by equating it with a projection of Industrial Composite data. Mr. Lalonde stated that this change will play a vital role in substantially increasing C.P.P. benefits in the future. As a result of this change, he expects that, over the next decade, maximum C.P.P. retirement pensions will increase by about 250 percent, that is up to \$350 a month, and disability and survivor pensions will increase by up to 180 percent.

Under legislation passed last year, the Y.M.P.E. for 1974 was set at \$6600 and for 1975 at \$7400. That legislation also provided for the full escalation of benefits in pay in line with yearly changes in the Consumer Price Index. The new legislation is designed, therefore, to provide for changes in the Year's Maximum Pensionable Earnings in 1976 and and subsequent years.

A further change in the Bill will establish the basic exemption (the amount on which contributions do not have to be made) at 10 percent of the Year's Maximum Pensionable Earnings; under the current legislation this is set at 12 percent.. If passed, the new legislation will set the Year's Basic Exemption for 1975 at \$700. At the same time the Bill will delete a special provision that has applied to selfemployed persons, that is, the requirement that they must earn at least one and one-third of the Year's Basic Exemption

to qualify as a contributor. These changes will provide greater opportunity for people at lower income levels to participate in the Canada Pension Plan. In particular, increased numbers of farmers, fishermen and other selfemployed persons will be enabled to improve their protection under the Plan.

The bill also contains a provision which would allow individual members of religious sects to exclude themselves from the Canada Pension Plan in the case of sects that have "established tenets and teachings that oppose the acceptance of benefits from any private or public insurance that provides for payments in the event of death, disability, old age, or retirement."

Mr. Lalonde mentioned that these changes have been discussed with and have the support of the provinces. He also noted that Bill C-19 which contained the same features and which was debated by the last Parliament, enjoyed a broad measure of support from all political parties. Accordingly, he was hopeful that the new Bill would secure speedy passage by the new Parliament.

OTTAWA--Health and Welfare Minister Marc Lalonde today introduced a Bill in Parliament which would amend the Canada Pension Plan. This Bill has the same key features as Bill C-19 which Mr. Lalonde introduced in April of this year and which was being considered by Parliament just before its dissolution for the recent election.

Mr. Lalonde stated that the main purposes of the new Bill. as indicated in the Speech from the Throne, are to:

1. establish equal treatment for male and female contributors and beneficiaries under the Canada Pension Plan,

2. remove the retirement and earnings tests for retirement pensions,

3. establish a new formula for determining the Plan's earning ceiling and thereby establish the base for rapid growth of future C.P.P. benefits,

4. change the basis of the Plan's exempt earnings provisions and thereby provide a greater opportunity for people at lower income levels to participate in the Plan.

5. allow members of certain religious groups to exclude themselves from the C.P.P., and

6. make a large number of technical changes to improve the Plan, and, generally make it more effective.

The amendments that are designed to provide equal treatment for male and female participants in the Plan will pave the way for pensions to be paid to widowers on the same basis as they are now paid to widows. At the present time, widowers' pensions are only paid when the husband is disabled and has been financially dependent on his wife, On the other hand, widows' full pension are payable to (1) those widows over 45 years old, or (2) under that age and at the same time disabled, or (3) have dependent children. Reduced pensions are paid to widows between 35 and 45 years of age who are not disabled or do not

have dependent children. Under the new Bill, the provisions that now apply to widows will apply to both widows and widowers alike. The equality amendments will also make it possible for children's benefits to be paid on the disability or death of female contributors on the same basis as they are now paid with respect to male contributors. At the present time, such benefits can be paid in the case of a female contributor only in situations where the children were substantially dependent on their mother before her disability or death.

Another important feature of the Bill concerns the proposals for removing the retirement and earnings tests that now apply to C.P.P. retirement pensions. Under the Act, at the present time, contributors between 65 and 69 must retire from regular employment before they can qualify for a C.P.P. retirement pension, and recipients of these pensions who are aged 65 to 69 face the prospect of having their pensions reduced or eliminated if their post-retirement earnings exceed amounts stipulated by the legislation. Once the new Bill becomes law, these tests will no longer apply and persons 65 or older may draw their Canada Pension Plan retirement benefits whether or not they continue to work and receive wages.

# Westport

In Darkness

Westport was thrown into darkness on Tuesday evening when the power cable between Westport and Freeport was badly damaged. The vessel "South Wind" dragged anchor and caught the cable about 3:15 p.m.

Auxiliary power was expected to be supplied the following day but if the cable is broken it will take considerable time to obtain a new one for installation, it is understood.

In the summer of 1966 the power was off for 13 weeks because of cable damage. A new one was laid on August 19, 1966 with the "Danny and Penny" laying the cable. At that time auxiliary power was made available at the Post Office.

# 1975 License Plates Soon Ready

Nova Scotia's 374,000 motor vehicle drivers can soon purchase 1975 license plate stickers to be affixed to present plates. The black and white, reflectorized stickers go on sale in Registry of Motor Vehicle Offices at Halifax and Sydney on November 1.

Hon. Leonard L. Pace, Q.C., Minister of Highways, advises drivers that the deadline is December 31 and urged they avoid a rush by purchasing stickers early. This December date applies to passenger, trailer, farm tractor and general tractor plates.

Any extensions on getting stickers for commercial vehicles would apply until January 31, 1975. Extensions on obtaining stickers for passenger vehicles. motorcycles and dealer plates would be until March 31, 1975.

Mr. Pace estimates that 1975 revalidation stickers for about 350,000 vehicles will be distributed, representing revenues of \$15 million. This volume is six per cent above that of 1974 distribution and revenues. The stickers are in effect for one year. Instructions for attaching them are enclosed at time of purchase.

To help speed up the process, License and Registration offices in Halifax and Sydney are mailing vehicle reminders to drivers who need only fill out the accompanying form, enclose payment by cheque or money order, and mail contents to the registry in a selfaddressed envelope. License plate stickers are sent by return mail the same day the application is received at the two offices of the Registry of Motor Vehicles.

Applicants may also apply in person to the provincial registry offices. In Halifax the address is Head Office, Metro Centre, Kempt Road and Young Street. Drivers can also apply to the Registry of Motor Vehicles, Provincial Building, Prince Street, Sydney.

One category of vehicle has already passed its licensing deadline, said Mr. Pace. Revalidation stickers for snowmobiles were on sale from September 1 to to September 30, 1974. About 15,000 were licensed this year.

# 1975 Tax Indexing

The indexing plan for personal income taxes will result in an increase in tax exemptions and tax brackets of 10.1 per cent for the 1975 taxation year, Finance Minister John N. Turner announced today.

This will reduce taxes for all taxpayers from the amounts they would otherwise be required to pay. It is expected that some 225,000 taxpayers will be dropped entirely from the

The indexing plan, approved by Parliament in 1973 and introduced with the 1974 taxation year, provides for the major personal exemptions and deductions and tax bracket limits to be raised each year to reflect changes in the Consumer Price Index. In this way taxpayers will be prevented from being pushed into higher tax brackets by purely inflationary increases in income.

The adjustment for 1974 was obtained by dividing the average Consumer Price Index for the 12-month period ending September, 1974, by the corresponding average for the 12-month period ending September, 1972. This will result in the major personal income tax exemptions and the tax bracket limits being raised by 10.1 per cent from their current levels or by 17.4 per cent from the levels that prevailed in 1973, the last vear prior to indexation.

Basic personal exemption for 1975 will be increased to \$1,878 from the current level of \$1,706; the married exemption will rise to \$1.644 from \$1.492; and the deduction for the aged and disabled will be increased to \$1,174 from \$1,066. In addition. the maximum exemption for dependent children under 16 will rise to \$352 from \$320, while for children over 16 the corresponding increase is to \$646 from \$586.

It is estimated that federal income tax revenues will be reduced by more than \$750

million in 1975 as a result of the increase in the indexing factor from 1.066 to 1.174.

The new rate schedule resulting from indexing is set out in the attached tables which make no provision for any tax change which may be introduced in the forthcoming budget. These tables also indicate the savings for typical taxpayers at various income levels.

Revenue Canada, Taxation, will shortly distribute new withholding tables which reflect these changes. Taxpayers subject to withholding by employers should thus start to benefit in January, 1975, from these increased exemptions and deductions and the wider tax brackets.


The work on the grounds around the hall building is nearly completed. Grounds have been levelled, drains dug, gravel and fill hauled in and rocks removed.


liquidated. There seems to be no limit to what God's people can do when they see a need and catch a vision and commit themselves fully to the Lord Jesus Christ.

### Hunting Caution


Nova Scotia's Lands and Forests Minister, Dr. Maurice E. DeLory has urged all hunters in the province to exercise extreme caution during the current season.

In a statement issued Dr. Delory said that last year 12 hunting accidents occurred in Nova Scotia, three fatal and nine injury.

In 1973 four people were mistaken for game, three were shot as they walked into the line of fire, two were shot as the result of defective firearms and one each was caused by falling with a firearm, horseplay and ricocheting.

Seven of 1973's accidents involved shotguns, three highpowered rifles and two .22 calibre rifles.

"With over 100,000 license holders expected to hunt for big game and small game this year everyone should be very careful," the Minister said.



### - Measles

Hundreds of thousands of children in the world are victims of rubella (German Measles) which their mothers had when they were pregnant.

As a result, they are blind, or deaf, mentally retarded, suffer from congenital heart disease, and some are still-born.

Protection against these tragic results is available through rubella vaccination, said Dr. H.B. Colford, administrator. Nova Scotia's Child and Maternal Health, and Communicable Diseases, in announcing the policy of the Nova Scotia Department of Public Health regarding rubella vaccine.

The vaccine has been available free in Nova Scotia's public clinics since 1970, for children from the ages of one to

Unfortunately, only about one-third of the children in that age category have been vaccinated, says Dr. Colford.

Yet, vaccination is the best means of protection against serious birth defects.

Blood tests which determine whether a person is immunized, are given without charge at the Pathological Institute, University Avenue, Halifax.

The vaccine may not be given to a pregnant woman, nor should a woman plan to become pregnant within two months following vaccination, says Dr.

Colford. "If you think that you had rubella as a child, but vou are unsure, it would be wise to vaccinated anyway," Dr. Colford says. "In the past, rubella was sometime mistaken for another illness. It is a mild disease, and you cannot be sure that you have had it."

Symptoms of rubella include a fever and rash. Usually, the victim is not very ill. However, medical research done in the United States in 1964 established that if rubella . 3curs in pregnancy, 't can cause serious damage to the unborn

Vaccination is the best means of protection against the results of this disease, says Dr. Colford.

The wharf at New Edinburg, Nova Scotia, will be repaired under a contract worth \$76,660 awarded to a Digby firm, Beaver Marine Ltd., it was announced by the Minister of Public Works, the Honourable Charles M. Drury. New Edinburg is fifteen miles southwest of Digby.

Five bids were received in response to public advertisement. The successful bid was low. High bid was \$106,850.

Repairs will necessitate removal of a damaged section of the wharf and casing the existing outer end of the structure with untreated close timber piles. An untreated deck system and ballast stone fill will also be added. The work will be

Plans for the project were prepared for the Department of the Environment by the Halifax regional office,

complete in three months.

Department of Public Works. Project manager is A. L. Sallaj of that office.

Two contracts have been awarded to Port Hawkesbury Developers Ltd., Port Hawkesbury, Nova Scotia, for marine work in the Digby, Nova Scotia, area.

A \$39,903, contract was awarded for repairs to the wharf at Digby, and a \$34,200 contract was awarded for deck and fender repairs to a ferry wharf at Tiverton, about thirty

miles west of Digby.

The successful firm offered the lowest of six bids received for the Digby project; high bid was \$55,890. The bid for the work at Tiverton was the lowest of three received, the high bid being \$42,230.

### BEAR RIVER BREAK-INS

The village of Bear River suffered two more break-ins on Thursday night, Nov. 21st. The Oakdene School and the New Horizons Centre were entered, the Centre being the major loser, as the Stereo equipment, valued at \$175 was taken.

There seems to be no end to the activities of the group at present operating in the area, and little success in their apprehension. This seems to be due two factors; the increasing work load on the R.C.M.P. Detachment in the County area, which does not have the manpower to make effective night patrols; and the unwillingness of local citizens to come forward and assist the police with information that they have.

It seems incredible that a gang like this could operate on such a consistent basis without some parents or neighbours not being aware of the nightly activities, and in view of the action taken by citizens in other Valley areas, in the setting up of night patrols, it may well be to Bear River's advantage if similar action was taken here. Many local residents feel, that inspired by their present immunity from arrest, these people may turn to household robbery. when the supply of targets in the form of stores and community centres has been exhausted. If this does happen, community feeling may well express itself in a strong desire to do their own policing. This would be a drastic step, but there seems to be no other alternative in the light of the present situation.

-With all due respect to the efficiency and courteous dealing of the Digby postal staff we have to complain about postal service in other places which effect us. One Ontario subscriber sometimes gets his Digby Courier every week and sometimes he doesn't get one for two weeks. Three issues will arrive at once. In his speech, Mr. Cardoza spoke mainly on the Inns and Hotels that had been in operation in past years in the Cove, and bringing up-to-date those still in existence at this time. He took much of his material from Isaiah Wilson's writings who had, in spite of bad eves, walked to Weymouth and to Annapolis Royal searching the records for data on this area and surrounding Digby areas.

Mr. Wilson had also travelled to Windsor and Halifax over some thirty years, at his own expense, in order to obtain material for his history of the area. Mr. Cardoza also used the writings of Mrs. Hazel Clayton for background of local people and the inns.

One comment made by the speaker was that he was impressed by the fact that many descendents of original settlers still live in the area.

Among the hostelries mentioned was the first "tourist" hotel, known as the Hardwick House, later the Mason House, and finally known as Keltic Lodge which was situated on what is called Jaeggar's Point back of the Smith's Cove Trailer

and Tenting Park. Owners of this hotel were Mr. and Mrs. Hardwick, followed by their son, Bob, who was also a stage driver: Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mason; Bishop Jaeggar, Who was the last owner and who added to the structure as it was until it was destroyed by fire in 1950. The property was then purchased by Walter Flett.

The Out-of-the Way Inn . Pleasant View House managed by Evan Thomas was situated in the present camp grounds. The first non-tourist hotel was managed by Ben and Elizabeth (Odell) Hunt and was situated

where the home of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Berry now live. This hotel was a stage coach stop and named the Imperial House. Among the notes Mr. Cardoza had scanned, was the notation that the Temperance group had enjoyed a goose dinner at this inn for the sum of 65 cents per couple. In 1908 Angus Gidney took over the Imperial Hotel and named it Juanita Lodge. last owned by Fred McHug.

In speaking of a "tourist" hotel, Mr. Cardoza emphasized the fact that the tourists were not as they are now, but summer residents who brought their families and stayed throughout the summer, often becoming identified with the people of the community over the ensuing years.

The Cossabooms opened Harbour View House and Cottages in 1900 with the original dining-room seating 200 people. The original building was burned several years ago and the present building was at that time the Annex. Harbour View was later owned by Walter Flett, and is presently owned by David and Sylvia Irvine.

The meeting closed with a lunch served by Mrs. Kelsey Raymond and Mrs. Irvine which was highlighted by the singing of "Happy Birthday" and presentation of a birthday cake to David Irvine for his natal day.

# FARMERS HOLD ANNUAL

Leonard Boudreau, president, presided at the annual meeting of the Digby County Federation of Agriculture on Monday evening in Weymouth when Al Connor and Bruce Gilliatt talked and showed slides on Farm Land Leasing and the Land Bank Program. Mr. Connor is the resource development representative of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing and Mr. Gilliatt is the agricultural representative for Digby

County. Another guest at the annual meeting was Martin Vissers, president of the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture, Truro who gave a report on that organization.

The Land Leasing and Land Bank program designed to provide assistance for the production of agricultural products in Nova Scotia is a program in which the province acquires land of high agricultural capability for development, subsequently leasing such lands to selected bona fide Nova Scotia farmers to augment a scarce land resource. Farmers get a fiveyear lease at five per cent per year of the farm appraised value plus taxes. The lease can be renewed so long as the province finds the land is being properly developed. Reports were given by the

president and committee chairmen covering the past year's activities and new directions appointed to guide the federation in 1975. The new directors named were Louis Comeau, Comeauville; Murray Prime, New Tusket and Malcolm Justeson, Bear River for a three year term and Peter Balser, Shelburne 'Road and Wayne Comeau Marshalltown for two years.

Named on the nominating committee were Wayne Comeau, Bruce Gilliatt and Leonard Boudreau.

Representative to the Nova Federation Scotia Agriculture is Cameron Johnson of Bear River with Leonard Boudreau, Concession as alternate. (further details on the annual meeting next issue.)



# Notice To Motorists

(Owners Or Drivers)

### WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS DIGBY, N.S.

WHEREAS due to the congestion on the streets of the Town of Digby caused by vehicular and pedestrian traffic. and the limitation on the free use of the streets liable to be caused by the presence of ice and snow thereon, I am of the opinion that an emergency and a special condition exists, and I so declare,

THEREFORE under the authority of Section 180 (1) of the Motor Vehicle Act, as Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby, I make the following temporary regulations:

(1) Notwithstanding that certain traffic signs have been erected in the Town of Digby prohibiting or permitting the parking or leaving standing of vehicles upon sections of the highway during the hours stated thereon and notwithstanding the provisions of the Regulations made by the Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby pursuant to Section 137 (3) of the Motor Vehicle Act respecting Parking Meters and dated the 30th day of November, 1963, and amendments thereto.

(a) No owner or driver or persons having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave standing the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby between the hours of 12:01 o'clock in the morning and the hour of 8 o'clock in the morning of the same day.

(b) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby in such manner as to hinder, inconvenience or prevent the proper removal of snow or ice from such highway or street.

(c) The provisions of Clauses (a) and (b) hereof shall not

(1) The motor vehicle of a physician or surgeon parked reasonably near his office or residence and immediately available for professional calls.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by a physician or surgeon who is actually engaged in his professional occupation and reasonably near where he is so engaged.

(3) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the RCM Police.

(4) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

(5) Commercial vehicles parked by an operator for the purpose of loading or unloading merchandise.

(d) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall during the period from one hour after any snow storm has commenced to two hours after such snow storm has stopped park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in that area in the Town of Digby.

(e) The provisions of Clause (d) shall not apply to:

(1) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the RCM Police.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

2. The time above referred to shall be the time from time to time legally in effect in the Town of Digby.

3. It shall be an offence for any person to fail to comply with these regulations and any such person will be liable to a penalty provided by Section 266 of the Motor Vehicle Act.

4. Any peace officer may seize and remove any vehicle with which an offence has been committed under these regulations. 5. These temporary regulations shall be in full force and

effect from the 1st of December 1974 until the 31st of March, DATED at Digby, N.S., this 15th day of November, A.D.,



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

# ip enjoyed i ome of Mis r. P.ev. Pem TO CRACK DOWN ON NEEDLESS WELL ARE

Gerald Walsh, Vernon Wessell and Lewis Comeau of the Digby Social Service department appeared before the regular meeting of Digby Municipal Council on Monday, having been invited by the council to discuss matters of welfare, especially on the topic of welfare abuse. Councillors felt that abuse could be prevented to a great extent if the department consulted the councillor in the district where welfare requests were made. Councillors, they felt, were fairly well acquainted with the

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needs of persons in their own districts. Mr. Walsh agreed that the council has a responsibility to report cases of abuse.

A court case of recent date was mentioned which involved a person who accepted social service payments while receiving money from other sources. The outcome of this case, they felt, would be a detriment to any other person who might attempt social service abuse.

Council members, who find welfare costs rising, said they find welfare being deplorably

abused "left, right and centre". Mr. Walsh disagreed and said that it amounted to no more than one or two percent. He said that in the final analysis the decision was the department's responsibility and welfare could not be withheld unless there was a just cause.

With the figures presented to the Municipal Council and the tend of the economy, the municipal councillors felt that they had to carefully watch all spending. Warden Wilfred Swift, who presided, agreed that welfare as such was good

but many ratepayers are kicking about abuses. On the other hand, said Councillor Eric VanTassell, there are a great many families who need assistance of this sort but have too much pride to go on welfare.

An invitation had also been issued to the local R.C.M.P. to visit Council and discuss the subject of vandalism and crime as pertained to Digby County and assure the R.C.M.P. of the Council's co-operation and offer to help. Sergeant 'Bud' Abel represented the R.C.M.P. at the meeting on Monday morning.

Being understaffed seemed to be one detriment to law enforcement was the concensus of opinion. Including office clerks, there are 12 on the Digby R.C.M.P. staff. There are three constables for the town, four county men on investigation and two highway patrolmen. "you can't give a man a uniform without training", the sergeant noted. Also, Sergeant Abel said, that where they worked from 16 to 18 hours a day, duties are cut down to five days a week of eight hours each.

On the subject of drugs, the

sergeant said it has died out somewhat because the young people can't afford it. There had been cases in Weymouth, and on the Islands and Bear River was a "hot spot".

The subject of the lack of co-. operation by the public was discussed and the fright of retaliation if involved.

Bounty on bears came up for discussion and the Council decided to endorse a resolution of Annapolis County to the Department of Lands and Forests that bears be taken off the protective list.

It was reported that bears ate fields of grain at Landsdowne, they had been sighted across the highway on Digby Neck and other people were afraid to leave three and four year old children to play outside where a bear was seen walking between the garden and house in the North Range area.

Councillor MacNeil asked that a letter be sent to the Department of Highways asking when they expect to pave the Jordantown road. She said that tenders had been out and accepted but nothing done...

# TALKS ON LAND USE AND LAND BANK PROGRAM

Guests at the annual meeting of the Digby County Federation of Agriculture held at Weymouth on Tuesday evening were Al Connor, resource development representative of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing and Martin Vissers, president of the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture. The meeting was presided over by Leonard Boudreau, Concession, president.

The president, in giving his yearly report said that two years ago they were told that the farmers in Digby County did not want to farm anymore but there is a new lease on life in farming. He complimented the new agricultural representative, Bruce Gilliatt, on his accomplishments which helped to overcome the discouraging facts. He also spoke highly of the Limestone spreading service. He made special mention of the fact that the St. Mary's Bay marshlands were to be retained by dyke repairs and replacements for the land is valuable for hay and pasture for cattle. He expressed hope that the farmers will continue to work together because it is the only way of survival for far-

# CONSIDER **MORE FUNDS** FOR FISHING **BOATS**



Coline Campbell, member of parliament for south western Nova, stated in Ottawa that the Honourable Harold Huskilson, Mr. Hugh Tinkham, M.L.A., Senators Donald Smith and Ernest Cottreau, along with herself, met today with the Honourable Romeo LeBlanc, Minister of State for Fisheries. and Senior Officials of the Department to discuss the need for more funds to be allocated in the Boat Subsidy Program.

The delegation presented their concern for fishermen who have had their plans drawn up to have their boats built this winter and the fact that unemployment might result in the Ship yards in the area.

The Minister showed concern and assured the delegation that the problem is being examined thoroughly with the hope that a satisfactory solution can be found to alleviate this problem.

LeRoy Warner, president of the Bear River Agricultural Society, gave a report from that organization, the only society of its kind left in Digby County.

Mr. Gilliatt spoke of the improvements made at the Digby County Exhibition grounds and buildings such as enlarging the horse ring. He noted there was an increase in livestock both in quantity and quality at the 1974 exhibition. Attention to the condition of the barns was brought up to Hon. Jack Hawkins when he visited the exhibition and it is hopeful that the barns would be repaired in the next three or four years. He was concerned about the future and said he would like to see all Digby County farmers and ranchers to take part in the exhibition.

Lester Mullen gave the St. Mary's Bay Marshland report. He said that they noticed in May that the dyke had been eroding rapidly which distressed the owners who had invested money into it. They appeal to the government through Hon. John Hawkins and a \$75,000 repair job will be undertaken. He said that the owners had taken heart again and are taking a more intensive interest.

John Roope gave the report on the pasture lands. One hundred and forty-five head of cattle were pastured and fifteen calves were born on the pasture lands. One animal was struck by lightning, it was thought.

Mrs. Helen MacNeil. chairman of the Veterinary Board reported the veterinary had made 152 calls and 101 phone consultings. At present, Mrs. MacNeil said, there is no

# DIGBY LIBRARY **NEEDS FUNDS**

The possibility that the Digby Library might have to cease operations unless additional financial support is received was seen at a meeting of the Board of Directors, held at the home of Mrs. H. M. Warne last Wednesday evening.

The meeting was told by the treasurer, F. C. Purdy, that present revenues are insufficient to meet operating costs. Necessary capital expenditures to repair and maintain the library building cannot be met. it was stated, as the Admiral Digby Library and

Historical Society, which owns the building, is at present in a deficit position.

It was pointed out at the meeting that a number of repairs are badly needed in order to ensure proper maintenance of the library building which is one of the historic structures in Digby. The building was purchased several years ago by the Admiral Digby Library and Historical Society

and every effort is being made to restore and maintain the building as one of the valuable heritage properties in the community.

Plans to establish a museum on the second floor of the library building have been delayed because of the problems of financing. It is understood all monies presently being secured by the Society through donations and other support are being used for maintenance. These are inadequate to the need and will not permit continued operation unless additional sources of revenue are found, it was stated. The Society has been caught in the squeeze of rising fuel costs and fears are expressed current revenues will fall short of meeting these costs.

It was pointed out at the meeting there are more than 2,000 persons who regularly use the services of the Digby Library. Nearly 50 per cent of

# CASEY URGES CNR TAKE OVER FERRY

Joe Casey (I-Digby), obtained complete consent for his suggestion that the federal government, through Canadian National, take over the operation of the Canadian Pacific ferry service between Digby and Saint John, N.B. in the Legislature on Tuesday.

Mr. Casey charged that successive rate increases and cutbacks in daily sailings of the Princess of Acadia had caused the whole operation "to go sour''.

A trip between Digby and Saint John that cost \$10 three vears ago now costs \$22, Mr. Casey said. The per passenger rate has increased from \$2.50 to \$5. and the three-times daily sailing has been cut to twice a day in the winter.

"There are now rumors that service will be cut back to once a day. Truck rates have also been increased," said Mr.

Casey. Mr. Casey, who is also deputy House speaker, accused CP of increasing prices and reducing services to a point where traffic had fallen off.

Then they present figures to the Canadian Transport Commission designed to convince the government they should be subsidized on the grounds the service is unprofitable, he said.

Mr. Casey said he had no objection to subsidized ferry services "but what frightens me is CP's pleas for subsidies are but the first step towards further reduction of service."

If CN takes over the ferry service, it should also acquire the Dominion Atlantic Railway, "an orphan in CN territory," said the member from Digby, Canadian Pacific owns the

DAR. "When one considers the past history and concept of the DAR....then a takeover by CN, or, at the very least, an integration of facilities, would produce better services".



Mr. Casey said he has been assured the crew of the Princess of Acadia would be absorbed into the CN service without loss of pay, fringe benefits or seniority.

He said he believed a strong case could be made for selling sea travel to Nova Scotia from Saint John, especially to tourist who include the Annapolis Valley and the South Shore in their travelling plans.

"But...to market any commodity there must be a consistent quality of service and a competitive price factor."

Mr. Casey said if the publicly owned CN was given the sea route between Saint John and Digby, "any loss of revenue would be absorbed by the entire Canadian population".

In the long run, increased revenues resulting from the tourist industry would offset operating deficits incurred by the ferry service.

Mr. Casey said he was convinced that the tourist industry alone was sufficient reason to justify the ferry service.

Mr. Casey was supported in his resolution by members of both sides of the legislature, including Finance Minister Peter Nicholson, Dr. Gerald Sheehy (PC Annapolis East), and Glen Ellis (L-Kings North). PREPARE FOR FOOD SHORTAGE

This emphasis on using the good land for agriculture rather than for paved roads and idle summer resorts is not a fad or impulsive irresponsible thinking. With the increase in world population it could very well be difficult to find enough food to feed all the hungry mouths.

Nova Scotia has good land for agriculture and a considerable amount of acreage is not put to agricultural use. Indeed, the number of farms and farm acreage has gone down terrifically according to Al Connor, Resource Development Representative for the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing, who addressed the annual meeting of the Digby County Federation of Agriculture on Tuesday

While some throw up their hands in despair and say it is impossible for Canada to ever feed the world hungry, there is no reason why the agricultural lands should not be used to capacity to save as many as possible of the starving people. Instead of destroying millions of eggs and hundreds of calves some other system of acceptance to farmers should be instituted for making a profitable industry out of farming. To this end the Department of Agriculture and Marketing in Nova Scotia has provided assistance for the production of agricultural products through a Farm Land Leasing and Land Bank Program. Bruce Gilliatt, agricultural representative for Digby County outlined the objectives and possibilities of the program at the annual meeting of the Digby County Federation of Agriculture on Monday evening.

The program is designed to provide assistance for the production of Nova Scotia agricultural products by the province acquiring land of high agricultural capability for development, subsequently leasing such lands to selected bona fide Nova Scotia farmers to augment a scarce land resource.

The land shall be purchased by the province at a price based on auction, tender or other negotiations with the seller. Only the real property will be acquired by the Nova Scotia Farm Loan Board.

The farmer who leases the land (adjacent or near their existing property) for the purpose of developing a more economic farm business will have a five year lease at five percent per year of the farm appraised value plus taxes.

There are other benefits to the Farm Land Leasing and Land Bank Program which can be learned from Mr. Gilliatt or from the department. For those who are interested in doing a small share in providing food to feed the hungry or to develop land for greater profits might be wise to contact those in the know and be prepared to meet a food shortage if. necessary.

SAFE DRIVING WEEK BEGINS SUNDAY

Safe Driving Week starts Sunday, December 1. We cannot think of another week of more importance than a week which recognize the value of human life and attempts to save people from injury or death on the highways. Safe Driving Week, however, would be practically fruitless should the other fifty one weeks of the year ignore safe driving. It is a subject which must be constantly before the public with the hope that the concern will eventually sink in.

Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau reasons that Safe Driving Week does have some impact and we agree with him. His recent Safe Driving message to Canadians says "There was a time in Canada's recent history when the month of December was the worst in the year for fatal traffic accidents. This is one reason why December 1st - 7th is Safe Driving Week.

Now, more than half the months of the year have records worse than December. This suggests to me that the campaign does have an appreciable effect in saving lives and in helping to prevent injury. It also shows that there is still a long, long way to go.

As responsible Canadians, each driver must accept his duty to drive safely on our roads, so the awareness and practice of that obligation will extend great benefits to all drivers, their families and to Canada.

Safe Driving Week in Canada is sponsored by the Canada Safety Council. The message of B. J. Legge, QC. president of the C. S. C. has this to say: "The only thing one can say about traffic accidents in Canada, is that statistically, we do not have the worst record in the world. Unfortunately this is cold comfort because statistics cannot measure the pain of injury, the depression of economic losses, and the anguish of

Mr. Legge exhorts everyone to contribute to the week by driving defensively and by using safety belts. The theme for 1974 is to drive like you'd like everyone else to drive.

Right now the use of safety belts is a much takled about subject. Most are for them but there are those who disagree. The use will no doubt be mandatory as introduced in the Legislature by the highways minister. Hon. Leonard Pace, but in the meantime, it would be a good idea for our readers to voice their opinions for or against in these columns. They are open.

Whether or not seat belts become compulsory we urge everyone to heed the Safe Driving Week theme "Drive like you'd like everyone else to drive."

Surely we could get the assistance of Provincial Scientists in determining if it is possible to remove troublesome bears to more remote areas. Surely any animal, deer, bear or dog will occasionally tamper with property. We should be glad that we are sharing this land with all mammals.

Note that considerable havoc was made to highway signs in Kings and Annapolis Counties after the Halloween night celebrations, and I am wondering if local councils are proposing placing a bounty on humans.

Let us hope that the Annapolis County Council will take another look at this proposal before they present it to the Minister of Lands and Forests.

contract with a veterinary Dr. Calvin Rice resides in Digby and gives service on Thursdays and Fridays but is engaged in Halifax at other times.

An interesting part of the Tuesday night meeting was when Elmer Jarvis, retired farmer from Weymouth Falls presented the president with a cheque. Forty years ago there was a Weymouth North Agricultural Society and Elmer Jarvis is one of two of the members living today. The cheque presented to Mr. Boudreau represented the balance from that society in a Weymouth Chartered bank.

The report for Nova Scotia Board of Director of the Nova Scotia Federation Agriculture was given by Martin Vissers, president of the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture. Of the major activities of the Board were two which stood out. There was a meeting with the Honourable Otto Lang to discuss the domestic marketing of feed grain. Also there was a meeting with the Atlantic Parliamentary Caucus (M.P.'s of all parties) when papers were presented on feed grains, price stabilization, transportation and taxation. Besides these two meetings the Federation also expressed to Honorable John Hawkins, Minister of Agriculture, their apprehension of the encroaching of Government departments into agricultural fields in which they are not fully familiar such as Land Use Planning, credit. environmental control, labour and the motor vehicle branch as it pertains to farm vehicles. Other activities dealt with the

increase in the cost of limestone '(which increase was later absorbed by the department), requesting capital grants up to \$15,000 when erecting such buildings as grain storage and drying facilities, requesting tax free fuel to be used in farm registered trucks and requesting that land being used to its full potential not be taxed at a higher rate than potential agricultural land that is/kept out of production.

The report stated that a request had been made that the Farm Loan Board be placed under the jurisdiction of the Department of Agriculture: that an act be implemented for the Fencing and Impounding of a stray animals; that the cheap food policy be done away with and an "Agricultural Week" be established. The Federation in their presentation stated that if the agricultural industry is to make a significant contribution to food production, it would require a long term commitment from both levels of government, and unless such a acommitment was forth-coming they would continue to lose farmers at an alarming rate.

Mr. Vissers said the Board requested the removal of the twelve percent excise tax that applied to trucks used for farming and made representation to the Minister to have in the long term commitments to agriculture a policy of low interest rates and that the maximum for a Farm Loan be increased to \$200,000.

The educational committee of the Board recommended a course with on-farm training and had offered three scholarships. The Board requested capital grants on farm homes be re-established and that the capital grants on electrical generators be increased from twenty per cent to fifty per cent.

Al Connor, Resource Development Representative of Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing. Bridgewater, and Bruce Gilliatt, Digby County agricultural representative versed the audience on the Land Use Planning and the Land Bank Program.

The Land Leasing and Land Bank program designed to provide assistance for the production of agricultural products in Nova Scotia is a program in which the province acquires land of high agricultural capability for development, subsequently leasing such lands to selected bona fide Nova Scotia farmers to augment a scarce land resource. Farmers get a fivevear lease at five per cent per year of the farm appraised value plus taxes. The lease can be renewed so long as the province finds the land is being properly developed.

The Province of Nova Scotia agrees to install drainage facilities of the type and extent as determined by Department of Agriculture engineers for adequate soil drainage. The cost of such drainage to beborne by the Province of Nova Scotia.

On the first annual anniversary of the lease signing, following the completion of necessary drainage work, the lease fee shall change and shall be based on farm appraised value plus cost of drainage work loss assistance eligibility. Five per cent of this total shall constitute the new lease fee:



# **GOVERNMENT TAKE OVER FUNDY FERRY SERVICE?**

OTTAWA - The Bay of Fundy ferry service between Digby and Saint John may be taken over by the federal government from its present operators, Canadian Pacific Railways.

The government has been conducting negotiations with the company, over possible purchase of the 10,109-ton Princess of Acadia, which went

into service in May 1971. CP indicated last year that it wanted out of the ferry service because it was not a moneymaker.

Ottawa has set aside \$10 million in the event that the transfer of operations goes through.

The company last fall announced that it was dropping one of its two daily round trips,

as an austerity move. That evoked a howl of protest from business and industry representatives in western Nova Scotia.

The firm subsequently agreed to continue with a twice-daily round trip service, after the federal government agreed to pick up the tab for any operating losses on the second

Since that time, talks have been continuing between the two sides.

The Princess of Acadia was

built at a cost of \$8 million, and went into service on the 43-mile crossing to replace a 20-year-old vessel by the same name.

When construction of the ship began in May 1968, the federal government gave CP an undertaking that if the company subsequently wanted to discontinue the service, Ottawa would buy the ship.

A transport official said yesterday the government has not yet decided whether it will purchase the vessel, although this option is still being discussed.

CP has sufffered interest-rated losses estimated at \$1.5 million since the new Princess of Acadia began operating.

### SALES TAX EXEMPTED UP TO 25 CENTS PURCHASE

A bill introduced in the Legislature today by Finance Minister Peter Nicholson would remove the Provincial Sales Tax on all purchases; except cigarettes and cigars, where the price is 25 cents or less.

The change, an amendment to the Health Services Tax Act, would become effective Dec. 1,

Other amendments to the act include changing the interest to be charged upon penalties from six per cent a year to amounts. to be determined by Governorin-Council.

The Amendment to the Nova Scotia Lord Day's Act, tabled by Provincial Secretary A. Garnet Brown, authorizes persons to operate Flea Markets and Rummage Sales on Sundays and authorizes municipalities to issue permits for them.

The arnendment also adds a definition of the terms "Flea Market" and "Rummage Sale" to the act.



# HISTORY OF D.C.P.B. 48 YEARS SERVICE and the second s

Reports that consideration is being given to the possibility of sale of the Digby County Power **Board to the Nova Scotia Power** Corporation, have sparked interest in the background and history of the nearly 50 year old municipally owned utility.

**Incorporation of the Digby** County Power Board by an act of the provincial Legislature in 1926 marked the culmination of years of effort in Digby town and county to develop and provide electrical energy for the people of the area. The incorporation of the power board also marked the first step in a successful program to provide a hydro generating

plant and transmission facilities to cover the whole of the Digby County area.

Electrical energy was first generated in the town of Digby for local domestic and commercial use in 1891 when the Digby Electric Light Company was established and set up a steam operated generating plant in the town. The company provided transmission lines to the homes and business establishments in the town, with the customers equipping their premises with the necessary lights and fixtures.

In its earlier years of operation the Digby Electric

Light Co. did not provide meters. Flat rates were established for use of the electric energy based on a yearly rate for incandescent lights of 16 candle power. The rates were set according to use of the rooms in homes. Drawing rooms were \$6.00, when used only as such. Bedrooms not used as sitting rooms were \$3.00. Upper halls were \$5.00 as were lower halls. Parlours, sitting rooms and general living rooms were \$8.00. Kitchen and dining rooms were \$8.00. Additional lights were \$3.00 and bathrooms, attics, etc. were

The operators of the Digby Electric Light Company were very energy conservation conscious and the rates were offered on condition that the subscribers kept all lights not actually required, turned off. In addition, all operators of stores and commercial establishments were required to tarn out all lights as soon as they closed their places of business. As a deterrent to leaving lights on unnecessarily, a double rate of 6 cents a night was charged for commercial lightsleft on after 10 p.m. unless in actual use. The règular commercial rate was 3 cents per night.

A system of street lights was provided by the company and some twelve lights were authorized by a special meeting of the town council on Sept. 14, 1891. Most, if not all of these street lights were on the main street of the town.

By 1905 the service of the Digby Electric Light Company had developed to the point where a new engine was installed that doubled the generating capacity of the plant so that it was capable of providing power for 2,500 lamps of 16 candle power. The plant was owned by Major John Daley with his son, A. Douglass Daley, as superintendent. In later years the plant and its transmissions system was acquired by the town of Digby.

As the years passed, demand for electrical energy in Digby grew as did the demand for 24 hour full service. In the years

immediately preceding the incorporation of the Digby County Power Board a considerable controversy developed in Digby regarding the future of the local power source. Vocal' groups supporting the installation of a diesel power plant presented their case to civic authorities and the public, as did equally vocal groups advocating development of a hydro-electric system to serve not only the town but a wider area. Supporters of the hydro-electric development won out and in 1926 the Digby County Power Board was incorporated. Original members were the town and the municipality of Digby and the village of Weymouth. Provision was

Authorization was given the board in 1927 to issue debentures to the extent of \$75,000, giving legal sanction to the board's earlier decision to proceed with a hydro electric development. On Oct. 11, 1926 a contract had been awarded for the construction of power lines from the proposed generating plant at Sissiboo Falls. A contract was also awarded in the amount of \$16,000 for generators and turbines.

From its éarliest efforts in 1926 the Digby County Power Board continued to expand and extend its generating facilities and distribution system to include all of Digby County, including Digby Neck and Islands as well as the district of Clare. A grant of \$10,000 was provided by the province in 1927 to help with the cost of a submarine cable across Petite Passage to Long Island.

By as early as 1929 the demand for power throughout the area served by the power board had increased to the point it was obvious the original generating facilities at Sissiboo could no longer suffice. A controversy arose as to how the matter should be handled. One group favored a sell-out of the operation to private enterprise while others were in support of

greater financial commitment on the board's behalf to provide for expansion of what was proving to be a financially sound operation.

After a thorough study of the situation, the board decided to expand its generating facilities. The provincial Legislature in the 1929 session approved the borrowing by the Digby County Power Board of \$100,000. In 1931 a further authorization of \$115,000 was given. The additional financing made possible new generating facilities, water storage and transmission lines. An additional generating plant went into operation in 1930. Earlier that year, however, nature gave the power board a rough time with an exceptionally dry summer. During that year a steam plant at the H. T. Warne mill in Digby was used to help meet the demand. A generator was also secured for the old Digby Electric Light Company plant which was still located in the town. The boiler and engine of this plant operated through the late fall of 1930.

The difficulties of 1930 were very trying for the board as well as posing some inconveniences for the customers. The following year the board received an offer from the Nova Scotia Power Commission to buy all the board's plant and facilities. They turned this down as they did an offer from the Western Nova Scotia Electric Company to link up the two utilities in a joint operation that would permit sale and purchase of power between the two companies.

Despite difficulties, the board continued to expand its operations and in 1937 rebuilt its main dam at 5th Lake. A new 500 h.p. unit was added to the Sissiboo plant in 1938. By 1946, 20 years after its inauguration, the Digby County Power Board had increased its own generating capacity from 250 kva. to a capability of 1220 kva. It also had a standby link with the Nova Scotia Power Commission of 750 additional kva. A substation and storage facility was built in 1946 at the main highway entrance to Digby and

a 12,000 volt line from the NSPC at Acaciaville to Sissiboo Falls.

The power board did suffer some problems during its growth. In 1950 a second break of the underwater cable crossing Petite Passage occurred and a new one was installed with the assistance of an \$8,000 grant from the province. In 1957 towers were erected on either side of the Passage to permit overhead lines. A provincial grant of \$6,500 was provided to help finance this.

The following year it became apparent demands for power were exceeding the board's generating capabilities and, after a series of discussions. public meetings and deliberations, it was decided by resolution on May 27, 1958 to sell out the generating production assets of the Digby County Power Board to the **Nova Scotia Power Commission** for \$250,000. The transmission and distribution facilities were retained and an agreement was made to purchase all power requirements from the NSPC.

In 1959 the NSPC began the first phase of a huge new power generating program on the Sissiboo River. This first phase included a 751 foot dam, a power house and 6,000 KW generator with 8,000 HP turbine. In May, 1966 a second generating plant of 9,000 KW capacity was added. **Both of the Sissiboo generating** plants are remotely controlled from the Gulch Plant in Bear River, put into operation in 1957 by the NSPC.

Transmission and distribution facilities of the Digby County power Board have, over the years, been subjected to the buffetings of nature. The freak snow storm in October of this year created. problems in power interruption as did a number of previous severe storms in other years. One of the most disastrous of these was on April 8, 1963, when more than 70 hydro poles in the vicinity of Digby fell prey to the high winds and heavy snows. On Digby Neck some 80 utility poles went down and power and telephone service was interrupted up to close to a week in some areas.

Capt. Watson Adams nearly 89 years of age from Tidal View Manor in Yarmouth, a cousin of Mr. Adams, was also among the many present. He was one of the older folk who came here to help Mr. Adams celebrate and this meeting brought together cousins who had not seen each other in over 80 years.

The youngest guest was the two month old daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Douglas Hapeman. Speaking of the younger generation Miss Joanne Frankland of Point Prim Light was present during the late afternoon and rendered some solo's for Mr. Adams which ended as duets when he joined in. They were accompanied by the guitar music of Joanne Frankland.

A special guest book which was circulated during the day revealed that approximately 83 folk had come to extend their best wishes and congratulations

to Mr. Adams. Birthday gifts were numerous and in addition to this the good neighbors of Bay View donated much of the delicious food used for this memorable occasion.

Mr. Adams was born in Bay View, the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Allan Adams. He now resides only two houses from the place of his birth and reminds his friends that he never travelled very far by land but like his ancestors before him Mr. Adams was a seafaring person. He said he boarded a boat at an early age and spent most of his life in one until his retirement at the age of 75.

Prior to World War I and at an early age Mr. Adams went to work for Mr. William Troope of the Manhattan Hotel. For a period of about two years he took many tourist parties from the hotel out fishing. After this Mr. Adams went into a similar business for himself. He said he was in the tourist business for about 1/4 of his life. He said that in those days that fish and tourists or "summer visitors," as they were called, were numerous however, today such is not the case because both

appear to have diminished to a large extent.

Mr. Adams first went to sea as a boy of 15 and when 16 years of age he began fishing with his father. In those days fishing in this area was done by handlining from a small boat and the fishing was done from known "grounds." He sailed across the Bay of Fundy to exchange a load of salt fish for winter provisions.

In later years he fished with his only son. He was a lobster fisherman for many years.

Prior to World War I Mr. Adams joined the original crew of the Bay View Lifeboat. He was 2nd in command and went with the crew to Saint John, N.B., to get the first life boat. This was a sturdy little boat which they shipped by rail from Bayoone N.J.

In those days Mr. Adams said the personnel of the boat changed with the government and he was relieved of his post during such a change after serving for 10 years. He is the last surviving members of the original life-boat.

Mr. Adams after leaving the Life Saving Station continued in the tourist business and in the fishing industry for a number of


On July 16, 1970 Mr. Adams was visited and interviewed by two men from CBC Radio who made a tape for T.V. During this interview Mr. Adams told of his experiences with the Life Boat.

He also told that once he had many Indian friends and even learned enough Micmac to carry on limited conversations with them. He remembered their hunting in Digby Gut for porpoise and the uses the Indians found for them.

There are four generations in Mr. Adams family.

In recent years Mr. Adams has been living with his son, Capt. Harry Adams and family. He has two grandchildren Mrs. Reginald Bremner of Bay View, and Master John Adams age 11 who is presently attending the Nova Scotia Youth Training Centre at Truro. He also has three great-grandchildren all of Bay View.

# RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY TAX ACT

Municipal affairs Minister J. Fraser Mooney introduced a Bill in the legislature to amend a portion of the Residential Property Tax Act.

Clause 1 of the Bill provides additional remedy to a tenant who has not received his entitlement from his landlord. The act presently provides that if the landlord does not pay the entitlement to the tenant, the tenant may withhold future rental payments. However, there are situations where the remedy is ineffective.

Under the amendment proposed by the Minister, the Municipality will make payment of the entitlement to the tenant and in turn the landlord will be indebted to the Municipality in the amount of the entitlement and the property of the landlord will be

subject to a lien in favor of the Municipality.

The amendment also makes provision for those cases where a property has been sold or taansferred from one person to another subsequent to July 8, 1974. In such cases, the Municipality will pay the entitlement to the tenant, forwarding an account of the payment to the Department of Municipa! Affairs who will reimburse the Municipality and then attempt to collect from the original owner.

The second part of the Bill places a limitation period upon the entitlement of a person under the Act. It states that a claim must be made and action taken to enforce that claim prior to September 30,1975, or else the entitlement expires.

# WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS DIGBY, N.S.

WHEREAS due to the congestion on the streets of the Town of Digby caused by vehicular and pedestrian traffic, and the limitation on the free use of the streets liable to be caused by the presence of ice and snow thereon, I am of the opinion that an emergency and a special condition exists, and I so declare.

THEREFORE under the authority of Section 180 (1) of the Motor Vehicle Act, as Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby, I make the following temporary regulations:

(1) Notwithstanding that certain traffic signs have been erected in the Town of Digby prohibiting or permitting the parking or leaving standing of vehicles upon sections of the highway during the hours stated thereon and notwithstanding the provisions of the Regulations made by the Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby pursuant to Section 137 (3) of the Motor Vehicle Act respecting Parking Meters and dated the 30th day of November, 1963, and amendments thereto.

(a) No owner or driver or persons having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave standing the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby between the hours of 12:01 o'clock in the morning and the hour of 8 o'clock in the morning of the same day.

(b) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby in such manner as to hinder, inconvenience or prevent the proper removal of snow or ice from such highway

(c) The provisions of Clauses (a) and (b) hereof shall not

(1) The motor vehicle of a physician or surgeon parked reasonably near his office or residence and immediately available for professional calls.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by a physician or surgeon who is actually engaged in his professional occupation and reasonably near where he is so engaged.

(3) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the RCM Police.

(4) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

(5) Commercial vehicles parked by an operator for the purpose of loading or unloading merchandise. (d) No owner or driver or person having control or

custody of any vehicle shall during the period from one hour after any snow storm has commenced to two hours after such snow storm has stopped park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in that area in the Town of Digby.

(e) The provisions of Clause (d) shall not apply to:

(1) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the RCM Police.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

2. The time above referred to shall be the time from time to time legally in effect in the Town of Digby.

3. It shall be an offence for any person to fail to comply with these regulations and any such person will be liable to a

penalty provided by Section 266 of the Motor Vehicle Act. 4. Any peace officer may seize and remove any vehicle with which an offence has been committed under these regulations.

5. These temporary regulations shall be in full force and effect from the 1st of December 1974 until the 31st of March, A.D., 1975.







MY NAME IS NOBODY Universal Western Comedy

In 1899, aging gunfighter Henry Fonda is more concerned with catching a boat for Europe at New Orleans than with the three killers who try to do him in while he's being shaved. Later, trader R.G. Armstrong asks drifter Terence Hill to deliver a basket containing a bomb to Fonda. Since Fonda is his idol, the equally skilled Hill casually tosses the basket back to Armstrong. 

Mayor Kinney stated that when a new mayor takes office at the first of the year they will be able to work under their own budget. The mayor's seat is now declared vacant and an election will be called within 21 days.

In his report to council on

Monday evening, Glen Pitman, town clerk asked for guidance in priorities in his work, whether to do the regular work as first priority or be required to use the time in looking up and making reports requested by councillors. To do both Mr. Pitman said would demand additional staff. Mr. Pitman said he realizes his position to give information but if reports have to be prepared then the council would have to authorize him to put the regular work aside. Each councillor, he felt should have the same right to request information. Councillor Comeau felt in order to conduct affairs of the town it was

necessary to get to the "bottom of it." Councillor Eileen Chipman said she was elected by the people and would continue to ask questions about financing of the town and the people should know about it.

On motion of Deputy Mayor Philip Robertson, seconded by Councillor Gordon Ellis the clerk was advised to look up the information if readily available but should have permission from council on matters which take time. Councillor Ellis complimented Mr. Pitman on the fine reports he presents at the council meetings.

Mr. Pitman's report showed that \$300 has been collected so far from merchants for the Christmas lighting but there is yet \$600 to come in. On regular motion it was decided to publicly acknowledge those who contributed to the lighting.

In his report Mr. Pitman dealt with seminars on the Graham report and other seminars. which prove educational and of benefit in the executing his duties.

The resignation of Reginald

Turnbull as head officer in Digby of the Emergency Measures Organization was accepted to take effect on December 31, 1974. The town is E.M.O. committee's chairman, Councillor Guy Van Tassell was asked to look into the possibilities of a replacement. A letter was authorized to be sent to Mr. Turnbull acknowledging a "remarkable job" done in his capacity as E.M.O. chief in Digby.

While a number of visitors attended Digby Town Council on Monday evening, two addressed the council. Joseph Hazel inquired about Senior Citizens Housing in Digby with the hope that he and his wife might be accomodated there. He was advised that these units were for the 60 years and over persons as far as they knew. Councillor Chipman made the motion and Councillor Van Tassell seconded it that the **Housing Authority be requested** to provide copies of their minutes to councillors.

Joe Casey M.L.A., Digby, reported to Council on plans for Victoria St. by the Department of Highways. He said money had been set aside for construction on these streets. The province looks after the ditches, storm sewers and paving of the street but the town would be responsible for the sidewalk amounting to \$50,000. In the municipality there is a 90 per cent and ten percent sharing in costs, it is understood. Mr. Casey said the department wants to upgrade those streets first and later survey the Abramson's pasture route to reach 101. Mr. Casey had been invited to council by an interested councillor. chairman of the streets committee was authorized to correspond with the highways department regarding paving

## **Editorial**

Like a "bolt out of the blue", Digby Town Council members and visitors at the town council on Monday evening heard the resignation read of His Worship Mayor Willard Kinney.

He served on many committees through those six years. We are aware that each and every councillor puts in a great deal of free time in performing their duties for the good of the town but the office of mayor generally is still more demanding. He is head of the town and as such is expected to be present at many functions as well as caring about the more mundane features of running a town. As Mr. Kinney has said in his resignation message, in an effort to keep abreast of what is available in grants from the two government levels and to obtain other vital information, it is necessary to attend meetings and seminars to be brought up to date. We all realize that this takes time and money and still there must be left time and money for "living".

It was with regret that Council accepted his resignation. Appreciation for the time of his services as councillor and mayor is evident within the Council and outside council.

KEEP DOWN THE SLAUGHTER

The Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council has just issued a partial list of Nova Scotia highway accident facts. The most disturbing fact of all is that with all the stress put on highway safety programs there still continues to be a steady increase in highway accidents. We can only feel that without these programs the statistics would be far worse. While the facts are from the years of 1972 and 1973 we have no reason to believe that 1974 will be any exception.

The number of accidents reported in 1973 in Nova Scotia were 1,5897, just 1,162 more than in 1972.

Strange, too, most of the accidents occurred on clear days. In 1973 there were 10,489 accidents on clear days as against 9,331 in 1972.

One catagory did show a decrease. That was the snow and sleet group. It decreased from 1,765 in 1972 down to 756 in 1973. Could this be partly because drivers are becoming more conscious of the hazards of winter driving or has the December Safety Week made some impact.

Inattention was blamed for 3,192 accidents in 1972 which rose to 3619 in 1973.

Most accidents happen between four and five p.m. with the hour of five to six coming next.

Another fact given was that there were was that there were 9160 accidents in daylight in 1973, in darkness lighted 3,431 and darkness not lighted 2,671

Most accidents happen, according to the Nova Scotia Accident Facts, occur to those in the 25 to 34 age group and the fewest to 65 years or over. Each classification, however, had an increase from 1972 to

These facts make dull reading but in the midst of Safe Driving Week they become figures which deserve to be seriously pondered with the hope that we might keep down the slaughter on our highways.

GREEN LIGHT FOR CHRISTMAS LIGHTING
The time has come again to decorate our towns
and villages for Christmas. The lights give a cheerful
atmosphere to the preparation for Christmas, instill a
Christmas spirit and of course, lure shoppers to a

specific town or village.

Remember Christmas 1973, when there seemed to

be an energy crisis and towns and villages and individual homes refrained from lighting up extensively so as to conserve electrical energy.

This year Federal Energy Minister, Donald MacDonald, has given the go-ahead for traditional Christmas lighting. Mr. MacDonald was responding to a Canadian Toy Manufacturers Association when he said "there is no reason to single out Christmas lights as a special target for energy conservation efforts during the coming heating season".

Mr. MacDonald said that the program of Christmas lighting on Parliament Hill will be undertaken this year.

The industry brief pointed out that Christmas lighting received unfair public attention last fall as a largely symbolic vehicle for introducing energy conservation awareness and that no other industry was singled out in such a way.

In recognition of the need for responsible use of all energy resources, the industry supports Mr. MacDonald's suggestion that Christmas lights be turned on after 6:00 p.m. and turned off upon retiring.

So go ahead. You have the green light for Christmas lighting, but like everything else, use it with responsibility. The time is here. Light up.

ON READING

More and more reading is being looked upon as a most important tool in the education of a child. Without the ability to interpret properly what is in print a child is handicapped in his progress in so many phases of his life.

Mrs. Carolyn Brown, English teacher at the Digby Regional High School has passed on to us some ideas on reading set forth by Dr. John Manning of the University of Minnesota who was guest here recently at an International Reading Association conference. While much of Dr. Manning's discourse and group sessions were aimed for the teacher's benefit, the information, in many cases, was also helpful to parents.

Dr. Manning in speaking on HUMANIZING THE READING PROGRAM, suggested that a child, if read with at home, will probably read well in school: he knows what print is all about. The best place for the child to learn to read is on the mother's knee and the father's lap. Libraries would best serve the needs of very small children rather than wait 'til they go to the library. The ideal situation would be for the librarians to go into the homes.

A fluent reader develops over a long period of time and reads all types of reading including sports news, magazines, newspapers, books, comics, etc.

Many children placed on individualized reading programs are children who belong in a group; they need the group-feeling. Many who are verbal, need to learn how to be silent and to work alone. They need to learn the silent interchange with self, and all need the dialogue of a sensitive teacher.

We want well balanced readers, well balanced people and well balanced students. The strength of a country is being able to use the unique talents of those who can serve the democratic process. We should develop the interests which pertain to the individual child, whether it be music, swimming, oceanography,

or whatever it might be.

Teachers should encourage the career decisions of children. We should not expect to be good in everything, but be able to develop strengths of each

Materials, outside the basal reader, may be of more value to a child who is already failing in one

program.

He spoke to the group in a direct way by telling them that schools were "places of people, spiritual goals, as well as places to learn to read, do math and so forth."

He went on to say, "If they can read, let them read whatever they want to read."

The teacher's best diagnostic tool is to write down the miscues the child is having. But, he felt that parents have a right to know exactly what trouble the child is having, therefore the teacher needs to keep records to show to the parent. Tell the parent what is wrong. If the child is having trouble with d, t, l and w;

children who need to work alone should do so, but for those who need to work together for reinforcement, they should work in a group.

We do not know what happens in silent reading. There is only disability noted when children open their mouths. "We should read to classes," Dr. Manning said, "and encourage the beauty of our language."

Principals and administrators should go into the classroom and listen to children read so they can sympathize with the problems the teacher is having with the children. This is also of tremendous impact for the children who believe when someone, such as these "important" people, will stop "to listen", then reading is worthwhile

# Letter To The Editor

"THE PROPOSED DIGBY TO SHELBURNE ROAD"

During the recent years there has been a great deal of talk of a new highway linking Digby direct to Shelburne, on the old road that exists across the Province between these two towns. A number of years back a man is said to have traversed it in an old car. And of recent years a couple of snowmobiles from Shelburne are said the have gone across to Digby by it. Possibly heightening the interest being taken in it.

About three to four years back the way people were discussing it, one was led to believe that the project was almost ready to begin. However nothing has been done about it to the present time, and one wonders why not have it all cleaned out, and the bushes cut back, and make it into a well developed snowmobile run for both towns to enjoy. At least until money can be allotted to a two lane highway, which was what had been proposed.

When one studies the map of the Province, one realizes how beneficial this road would be for both towns, as at present all the big refrigerator trucks bound for the United States with fish, or scallops, have to either drive up to Liverpool, and cross over to Annapolis Royal, and then down the coast on the North Shore to Digby. Or drive down to Yarmouth, and then turn up Digby. Both taking them miles out of their way to reach there.

Also you constantly hear from Americans, when you ask if they came across on the ferry,

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"No, it costs so much if one has to drive so far out of ones way to reach the South Shore, we decided we might as well go around by Amherst. All which deprives the ferry of a lot of passengers that they might have, and the town of Digby of a lot of pótential money they might have by tourists stopping in the town first before they

At present so many Canadians take the Yarmouth ferry in preference, as it is the closest one to reach if going to the United States from anywhere on the South Shore. But if there was a paved road across from Shelburne to Digby, the larger part of the traffic would go to Digby - that is if they were going by car. For a lot fly nowadays from the Yarmouth Airport.

One would hope if this proposed road ever does get under way, and the building of it started, that it will not be made into a "Controlled Access Highway", with no building entrances permitted, so settlements may spring up midway, with a service station to refuel the motoring public. At present the Department of Highways is giving the population of the Province "Building Claustrophobia", with the way they decline to permit entrances to be built on the land outside the villages, so

these settlements cannot grow and expand, which they need to do. And has contributed to the high cost of land, for building sites with entrances on to a highway are getting few and far between.

The C.C.G.I02 was busy all day with calls from Stan Moore - "Anna Mae Too" who needed to be towed from his wharf; Richard Swift - "Wanda Lou" who got tangled up in rope, tore part of basket off and a bent wheel; Billy and Glen Welch - "Verna and Stephen" engine trouble and Wilbert Frost - "Elaine Gail", with engine trouble. Later in the day they received a call from a Meteghan boat "Cape Wanda" asking for assistance. The C.C.G. 102 made a call to East Ferry and while steaming one of the engines was disabled.

Since then the men have all their traps out and been able to haul with the catches on an average range. On the evening of the day the men set the traps, the weather turned gale force and they lost some of their gear before getting a haul from them.

## **FISHING** SEASON AT TIVERTON

by Mrs. John Outhouse The summer is over and gone.

The flowers that dotted the landscape have turned to seed and now lie asleep shrouded in frost and snow. The cheerful chirping and songs of the birds are heard no more, they have long since sought a kinder climate, more agreeable to their frail, small bodies. Wary fish of the Bay of Fundy and St. Mary's Bay off the coast of Tiverton, N.S. need not be so "up tight" and alert to the trawl fishermen, because for them too, the summer season is over and gone. Adjustments to another form of making a living is taking place.

Trawl tubs, ropes, fish hooks. trawl haulers and the trawls themselves have been laid aside. Workmen of the fish plants of Small Brothers have been laid off for a season. Lobster traps (pots) that have been newly constructed, older ones that have been repaired, and the fathoms of lanyard attached to them are now reclining on or near the ocean floor of St. Mary's Bay and the Bay of Fundy. Brightly painted buoys attached to the lanyard are bobbing about on the surface of the water to mark the spot where each trap with its fresh bait is lurking and luring the unsuspecting prey, the lobster. Winter has come. The lobster season has begun.

Most of the approximate 13 trawl fishermen of the summer season also lobster fish. Several employees of Small Brothers fish plants also take advantage of the lobster season as well. The three dragger fishermen of Tiverton carry out their operations the year 'round depending on wind conditions.

Some of the lobster fishermen, as in past seasons, will fish their traps about three or four weeks to glean the greatest riches to be had during the first of the lobster harvest. Others will continue operations for perhaps two or three months then give up fishing on the grounds that they feel lobsters are not plentiful enough to cover cost of gasoline and other expenses involved. Several fishermen of St. Mary's Bay will join fellow fishermen in the Bay of Fundy by re-setting their traps. They seem to feel the Bay of Fundy will still yield a lucrative supply of lobsters even though many have been taken from the Bay of Fundy grounds by that time. Then there are those fishermen who will stay with lobstering until the season closes in May.

There are two lobster buyers in the Tiverton area, Mr. Arden Greenlaw and Mr. Manford Pyne. They in turn sell to buyers from Digby Neck and other places. They supply a ready and waiting market as handy as Digby and as far remote as various places throughout U.S.A.

With the closing of the lobster season in May, the winter part of Tiverton's life cycle is at an end. Spring and summer activities come in to complete the round of the year's events.

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
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## CHURCH POPULAR WITH TOURISTS

St. Mary's R.C. Church at Church Point continues to be one of the most popular tourist attractions along the French shore in Digby County. It is estimated that over 18,000 visitors entered St. Mary's church during the summer months and these persons are those who were passing by and stopped off to view the beautiful interior of the church.

Tourists from practically every province of Canada and most of the states in the United States have registered their name in a special book placed in the entrance hall of the church. Such written comments as follows may be found in the registry: "Most beautifulwarmest in feeling-even. The most sinful must believe something"; "We are glad we stopped, it's beautiful"; "Magnificent-it exhibits the true love and sacrifices of the faithful-God rewards all who built or contributed towards this house of God"; "The silence is most comforting';

"breathtaking"; "fascinating"; "A truly lovely house of worship"; spiring"; "vast and beautifulwarmest in feeling-even surpasses many stone cathedrals in structural design and details, an indispensible piece of Canada's past"; "a beautiful house of God, reflection of the wonderful people in the past who built this wooden church by 'hands and hearts' ".


The dimension of the church is as follows: the interior is 85 feet wide at its main section, 135 feet wide at its widest point Church is built in the shape of a cross); steeple is anchored with 40 tons of rocks and the belfry contains three huge bronze bells weighing 3,740 pounds. The smallest weighs 844 pounds, the second 1,172 and the third 1,724 pounds. They were cast at the Piccardy foundry in Arras, France.

The ceiling is 65 feet from the floor and contains oil painted religious pictures. The church was designed by Reynault, architect of Rennes, France. Master carpenter was the late Leo Melanson of Little Rock, who built several wooden churches along the french

Granville Ferry.

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#### EXPERIMENT WITH SOYBEANS

Soybean experiments, carried on this year, on two farms in Digby County along, with others in the Province. have turned out successfully inthis area with both fields producing "good quality, excellent yields," Bruce Gilliatt,. Agricultural Representative, reported last week.

Although the crops are now ripe, harvesting had not yet been started on the two Digby County farms because of wet weather. Gerry Smeltzer, Agronomist, Project Farm Supervisor, and Research Scientist at the Agriculture Canada Research Station in Kentville, has suggested that the farmers involved try to combine the crops themselves with a small pull-type combine.

The farms involved in the project are those operated by John Roope, of Hillgrove, and Green Valley Farm, operated by Stan and Leonard Boudreau, of Concession. This was the first year soybean was tried on such a large scale.

Mr. Gilliatt sees bright prospects for soybean production in Digby County. He feels that the success of this year's trials despite the wet weather conditions should mean the crop is readily adaptable to local conditions.

Cattle farmers are expected to draw the immediate benefit from the protein-rice crop, according to Mr. Gilliatt, and this could help alleviate the problems associated with the ever-rising prices on feeds.

Soybean also has a great potential in feeding people but

Mr. Gilliatt is hopeful that more experimentation with the , crop will be carried out next year. Prior to the large scale testing, preliminary tests were carried out on a smaller scale at the Research Station in Kentville, which indicated the crop could be adopted to Nova Scotia conditions.

The main aim of the experiment is to increase livestock production in the Province and decrease costs to the farmers.

## READY FOR **CHRIST MAS DADDIES**

Things are near readiness for the fifth annual CKDY Christmas Daddies Show on Sunday, December 8. The marathon nine-hour broadcast over Digby radio station CKDY gets underway at noon at the multi-purpose room of Digby Regional High School. CKDY station manager, Leigh Everett, who coordinates the show, said over 200 behind-the-scenes volunteers and another 200 entertainers will be available to raise funds for the Digby Christmas Daddies Fund Committee, and other volunteer group comprising both private and public care-giving agencies in Digby and Annapolis counties. ## HOG BUSINESS TAKES SLUMP

The Digby County Federation of Agriculture revealed on Tuesday at their annual meeting in Weymouth that a reduction had occurred in the number of hogs raised by the Clare Shipping Club in 1974. According to figures submitted the total hogs on commercial farms in 1973 were 8,356 and in 1974 there were \$6, 274, more than a 2000 decrease. This also resulted in reduced revenue for the hog raisers. The 1973 revenue in the commercial farms being \$766, 719 in 1973 and reduced to \$512, 121 in 1974, more than \$250,000 less.

A slight increase was found at the non-commercial farms when the hogs increased from 121 in 1973 to 160 in 1974. Value was \$10,885 in 1973 and \$11,264 in 1974. Grand total in 1973 was \$77,7605.40 and in 1974 it was **\$523, 386.19.** 

Interesting figures showed an increase per hog of 19.14 in 1972 from 1971; increase of \$28.34 per hog 1973 from 1972 and a decrease of \$7.92 per hog from 1973 to 1974. At the same time feed had increased by 1.10 per cwt.

**BOARD** Ownership of land is not the problem in Nova Scotia a select committee on non-resident ownership of land concluded in a report tabled in the House of

Assembly. "The title of the committee is a misnomer," the report states. but "It is the conclusion of the committee that the problems and difficulties are those of use of land and taxation."

Consequently the select committee recommends that a land rescurces board be established to advise on the proper use of land and to designate what should be agricultural, recreational, historic, scenic and "such other designations as are appropriate under the circumstances."

The all-party select committee, under the chairmanship of Hon. Leonard L. Pace, Q.C., recommends that once the land is designated "It will not be able to be put to another use without the approval of the board."







## SOVIETS AGREE TO NEGOTIATE CLAIMS BY

## LOBSTER FISHERMAN

OTTAWA - The way has been cleared for Canadian East Coast lobster fishermen to negotiate gear damage claims with Soviet authorities, Fisheries Minister Romeo LeBlanc announced.

Canadian officials met with ... officials of the Soviet Union in Ottawa on November 21st through 25th to discuss certain fisheries problems of concern to both countries. The meeting dealt with outstanding claims for past damages caused to lobster gear belonging to Canadian fishermen, and the establishment of preventive measures to avoid further incidents.

The following joint com-

munique was issued following the meeting: "On the question of the outstanding claims it was agreed that the Soviet agency, Sovrybflot, which represents the interests of the owners of the Soviet fishing vessels, will study ths evidence which has been submitted on an urgent basis, obtain such clarifications as may be necessary, and in necessary cases will meet and negotiate with the Canadian claimants. The appropriate agencies of the two countries have undertaken to encourage the speedy and equitable settlement of claims.

"On preventive measures to avoid further incidents. agreement was reached on the

implementation of a detailed gear marking scheme and on an improved system of communicating the location of Canadian lobster gear to Soviet fishing vessels.





Perhaps it might be a good thing, from a point of view of population control, if every woman pregnant for the third time were compelled by the state to submit to an abortion, but I for one would fight to the last breath against such a proposal.

No doubt it would be a great thing, from a point of view of health and saving lives, if a law were to be passed forbidding smoking, with a fine of \$25 for the first offence, but I could not see myself supporting that one either.

The recent seat-belting law falls into the same category. No doubt from a point of view of highway safety, it probably makes sense (although lives could also be lost by people being trapped or rendered immovable by restraining equipment in cars). But the fundamental objection goes far deeper than highway safety; it goes to the roots of the freedoms, the rights which we cherish and which go hand in hand with the democratic system of government.

No doubt, from the point of the rulers of East Germany, the wall made good sense. The country was losing too much skilled manpower, and this was not good for the welfare of

East Germany. So the wall went up, and now skilled manpower is not nearly so short there. But we in Canada have hated the wall and all it stood

The wall stood for the denial of human liberties. It said, "Stop! The lawmakers have decided that it is not good for you to go past this point, and if you do you may be shot and certainly will be taken to court. Although you are an adult, you have no right to chose whether you shall or shall not go past this point. The State, in its wisdom, has already decided

that for you." Now, here, on a smaller scale, a similar law has been passed. People object to it without having to ponder very long, because there is something about the belt law which immediately strikes one as wrong. It is not like other laws, designed to prevent you from harming someone else, as by robbery, assault, or perhaps causing pollution. It is designed to protect you against yourself. If is not like a law, either, which requires you to wear protective gear while, say, working in a dangerous place or

you in the privacy of your own family automobile. It almost seems akin to those laws which once were in effect but have now been repealed everywhere, prohibiting certain intimate - people in the acts between privacy of their own bedroom.

The seat-belt law seems to strike one as an improper invasion of an area which the state ought not to invade. It conjures up visions of George Orwell's famous novel 1984, which forecast that by that year a superstate would exist which would scan and supervise the every private act of the individual, indeed, the every private thought. It strikes one as the type of thing which will encourage the police to become super-snoops, spying and surveying dilligently to ensure that each and every belt is fastened and properly tightened

Many of us, too, are bound to feel that if it is to be compulsory seat-belts to-day, what will it be tomorrow? Where will it all end? What private area will they next invade? Will there be any boundary, anywhere, which can be identified and of which it could be stated with any confidence, "Legislation will extend perhaps even up to this point, but never beyond?"

It strikes me that we, the people ought to draw that boundary line now, and draw it where it stood before this seatbelt idea was dreamed up. On grounds of fundamental principle, on grounds of the rights and liberties of individuals which we have always cherished here in Canada and which we fought two World Wars to maintain, we ought now to say to this or any other government which is wont to extend itself beyond its proper boundaries, "Halt! Thus far, and no further."

In a democratic state (and let us hope that free elections are not abolished after all the other basic freedoms have been swept away), the citizens in the final analyses are the arbiters, even yet, of just how far a government can go. If the government goes too far, presumably the voters will remove it and replace it with one more attuned to the popular wishes, which can repeal the bad legislation of its predecessor. Unfortunately, in this instance, that means we may have to wait until 1977 or 1978, by which time we may not only be all fettered with seat-belts but with staggering other encumbrances as well. The present government is increasingly geared to a course of a action which places the rights of the government (and its political party) on top and the rights of the individual at the very bottom.

In the meantime, I should think that every arbitrary act of this present government should be fought tooth and nail. As for highway safety, I am all for those who feel that seat-belts should be worn wearing them, just as I am all for those who feel it appropriate to wear long underwear in the winter to do so. But the day that this government legislates to require, on a compulsory basis, the wearing of long underwear from December to April, with a fine of \$25 for the first time one is caught not wearing it, then I am going to be calling on the people of Nova Scotia to destroy their long underwear the same as I recently called for the removal of seat-belts from the cars of those who do not wish to wear the belt, which, I understand is soon to become the official emblem of the Liberal

Party of Nova Scotia.

CAPSULE REVIEW OF 1974 OFFICE OF THE OM-BUDSMAN By Dr. H. D. Smith,

The year 1974 saw the Office of the Ombudsman come of age in the province of Nova Scotia.

Compared to the number of new files opened in the previous two years, the caseload almost trebled in 1974. From the 1973 figure of 335 files, which seemed to be normal, when compared to other Canadian provinces, on a per capita basis, we expect that by the end of 1974, we shall have handled close to one thousand cases in the one big year of staggering growth:

The public may ask what caused such a heavy increase in the flow of correspondence during the third full year of operation. The answers lie, for the most part, in three factors: 1. More and more people are learning of the existence and

the functions of the Ombudsman. A complainant tells his or her neighbour what the office has, or has not, been able to do to rectify a grievance, and the word spreads and

knowledge grows. 2. The Ombudsman advertised in all of the newspapers in the province, running the same notice three weeks apart: "Do you have a complaint against the administration of the laws of Nova Scotia (provincial or municipal)?,' One can imagine the response to such a free invitation.

3. The appearance on CBC television of the Fall and Winter programme, every second Sunday evening, call CBC Ombudsman. This programme gave rise to more people seeking help from their provincial Ombudsman.

During the year, the effectiveness of operation of the

Ombudsman's Office was again bandicapped by a shortage of staff. Despite the 300 per cent increase in the case load, the office had authority to engage only one additional employee, an investigator, bringing the total permanent staff, including clerical, to five. This is smaller than any other province in Canada with the exception of New Brunswick which is now engaged in a reorganization of its Ombudsman's Office.

This staff shortage has resulted in some complainants being required to wait longer periods than they consider reasonable for the investigation of their grievances. The handling by the Office of

the Ombudsman of between 900 and 1000 files in the year 1974 is testimony that it is providing a useful service to the people of Nova Scotia.

## E.M.O. REVIEW

By George H. Emerson Director, Emergency Measures Organization (N.S.)

The activities of Nova Scotia Emergency Measures Organization during 1974 focused on enhancing the capability of municipalities to plan and be prepared for local emergencies.

The year started out with emphasis on identifying those hazards in each municipality which could have an effect of lives and property. Once this was accomplished a program was developed to demonstrate to municipalities that they had much of the resources, material and personnel required to deal with any emergency.

A resources register was produced by EMO(N.S.) for each county listing the resource potential within the whole county, where the resources could be obtained and in what quantities they were available.

Then through training municipal administrations, services and agencies were assisted in preparing plans to meet any eventuality. In this regard, more than one dozen exercises took a number of forms, i.e. a simulated school bus accident, etc. and in each case involved all the local services, e.g. health, welfare, police, fire, etc.

Perhaps the most rewarding aspect of these exercises was the reaction by many municipalities to the severe wind and snow storm of October 20th. It demonstrated that by having plans, municipal officials, departmental and service heads and agencies know where to go and what to do. This resulted in a minimum of conflict and confusion, thereby reducing the suffering of people involved.

Many lessons were learned as a result of this storm. In the area of weather forecasting, for example, it is realized forecasters have a most difficult time in predicting weather on the Atlantic coastline; however, methods must be evolved whereby weather information is made available as quickly as possible\ to the various government agencies and utilities which must react in an emergency situation.

The massive disruption of telephone communications gave amateur radio operators the opportunity to demonstrate the vital role they can play in such a situation, transmitting information from isolated areas to the larger communities. Equally important is the work of citizens band groups within the community.

The lack of auxiliary power at several radio stations, nursing homes and hospitals emphasized the importance of these essential services having adequate back-up power to meet emergency situations.

## **INCREASE IN SOCIAL SERVICES**

Increases in provincial social assistance benefits, effective Jan. 1, 1975, affecting all 15,700 recipients in the Province were announced in the legislature by social services Minister Harold M. Huskilson.

Mr. Huskilson noted that provincial social assistance payment scales are reviewed twice a year with a two-pronged approach being taken. Firstly, he said, the Budget Allowances which determine the amount to be paid in each case are increased by a percentage similar to any increase in the cost of living since the previous Secondly, the review. maximum payments are reviewed and increased by a percentage similar to any increase in the minimum wage, he said.

The Social Services Minister said budget allowances are being increased by 11 per cent for food and three per cent for shelter costs. These increases, he said, reflect the cost of living increase shown in the Consumer price index since the last review in July of this year.

The Minister cited as examples an increase in the Food Allowance from \$34 to \$38 for an adult and from \$41 to \$45 for an adolescent aged 12 to 18 years. The room and board rate will increase from \$99 to \$110 with all allowances being rounded to the nearest dollar.

Mr. Huskilson said that since the review in July of this year, the minimum wage has in-

The Social Services Minister said all provincial assistance maximum payments are being increased by 22.2 per cent rounded to the nearest dollar. Citing examples, Mr. Huskilson said the maximum for a single disabled person will increase from \$175 to \$213 per month and for a widow with two dependent children from \$267 to \$326 per

month. The cost of the increases is estimated at \$640,000 for the last three months of the current fiscal year, Mr Huskilson said.

The Minister said the mcreased payments will be included in cheques to be mailed on Jan. 1975 and added that the next review will be undertaken in July of next year.

The Minister also announced that blind and disabled persons who also receive a supplementary allowance to their blind or disabled persons allowance will receive an increase in their supplementary allowance.

The Bible tells us that the newly-born Christ-child was wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in a manger, a word derived from the French "mangeoir" or frame to hold animal feed

It is interesting that the other common English word for a cattle feeder, crib, which is derived from the German krippe, also means a baby's bed

Even the French word creche, which is often used to describe the nativity scene displayed in churches, homes, and other places at Christmastime, has the double meaning of "mangeoir" and a public shelter for the care of infants.

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## SEX DISCRIMINATION COMPLAINTS UP

Complaints lodged under the colour or race and sex discrimination provisions of the N.S. Human Rights Act formed the majority of those received by the Human Rights Commission during 1973.

According to the Summary of Activities, the Commission's report of its activities during the year, Blacks lodged 49 formal complaints with the Commission. During 1972, there were 78 such complaints.

Forty-two formal complaints were lodged under the sex discrimination provisions, a four-fold increase over the previous year. Formal complaints are those which the Commission investigates. Total complaints, including informal ones, numbered 1,022.

The majority of complaints were in the area of employment.

In his introduction to the report, Commission director. George F. McCurdy, called 1973 a rewarding and active year for the Commission and said the most significant happening during the year was Premier Regan's proclamation of the period 1973-83 as a Decade for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination in Nova Scotia. The proclamation was the culmination of a year which saw unprecedented activity, including four major human rights conferences in the

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province, the formation of a number of community human rights affirmative action committees, and the opening of new storefront facilities at the Commission offices.

Looking to the future, Mr. . McCurdy anticipates innovative and imaginative affirmative action programs in employment, housing and education developed by the community committees in cooperation with the Commission: This, Mr. McCurdy says, will greatly improve inter-group harmony and co-operation in keeping with the spirit of the Proclamation.

#### V.O.N. GETS INCREASED GRANT

Health Minister Bill MacEachern presented a cheque for \$19,400 to the Nova Scotia branch of the Victorian Order of Nurses today.

This brings the 1974 grant from the provincial government to \$79,400 which is more than double last year's total.

"The provincial funds will support the valuable Home Nursing Service of V.O.N.," said the Health Minister. "Their services cover 86 per cent of the population with services primarily used by citizens over 65 years, although care is available to all ages."

Regional director of V.O.N., Mrs. Marlene Grantham said that the grant will boost the work of the 12 branches of V.O.N. in this province, which provides home nursing to the ill including those who are discharged from hospital.

Revenue for V.O.N. services are provided by service fees, grants from provincial and municipal governments, voluntary funds, and sources such as bonds and loans. In 1973, 72 per cent of the services were visits to persons over the age of 65 years and 56 per cent of the V.O.N. service was given patients discharged from hospitals.

The service, now 76 years old in Nova Scotia, releases much needed hospital beds.

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## DRUG DEPENDENCY

The N.S. Commission on drug dependency's pilot addiction treatment program in Cape Breton should be given continued support and development and should be used as a model for other areas of the Province.

This is the conclusion of two independent evaluations conducted this past summer at the request of the Nova Scotia Treasury Board and the Commission and released by Health Minister MacEachern. "In several respects," one report says, "The Cape Breton Model could point the way to more effective management of addiction in other parts of Canada and elsewhere."

The evaluations were conducted by Dr. Gordon Bell and associates of the Donwood Institute for the treatment of Alcoholism, Toronto, and Dr. John Clayton and Dr. Norman Bell of the Canadian Mental Health Association. Both organizations have had extensive experience in dealing with drug and alcohol addictions.

Both reports recommend the Cape Breton Model be expanded across the Province as rapidly as finances and staff availability permit.

Singled out as important contributing factors to the success of the program were the dedication and enthusiasm of the staff. The Donwood Report especially praised the competence of both professional and non-professional workers, saying they are uniquely qualified to become the nucleus of other community programs in Nova Scotia. It recommended the staff be increasingly concerned with training, consultation and general education in the Community.

Noting that the "most expensive way to cope with alcohol and drug problems is to do nothing," the Reports urge continued emphasis on longterm care and community education, routine evaluation of results and techniques, and maintenance of the Commission's balanced team effort professionals, nonprofessionals and recovered patients.

Mr. MacEachern said the Cape Breton Project is unique in Canada in the comprehensiveness of its services; it offers a five-phase program involving detoxification, shortterm in-patient therapy and outpatient services. In addition, there is a half-way house for short-term stays and a longterm sheltered workshop for those unable to satisfactorily adjust to their new lives.

The program has been in operation just over a year, Mr. MacEachern said, and has achieved a high level of rehabilitation for those seeking its services, with a low drop-out rate. It attempts to involve every element of community life and is administered by community volunteers.

The major priorities stemming from the evaluation include the increased integration of existing community services, increased involvement of the medical profession, expansion of the Industrial Program, increased education programs and the implementation of a documentation, evaluation and research program.

Mr. MacEachern said the two reports were a tribute to the competence and dedication of the Commission staff, both at the Cape Breton facilities and at commission headquarters. He also praised the volunteer assistance of the local committees and regional board and said that without their help, the Project would not have been possible.

"Nova Scotia," he said, "has broken new ground in the treatment and rehabilitation of drug and alcohol problems.

"These reports, by people whose credentials in the field are beyond question, confirm what the Commission has always believed, that by using all the Community resources at our disposal, alcohol and drug addictions can be overcome.

"PCredit must go to the Commission staff for its perseverance in the belief that these problems are not hopeless. The fact that other jurisdictions are now looking seriously at our program is due entirely to their success."

## GIRL GUIDES COME TO N.S.

Hon. M.E. Delory, M.D., Minister of Lands and Forests, announced today that the International Girl Guide Camp will be held in Nova Scotia in

It is anticipated that the Camp, which is scheduled to be held from July 28 to August 9, will attract approximately 2,000 guides from some 90 countries around the world.

Following an inspection of the area, and through the cooperation of the Department Lands and Forests, a camp ground will be provided for the visitors on the 470 acres of park reserve land known as the Lund Farm, located some 15 miles from Sydney on the Mira River.

This attractive property has a river frontage of over one mile and, in addition, has a large section of cleared farm land. It is anticipated that the Laind Property will be developed as a day-use provincial park in the future. ,

Basic testing and use of an existing well and provision of a water system will be required in any such development. However, as pointed out by the Minister, part of the cost which will be involved in providing facilities for the Girl Guides would be for the development of a provincial park. There is already a good road access into the area.

Next January, members of the International Camp Steering Committee will be meeting with Dr. Delory and officials of the Department of Lands and Forests for a joint discussion of plans involving the proposed camp program.

Dr. Delory said he was particularly pleased that the International Camp would be held in Nova Scotia in that it would constitute an opportunity. for Nova Scotia to become better known in countries around the world:

Because of the success in Cape Breton, the treatment program will be introduced in the North Shore area next year, Mr. MacEachern announced. Similar programs will eventually operate throughout Nova Scotia.

## **Forest Fire** Report for 1974 Season

OTTAWA - In its final report for the 1974 forest fire season, the Canadian Forestry Service records a total of 7,673 forest fires in Canada during the months of April to October inclusive, affecting a total 2,070,000 acres.

For the 1973 fire season, the corresponding figures were 7,475 fires and 2,971,000 acres.

During the month of October, **440** fires burned over 116,000 acres of forest land; a dramatic. increase over the same month. last year, when 189 fires of fected only 3000 acres. Average figures for the month of October for the 10 year period 1964-1973 are 171 fires over 4,000 acres, while the seasonal averages for the same 10-year period are 7,798 fires and 2,311,000 acres.

The statistics are compiled monthly by the Forest Fire Research Institute of the Canadian Forestry Service.

There is something about Christmas, and the forced-draft "merriment" that attends it, which seems to heighten the hurt of every poignant human situation.

Take, for example, those who have lost loved ones during the past year. An empty place at the Christmas table can create a keener sense of bereavement than the funeral itself.

Or consider those for whom loneliness long ago became a chronic condition. They may have lerned to accept it, and live with it during the rest of the year, but the spectacle of families gathering for Christmas is a poultice of salton a never-healed wound.

For every alcoholic who has achieved an arrest of his disease and is fighting gallantly, one day at a time, to maintain the blessing of sobriety. Christmas is sheer hell; the worst time of the whole year. This is the season when he is most severely temptedby his own desires and by his supposed "friends"-to fall off the wagon.

For the poor — and perhaps even more for middle-income families trying to keep tight budgets in precarious balance -Christmas is at best a strain. At

worst it presents a grim choice between breaking the children's hearts or go over the brink into financial disaster.







Our Glen is 12, Denina is 5, Gary and Terry are 7. They are handicapped with extremely bad vision. John 4, and Robert 11, are totally blind. Robert has had a severe time and has had to have one of his eyes removed. Little Mary is 3 - she is not only blind but deaf too.

Each of these and other visually handicapped youngsters have been helped in the ways most needed to give them a positive attitude to participate in life, as normally as possible. They are being trained through CNIB programs and the programs of other agencies, to overcome fears and take their place in school and learn the skills to become independent, selfsupporting persons.

Could any work for children be finer?

Miss Eileen Scott, a teacher of the Children's Department with Vancouver CNIB, recently broadcast to mothers about handling their blind child. One mother in response wrote to one of our Maritime Children's Counsellors, Mrs. Jean Royd, saying she had read Miss Scott's material entitled "What A Blind Child Needs More Than Tender Loving Care". At that time she was greatly confused fused and very unsure of how to deal with a blind baby. "Miss Scott has helped me so much", she said. Futhermore, she wrote saying "Mrs. Boyd's thoughts, dreams, plans and everything else, have made me so grateful. I now know and feel that I am, and can be, a qualified mother to raise my blind child".

Maybe you can help at this Season of Goodwill, by remembering the blind of your community in your will. The work of the CNIB serves little people throughout the years till they grow to maturity, and take a productive part in society.

## MILK FOR STUDENTS STILL FIVE CENTS

"The increase in the cost of milk due to the withdrawal of the Federal Subsidy will not affect the price of milk to elementary students under our school milk program," said Hon. Jack Hawkins, Nova Scotia's Minister of Agriculture and Marketing.

The Minister went on to say, "while the cost of milk has increased we will continue to provide milk to elementary school children at a cost of five cents per serving."

Nova Scotia is the only province in Canada with a school milk program for elementary students. This new program costing close to one million dollars was introduced by the Department of Agriculture in September, 1974, and has been successful, with 468 schools enrolled at the present time, making milk available to approximately 101, 258 elementary students. Many counties have 100 per cent enrollment in the Program.

The Halifax County area. including the Cities of Dartmouth and Halifax, have 114 schools enrolled, and they serve 28, 634 students. This is followed by Cape Breton County with 60 schools enrolled and 12,474 students and Colchester-

Hants has 36 schools enrolled and 7.728 elementary school students are being served in this area. Kings County, with 14 schools and Northside-Victoria County with 26 schools have approximately the same number of students enrolled just over 5,000.

This is a voluntary program and schools are free to participate and use whatever method they wish in dispensing the milk.

"By maintaining a five cent per serving cost, we can provide a degree of stability in pricing and consumption for elementary school students in the Province," said the Minister. The School Milk Program has increased milk consumption in the Schools by 300 per cent.

An examination of the volume being handled by this program indicates that for the month of October, the **Elementary Schools used 90,000** quarts of milk and 810,000 eight ounce containers, this being equivalent to 252,000 quarts.

If the present rate of consumption continues throughout the school year, it would seem likely that the School Milk Program will account for the consumption of over six and one half million pounds of fluid

## Send season mail without any delay

Watch the calendar! You can make sure your Christmas cards and packages are delivered on time if you just follow a simple

rule — mail early. Although "it's the thought that counts," a Christmas card or Christmas gift received in the mail late can be disappointing. Not to mention the aggravation it produces among Service employees who are

deluged with billions of cards and packages during the season.

So, to get holiday material delivered on time, and help the postman perform his duty, use zip codes and keep some deadlines in mind:

—By the end of November you should have mailed: surface parcels to Alaska and Hawaii; packages via parcel airlift to the Arctic and Canada:

and airmail parcels and cards to South and Central America, and the Near East or Far East.

During the second week of December, try to take care of these holiday mailings: international greeting cards and parcels to Africa, Near East and Far East; surface mail for the whole United States (including Alaska and

Mawaii); airmail parcels and cards to Canada, Europe and Mexico.

-And finally, by the end of the third week in December, with only three to five days to spare be-fore the 25th, send all airmail parcels and cards to Alaska and Hawaii as well as all destinations in the continental United States.

Christmas Seals originated in Copenhagen, Denmark. in 1904. It was the idea of a postal clerk named Holboell. who dreamed them up as a benefit for a children's hospital.

"Christmas" got its origin from "X," an abbreviation of Christ deriving from the Greek letter X (ch) beginning His Name.






## SANTA PLUS 100 RECRUITS VISIT HOME

## FORMER DIGBY WOMAN 100 YEARS OLD

It is interesting to note that Sir Winston Churchill must share his centennial year with a local resident. Born also in 1874 was Emma Evelyn (Sabean) Greene, 42 Acadia Street, Wolfville.

On December 8th, 1874, Mrs. Emma Evelyn (Sabean) Greene was born in New Tusket, Digby County, one of five children in the family of the late Mr. and Mrs. John T. Sabean. In 1895 she married James W. Greene. After brief periods spent in Boston, the family returned to New Tusket where they operated a farm until 1941. In 1888 at the age of 14, Emma (Sabean) Greene became a baptized member of the New Tusket Baptist Church. She is the longest living and oldest member of that church. His life was a conflict with forces of evil, forces which eventually brought him to the Cross.

So in celebrating Christmas, we should see in the one called Christ a challenge, not only to the Herods and Pilates of 2,000 years ago, but to those of every day, of every nation.

That was the hope, of Christmas then. It is still the hope, of Christmas today. But we need to work harder to realize that hope. - Unchurch Editorials.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor and Readers:

Since my last letter from "behind the scenes" in Digby, some good things have happened in your town council. Perhaps the most rewarding of these, to the greatest number of taxpayers, has been the removal of the controversial occupancy tax. As I mentioned previously, my motion at the November 4 meeting of council to remove this tax was Between the defeated. meetings of November 4 and December 2 I received 72 phone calls, several letters and other verbal communications supporting the removal of the tax. I did not receive one call supporting its retention.On the basis of this, the issue was pursued further on December 2, and although Mayor Kinney again requested further delay, the motion passed with only one dissenting vote, that of Councillor Gordon Ellis.

Another long-standing request was fulfilled, in the decision at a special meeting of council on December 4, to install eleven street lights in the Mount Pleasant area. When residents appealed to the county council a few years ago for this service they were advised that the distribution system for the area of the request belonged to the town of Digby. Since that time residents have presented petitions and appeals to the town for this needed service, indicating their willingness to bear the cost, which unfortunately has now increased to a figure far beyond the original estimate.

Hopefully, this is the beginning of long overdue improvements in street lighting services, one of the top areas of dissatisfaction expressed by town residents to me since October.

On the darker side of the horizon, it appears that the residents of Victoria Street will continue, for some time at least, to be the victims of a colossal error of judgment made in August 1969, when the Department of Highways bowed to the wishes of a small delegation of Digby business men, headed by (then) Mayor Smith. As a result of this deputation, the approach road through a wooded area, which had been appropriately designed by the department to connect 101 to the Princess of Acadia ferry wharf, was abandoned, and the narrow, thickly settled Victoria Street emerged as the connector route, which incidentally joined the main highway at the site of a (then) proposed shopping centre. Since that time the tragedies of death and destruction which have occurred on this ill-chosen route have made it a monument of

shame to its promoters. Added to this, the night-long roar of heavy transport traffic en route to the ferry, and the safety of children and pedestrians by day, have changed the one-time peaceful life-style of Victoria Street residents to one of nightmarish existence.

Only recently have I learned that the Department of Highways wanted to improve Victoria Street in the summer of 1974, and offered to eliminate the treacherous roadside ditches by installing storm sewers, covering and paving the road shoulders. This however, would be done only if the town agreed to construct adjacent sidewalks. When the department requested a decision on this from the town they were informed that sidewalks would not be constructed this present year, due to "budget

problems." The cost of the sidewalks was estimated at \$50,000, a modest sum compared with the allocation of public funds for servicing development companies in this period - a service frowned upon by the Graham Royal Commission, which states on page 23 of the synopsis of the report,

DEVELOPER CHARGES: 'Each county would be empowered to levy a developer charge on those undertaking any major development. This would cover all or part of the additional costs of water supply and distribution facilities, sewage collection and treatment facilities, and streets and

roads that are required as a result of development. Planning permission for such a development should be conditional on an undertaking by the developer to pay the charge. The charge would become a lien on the development."

In closing, I would like thank the citizens from whom I have received such kind letters and notes since October last. Your questions are receiving my attention and I shall continue to attempt to secure answers to them all.

### PREWINTER INSPECTIONS

Snowmobile owners were urged by the Ministry of Transport today to inspect their machines thoroughly before putting them into service this winter season.

The Ministry stressed that a fuel tank inspection is of particular importance since the plastic fuel tanks used in most snowmobiles have a tendency to develop cracks during summer storage months.

The fuel tank should be removed and checked for a singular one to two inch crack or for crazing marks or spiderweb-like cracks on the tank surface. A cracked fuel tank should be replaced. While there are as yet no recorded fatalities resulting from this problem it does present a

significant and also poses a safety hazard due to the possibility of stranding in cold weather.

Other recommended safety checks involve inspections of steering tie rod ends, kingpins, brakes, drive belts, lubricant levels and the track condition. It is important to properly reinstall all shields and covers after these inspections.

Snowmobile owners should heed these warnings, carry out the necessary inspections and thereby greatly enhance their chances of enjoying the snowmobile season.

A safety standard for the construction of metallic and non-metallic fuel tanks in snowmobiles has been proposed effective February 1, 1976.

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
### ASSOCIATION MEETS AT FREEPORT

### **CHRIST MAS** SAFETY HINTS

Before erecting your tree, cut an inch or so off the bottom, place it in a sturdy stand containing water, and fasten it securely, advises Nova Scotia Fire Marshal Robert Kerr. Check the water level everyday.

Keep your Christmas tree away from heat, such as radiators or the fire-place, warns Fire Marshal Robert Kerr. Make sure the lights are turned off before you leave the house, and don't leave them on for long periods.

On Christmas morning, clean up the old gift wrappings, bundle them up and put them outside, advises Fire Marshall Robert Kerr, to make sure fire doesn't spoil the festivities.

When cooking with grease, oils or fats never leave the pot or pan unattended, Provincial Fire Marshal Robert Kerr suggests grease fires happen

If grease or fats catch fire act quickly - turn off the heat and put the lid on tightly - smother the fire, urges Fire Marshal Robert Kerr. If you do not have a lid, throw lots of baking soda directly on the flames - never use water, it will only spread the fire.

Never carry a flaming pan turn off the stove, smother the fire - keep cool but act fast advises Fire Marshall Robert

Federal financial assistance totalling in the millions of dollars is desperately needed to bring community fishing wharves in the Digby Neck and southwest Nova Scotia areas up to acceptable standards, Digby MLA Joe Casey said.

Despite the money the areas have received in the past two years for repairing and extending wharves, "it has only been a drop in the bucket," he

said. Mr. Casey said in an interview that in Digby Neck alone, at least \$4 million needs

to be spent on wharves. Fishermen in most localities have no reliable means of securing their boats in rough

### \$3 Million Worth Of N.S. Pelts At Show

Mr. Pace recalled that at a recent conference of highways ministers in Winnipeg, it was noted that "no province has implemented a reduction to 55 miles per hour on its principal highways". The conference formally went on record as favouring reductions of speed limits on selected roads. "This we do now, as circumstances warrant," he said. The ministers agreed that "a reduction of speed limits alone may not automatically result in a drop in traffic deaths."

He cited the need to prevent excessive speed through education and deterrents, such as recently-introduced legislation to increase fines substantially. Proposed amendments to the Motor Vehicle Act also provide penalties for failure to wear seat belts, or other restraining equipment, if a vehicle is so furnished.

"Nova Scotia leads all other provinces in making mandatory the use of such safety equipment," said Mr. Pace.

He noted recommendations of a Crash Countermeasures Committee charged with determining causes of highway accidents, and the proposing of measures to reduce their number and severity. A major recommendation has taken shape in the setting up of a Task Force to suggest how a driver education course may become part of high school curricula. The Department of Highways now gives assistance to driver education courses in 85 schools throughout Nova Scotia.

An advertising campaign will soon appear in major media alerting drivers to the perils of drinking and driving.

Two breathalyzer vans will shortly be put at the disposal of the RCMP. Highways safety education officers spoke to 73,000 people last year.

Nova Scotia mink ranchers will have approximately \$3 million worth of pelts at the annual Canadian fall fur show in Montreal, next week.

About 80 per cent of the province's 110,000 pelts have come from Digby County.

The show is critical to the ranchers, Digby County agriculture representative, Bruce Gilliatt, said yesterday.

"In the 15-to-20 minutes it takes for buyers to bid on a

rancher's pelts, he could either sink or swim financially."

Don Mullen, Havelock, Digby County, president of the Nova Scotia Mink Ranchers Association, said Tuesday last year's average price per pelt was \$21 with top price reaching \$50 per pelt.

Mr. Mullen estimated the average price this year will be down about 10 per cent because of speculation there will be fewer European buyers at the

"This could mean buyers will be extremely cautious in their bidding and not buy as much as last year," he said.

Nova Scotia produces 12 to 13 per cent of all Canadian mink pelts. The province has the third highest mink production rate in Canada.

The three-day show which begins Monday will feature furs from across Canada.

Prior to the sale, buyers from around the world will have a chance to view the pelts and decide which ones they want, said Mr. Gilliatt. The pelts are numbered in groups.

The sale is organized by the Hudson Bay Company in Montreal.

# increase in **Family** Allowance

Increases in Family Allowances, effective in January, 1975 have been announced today by Health and Welfare Minister Marc Lalonde. The increase is based on the cost of living increase since November 1973, as provided for in the Family Allowances Act.

Federal monthly allowances paid for children under the age of 18 will rise to \$22.08 from \$20 a month per child. Under a provison in the Family Allowances Act a provincial government may ask thefederal government to vary the family allowance rates payable in that province according to the age cr the number of children in a family, or both, providing the family allowance payments in each province average \$22.08

In my opinion, if the Digby fans continue with this attitude, then hockey and other sports will become a thing of the past. Already, one hockey team in the high school league has refused to play in Digby and I'm sure others will follow.

The value and importance of sports in the valley and in Nova Scotia is too great to allow these few people to destroy it.

In closing I wish to re-state the fact that this letter in no way reflects on the Digby Hockey Team itself who played an excellent game and defeated Bridgetown.



10. Consider using an artificial flame proof tree.

11. Remove the tree to the outdoors as soon as possible.

12. Never burn a Christmas tree in the fireplace.

The idea of making the Christmas tree flame retardant appeals to all of us, and each year various organizations publicize do-it-yourself treatments. Usually, the solution suggested is the borax boric acid compound. According to the National Fire Protection Association, this treatment is

satisfactory when used for the temporary fire retarding of cellulosic fabrics such as cotton and rayon but it is of little value when used on Christmas trees. The needles of a tree do not soak up the chemical as a fabric does, nor can they be readily coated on all sides.

The only sure method of flame retarding natural trees is to completely immerse them in an U.derwriters Laboratories listed tree fire-retardant, and no private individual would be expected to go to such trouble and expense.

The Council therefore suggests the above safety tips should be clipped out and used when needed.

The measurement and division of time goes back to the very beginning of things. Days were easily divided by the passage of the sun and longer seasons were measured by the moon. village. The meeting was presided over by the president. Rev. R.R. Winchester and a special guest was Terry Crowe, Annapolis County District Planning Officer.

A decision was made to have a map drawn up by Mr. Crowe in order to inform the public and measure the reaction as the wishes of the people are important. The map, it is un-

derstood, will entail the school district on the Digby and Annapolis County sides, a fire district area and location of roads leading to the village.

It was felt that information on procedures should be found and also what powers would be bestowed on the Village Commissioners: Boundaries, drainage and assessment propositions were discussed. Warden E.C.Denton offered that an area rate would be

assessed for village services which are not looked after by the County. He stated that the community can get additional services under the present setup but as a village it would have direct control over them.

Bill Cox said that the Village would have no direct control over education but could make representations concerning the matter.

Some of the effects of incorporation on the community were also brought out Bruce Davey pointed out that as a village the community could have its own police protection and could enact by-laws to

cover squealing tires, etc. He said it would be eligible for costsharing in its services and would only have to pay 20 percent or less of the actual cost.

### CHANGES HEALTH SERVICES TAX ACT

The Health Services Tax Act Chapter 126 has been amended to incorporate certain changes, and the following information is provided to vendors and consumers.

1) Clause (0) of Section 10 of Chapter 126 Health Services Tax Act is amended by striking out the word "fifteen" in the third line thereof and substituting therefor the words "twentyfive". The effective date is on and not before December 1,

**Explanation:** This removes the tax from a transaction where the purchase price is twenty-five cents or less. This does not include cigarettes and cigars. The previous exemption minimum was fifteen cents. Tax cards presently in use may continue to be used amending

16-21.01c to read 16-25 nil, and amending 22-35.02c to read 26-35.02c. There is no change in the balance of the card with the exception of the footnote on the second page which should now read \$0.25 in lieu of \$0.15.

There is no change in the taxable status of such items as chocolate bars and soft drinks. When purchased for .26c and over, singly, or two or more, the tax is applicable. 2) Subsection (2) of Section 14 of said Chapter 126 as enacted

by said Chapter 15 is amended by adding immediately after the word "records" in the third line thereof the words "and to make and file such returns".

Explanation: This makes the provision dealing with the certificate of a Commissioner and failure to keep records also applicable to failure to make and file returns.

3) Subsection (1) of Section 30 of said Chapter 126 is amended by striking out the words "six per cent per year" in the fourth line thereof and substituting therefor the words "such interest rate per year as is determined from time to time by the Governor in Council".

Explanation: This will change the interest to be charged upon penalties from Lix percent a year to the amounts to be determined by the Governor in Council.

4) Subsection (2) of Section 40 of said Chapter 126 is amended by adding immediately after clause (e) thereof the following

(ea) determining the interest rate year for the purpose of subsection (1) of Section 30.

**Explanation:** This gives the Governor in Council authority to make regulations to determine the interest upon penalties for the purpose of Section 30 of the Act.

5) Clause (b) of subsection (2) of Section 42 of said Chapter 126 as amended by said Chapters 49 and 15 is further amended by adding immediately after subclause (iii) thereof the following subclause:

(iv) to defray the cost of purchasing or acquiring control of a hospital as defined by the Public Hospitals Act;

Explanation: This will permit the Minister of Finance to charge to the Hospital Reserve Account the cost of purchasing and acquiring control of a hospital as defined by the Public Hospitals Act.

The changes above will be incorporated into the Health Services Tax Act during reprinting.

### Retirement Pensions Have you contributed to the Plan at any time since January 1,1966?

Are you between 65 and 69? Then you have a choice

Apply now and start receiving your monthly CPP retirement pension. No more need to retire to collect benefits. (Once you start receiving your pension, however, you can't make further contributions to the Plan.)

Continue to contribute to the CPP and possibly build up a larger retirement pension to commence at a later date. Continuing to contribute is also a way to qualify survivors for benefits if you have not already done so. (When approaching age 70, you should consider applying for your retirement pension because after 70 you may no longer contribute to the Canada Pension Plan.)

NOTE: Before making your choice you may wish to seek advice from the nearest CPP office. The staff will be pleased to help you.

Are you approaching age 65?

If you have made your choice and want your CPP retirement pension to commence as early as possible, you should apply two or three months before your 65th birthday NOTE: There is no provision for retroactive payment of retirement pensions between the ages of 65 and 69. So if you're in that age group or approaching it. get advice as soon as possible

Do you now receive a CPP retirement pension? As of January 1st. 1975, your pension will no longer be affected by any money you earn thereafter

# **Equal Protection** for Males and Females.

This means that for female contributors, in addition to being eligible for a retirement pension and disability protection for themselves, and a death benefit payable to their estates, as has been the case in the past, their spouses and dependent children are now eligible for benefits as follows:

**Benefits for Surviving Spouses** 

A monthly pension payable to the widower who at the time of the death of the contributor is over 35 years of age, or under 35 years of age but is disabled or has dependent children; that is, a benefit similar to that which has always existed for widows:

**Benefits for Orphans** 

Disability Pension.

A monthly benefit payable to unmarried dependent children under 18 and to unmarried dependent children between 18 and 25 attending school or university on a full-time basis. In order for survivors to qualify, the contributor must have died in January 1968 or later and must have contributed for the minimum contributory period, which is three years for

deaths occurring before January 1, 1975. **Benefits for Children of Disabled Contributors** A monthly benefit payable to unmarried dependent children under 18 and to unmarried dependent children between 18 and 25 attending school or university on a full-time basis, where the contributor concerned is in receipt of a CPP

NOTE: In all cases, it is necessary to make application for benefits. If such applications are approved, payments can only be made currently—that is, from January 1, 1975. No payment can be made for any period prior to that date.

### Other Changes:

The earnings ceiling—that is, the maximum amount on which contributions can be paid and on which benefits can be calculated—is being raised to \$7400 in 1975 and to \$8300 in 1976. The initial amount of earnings. on which you are not required to contribute, will be

### Nutrition Aims At Quality

Today, the aim is toward adding quality to life, and not just years.

This sums up discussions at a symposium held in New York City to review and explore information on nutrition and aging.

A nutritionist with the Northumberland Health Unit, Miss Vicki Crooks of Pictou, attended the third annual symposium on nutrition and aging, held at the Commodore Hotel by the Institute of Human Nutrition, College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University.

"Aging begins early in life and many defects seem to be programmed in childhood," said Miss Crooks in an interview on the symposium. "You can prevent disease after discovery of defects and it is also debatable whether you can change programming later in

"Today's lifestyle, with its lack of exercise, soft foods, high fat intake and smoking, affects the state of health," she said. "Only cancer of the lung ex-

ceeds cancer of the colon in the cause of death due to internal cancers," she reported. "The symptoms are connected with our lifestyle. There are some 500,000 deaths a year from cancer of the colon, in the United States."

Nutritionists expressed concern over the lack of fibre in the "soft" diets of today, she said. Several gastrointestinal conditions such as constipation, diabetes mellitus, carcinoma of the colon, hyperthyroidism gallstones, hiatus hernia and many more, were attributed to low fibre content.

### Credit Purchases Hig h

Nobody gets anything for the Provincial nothing, Secretary, Hon. A. Garnet Brown reminds shoppers, not even at Christmas.

Mr. Brown reminds would-be Santa Clauses to be careful how they spend their money, especially if they buy their gifts on credit.

Credit cost money, Mr. Brown says, and like any other consumer product available these days, the cost varies. Therefore, to get the most for your money, you should shop around for credit just as you would for any consumer goods.

If you are borrowing money or buying on credit, find out how much the privilege will cost you before you sign anything. Under the terms of the Nova Scotia Consumer Protection Act, consumers buying on credit must be provided with a true copy of the contract or invoice setting out exactly how much credit will cost them. This amount must be shown in actual dollars and cents, as well as an annual interest rate.

The lender must also show in writing all other charges he intends to make should the borrower default in his payments. The Act applies not only to contracts for goods purchased on credit, but also to overdue monthly accounts and to all loans.

Credit is an important financial tool in this day and age, Mr. Brown says, but improperly used or credit can be

the cause of many problems. Remember, he advises, the gift that seemed so perfect before Christmas, will be a great deal

less so if you're still paying for it in March. Think before you buy anything, especially if you're buying on credit.

Buy wisely and pay promptly is a good maxim to shop by, says Mr. Brown at Christmas and throughout the year.

# Thoughts Of The Sea Understanding And

From square-rigged sailing ships of last century to armed merchantmen on Atlantic convoys in World War II - that's the span of history and sailing experience of one Nova Scotian skipper.

Capt. Eugene Coates, OBE, spent more than half a century at sea, 35 of those years as master of a variety of vessels. Now, at 84, he is just as erect, keen of eye and steady of hand as when he signed on as ship's crew in 1906, an eager 16-year old from Annapolis.

Although officially retired since 1960, Capt. Coates hasn't finished with the sea. He would be called out, often on short notice, to serve as relieving master on a variety of commands.

His sea-time of 60 years or so is a record not commonly enjoyed by sea-faring men or those of any other vocation. He has served as seaman, cook, boatswain, quartermaster, second mate, mate and master.

Going up that ladder takes a combination of experience afloat and classrcom studies. Classes ashore were held in the marine schol in Yarmouth where Capt, Coates gained his Mate's Certificate for Passenger Steamers and Square-Rigged and Fore-and-Aft Rigged Sailing Vessels, his Master's Certificate for Sailing Vessel Any Rig and, finally, his Master's Certificate for passenger steamers and any rig or sailing vessel. This last he has held and cherished since 1917.

In the arctic waters of Hudson's Bay and tropical waters of many of the world's ports, Capt. Coates has handled cargo of all kinds and taken command of armed merchantmen in two world wars.

observed Capt. Coates, "I never lost a a up - and only one man. That was when we were working the Great Lakes and he died of natural causes as we were rushing him to hospital in Toronto."

"In all my years as Master,"

In this, the captain was a lucky man. Once, on convoy in World War II, three ships in his line were torpedoed and lost. He's had closer calls than

that. On January 3, 1913, he was mate on a four-masted American schooner carrying 2,250 tons of rails to Galveston, Texas. The ship hit a heavy gale and was straining badly. With water rising in the hull, the order was given to abandon

"We were only 400 feet away in the life-boats when she tipped. bow first and went to the bottom



ina steep dive," Capt. Coates remembers.

Keeping the life-boat afloat was a constant job for four days as bailing was a full-time occupation. The men in the lifeboat were picked up by a Greek sponger and landed at Cedar Keys, Florida.

"That was one time when we were mighty glad to get ashore," said Capt. Coates.

Another close call was experienced in Bridgetown, Barbados, when the duty boat was taking Capt. Coates andtwo other masters out to their ships anchored in deep water offshore. The duty boat was run down by a small steamer at 11 p.m. and by the time he was picked up, Capt. Coates had lost consciousness. necessitated a six-day hospital

"After getting back on board my ship, I then sailed for New York," was Capt. Coates way of ending that story. Just the bare. facts, no details of coming up under the steamer's stern, nearly being drawn into her whirling propellers, almost being drowned. His most interesting command, and a favorite vessel, was the tern schooner Montclair, a threemasted ship 142 feet in length built by the Yarmouth Shipbuilding Company."I went on board and took command of her on the first day of November, 1918 while she was still on the stocks," said the captain. "I

was on her when she was launched, on November 18 - my birthday, to be exact.

"Quite a birthday present," he said. "I was in command of her for two and a half years, enjoyed every minute of it even the hard times, and there were plenty of those."

After sea trials, Capt. Coates and the Montclair took 4,000

barrels of potatoes to Havana, Cuba, a passage of 20 days.

From there, it was a cargo of rum and tobacco to Secondi, Gold Coast Colony in West

For that trip, the Montclair was 50 days at sea in weather both good and bad, including three days of heavy gales with a dangerous sea.

Several other African ports, as well as Marseilles and Gibraltar in the Mediterranean, before re-crossing the Atlantic to the West Indies then to New York. It was a voyage of 19,000 miles to a variety of ports with a variety of cargoes.

With a lifetime of sailing behind him. Capt. Coates can entertain visitors by the hour with his stories of the seas. discharging cargo at Fort Churchill in Hudson's Bay; loading crude oil in Venezuela's Lake Maracaibo; Canadian grain at the Lakehead; bananas in Nicaragua; oranges in Cuba: lobsters in Nova Scotia. Your name it and Capt. Coates has probably carried it.

His service was not unrewarded. In 1946, he was on the New Year's Honors List when King George VI conferred the Order of the British Empire upon him.

In a letter of recommendation, a former employer wrote, "We never had any cause for complaint. Capt. Coates is strictly sober, honest and attentive to his duties and we can thoroughly recommend him in every way to anyone who can make use of his services."

That's high commendation but justly earned in a life of command at sea. Today, Capt. Coates lives quietly ashore in a bungalow at Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, a stone's throw from Halifax Harbor where he often boards one of his many commands.

Liquor Consumers Fa cin g Increased Prices

After a number of years of relatively stable prices in the alcohol beverage industry producers are facing increases which have not been experienced before particulaly with regard to the cost of raw materials which in some cases have more than tripled.

Strikes within and outside the industry as well as a severe shortage of packaging materials have caused difficulties for the commission in obtaining products from suppliers, especially in the United Kingdom.

Glass is in short supply in the U.K. have had to find new suppliers from as far away as the U.S. and this has added to production costs which have in turn been passed along to the consumer.

Due to an ever increasing interest in table wines by the general public the question of product knowledge has come under review. Customers are requesting information that most of the staff of the commission's store do not have. In this regard the commission will hold product knowledge seminars throughout the province in 1975 to enable staff to answer questions and assist customers in making purchases.

French wine prices have begun to level out after two years of dramatic increases. This is due chiefly to two factors - an over supply of wine in France following two years of record vintages, and a reluctance on the part of customers to buy wines from France at the price asked.

Customers have turned to other countries as sources of wine, and though prices have not dropped drastically there is some movement in this direction. In the past year the commission has listed California wines which are now competitive in price with French wines.

Since 1970, the commission has been working on a program to convert and replace all outlets with self-service stores. During the current fiscal year the commission has converted premises at St. Peters, Arichat and Digby to self-serve. Only one replacement store (at the Halifax Shopping Centre) has been completed. Premises will be opened early in the new year at Bridgetown, Glace Bay and West Pubnico.

A new licensee store, located adiacent to the Ashby liquor store, will be opened in 1975 to service taverns, beverage rooms and other licenco establishments.

The commission specialty store, on Hollis Street in Halifax, is moving early in 1975 to the Halifax Shopping Centre in order to serve a greater number of customers. The purpose of the specialty store is to provide a wider selection of products, particularly table wines, and to test new products which might be suitable for listing in all commission

While we give credit to these persons for their ability and patience we must go a little further and credit the underpinnings of the whole success to the hope, trust, uriderstanding the love generated by the superintendent. Mrs. Dorothy Smythe and her entire staff and to the sympathy, understanding and generosity they inspire to many friends of the Home.

Hope, trust, understanding and love could work wonders in the whole world. Yes, it could. using Mr. Cardoza's expression work a major miracle.


### Digby County Mink Stand Out In Show

At the fall fur show held in Montreal recently Digby County mink made a fine showing as has become habitual for the past years with about 80 per cent of the Nova Scotia animals in the show being from Digby County.

Because of the fear of adverse economic conditions fewer European buyers attended the show which caused the sale of mink pelts to decrease by twenty to twenty-five percent. The price also fell by nearly a

quarter of the 1973 show. Instead of 30 European buyers as in 1973 there were only five, it is understood.

The ranchers from Nova Scotia sold about 75 percent of the dark mink they displayed in Montreal while the pastels went only to fifty percent. Highest price for dark mink was \$36.50 males and \$28 females. Some of the Digby County mink rated the top prices paid and in general Nova Scotia ranchers did better than other provinces.
